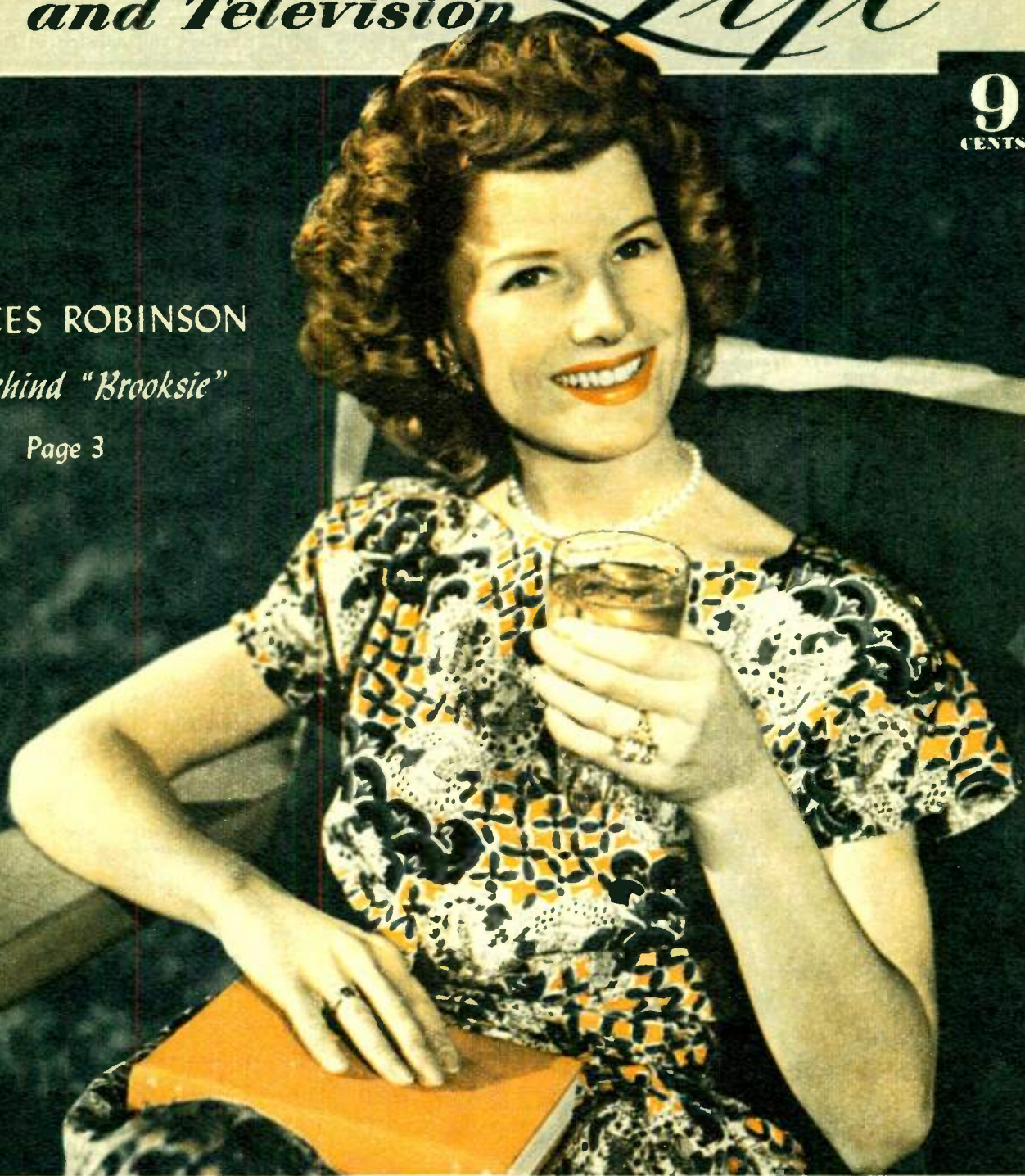

The Real "Brooksie"

Meet Beautiful Frances Robinson, Who Tells Of Her Nicest Compliment—Being Rated Next To Ida Lupino as a Fan's Favorite Actress

YOUR FIRST impression of lovely Frances Robinson would be that she is one of the most poised women you have ever met. As she breezed through the entrance to the Brown Derby, a little breathless because she was late, her head was high and she called greetings to many friends in a softly modulated, vaguely British-accented voice. Yet as we settled into the plush leather booth, Frances admitted her one fault.

She is terribly self-conscious and admits it freely. "Of course I don't show it in front of people," she exclaimed. But behind the bright smile and the calm greenish-blue eyes there was a certain hesitancy. As if she were trying so hard to prove to herself that there is no reason for her complex.

Frances certainly is one girl who could sit back and think of her dramatic career with great pride. She began at the age of four with the portrayal of Lillian Gish as a baby in "Orphans of the Storm."

"I saw the picture for the first time not too long ago," she remarked. When asked what she thought of herself, Frances laughingly admitted, "Oh, I thought I had never seen such a darling little child! Such plump dimpled arms! Such sweetness! I kept telling myself how adorable the baby was with one voice while another in me kept saying, 'Oh, Frannie, shut up!'" Her mother, she said, cried.

Juvenile Roles

Moving to California when she was nine, Frances became a juvenile star in the movies. Her debut on radio was made several years later with a co-starring part on "Silver Theater." Somehow the breaks in radio didn't come as fast as should be expected and Frances happily accepted the opportunity to return to the East and a role in the Broadway musical "Jackpot" with Allan Jones.

The response was more favorable in New York, and Frances found herself busier than the legendary bee with ten radio shows a week in-

cluding "Perry Mason," "Ellery Queen," "Inner Sanctum," "The Aldrich Family," and "Philo Vance" (on which she played opposite Jose Ferrer, whom she regards with much respect).

Even with so many programs Frances still held herself back. "I just didn't think I was a good enough actress," she remembered. "But Frannie, how can you say that?" queried friends who believed in her . . . one especially, Martin Gabel, a radio actor and producer. "Frannie, you're the most attractive woman and the best actress in New York!" he kept telling her. "But I feel so unimportant!" she would bemoan. "You've just got to keep working hard!" was his reply. Mr. Gabel pushed Frances with constant reading and rehearsing, and it is he to whom she credits all the success she has attained.

From him she learned one big lesson. "Martin told me I should always give a full performance at every rehearsal," she revealed, "so instead of skipping until show time the lines where it said I should cry

or scream or laugh I would plunge right into them."

