

# **Revving Up For The Future**

The sky was the limit – literally – in 1979. No sooner had the FCC opened the gateway to satellite transmissions, than RKO and NBC (Source) weighed in with national nets signaling the launch of a major industry boom.

Meanwhile, it was "heads up" as the country prepared for Skylab's crash landing. During this and other more serious crises (the Iran hostages, Three Mile Island), radio was right

there – informing, allaying fears, providing support.

Mutter Evans became the first African-American woman to own a station (WAAA/Winston-Salem). Jay Thomas moonlighted on TV as a member of the Mork And Mindy cast. WDAI/Chicago, WXKS/Boston, and KTLK/Denver helped lead the Disco charge. But that summer, WLUP/Chicago morning maven Steve Dahl marshaled his anti-disco forces and blew up 20,000 disco albums between games of a White Sox doubleheader. Some 7000 K.C. & The Sunshine Band-hating, rock 'n' roll-loving Midwesterners swarmed the field, forcing

cancellation of the second game and generating nationwide publicity. Disco's true death knell sounded when format pioneer WDRQ/Detroit switched to Top 40. While earlier in the year, John Travolta traded his disco duds for country couture after signing to star in *Urban Cowboy* – another portent of things to come. Mergers (Portrait and Epic, UA and EMI America), shutdowns (ABC, Infinity), and staff cuts caused turmoil on the record side, compounded by an NBC-TV news

segment reporting that the FCC was exploring payola allegations against WDAS/Philadelphia. On the plus column: The first digital mastering machines hit the scene in readiness for a digital disc revolution.

**R&R** came home to L.A. for its '79 convention, the largest to date. Rep. Lionel Van Deerlin made a landmark appearance – live, via satellite – from Washington; co-keynoter John Bayliss outlined radio's future in the '80s; and the Blues Brothers rocked the rafters of the Century Plaza with their special brand of music and mayhem. Four months later, **R&R** was sold to Harte-Hanks for \$12.5 million.

Recalling the year are Bill Moyes, who, as an early advocate of research, found himself a lightning rod among independent-minded programmers; Columbia promotion exec Bob Sherwood, who oversaw highs and lows in 1979; and the aforementioned Steve Dahl, recounting that fateful evening at the ballpark.

# Reflections



**BILL MOYES** 

**Career motivation:** "When I was in high school, I was into engineering. One day, they made me fill in for a disc jockey who was sick, and I thought that this was pretty cool. Then I got more and more into the business of it, and I actually chose the college I went to by who had the best radio station." **Most significant change of the past** 

Most significant change of the past 25 years: "When I started the Research Group in 1977, almost nobody was doing perceptual studies, never mind music research. I mean nobody was doing any kind of perceptual studies at all. Today, almost everybody does in any kind of competitive market."

**Biggest influence:** "When I was 12 years old, I went through a radio station in my hometown owned by sports broadcaster Curt Gowdy. I didn't meet him at that time, but I have talked to Curt and told him that his station was my inspiration." **Most rewarding achievement:** "To see the innovation of research sweep the industry. I think I had a little something to do with that."

Most disappointing: "Whenever there is a new way of doing some kind of research or a new approach to contesting or whatever, it's kind of disappointing to hear, 'I don't get it; I can't see this.'"

First R&R sighting: "I knew Bob Wilson when he was first thinking of putting the paper together. In his start-up years, we were starting the Research Group as well as a station group, so we were co-entrepreneurs. Over the years I've used **R&R** to monitor the different thought processes that are going on with people in the business who matter. It's not just watching the news, but watching the thoughts behind the news."

# Vinyl Statistics

If there was any doubt that 1979 was the year disco music ruled Top 40, look no further than Rod Stewart's "Da Ya Think I'm Sexy," which hit No. 1 on R&R's Top 40 chart on January 26, 1979 and stayed there for six weeks. Donna Summer made her mark with five singles released for the year, including a duet with Barbra Streisand, "No More Tears (Enough Is Enough)." In

fact, the music was so prevalent that R&R produced a Top 79 Of '79 year-end chart for Dance Music Radio driven by the likes of WKTU/New York and KUTE/Los Angeles. Other memorable disco hits included "I Will Survive" by Gloria Gaynor and "Ring My Bell" by Anita Ward.

And who could forget Sister Sledge and "We Are Family," a song that will be remembered forever by baseball fans, as it was the theme for the Pittsburgh Pirates, who won the World Series that year.

Coinciding with the peak of

disco, a new form of music began to make noise. The "new wave" genre was about to take America by storm, and 1979 bore witness to early hits by Blondie, the

Cars, Cheap Trick, and the Knack. New wave

music provided the ammunition for successful breakthroughs by many artists and radio stations in the next decade.

Warner Bros. led 1979 for most albums charted at AOR with 14. Four placed in the top 10 including albums from The **Doobie Brothers, Dire** Straits, Van Halen, Rod Stewart, and Rickie Lee Jones. The No. 1 most-played album of 1979 was Breakfast In America by Supertramp, which garnered airplay on just about every track.

The '70s biggest and most enduring Country superstars

finished the decade with big year-end numbers, particularly Kenny Rogers, who landed three songs in the top 10. There were 31 No. 1 hits over the course of the year, and Rogers was at the top four times. RCA, MCA, Columbia, Epic, and United Artists (Rogers's label) were the top five labels on Music Row.

R&R's Pop/Adult format closed 1979

with a plethora of crossover titles from other formats, including hits from Rogers and Anne Murray from Country. "Rise" by Herb Alpert topped the year-end Pop/Adult chart. It was a trumpet instrumental that was later used during a key scene in the "Luke and Laura" saga on ABC-TV's toprated soap General Hospital. It was noted in R&R's year-end issue that it appeared the Pop/ Adult format was beginning to take a softer and more mature approach. That's exactly what happened as we turn to 1980 and the changes the new decade brought



Current gig: "I'm presently a consultant to Sony Corporation and involved in the development of Super Audio CD.


Most significant change in 25 years: "Without question, it was turning music portable. The first step was the music cassette (and then the Walkman). A close second was the compact disc. Less obvious but of equal importance is the forced evolu-

tion of music and broadcasting from creative entities to businesses forced to play by the same rules as the rest of the world.

Career influences: "The decision by General Cinema to change the programming of all of its stations. I got a call from Columbia Records that changed my career. As to the person, she was a slim, blonde, former model/actress/executive assistant to CBS President Arthur Taylor and the greatest publicist. She's now Carol Sherwood, and she's had a profound impact on what I've become.

Mostrewarding career point: "The euphoria and sense of accomplishment when KROY/Sacramento and Columbia Records marketing/promotion surpassed previously significant benchmarks.

