

Broadcasters Irked by Late Propaganda Move

(Washington Correspondence)

Radio broadcasters of the United States are up in arms at what they declare to be an organized move to discredit commercial broadcasting as it exists in this country and to cause it to suffer in comparison with the British Broadcasting System. Prime movers in this plot, say the broadcasters, are the same newspaper interests that have continually sponsored adverse legislation at Washington and that are continually trying to throw a monkey wrench in the broadcasting show, the alleged reason being that broadcasting is more and more becoming a competitive menace in the advertising field. Teamed up with the newspaper interests are said to be a faction of professional office-holders in the national capitol with an eye to soft bureaucratic berths, with these two carefully pushing a group of diluted educators into the foreground.

The thing that has aroused the broadcaster's ire is a book compiled by E. C. Buhler, director of Forensics, University of Kansas, entitled "American versus the British System of Radio Control," said by the broadcasters to be part of a plan to undermine broadcasting on a large scale. This alleged piece of propaganda is supposed to go hand in hand with a move to inaugurate school debates

throughout the land on the same subject, "American versus British System of Radio Control." Subtest of propaganda, say the broadcasters, is the following paragraph from Professor Buhler's book:

"Recently, there has been increasing dissatisfaction on the part of the general public and particularly among those people of more discriminating tastes with the quality of program materials which are being broadcast. The general feeling is that radio broadcasting is over-commercialized and that its possibilities for educational and cultural uses have been neglected. Those

who complain of our system of radio control and operation, point to the system of radio broadcasting in Great Britain as a possible solution for the United States. This question, therefore, involves a discussion of the comparative merits of the British and American systems of radio control and operation. The burden is clearly on the affirmative, as the proposition definitely proposes the adoption of the British system."

Test Suit

Considerable interest is felt in official circles in the first test suit of that part of Oklahoma's sales tax law that levies one per cent against the receipts of broadcasting stations. The suit filed is that of station WKY and is directed to the Oklahoma tax commission.

News Vending System Founded by Columbia

(New York Correspondence)

Organized broadcasting has made its reply to the embargo established by newspapers and press associations against the dissemination of news over the radio. Specifically, it is the fine set-up being established by the Columbia broadcasting system as the result of restrictions established recently by the Associated Press.

The new news-vending service, technically, is not a part of the Columbia Broadcasting System but a distinct corporation headed by Wm. S. Paley who is, of course, president of Columbia. By a co-operative system that is being estab-

lished, news will come flowing in from each of Columbia's ninety odd stations. In addition to this news, bureaus will be established in the leading cities, such as New York, Washington, Chicago, Los Angeles, and London. This entire news-acquiring network, which is a counterpart of the broadcast chain is linked by teletype, and the news is handled, therefore, with very little loss of time. Thus, is each of the broadcast stations in a position to broadcast major news events many hours before newspapers can be printed. Primarily intended as a vast news-vending organization, Columbia will be in a position to supply its news commentators with first-hand information independent and considerably in advance in the news reports of the newspaper organization. Paul White, head of Columbia's publicity for several years, will be the directing head of the company with the title of second Vice-President and General Manager. How the public will react to the new service is a question disturbing both broadcasting and newspaper circles at the present time. The tremendous prestige of radio as a news vending agency is best attested by the extreme jealousy manifested by newspaper interests everywhere.

Things Upside Down

It appears that many things besides having winter when we have summer and summer when we have winter, may be diametrically opposite in Australia, to the way we are used to seeing them in the United States. For instance, this very unimportant but nevertheless interesting item concerning a mobile radio station, that broadcasts phonograph records, travels on rails, is loaded to the gunwales with advertising and yet makes the customers shriek with joy. Imagine anything like that in this country. The station's call is 3YB, and it operates with a power of 25 watts. Its legal standing is duly authenticated by the authorities. If it needed any sentimental background to put it over, and it seems it doesn't, it has it in the fact that it is housed in a luxurious Pullman railway coach once used by the King and Queen in a tour of Australia. But to get back to the story of the station. According to the owner and founder, the station was conceived to aid people in the rural districts in finding their local outlets for certain lines of merchandise. Imagine a condition like that here, where customers wait to hear over the radio where the necessities of life could be purchased, and particularly that the broadcast station should be a itinerate traveler on wheels. But conditions are of course different, and we are told that when this welcome traveler arrives in a community and starts one of its recorded programs, that verifications of receptions begin to arrive on foot, on horseback, on bicycle, and in motor car. It is claimed there are too many radio stations in the United States, many for which there is no field or necessity. There is keen competition for privileges on the air, and each station is hemmed in on all sides. But be thankful that no visitor can crawl into the freight yard during the night to add to the morning's confusion.