Worships Sailing

Frances looks the type who would do things enthusiastically. She describes her hobby of sailing with colorful verbiage. Even the time when she was struck on the head by the boom. "I zigged when I should have zagged!" she laughed. The delights of sailing were discovered several years ago when she and best friend Ida Lupino chartered a boat for one week. They liked it so well they kept on sailing for seven full weeks.

Talking about Ida, Frances becomes intensely loyal. Their fast friendship stems back to girlhood, when they made a solemn pact that

RADIO may change, but people don't.

Twenty-two years ago, folks liked to hear their names go out over the "wireless." That's why Ed McConnell of Atlanta, Georgia, cornered his first sponsor. He's never been without one since.

"Smilin'" Ed was an entertainer who wandered over Georgia from Mondays to Thursdays to regale audiences with his singing and playing. But every Saturday night he was back at WSB, where he started broadcasting at 10:45 p.m. and quit when he felt like it. "Sometimes it was 2 o'clock Sunday morning," Ed recalls. "Sometimes it was 3, or maybe 4 o'clock. The Western Union was

right downstairs and the boys from there brought me telegrams in baskets."

"Coming in fine," the wires would say. "Please mention my name."

Ed never did get around to mentioning the names of all the listeners who received his program "just fine." That's why the most enterprising crystal-set owners always started wiring early Monday morning to request a name mention the following Saturday night. "They didn't care about my singing," chuckles McConnell. "They just wanted to hear their names."

Grateful ones, lucky enough to be mentioned on Ed's show, sent him fruit, quail and other delicacies. Two of the most appreciative listeners

A RADIO commentary by an editor and publisher of a newspaper, listed as a "best bet" in the radio columns of rival papers—that's the pleasant attitude of the local press concerning Manchester Boddy on KFWB.

Boddy, no newcomer to the air, has been heard on his present program since February. He was also heard on that station during its accoladed coverage of the United Nations conference at San Francisco.

The editor-publisher's commentary is unusual in that any one part of it is merely a fraction of a whole philosophy which he uses as a basis for his interpretation and prognostication of the news. Attesting to its

validity are three of the shots he called during World War II. They were the invasion of Africa, the Hitler-Stalin alliance and Hitler's invasion of Russia. He discovered later that his accuracy in the first instance was so close as to be almost dangerous. The actual invasion, planned and top secret, was being discussed by Boddy in the editorial columns, not because he had information unavailable to anyone else, but because, on the basis of his figuring, thus and so should happen!

Blueprint of Future

A cool and collected individual, Boddy explains his way of looking at the world and its culture by comparing it to a home in the process of being blueprinted. If one part of a project is indicated, one will have reason to expect the entire project to be completed. Boddy's blueprint, based on history and edicts of fact, is something that is always in his thoughts, as much a part of his life as the air he breathes. He constantly checks it against the news of the day.

At present it goes in this direction: "The world faces a new problem—mass man. Three and a half generations ago, there were eight hundred and fifty million people on earth. Today there are two billion, three hundred and ten million. That's the basic situation," he states. Add the figures that world population has increased two hundred million since 1938 in spite of war casualties and

postwar conditions, and the fact that man, to feed and clothe himself, needs two and a half acres per person while only one and seven-tenths acres are available under the fairest division, and you have the basic statistics that blueprint the situation. "Mass man," continues Boddy, "has captured the end product of science and doesn't know what to do with it. Masses have never created—they have inherited. The utilization of this inheritance is the difference between our age and others."

Reason for Cold War

"Their sheer numbers, their lack of experience and their suddenness make it impossible for them to manage their own inheritance. Therefore, mass man will have war... the cause of previous wars has not been settled, so there must be further trouble. But the atom has destroyed war as we knew it as an institution; no nation can afford to undertake formal wars. The answer, bringing us to date, is the cold war, one of ideologies, consisting of isolated, spotty trouble. In spite of projected world government, we find Europe more divided than ever, the Balkans more unsettled, the present state in India and the civil war in China."

Boddy views the current situation in Europe as the passing of the era of the Atlantic and the beginning of the era of the Pacific. "The news is against me," he admits, "but the trend is there."

On the spread of communism,

Boddy paints a pessimistic picture. He believes that Russia will be unable to change Europe or to dwell next to her unless she is changed. The natural ally of Russia is Asia, dwelling in the same feudalism that ruled Russia before the Soviets. The sheer growth of population and land hunger will bring even more pressure to bear. Because our economy requires continuous expansion, these pressures are the devil to us. "And there are more members in the church when the devil is loose," he adds. In fighting the devil of communism, logically we have changed the conception of the American way of life from a political to a religious one. According to Boddy, our country will have more and more of a tendency toward military control of government, with citizens willingly giving up heritages of liberty because of the need of becoming efficient in meeting the world threat. "We fight fire with fire—and discipline with discipline." The answer to the citizen's dilemma in this changing world is that he must develop a philosophy that "tolerates and gives it its proper place in life—viewing the bulges and periods of adjustment as naturally as he views life and death."

Check on the Future

Boddy's favorite quotation, Aristotle's "Every institution has within itself the seeds of its own destruction," expresses the law of balance, which he believes holds the future in check. As an example, free speech is a heritage which we (and our newspapers) have always practiced. Self-regulation in this, as in everything, is almost compulsory. "There is freedom to do the wrong thing, but by doing that the thing destroys itself."

Boddy broadcasts from his office in the Daily News building in downtown Los Angeles. He first started his radio news commentary in 1936, and has been heard on KFI and KECA in addition to his present series on KFWB. His editorial column is in its twenty-fourth year, a

"Macbeth" Goes Modern

WHEN the Pasadena Community Playhouse some months ago began its television series with a presentation of William Shakespeare's "Macbeth" over KTTV, the occasion marked the fruits of the first station-talent pact signed on the West Coast.

Long a leader among the West's theater schools, the Pasadena group was signed by KTTV as its first programming step when that station was granted its Channel 11 permit back in 1947.

Starred in the initial production was Victor Jory, whose talents are equally known to radio, stage and screen fans. Jory, seeking a televi-

sion vehicle, eagerly grasped the chance to play the Bard's dour "Macbeth." The special adaptation, which ran for an hour a quarter, was jointly engineered by David Crandall, the show's producer, and director Thomas Armistead of the Playhouse.

Authentic Sets

Employing sets that were copied from those used in the original Globe Theater, where Shakespeare's plays made their original appearances, the show gave the Los Angeles televisioners their first inkling of the new dimension by adding to their entertainment fare professional productions of outstanding legitimate hits.

Armistead and Crandall worked over every detail of lighting, costuming and even the music for the series, their goal being that of presenting a program that could compare with theater offerings seen here on the Coast. Subsequent productions from the Playhouse will be tailored with the same objective in mind.

