# CLUE ONDES COURTES DE RADIO-CANADA Short wave glub

On October 6, 1973 there'll be a special extended edition of the Radio Canada Shortwave Club program to mark this WORLD DX FRIENDSHIP YEAR 1973. This special program will bring together 5 popular and well known DX programs from Europe and the South Pacific. Taking part are Arthur Cushen's DX World from Invercargill, New Zealand; Radio Nederland's DX Juke Box with Harry Van Gelder; Radio Sweden's Sweden Calling DXers with Arne Skoog; and the BBC World Radio Club with Reg Kennedy and Henry Hatch. Hosting the program at Radio Canada International in Montreal will be Bob MacGregor.

Four trans Atlantic and trans Pacific cable circuits, and associated land lines, spanning some 26,000 miles, will be used to link up the participants on three continents.

We'll also be issuing a special QSL card for all correct reception reports on our transmissions during the week of October 1 to 7 inclusive.

There's a contest too, to be held in conjunction with our special Shortwave Club program. There'll be lots of prizes, and winners will be chosen from all correct reception reports based on this special club program.

RAIN, RAIN, GO AWAY...The Volkswagen Gamper threaded its way through a varied assortment of raindrops...hoping that the foul weather would have no adverse effect upon United Airlines Flight #79...seheduled to depart shortly from Hartford-Springfield's Bradley International for Los Angeles and San Diego...the latter, of course, the chosen locale for the 1973 mixture of mayhem and madness masquerading as the convention of AWARC...no, that's not a large barge of biblical significance filled with assorted wildlife...it's the Association of North American Radio Clubs...which, as time went on, may have been filled with assorted wildlife of its own...

QTH...35,000 FEET...With ourselves and...hopefully...our luggage tucked safely aboard the DC-8 your "DK MONTAGE" staff...consisting of your editor and his faithful proofreader...continued the journey to the homeland of Mickey Mouse, Goofy, and Dave Thorne. However, a copy of United's "Mainliner" magazine is hardly sufficient to sustain one's interest for an entire six-hour flight; rescue was scon provided from the cockpit. An announcement from the pilot indicated that in addition to the syriad of entertainment available over the plane's stereo headsets during the ride, the co-pilot would tune in various AM stations on the ground and would pipe in the broadcasts via channel four for any interested passengers, A diabolical idea entered my mind...what better souvenir of this cross-country junket than a collection of BCB QSLs gleaned from some 35,000 feet above terra firma...to say nothing

Feature of the day seemed to be CBS News coverage of the comedy team of Ervin and Erhlichman as Flight #79's #2-man and I "DXed" BCB outlets in New York City, Buffalo, Chicago, Minneapolis, Denver, Las Vegas, Los Angeles, and Cedar City, Utah...No more appropriate way to spend flight time enroute to an ANARC gathering...

TNO'S A COMPANY...FOUR'S A DX-FEDITION...A brief stop in Los Angeles afforded us the welcomed chance to test the "land-legs" via a stroll about the confines of L.A.'s air terminal....when what to our smog-smarting eyes should appear, but two familiar figures huddled in a corner of the waiting area...with some apprehension I then queried, "Al Reynolds, I presime?"...and, indeed, it was the AMARC Executive Secretary and his friendly seeing-eye dog, Woody Seymour, who had been taking a protective stance in front of a case containing his XCR-30....one of the few still working we are told. All seemed forgiven as multitudes gathered at the post-game picnic ... the prime concern of which was a graphic conflab on ways to clean up the items in DX MONTAGE ... # SPEEDX FEATURE



In 1919, a group of Recife radio amateurs met in an agricultural high school building, with the aim of creating a radio club. On October 17th, 1919, the newspaper Salao Nobro des Dicie des Original article for the Assoziation Deutschsprachiger DX-er, ADDX, by Herrn Bernd Kielmann, ADDX Latin American correspondent, appeared in September first 1972 issue of ADDX "Kurier." The article has been translated and condensed for publication in SPEEDX by Serge C.P. Neumann.

the newspaper Salao Nobre des Diário de Pernambuco was the site for the founding of the organization - with the goal of listening to and studying various aspects of broadcasting. The club met weekly until 1922, when Sr. Oscar Moreira Pinto returned from Europe with a 20 watt and 25 watt LEVY transmitter, a Crosley receiver, and a head full of ideas about broadcasting.