Presidential Coverage

Future radio addresses by President Roosevelt will go further up and down the land than ever before, and small-town stations can be depended on to broadcast the words of the chief executive. Heretofore, it has been simply impossible for the small station to stand a wire rental to Washington D. C. and practically impossible to perfect arrangements for the broadcast,

even if willing to stand the expense. Now, however, comes Columbia and the National with an offer to hook on any and all stations at their nearest point of contact, and as, of course, no one wants to listen to any other program while the President is broadcasting, you may reasonably expect in the future, hookups that will include practically all of the nation's stations.

English Are DXers

Upon casual reading of the English radio magazines, it is quite easy to see that English dialers are very much interested in logging American stations and that these dialers perhaps, have a better working knowledge of their frequencies than do the average owners of radio sets in this country. The writer in the BBC's World Radio says that dialing conditions prevailing during the winter of 1932-33 were the best that have been obtained for a great many years, but admitting, however, that more selective and more powerful sets may have been an influential factor. This writer also gives the Federal Radio Commission due credit for clearing the channels of superfluous transmitters. From the same authority we learn that the venerable KDKA is king pin no longer of the stations most commonly received there. The champion now, he says, is WCAU of Philadelphia; with WTIC, Hartford, WPG, Atlantic City, and WTAM, Cleveland, as runners up. He also notes that WIOD of Miami, the Florida station with only one kw power, is still maintaining its remarkable record for reception in the British Isles.

So This Is Al's Game

You surely have to go away from home to get the news, and we learn something more from BBC's World Radio. This time, that Mr. Albert Smith, a former governor of New York State, in order to bring "big business" and the public into a more harmonious union, has enlisted the aid of a group of young men, members of wealthy families as it were, and formed a company known as the Federal Broadcasting Corporation, which in turn has taken a lease on WMAC of New York. The "economic blizzard" (quoted by World Radio) has been a testing time for all sections of society, we are told. We are further confidently informed that "big business" has not emerged scatheless, but that the young champions feel that it has a case to lay before the nation. Further, it says that "big business" has been discredited and its leadership made a popular subject of mockery and scorn, but that the policy of the Federal Broadcasting Corporation will be to soften the prevailing hostilities.

Some Good in the Poorest and Some Bad in the Best—Programs Mostly Are the Way You View Them; the Aim of This Department Is to Help You Find the Kind You Like. It Will Contain Commendation at Times and Honest Criticism; but Its Main Purpose Will Be to Classify, for Easy Reference, the Myriad of Productions on the Air and to Bring to Your Attention the Ones You Like Best.

Surely the enterprise of the press agent should not come to naught. We pass this story along: Miss Irene Rich (whose likeness adorns our cover) appears much younger than forty-one—the implication, without saying so, being that this is her age. Another important bit of information is that she weighs less than when she was sixteen years old—no weight being given. We are further informed that Miss Rich often does things backwards. For instance, the other day she put her dress on backwards, and being superstitious wore it that way all day. Then too, she reversed the usual program of starting on the stage, shifting to the movies, and then getting married and raising a family. Irene married, became the mother of two daughters, and then at the age of twenty-six undertook the more serious part of the program, *to-wit*: With no previous stage experience, she entered the movies and after firmly entrenching herself there, made her first stage appearance. She is now playing in a new series of programs over the NBC Blue network, sponsored by the Welsh Grape Juice.

The H. J. Heinz Company is sponsoring a program that is proving an invaluable aid to the modern young wife who wants to have her share of business, to do her duty toward tennis or golf and yet keep her house in order and efficiently run. Josephine Gibson, hostess counsel who gives the talks, is a veteran of a similar extended series over NBC. She is heard each Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 10:00 a. m., EST.

Speaking of movie stars, Irene Dunne appeared with the Ipana Troubadors as guest artist recently. Movie stars seem to be in quite some demand over the radio, and more and more the radio stars are finding their way into pictures. After all, it is the same public that is the final judge.

