One of the listeners to that first program was SPEEDXer Bill Smith of IA. Bill comments that "the format reminded me of DX JUKEBOX(formerly of Radio Nederland). The 16-minute show, heard 0112-0128 GMT July 6 moved well and was tight, but was the usual "fluff". The most interesting part to me was the glimpse of the Australian DX Club and other DX clubs half a world away. Other than that, nothing special to me about the program, but we shouldn't judge on the initial broadcast--other than Virginia Brown sounds rather fine!" Any other comments on the program?

It seems that hostess Dody Cowan(she's HIS) was advised by her doctor to slow down" for the benefit of her health. Thus, the Cowans had to end their popular series, and for countless listeners around the world, Tuesdays will never be the same again. (WS)

ITALY ... NOTTURNO ITALIANO is a lengthy program sent out every night to Europe and the Mediterranean Basin from 2130-0400 GMT on 846, 900 and 6060 kHz. It includes three-minute news bulletins on the hour in Italian and English, as well as three-minute bulletins on the hour in hour in French and German. These bulletins are the only source of news available to the target areas from RAI during the night. The musical portions of this all-night program are broadcast through an automated system in Rome. (Taken from "This is The Italian Radio-Television Calling From Rome", a quarterly program publication of RAI. While this booklet is available in several languages(including English), the contents are mainly concerned with Italian-language programs broadcast by RAI. MONGOLIA.."Radio Ulan Bator broadcasts a musical program on the last Saturday GMT of each month. On June 27 the program featured Mongol-ian marching music. 12070 kHz at 1220 GMT is the best frequency for the Hawaiian area."(<u>Tanigawa</u>, HI).....That's the best bet for the rest of the USA as well. (WS)

SPAIN ... Spanish Foreign Radio has changed the schedule for its RADIO CIUB AMERICA program. It is now heard at 0020, 0120 and 0550 GMT <u>Mondays(GMT)</u> on 9630 and 11880. (<u>Kevin Davidson</u>, SC)......(Charley Hoffman, PA in <u>RIB</u> #54):"On June 14, SFR broadcast a letter from a concerned listener who heard rumors that SFR English Service would



soon be dropped. The unknown male announcer's reply: Due to financial problems around Christmas things did look uncertain, but for now it looks like we'll stay on the air. (He) mentioned that a little over 100 listeners wrote in, concerned about the fate of RADIO EXTERIOR DE ESPAÑA the English Service."

SURINAM...(Via WWDXC via <u>RIB</u> #54)...Part of Radio Apintie's program schedule which might be of interest to "Our Friends Abroad": <u>Mon</u> 0230-0330 CLASSICAL PROGRAMME; <u>Tue</u> 0230-0430 SWING LOW IN FULL STEREO--100% music with universal character. In this programme, music has no boundaries, especially between classical and non-classical music. Anboundaries, especially between classical and non-classical music. An-nouncements are kept to a strict minimum. Also Wed-Sat 0230-0430, Sun 0330-0430; Thu, Fri, Sat at 0430, a special request programme where you can phone in your request...A program projected on every one working late at night, i.e. nurses, waiters, police, etc., even you abroad! 0530-0630 GRAN MORGOE (Good Morning), a program for the late workers at night providing information such as news, horoscope, humor, mixed with local and South American music. Also meant for Surinamers abroad. Daily sign on at 0830 GMT with program in Hindi (5006 kHz).

UNITED ARAB EMIRATES...UAE Radio broadcast its first MAILBAG program on July 12. It was heard at 1645 GMT on 21650. Host Glenn Jones read some listener letters, gave information about the station and played some music. Two songs that were presented on the program were English language songs about Dubai and the UAE. The lyrics to one of these "local" songs went "Come and See the UAE...It's The Place to Be, the UAE"! NEW PANASONIC RADIOS... As displayed in their new catalog just received from Japan. Leading the list is the RF-9000. A large set measuring about the same size as the Grundig "Satellit" series. Features include LCD readout to within 1 khz. Direct access (keypad) tuning, Conventional "knob" tuning, 15 memory channels, 3 bandwidth positions, built-in 24 hour clock/timer with 24 hour format, Timer can be programmed to change to up to 4 stations/day over a 7 day period. Power supply will operate on 115/230 volts and set can also be powered from 8 "D" size batteries (+12v.) Seperate RF gain, AF gain and treble/bass tone controls. A real nice looking set! Probably will be very expensive!......Frequency coverage looks like 150 khz: thru 30 mhz. and 88-108 Mhz. (FM).....Next is the new RF-6300..looks about the size of the old RF-2900.PLL synthesizer tunes 150khz. thru 30 mhz.?? plus FM band. Knob type digital tuning. Uses green flourescent display on all bands and has conventional "S" meter. Built-in clock (format unknown) with LCD display. Will turn set on in usual "clock-radio" type function. Has 12 channel memory presets. Two selectivity positions. Seperate AF/RF gain controls, Treble/bass tone controls and BFO pitch control. Will operate from 115/230 volts AC and also 6 "D" cells plus "AA" memory batteries.....