Sr. Pinto became acquainted with the radio club, and in 1923 the "Radio Society of Rio de Janeiro" was founded. But even before the founding of the Radio Society, Rádio Clube was on the air - becoming the first radio broadcasting station in Latin America. The programs were irregular, and couldn't be heard across town. But <u>how</u> could they? The transmitter was of simple design and construction, and the microphone was round, shaped almost like a bowling pin.

On October 17th, 1923, exactly four years after their initial meeting, the group met again at the Diário de Pernambuco to establish laws which would govern the Rádio Clube. Headquarters for the Rádio Clube were at Rua Luiz do Rego #394, and in 1928, headquarters were moved to Rua da Aurora #55 because the Rádio Clube couldn't pay the rent at the former address. They had moved in with Telegrafo Nacional (National Telegraph Company). Now, the programs of the Rádio Clube were transmitted using a mast on top of the Diário de Pernambuco building.

1924 was a good year for Rádio Clube. Oscar Pinto installed a new trans-

mitter; a Lucien-Levy with 500 watts. Yet it was still broadcasting by a group of amateurs. Friends of the amateurs served as announcers, sometime singers or comedians. Money was always a short commodity at Radio Clube. But those that wanted to work always had their hands full. Floriano Costa was the secretary, technician, and helper in various ways. Utávio Saraiva was the senior announcer, but at the same time served as the bureau chief and telephone operator. The programming had progressed to 2 hours, three times a week. Slowly, program

quality improved. In 1926, the call letters were changed to SQAC. One day, Oscar Moreira Pinto ran exitedly into the studio. Why? Radio Clube was audible in Jaboatão, some 30 miles from Recife. In 1931, a new two kiloWatt transmitter was installed, and on February 26, 1931, the call letters were changed to APRAP. The years passed, and the call letters were again changed, this time to PRA8, when a Cinephon transmitter began beaming programs on both medium and shortwaves. It was 1939. Shortly before the death of Sr. Oscar Moreira Pinto on December 20th,

Shortly before the death of Sr. Oscar Moreira Pinto on December 20th, 1943, Rádio Clube was purchased by Diérios Associados. On June 4, 1960, the television era came to Rádio Clube, when a 25 kW television transmitter began operation on Channel 6. Only last April, did Channel 6 begin to operate in color.

Rádio Clube de Pernambuco operates on 720 kHz (25 kW), 1030 kHz (10 and 5 kW), 6015 kHz (10 kW) and on 11865 kHz (1 kW). (-30-)

#### SELECT AWARDS

As of this writing, some few days remain prior to the 31 August entry deadline for the "First Annual SPEEDX Q&L Size Awards". It would therefore be inappropriate to report upon specific entries, hut we can say that this award has sparked ouite a number of entries... ...usually accompanied by a comment or two such as: "absolutely irrelavent to SWLing expertise, but real fun", "What comes next? Longest antenna? I can hardly wait", "Nuttiest contest I ever heard of...here's my three entries". It would seem many in the world of SWLing have an appetite for such tongue-in-cheek awards.

It appears fairly obvious that sufficient interest in this sort of thing has been stimulated, so we are following right along with another off-beat award. This particular citation was suggested by no less than four SPEEDXers...and on such grounds, the editor disclaims at least some portion of the responsibility for its presentation (HI). Here it is:

## "MOST NON-QSLs FOR 1972" Award

Here's a chance to maybe get a little value out of those "regrets" form letters, interpretations of ITU regulations, and all the other types or variations of DX pink-slips!!!!

The SPEEDXer submitting the greatest grand total of QSL turn-downs for the year 1972 will receive an appropriately inscribed SPEEDX Select Award certificate to commemorate the accomplishment. This is NOT a booby prize!!! .... Remember that several stations and organizations reply with "Sorry OW" to ALL reception reports; thus the experts can easily collect as many during the year as anyone else!!

#### General Rules

1. To qualify as a "non-QSL" the card, letter or whatever must have been sent from a radio station, broadcaster, or communications organization and in some manner state (in any language) that verification of reception is being withheld. The reason given for denial (if any) is of no importance for the purpose of this award. The rejection itself may be a form letter, personal note, comments written directly on the SWLs reception report, or any other type of memorandum that conveys non-confirmation.