The venture proved conclusively to video set owners that the dramatized classics, even in capsule form, can be televised most entertainingly.

The American "Lama" is accompanied on most of his adventures by the faithful "Tulku," his Tibetan servant, played by Ben Wright. Many out-of-this-world characters pop up in each script and Jack Kruschen has been particularly good in a variety of roles, including a recent snappy Chinese private eye.

Though the "Lama" operates out of New York, he seems to be able to appear in a variety of locales with great ease. And it's always explainable.

These fanciful adventures are the work of William Froug and Richard

Foster, atmospherized by the music of Dick Aurandt.

VIDEO *In Review*

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

The Defense Answers

Last week's copy of *Radio and Television Life* carried a letter from a reader not exactly happy with our current video fare. His question asked where coast video was going. In almost no time an answer reached our office . . . an answer the writer of the first letter had himself said would be most welcome.

We thank both these gentlemen for their interesting, and completely diversified, points of view.

"If you are not an intense sports fan or a small child, what else does television have to offer that would justify the expenditure of the amount necessary to purchase a good television receiver?"

This question, posed in last week's "Radio and Television Life" by the gentleman signing himself as "Mr. No Name," directly leads to a question I'd like to throw at him. Mr. No Name, have you stopped beating your wife?

At their best, generalizations are far from good. Mr. No Name indulges in several which I think are poor. He writes, "I contend that television is not progressing." Again, "The retail dealers blame the type of programs offered, excluding the sports and kid shows, for the refusal of many families to lay their cash on the line for a TV set."

Mr. No Name identifies himself as a member of the trade and as a "television performer." I am firmly convinced that a large number of people like him in the trade are prone to adopt a supercilious approach toward TV in Hollywood, an approach which is not shared by the vast majority of average set owners. Of course, there are bad programs. But don't forget there are highly individual personal tastes. An intellectual who likes the Vienna Symphony may not happen to care for Phil Gordon but this doesn't negate the least bit Phil Gordon's tremendous drawing power. This being a democratic society, a viewer may turn his set on or off at a given time and may also switch to other channels—which will soon number seven in the Los Angeles area. People in the television, radio and motion-picture fields are known to be overly critical and do not represent average viewpoints.

I hope my attitude isn't too much colored by my participation in TV and by my great enthusiasm for the medium. I am convinced television has already asserted itself as a vital new part of American home life. Its value, as both an entertainment medium and a source of information, will constantly be on the upgrade. As a cultural booster in the average home, television has proved itself. Likewise

it has chalked up success as a monitor of current events, an intensely intimate channel for dramas, a stimulating medium for the interchange of ideas and byplay of personalities, and a totally entertaining source of comedy and music.

For example, with its excursions into serious drama and choreography, television has attempted to lift the entertainment eye-level of the viewer. "Julius Caesar," enacted in modern dress in a one-hour CBS adaptation, became a stirring cultural event. If one seeks to escape cultural upliftment, there's certainly a wealth of sheer entertainment in the situation comedy of "The Goldbergs," the songs of Patty Meakin, the easygoing, relaxing tempo of the Don Otis show, the mystery plots of "Armchair Detective," the subtle humor of "Kukla, Fran and Ollie" and the comedy of Bud Steffan. Confronted with such a list of talent, how can one generalize, via a loaded question, that TV hasn't enough to offer to make up for the expenditure of the cost of a set? I'm firmly convinced that television has much to offer that justifies such an expenditure. And, again disagreeing with Mr. No Name, I'd like to point out that the purchase of a TV set does not involve spending "a few hundred dollars." This reference to a particular price scale is another generalization. Depending upon the type of set one seeks and the amount of money one has in his jeans, he may spend anything from under one hundred dollars to several thousand for his video variety.

I deliberately mixed kinescoped shows from New York with local Hollywood programs in my short list of outstanding TV shows above. Of course New York is doing a masterful programming job and it has the money, the paying market and the long-experienced personnel for the chore. Hollywood, on the other hand, has had a tough, uphill fight for television programming quality. Mr. No Name's remarks lead me to question

whether he has followed TV here during the past six months when it has made such astounding progress. Top motion-picture and radio specialists have been attracted to TV. Shows loaded with talent have been made available for viewers. Hollywood has overcome to an amazing degree its lack of money and long experience in video. I honestly don't see how anyone could continue to delay buying a TV receiver. It offers such a wide range of entertainment and information for everyone in the family. New ideas are making themselves apparent every day in different programs, forcing themselves to the surface even over the faint lethargy of overworked personnel in some cases. It's interesting that with the extremely recent advent of good kinescoping equipment in Hollywood, top shows are already being snapped up for viewing and sponsorship in Eastern markets. Top network and agency executives, naturally leaning to New York, apparently don't share Mr. No Name's blanket indictment of all types of programs on television in Hollywood, excluding sports, kids' fare, Berle and Godfrey. Mr. No Name singled these out as exceptions. He wrote another amazing statement. "If you are not a particular admirer of Milton Berle or Arthur Godfrey the programs are narrowed to a still smaller field." I want to state that I'm happy for Berle's terrific success as Mr. Television and I'm equally glad that Godfrey has clicked with audiences. However, I hope the current TV season will end the necessity for constant reference to these two as the cumulative great white hope of video. Paul Winchell isn't exactly washed out. Waring has a few more good years. Shirley Dinsdale isn't on unemployment compensation due to lack of booking offers. Certain quarters hold out hope for General Eisenhower, Ben Gage, Mike Stokey and Spade Cooley.

I can't help but challenge Mr. No Name's refutation that retail dealers blame the type of programs offered for the refusal of many families to buy TV sets. In my experience, retail dealers blame a botched-up public-relations program which has confused many families. These families believe color television or some other new gimmick is right around the corner which will make all sets purchased now obsolescent. All such claims have been refuted, denied and patiently explained. They just aren't true.

Frankly, while I'm on the subject, I'm amazed at the number of people in motion pictures, radio and general business who still don't have TV sets of their own. What they're waiting for is beyond me. They're missing consistently good entertainment, a wonderfully varied panorama of programs offered in their own homes and the chance to grow with the most dy-

namic, exciting medium in the history of show business. They're missing a chance to see new stars born. They're missing a chance to be in on the "ground floor" themselves.