This catalog has retained the older "Command Series", namely the RF-2200, RF-2600, RF-2900 and the RF-4900. Also, of course, is the sub-compact RF-085. (Maybe one of these days, they will come out with a similar set in the "Mister Thin" series! That would really be a useful shirt pocket radio!!)

INTERNATIONAL SHORTWAVE STATIONS,....maintain their "frequencies" via the "ITU" (International Telecommunications Union) in Switzerland. A register is kept there, along with a coordinating committee. "On paper", the countries who are ITU members (all countries are not!) agree to share the available frequencies and targets areas in a way such as to minimize interference (QRM). As stated, this is a "paper" agreement which is sometimes flagrantly ignored by some members. (The USSR for example!) Cther ways "ground" the agreement, are operation "out-of-band" etc. Jamming is another "violation" of the sharing agreement as well. (Again the USSR is the prime violator here!) These frequencies are re-shuffled several times a year to compensate for changes in seasonal variations of the ionosphere, and resultant propagation changes. Also there might be slightly different bands in use for say Spring 1980 and Spring 1981, for a given radio path, due to an annual change in the ionosphere. This being in an 11 year cycle. (The so-called: 11 year Sunspot cycle) Other things might force last minute changes, such as unusual absorption, very unsettled geomagnetic conditions, or other reasons for a short-term change in the ionosphere which would make the "assigned" bands unusable. This is the reason for last-minute changes in a particular SW station's broadcast frequencies, from the "published" or scheduled list.

As to the mechanics of changing frequency of the transmitter....this is done by changing crystal oscillators (very high stability ones) or simply "dialing" up the correct frequency on the station's "synthesizer". The synthesizer being "locked" to a very stable Crystal "standard" of course. The transmitters are very easily tuned for different frequencies within a given band, 19 meters for instance. When the bands are changed quite a few controls must be "re-tuned". This being done manually in older transmitters and automatically to preset positions in later transmitters. Along with this, the antenna array must be switched as well. In some instances, this must be done <u>manually</u>, much is a power company linesman flips switches on a power pole with a "hot-stick". In more medern stations, it is simply a matter of puching a button! Due to these recents, some stations may require 10-15 minutes to implement a frequency change, whilst others can do the same thing in a much shorter time. Of course, if there is more than one transmitter at the site, it can be done in a second or less. Many of the "shoestring" SW orerations are unable to do this instantaneous a change!

Antenna systems vary from simple vertical "marconi" omnidirectionals, to very elaborate "curtain" arrays, capable of high gain. The "Norconi" is basically a single band device, where "curtain" arrays and "log-periodic" arrays will operate over a band or several bands without retuning. Schemes are used to "steer" the "beam" of a given antenna array without actually moving the antenna. Some Yagi or log-periodic arrays are actually rotated (in the fashion of a TV antenna or amateur antenna) to direct the signals in the proper direction. Other electronic tricks are employed to increase the "gain" of the antenna by narrowing the "beam" of radio signals. This results in a measureable and sometimes VERY considerable increase in signal strength at the receiver site. This has the same effect as increasing the actual transmitter power. I will not attempt to go into the mechanics of this, as it becomes very theoretical and difficult to understand!

THE HIDDEN RADIO BY ENRIQUE GORDON

It was an era in which Venezuelan radio was not the entity that we know today, similar to a jukebox with ads, and as such should be the beginning of another of those stories that try to reaffirm that "those were the good old days." But unfortunately the history of Venezuelan radio in its earliest days is not very clear and, although many writers have attempted to clarify the events of that period, the majority have failed. The usual cause of this failure is that, for unknown reasons, the earliest period, between 1926 and 1943, is missing from the official archives. In the records of the Telecommunications Directorate there is not a single document relating to the first 22 years of broadcasting in Venezuela. Although interested official spokesmen assure that "these documents were not filed", such assurances can be doubted since the official history of Venezuelan radio lies buried within the Official Gazette of Venezuela, and all that one has to do is to recopy it. It is a work that requires patience and time, but once done it produces some curious revelations.

Radio broadcasting in Venezuela began on May 23, 1926 with the first transmissions of AYRE Broadcasting Central in Caracas. However, the negotiations for the establishment of that station began two years previous to that date when, in 1924, General Juan Vincente Gomez granted a "special permit" to Coronel Arturo Santana to "introduce, sell, lease and set up in Venezuela, aparatus for private service limited to radio concerts".

By 1924 an important industrial and exporting sector had been developed beginning with the takeover of power by General Gamez in December of 1908. This sector, thanks to continuous trips to the United States and Europe, knew of the existence of radio broadcasting in other parts of the world, since by 1922 there were 500 stations in the United States, and by 1924, regular service was available in Luxembourg, Russia, Austria and Spain. This situation was a strong argument before General Gamez, who suspected it might be used in opposition to his government. His fears were overcome, however, and the permit was granted to Coronel Santana, the aide-de-camp of his son, Jose Vincente Gamez, and who had the political assistance of his son and other persons closely linked to the regime.