2. The date of mailing of the non-QSL must have been between 1 January 1972 and 31 December 1972 inclusive. This date must appear somewhere on the actual piece, or the postmark upon the envelope in which it came may be used-provided the outer return address coincides exactly with the letterhead or other identification on the actual non-QSL.

3. In the event more than one non-QSL has been received during 1972 from the same station or organization, <u>EACH will count fully toward the total</u>. In other words, it's possible for the winner to have 'em all from the same outfit.

4. Entries must be postmarked not later than <u>30 September 1973</u> and contain a brief description of each non-QSL along with the mailing date.

5. Mail entries to SPEEDXTRAS at the above address. It is not necessary to enclose the actual turn-downs, although the apparent winner(s) may be contacted after the deadline for validation. In the event of a tie, duplicate certificates will be awarded.

The "Most Non-QSLs for 1972" award winner will be announced in the November 1973 issue of the SPEEDX magazine.



#### THE BRAZILIAN SCENE

Time to rid my desk of the pile of items I have been collecting and so we'll begin with an item sent in by Bob Butterfield. Bob quotes the World Wide DX Club who quote the Danish Short Wave Club International who, I suppose, heard from someone that Radio Timbira, Sao Luis, Brazil airs a special English language program at 2330 and 0300 GMT every Saturday and Sunday on 4975 khz. Reception reports are wanted on these special transmissions.

While speaking of Brazil let's confirm your suspicions with a report by Maarten van Delft via Sweden Calling DXers Bulletin # 1235 that Radio Inconfidencia actually uses 25 kw on 6000 khz instead of the 1 kw listed by the WRTVH. Maarten also notes that R. Clube Paranaense (6045 khz) has been off the air for two months and recently changed owners. The new owners have not yet decided when transmissions will resume.

Sweden Calling DXers also brings word of some changes coming up soon on the Brazilian scene. Look, for example, for Radio Nacional, Rio de Janeiro to boost power on 6145 khz when the conversion of their old 50 kw medium wave transmitter is completed this fall. R. Aparecida also plans to inagurate new transmitters. Look for improved reception of this Brazilian on 9635 some time in December.

#### OFF AGAIN

With but four days before I leave for Hawaii, Japan, Taiwan, and a quick return stopover in Los Angeles on the 19th I had best be at the loggings. Every year, a couple of weeks or so after the autumnal equinox, what is termed the "DX season" begins for North American SWLs. Lengthening darkness periods coupled with decreasing atmospheric noise north of the equator open the door during the evening for the picking off of some of the more distant lower-powered local or regional outlets in the frequency range below & megahertz. While lower frequency long-haul DXing will improve to a greater degree as winter approaches, the month of October offers certain possibilities not present later on!!

Without going into a lengthy discussion, the mid-autumn period has specific characteristics that present the year's best (and often only) opportunities to log local or regional stations operating below 8 megahertz and lying on long southeasterly or southwesterly paths from a North American QTH.

1. Darkness, or close to it, is required to complete lower frequency communications. During mid-autumn the nighttime "shadow" on the earth's surface is tilted in such a manner that darkness covers the maximum diagonal distance, thereby opening up a shot or two not available later on in the "season".

2. Local atmospheric noise levels are greatest when and where the season is summer, and least when and where it is winter. October is about half-way between, noise in North America has fallen off its summer high, and still well short of a maximum value in the southern hemisphere. Since radio signals have the habit of picking up at least a little of the atmospheric electrostatics they encounter on their journey, and since there is more mileage to cover for a long diagonal shot, all this adds up to a seasonal minimum of accumulated "static" for such transmissions.

3. Many smaller local and regional broadcasters in foreign lands schedule themselves on the air only during the peak audience hours of early to mid-morning, and later on again in the evening...their time. Combining this with (1) above, can result in the once-in-a-year chance at some rare catches just as a station is either signing on or off for the day...often for only a few fleeting moments. The trick then is to determine just when both their transmitter and your receiver will be in the "shadow" AND THEN see how this stacks up with their broadcast schedule!!...assuming that you're out to get a specific country or station entirely on your own, and not waiting for someone else to report the logging (in the case of long "diagonal" lower band DX, by the time the report comes out the chance is usually gone!!)