The "Lone Ranger" television films will get rolling around July 5. . . . The days when a pretty sweater and a seat at the drug-store fountain were enough to snag a movie contract option are over. Casting directors today are watching their TV sets, and Peggy Dow, the Pickard Family, Bill Roberts, Phil Gordon and Spade Cooley can all thank TV for film commitments. . . . Joining the kinescope trail east next month will be "Armchair Detective" and "Pantomime Quiz." NBC's "Nocturne" and "Pickard Family" are already kinned, and CBS's Jack Benny show will be tee-veed from here east. . . . From under a Washington date line comes the news that video-receiver output topped the 40,000 weekly rate again in May. Predictions for the year's output exceed 2,000,000 sets. May shipments of TV sets were greater than the number of AM (radio) receivers produced! . . . Even at that, authoritative sources say that untimely publicity on color TV and ultra-high frequencies has caused a slowing down of set sales. The refusal of the Coast Conference to make a deal for videoed football here hasn't helped any. The latter, unfortunately, can't be denied. Any obsolescence reports, though, are groundless. . . . were Harley Watson, the Ford-Lincoln dealer in Arcadia, Florida, and his friend, a fruit packer whose name has slipped McConnell's mind. These men were so appreciative and so lavish in their gifts that Ed got an inspiration.

Why Not?

"I wonder if they'd pay me something for mentioning their names every Saturday night?" he mused. He sat down and wrote: "Would you fellows be willing to pay a small fee to be sure you get your names on the air?"

"Name your price," they replied.

Relates Ed, "Then I was up against it. I wondered how much a 'small fee' should be. I struggled with the idea of \$10 a program and sat around a week waiting to decide. Then I said to myself, I might as well shoot high, and so I asked for \$250 a month from each of the fellows."

Their answer: "Start Saturday." Ed isn't sure, but he believes his might be the first sponsored radio program. "It was nine months before the station knew what I was doing," he remembers. "I used to give the 'commercials' as much as thirty minutes. One day the manager asked me why I talked so much about Fords, Lincolns, and fruit packing. I told him. From then on I had to cut him in on the take."

Average radio fans don't think of Ed McConnell as a "big" radio star. In the cauldron of Hopes, Bennys, Fibber McGees and Crosbys, Ed often seems like a drop in the bucket. But on the basis of what he does, how much he gets, and how long he's been getting it (continuous sponsorship since 1922), we doubt that anyone can touch McConnell.

"I'm not an entertainer," he states simply. "I'm a good salesman."

His three most important sponsors have been Mantel Lamp Company (twenty-two years) Acme Paint (ten years, until the war) and Buster Brown Shoes (more than six years).

"I'm quite sure," adds Ed, "that I sell a bigger percentage of people listening to me than anyone else." This year, according to McConnell, shoe sales generally are off forty to fifty per cent. But the Buster Brown Division of Brown Shoes, as of March 31, 1949, is eleven per cent over 1948, and that increase is attributable to "Smilin'" Ed. When he went under Brown sponsorship in 1943, the company was doing \$3,500,000 in the Buster Brown Division. Last year, claims Ed, it did \$18,000,000.

"During the war the dealers wanted me to get off the air," McConnell stated. "They couldn't get the shoes I was advertising and the children wouldn't take anything else. Guess the children have confidence in me."

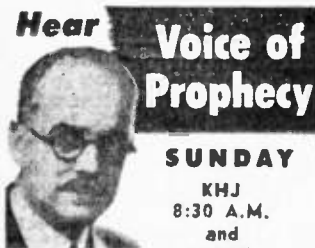

mer. . . U. S. Tobacco signed William Gargan to a three-year deal to do a private-eye series, similar to Bill's old "Ross Dolan" air detective series, on both TV and radio. Kinescope of the show will hit the Coast next mid-month, over NBC-TV. . . Representative A. L. Miller of Nebraska proposed that the legislative chamber be wired for video and radio. The House of Representatives nixed the idea flatly. Don't they want the folks who elected them to see them at, uh, work? . . . KTLA lays claim to nine of the ten top Hooper ratings on locally seen video shows. NBC's Milton Berle, of course, is first, with "Hoppy" pulling down the next two ratings, followed by "Hollywood Opportunity," Spade Cooley's "Western Varieties," "Hoffman Hayride," "Movietown, RSVP" and "Armchair Detective." . . . Bill Boyd has reportedly turned thumbs down on making any telepix of the "Hopalong Cassidy" series because the star feels that the allotted \$10,000 per picture wouldn't allow them to stand up against the quality of the movies leased for video.

Video in the Hills, Too

Some of the questions you readers have asked us about video are making us appallingly aware of our lack of technical knowledge. Of course that technical knowledge takes some years in the getting, so the next best (and immediate) thing we can do is have the people with know-how answer for us. With that purpose in mind we lured Arch Presby (a former engineer and operator of broadcasting transmitters and currently both an NBC staff announcer and portrayer of "Froggy Gremlin" on NBC's "Smilin' Ed McConnell" show) into our office. Knowing that a main problem of television in Hollywood lies in our being plagued with hills, and knowing that Arch dreamed up a wonderful development to beat this, we shot at our visitor the old Indian word, "How?"

Reported Mr. Presby: "Average owners think that because of the hills they are being blanketed, thereby receiving no signal at all. The major problem is that you get too many signals, or multiple signals, brought about by the bouncing of a signal off the hills. The higher in the air you go, the stronger the multiple signals become, constantly fighting one another, and in many cases outphasing each other, which results in a zero signal. At present there is no commercial device which will separate these various signals. The various director and reflector systems tend to increase the sensitivity in one direction, but they do not decrease the sensitivity in the unwanted direction, or source of the interference. So it is necessary to get the main signal free of all ghosts, etc. If you get the right directivity on one, you get them all. We are fortunate in this town that all

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the transmitters but one (and KTSI is shortly to move to Mt. Wilson) are located at one point. Antennas orientated for one point are orientated for all because of this strategic placement of transmitters.

"Some of the best installations, for troublesome areas just explained, are found in basements, holes in the ground, or behind garages. The most unlikely locations often pan out best. I mean by 'best location' that the signal is clean and without ghosts, and the sound, too, is good and clean. This presents a problem, because being close to the ground, the signal, while clean, is weak. So we have to utilize a very sensitive and efficient antenna system . . . one that will collect and utilize as much of the energy as is possible.

"Putting a booster on an ordinary type antenna receiving a weak signal merely amplifies the noise ratio or snow along with the signal. The antenna itself must be efficient to the point of discriminating between noise and signal. Like prospecting for gold. It takes a man with know-how and patience to isolate feasible spots.

(Hearing about the development set our cogs to spinning at such a rate that the only solution seemed to lie in a look at the idea in concrete form. So it was up to the Presby home, on the hills between Hollywood and the Valley, along Barham Road, one day recently.)

Being not technically versed in such matters, the development looked to us like the funnel from a steamship. Put a door on the device and you could probably keep birds in it.