#### Who's Next To Catch The 'Fever'?

As disco mania continues to sweep the country, rumors fly in markets from coast to coast that a station will soon start dancing. Those rumors are false at KLOS/L.A., crosstown KZLA, and WZZP/ Cleveland (but true at WDRQ/Detroit). On the other hand, 96X/Miami abandons its dance-music format for straight-ahead Top 40. Meanwhile, 99X/NY takes on crosstown WKTU with a "No Disco Weekend.'

More rumors: Is KRLD/Dallas flipping to Country? Was Bob Hamilton offered the KHJ/L.A. PD gig? Is Frankie Crocker considering a departure from Disco-formatted KUTE/L.A.? Is Infinity Records about to fold?

RKO Rumors: With WFYR/Chicago PD Don Kelly segueing to 99X/ NY as PD, is the station about to revert its call letters to WOR-FM?

And, faced with a possible strike of its DJs at WRKO/Boston, the company brings all of its PDs to Beantown in case they're needed to pull on-air shifts.

Robert W. Morgan has been named new morning man at KMPC/L.A. He succeeds Dick Whittinghill, who had been with the station for just about forever. Morgan had been doing swing at the station for the past four years while being groomed for the morning slot. The rest of KMPC's lineup remains the same: Geoff Edwards and Wink Martindale in middays, Gary Owens afternoons, Roger Carroll evenings, Dave Hull late-nights, and Sonny Melendrez overnights.

• Dan Mason resigns from WPGC/Washington and heads to KTSA/ San Antonio as GM.

• John Bettencourt is named National Disco Radio Promotion Manager at Casablanca.

• WROR/Boston suffers a mass exodus of employees as it shifts from Oldies to Pop/Adult.

• More shake-ups at ABC Radio, as Frank Cody and Corinne Baldassano exit KLOS/L.A. and KAUM/Houston, respectively.

• Steve Casey exits KHJ/L.A. to join John Sebastian in Phoenix as PD for KKKQ-AM.

• In the nation's capital, Scott Shannon joins WPGC.

• KGW/Portland PD Mike Phillips joins KYUU/SF as PD and is replaced at KGW by Richard Harker.

• WHBQ/Memphis morning monster Rick Dees joins KHJ/L.A. for wake-ups.

• WMET/Chicago flips from Top 40 to AOR.

• CKGM/Montreal PD Reg Johns joins CFTR/Toronto for similar duties

• First Media KOPA/Phoenix GM Charles Giddens joins the company's newly acquired KFMK/Houston. Will KOPA PD Steve Rivers follow him?

• WQAM/MiamiTom Birch resigns.

- Mark Elliot joins Q102/Cincinnati for programming duties.
- Rick Sklar returns to the day-to-day helm of WABC/NY.

## Reflection



STEVE DAHL

"What can I tell you? I thought it was going to be a huge flop. There I was at Comiskey Park, July 12, 1979 at five in the afternoon, looking like a complete idiot in my army helmet and my ill-fitting army jacket with the fishing-lure fruit salad on it (for some reason still unclear to me, our anti-disco army was called "The Insane Coho Lips"). The year before it had been WLS Teen Night, but this year they decided to try something different, and they called it Disco Demolition Night (an idea by Mike Veeck from the White Sox and Dave Logan from the Loop).

"When WLS changed to Disco, I was pushed out of ABC-owned WDAI less than a year after being brought to Chicago by them, and they had contractually locked me out of returning to Detroit by having me supply taped bits to the WRIF morning show (lesson learned). This, of course, pissed me off greatly, and after I got hooked up at the Loop thanks to my friend Lee Abrams, I began bashing the station and disco. It apparently hit a resonant chord among my listeners. Duh!

"Harry Carey, who was then the Sox announcer, said the place was 'really starting to fill up.' That turned out to be one of Harry's few understatements (the cops estimated over 70,000 in the park and another 20,000 on the street). I went out on the field, blew up the records, ignored management's orders not to talk about it the next day (they really said that!), and the rest is history and a 20-year career in Chicago. Congratulations to R&R on 25 ... they only had to blow up Billboard."



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The ex-Beatle's death overshadowed an active year for radio and records. Radio deregulation got another push — this time from FCC Chairman Charles Ferris. *Urban Cow*-

boy corralled a herd of new Country disciples, among them former "Boss Radio" Top 40 giant KHJ/Los Angeles. The Commission approved the Magnavox AM stereo system as Arbitron initiated quarterly measurement in five markets. Cox backed out of its merger with GE, and Infinity bought a radio triumvirate for \$32 million. The eruption of Mount St. Helens also earned its own share of radio airplay.

The record industry was in full flux: Geffen, Boardwalk, and Handshake enlisted in the label wars, while PolyGram consolidated its Polydor, Mercury, and Casablanca divi-

sions. And Motown's Stevie Wonder — now also owner/operator of KJLH/Los Angeles — pledged his personal support in the crusade to designate Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday a national holiday.

In answer to growing disfavor with the term Top 40, **R&R** reviewed a litany of imaging descriptions and found the two

most common words were "Contemporary" and "Hit." Hence, CHR was born. We had fully intended to bow out of the convention biz after 1979's blowout while still on top, a la Seinfeld, but the National Radio Broadcasters Association coaxed us out of "retirement." The joint venture dubbed the "American Radio Expo" — focused on the hot topic of deregulation, with Charter Media's Karl Eller. R&R editors moderated the daily format sessions: Paul Simon and Barbara Mandrell wowed the crowd at night. R&R wouldn't re-enter the convention fray until 1988.

Reflecting on the year are radio

proponent and NAB Chairman Eddie Fritts and Vin Scully, the revered Los Angeles Dodgers broadcaster who, in 1980, celebrated his 31st year with the team.

# Reflections



**EDDIE FRITTS** 

**Career inspiration:** "I suppose one could say I 'grew up' in the business, as my father was manager of a smallmarket radio station. In high school, I spent my summers working as a swimming-pool lifeguard in the day and a radio DJ at night. (Obviously, had dad not been manager, my radio career would have been short-lived.)"

**Gratifying professional moments:** "Paying off the bank note on my first radio station (WNLA/Indianola, MS) would be the most significant. Working first with the Mississippi Broadcasters Association and then with the NAB has been most gratifying. The people who make our business strong are businesspeople, but they also take their charge to serve communities very seriously, and I hope that I help do the same here in Washington."

Most rewarding career point: "Every broadcaster is keenly aware of the positive impact our industry has on every community in our country. Last year, the NAB aggregated the total amount of public service donated to America's communities by the broadcasting industry. We all knew the contributions were huge, but no one expected it would be \$6.8 billion. That clearly shows that broadcasting is the largest single public service provider to America."


First R&R sighting: "It has been an integral part of every station I've owned. It would be hard to imagine not having R&R in every station, as there's something of interest in R&R for every staffer."

Most significant change in 25 years: "The most significant change is that which hasn't changed. Remember radio's 'Golden Years'? Well, they're still evolving. From its very inception, radio established itself as the local voice for each community. Even as the industry continues to consolidate, radio must always be relevant to diverse local communities. That's what our success has been built upon, and that's the road map for success in the future."

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# Radio Rewind

1980 was the year R&R renamed the Top 40 format CHR (Contemporary Hit Radio) - a name it still has today. It was the post-disco

era, and the format was in flux, as the newly christened CHR was very soft and conservative - and had its taste of country, too.

On the softer side, we find the Australian duo Air Supply. They had the top two Pop/Adult hits of the year with "All Out Of Love" and the title track from their album Lost In Love. The Best New Artist Grammy that year went to Christopher Cross. Cross had three songs go top 10 at CHR and Pop Adult, including "Ride Like The Wind," "Sailing," and "Never Be

The Same." He was never able to match this success.

With CHR slowing things down, venerable country superstar Kenny Rogers had

> the biggest crossover success of his career - long before his name became synonymous with roasted chicken. The Lionel Richie-penned "Lady"; Rogers' duet with Kim Carnes "Don't

Fall In Love With A Dreamer"; "Coward Of The County"; and "Love The World Away" all went top 15 at CHR, Country, and Pop Adult.

One of rock's legendary tworecord sets, The Wall, by Pink Floyd, impacted in 1980, giving the band its biggest CHR hit ever, "Another Brick In

The Wall (Part 2)."

Also released in '80 was one of the greatest heavy-metal albums ever recorded, AC/DC's Back In Black. Among the tracks that received AOR play were "You Shook Me All Night Long," "Shoot To Thrill," "Hell's Bells," and the title track.

AOR- not unlike CHR had its softer side in 1980. Dan Fogelberg went all the way to No. 3 on the chart with his Phoenix album.



He was a father and a teacher and a friend. The great thing about Red was that he cared. Red wanted me to succeed as a broadcaster, just as a father would like to see his son succeed. As a father, he was a strict disciplinarian, and all of that has helped me over the years.

Advice to young broadcasters: "First of all, two words: be yourself. I think most young broadcasters have a tendency to try to imitate those who have already made it. That's not necessarily a good idea. You might appreciate the man's work habits, you might appreciate his crisp delivery, but you shouldn't try to have that. You should be yourself. It's really hard to do, especially when you start.'





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# Reagan Makes His Mark

In the wake of the "Reagan Revolution," radio deregulation won approval. That is, half a dozen key regulations were eliminated or revised. Among them: the abolishment of program logs and the 18-minute-per-hour commercial restriction. Mark Fowler later took the FCC's leadership reins, championing a slate of additional proposals (i.e., changing multiple ownership limits).

A network radio explosion also generated headlines. Satellite Music Network, RKO, and Transtar offered fulltime formats and other services; ABC fired up three nets

(Rock, Direction, Talkradio) and later nixed its ballyhooed Superadio venture; CBS marched in with RadioRadio; and United Stations was established. Surrey jumped to the head of the sales line with its \$32 million Charter purchase. Quarterly measurement expanded to all Arbitron markets. A baseball strike forced stations to load their programming bases with creative stand-ins, scoring with such alternatives as "Fantasy Baseball." Speaking of scoring, industry watchers needed scorecards to keep track of the steady stream of Urban Cowboy-influenced Country



As it had with other emerging formats in the past, R&R did not publish a numbered year-end chart for Black radio in 1981. Instead, an alphabetical chart was utilized with some chart notes to provide perspective. However, one thing is for sure: Black radio was on the rise. and it was clear that the format would go on to play a pivotal role in the steady growth and popularity of the music.



Georae Benson Looking closely at the A-Z chart, it was an era of tempo, driven by such legends as Earth Wind & Fire, the Gap Band, Chaka Khan, the Commodores, and Aretha Franklin.

"Bette Davis Eyes" by Kim Carnes finished No. 1 for the vear at CHR. and while Carnes had subsequent releases. nothing ever came close to matching the

success of "Eyes."

Interestingly, a handful of jazz mainstays had CHR success, with chart entries by Grover Washington Jr., Al Jarreau, and George Benson. Clearly the biggest influence on the chart was the music exploding from AOR by **REO** Speedwagon, Foreigner, the Rolling Stones, the Police, Tom Petty & The Heartbreakers, Pat Benatar, and Eric Clapton. R&R's CHR 81 of '81 was the first R&R yearend chart to explain in print the methodology used in its compilation. A reverse pointvalue system was used, based on radio airplay as reported each week by all of R&R's reporting CHR stations

The music of AC was as broad as ever, with plenty of crossover from other formats, including Country, CHR, and AOR. Soundtracks continued to play a major part in the music of 1981, with no less than five songs from movies hitting the top. "Endless Love" by Diana Ross & Lionel Richie finished as the No. 1 AC hit of the year, but also notable were Neil Diamond's trio of top three hits from the

Jazz Singer. "Hello Again," "America," and "Love On The Rocks." Christopher Cross' "Arthur's Theme (Best That You Can Do)" and Dolly Parton's "9 To 5" both finished in the top 15.

Country crossovers continued to make their mark on other formats, particularly AC, where several tunes actually charted higher than they did at Country. Eddie Rabbitt landed on top for the second consecutive year, as



"Step By Step" enjoyed four weeks at No. 1 on September 18. 1981.

The top AOR artist for the year was the Rolling Stones, as Tattoo You placed No. 1 for 10 straight weeks, yielding big airplay tracks such as "Start Me Up" and "Waiting On A Friend."

1981 was the biggest year ever for Philadelphia's Daryl Hall & John Oates. The duo, best known for their "blueeyed" soul sound, topped the charts with "Kiss On My List" and "Private Eyes." They went on to become one of the biggest recording duos in rock history







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# FM: Flying High On 'Hot Hits'

# As the '80s began to take hold, the always-shifting winds of popularity drifted from Country to CHR.

The catalyst: Mike Joseph's all-current "Hot Hits" format making a splash on FM. Of course, the music had a lot to do with it as well. IRS Records was having a great time with the Go Go's and the Police, Australia's Men at Work were hard

at work, and Duran Duran led a resurgent British Invasion.

Meanwhile, Top 40 was out and Talk was in at AM giant WABC/New York. Ironically, consultant Joseph had been hired in 1960 to forge the station's future status as a format icon. Among the talent who worked inside its hallowed halls: Herb Oscar Anderson, Jack Carney, Scott Muni, Dan Ingram, Ron Lundy, "Cousin" Brucie Morrow, and PD Rick Sklar.

Network expansion was still occurring at a feverish pace. CNN Radio and NBC's Talknet debuted. ABC acquired Watermark for a cool \$4 million (mere pocket

change by today's standards). McGavren Guild gave birth to Interep, linking the MMR, HN&W, and Bernard Howard rep firms. The House designated \$17 million to build Radio Marti, a super Florida facility that would beam anti-Castro sentiments to the Cuban populace. The first AM stereo stations signed on in '82, while President Reagan returned to his old radio stomping grounds with a weekly series of fiveminute broadcasts.


Two out-of-this-world talents teamed up briefly: Michael

Jackson and E.T. And the biggest soundtrack of the year was from that humorous homage to adolescent angst, Fast Times At Ridgemont High. The record industry was also training its sights on the home-taping issue. Bills were introduced in both congressional houses seeking reimbursement: The "millions" in lost revenue were slated to come from the manufacturers and importers of record equipment and blank tapes. The year also found the industry mourning the loss of cutting-edge label exec Neil Bogart and Big Apple air personality Murray "The K" Kaufman.

For **R&R**, it was a relatively

quiet period. We opened our Nashville bureau and expanded the Jazz music information to a Top 30 chart. On this year's pages, we hear from radio management veteran John Gehron, producer extraordinaire Quincy Jones, and rockin' personality Jed The Fish.

# Reflections

**Gareer inspiration:** "Hearing the disc jockeys on the air and really connecting with them. I mean the classic disc jockeys I grew up listening to in New York: Alan Freed, Dick Biondi, and such. They were my window to the world." **Personal influence:** "Musically, the Beatles, because that was the first

**Personal influence:** "Musically, the Beatles, because that was the first time I ever bought an album. I was a 45rpm guy before, but I bought an album for the first time and was just fascinated that there were so many good songs that hadn't been released. That just opened my eyes to what more was out there."

**Role model:** "Rick Sklar. I was competing against him in New York when he sat down with me and told me he respected what I was doing with the basics of radio. He recommended me for the job at WLS/ Chicago."

**Greatest achievement:** "I'd like to think I'm fun to work with and I give talent the chance to be the best that they can be. I hopefully carried that on with other people I worked with when I became a general manager."

Most profound change in 25 years: "What's happening now. People ask me, 'Are you excited about what's going on in radio? Does it worry you?' And my response is, we always hear about the Golden Age of radio. But we are *now* in the Golden Age of radio. Those of us in the business today are going to determine what radio is all about going forward."


First R&R encounter: "I remember this tabloid-sized newspaper that had all this great news that other people were not covering. I became a fan very early, and it's been fun watching R&R develop from that tabloid into something that has become the voice of our industry. It is the one trade magazine that I make sure I read every week."

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# **Radio Rewind**

Music at CHR was more polarized than ever in 1982. There was still a backlash against music with any kind of rhythm. Only three of the year's top 50 songs at CHR featured

black artists: "The Other Woman," by **Ray Parker Jr.,** and a pair of Stevie Wonder tracks — "That Girl" and his duet with **Paul McCartney**, "Ebony & Ivory."

But 1982 was also the year **R&R** started its weekly Black Radio charts and had its first year-end numbered chart for the format. Wonder had a huge year there, as "That Girl" was the format's biggest hit, and the follow-up, "Do I Do," placed sixth. While few of the songs at Black Radio were big CHR hits at the time, many are bigtesting gold titles for multiple formats today, including "Forget Me Nots" by **Patrice Rushen**, "Let It Whip" by the **Dazz Band**, and the late **Marvin Gaye**'s last hit, "Sexual Healing."

In 1982, British rock superstars Steve Howe, Carl

Palmer, Geoff Downes, and John Wetton formed Asia. The band's self-titled debut album, which featured the hit tracks "Heat Of The Moment" and "Only Time Will Tell," was No. 1 on


the AOR chart. New wave

music (as it was called back then) was impacting the AOR and CHR charts thanks to stations like KROQ/Los Angeles,

which was at the height of its popularity. Artists in the genre who had big years at AOR included **Men At Work**, the **Cars**, and **A Flock Of Seagulls.** Other big new wave hits from '82 included "Mickey" by **Toni Basil**, "Tainted Love" by **Soft Cell**, and "867-5309/Jenny" by **Tommy Tutone**.

Songs from the big screen made their mark too. "Hard To Say I'm Sorry," from the movie *Summer Lovers*, was the comeback hit for '70s superstars **Chicago** and the beginning of the band's huge success in the '80s. The song finished No. 2 for the year at CHR and AC. "Up Where We Belong" by Joe Cocker & Jennifer Warnes, from An Officer And A Gentleman; the theme from Chariots Of Fire by Vangelis; "Somebody's Baby" by Jackson Browne, from Fast Times At Ridgemont High; and "Eye Of The Tiger" by Survivor, from Rocky III, were also big hits in '82.

Country's impact at AC was in full force, with hits by Kenny Rogers, Willie Nelson, Ronnie Milsap, Michael Murphey, and



Juice Newton all in the top 25. It was the year **Charlene** went top 10 with "I've Never Been To Me," a song that became a hit thanks to a Tampa DJ named **Scott Shannon**.

Also in '82, Eagles members **Glenn Frey** and **Don Henley** began their solo careers, with Frey's "The One You Love" and Henley's memorable "Dirty Laundry" both going top 10.



# Reflections



**QUINCY JONES** First ran November 23, 1984

Significant industry changes: "Well, years ago, an album was \$4.78. Actually, an album then was four 78s in little sleeves attached to a big album with

attached to a big album with a hard board cover. The first 33 1/3s that came out were 10-inch and later 12 inch. In '62, Mercury President Irving Green showed me a pink box with a cassette in it and said it was going to revolutionize the record business. You really trust technology when you go from a moment like that to today, when you see billions of cassettes. I just feel blessed that I've been able to live through an evolution like that from '78 rpm to compact discs."

Impact of MTV on radio: "They need and enhance each other. Radio is local, MTV is national. It's like a close-up and a master shot. We personally felt MTV's impact: Outside of the music, the difference between Off The Walland Thriller was 25 million LPs. It's obvious MTV is reaching more people."

The radio and records relationship: "Radio and records would be in pitiful shape without each other, but they are still trying to figure out if it's the tail wagging the dog. Radio's got a direct antenna that plugs right into the people. And the record industry is the only business in the world where the product is consumed *before* it's purchased. That's a tall order. You couldn't do that with hot dogs, clothes, movies. Radio gives it to you free right away."

**Looking ahead:** "If I had 200 more years, I still wouldn't have enough time to do all the things I dream about. It's a great challenge that keeps you young."

WWSA/Savannah, GA launches a contest offering \$129 to listeners with dollar bills carrying 1-2-9 consecutively in the serial numbers. Although the station has calculated the odds of winning at several thousand-to-one, it has to stop the contest the same day when phone lines are overloaded and a traffic jam forms when more people than the station bargained for show up to collect their winnings. What was intended to be a \$3000 promo may wind up costing \$40,000!

During a lunch with KMET/L.A., Arista VP/Promo Mike Bone toasts his latest label priority, Haircut One Hundred, so PD Sam Bellamy asks Bone what his commitment is to the band. "Substantial," Bone says, to which Bellamy replies, "Substantial enough to have your hair cut into a blue mohawk?" He says yes, and soon emerges from the station with the sides of his hair colored silver and the top a beautiful shade of blue. And, yes, KMET adds Haircut One Hundred.

WEBN/Cincinnati sends a "heads up" (literally) to crosstown competitor WSKS - the skinned head of a large animal, with the note, "You don't deserve a thoroughbred - you're lucky you didn't get the other end!" 'EBN PD Denton Marr says the gift was a warning to the newcomer, which had been saying nasty things about WEBN.

During a station promo for E/A artist Richard Simmons, Q107/DC's Alan Burns decides to join Simmons onstage for what turns into an impromptu bump-and-grind number, with lots o' garments coming off. What Burns doesn't know is that half of his Q107 staff is on hand to videotape the entire incident..

Robin Quivers, who handled news on Howard Stern's DC101/ Washington show and then went to WCBM/Baltimore, is rejoining Howard at WNBC/NY.

KNX-FM/L.A. VP/GM Robert Nelson stands firm in his statement that the station will not change its Soft Rock format.

The battle heats up in the nation's capital, as WPGC's morning team of Elliot & Woodside jump ship for crosstown Q107 while 'PGC PD Steve Kingston grabs Washington Redskin quarterback Joe Theisman to fill in morninas.

Is Mairite talking with Heftel about acquiring WLUP/Chicago?

First R&R sighting: "It was 20 years ago. I was the new MD at KROQ. We needed records because all the DJs had stolen the records. When I started there, nobody was getting paid, so everybody was stealing the records and selling them in order to get paid. We called up the record labels, and they said, 'If you were in the trades, particularly if you were an **R&R** reporter, then we could give you record service.' So then I'm trying to get a lunch with [then-AOR Editor] Jeff Gelb.

"His main concern was whether we were going to be around. He wasn't going to make us a reporting station if we weren't going to be around. And there was no evidence whatsoever that KROQ was going to stick around. So we were kind of in a bind. Eventually in the next year or so we convinced him.'

Personal influences: "Probably the most influential people have been Frazier Smith, Andy Schuon, and Kevin

Weatherly. Smith, now a DJ on KLSX/L.A., was the crazy man of KROQ in 1978, when I first started. He would just do anything. It impressed the hell out of me. And the other two guys are what really made me a broadcaster. It's like, 'Very good, Jed: Try to say it in one minute instead of seven minutes, and don't pause when you're talking, because it sounds like you have no idea what you're talking about.' I've been able to take their

direction and make it something perfectly comfortable for me." Most rewarding career moment: "To be able to develop my skills as a broadcaster and have them evolve into something that I'm proud of.







# The Year Of The CD

Warner Communications even proposed to distribute and own half of PolyGram, but the idea was dropped the following year for lack of government blessing. But

distribution wasn't the only issue on labels' agendas. This was the year of the CD, with WDHA/ Morristown, NJ touted as the first station to air the new configuration. Michael Jackson thrilled the masses with his latest solo effort and an unforgettable appearance on the Emmy-winning *Motown* 25 special, and Rev. Jesse Jackson rallied forces for a fight that's still making news 15 years later: suggestive song lyrics.

Meanwhile .... the FCC's Docket 80-90 plan opened the door to 1000 new FM opportunities. Speaking of FM, Z100 (WHTZ) took root in the Big Apple and faced competition

from AOR-turned-CHR WPLJ. This while formats adopted more customized personas: John Sebastian bowed "Eclectic Oriented Rock"; Rick Carroll's "Rock Of The '80s" signed up its share of Alternative followers (including WIFI/Philly and 91X/San Diego); and an all-Beatles format made a few waves. Trivia buffs take note: One Dr. W — aka Larry Walton, afternoon jock at WKSI/Eldorado, IL — broke the broadcasting record. He clocked in at 378 hours, 59 minutes



SCOTT SHANNON

**Gareer inspiration:** "I'm one of those radio rats whose only goal was to be in broadcasting. For as far back as I can remember, I wanted to be on the air and never had a 'Plan B.' In addition to being a radio rat, I was an Army brat and spent my childhood listening to radio in Detroit, St. Louis, Tacoma, San Diego, and Indianapolis. When I was 12, I hijacked my dad's Silvertone record player and Revere reel-to-reel tape recorder and set up shop in the basement with my own make-believe radio station." **First R&R sighting:** "I remember it well. I was working at 'AM 1300,'

**First R&R sighting:** "I remember it well. I was working at 'AM 1300,' WMAK/Nashville. **R&R** came out of the blue in the mail, and I thought it was brilliant. I immediately devoured the whole thing. When I was finished, I went to the masthead, called the name at the top, which was Bob Wilson, and told him to please sign me up as a subscriber. ## I was the first one to call)."

Most significant change in last 25 years: "There's no doubt it's been deregulation. While realizing that it's not the prevailing opinion, I think deregulation has been horrible. For many people — including me — radio isn't as much fun as it used to be. I strongly believe in the concept of serving the community and the spirit of competition. There's nothing like the old radio battles that have taken place over the years. Despite what many big corporate executives want us to believe, the spirit of competition has been severely diminished. While I've always treated radio as a business, it's also been an art to me."

Most influential person: "Without question, Bill Drake has had the most powerful impact on my career. I sometimes feel like a stalker, because I

## **Radio Rewind** 000



The new wave boom peaked in 1983 - especially at CHR as evidenced by the onslaught of acts making their debut. Artists like the Eurythmics, Spandau Ballet, Fixx, Madness, Men Without Hats, After The Fire, Thomas Dolby, and Naked Eves became wellknown with their first-time CHR hits. 1983 is remembered as a banner year for CHR music, and it's no wonder that the format experienced a major surge in national audience. WHTZ (Z100)/New York signed on, and the rest is history.

But no act was more outrageous than Culture Club. Led by crossdressing lead singer Boy George (O'Dowd), the group had four top 10 hits, including "Do You Really Want To Hurt Me," "Time (Clock Of The Heart)," "I'll Tumble 4 Ya," and "Church Of The Poison Mind.'

1983 was the first year R&R produced a Hot Tracks chart for AOR, and the timing was

forward. Taking Rogers' and Parton's lead were other Nashville pairs that found success by recording together, including Willie Nelson and Merle Haggard, Mickey Gilley and Charlie McClain, and T.G. Sheppard and Karen Brooks.


Michael Jackson released Thriller, and "Billie Jean" wrapped up 1983 at No. 1 for the year-end R&R Black radio chart. During 1983, it was hard not to notice the influence of

rock guitars in black music, particularly those found in "Stay With Me Tonight" by Jeffrey Osborne, "Dead Giveaway" by Shalamar, and "Beat It" by Michael Jackson. Up until 1983, the term Urban had not been used in conjunction with Black radio, and although it didn't officially appear in the name of the format, it was starting to pop up in editorials.

R&R produced a year-end chart for Jazz radio in 1983 that featured a diverse range of jazz styles and was the format predecessor to NAC/ Smooth Jazz. NAC icons George Benson, Joe Sample, Ramsey Lewis, and Grover Washington Jr. all placed hits in the top 10.

#### Career inspiration: "My first exposure to pop music was in my preteen years in the early '50s. Tin Pan Alley publishers held sway over the business, and a potential hit song was recorded by artists on every label. That taught me the enduring value of great songs. By age 10 I discovered the great AM stations that were exponents of R&B and gospel. R&B, country, and the emerging rockabilly scene moved me more than pop ever did, and I became fascinated with small

labels like Atlantic, Chess, VeeJay, and Sun, which caught the majors off-guard and captured market share in the early days of rock 'n' roll."

Most significant industry change in the last 25 years: "The primary change has been the growth of the industry from a small business to one that dominates the entertainment field. Contributing factors include the decline of the single and the rise of the album as a major configuration. Also, the

bigger role played by accountants and lawyers must be noted. Their impact with regard to the cost of signing talent and doing business cannot be underestimated. Lastly, in the '50s there were four majors. We could be back to four again very soon."

First R&R sighting: "My introduction was, of course, when it started publication. I felt it added a new perspective with its in-depth coverage of radio, honest reporting, and chart coverage."



To protest WDBO/Orlando's format change from Beautiful Music to Country, Gary Schaffer, Ron Kocher, and Lon Wagnertake the station hostage for three hours. The protest ends quietly and the three announcers, who were already being released, demanded letters of recommendation. Management declined.

Malrite moves its new purchase, WVNJ/Newark, to the Empire State Building and asks the FCC for new calls WHTZ. After WHTZ hires Scott Shannon as PD, word is out that WKHK/NY will abandon its Country format in favor of CHR.

know so much about him but have only met him face-to-face once. The first time I was exposed to his Top 40 concepts, a light went on in my head, because it made so much sense. It was so simple to see the genius in his thinking. He didn't take the personality out of radio. Instead, he wanted personalities to be challenged by his concepts. Throughout my career, I've tried to put together disciplined, focused stations with high-profile, high-impact personalities."

Most rewarding career point: As delusionary as it may sound, I really like to

think of myself as a coach. One of the most enjoyable things for me is designing a station, putting together the team, and then coaching that team

Most disappointing: "February 13, 1991 the day I got the call from Norm Pattiz that the plug was being pulled on Pirate Radio/L.A. It was devastating to me, because we had just turned the thing around. Looking back, I don't begrudge Norm for what he did. It was a painful decision for him, and I don't think it was something he wanted to do. But I would've been willing to take a pay cut or done anything else possible to make that situation work. I saw the light at the end of the tunnel, and he didn't

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
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
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
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
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# **CHR Fever Hits Los Angeles**

There were plenty of "Big Brother" jokes in 1984. After all, this was the year George Orwell hung his hat on.

But the world survived just fine, and, heck, there weren't even any traffic jams during the L.A. Olympics!

Speaking of L.A., ever since KHJ had begun to fade in the mid-'70s. CHR radio in this town was a mishmash of oddball sounds. Enter KIIS. By 1984, the market was so hungry for a straight-ahead CHR sound as well as an entertaining morning show, that it anointed KIIS (and Rick Dees) as No. 1 with double-digit numbers (the station used Mike Joseph's "Hot Hits" slogan, but Joseph was not an on-site consultant). KIIS' success, combined with that of WHTZ (Z100)/NY, provided the first CHR doublewinners since the WABC/KHJ days of the '60s and '70s.

This was the year stereo broadcasting was supposed to save radio's AM band. Oh, re-

ally? After years of wrangling, AM stereo receivers were finally available. But they were expensive, the consumer had to choose between two systems, and there weren't a lot of music stations left on AM. What AM stereo couldn't do, Rush Limbaugh managed almost singlehandedly. But that's for another year.

A shudder rippled through the entire Talk radio industry in 1984, after Alan Berg, the brash and outspoken KOA/ Denver host, was gunned down in front of his home with


large-caliber ammunition. Berg Quello Appointed To New FCC Term was a popular personality in Denver - he had a style that many future hosts would emulate ---and he had been recently profiled on 60 Minutes. Authorities would later find the alleged murder weapon at the home of a white supremacist. CDs were becoming a bigger

factor in both radio stations and consumers' homes, but a Warner Bros. ad in R&R exemplified the issue of the day: At the end of an ad promoting John Fogerty's Centerfield album, a disclaimer warned that the CD could not be released day-and-date with the vinyl because "the time required

by foreign CD pressing plants makes simultaneous releases impossible."

Reflecting on the year are a pair of professionals who combined efforts to make KIIS-FM/L.A. the most successful CHR in that market since Boss Radio KHJ of the '60s: Gerry DeFrancesco and Rick Dees.

## Reflections



**GERRY DEFRANCESCO** 

Career inspiration: "My father played bass in a '50s rock 'n' roll band. He inspired my love of music and radio. As a child I used to keep a transistor radio and a flashlight under my pillow and stay up all night listen-ing. In fact, I refused to attend first grade! Unfortunately, my parents took the radio away.

First R&R sighting: "In 1976 I was a college senior participating in Temple University's summer internship program. I was placed at WFIL. And Jay Cook was PD. One of my first assign-ments was to 'study' the **R&R** charts and report on the playlist activity of various stations. Jay advised me read **R&R** from cover to cover. To this

day, I still try to do so." **Current gig:** "Since the sale of Gan-nett's radio division, I've worked with the company in assessing potential radio acquisitions in Gannett TV markets. I'm also doing consulting projects with friends in radio and the Internet."

Most significant change in last 25 years: "Consolidation. As a result, radio companies' long-term health will be strong.

Personal influences: "I've worked with many brilliant people, but Jay had the most significant bearing on my career. He allowed me to be his partner for nearly 16 years, teaching me how to find a happy balance between the art and the science of radio. More importantly, he had great confidence in me. He created a very liberating environment in an industry that often bites its nails over the next monthly extrapolation." Most rewarding career point: "The

most memorable is the day when 102.7 KIIS-FM went to No. 1 in L.A. - summer '84. We didn't see it coming, and the shock was overwhelming. I was on the phone with Arbitron and was the first to find out. I stepped into the hallway; the staff was waiting. I screamed, 'We're No. 1!' Everyone went absolutely crazy with excitement."

from *Footloose;* and two **Prince** tracks from *Purple Rain*, "When Doves Cry" and "Let's Go Crazy," were two through five on the year-end CHR chart. For good measure, **Ray Parker Jr.**'s "Ghostbusters" and another track from *Footloose*, "Let's Hear It For The Boy," by **Deniece Williams**, were ninth and tenth, respectively.

1984 will be remembered as a year of albums with multiple hit singles. Who could forget *She's So Unusual* by **Cyndi Lauper**, which yielded the hits "Girls Just

Want To Have Fun," "Time After Time," "All Through The Night," and "She Bop"? Van Halen was so excited about 1984 that they named their album after the year. The final Van Halen collection with David Lee Roth on lead vocal featured "Jump," "Panama," "I'll Wait," and "Hot For Teacher," among others. Bruce Springsteen's most infamous album, Born In The U.S.A., was released in the spring and produced "Dancing In The Dark" and "Cover Me" that year. It would eventually yield seven top 10 hits.



#### Heard It Through The Grapevine

Sparks fly when WGCL/Cleveland announces a concert with Slade, and crosstown WMMS --- acting on a rumor that Slade would lip-sync to a tape - broadcast the rumor on the day of the show. Epic promo guy Joe Carroll calls 'MMS and proceeds to tell the morning man what he can do with that info, only to have WMMS replay Carroll's ranting over the airmuch to his chagrin. Months later, WMMS adapts Ray Parker Jr.'s "Ghostbusters" and renames its version "Baboon Busters." One line goes, "I ain't afraid of no lip-syncing baboon."

KRLB/Lubbock, TX runs a promotion that has personalities Steve Sever and Gary Winter racing each other around the world. Steve headed east, Gary headed west. After seven days and 13 hours, Steve arrived first

Meanwhile, KIQQ/Los Angeles sends its listeners into a "State Of Shock" by playing the new Jacksons single continuously from the time it's released - noon on Wednesday, June 13 - until 10am the following morning!

WHTY/Detroit's TV spot, featuring a bunch of snakes slithering around a scientist who proclaims that even reptiles are calmed by the music on WHTY, gets the can when viewers complain the sight of all those snakes makes their skin crawl. The station changes the commercial to the scientist holding a ferocious ... puppy.

Consultant Walt Sabo dictates a new music policy to the RKO station group: In a nutshell, the stations can no longer discuss music with anyone - label reps, indie promo people, not even the trades.

Rumor has it that Epic VP Frank Dileo will exit the label to become Michael Jackson's personal manager!

Lee Abrams tells those attending the Superstars Convention that AOR has generally become too predictable and encourages programmers to get more creative in their presentations.

At WLS/Chicago, Larry Lujack is signed to an unprecedented 12year contract.

Wolfman Jack returns to L.A. for overnights on KRLA.

Jimmy Bowen resigns as head of WB's Nashville operations. Word has it that he'll cross over to MCA/Nashville.

WNEW/NY celebrates its 50th anniversary. Former WPLR/New Haven GMChris Kampmeier will be named

PD at new Phoenix AC KLZI.

Will Cox's new WXFM/Chicago become CHR or AC? It becomes CHR WAGO.

Tongues wag that WMET/Chicago will go from AOR to AC.

In a somewhat unprecedented move, CBS-owned FM stations hire Charlie Van Dyke to be "the voice" of their seven stations. New York gets a "Spanish CHR" as WKDM goes on the air with new

management. Rumors fly that B104/Baltimore PD Steve Kingston is being courted

by a major broadcast group to take its flagship station in the nation's top market. Nothing comes of it ... this year, at least.

Rumor has WLUP/Chicago switching formats and owners (from Heftel to EZ Com). Then, weeks later, it appears Malrite is the buyer. A week later, both camps deny any transaction will take place.

#### Reflections



RICK DEES first ran September 4, 1998

Careerinspiration: "Paul Allen. This thin guy had this huge voice, and did all the announcements at my high school back in Greensboro, NC. I started doing an impression of him, and after a while he said, 'I'm also a licensed broadcaster.' He invited me to his house. His brother was an engineer at a radio station, and they had built a little radio station in their house. I asked him to do a jingle for me, and we all got in front of the microphone and went, '1400 ... Rig Dees.'" [Dees' real name is Rigdon, but everybody thought he was saying "Rick Dees' instead of "Rig Dees," so he eventually stuck with Rick.]

First R&R chart appearance: "Disco Duck," on RSO Records, Breaker, August 20, 1976. The record would peak at No. 7 in early October.

Personal influences: "I'm tempted to say Jesus. I read what he's written every day. A person living today would be Billy Graham. Through all the incredible problems we go through today, he's going

to be the one you look back to and say, 'Never a problem.' I also have a wonderful team that supports me, with Paul Joseph producing the show. Ellen K is the best sidekick anybody could have. And, on Weekly Top 40, Melinda Ellison has a gift for knowing how to make the show run so fast.

Most rewarding career point: "'Disco Duck.' To have the listeners we have is also a wonderful feeling. Having the support of the audience — there's no beginning to tell what a wonderful sense of appreciation I have for that. Also, working on the next generation of electric engine, the Cylindrical Energy Module. And inventing Crystal Breath.



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# Stern Bows On New York's FM Dial

WKTU/New York, the station that in 1978 exploded onto the radio scene with an 11 share, disappeared with a whimper this year. (Of course, there's achaptertwo to the WKTU story ... jump to 1996).

Mel Karmazin made the station the flagship of his Infinity radio chain, flipped the call letters to WXRK (K-Rock), and put it nose-to-nose with WNEW-FM, the enduring Rock station

where Karmazin had earned his first set of GM stripes a decade earlier. At the same time all this was happening, Howard Stern and Robin Quivers fell through the thin ice they were skating on over at WNBC. Precious nanoseconds later, Karmazin had Stern, Quivers, et. al., signed for wake-ups at his station. And the rest, as they say, is history.

Elsewhere in the radio world in 1985, charity events were in vogue. It seemed almost everyone played "We Are The World" at least once during its run early in the year, and there was one moment when thousands of stations played it simultaneously. Needless to say, the fam-

ine in Ethiopia was an unknown issue no more. The song set the stage for a slew of similar charity tunes and concerts later that year and in the future, including the trans-oceanic Live Aid.

Arbitron expanded its measurement activities once again by

ad revenues (little did we know then it would double in just over a decade). This year's reflections are from consultant/Classic Rock disciple Fred Jacobs and Ken Kragen, the manager of Kenny Rogers and the spearheading force behind USA For Africa.

## Reflections



FRED JACOBS

"My earliest memories of Classic Rock's possibilities are when I was programming WRIF in the early '80s, observing how the Album Rock audience was being stretched to the max. The younger listeners — as always were embracing new music. But our upper demos (at that time 25-34s) were wondering why we weren't playing more of the staples from the '60s, like the Beatles, Stones, and the Who. I started to envision a format that just specialized in the old stuff.

"The MUSIC environment at this time was red-hot — the explosion of MTV, Hot Hits radio, and superstar artists like Michael Jackson, Madonna, and Prince. Not exactly the best time to launch a format that essentially stopped in 1978. Because of the spotlight on new music, many AORs had all but stopped playing the Beatles when Classic Rock first be-

came a reality. "One of the big breakthroughs was

the brand. When the Coca-Cola folks were forced to save face because of the New Coke debacle, Classic Coke was born, thus ensuring that the format's name was a home run. As the word *classic* came to denote quality and longevity, Classic Rock became more than a format or fad. It quickly developed into a type of music and a bona fide trend. While many radio format names are only used in industry-speak, radio people and the audience refer to this music by the same brand name. "Classic Rock was the first true

Classic Rock was the first profragmenter of AOR (more would surely follow), and its explosion caused many heritage stations to rethink their timehonored strategies. Some fought Classic Rockers head on, others eventually retreated to the younger end, and a few lodged themselves into the precarious middle ground. In an industry littered with two-year formats, I'm gratified that Classic Rock has truly stood the test of time."

# **Signs Of The Times**

- "We Are The World," written by Lionel Richie and Michael Jackson, features 45 superstars; Northern Lights' "Tears Are Not Enough" includes Canadian superstars Bryan Adams and Anne Murray.
- Live Aid, held simultaneously at London's Wembley Stadium and Philadelphia's Veterans Stadium, is the premier charity event of the year. Other projects include Farm Aid; Artists United Against Apartheid's "Sun City"; and "That's What Friends Are For", recorded by Dionne Warwick, Elton John, Gladys Knight, and Stevie Wonder on behalf of AIDS research.
- The Parents Music Resource Center, led by Tipper Gore, launches a full-scale media blitz against "sexually explicit" and thematically violent songs, including Sheena Easton's "Sugar Walls."
- FM continues to surge ahead of AM, commanding 71% of all radio listening.
- KFRC/SF strips itself of music and becomes "The Game Zone," constructed by PD Mike Philips and RKO consultant Walter Sabo.
- WWTC/Minneapolis becomes "Weatheradio," featuring weather updates, traffic, and other travel information -including airline arrivals and departures.
- General Electric buys RCA and NBC for \$6.3 billion.
- Capital Cities purchases ABC for \$3.5 billion.
- FCC proposes to end AM-FM simulcast limitations.
- Transtar's "Format 41" debuts on WDRQ/Detroit and KIQQ/L.A.
- WMMS/Cleveland segues from AOR to CHR.
- WKTU/New York flips to AOR as WXRK (K-Rock) with live coverage of the Live Aid concert.
- Sconnix's WCKO/Miami drops AOR for "adult CHR" as WMXJ



# Radio Rewind

With six hits in the CHR Top 85 of '85 Madonna ruled the roost, and one of the biggest ballads of her career, "Crazy For You," from the Vision Quest soundtrack, came out on top for the year. Although Madonnamania was in effect throughout

the middle and late '80s, '85 was perhaps her most visible year, when she performed the controversial "Like A Virgin" on the MTV Video Music Awards in a wedding dress. All of her risks paid off, as she earned a reputation for being able to reinvent herself year after year, exciting her fans and shocking the world in the process.

Clive Davis' Arista exposed the talents of Whitney Houston, and her first two singles, "Saving All My Love For You" and "You Give Good Love," finished Nos. 2 and 3, respectively, at Black/Urban. Since that memorable time, Houston has blazed a long trail of big chart hits at numerous formats.

In response to the famine in Africa, a large group of legendary artists and

newcomers alike banded together under the direction of super-producer Quincy Jones to lay down "We Are The World." The conglomeration recorded as USA For Africa, and the song's proceeds helped relieve the crisis. Michael Jackson, Dionne Warwick, Stevie Wonder, Cyndi Lauper, Bruce Springsteen, Ray Charles, and Bob Dylan were among those who participated in the project.

RCA/Nashville's Alabama was the big winner in '85, placing three singles in the yearend top 10. "There's No Way" finished No. 1, and "Can't Keep A Good Man Down" and "Forty Hour Week (For A Livin')" at Nos. 7 and 8. RCA held seven of the top 10 positions, with Ronnie Milsap, "Real Love" by Dolly Parton and Kenny Rogers, and "Love Is Alive" by the Judds all contributing to RCA's dominance during the vear.

Bryan Adams' "Reckless" topped AOR Albums, and '85 is remembered as a year of blockbuster rock releases. Other multiplatinum superstars found in the year-end album chart include Dire Straits, Phil

Collins, Sting, Bruce Springsteen, and Tom Petty.

An album that came out in '85 that still receives significant airplay in multiformats today is Songs From The Big Chair by Tears For Fears, which featured

the chart-toppers "Shout" and "Everybody Wants To Rule The World '

R&R maintained its Jazz chart throughout 1985, and it clearly served as an overview of the traditional side of the genre.

Stanley Jordan, Dizzy Gillespie, Wynton Marsalis, and Pat Metheny all placed in the top 15.

Whitney Houston, Aretha Franklin, and Freddie Jackson ruled Black/Urban, each placing two songs in the top 10. The year-end No. 1, however, was "Part-Time Lover" by Stevie Wonder, who held at No. 1 on the R&R Black/Urban chart for four weeks.

Careerinspiration: "I started producing high school dances in Berkeley. Then I produced my first concert (\$.75 tickets) with the Limelighters. while in college there."

First R&R sighting: "Seeing a copy on a record promotion executive's desk. Later, R&R became a force for us in organizing the 'We Are The World' and Hands Across America activities."

Current gig: "Same thing I was ing in 1 - managing artists. It's my 31st year with Kenny Rogers; my ninth with Trisha Yearwood. Then I have country singer Billy Dean, comedian Ron Lucas, and Broadway's Linda Eder. I'm also about to launch my first feature nim, on the life of Galileo. And I'm managing my eight-year-old daugh-

ter. She took the '12 Days Of Christmas' and rewrote it as the '12 Dogs Of Christmas.' A book and CD (featuring 25 of her classmates) came out last month."

Most significant industry change in last 25 years: "We've gone from an artist-driven to a song-driven industry. And the song is driven to a large extent by testing. It's changed the way we promote records, the way we record records: People are unwill\* ing to make mistakes. They want justification for everything, so there's less risk-taking."

Personal influences: "When I was 15, my father left a prestigious job as a senior partner in an L.A. law firm for a \$12,500 a year teaching job at