A new radio romance, bringing the glamour and adventure of the far off South Seas, will be heard over the NBC-WJZ network beginning Wednesday, October 25, at 8:30 p. m. EST. The newcomer to the ether waves will be known as "Dangerous Paradise" and will feature Elsie Hitz and Nick Dawson, popular radio dramatic stars, in the leading roles. The serial will deal with the adventures of an attractive young newspaper feature writer, whom circumstances and an airplane drop down in a remote section of New Guinea and of a modern young man whom she meets and falls in love with, on the coral skirted beach of the island.

At least there is one performer on the air today who can boast of being there continuously for the past eleven years. It was on November 19, 1922, when S. L. Rothafel, better known as Roxy, defied tradition and convention to go on the air with a complete program featuring the personnel of a stage show. On November 19 next, Roxy will again wield the baton—for the anniversary of his first broadcast that took place so long ago, when radio was new and still in the pioneer stage.

A new musical program under the title of a "Galaxy of Stars" has been inaugurated over the NBC network. The stars of the program are Phil Porterfield, baritone and former star of the stage; Edna Odell, contralto; Irma Glenn, popular organist who has been on the air since 1922; and Earl Lawrence, pianist and arranger, who started in radio playing the piano for Major Bowes Capitol Family. The program which is sponsored by the Red Star Yeast Products Company, is heard three times a week.

Eddie Cantor found time the other day to drop in on a Chase & Sanborn Hour rehearsal to see how Rubinoff was getting along without him. The broadcasts are coming from Hollywood now, where Eddie, Ruth Etting and Jimmie Durante are making movies; but as soon as Eddie can finish, the program will probably be transferred to the new NBC Radio City studios in New York—where Eddie will resume his old place before the microphone.

Irene Beasley, in many people's opinion, is either a very rash person or one who is very sure of her possibilities. She turned down a sponsor's offer to appear on a sustaining program. She took this chance because she believes that people want something more from a singer than just a song—and is putting on a "one-woman variety show" of her own. The "long, tall gal from Dixie" not only sings many songs, but is the producer, writer and sole actor of her programs.

Network Programs; How and Where to Find Them

Radio programs have come to be the center of life in almost every American home; hence the importance and value of air schedules is obvious. To many, programs and their time, the networks, broadcasting stations and their frequencies, are but a mass of confusing information and while we believe Radio Log and Lore program features are self-explanatory, these remarks concerning the whole program set-up and the application of Radio Log and Lore features, is intended to simplify the problem and to be helpful, at least to those not well versed in programs and broadcasting.

Interest in Networks

An over-whelming majority of interest is in the so-called network programs, which may be produced anywhere, but generally are released in New York or Chicago studios. From a small studio the entertainment of a single broadcast is heard by countless millions in four different time zones. Thus while the program may be produced and heard at a given time in New York it is heard simultaneously in San Francisco, yet some three hours earlier as far as clock reading. Network attractions, as a rule, are produced either daily

or on a given day of the week. Thus with three networks (one by Columbia and a Blue and Red by NBC) it is fairly easy, by using this information as a basis, to follow every quarter hour period every day in the week. Following up this plan it is a simple matter to locate a nearby chain outlet (broadcasting station). For your convenience two double-page charts are presented: First, a coast-to-coast program schedule with a listing for each of the three networks, for the first quarter, the half, the three-quarter, and even hour periods. The hour of time departs on the zone in which you are located. A second double page (network maps and complete station listings) shows which stations are members of a chain. Member stations do not always take every release; if one does not take it, try another.

Pacific Coast Programs

Three pages of programs of the newly-formed and government-owned Canadian network, list programs in the same time zones and with the Atlantic zone, in which the maritime provinces are located, added.

Both National and Columbia maintain Pacific Coast Chains, where many excellent


programs are produced. These Coast programs which may be tuned in after Eastern stations have closed for the night, are contained elsewhere in this department.

About Split Programs

One condition in broadcasting incidental to extremely popular programs is very confusing—split networks. Amos 'n' Andy is one of these. It means that an hour suitable for the Eastern part of the United States (7:00 p.m.) is entirely too late for the Pacific Coast. (It is 3:00 in San Francisco when it is 7:00 in New York.) Thus Amos 'n' Andy broadcast their program several hours earlier for Western listeners and repeat it later for the East.