Arch pointed out that it was necessary to have that size to collect efficiently the very weak signal at the level in front of his home. The dimensions, it seems, are critical to the inch, a point that has rendered similar attempts without benefit.

While we were on the hill studying Arch's "scoop," a peek inside his home uncovered still another antenna development. This last bit of magic is designed for locations that may use an indoor antenna. By the simple movement of one graduated control, the antenna is automatically adjusted to the proper length for each channel, plus the impedance matcher which can be used later on an outdoor antenna, if desired. This one is being created for manufacture, and should soon be available on the market.

The "scoop" which aids folks in troublesome areas we mentioned first of all will ultimately be made available, in plan form, to set owners too. So you hill dwellers, as well as you fringe-area dwellers who have critical problems, can look forward to the sort of reception that is delighting flatland habitants.

So if living in an "unstrategic" area has been a TV-set-buying block, you can open Junior's bank and go to it. Something has been developed, and should in the not-too-distant future be

available to all, that makes good reception feasible in all locales.

Shirley and "Judy" Off

In answer to your many requests about Shirley Dinsdale and "Judy Splinters" having vanished from the local scene, we report with the same regret with which the news was conveyed to us that the popular duo will not be seen on KNBH until at least August. The pretty ventriloquist and her puppet pal are taking time out to delight Eastern and Middle Western audiences for a few months. But rest assured that when they return we will let you know in plenty of time.

Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You May Like)

Steve Allen's Country Store

Fortunately for all (including the viewers) the first stanza of Steve Allen's Country Store (Tuesday, KNBH, Channel 4, 9:00 p.m.) apparently isn't going to serve as a criterion for others on the schedule. We caught the second show, a tightened-up, joyous comedy time that cleared the air completely.

Allen, as the proprietor of a paradoxically Budget-Pack-stocked "country store," was either in a "to heck with 'em" frame of mind, or else had been assured that nothing dire would happen when a camera was trained on him this second time. He relaxed into the Steve Allen that captivates radio audiences completely. Some of the funniest bits were obviously ad-lib artistry. The youthful proprietor had the upper hand at all times, and successive shows should get better and better.

Typical of Steve's operating technique was the moment last Tuesday when Steve asked a winning contestant, standing eagerly by to receive his prize . . . "Do you like gin?" Viewers could literally see the contestant's hesitation. "If I say 'yes,' what will my friends and family think?" and "If I say 'no,' the radio audience will think me a lily-fingered hypocrite!" were certainly the uppermost thoughts. Finally friend contestant bravely blurted out, "Well, yes."

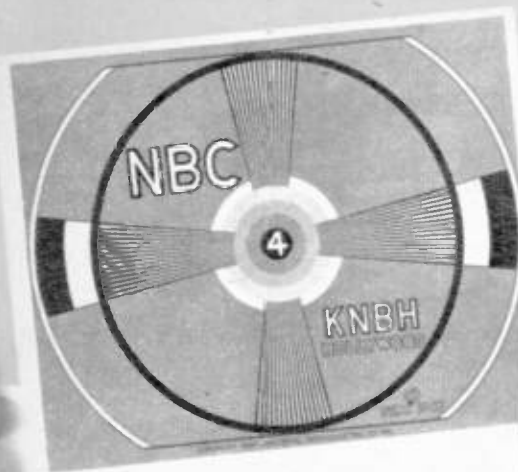
Said Allen, "Fine, here are a couple of packs of cards. Go home and play yourself some."

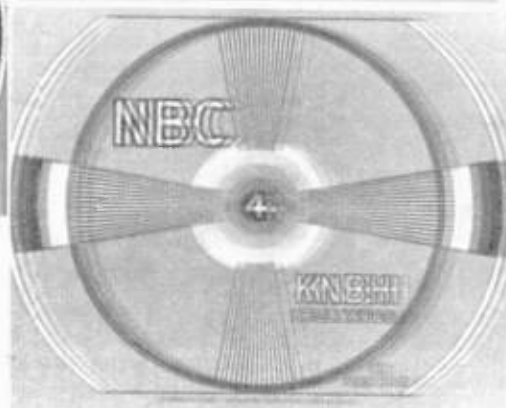

Running Interference... Down!

*Television Is a Little Trickier Than Radio
And Perfect Pictures May Be Hard to Get ...
But Here Are Four Tests to Assist Lookers*

By Blake Chatfield

DOES the picture on your television screen look like any of the four distorted pictures illustrating this article? If it does, don't blame the television station transmitting the picture or your television receiver. Blame man-made interference.

While static or man-made interference can be *heard* on a radio receiver tuned to the standard broadcast band, it can only be *seen* on the picture tube of a television receiver. Your television set receives frequency-modulated (FM) sound, and interference seldom is heard in the sound portion of the television signal.

The man-made interference, which shows up on the picture tube of your television set, can for the most part be corrected and removed. The services of a trained television technician are required for this job, but the set owner can assist him by identifying the type of interference.

When your set was installed, most of the man-made interference present at that time was removed by the technician. However, sometimes a new source of interference will give trouble after a set has been installed and operating correctly for some time.

This new interference can be determined, and steps may be taken to correct it. Figure 1 shows a television test pattern as it should look with your set properly tuned and all interference removed.

Figure 2 shows "ghosts" (multiple images) on the screen. In some cases, the "ghost" image may be a negative of the original picture. Multiple images may be caused by many different things. The television signal may be bouncing off a nearby building or hill. In cases of "ghosts" in the image, the television antenna probably will have to be moved or turned, or both.

Entirely different conditions of signal and interference may exist at two receiver locations in adjacent buildings. It is up to your service technician to determine the type of antenna necessary for good television sight and sound reception. He usually can remove all "ghosts" from the picture.

Figure 3 shows one type of image defect caused by automobile ignition interference. Larger blotches of light and black traveling horizontally from left to right across the face of your receiver also are ignition interference.