In 1926, two years later, AYRE became the company "selling, leasing and setting up apparatus of a private service limited to radio concerts", and in doing so became the first radio station in Venezuela. AYRE began broadcasting on Sunday May 23, 1926 with a concert dedicated to General Gomez by the co-owner of the station. The program was heard that day in the principal square of Caracas, by means of three receivers located high in the building situated at the foot of the plaza, today the site of the Town Hall. At that time there were only a few people who owned receivers, and this privileged few had to pay a monthly tax to AYRE which had a monopoly on the sale of same. Thus, Venezuelan radio was born as an entity closely linked to the interests of Juan Vincente Gomez.

The broadcasts of AYRE only lasted for two years for in 1928 its broadcasts were suspended for unstated "official reasons". The generally accepted reason, however, was that Jose Vincente, son of the "General" and one of the principal stockholders of the company was suspected of conspiring against his father, the General, and the station was ordered closed down to prevent its being used against the regime.

AYRE had, however, created a public following for broadcasting and provided the means to enjoy it. Thus, in the absence of AYRE, those with receivers like Stromberg Carlson and Resco & Co., which were able to receive foreign stations whose signals crossed into Venezuela without any problems, were able to tune in stations like POJ from Holland, and WZXAD from New York in the 31 meter band.

In 1930, Broadcasting Caracas, the second Venezuelan radio station began transmissions. This was a station that began as an outgrowth of "The American Department Store", a business directed by Sr. Edgard Anzola and owned by William H. Phelps, then the principal importer of electrical appliances, automobiles, and tires. About the birth of Broadcasting Caracas, today Radio Caracas, the records are a bit contradictory. Although it actually began transmitting on December 9, 1930, the permit or official licence to initiate broadcasts was not granted until two years later on March 11, 1932 under resolution 47 of the Department of Statistics and Communications of the Ministry of Development as is recorded in the Official Gazette 17.676 on the above mentioned date. This is very interesting to say the least for it is hard to believe that, during a period of so much repression, punctuated by the events of 1928, a radio station could broadcast for two years without any type of permit, even an unofficial one.

THE HIDDEN RADIO(cont)

At the time the official permit was granted to Broadcasting Caracas the new Regulations for Broadcasting were only a few months old. The fourth of the 35 Articles of these Regulations, issued on January 19, 1932 provides that "The Federal Executive, through the Ministry of Development, is the only one permitted to construct such stations(radio), but it shall be able to permit private parties to construct and operate them as concessionaires or permitees." It is an ironic note that at that time there was only one radio station, Broadcasting Caracas and that was, as we have indicated, strictly a private business venture.

The first Regulation of 1939 formalized the granting of licenses to establish and operate radio stations. From then on, Juan Vincente Gomez began to encourage the industry. Among the first beneficiaries we have Luis Mantellini Jr. who received a license to install Radiodifusora Maracaibo in the State of Zulia, Vincente Vissiani for the station "Sello Rojo" in Caracas, Pedro Bermudez for La Voz del Lago in Maracaibo, Zulia, Herman Degwitz for Radiodifusora Venezuela in Caracas, etc.

In all, General Gomez awarded 15 licenses for radio stations between the years 1924 and 1935. These first stations were established, originally, in Maracaibo and Caracas, the cities with the greatest income per capita. So, as Professor Pasquali has indicated, "the population of the country thus received radio broadcasting services not in accordance with its social, cultural needs or the common good, but in direct relation to its wealth."

Juan Vincente Gomez not only stimulated the growth of private broadcasting, but he was proud of this growth and the loyalty of the industry to his regime. For this reason, in 1935 he issued an official invitation to poets and musicians to submit entries for a hymn for the Venezuelan radio industry since "the signal strength that the national broadcasting industry had acquired called for a special Anthem that should be an expression linking the stations of the Republic among themselves and their contact with foreigners." The spirit of the hymn, he said in his invitation, ought to express the growth of the broadcasting industry under the Regime of Rehabilitation.


It was an ironic pride for the only broadcasting that had grown was the private broadcasting sector as an industry. On November 23, 1935 the verdict of the judges was announced and the winning poem was written by Jose I. Pineda and included these words in its first stanza:

> I am called by the motto, culture and progress mission: of my fatherland the privilege to tell other countries, speak their warlike songs, Venezuela speaks words of peace.

The music for this hymn was programed by all stations in Venezuela for December 19, 1935 as part of a program celebrating a new anniversary of the date "on which the worthy General Juan Vincente Gomez, with his great patriotic spirit and strong arm of reform, laid the foundation of the freat work to which the Republic owes its growth in the benevolent work of peace, founded and consolidated by him." Naturally, the broadcasting industry of that time was disposed to play its part in the "great date."

The program never took place however, as the death of Gomez was announced on December 18, 1935. Buried, the "General" became the "Dictator." The protests and proclamations began to be felt. Those who were friends and "collaborators" of Gomez began to deny their friendship and loyalty. The broadcasting industry likewise forgot, and tried to forget they had acquired the power they displayed from Gomez.

Broadcasting Caracas then became Radio Caracas and all the history about the first years of operation remained quietly dispersed. It is possible that many feel that it is of no interest to assemble such facts but, if so, why did they pay for a series of books filled with anecdotes without political, cultural or social context and title it "The History of the Venezuelan Broadcasting Industry."