No claim is advanced that these listings will be found 100 per cent perfect; we can simply print a schedule representative of the month as it is received from the networks. Last minute substitutions are frequent, but these schedules will be found to be correct in the main and easy to use and understand.

In addition a double page of programs and artists—"Who's Who"—is published in alphabetical arrangement, telling when and where your favorite program may be heard.





One of the discoverer of and world's foremost authority on radio; the other, of a man who will picture the new world to thousands of listeners at home.




Discoverer Marconi

Marconi's views will not reach the ears of thousands of listeners, but his visit is none the less important, as he is probably the world's most famous radio authority. Just 32 years ago, Marconi, then in his twenties, sent the first wireless message; 19 years later KDKA began the first world's daily broadcast. From this beginning to the consummation of the world's largest broadcasting plant in the world in Radio City, Marconi was deeply impressed with what has resulted from his first discovery. He will remain in America to participate in NBC's seventh anniversary celebration this month, which will also mark the official opening and dedication of Radio City by RCA, when there will be a week of special broadcasting of world-wide scope to celebrate the important event.

Discoverer Mais

A visitor is apt to see things that his host has forgotten about and likewise, place secondary importance on things that his host is sure will prove most interesting. NBC officials, who had Mr. Mais in tow in New York, proposed to first show him New York's famous skyline. Mr. Mais looked upward—not at the skyline at all, but at the deep blue sky background and demanded to know why English people had never heard more about American weather. He declared that even one of such days as he had seen in New York in unbroken succession, would be cause for hilarious celebration in London where, too, there is an unbroken succession—of fog. He is commissioned to broadcast from all parts of the United States, to far-flung audiences in both the Old and New World.



'Pole Discovering' Broadcasting Part

There have been Arctic explorers and Antarctic explorers down the centuries, but Polar exploration has now gone modern, for when the S. S. Jacob Ruppert, flagship of the Antarctic expedition, reaches the Antarctic ice barrier, it will have on board a 1,000 watt broadcasting station; licensed by the Federal Radio Commission to use 15 frequencies for voice and 51 for code. Byrd will be transferred to the steamship Bear, which will penetrate the frozen wastes to Byrd's base in little America. There a new station, with the call of KJTY, will be set up to handle the regular weekly programs in which Admiral

Byrd and the members of the expedition will report on the progress of their expedition. The voice frequencies granted the station are, in kilocycles: 6650, 6660, 6670, 8820, 8840, 13185, 13200, 13230, 13245, 13260, 17600, 17620, 21515, 21600 and 21625. The Columbia Broadcasting System, which hopes to present a weekly series of broadcasts keeping tab on the trip, will supply two men to accompany the expedition; an engineer and an announcer. One of the country's largest wholesale magazine distributors is supplying the expedition with a special line of current men's magazines, including Radio Log and Lore.

Reginald Stewart Heads Orchestra

(Toronto Correspondence)

Reginald Stewart, the eminent Canadian conductor, is directing the broadcasts of the new Commission Symphony Orchestra which is heard over a Canadian network under the auspices of the Canadian Radio Commission.

Sixty-five of the finest players in Toronto are heard in the Cesar Franck Symphony, under the brilliant conductorship of the young Canadian who was guest conductor on six occasions for the British Broadcasting Symphony Orchestra, for the London (England) Symphony on several occasions, and who is identified with the Bach Society as Musical Director.

Reginald Stewart was born in Edinburgh; had his early musical training in Scotland and later studied with such established teachers as Conradi, Isador Phillip in Paris, Hamburg in London, Friedheim in Germany. He became the conductor of the Canadian Operatic Society in 1919, director of music at Hart House, University of Toronto, in 1921 and conductor of the Eaton Choral Society in 1925. The same year he filled special engagements in England, receiving flattering acclaim, and again in 1930 the British press had occasion to pay tribute to his brilliance and conspicuous triumph as guest conductor of the London Symphony at Albert Hall.

Assembled under this able baton are a large group of first ranking musicians, and this, the first of their Radio Commission programs carry their fine ability to music lovers all over Canada.