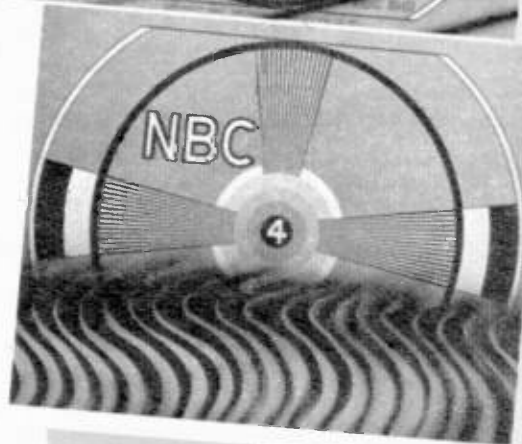
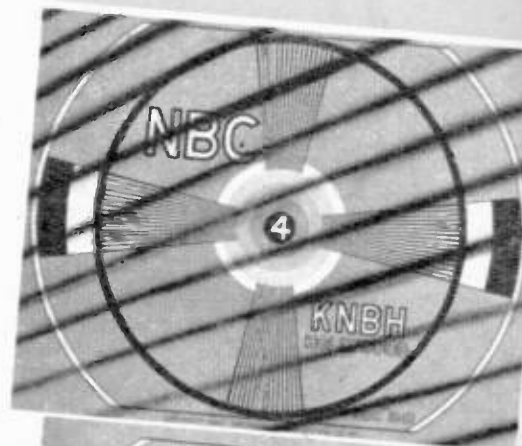

WHEN the King's Men, for the past ten years a featured quartet on NBC's "Fibber and Molly" program, took over that show's Tuesday night spot for the summer, the opening program marked not only the group's twentieth year together, but also the quartet's first starring spot on a transcontinental program.

The King's Men were organized more or less by accident at Chapman College in Los Angeles. Short, irrepressible Buddy Linn, a member of a fraternity quartet at Chapman, was asked by a friend to try out in an audition for quartets at Paramount Studios. After the audition, Buddy informed the Paramount musical director that he belonged to a quartet which could out-sing any he'd heard that day. A few weeks later, Buddy got a call: "Bring your quartet over to Paramount!"

Buddy said, "Sure!" and then started worrying, for summer vacations had just started, and two members of the quartet were miles away. Buddy and Jon Dodson, another member of the fraternity quartet and student director of the men's glee club, started phoning college friends trying to line up two other singers.

Ken Darby, an accomplished pianist, said he'd play for the quartet, but couldn't sing. "Of course you can," Buddy and Jon insisted. "You just haven't tried." Ken was finally persuaded and discovered, to his great surprise, that he really could sing. Then the three found a fourth. The quartet practiced practically all night, showed up next morning at Paramount, auditioned, and were

promptly signed for "Sweetie," a college picture.

Drama, the Ministry and Singing

At this time, Ken was torn between music and the ministry. Buddy had also been studying for the ministry, but recently had switched to sociology. Jon, who was taking post-graduate work at the University of Southern California while directing the glee club at Chapman, intended to teach music. Rad Robinson, the fourth member of the quartet, was going to be a physical-education instructor.

With their success in "Sweetie," they decided to quit their studies and become singers, which they were not for a very long time. Over a period of some two years, the boys appeared in about three Jeanette MacDonald musicals, "and in between time starved on the beach."

On the Air

The quartet's first radio job resulted from a series of summer plays they did in 1930 for the late John Steven McGroarty, historian and poet laureate of California.

The King's Men doubled as singers and actors, and each received eighteen dollars a week. From that association they were signed for Bill Sharples's "Breakfast Club."

Then KTM offered the boys a job as staff singers at thirty-five per week, and another Los Angeles sta-

tion offered them a staff job at only twenty-five. The quartet accepted the latter offer, for which they claim great foresight, because three weeks afterwards, KTM folded.

As staff men, they were busy all day long. Their salaries were raised a little, and then a little more, and then again, until finally Buddy, Jon and Rad were making fifty dollars weekly each, and leader Ken was receiving seventy-five.

Don Clark, saxophone player with Paul Whiteman's band and a close friend of the group, had them make a record, which he dispatched to Whiteman in New York. A week later, they received a phone call from Whiteman alerting them to stand by at 10:00 p.m. for a phone call. They stood by.

Their first job with Whiteman was singing at Manhattan Beach, next to Coney Island, in the afternoon, and at the Biltmore Hotel at night.

Back to Hollywood

They were with Whiteman four years. Then, on an impulse, the quartet hit the road, in Ken's car, of course, for Hollywood. They were signed by Fred Allen for an eight-week stint and then weren't able to get a job anywhere. Finally Rudy Vallee came to their rescue.

He already had a quartet singing with his orchestra but he signed the

"It's Not a Soap Opera!"

Says Sandra Michael, Scripter of "Against The Storm," Serial That Defied the Taboos Of a Generation of Soapy Daytime Dramas

EVERY TIME I hear 'soap opera,' I see red!" exclaims Sandra Michael, attractive originator of the distinguished "Against the Storm." "Unfortunately, there's a tendency to lump all daytime dramatic shows under the one odious heading," she laments, "and that makes it tough for the writer who comes along with something different."

"Against the Storm" was first heard in 1939, and serious critics agreed to a man that Sandra had indeed come up with "something different." She defied some of the most strenuous taboos in daytime radio. First rule she discarded was the one that insists daytime radio audiences lack intelligence. "Most great literature," she asserts, "has a basic simplicity or a universality which makes it understandable to the average intelligence." Accordingly, Sandra feels it is silly to be afraid to "aim too high" for the average listener. Some of the greatest interest in the show has come in response to the reading of poetry of John Masfield, Edna St. Vincent Millay, Edgar Lee Masters and Walt Whitman.

No Queries

Another supposedly inviolate rule broken by the writer was omission of the daily final question posed at

the end of the episode, asking plaintively, "Will John's other wife meet his other wife?" "Can a simple gingham girl find happiness with this worldly prince from the palaces of Europe?" "My theory," continues Sandra, "is that if a story is interesting and basically sound dramatically, people will tune in without the artificial stimulus of a lot of silly questions or cliff-hanging episodes. If it isn't, no amount of coaxing can make them listen." She further believes that characters should be realistic people who can live in the listener's mind half an hour daily, five times a week, fifty-two weeks a year.

A Pioneer

"Against the Storm," termed a radio novel, was the first commercially sponsored program and the only daytime drama ever to win a Peabody Award. That was in 1942. Sandra still writes the kind of drama she pleases and makes it financially successful, too — but it wasn't always that way. She has fought a long battle against entrenched ideas about radio drama, a battle that started nearly twenty years ago when she was graduated from the University of Illinois and began work in a Milwaukee radio station.

Writer's Background

Sandra Michael was born in Denmark, the descendant of a long line

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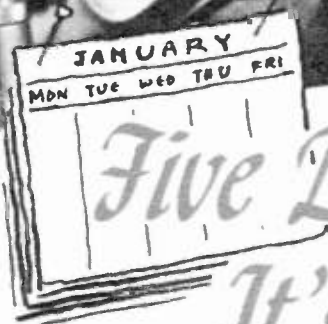

two-o'clock-in-the-morning after-the-show life for Lois. The two were married, and Lois got into radio. Only the show was "Reveille Sweetheart," "and I had to get up at 4:30 in the morning to do it," she exclaims. The program was on for two and a half years and Lois became well known to the boys then going overseas. Her present program is much like the one she did then, she says. Charming and radio-wise, Lois's ability at the mike is no hit-and-miss affair. She prepares a script outline, and then speaks to her audience in her own way. The result is a spirit seldom captured by a feminine radio performer.