WELL, ANOTHER MONTH, ANOTHER COLUMN. It has been very quiet on the Western Hemisphere DX front and on the DXing front generally. The Canadian NABET strike is still going on. The technicians have been joined by the postal workers, who are striking over maternity benefits, as I understand it. This explains the dearth of reports from our faithful Canadian friends, such as Wilf Stone, this month. In fact, there is a possibility of a postal strike in the United States before this bulletin is mailed -- you might not be reading this right now!

AGOSTO,

I WOULD LIKE TO REITERATE SOME OF THE GROUND RULES FOR CONTRIBUTING TO THIS COLUMN. First, you should report only SWBC stations to this column. Point-to-point transmissions, even feeders of SWBC stations, should be sent to the Utilities column; time signal stations should also be sent there. Western Hemisphere relays of Eastern Hemisphere radio stations should be filed under the country where the transmitter is located, not under the country from which the program originates. My deadline for receiving reports is the 12th of the month -- so those from the West Coast or overseas should mail their reports on the 5th or 6th of the month to get them here on time. Those in the East can wait until the 7th or 8th to mail. You should use SPEEDX report forms, available from HQ for a nominal sum, and PLEASE PRINT LEGIBLY OR TYPE your loggings. Illegible loggings go into File 13 and are not counted as a contribution. You should cut your loggings apart before you send them (cutting 2000 or so loggings apart would be a monstrous, job), and it is best to mail them in a business-size envelope, so that they don't bunchup or foul the U.S.P.S.'s machines. Make sure that your loggings are complete, and that all relevant information is given. In this category, too, should go some thought as to exactly what you are contributing. If you are contributing the 20th logging of 4832 R. Reloj, and just have in the program "tik, mx, ID, more tlk, ads," your chances of getting the premier spot in the logging are slim. You should contribute only your best loggings. You should also try to give more information about what you heard -- was it news, were there any items you understood, did you hear the ID, what was the ID text, etc. This way your loggings will be more informative for the membership in general.

ACCORDING TO VARIOUS SOURCES, the address for the new R. San Martin in Peru is: Casilla 169, Tarapoto. This is in response to several requests for information.

I suppose that a short reintroduction would not hurt anyone -- in the slow months of each year it is good to have some filler material. 



More on the proposed format change ......

Basically the ute column will be rotated 90 degrees and setup into a 2 column wide page. Compared to the now standard 9 page format, the rotated column will compress the same amount of data into roughly 7 pages. This will free up to 2 pages for:

(a) to better handle contributor/volume increases, with fewer logging cuts... (b) allow more room for informational articles (which have been well received by the utes)

In order to accommodate 2 columns side by side, their line lengths will be decreased by 1.5 inches. So a much wider use of abbreviations will be needed. In some instances, abbreviation usage will allow more data on the station, to be included, along with the logging.

Plans are to use either the now standard format or the rotated format, dependent upon monthly submission volume, &/or informational article needs.

The rotated format, (if approved by Speedx HQ) will run next month......

It is an experiment, and as such, your comments, pro or con will be wanted. I won't force the rotated format on you, if the majority opinion is aganist it. But I must be frank. Don't be fooled by the current events. Summer is traditionally a slow season for indoor activites like short wave monitoring/reporting. Currently 33% of all the listed utes are reporting in. So you active contributors are realizing very high submission/ print out ratios. This will change as we enter the busy fall/winter season.

The rotated format is my attempt to squeeze in as much submitted data as possible. In effect, the rotated format will give the ute column an equivalent of 11 standard pages.

Informational articles (there are now 6 in various stages of completion) will run either in the standard or rotated format, dependent upon line spaces needed and the article layout arrangement.

**** Question: What would you like to see covered in an upcoming informational article??? Also, if you have data, which you'd think would make for a good article, send it to me.

The abbreviations & terminology list, as stated before, covers a wide area of ute comms. Covered is: abbreviations used & to be used in this column. Terminology heard over the airwaves, or other terms applicable to ute endevours. Not every conceivable abbreviation is listed, nor is it the same for the terminology, but it is, nevertheless, a very comprehensive list. It is geared specifically to the Speedx ute column. So many of the newly assembled abbreviations maybe undecipherable to a ute editor of another SW club. Whether the rotated format is adopted or not, the abbreviation list will be used, starting with the next months column.

So please send me an SASE (#10 size envelope) or 1 IRC for overseas utes, and indicate that you want the abbreviations and terminology list.

## TIME AND FREQUENCY STANDARD STATIONS

by Leon Kanopka

Standard time and frequency stations are radio stations that transmit extremely accurate. time signals on highly calibrated frequencies. The frequency and time signals are usually calibrated to several cesium beam time and frequency standards, which are compiled by computers, to give extremely accurate time and frequencies, usually within one part in 100 billion (1  $\times 10^{-11}$  minutes or hertz). These standards are usually located in the laboratories of the agency that owns the transmitters, and are often checked against the worldwide standards maintained by the Bureau international de l'heure, using portable clocks.

The accuracy of these stations is deceiving, though, because the frequency can be altered slightly by the ionisphere, and the time signal can be delayed, for example, by the time it takes for the signal to travel from the transmitter to your receiver. For example, I once tuned in WWV on one radio, and CHU on another. I hooked up the output of both radios to a dual trace oscilloscope, to see if the time pipe matched, and I discovered that the CHU pip was arriving before the WWV pip. This difference was only microseconds, so it would not make much of a difference in normal usage. For normal shortwave listening these delays are unimportant, although they can be critical for such things as navigation, and astronomy. Most of these stations also broadcast information on UT1, a time scale based on the rotation of the earth. This is an important time scale for navigation and tracking objects in orbit, like satellites. This scale never differs from UTC by more than .8 seconds, because UTC is altered to keep up with UT1, which is irregular, and changes as the earth speeds up and slows down. This is the reason why the leap-second (extra second) was added to all WWV, and most other time signal transmissions at the end of June, to keep UTC within one second of UT1. This difference between UTC and UT1 can be determined to the nearest .1 second, by a system of emphasised or doubled used by most time stations. This scale is also unimportant in shortwave listening, but if more information is desired, one can write to the individual stations.

Despite these unimportant, at least to the shortwave hobbyist, uses and problems with time and frequency standard stations, there are still many things that they can help the SWL with. The obvious is for the time, and also for checking tuning dials for accuracy, but some stations also transmit information about propagation. This can be extremely helpful, and can let you know if tonight is the night to try for that "hot" DX catch. This can get complicated, and I don't know that much about the technicalities involved with propagation, but I do know enough to be useful in my hobby, and I will explain how to desipher these informative broadcasts in the future. These stations also transmit weather alerts and emergency information.

These stations can be found on any part of the shortwave spectrum, although most of them broadcast on 2.5, 5, 10, and 15 megahertz, which are designated as standard carrier frequencies worldwide. All these stations broadcasting on the same frequencies can create extreme problems to hear them in the US, especially when WWV usually blasts in with a 5 signal strength, but sometimes other stations can be picked out from behind WWV with a keen ear. This is how I logged JJY, Japan on 10 MHz. But despite the popularity of these nice even frequencies, some stations can be found on such odd numbered frequencies as: 4856, 8167.5, and 12008 kilohertz!!!

This article is an introduction for other articles I plan to submit. Each one will deal with a particular time station I have heard, and I will supply information about scheduling, frequencies, plus any other information that I may have received from the station. I will also write a brief article on how to use the propagation information broadcast on WWV/WWVH to help in your DXing. Next time I will deal with VNG, an Australian time standard station.

# THE ANARCY GUIDE TO DX CLUBS

As the shortwave hobby becomes more popular, and DXers begin to specialize in their pursuits, the number of DX Clubs has begun to proliferate. This poses a problem to the DXer. What club will I join?? Thus, ANARCY, the umbrella organization for DX Clubs in North America has come up with this directory of DX Clubs and publications. With this in hand, the DXer can save considerable time and money by writing only to the clubs he/she may be interested in. Thus, without further ado.....The Anarcy Guide to DX Clubs.

<u>ANARCY</u>: Not really a club, but the umbrella organization for all DX clubs in North America. Similar to the UN in more ways than one. These include not only SW clubs, but TV/FM, BCB, LW and VHF DX clubs. ANARCY's major function each year is to sponsor the annual ANARCY convention, where DXers from all over the world gather to talk shop, swap stories, and attend various and sundry seminars. Some of the more controversial topics covered at ANARCHY conventions include, "Defining Radio Countries - Or Why Uzbec SSR Counts and Transkei does not". Kurt Waldheim guest speaker. "Pirate Time Stations - Has Free Radio Gone Too Far???", and this years topic, "1610 kHz, BCB or SW - The Case of the Caribbean Beacon Station."

Critique of International Broadcasting: Not really a club either, although it sometimes gives that appearance, CRIB is a magazine for the discriminating DXer, published by one of America's top DXers. CRIB emphasizes the programming side of the hobby, and encourages listener contributions. The editor prides himself on detailed/exact info, and only through CRIB will a SWL learn the <u>exact</u> frequency of Radio Free Grenada (15045.637v kHz.), the latest harmonic information on La Voz del Istmo in Panama, or the current activities of a 10 watt FM pirate in West Berlin.

American Listening Club of Shortwave: The ALCSW has been around a long time. From the inception of ANARCY, this club has been surrounded by controversy. When ANARCY began publishing this directory, in alphabetical order, other clubs protested because the ALCSW was always listed first, giving it the inside track on new members. Later, the club shocked the DX world by publishing its magazine on yellow paper. It ain't pretty, but it glows in the dark, making late night DX a breeze. The club's major 1980 project involved the purchase of a new staple machine. It works great - last month it took one crowbar and 3 DXers to pry my magazine open.

Northern Continental Shortwave Association: Radio historians are not sure, but it seems the NCSWA invented DXing. Or at least that is what one would think after reading the club's definitive work "DXing According to US", distributed to all new members. This club deals with SWEC only, and the novice who reports a Latin Harmonic as SWEC can expect to be severely reprimanded. The club has a strict set of rules regarding what counts as SWEC. Stations below 2000 kHz do not, and pirate stations must have at least one paid staff member and a hook-up to one major wire service before their loggings will be printed. The NCSWA has even transcended DXing and entered the world of international politics. Renegade revolutionary groups have strugged to make their enclave "independent" for at least one year, so that they may gain acceptance on the NCSWA's coveted "Radio Country List." NCSWA's acceptance criteria is tougher than even the UN's, and membership here is considered a prerequisite to US foreign aid.

<u>SPEEDXRx</u>: The newest of the major clubs, and an instant hit among the young DXers. <u>SPEEDXRx</u> emphasizes active participation, and has established a caste system to separate its members. The "Untouchables" include those who merely subscribe. The Middle Class includes those who may contribute to the magazine six or seven times a year. The upper limits include those whocontribute a minimum of 265 times a year. Reaching this plateau allows one to become a Full Member, and the DXer is now entitled to a wide range of "perks", such as pre-printed Urdu report forms for QSLing Pakistani regional stations. The club derives its name from the fact that many full members become addicted to speed while trying to keep up the grueling pace required to maintain full membership. After two or three years most members burn out, and turn to the leisurely pace of SWLing through CRIB magazine.

<u>World-Wide Video-FM Club</u>: Fed up with the boob tube? Then this club is not for you. These guys constantly scan weather reports, listen to WWV propagation forcasts, etc., looking for that tropospheric ducting or that sporadic E-skip that will give them the thrill of watching "Different Strokes" from Tulsa, OK rather than their native Miami. One advantage, this type of DX only happens once every 127 days, giving you the rest of the year to lead a normal social life. 'Nuff said......

Lowdown DX Club: What can I say? This club specializes in longwave, (yes, longwave) DX. Membership requirements are tough. For starters, you must be wealthy enough to own acres

of land in order to accommodate the huge beverage arrays required for longwave DX. Excepting a few Eurasian BC stations, LW DX mainly consists of listening for radio beacons that send one, two, or three letter CW ID's over and over and over..... This is a club that caters to people fed up with all types of programming - TV, BCB and SW.

National Club of Radio/Internal Radio Club of America: Like to collect QSL's? Then these two clubs are just for you, as they deal strictly in MW (AM Band to the uninformed) DX. With over 4000 outlets in the US alone, any hundreds of call letter changes every year, you will never run out of QSL possibilities. MW DXers can often by spotted at ANARCY conventions carrying three or four suitcases of QSL's. They are infatuated with hetrodynes and some disease called "split frequencies". They also have special seminars at their convention with psychiatrists in attendance. Why? Tune across the MW band for 15 or 20 minutes. Chances are, with all the "Top 40" stations around, you'll hear "Da Doo Doo, Da Da Da Da" by the Police 37 times. Do this every night for a year, and you'd go crazy too!!!!!!!

# EDXC CONFERENCE '81

**TIDBITS** WAR OF THE AIRWAVES: Wolfman Jack is but a puppy compared to this disc jockey. For the past 25 years his ratings have been as high as those of Johnny Carson or Monday night football. Loyal listeners have been known to mob airports when he comes to town. And he may be the only DJ ever to be honored at a special White House reception. This wonder of the air waves is Willis Conover! If the name doesn't ring a bell, it's not supposed to—unless you happen to live in, say, Monrovia, Liberia, or Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. Few Americans ever hear Conover's popular "Music USA" program because it is broadcast on shortwave radio. And the transmitters are located in Germany, Britain, Greece, Liberia, Morocco, Philippines, and Sri Lanka. It is a program of the Voice of America, a US government funded international radio network.

"Music USA" and similar programs are serving in an old but growing war-"the war of the airwaves." Dating from World War II, this "war of the airwaves" is today expanding on all

fronts and involving many nations. On any given day, music, news, interviews and other types of programs are fired across international borders by some of the world's great powers. The chief combatants in this "war"are the US and the USSR. Each year they spend tens of millions of dollars to fuel their radio combat. Broadcast services on each side have assignments to create as favorable an image as possible of their countries and their systems of government in the minds of listeners around the world.

To each side it is very serious business. At the Voice of America, for example, programs are beamed around the world in forty different languages running the gumut from French. Spanish and English to the more remote languages such as Uzbek and Hausa. Of the 830 program hours a week of Voice of America, about 211 hours are devoted to English language programs and 168 hours are in languages of the Soviet Union, primarily Russian, Next on the list is Arabic. with more than 52 hours a week. About forty percent of the air time is given to music-everything from soul to "Yankee Doodle Dandy." The rest is a mix. anything from talk about the best-selling American books to interviews on the state of American science or farming. A popular feature involves answering questions sent in by listeners. Then there is the news. It is here that a VOA broadcaster wears two hats-that of the journalist and that of a US government spokesperson. John Chancellor, the NBC anchorman, once served as head of the VOA. He says the Voice stands "at the intersection of journalism and diplomacy"-which is exactly where it is supposed to be. In its charter to the Voice of America, Congress said VOA "will represent America, not any single segment of American society, and will therefore present a balanced and comprehensive projection of American thought and institutions." That is sometimes easier said than done. During the Watergate investigation, which implicated President Nixon in criminal activity, Nixon supporters fought against putting news of Watergate on the air. Since then, however, the pendulum has swung the other way back toward the goal of gaining people's trust by telling everything about the US, including the bad news. "We cannot force people overseas to listen to us, nor can we force them to believe us," says Michael Pistor, a high official of the International Communications Agency, of which VOA is a branch. "Credibility is what brings trust, and it is credibility on which we must build our programs." As a result, the Voice of America has broadcast some incredible news stories. At the top of the list must certainly be the news that an investigation by the US Senate had revealed that the CIA had been involved in plots to kill foreign leaders. It's not the kind of news you'd hear from many other nations, certainly not from Radio Moscow.

One thing Radio Moscow does not do is spend much time reporting bad news about the USSR. Apart from that, however, much of its programming is similar to that of the Voice of America. There are music, and culture reports, answers to questions from listeners and interviews with Soviet notables. To the Western ear, however, the Russians seem often to do their cause more harm than good by asking listeners to believe a bit more than is really believable. During the war in Vietnam, for example, Radio Moscow said that the US commander in Vietnam, Gen. William Westmoreland, "does his best to see that as many negroes are killed in battle as possible." More recently broadcasts from Loscow have reported "news" about thousands of political prisoners in American jails, the "fact" that US support for Israel is proof of American "hegemonistic (controlling ambitions" in the Middle East, and that Soviet troops are in Afghanistan because of interference in Afghanistan affairs by China, Pakistan and the US. The shooting death of John Lennon provided a special opportunity for Soviet radio. Although the Soviet media had originally condemned the Beatles as an example of corrupt Western culture, Lennon was described as a man persecuted by American authorities because of his devotion to peace. His death was described as but one example of the widespread violence which plagues a decadent American Society.

Whether or not people around the world believe Radio Moscow, the Russians are trying very hard to get their views heard by as many people as possible. They broadcast in more than twice the number of languages as the Voice of America. Soviet broadcasts to Latin America, for example, are not limited to the dominant languages—Spanish and Portuguese—but include various Indian languages such as Quechua. And Moscow's message to Africa is sent in several tribal languages such as Fulani, Bambara and N'debele.

Two years ago, Radio Moscow officials decided to expand their English language programming to 19 hours a day. English broadcasts to Africa were increased by forty-four percent, to the British Isles by forty-three percent, and to Southeast Asia by one hundred-fifty percent. "They are littering the world's airwaves with English," says Richard Meash, who monitors Radio Moscow for the British Broadcasting Corp. "You can be almost anywhere in the world now and hear Radio Moscow." But that strategy of saturating the airwaves could possibly backfire for a reason the Soviets might never have thought of. Both the Russians and the Americans are now the targets in a new war of the airwaves. That new front is a technical one. And the new army is a combined force of poor, so-called "third world" nations. Their complaint? Simply, that the world is running out of radio channels. At a 1979 international conference on radio use, delegates from 100 poor nations tried to persuade developed nations to leave some radio frequencies vacant. This particular skirmish cooled down a bit after US and other delegates agreed to help third world nations develop their own radio systems. But whatever kind of electronic equipment they use, the third world countries should pay as much attention to what goes on the air as to how it goes on the air. Here they might learn a lesson from Radio Moscow's major mistake. Last year, Radio Moscow began beaming English language programs at the southeastern section of the US from a powerful transmitter in Cuba. The new service, however, hasn't exactly got Floridians switching their allegiance from Washington to Moscow. In addition to such musical memories as "When Moldavians Get Together," Floridians have been treated to long interviews with Soviet truck plant workers who explain why they love to work so hard. "I suspect the only people who really listen, are convinced Communists and the CIA," said a US government official quoted in the Los Angeles Times. "Those broadcasts are dull, dull, dull," (Senior Scholastic Magazine, June 20, 1981 via James E. Olson. This is the first time a major school publication has done an article about international broadcasting. Interviews by inaccuracies. Ed.)

TV 'PIRATES' PROWL DUTCH CABLE SYSTEMS: Television stations go off the air around midnight in, the Netherlands, but for those who like late-hour viewing there are the pirates. The country has had a 20-year tradition of pirate radio broadcasting, and now pirates are sending movies and popular serials into local cable-television systems. This is accomplished by transmitting a signal into one of the receiving antennas that are used by cable TV companies. "It's very simple to do and very difficult for us to find," said Lockie Schoor of the postal service, which tries to track down pirate broadcasters. One of the pirate operators agrees with her. "Piracy in the air will never be silenced," he said in an interview with a Dutch newspaper. "For every one of us who is shut down, two more are ready to take over his work. . . The technology offers pirates unlimited possibilities."

The phenomenon of pirate television broadcasts on cable TV networks in the Netherlands appears to be unique in Europe. Many nations have no cable TV at all; in the Netherlands 60% of the homes are hooked to local cable systems. For years, one-man pirate radio stations with cheap souped-up transmitters have been a growing headache to the government, which says they are not only annoying but dangerous. Authorities in The Hague shut down Court City Radio early in January, charging that its signal interfered with radio communications at the nearby military airport. The original radio pirates of the 1960s and 1970s are said to have made millions transmitting pop music and commercials from ships in internetional waters. Parliament member Piet van der Sanden told a committee hearing in December that there are now as many as 10,000 radio pirates in the Netherlands. He said about 2,500 of the pirates illegally broadcast commercials paid for by Dutch businesses.

Schoor said there must be more than 10,000 radio pirates because the postal service, using 16 specially equipped roaming mobile cars, found and shut down 8,000 last year----and the air--

waves are more crowded than ever. One problem is that the arrested pirate often is back on the air the next day, so the service is seeking changes in the law that would keep them shut down. The new television pirates are harder to find and thus are more worrisome. The first one appeared in December, 1979, and since then half a dozen have emerged in the major cities of the western part of the country. Among them are Free Television, Amsterdam, Central Television in The Hague, and Netherlands 3 in Leiden, a tongue-in-cheek reference to a much-discussed proposal for a third government television network. Gerard van Beek of the official Netherlands broadcasting system, based in the city east of Amsterdam, said that so far pirate TV is merely an annoyance. But he concedes the simplicity of making pirate broadcasts through cable systems means it is likely to grow.

With the majority of homes in this nation of 14 million linked to local cable systemsbringing them Belgian, German and in some places British programs as well as the two Dutch stations--all a pirate has to do is point a weak transmitter from close range at the cable receiving dish in each city and the signal goes directly into homes. Viewers do not know what the pirates will be broadcasting or what channel they will appear on. It takes a flicking of the TV dial to find a pirate program. The pirate TV broadcasts must be sent after the official signal has closed down for the night, usually around midnight, because the transmissions merely would garble an official broadcast in progress. Government trackers have not arrested any pirate cable-TV broadcasters. Schoor said they did find a transmitter in Leiden--in a tree. It is illegal to advertise through pirates, but shopowners merely deny that they bought time and are not prosecuted. Under Dutch law the mere broadcast of a commercial does not constitute proof that it was ordered and paid for. The pirate programs apparently are videotaped from other television networks or purchased in cassette form. The emphasis on the regular Dutch television stations is on educational and political news broadcasting. The pirates offer such fare as Westerns and comedy shows in a variety of languages. Many Dutchmen speak French, English or German. The man who operates the pirate Free Television Amsterdam said in a secret interview with the newspaper De Telegraaf that he uses a \$5,000 video recorder and transmitter unit. He added that he hopes to build goodwill among the viewers so that his station can be legalized. (Los Angeles Times, February 4, 1981, via John Bickel)

<u>POSTAGE AND DXING</u>: I am sure every one has written to a station or a fellow DXer before and all of us did write to SPEEDX. When you did, you used the post office whose rates are now very high. All of you have probably spent 40% for a postage stamp in order to send a letter overseas. Well, the post office does offer two cheaper ways to send letters overseas. The first is by surface mail. However, surface mail is very slow and you could wait seven to fifteen months for a QSL. To save one dime, it is not worth it. Another way to save money is by using an Aerograme. Aerogrames can be bought for 30¢ at any post office. The only disadvantage is that you cannot enclose anything inside the envelop. But I do not think they mind if you put in one or two IRC's. By the way, when reporting to the Caribbean, Central America, as well as Columbia and Venezuela, that ½ oz. letter is only 35¢ airmail and not 40¢. (Mike Reid)

<u>TV COURSE FOR 25</u>: Twenty five young Grenadians are now getting a five-week course in television production. Afternoon lectures began at the Grenada Boys' Secondary School (GBSS) on February 9. Principal instructor is Carmen Ashhurst, a TV specialist from the US, now working with Grenada Free Television (GFTV). The course covers theoretical and practical aspects of television production with greater emphasis on practical work, which will take up the last three weeks. Sis Ashhurst said that "everything is basically geared towards putting a programme on the air." Other objectives are to familiarize students with overall functions of a television station, and to discover which students have interest and abilities t o work in that field. Lectures include introduction to equipmentcamera, deck, take, lights, sound and studio, or formulating the approach to a story, target audience, target message, storyboards, format, script preparation and interviews. Other instructors will be Ken Harbin and Elaine Barley of GFTV. There are 17 boys and eight girls on the course, and according to Sis. Ashhurst, the idea for this course came from the urgent need for trained TV personnel in Grenada. Exceptional students will be employed at GFTV. (Free West Indian, February 14, 1981 via Richard Armada)

<u>VERIFYING ASIATIC USSR</u> Although SPEEDX counts the USSR as one country, other clubs such as NASWA and the Miami Valley DX Club count the republics of the USSR as separate countries. One such "country" is the Asian part of the Russian SSR. If you have been trying to log it, it might be easier than you think! Today I opened a letter from Radio Moscow and to my surprise, I had six QSLs. Now, I already had these QSL's but I noticed they had the transmitter sites on five of them. Here is what I found. On 12050 kHz via Khabakovsk; 17170 kHz via Khabakovak; 7260 via Yuzhno-Sakhalinsk (Sakhalin island north of Japan). The only trouble is that Radio Moscow very rarely puts its transmitter sites on its QSLs--even when asked. My only suggestion is log 12050 kHz now that you are sure of the site before they change frequencies as they so often do. (Mike Reid)