LEGEND: The Canadian network is divided into four main divisions, while a fifth division, the Midwest, is a combination of the eastern part of the Pacific division, Alberta, linked with the western part of the Central division, Saskatchewan, and many regional programs are released by stations within the borders of each region. Thus the constituent division of the whole network is practically a counterpart of the divisions of Standard Time, Pacific division being in territory governed by Pacific Standard Time, the Midwest in Mountain, and Central in Central Time, the Mideast in Eastern Time, and the Maritime in Atlantic Time. The stations comprising these regional divisions are listed below, but in the program schedules time zones are used to indicate in which portions of the country a program may be heard. Thus: A to P means all zones from coast to coast, while A & E means the program is heard in the Atlantic and Eastern zones only. The origination of each program is also indicated at the left of each program, CBS and NBC indicating an American hook-up, while the first letters of Canadian cities indicate its origination there.



Q The time column at the left is easy to understand and the table will be found very handy once that it is clear. The large figures in the column are in Eastern standard time and each, of course, represent one hour's broadcasting; thus, by following through the different days of the week, you can ascertain the programs that are on during each quarter hour of the period. The hour, fifteen minute, half hour and forty-five minute periods follow in order, as indicated by the figures at the right of the large hour number. If you do not use Eastern time, the transcriptions for each of the five time zones will be found in smaller type immediately at the left of the large figure; thus, as a program is flashed across the continent's different time will be in effect in five zones.



NBC [Non-Chain—KPO] PROGRAMS

By a recent re-arrangement, release of NBC programs in the principal cities of the Pacific Coast is effected through double outlets, although there is but a single network. Thus, when one outlet is taking the chain the other is releasing a local program. Los Angeles, Seattle, Portland and Spokane all have dual NBC outlets while San Francisco has the two key stations, KPO and KGO and a third station—KYA—also releases NBC features. A double program service is maintained in San Francisco by NBC, one going on the NBC-Pacific Chain, while the other is released by the co-key station. KGO, however, is generally attached to the chain, which is known as the KGO network; thus the programs not released on the chain are known as the NBC-KPO programs. These are generally from the San Francisco studios, although Eastern features are released when the chain is occupied by a Pacific Coast program. NBC-Pacific programs, with all NBC outlets, are printed on another page and where there are double outlets, one will be found to be releasing the chain feature.


Back on the Air



What the DXers Are Doing

N. Z. Club Sponsors a DX Contest

(Dunedin, N. Z. Correspondence)

New Zealand dialers are proud of their DX organization, "The New Zealand DX Radio Association, Inc.", which is growing by leaps and bounds and which publishes its own official magazine, "Tune In", at Dunedin, New Zealand. A second organization, "The New Zealand DX Club", also has a large membership. The latter organization has recently sponsored a DX competition in which three cups were offered. J. E. Downes of Dunedin won the New Zealand championship with 417 stations; J. P. Cowlishaw was second with 381 stations; M. Stafford third with 358 stations; S. Robson fourth with 321 stations; J. R. Bain fifth with 313 stations; D. N. Adams sixth with 303 stations and J. Downey seventh with 207 stations. Mrs. C. H. Judd of Tauranga was first in the women's division with 160 stations.

Although rumored that the DX hobby was waning, ample proof has been shown in the last few months that it was becoming more and more popular. Station 5AD, which is not an easy station to log, had 2,000 reports in less than a year. The 50 watt Geelong station, 3GL, recently had five correct reports on their transmissions from the United States alone.

Newspaper DX Clubs

Two of America's outstanding newspapers have done an incalculable service to those of their constituents interested in radio and to distance fans in general in lending aid by the establishment of DX clubs bearing their names. They are the Newark News of Newark, N. J., and the Buffalo Evening News of Buffalo, N. Y.

The Newark Club was founded in December 1927 and is credited with a membership of over 1800. The dues are \$2 for the first year and \$1 each year thereafter, but the dues include a copy of the News, in which there is a page of interest to Club members.

The Buffalo club is younger and smaller, but operates along the same lines.

DIALING 100-WATTERS IS FAVORITE PASTIME FOR NEW ZEALANDERS

(Wellington Correspondence)

Indoor sports for New Zealanders—in fact for all Australasians—twirling the dials for American stations. Divine Providence surely has been kind in creating a set of conditions here, ideal for trans-oceanic reception. Perhaps it is because signals are known to travel better over water; perhaps because of reasons unknown to science, but picking up American 100 watters on these islands is a comparatively easy feat.

Reception, over a large area, is a difficult subject as the vagaries of radio signals are well known and seem to exist everywhere. New Zealand is no exception. However, most DXers believe that the generally favorable conditions are largely caused by the large water surrounding these two islands.