Her husband is currently producing "County Fair" and was the originator of "Professor Quiz," a program it took him a mere four years to sell (sponsors didn't think that listeners cared about hearing questions popped!) "He's my severest critic,"

Five Days a Week It's January

*Lois January Resumes Bright Radio
Career With Delightful KMPC Series*

LOIS JANUARY, back in radio with a delightful record and chatter program on KMPC, is a young veteran of the films and Broadway hits. A Texas girl, she was first ambitious to be a dancer. When her parents moved to California, Lois joined little-theater productions and became a member of the Ruth St. Denis group. She took singing lessons from a teacher who was then coaching a fellow Texan, Mary Martin.

At fourteen, pretty Lois was being seen in movies and had appeared in the Leonard Sillman musical, "New Faces," at the Pasadena Playhouse. Studio publicity departments made her a much seen "leg art" gal. "Every New Year's," she laughs, "they'd deck me out with a piece of fur and a calendar." With the name January, the caption wrote itself.

Lois made forty-five Westerns, and being from Texas, she did all her own riding. She's been seen on television, much to her own surprise, both in Hollywood and New York—so many of her Westerns have been revived on the new medium.

Texas Friend Aids

She owes her first big break on Broadway partly to Mary Martin. Mary, just making her first hit sing-

ing "My Heart Belongs to Daddy" in a Cole Porter show, wrote to Lois and told her to try New York. Lois did and won the lead opposite Buddy Ebsen and Judy Canova in "Yokel Boy." She sang in several of the top night spots, including the Versailles and the Rainbow Room, and then became George Jessel's leading lady in "High Kickers." During the run of the show, the actress met her husband-to-be, radio producer Bill Gernannt. "You're too nice a girl to be in show business," he told me," Lois laughs. Bill's argument was that a girl who didn't drink, smoke, or frequent night clubs should get into radio, where the hours were so much more sensible. No more of this

Lois smiles, "but he talked me into radio."

Lois New Year's?

No article about Lois is complete without a mention of her unusual last name. "Everyone thinks it's a stage name, but it's really mine," she insists. She believes that it was originally Janvier, French for January, and that somewhere along the line a forebear got tired of hearing it mispronounced and gave it its English translation. Lois admits that though the name is an easily remembered one, occasionally she's referred to as "Lois Holiday . . . Lois Christmas . . . Lois Valentine. . . ." All very pleasant associations—and quite rightly so!

"Jim" of All Trades

Announcing Is Just One of Jim Ameche's Talents. He Also Cooks, Decorates, Reads Stories to His Sons, Is Handy With Saw and Nails

LIFE is never uninteresting or dull in the Jim Ameche family, says Bette, wife of one of radio's most popular and versatile stars. Jim's busy schedule on the airways and before the television cameras keeps the household schedule in a constant state of change . . . but "it's fun and we don't mind the occasional inconvenience," Bette explains.

Jim began his radio career fifteen years ago in Chicago as the original "Jack Armstrong, the All-American boy," a role he won as a result of his first audition . . . something of a record in radio circles. He remained on the "Jack Armstrong" show for six years before moving to Los Angeles to take the lead in Hollywood Playhouse with Gail Page, and also was heard on "Lux Radio Theater," Edgar Bergen-Charlie McCarthy show and others. After three years on the West Coast he went to New York for "Saturday Vaudeville" and was heard on "Attorney-at-Law," "Big Sister," Lux Story Theater" and many more New York-originated shows.

Even though his numerous air assignments keep Jim hopping from one studio to another all day he still finds time to enjoy his home and

take an active part in the rearing of the two Ameche boys, Jim Jr., eleven, and Patrick Anthony, four.

"The children really pay attention to Jim when he tells them something," Bette says, "and although he's never cross with them, they know when he says to do something he means just that and there is no argument." One of the highlights at home is the story-telling time, with Dad doing the honors with a favorite tale. His flair for drama and ability to tell a story well have made such famous characters as "Robin Hood" and "Gulliver" really come to life for Jimmy and Pat.

Bette tells the amusing story of how Jimmy was explaining to one of his friends the fun they had at home when Jim read a story. The friend was a little skeptical and indicated he was "too big" to be read to . . . but after one night he was a constant visitor at the Ameche home when story-telling time came around!

Kitchen Expert

"Growing up" with his sons is Jim's principal hobby at home . . . but second on his list is cooking. In fact, Bette says she thinks their home is one of the few in which the man of the house also is chief cook when guests are expected for dinner! "I do

the run-of-the-mill cooking," she explains, "but when we want something fancy, Jim takes over." He is especially known for his spaghetti—of which his friends say there is no equal—and exotic salads.

Jim's genial voice is to be heard as announcer and co-host on ABC's popular "Welcome Travelers" show, as master-of-ceremonies on the Naval Air Reserve show and as host on "Hollywood Playhouse," broadcast from KPMC, Bakersfield; KGER, Long Beach; KFSD, San Diego; KLX, Oakland, and KPMC, Stockton. In addition to these network broadcasts Jim hosts a television program, "Midget Boxing," Monday nights, has his own show, "Date With Jim Ameche," and a host of local programs.

"All the King's Men"

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King's Men too. They were with Rudy almost two years, singing on the air at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles, and in San Francisco.

In 1939, Harry Sherman engaged the quartet for a series of "Hopalong Cassidy" pictures. They were the screen's first, and very possibly last, singing bad men. Rad was the leading man, playing the role of "Smiley."

Just about January 1, 1940, they happened to hear that "Fibber McGee," Jim Jordan in private life, liked quartets, so they sent him a record of "In the Good Old Summer-time." The evening he received the record Jim played it about a dozen times, and finally his wife, Marian, who is "Molly McGee" to some 20,000,000-plus radio listeners, suggested that if he liked it so much he should arrange to hear the King's Men in person.

"A great idea," said Jim. "Maybe Johnson's Wax will put 'em on the air with us, and then I'll get to hear 'em every Tuesday night."

Just a few weeks later the King's Men made their debut with "Fibber McGee and Molly." They have been a fixture with the show ever since.

The quartet has backed many famous vocalists during the past ten years. They recorded their own "King's Men" album, and sang in the Hollywood Bowl with Meredith Willson. They were one of the hits of the season, outdrawing even Lily Pons and Andre Kostelanetz.

All Hobbyists

Tall, lanky Ken was born in Hebron, Nebraska, and moved to California as a small child. After writing his Santa Monica High School alma mater's song, he went on to become a member of ASCAP and composed several songs, including "Make Mine Music" for Walt Disney's picture of the same name. He also set to music "The Night Before Christmas," and this arrangement has been featured for several years on NBC's "Fibber and Molly" program.

Ken is now vocal director at 20th Century-Fox studios. His hobby is gadgets. "He's the disgusting type," says Buddy, "who does very well anything he tries to do."

Ken's first claim to fame was as an organist for silent pictures at the old Forum Theater in Los Angeles, while he was still a high-school student. It was the best pipe organ in the city at the time.

He makes furniture, he repairs electrical equipment, and, with Eliot Daniel, composer of "Lavender Blue" and music conductor for NBC's King's Men summer radio show, he invented an automatic splicer for

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of clergymen and scholars. Following World War I, her family came to Montana. Early days in radio found Sandra working with enthusiasm for twenty-five dollars a week; announcing a fashion show, helping out on a children's hour and writing commercials. After a brief fling at free-lancing, she moved on to Hollywood, where she wrote dialogue for such stars as Jean Hersholt, Francis Lederer, John Boles and many others. In 1939, she brought "Against the Storm" to the air as a daily fifteen-minute show. She gave her listeners a taste of everything — poetry, ballads, events in the lives of very normal people, and intelligent discussions. By 1942, however, she realized that the show required a half-hour daily format for adequate presentation. Failing to obtain the necessary time, she requested and obtained the show's release. Now back on the air in its half-hour format, the show is attracting the same type of discriminating listeners that it formerly boasted.

The scripter has never been guilty of stuffiness in presenting her literature program. It has never had overtones of "this is good for you." Nor does its creator feel that she herself has done anything too unusual in putting it across. She feels that the sub-quality of the soap operas is not the fault of their authors. They have been held down in the same way that the pulp writers have been. She has been lucky, she feels, in finding sponsors who have faith in her idea of what a radio drama might be.

of all trades in radio," Jim explains. "I've acted, narrated and announced on every type of show from soap operas and women's fashions to boxing matches!" In all, he estimates he has appeared on more than 14,000 broadcasts in his fifteen-year career, so it's easy to understand how he and his equally famous brother, Don, made the Ameche name a radio tradition.

Jim has another hobby, home decoration, which has become a major project with the entire Ameche family this year. They recently bought a seven-room house in one of Chicago's suburbs and Jim could be seen during his spare moments swinging a mean paint brush and adding a "touch" here and there.

"When we first moved into our house I was dismayed at its condition and wondered if it ever would be livable," Bette recalls. "But very quietly Jim went to work and built bookcases, extra kitchen cabinets, a cupboard for mops, dusters and other cleaning equipment, a large toy box on wheels for little Pat and countless other things which eventually make a home out of a house."

Personality Home

Bette, who is a clever decorator too, busied herself making slip covers and draperies, fixing up lamps and planning what remodeling had to be done. "It was weeks before we saw very much of each other even at home," Jim says looking back, "until one morning we got up, looked around, liked what we saw and decided the major portion of our work was done. Now we feel our home really has a personality, and our friends tell us it reflects the personalities of the entire Jim Ameche family."

In the arrangement of their home Bette had to plan for a fifth member of the family . . . the television set. In solving the problem of where the set should be located so that everyone wouldn't have to watch television just because someone else wanted to see a program . . . she put the receiver in the den. "This way the boys can follow their favorite children's shows and we can enjoy ourselves in the other room."

Where to put the set was not the only television problem as far as the Ameches were concerned, Jim recalls with a grin. "We also had to decide who was to see what . . . when. There's enough difference in the ages of the boys that they don't like the same type of shows, so we had to work out a plan by which Pat has his choice earlier in the evening and then when he goes to bed Jimmy takes over. Bette and I do our 'watching' after the boys are asleep."

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Running Interference . . . Down!

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interference when an automobile with bad spark plugs drives by. However, if you do not live on a main street where traffic is heavy, interference from car motors will occur so seldom that it should not be necessary to have your technician correct it.

Figure 4 shows a more bothersome type of interference which will be present when short-wave (FM and amateur) transmitters are sending out signals nearby. The number and position of the dark lines may vary from the picture, and if two or more stations are located near your receiver, a herringbone pattern may form on your viewing tube which completely blocks the picture being transmitted by the television station.

A service technician can install a "wave-trap" on your set to eliminate this short-wave interference.

Figure 5 shows a more intense type of distortion. This coil-like interference appearing either on the top or bottom half of your viewing tube is caused by electronic medical equipment such as X-ray, physiotherapy machines and ultra-violet sterilizing lamps. Fortunately this type of machine is not used for periods of long duration, for there is very little that a technician can do to eliminate this interference completely. The best method of clearing electronic medical interference is to work on the source of trouble. A "wave-trap" may help to clear the interference somewhat.

One last caution. If your television screen is blank except for a very bright horizontal line, turn your receiver off immediately and call your service technician.

If you have these four common types of interference removed and learn to tune your set correctly, you soon will increase your viewing enjoyment.

"Never dressed up in my life for anybody," he concluded.

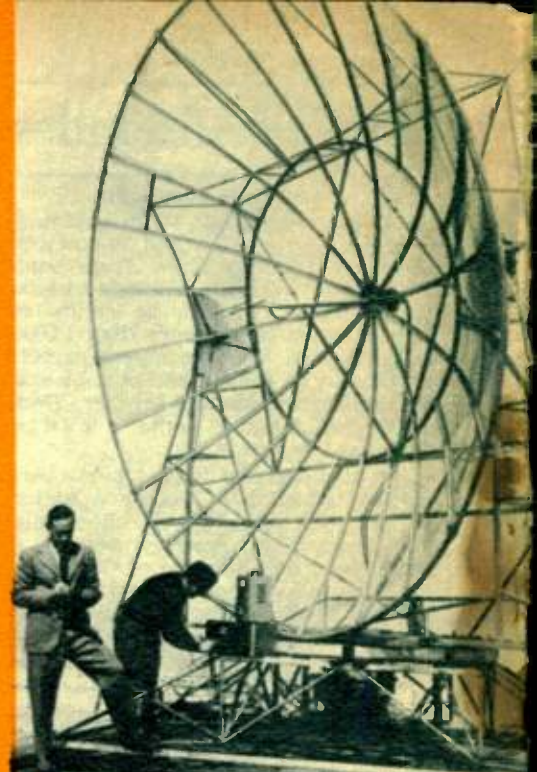