"OK", you say, "How do I go about figuring all this out?". Well, there are several sources for year-round sunset/sunrise information (and we may be coming out with our own in the not too distant future); but for the purpose of this article dealing with only mid-autumn, it isn't necessary to explore too much in the way of technical complexities.

Give or take a half-hour, sunset and sunrise will occur at the same local standard times during October for any given location lying between the latitudes of roughly 50° N and 20° S (approximately 5:30 PM and 5:30 AM respectively). Further, the darkness shadow will cover about 180° of longitude between these latitudes. That's half-way around the world, or in other words, the shadow will be 12 time zones wide. Consequently, at your local sunset, long-haul low-end DX would be theoretically possible into points having latitude between 50°N and 20°S up to 12 time zones distant in an easterly direction. On the other end of the string, at sunrise a 12 time zone shot might occur toward the west. During your local darkness the maximum distance possible in either direction can be computed by simply subtracting one time zone toward the east and adding one time zone toward the west for each hour elapsed following your own local sunset. As an example, at 8:30 PM local time (3 hours after sunset) the maximum DX distance would be 9 time zones east, and 3 time zones

Now then, what remains is to plot out the situation for the desired listening hour by measuring off time zones in respect to your own location on a world map (if you've got one showing time zone). In theory, reception would be possible from any location within the plotted darkness area and falling between 50°N and 20°S latitude...,provided they are on the air!! This information can be gleaned from World Radio TV Handbook and/or other sources. If you use WRTVH, you will undoubtedly quickly discover it also contains some very useful data regarding, of all things, the latitude and longitude of the station, and their local time relationship.

The forecast chart is arranged in three vertical columns. The one on the left consists of five graphs depicting anticipated reception for Western North America (MST & PST time zones). Similarly, on the right is another set of five graphs representing Eastern North America (EST & CST time zones). Down the center is a series of notations indicating the world regions from which a radio signal might originate.

Each individual graph is indexed with GWT on its horizontal axis (the "00" following the hour has been deleted to conserve space), and Frequency (in megahertz) on its vertical axis.

There are actually two curves plotted on each graph...one representing the maximum useable frequency, and another representing an estimated lowest useable frequency. Therefore, the darkened area between these curves (called an "envelope") illustrates the <u>frequency range</u> most likely to produce reception at the given hour.

As an example, let's consider an SWL in Western North America wishing to listen to Central Asia around 0200 GMT. Selecting the fourth graph from the top (Central Asia/Far East) in the left column (Western North America), and then reading across the horizontal axis to "02" (0200 GMT with "00" deleted), the predicted frequency range would be between 5.0 and 18.0 megahertz.

Long distance reception is noted for its almost daily variations in quality, but as a general rule, frequencies appearing in the upper 20 to 25% of the envelope will provide the most stable and reliable signals for the path at the given hour. For the above Western North America/Central Asia example, this would mean that frequencies above about 14.5 megahertz would be more reliable than those below that value. (\*) Overall reception quality may be expected to decrease sharply toward the lower limits of the envelope as well.

If desired, the reader may remove this entire section from the magazine and fold the chart vertically to show only his own regional graphs...providing a handy reference near the receiver at all times.

THESE GRAPHS REFLECT PROPAGATION CONDITIONS ONLY!! There has been no attempt to modify this forecast in consideration of transmission schedules. Such references as World Radio TV Handbook, SPEEDX Utiliy DXers Guide, log sections of this magazine, or other such sources should be consulted for this sort of information.

(\*) Note: In this particular case, it is possible for signals to arrive via both the long and short paths at that hour, which could increase the most efficient frequency range to somewhat more than the upper 20 to 25% of the envelope; but by and large, this rule may be applied throughout.