Not generally known, but well known to scientists, is the fact that the reception of radio signals has a practical counterpart with solar activity, in which the sun is encompassed in an eleven year cycle and in which, at the present time, we are experiencing the minimum. Within this cycle, however, is apparently a smaller fifteen month cycle. At least, this condition would seem to be established by two American astronomers who investigated radio reception over a number of years. Using the signals of WBBM of Chicago in this period, they found a definite fifteen month cycle of good reception that apparently had its counterpart in solar activity. The last maximum of this cycle was in August, 1932 and its next appearance will be in November of this year. All New Zealand DXers will quickly attest to the excellent reception experienced during the last cycle appearance. What November will bring, remains to be seen, but increasing static may be counted on to deprive us of much of its benefit.

(Newark Correspondence)


Whether or not the climate is a contributing factor, there are two spots where DXers fairly spring out of the ground and both have the prefix New—New Zealand and New Jersey.

In New Zealand, it would appear that every radio set owner is a potential DX contest winner—depending on how lucky he is and how expert. There is little doubt, however, but that the DX brethren down under are very fortunate in being endowed with physical conditions that make for good reception.

It is not known whether any similar claims have been advanced on behalf of New Jersey's natural advantages, but it is apparent that the state is endowed with plenty of enthusiasts willing to stand vigil through the hours, to bring in the elusive distant signal. In fact, there are so many, it would appear, that numerous DX clubs are required to hold them. There are only nine DX clubs listed in the United States and five are from New Jersey.

President Charles A. Morrison of the International DXers Alliance, has announced the official schedule of International Broadcasts for November and December, 1933. The first broadcast will be on November 12 from YV2AM, Santiago, Chile on 7145 kilocycles at 8 to 10 p.m.; the second will be on November 26 from the 75,000 Piedras Negras station XEPN on 585 kilocycles at 1 a.m.; the third on November 27 from CP4, La Paz, Bolivia on 600 kilocycles at 3:30 to 4:30 a.m.; and CP3, La Paz, Bolivia on 6080 kilocycles at 3:30 to 4:30 a.m. A fifth broadcast will be on December 3 from LR5, the 27,000 watt Buenos Aires, Argentine station on 830 kilocycles at 11 to 12 p.m.; the sixth on December 16 from HCJB at Quito, Ecuador on 1405 kilocycles at 11 to 12 p.m.; the seventh on December 17 from FQN, St. Pierre, France on 570 kilocycles at 3 to 4 a.m. and an eighth on December 18 from FQN, St. Pierre, France on 570 kilocycles at 3 to 4 a.m. Time given is in Eastern Standard Time



The Short Waves

Functions of short wave stations are indicated by their classification and of these, program or broadcasting stations are most eagerly sought. However, the thrill of a voice from the opposite side of the earth is not without its effect and distance, therefore, becomes an important consideration. ¶ ¶ In addition to the classified lists, a master frequency list is published, listing either individual stations or channels inhabited by many stations; also, a spectrum containing many station and channel listings, and illustrating the entire span of radio.

In many of the tables, meters are omitted, as most sets are now calibrated in megacycles and both megacycles and kilocycles are convertible by a shifting of the decimal point. Where space permits both meters and kilocycles (or megacycles) are given.

No attempt is made to include stations that hold a license but seldom operate, or stations that operate only at infrequent intervals. Broadcast stations only actually on the air, phone stations that transmit messages and ship and code stations actually heard by listeners are included.

When Short Wave Reception Is at Its Best

The high frequencies (short waves) are used to span great distances so that the short wave set in a word, as compared to the long wave or broadcast wave receiver, is a set of great distances; but there are many factors which control reception and make the success of reception uncertain. Two fundamental factors in short wave broadcasting, however, have been discovered and used to advantage by broadcasters which have, in a measure, reduced uncertainty and improved on the results that may be obtained.

