

Then Along Comes R&R

On October 5, 1973, a new era in trade publications began.

Amid a chorus of "Why another tip sheet?" R&R was created "out of a desire to serve the industry with unbiased

news coverage and honest, understandable charts." Country was called Country & Western, AC was Pop/MOR, Rock was Rock, but all of the charts had one thing in common: They were based strictly on actual station airplay.

R&R also shattered other industry conventions at the time, incorporating a Friday vs. Monday publishing date and giving subscribers current music information in the same week it was reported. Then there were such distinguishing innovations as the Parallels and airplay acceptance graphs. The 24page weekly was also stocked with editorial covering the latest wild

and crazy promotions (a mass wedding at KMET-FM/Los Angeles; jock levitates audience at WSAI/Chicago),

lawyer Jason Shrinsky's guide to understanding the FCC (is that really possible?), Nashville goings-on

with Biff Collie, and upfront interviews with the industry's then-movers and shakers, including Buzz Bennett, Rick Carroll, Ron Jacobs, and John Lennon. All for \$130 a year or \$35 a quarter.

Along for the ride during R&R's inaugural efforts: Publisher Bob Wilson, Managing Editor Martin Cerf, Editor Gene Sculatti, Ad Director Dick Krizman, Asst. Editor (and typesetter) Ken Barnes, production staffers Richard Zumwalt and Roger Zumwalt, and Chart Director Nancy (Lecuyer) Hoff. Little did they

know that a quarter of a century later, R&R would still be the industry's true information leader.

Reflections



BOB WILSON, R&R FOUNDER

Career inspiration: "I was attracted to radio at an early age growing up in Providence in the early '50s, listening to WPRO. The morning man actually used to sing happy birthday greetings. After he sang my name, I was hooked and became a radio junkie. When my family moved to Los Angeles, my radio influences were KFWB (I used to park cars there; that's how I first met Gary Owens when I was only 16), KRLA, Boss Radio KHJ, and late night dial tuning to receive Wolfman Jack from Mexico. I played and won contests every chance I could — I was one of those people for whom they eventually established rules about how many times a month you could win.

Personal influences: "Gary Owens, who told me how to get into radio school; best friend Sam Riddle, who I met when he was doing 9pm-midnight at KRLA (preceding Bob Eubanks); Wolfman Jack, truly one of the greatest human beings ever, a very insightful man; and Neil Bogart, who

I met in the '60s, after I had broken several of his Buddah Records hits on the stations I programmed. We became very close. Even after his death, he's still a strong influence. He was the greatest showman I've ever known with a heart of pure gold.

Catalyst for starting R&R: "In 1973, the existing music information came from Billboard, Cashbox, Gavin, and Bob Hamilton's newer radio publication. None of them shared information or chart methodology. You'd see a record move on *Billboard*'s chart from 11 to 1 to 13, just so it would get a No. 1 spot. I was programming an L.A. AM station [KDAY] with progressive music presented Top 40 formatics (what became AOR), and we actually tied KHJ 3pm-midnight (with Wolfman at night). No one in the big trades was covering the emerging music, radio PDs, and managers. There was an obvious opening for serious radio information and honest charts — and delivered faster. That's what **R&R** did. You got to look ahead instead of trying to program out of a two- to threeweek-old rearview mirror. R&R changed the industry perspective. Everyone was able to see what was coming and prepare for it. I picked the newspaper format because newspapers were the perceived information institutions

"After we were firmly the leader in music and news, we set our sights on *Broadcasting* magazine, formerly the radio GMs' publication. Some transaction data was months old by the time Broadcasting finally printed it. We opened a DC bureau and made the buying and selling of radio stations a news beat. Later, R&R was

the first with news and music info via fax and online."

Convention flashback: "R&R conventions changed the expectation levels for those kinds of industry events. When we did the first convention in Atlanta, it was a convention of the people. Registration was \$55 with \$35 rooms and all the food you could eat. We planned for 250 people; 1000+ showed up. I never ran the conventions as a business. I always looked at them as giving back to the industry that had been so good to R&R.

Current gig: "I left R&R to get involved in emerging technologies. I've since partnered with Jeff Pollack and Mel Karmazin to fulfill the vision of what radio can and must become on the Internet to compete in the new millennium. After two years of research and development, we are about to roll out the product. KROQ will be our prototype station. There's nothing on the 'net like it today. It will blow every major-market manager and PD away.

'I've also identified a music trend that I believe will be prominent in the coming years. I've developed two acts. One is already signed to a major label with a planned January 1999 release; the other will be signed by the time this interview is printed. It will be interesting to see if any of the music I'm involved with reaches No. 1 on the charts I created 25 years ago. That would certainly be taking it

Most rewarding moments: "Certainly my two daughters are the greatest rewards in my life. Knowing that I created an industry institution that's still going strong is another. Creating an 'institution' was certainly part of my original drive. Presenting one of only three live performances ever by the original Blues Brothers still ranks pretty high on any scale. And having the Eagles' reunion evolve onstage during the Don Henley show at the 90 convention may be one of my personal best moments (they had banned me from rehearsals).

Funny anecdote: "It was pretty wild in the beginning. What few people **kn**ow is that, when I started **R&R**, I was also partnered with Wolfman Jack in a syndication company that handled his shows and special-event programming as well as weekly concerts from the Roxy and the Troubador nightclubs. The ${\bf R\&R}$ offices housed both operations. When the Wolfman was in town to record, we had to work around his howls and yells. There were no doors in those first offices, so he'd have to yell to everyone that he was going to start recording. Then we'd have to lower our voices while taking reports and getting the news until he came out and gave us the Wolfman all-clear

signal.



Building Momentum

Often, we think of the "old days" as being simpler times. Not so 1974. It was a year marked by an energy crisis, gasoline shortages, Nixon's resignation, and a new national pastime — streaking.

Radio continued to do what it does best: capitalize on topical events while keeping listeners informed and entertained. For example, before Mark McGwire and

Sammy Sosa were old enough for Little League, WSB/Atlanta listeners heard the play-by-play of Henry Aaron breaking Babe Ruth's career home- run record.

Newcomer **R&R** was on the scene, chronicling everything from the serious to the sublime, from carpool promotions to WPOP/Hartford's "Streaker Sneakers" giveaway and WRC/Washington's "The Devil Made Me Do It" contest, a tie-in with box-office champ *The Exorcist*, complete with a Flip Wilsonvoiced liner. *The Trouble With Rock*, a CBS-TV news special, focused on alleged Mafia ties in the record industry.

In between, the government was considering asking radio stations to conduct voluntary sign-offs as well as decrease power usage. There was also a prediction that FM cume would zoom in '74 as a result of the energy crisis (because more people were staying home on the weekends, there were fewer of them listening to their car radios, which

AM had a lock on in those days).

For whatever reason, FM cume *did* begin to zoom in '74, and the old-line AM operators of the day saw some of their shares move to the other band, which featured such innovations as music sweeps and eight- minute spot loads.

Meanwhile, **R&R** was busy with a few milestones of its own, introducing the Back Page and Street Talk's predecessor, Radio Rumor Control, and snaring industry luminaries such as WPEZ/Pittsburgh PD (and future MTV founder) Bob Pittman to wax philosophic on timely issues. Reminiscing

about the old days are former RKO programming maestro Paul Drew and veteran record exec and Arista President Clive Davis.





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

PAUL DREW

Career inspiration: "Listening to the DJs on ABC's WXYZ/Detroit when I was growing up, I questioned some of the music. This was in the 1950s when DJs programmed their own shows. I worked in Detroit's number one record store, so I had a chance to meet people and make suggestions about buying various records. Combining all that, one day I wanted to be the one who chose the right records to be played on the radio."

First R&R sighting: "While working in my RKO office at 6255 Sunset Boulevard, I was informed that

R&R was beginning; they were also on the sixth floor in a very small group of offices with about five or six people. And we developed a good working relationship since we all shared the same men's and ladies' rooms. We did everything we could at RKO to help R&R get started. We thought it was a good idea."

Personal influences: "I always liked to hire people who worked for Gordon McLendon. I was also influenced by Chris Lane's more music approach at Bartell's KYA/San Francisco; later by Ron Jacobs at Boss Radio KHJ/Los Angeles and by Jerry Clifton with what he did for us at 99X/New York."


Most rewarding career point: "All the people who came to RKO— who've gone on to have successful careers. It's just a long list that gives me much pride."

careers. It's just a long list that gives me much pride."

Most disappointing: "RKO not being able to change WGMS-AM/Washington from Classical to Top 40 in 1972."

Current gig: "I provide strategic programming analysis to radio station owners. I'm also completing my book about the music business and radio."

Most significant industry change in last 25 years: "The unfortunate overreliance by the major record companies on independent promoters to obtain radio airplay — which gives too much airtime to mediocre music."



Vinyl Statistics

1974 was the first year R&R published a year-end wrap-up of music. At the time, there were three formats: Rock (now CHR), Pop (now AC), and Country. Compare that to the 12 formats that exist today.

1974 was song-driven, rather than artist-driven. Seventeen songs topped the Rock chart in '74, including titles that you're more apt to find on a Rhino Records collection than an Oldies station. "Seasons In The Sun" by Terry Jacks, "Kung Fu Fighting" by Carl Douglas, "Hooked On A Feeling" by Blue Swede, "The Night Chicago

Died" by Paper Lace, "I Can Help" by Billy Swan, and "The Streak" by Ray Stevens were among the Rock chart-toppers in '74.

But don't get us wrong: Some very successful recording legends had a big year in 1974. Elton John reached the top 10 four times with "Bennie And The Jets," "Don't Let The Sun Go Down On Me," "The Bitch Is Back," and his rendition of the Beatles' "Lucy In The Sky With Diamonds.

R&B music, which wasn't represented with an R&R chart




of its own in the early days, certainly made its presence felt on the Rock chart. Stevie Wonder and Barry White had three songs that peaked in the top 15 in '74, while Gladys Knight & The Pips had two.

On the Pop chart, singer/ songwriter John Denver was at his high with two No. 1 songs, "Annie's Song" and "Sunshine On My Shoulders." Another, "Back Home Again," peaked at No. 2. A young Australian country/pop singer named Olivia Newton-John made her breakthrough in '74 as well. Her "I Honestly Love You" topped all three charts that year, while "If You Love Me (Let Me Know)" topped the Pop and Country charts and went top 10 at Rock.

Thirty-one songs topped R&R's Country chart in 1974, and Conway Twitty had three of them with "There's A Honky Tonk Angel (Who'll Take Me Back In)," "I'm Not Through Loving You Yet," and "I See The Want To In Your Eyes." Charlie Rich was anything but behind closed doors in '74. He landed six top 15 hits that year.

Classic Rock staples that hit in '74 included "Sweet Home Alabama" by Lynyrd Skynyrd, "I Shot The Sheriff" by Eric Clapton, "You Ain't Seen Nothing Yet" and "Takin' Care Of Business" by Bachman-Turner Overdrive, "Can't Get Enough" by Bad Company, "Radar Love" by Golden Earring, and Grand Funk's cover of Little Eva's "The

Loco-Motion," which was the No. 2 song at Rock that year.

Another very notable song from '74 was "Rock The Boat" by the Hues Corporation, which has been credited with starting the disco craze that would dominate much of the mid- to late '70s.


Personal influences: tainly, I owe my career to Goddard Lieberson, who was the head of Columbia Records and gave me my opportunity."

It's All In A Name

Editor's note:

For 22 years, Street Talk has ranked as the most widely read of R&R's inside pages, but the column didn't evolve until 1976.

While we wait for Street Talk to arrive, here's a piece from Elizabeth Salazar, wife of cartoonist and voice-and production-wiz extraordinaire Bobby Ocean, who reacquaints us with one of R&R's most popular features of the late '70s, Err Waves.

For this special, Bobby and Elizabeth selected their favorite strips from the series, which we chose to spread throughout this book. Plus, they honored us with a halfdozen strips that were drawn just for this commemorative issue. We're deeply indebted to them both!

I've always been of the opinion that Bobby drew Roger Small as his alter ego, and that Roger's frustrations and adventures were perhaps Bobby's in cartoon form. There's no denying that Roger's facial features were a two-dimensional rendering of Bobby Ocean, just as "Shaune," the

overworked Err Waves secretary, is Shaune Steele, and "Charlie Van Dallas," the aspired-to-majormarket talent, is Charlie Van Dyke. Equally undeniable were some of the allegorical themes reflected in Err Waves through whimsy, wit, and bite.


Bobby concedes that his overall radio experiences were often mirrored in Roger's smallmarket experiences in an unnamed California town. R&R published the strip between 1976-1980, and the Err Waves

gang - Les Talent, Pipes McMouth, Jay Trifle, League Majors (a.k.a. The Stone Don Clone), Roger Small, and Chatty Cathy became avenues through which the overall tastes of the broadcast day can now be glimpsed.

Many of the characterizations or comical situations may seem quaint by 1998 standards. Additionally, there is nothing abstruse nor penetrative about Err Waves (translation: It ain't brain surgery). We just ask that you bring an open mind and your sense of humor as R&R reels you back 20+ years to an era that may seem very un-PC by today's standards, but was undeniably the status quo. And that's what Err Waves has unwittingly preserved: an authentic, clever, and satirical look at the social climate of a Top 40 radio station in the '70s as seen through the pen of Bobby Ocean







Conventional Wisdom

While the social in crowd was seeking fulfillment through EST (Erhart Seminar Training), radio and records cognoscenti were seeking their own brand of fulfillment in Atlanta, at **R&R**'s first in its series of infamous conventions.

Just 17 months after hitting the scene, the trade trekked to the Royal Coach Motor Hotel for a mix of panel discussions, seminars, keynote speakers (Geor-

gia Lt. Governor Zell Miller did the honors the first time out), and superstar entertainment. In tow, a who's who of more than 800 from the converging worlds of radio (including Jay Thomas, Scott Shannon, Jerry Clifton, Lee Abrams, John Rook, Michael Spears, Buzz Bennett, Bill Tanner) and records (Clive Davis, Joe Smith, Neil Bogart, Al Coury, and Russ Regan, among others). The entertainment lineup - presented by the inimitable Thomas - featured the Pointer Sisters, Jim Stafford, and Paul Davis ... and a backgammon tourna-

ment. Imagine, all that for a mere \$55 registration fee!

But the convention wasn't the only news making noise in 1975. The radio industry also bore witness to other firsts: KKDJ/Los Angeles adopted a new persona as KIIS. WKYS/ Washington – formerly WRC-FM – made history when it debuted as the first major-market Disco station. And more

AM Top 40s punched off the dial. Meanwhile, the FCC was still wrestling with WBAI/New York and George Carlin's "Seven Dirty Words," plus debating the ethics of stations

airing phone calls without alerting listeners beforehand.

On the promotional front, RKO VP/Programming Paul Drew proposed an 11-year precursor to the "Hands Across America" coast-to-coast human chain. To commemorate the country's upcoming bicentennial celebration (July 4, 1976), he asked stations to encourage listeners to link hands across the country and sing "God Bless America" at 3pm ET. Alas, he didn't find much support for the well-intentioned cause.

And, sadly, one of radio's guiding lights was dimmed: Progres-

sive rock pioneer Tom Donahue died at the age of 48.

Our lineup of remembrances this year includes Frankie Crocker, who in 1975 was a staple in front of and behind the mike on WBLS/New York and former UA President Artie Mogull, who was riding high with War, ELO, and other artists.

Reflections



FRANKIE CROCKER

Career Inspiration: "My love of music. When I first started, I was a news director/part-time DJ. The station I worked for had three or four different formats. So I had the influence of jazz (my first love), R&B, rock, gospel, and country & western. As a baby DJ, I had to sit in for all of these shows. When you listened to early WBLS/NY, it was an amalgam of jazz, blues, R&B, rock—a lot of different music that was happening."

Current career gig: "I'm doing syndication. I also have my own website. And I'll start seminary school in the fall in L.A., something I wish I'd done years ago to help me live."

Most significant industry change in last 25 years: "The lack of creative personality; the DJ not being as integral a part as he used to

be. It's not to say that it's a bad thing, but I just miss it."

Personal influences: "The person who influenced me most was the late [Cleveland DJ] Eddie O'Jay. When I first heard him, it changed my life"

Most rewarding career point: "The people who tell me how the music I played influenced their lives."

Most disappointing: "Some of the language that's allowed on the radio. It's disappointing that I'm not in the middle of it to find the good and praise it, to coin a phrase. If I was in the forefront of the business, I would be able to find music that's positive rather than negative. I think the foul language is what's hurting a lot of the hip-hop. There are some very talented youngsters out there, and their music and culture have crossed all lines. But they need better PR."

Vinyl Statistics

R&R's format classifications from the early years look funny today, particularly the "Rock" category — that's what we called Top 40 of the day —

which featured some not-so-rockin' year-end finishers:
Captain & Tennille, the Bee
Gees, Barry Manilow, Neil
Sedaka, and KC & The
Sunshine Band all appeared in the R&R Rock 75 of '75!
There was also Olivia Newton-John, who finished as R&R's
Female Vocalist Of The Year for 1975 with three top 10 hits, including "Have You Never
Been Mellow," which peaked at No. 1 in February.

AOR Album Airplay for the year featured the biggest artists of the era who would go on to define the Classic Rock format. Literally tens of millions of albums were sold by mega-groups like Fleetwood Mac, the Eagles, Elton John, Bruce Springsteen, Pink Floyd, and Aerosmith. Aerosmith (who 23 years later would still be cranking out No. 1 records)

landed in the top 20 with *Toys In The Attic*, which produced "Sweet Emotion" and "Walk This Way," two of the mostplayed tracks in the history of Rock radio.

Nashville influenced the pop world, with hits by **B.J. Thomas** and **Glen Campbell** earning top five status on **R&R**'s year-end Pop (AC) chart. Campbell's signature hit, "Rhinestone Cowboy," finished No. 2 in Country and No. 4 in Pop. Many of the legendary Music Row labels still going strong today enjoyed big success including Capitol, Columbia, MCA, RCA, Mercury, and Reprise.

Pop/Adult radio featured many of the same superstars as Pop and Country, including No. 1 hits from **John Denver**, **America**, the Eagles, Barry Manilow, and **Wings**. And who could forget "The Hustle" by **Van McCoy**? The novelty sensation hit No. 1 on **R&R**'s AC chart on July 4, 1975.

One artist who produced

country-flavored rock in the '70s was Linda Ronstadt.
Two of her biggest hits came in '75, "You're No Good" and "When Will I Be Loved."


Disco music was beginning to take shape, with many of the genre's biggest hits charting, including the Bee Gees' "Jive Talkin," "Fly, Robin, Fly" by Silver Convention, Gloria Gaynor's "Never

Can Say Goodbye," "Get Down Tonight" and "That's The Way (I Like It)" by KC & The Sunshine Band, and Labelle's "Lady Marmalade," which would launch Patti Labelle, who later became one of the most powerful and loved singers in pop history and would earn the richly deserved title "diva."

While R&R didn't have an R&B music section in the '70s, its impact was clearly being felt. Consider Barry White's "You're The First, The Last, My Everything"; "Shining Star" by Earth, Wind & Fire; and the Spinners, who hit it big with "(They Just Can't Stop It The) Games People Play."

Molding An Institution

Although Progressive radio (a la KSAN/SF, WNEW-FM/NY, KMET/L.A.) had been a staple for nearly a decade, a commercialized version of this format was winning young male audiences almost everywhere it appeared.

The record industry began paying attention to this new breed of FM radio by cranking up the volume of rock releases (cynics would call a lot of this stuff "corporate rock").

The U.S. celebrated its 200th birthday, while radio marked the return of the soon-to-be-ubiguitous KROQ/L.A. following a two-year absence from the airwaves. General Tire & Rubber Co. - in an effort to ward off license challenges stemming from alleged improper payments to foreign governments - opted to spin off its RKO broadcast properties to shareholders. Eight major radio outlets were among the affected holdings. Twelve years later, the spinning-off process was still in gear.

Elsewhere, the CB craze was on. Movers and shakers in the political and musical arenas rubbed elbows: Capricorn Presi-

dent Phil Walden was appointed to the Jimmy Carter inaugural committee. The FCC placed innuendo and double entendre under its indecency microscope (the verdict: neither is patently offensive). FM was becoming increasingly popular with young listeners, prompting a joint FCC/electronics committee to take up the AM stereo cause and begin testing half a dozen systems.

The Rolling Stones raised feminists' ire with a Sunset Strip billboard promoting the group's *Black And Blue* LP. A battered woman in ripped clothes shared space with the following ad

copy: "I'm 'Black And Blue' from the Rolling Stones – and I love it!" The ensuing outcry prompted removal of the bill-board ahead of schedule.

While monitoring these goings-on, **R&R** got busy on its own. It added a number of features that became popular staples: Street Talk, P-1 Playlists, Picture Pages, a weekly Top 40 (now CHR) section under the direction of first editor J.J. Jordan, and a Black radio (now Urban) section. Oh, yeah, we also found time to squeeze in a second convention. Atlanta's Peachtree Plaza Hotel played host to keynoters

Making their confab debut: separate format meetings and hospitality suites.

Radio's premier Rock consultant Lee Abrams and Rock radio superstar of the day Peter Frampton recall this exciting year for the format.



Identifying the Rock revolution source: "AOR's roots can be arguably traced to 1965, when, for the first time, the Top 40 audience started to fragment — primarily the mid-teen guys, who rejected the pop side in favor of new groups like the Byrds, Yardbirds, Animals, and Zombies. This 'movement' grew into a full-blown musical revolution by 1969."

How the Superstars format addressed this revolution: "The idea was to program as familiar as possible without losing the progressive edge by changing the familiarity factor from song title to artist, which allowed a wide range of titles into the mix without sacrificing instant artist awareness. It was the original 'oh wow' factor, where you'd hear Santana, but, 'oh wow,' it wasn't necessarily 'Oye Como Va' again. If the artist was new, we'd institute Top 40-style billboarding techniques."

The results: "In most markets we could waltz in and fill the huge hole between the self-destructive freeform stations and the Top 40s hinging their lives on the Osmonds. But the key to Superstars' extremely long run (the basics are still heard on most stations) was how our clients were creatively managed. From those legendary yearly conferences to simply helping develop some amazing PDs, we were able to constantly evolve the format, occasionally suggesting some rather original and drastic moves such as two-person morning shows."

Current gig: Head of programming for XM digital satellite radio service. "As I get into the digital satellite world, the most exciting prospect is bringing back the Superstars-style passion. It might be unfashionable, but the listeners are going to love it."

It was America's bicentennial year, and disco had a significant impact on the Top 40 chart. "Play That Funky Music" by Wild Cherry,

"Boogie Fever" by the Sylvers, "Disco Lady" by Johnnie
Taylor, "Right Back Where We Started From" by Maxine
Nightingale, "(Shake, Shake, Shake) Shake Your Booty" by KC & The Sunshine Band, and "A Fifth Of Beethoven" by Walter Murphy were some of the biggest hits of 1976. And a 26-year-old DJ from Memphis named Rick Dees took advantage of the craze with his charttopping hit "Disco Duck."

'76 was a big year for the husband-and-wife team of Daryl Dragon and Toni Tennille — better known as the Captain & Tennille. Three of their songs — "Muskrat Love," "Lonely Night (Angel Face)," and "Shop Around" — peaked at either No. 1 or 2 on the Top 40 and Pop/Adult charts.

1976 will be a year remembered for a handful of legendary albums. San Francisco's Winterland was where **Peter Frampton** recorded *Frampton Comes Alive*. The top AOR album of '76 featured multiple tracks that received significant airplay, including "Baby, I Love Your Way," "Show Me The Way," and "Do You Feel Like We Do."

One of the biggest-selling debut albums in rock history came out this year as well, **Boston**'s eponymous freshman

effort. Who could forget "More Than A Feeling," "Foreplay/Long Time," and "Peace Of Mind," among others — songs that are still Classic Rock staples today?

And, a year before *Rumours*, Fleetwood Mac's self-titled (released

in late '75) album became one of the biggest hits of 1976, featuring "Say You Love Me," "Rhiannon (Will You Ever Win)," and "Over My Head."

Harder-edged rock also

made an impact. Artists such as Aerosmith, Kiss, Thin Lizzy, Blue Oyster Cult, Foghat, and Sweet charted at Top 40.

The hot trend of CB radios and 18-wheelers led to **C.W. McCall** having a huge Country and Top 40 hit with "Convoy."

Three acts that scored four top 15 Country hits in '76 were **Mickey Gilley, Willie Nelson**, and **Conway Twitty**.

1976 continued the mid-'70s

trend of novelty songs. Along with the aforementioned "Convoy," you couldn't go anywhere without hearing "Afternoon Delight" by **Starland Vocal Band**, one of the year's biggest hits at Top 40 and Pop/Adult.

Also, the theme songs from two ABC-TV series became hits on the radio. "Welcome Back" by **John Sebastian** from *Welcome Back Kotter* and "Theme From S.W.A.T." by **Rhythm Heritage** both went to No. 1 at Top 40.

1976 produced some unique-sounding pop hits, including Gary Wright's "Dream Weaver" and Eric Carmen's powerful ballad "All By Myself," which was based on a Rachmaninoff melody.

WMPS/Memphis shows off five world records: The World's Largest Jelly Donut (225 pounds), World's Largest Lollipop (100 pounds), World's Largest T-shirt, and World's Largest Coat Hanger. The fifth was set by morning man Rick Dees, who broke President Teddy Roosevelt's hand-shaking record of 10,000. For April Fools Day, Memphis Mayor Wyeth Chandler and Dees switch jobs.

WCKY/Cincinnati announces it will go Country, but a protest by a group called "Citizens Committee To Save WCKY" forces the station to keep the launch date a secret.

PETER FRAMPTON

"At the beginning of 1976, I went away for a short holiday, knowing that a tour to promote Frampton Comes Alive! was being set up. The only date booked was my first headline show at Cobo Hall, Detroit. While I was away, the album took off, and my one date in Detroit had turned into four sold-out shows. This was the first sign that my world was about to change considerably.

"From then on, every show was sold out, and the record sailed up to No. 1 and seemed to stay there forever. It was No. 1 for 17 weeks straight, becoming, for the time, the biggestselling LP ever made. Wait a minute, let me say that again!

"I was 25 when it was released, and all of the sudden, everybody wanted me to do everything and anything. Every radio station, every magazine, and every TV show wanted

Frampton. The record business seemed to wake up at that time, and everything started to become much more corporate and big biz, including how they went for and viewed sales. The

stakes had been raised forever. To have the biggest-selling anything can be good and bad, because everything you put out after that is always compared. It can also be hard to keep from competing with oneself. 






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A Blockbuster Year

This was a year shaped by two box-office smashes (Star Wars and Saturday Night Fever), such TV phenomena as Roots and Charlie's Angels, and the death of music icon Elvis Presley.

Stations proved the force was with radio as they vied to create listener-grabbing sci-fi promotions, ranging from spaceship mini-battles to contests featuring Princess Leia look-alikes. Then, before the year was out, the nation fell victim to an outbreak of disco fever. That's when the Bee Gees let loose with

the platinum-selling blockbuster soundtrack to the John Travolta flick Saturday Night Fever. How deep would disco penetrate the nation's (and industry's) consciousness? Time would tell.

Station transactions picked up steam, paced by Harte-Hanks' purchase of Southern Broadcasting for \$57 million. Custom label deals also proliferated. Among the bumper crop were EMI America, Prelude, and Parachute. Against this backdrop, a new DJ on-air record was set (211 hours straight), KCBS-AM/San Francisco computerized its newsroom, a major blackout hit New York City, and several companies were toying with a laser beam record player.

By now, the R&R Convention was becoming an annual rite of passage. The '77 edition took place at the Fairmont/Dallas in February, and nothing - not even a two-alarm fire in the hotel kitchen - deterred the 3000 registrants from the business


at hand. They were treated to pointed remarks by industry notables Gordon McLendon, David Geffen (his first appearance at such a gathering), and Neil Bogart, who prophetically touched on the forthcoming video revolution and its marketing potential before disappearing in a cloud of

> smoke. Tony Orlando shared entertainment MC duties with O.J. Simpson (elected star spokesman of the year by Advertising Age in '77); Emmylou Harris and Boz Scaggs performed. That summer, R&R published its first separate special: the full-color, definitive "Top 40 Story."

Sharing his perspectives on the year is former Doubleday President Gary Stevens, the ex-WMCA "Good Guy" whose rise up the station and corporate ladders paved the way for other programmers-turned-managers such as Dan Mason, Bill Figenshu, and John Gehron to find their way

to the corner office. And there's E/A Chairman Joe Smith, who piloted his company to success via the likes of Queen and (through Asylum Records) the Eagles and Linda Ronstadt. Finally, WABC/NY morning man Harry Harrison shares his thoughts about the station, which was embarking on its last five years of greatness.



GARY STEVENS

Career inspiration: "My mother took me to a radio show when I was about 10 years old, and I got the bug. I used to hang around stations as a kid growing up in Buffalo.

First R&R sighting: "When I was GM of KRIZ/Phoenix, an AM Top 40. Bob Wilson called and said he was starting a publication. We said, That's great. Let's take a look at it.

Everybody liked it. **R&R** filled a gap." **Personal influences:** "Working for John Box, who ran the Balaban stations in Dallas, St. Louis, and Milwaukee. I - we're talking early '60s. Box was the most incredible guy. In the same breath, he was a broadcaster, a marketer, and a con man. But the whole WIL airstaff ended up in New York guys like myself, Ron Lundy, Dan Ingram. WIL was one of the seminal radio stations in the country.

Current gig: "I became a broker out of necessity when they sold Doubleday, and I found the market for used presidents wasn't good. I've been doing this for 12 years.'

Most rewarding career point: "Being successful as a broker, which was a major transition. When I left radio, I to work for a Wall investment bank, Wertheim Schroder. When I made partner, I felt like a million bucks, because I basically went from a big corner office to a cubicle with a shared secretary. It shows you can be resilient.

Most disappointing career point: "When we shut Doubleday down. The lesson learned was, there's no future in a radio company owned by somebody for whom radio isn't a core business. You see this every day now.

Most significant industry change in last 25 years: "Unquestionably, the last three years of deregulation. It's basically morphed from being a cottage industry to big business. That's not bad; it's inevitable. But I miss the touchy-feely business that it was. You used to know a town by the people who owned the stations

sharing due to the widespread appeal of many of the year's chart-topping acts. Fleetwood Mac's Rumours album was released in 1977 on Warner Bros. Records and had huge airplay on multiple tracks at every R&R format except Country. "Dreams," "Don't Stop," "You Make Lovin' Fun," and "Go Your Own Way" sent the near-decade-old band into the popularity stratosphere.

Music from motion pictures ruled the 1977 charts, as "You Light Up My Life" by **Debby Boone** from the movie of the same name topped the **R&R**77 Of '77. **Barbra Streisand**'s

"Theme From A Star Is Born," Bill Conti's "Theme From Rocky," Carly Simon's "Nobody Does It Better" from The Spy Who Loved Me, and Rose Royce's "Car Wash" contributed to top-selling motion picture soundtracks on the charts. One of the most enduring soundtracks of all time was released in 1977 and was credited with kicking the disco revolution into high gear. The music to Saturday Night Fever starring John Travolta jumped out of Club Odyssey 2001 in Brooklyn, NY and into the mainstream pop culture of the United States. In tandem with the Saturday Night Fever craze, the original WKTU blazed into double-digit ratings in New York City.

The year's biggest
Rock debut was unquestionably Foreigner, whose selftitled album on Atlantic
finished No. 3 on AOR Albums
on the strength of "Feels Like
The First Time" and "Cold As
Ice." Not surprisingly, both
tracks continue to be two of
the most-played at Classic
Rock today. Many other longlasting groups also showed up

on the AOR year-end chart, including the Eagles; Supertramp; Pink Floyd; Jethro Tull; Cat Stevens; the Kinks; Little Feat; Emerson, Lake, & Palmer; Ted Nugent; and Marshall Tucker.

RCA/Nashville topped the label derby for 1977 with a total of 15 songs on the year-

end Country chart. Many of the music's legendary artists from that year called RCA home, including America's beloved **Elvis Presley**, who died in 1977 at his home in Memphis.

R&R's Pop/Adult chart, the replacement for AC, was ruled by Barry Manilow, who had three hits in the top 15. "Looks Like We Made It," "Weekend In New England," and "Daybreak" all made the top 10, with "Made It" going all the way to No. 1.

1977 was also a big year for singer-songwriter **Leo Sayer**, who had the huge hits "You Make Me Feel Like Dancing" and "When I Need You."



JOE SMITH

"1977 marked my second year as Chairman of Elektra-Asylum, having moved from the Warner Bros. presidency. Our roster was a dream ... small and potent. The Eagles, Jackson Browne, Linda Ronstadt, Joni Mitchell, the Cars, Queen, Carly Simon, Judy Collins, and other brilliant talents made for a promotion person's best case.

"Individual promotion, personal contacts, the elusive 'gut feeling'—all were part and parcel of the way it worked in the '70s. The Warner labels, especially, felt in control of their destiny with a corporate philosophy that told us to 'just win, baby.'"

"R&R was a powerful ingredient with the introduction of

'Breakers.' It led to excitement and anticipation throughout every record company. Inevitably, a downside came with the independent promotion world being able to influence those Breakers, but they still served as a road map for our marketing efforts. My DJ background gave me an edge in dealing with radio and the immediacy of results without extensive research.

"The world turned. Radio formats became more fragmented. The logistics of setting up releases were akin to the invasion of Europe. Powerful multinational corporations folded us into their systems. We were divisions of these organizations with quarterly financial goals and pressures. Positive changes included the national recognition of country music, the emergence of rap music, and a more organized look at our successes and bombs.

"Having lived through the breakout years of the '60s and '70s and working through the 'corporatization' of the late '80s and '90s, much of the joy began to fade. For someone entering the business today, it still is the music: exciting, ever-changing, and rewarding. However, I long for the mornings when the Breakers were released, and for the hype and glory of a business that ran doubledigit growth every year. Perhaps the memory is selective, but it sure seemed a time of joy."



Most disappointing: "When the changes were occurring at WABC, that was a shocking disappointment to me and to many other people. I was very sorry to hear about the format change. I was at WCBS-FM at the time, but it brought back a lot of memories. I remember that I and other staff members were a part of that very famous and copied radio station. It was a pleasure to be a part of its success and its history.





Disco & Deregulation

It was a banner year for radio and records. Disco became a full-fledged epidemic – to the chagrin of some – but the radio and record contingents were riding high on the momentum.

Record sales and new labels soared. Disco formats beat their way onto radio dials thanks to companies like Plough Broadcasting and Burkhart/Abrams & Assoc. Then there was *Grease*. At a time when just about

everyone thought the movie musical was as dead as 78 rpm lacquer, along came the most successful screen adaptation of a Broadway classic since *West Side Story*.

These heady times saw bigger radio deals (Combined and Gannett agreed to a \$362 million merger), the hatching of mascot maverick the KGB Chicken (a.k.a. Ted Giannoulas), picture discs, brewing controversy over the lyrics to the Stones' "Some Girls," and, sadly, the death of Keith Moon. Radio and TV joined forces with the premiere of WKRP In Cincinnati, a series about the trials and tribulations

of a mythical Midwest Rock station. And personality Dick Purtan joined the monied ranks after signing a \$1 million pact with CKLW/Detroit.

On the other r&r (rules and regulations) front, Rep. Lionel Van Deerlin (D-CA) fired an early volley in the deregulation battle, proposing a rewrite of the Communications Act. His reforms included such radical notions as

virtually permanent license terms and the abolition of the FCC (replaced by the "Communications Regulatory Commission"). But Deerlin's revisionist act didn't make it through Congress. The Supreme Court upheld the "Seven

Dirty Words" ban and approved existing cross-ownerships, while minority tax breaks got the go-ahead.

R&R traded its Hollywood digs for swankier surroundings in Century City and also opened its Washington bureau. "The AOR Story" was published, chronicling the format's first decade. Once again, convention fever heated up in Dallas, as media theorist Marshall McLuhan keynoted and the research concept of "focus groups" was spotlighted. Dolly Parton, Steve "King Tut" Martin, and the Nitty Gritty Dirt

tin, and the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band entertained.

This year's recollections feature KGO/San Francisco President/GM Mickey Luckoff, who managed his station into first place during the Fall Arbitron of that year and has kept it there in the 80-odd survey periods since. Then there is one important group fixture on the music side: the Bee Gees, who figured prominently in blockbuster films that contributed *lots* of hits to Top 40 radio.

In the last 10 minutes of the broadcast, they stroll into the studio, proclaiming, "Hi, Dick, we're back from vacation!"

Oops! KHTZ/L.A. interrupts its automated Country format for a live news bulletin. The newsman soberly relates that Pope John Paul I has just passed away and, following the announcement, restarts the automation. The first song up: Bobby Bares "Drop Kick Me Jesus Through The Goal Posts Of Life." Is it any wonder why some programmers still fear automation?

WVBF/Boston isn't hiring a new PD anytime soon. In fact, the station will be programmed by "a coalition of jocks" through the spring book.

Rick Carroll resigns as PD at KEZY/Anaheim to work with his band, Eulogy, and get into a television project.

Rob Sherwood resigns as PD of KSTP/Minneapolis.

Jeff Salgo exits KFXM/San Bernardino to start his own consulting firm.

Bob Davis is appointed WGCL/Cleveland PD.

KTLK/Denver PD C.C. McCartney joins B100/San Diego for




RSO Records dominated the charts in 1978. While the soundtrack to Saturday Night Fever was actually released in 1977, the two biggest hits of '78 came from the collection. "Night Fever" and "Stayin' Alive" by the Bee Gees were 1-2 on the Top 40 chart. Another hit from the soundtrack was "If I Can't Have You" by Yvonne Elliman. The Bee Gees also somehow found time to lend their background vocals to "Emotion," by one-hit wonder Samantha Sang, which was the Top 40 format's ninth biggest hit of the year.

RSO had another huge

Gibb had three top 15 hits and the No. 1 smash "Shadow Dancing." In all, RSO amassed 15 top 15 hits in '78, including Eric Clapton's "Lay Down Sally" and Player's "Baby Come Back.'

1978 was another huge year for Barry Manilow. He had three top 10 hits at Top 40 and Pop Adult: "Can't Smile Without You," "Ready To Take A Chance Again" from the movie Foul Play, and his disco experiment, "Copacabana (At The Copa)." Manilow had a fourth top 10 at PA with "Even

soundtrack in '78 with Grease. The movie, which starred John Travolta & Olivia Newton-John, yielded two songs performed as duets by the stars, "You're The One That I Want " and "Summer Nights": Newton-John solo on "Hopelessly Devoted To You"; and, for good measure, the title song of the movie, performed by Frankie Valli.

Now, as if two hit movies with four No. 1 Top 40 songs weren't enough for the Robert Stigwood-led label, RSO also had Andy Gibb - younger brother of Bee Gees Barry, Robin, and Maurice — signed.

outside of Saturday Night Fever - was Some Girls by the Rolling Stones, which had an album cover that caused some controversy with retailers at the time, but clearly didn't hurt album sales or airplay. The album featured the multiformat hits "Miss You," "Beast Of Burden," and "Shattered."

1978 was also the year a group from Boston called the Cars broke through at AOR with their self-titled debut album. Along with Elvis Costello (who released two albums that year), they pioneered a sound that eventually paved the away for

new wave and alternative music.

Two songs that would become staples at Classic Rock were also released in '78: Queen's infamous medley of "We Will Rock You" and "We Are The Champions" can still be heard on stadium and arena loudspeakers throughout America.

RCA was the year's biggest country label, with 17 titles on the year-end chart, including the biggest hit of the year at the format, "Mammas Don't Let Your Babies Grow Up To Be Cowboys" by Waylon Jennings & Willie Nelson. Other acts who had big years

for RCA included Dolly Parton, Ronnie Milsap, and Charley Pride.

THE BEE GEES

Career highlights: (Maurice) "God, it's hard. Obviously, Fever is one of them. The Main Course album. Working with Barbra Streisand, Kenny Rogers, Dolly Parton. Writing for other people. A lot of highlights — too numerous to mention."

How Saturday Night Fever has stood up over the years: "It was an albatross for a while. I mean, 'How Deep Is Your Love' went No. 1 a month before the film came out. Then, it was known as an R&B ballad. When the film came out, it was a disco ballad. But when the whole world was going crazy, and everyone wanted to have some fun, suddenly the film represented what everyone would want to do at the time. But even we didn't know what was going on. We were here in Miami. If we would have been in L.A. or New York or London, it might have been different. So we went through the whole huge Fever period totally unaware of some of the things that were going on out

Dealing with saturation coverage: "It was an amazing feeling, an amazing experience, to have five records in the top 10. But when it came to the saturation point, it became very scary. They were having 'Bee Gees Free' weekends on the radio in Chicago and places like that, so it was pretty hairy. The funny thing is, people think we stayed like that, the white pants.

How the hits held up over the years: (Barry) "I thought they were good songs. 'Stayin' Alive,' I thought, was a good social statement. I think 'How Deep Is Your Love' is about as good a love song as you can write, so I'm proud of that. And you can call it what you like, but I'll go and see the film again too."