# IF YOU HAVEN'T HEARD THE KHMERE REPUBLIC (CAMBODIA) LATELY HERE'S THE REASON FROM UPT.

"Cambodian rebels captured Phnom Penh's communications center today (Aug 8th) and destroyed all international telephone circuits before being driven out. A rebel force estimated at about 200 men captured the communications center at Kambol, eight miles west of Phnom Penh after a brief battle. The director of the center, Bin Boeun, said the rebels held the building for about three hours and destroyed 70% of its equipment and circuits. Among the circuits destroyed were all the long distance radio telephone facilities linking the Cambodian capital with other countries. Government officials said long-distance circuits would be out for at least four to seven days." (I would expect it to be longer-pm-)

ANOTHER SERVICE TO GO TO THE SATELLITE? The Communications Satellite Corporation (COMSAT) has asked the FCC for authority to proceed promptly with a maritime satellite system. The system would provide communications to the Navy and would offer separate services to the commercial shipping industry. Service is planned to start in September 1974. The system would consist of two multi-frequency satellites stationed in geostationary orbits, one over the Atlantic and on over the Pacific, and related ground control facilities in Connecticut and California. (From July, 1973 "Popular Electronics")

A German at Radio nistan by Bernd Ludwig tranalated by: Dr. Richard E. Wood

Christmas was coming. I was on my way to India, but the Indo-Pakistan war had disrupted communications. So all I could do was to button up my Afghan fur coat and think of the palm-fringed beache of Goa (India), where I had planned to spend the festive season. The wind, howling down from the mountains to Kabul, the capital of Afghanistan, bit through me; in my hard bargaining over the price of my new Afghan coat, I had forgotten another important detail: the size. It turned out to be far too large for me. There in Kabul, it was just as cold as back home in Germany! Yet Kabul lies on the same latitude as Morocco, the difference, of course, being the Afghani capital's 6000-foot altitude.

As I walked through the wind-blown streets, cursing the weather, I noticed that I had reached the big new office building which housed the studios of Radio Afghanistan. Only three weeks earlier I had been quite unaware that Radio Afghanistan broadcast in German. But very soon I found myself sitting there every morning, answering questions from shortwave fans in Europe. Some days I read the news and commentary, helped out in the editorial office, or did outside reports such as one from the Kabul Museum.

I must admit that there was no money in it. Afghanistan is a poor country and its radio station, built with German development aid, is no exception. In any case, everyone there expects all Europeans to come loaded with their own money. The foreign service of Radio Afghanistan broadcasts in German, Russian, English and Urdu (spoken in Pakistan). An engineer, a student of German, a Professor of Economics and a merchant work in the German service. They are permanently employed and come to the studios for two hours daily, five days a week. And they get a real salary, 1200 Afghanis a month. That works out at only \$15.00, but that's a good deal by Afghan standards; for instance, you can buy an excellent dinner for only 35¢.

Dr. Asimi, the Head of the German Section, thrust the latest newscast right into my band as soon as I went in. I was supposed to correct the translation. "Prime Minister Indira Gandhi was brought down to earth yesterday morning at London's Heathrow Airport..." Wellthat didn't sound quite right for the grande dame of Indian politics. She had landed there. -But I was told not correct every mistake. "We don't want to start sounding like the Deutsche Welle," Dr. Asimi explained to me, "We want to keep the local color," I was only to correct real howlers. This kept me fully occupied right up to recording time at 6:30 pm.

In the studio, first, the engineer read the news. It was a good thing that we were not live on the air. The programme is only broadcast at 10 pm, local time. But our listener in Central Europe do hear the broadcast at 6:30 pm, their time, three and one-half hours earlier.

Then a German tune was played between the news and the second programme item; this is done daily. Then, on Mondays, it was time for mailbag. I took the script from my pocket and begans "Hello and good evening, shortwave fans in Germany!" ...Everyone who received a QSL card had to be mentioned by name, and everyone who had sent a correct reception report, giving programme content, frequency, time and reception quality received such a card. This is standard international practice; many listeners wrote telling us to hurry up and send the card, since they needed it for a contest.

I worked for a total of two months in the German Service of Radio Afghanistan. As a going-away present I received a beautiful alabaster ashtray with carefully-made inlays, one of the many handcrafted products for which Afghanistan is femous. It had been fun working there, but the air and sea connections to India were open again, and Kabul was getting colder and colder....

# Andy Kerr: "A System of Record Keeping for the DXer"

If your log and record keeping system is like mine was, you have my sympathy. Mine consisted of a loose leaf notebook of those pre-printed log forms, which gave space for the date, time, frequency, SINPO, and brief program details. There just wasn't enough room for other information, such as power, geographical coordinates, QSL data, etc. A considerable amount of station data had to be stored in your own head, which, after a while, starts to fade! If I wanted to check when I first heard a station, I had to remember the year I heard it, open my log and scan the listing until I located it. If I wanted to know the power of a station, it meant digging thru old World Radio and Television Handbooks. Not too efficient, right?

Well, I came across (purely by accident) a system which is a vast improvement. It consists of a series of punchcards - cards with a row of holes punched along the outer rim of the card. Information is stored on the card by writing specific details on the card, and related holes are punched on the card corresponding to the written information. For example, one hole might stand for all stations you've heard operating with one kiloWatt power or less. With all such specified stations, that hole would be notched. When you want to know all the "kiloWatt-or-less" stations you've heard, you simply stack the cards, insert the sorting rod, and all the cards listing stations with one kiloWatt or less fall off, and there's your list! This can be done for any bit of information you want to store. The beauty of this system is that the cards can be stacked in any order.

The way my system is set up, I could obtain a list of all Colombians operating in the 49 meter band (that I've heard) that have been QSLed, with 10 kiloWatts of power or less.

A commercial source of these cards is Indecks of Arlington, Vermont. They have several styles available. I'm using their Research Deck. They are  $5\frac{1}{2} \ge 8$  inch cards with two rows lining the outside edges. I've recorded the following information on each card for each station: name of station, loca-

tion, geographical coordinates, SINPO, time, frequency, I've notched for meter band. date heard, QSL data, program details, & power. location, date, power and I soon will have information regarding the bearing and distance in kilometers. You can add whatever you want. Indecks provides for

simple instructions for setting up and maintaining a system such as this one. Plan on spending a few spare days on it; if you've been DXing for a few years, it may take that long. But once set up, it's easy to maintain. One word of caution though: Plan and execute each step carefully. It will insure the accuracy of your system.

Of course, the system has its disadvantages. As mentioned, it's time consuming to set up. Another disadvantage is cost. Indecks offers an introductory system which includes 200 index cards and 10 code cards, sorting rods, etc. for about \$10. You'll find it well worth it!

#### YOUR FAVORITE ONES

Ever wonder who that fellow or girl is on the other side of the mike? Perhaps you also wonder how some of the big DXers got started in radio... or just someone who is not all that famous, but is the backbone which makes up the technical work for their station? I have planned to interview many people in this area who have contributed their efforts in making radio listening more enjoyable. Let's begin with a person whom some of you might know. He is PAUL RENARD, of Radio Belgium.

Paul is 23 years old and is currently a student of law at Brussels University. He works at RTB and, along with Jackie Marshall, they present some wonderful programs. I æsked Paul how long he had been with Radio Belgium and he replied, "Only a year". He first got started in 1963 when he obtained his first SW receiver, a Heath GR64. Then, "I wanted to listen to ham QSO's but, instead, discovered the wonderful world of shortwave broadcasting. At the present time I have about 200 QSLs from 180 countries. It is very important for a DX editor to remain active in the hobby. Now, I have the chance to realize a dream- to be on the other side of the loudspeaker".

When asked about receiving letters from listeners, and if he really enjoyed getting all of those letters, he could only say, "Well, I hope so. I am always very happy to receive letters, and the reception reports are always confirmed by QSL cards. As I make a program for DXers, I think that the listeners do most enjoy DX tips and news, but I'm open to all suggestions".

Also at this point I asked Paul what he most enjoyed about working at Radio Belgium, and he replied, "I most enjoy the friendliness and kindness of everyone at Belgian radio. I would like to give thanks to the engineers and secretaries. They give the best of themselves to make the DX programs possible. I hope that the listeners are also able to feel that kindness in their relations with the Belgium Radio and TV. We try to satisfy each listener, but we are not the NASA; we cannot give them the MOON!".

Last of all, I asked about his plans for RTB in the near future. "My further plans are to extend DX programs perhaps in more languages, but I am not the boss... I remember that our English DX program is on at 2255 GMT the 4th Monday, and again on 9655 and 15235 at 0055 GMT. This program is presented by Jackie Marshall. The French DX program is broadcast every 4th Sunday at 2345 on the same frequencies. We plan to start a special DX program for European and African listeners soon".