One of these is the time of day when reception is at its best for a given frequency. The other is the influence that both time of day and frequency exert on the "skip distance". Above 12,000 kilocycles reception generally is more satisfactory during the day than at night, whereas in frequencies below 6,000 kilo-

cycles night-time reception is better. It has been found experimentally that frequencies above 15,000 kilocycles can be heard only when the path between the transmitting station and the receiver lies entirely in daylight. For frequencies between 15,000 to 8,000 kilocycles reception is best when either the transmitter or the receiver lies in darkness, but not both. The reliable range of the sky wave will vary slowly from season to season, but very rapidly from day to night. The "skip distance" is at the minimum at noon, and increases to a maximum at midnight. The most unusual conditions of reception are encountered at sunrise and sunset when the most rapid changes occur. "Skip distance" is greater when the frequency is higher.

The foregoing accounts for broadcasters well familiar with these physical agencies.

using different frequencies for different periods of the day as well as a frequency suitable for reaching the locality the broadcast is intended to cover.

The seasons of the year affect greatly short wave reception. Better reception on the shorter waves or higher frequencies may be expected, as a rule, during the Summer months, and better reception at 6,000 kilocycles and below during the Winter months. The higher frequencies are affected least by atmospheric disturbances or static, and good results may be obtained even in Midsummer during a severe thunder storm. On the other hand, these shorter waves are affected more by interference from trolley-cars, dial telephones, automobiles, electrical appliances, elevators and the many smaller electrical devices than the standard broadcast waves.

Number of Letters, As Well As Letters Themselves, Has Meaning


In the early days of broadcasting the adopting of call letters by radio stations had one object in view, viz.: the identification and distinguishing of one station from another and seldom had these call signs any intrinsic significance of their own. This somewhat chaotic state of affairs was entirely changed by the general redistribution of call signs which took place throughout the world when the International Radiotelegraph Regulations, drawn up by the Washington convention, were brought into force about three years ago. These regulations provided for the systematic distribution of call signs according to the nationality and nature of stations. Each country was allotted a consecutive number of call letter combinations (such as PAA, PAB, and PAC, etc.) and definite rules were agreed upon as to the type of call sign to be used by each class of station.

In addition to the nationality of the station, however, call letters have even more significance, and by possessing a knowledge of how these letters and numerals are compiled one can usually tell at a glance to just what kind of a station a call sign belongs. While this rule is not infallible, it is generally the case, so that the listener with some understanding of the rules can readily tell the nationality and nature of the station, while by consulting lists giving the allocation of these call signs, which are published by the International (Berne) Radio Telegraph Convention, he may have full and accurate details. Exclusive of broadcast long wave and short wave stations there are four major divisions, and the way these divisions are indicated and handled by the call signs are as follows:

Fixed land 3 letters **Ship** 4 letters **Aircraft** 5 letters
Amateur and experimental **Nationality prefix followed by numeral and not more than 3 letters**

The terms, "ship and aircraft stations," is readily understood, as is the term, "fixed land stations." This latter may embrace coastal stations, airdrome stations, or commercial high-powered stations, and their identification is fairly simple, as the number of letters only in the call is involved. There is more confusion in the amateur and experiment stations as for various reasons the rules are not always closely followed. Each country is allowed to choose the nationality prefix for both the amateur and experimental stations, and many countries, notably the United States, seize the use of the second character (the numeral) as a means of further identification. As there are nine radio districts in the United States, the call signs of amateur and experimental stations within these districts are numbered accordingly. Other countries which have adopted this check classification include Australia, Canada, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, Dutch East Indies, Finland, Japan, New Zealand, South Africa, etc. Ordinary broadcasting stations, which are the best known of radio stations, frequently form exceptions to the above rules. Being fixed land stations, they should in reality have three-letter combinations; whereas, in many instances they have four-letter combinations as well as a frequent mingling of numerals with the letters. Short-wave broadcasting stations, as in the case of experimental stations, utilize calls with a numeral following the nationality prefix.

Calls and Call Districts of NORTH AMERICA




While prefixes or certain letters, designated to distinguish calls of one nation from another, are assigned by the international authorities at Berne, most of the larger countries divide their territory into numbered call districts and these numbers in calls, designate the district in which the station is located. In the United States there are nine call districts and in Canada, five. Long wave broadcasting and commercial station calls do not include call district numbers but amateur and experimental station calls are indicated by a number immediately following the prefix letter denoting nationality.

In the United States, each radio district maintains its headquarters in a centrally located city in charge of a supervisor of radio, a number of branch offices at strategical points and a centrally located constant frequency monitoring station, the manager of which is under the direct supervision of the Washington office. A list of these district headquarters, with the territory under the jurisdiction of each, follows:




