## RADIO OF YESTERYEAR

In 1921, at the age of 12 . I constructed my first radio receiver with the aid of an older boy in our neighborhood, who had previously entered the great hobby of "radio listening". It was a crystal detector radio with its 'cat-whisker', using either a small piece of silicone or galena. The tuner was a tapped variable inductance. The balance consisted of hatdware, hookup wire and a set of inexpensive earphones. My antenna was $50^{\prime}$ of 14 grage single strand copper wire mounted bewteen our house and garage.
The receiver components were mounted on a breadboard. The amazing thing about all this was not the way it looked, but the fact that it did actually work! Picking us such local broadcasts that were "on the air" at that time, this crystal receiver had a listening range of about 30 miles.
My next project was a one vacuum tube in a single circuit receiver with a variable capacitor and inductive tuning. This receiver provided a bit more distant reception. In fact, from my home in Minneapolis, I managed to hear broadcasts from Chicago (about 400 ailes away), but not with great fidelity.
Then I tried my hand at a three tube job known as an "Armstrong Regenerative Receiver". It employed variable capacitance, variable inductance, a series of seitch points or contacts, and a variable resistor known as a "rheostat", samething similar to our present day wire-bound potentiometer. In all, the operator of the regenerative receiver had five controls to adjust when tuning a signal!
The "Armstrong Regenerative" operated on the principle of controlled feedback from a point of higher to lower signal potential. The feeback was controlled by the rheostat", "or what we would today call the volume or gain control. If the operator of a regenerative receiver advances the rheostat too far (past the half-way mark) the receiver would break into oscillation and set up squeals and howls beyond description. In addition to the annoyance that was experienced by the person tuning such a receiver, these noises were fed back into the signal input and from there to the external antenna, then broadcast to other listeners in the neighborhood!
My final experience in "home brew" receivers was a five tube configuration known as the "Neutrodyne circuit". This was a prototype of the "tuned radio frequency" type. This turned out to be a vast improvement over my previous attempts. But, this too had its own built-in evils to plague the listener. Its main problem arouse from the fact that the vacuum tubes would not amplify all carrier frequencies with equal results. Reception was not stable, nor was the fidelity too good, and the tuning of such a unit still required too many knobs and dials.
By the way, most of these early receivers were limited to medium wave reception.
I might mention another chronic complaint of early radio listeners. It was a thing called "body capacity". It manifested itself as follows: If one's hand approached the front panel of the receiver, the radio would go into oscillation and squeal! The human body acted as one plate of a capacitor (the front panel), the dielectric and metal components inside the cabinet acted as the opposite plate, thereby setting up stray or unwanted capacitance!

Early radio experimenters tried to solve "body capacitance" by various means. One was lining the inside surface of the front panel with tin or copper foil, then connecting this shielding to a good ground. This helped, but did not solve the whole problem.

Another gimick involved a remote tuning device which resembled a "plumber's friend". A long handle with a rubber suction cup attached to one end to engage and tune the tuning controls. This kept hands and other parts of the body away from the front panel. It helped some, but not all that much.
of course, all the difficulties of early radio reception were not completely due to poor and inefficient receivers. Transmitters also had not come of age. When the "Armstrong Hazletine superheterodyne" was introduced, radio had arrived! Today, the "super-het" remains the basic circuit for TV and radio receivers. In the early $1920^{\prime} s$, wireless radio was in the "horseless carriage" stage, hardly looked upon as a practical medium for home entertainment. Radio was, for the most part, the concern of hobbyists \& experimenters.

There were a few factory-made radio receivers available at that time, which were both massive and elegant, with prices that regulated their purchase to the affluent few. The performance of those early factory constructed sets were rarely better than the "home brew" type. I recall one such professionally manufactured set that sold for almost $\$ 1000$ (a LOT of money in those days!) and it is amusing to note that a present day $\$ 15.00$ micro mini transistorized radio can out perform anything made in those days by far!

RCI, 9535, 9755, 1782021695, do it yourself cds in an average of 55 days (Krist-VA), (Thompson-NM), (Taylor-AZ), (Park-HI).

## RECEIVER REVIEW

## YAESU FRG-7700

I purchased this receiver in Harch from Gilfer for $\$ 725$ with the memory option. As a replacement for my unmodified RF-2800 the FRG was an immediate improvement. Of course this is as it should be. The RF-2800 had been purchased for $\$ 195$ new.
Frequency stability was the first improvement appreciated. I have yet to find the receiver to be off frequency or to drift at all. Using the 2.4 kHz narrow filter option identification of a station by frequency is often possible.

The memory suffers from often being 1 kHz off when set. This is easily correctable by turning the memory fine tuning one kHz to the left or returning the set to Gilfer. I chose the former option and find this problem to be very minor indeed. At first I planned to buy the receiver without the memory but now I'm happy I didn't. Programming a set of frequencies for the nights DXing makes for very enjoyable listening. Identification of stations by parallel frequencies can be done with ease by alternating between a tuned frequency and the parallel on memory.

The sensitivity of the set seems to be good to excellent. Only on 90 meters have I failed to log good DX. The problem on this band is probably my rather short outside antema; 50 ft . long wire and two 50 ft . center fed dipoles aimed north-south and eastwest respectively. I have lengthened the long wire to 100 ft . and hope to improve reception.

Like the RF-2800 the set can be used by a young DXer. My son Larry and his friend Eric, both 11 at the time, began DXing with RF-2800's and RF-2200's. Using these receivers they managed to $\log$ and verify rather rare third world 60 meter stations. With a little help writing letters to the stations, an excellent collection of QSL cards was built. Several of my son's Jr. and Sr. High School friends have used the FRG after about four minutes of instruction in its use.
My criticism of the set is that the 12 hour clock should be a 24 hour variety. Also, the attenuator must be kept in a almost full counterclockwise position to be usable.
In September I purchased an MFJ 1045 preselector. Using this I feel that the improvement in the general quality of the set as a $D X$ instrument is about $50 \%$. After reading the criticisms of the 1040 in the 1981 WRTVH, I feel that these problems do not apply to the 1045 to the degree described for the 1040. The DXer must watch that the 1045 is tuned to the correct band and frequency. Tuned to the wrong band or frequency, spurious stations will be received. Below 4 MHz care must be given to harmonics of medium wave stations. In the South Florida area many of these are in Spanish adding to misidentification if one is careless. The 1045 can be easily disengaged by pressing the on/off button thus making identification of the above problems simple. By reducing the gain these problems can also be reduced or corrected. But once the frequency is lowered to 2370 I find the 1045 to be of little use. All sorts of harmonics and false images are encountered. But let me restate that above 3 MHz I have found no major problems with false images. It is somewhat difficult to gage the increase of strength between the 1045 on and off because there is a slight loss in strength between the antenna directly connected and the antenna connected through the 1045 in the off position. But generally speaking stations "in the mud" become audible and weak signals become rather strong. I would suggest the purchase of the above combination of equipment for those looking for sensitivity, selectability and ease of use.

MEMORY OPTION
ON USJNG MEMORU

Now that more and more shortwave receivers have a memory option available for storing frequencies I would like to present one method of using memory.

Anyone that has a receiver with the memory option probably selects their favorite stations to save into the menory. This procedure is great except when the time comes to recall the saved stations. I find myself searching my mind's memory for what stations are where or I search for the memory log sheet. This sheet contains the corresponding memory position numbers for the given stations. Both of these methods are cumbersome and too time consuming.
A more efficient method is to store the permanent stations, ones unlikely to change, on the high end of the memory. My FRG-7700 has 12 memory positions, 1 through 12. I store my favorite stations such as Radio Canada International, BBC, Radio New Zealand, etc. . . in the 7 through 12 positions. I now have positions 1 through 6 available to use as "working" memory positions.
If, for example, I wish to DX Radio Bucharest I begin by consulting publications that will render the frequencies in operation at my desired listening time. I discovered that Radio Bucharest transmits on 11940 , 11840, 11735, 9690,9570 , and 5990 kHz at 0200 GMT. I "load" these frequencies into the "working" memory positions. Now when Radio Bucharest begins their identification signal I'm able to quickly select the best frequency for my listening pleasure.
The method just described saved time in tuning and retuning a station. I can locate the best frequency usually before the program even begins. When I'm done listening to a particular station I have the "working" memory available for another DX adventure.
I hope others will experience favorable results by employing my method of using memory.

 MORE ON ELITISMMORE RESPONSES TO VARJOUS ARTICLES ABOUT. ELJTE DX CLUBS BY TERRY KLASEK, RUSS LAY, ET AL

MJKE HARAESTER: I have been a DXer since 1968 and am very dedicated to the hobby of DXing. Presently, I am a member of nearly twenty domestic and international radio clubs which deal with all aspects of DXing. Anong these clubs is Fine Tuning. My receivers include the SPR-4, FRG-7, FRG-7000, and Kenwood R-1000. Additional equipment would take too long to list.
Now, from the last paragraph, it may be assumed I am either conceited and/or egocentric. . . neither is true. However, I an a perfectionist by nature: I "demand" nothing of others which I do not demand of myself. The same is true of DXing.
So much for the preliminary junk. Whether the hobby is DXing or another hobby where one "displays" their knowledge, skill or whatever, the ultimate line is honesty and/or reliability. In DXing, reliability is regular logging/reporting of $D X$ catches which bear up under constant review by peers. Granted, we all make mistakes, however when a DXer continually proves to be unreliable in loggings reported, then their reliability suffers as does their credibility. On the other side, we have the DXer who continually reports stations which, when checked by other DXers logging the station, are proven to be heard when stated. This DXer's credibility increases as does the reliability level. The line here is simply report what you hear and not what is supposed to be on the frequency. . .in other words, don't list long!
When a "senior" DXer looks at a beginner's logs, he may not be impressed by the difficulty involved in logging the reported station, but he will not laugh or degrade the logging: we all started out with the first logging and worked up! No one was born a DXer, we acquire the knowlege over the years.
Unfortunately, some DXers enter the hobby and desiring to progress as quickly as possible, sacrifice their credibility/reliability by reporting what they think should be there and not what they hear. At present, a fairly new DXer to the hobby is approaching 175 countries logged with less than 100 confirmed. One might not be concerned about this, however, when others (myself included) have tried to log stations he has reprted, we find a station with all the programming characteristics he reported, but with a different ID which, more than once, was the Voice of America in one of their numerous languages. Consequently, his reliability is a fat zero and unlikely it will ever rise above that point. When other DXers have pointed out the errors, he has refused to listen. The fact he logged stations off the air for several years did not phase him. Or a logging of an Oceanic station which was still four hours from local sunset, on the tropical bands, didn't phase him when it was pointed out. So, his reputation/reliability/ credibility has been permanently damaged.
Now we come to the so-called elite DX club. As I mentioned, I belong to too many clubs, and don't report to all of them. . .only a very few. Why? For one, virtually every club has their own peculiarity in how they want reports/loggings submitted to columns and by varying dates. Too much trouble keeping all the column requirements at hand.

Also, column editors can, by their editing, destroy a DXers credibility/reliability. How? By their own lack of knowledge, laziness, and a variety of other ways. For example, I might send in a logging to an editor as tentative, but when printed, there is no mention of my tentative and the listing is as though $I$ positively identified the station. I may report an UNID and on printing, the editor has made my UNID a positive logging of a station he thinks it was. NOT GOOD! I've had editors do such to many of my loggings and such has hurt my credibility, but fortunately DXers who know me will write for an explanation if the logging is too peculiar. As a perfectionist, the offending editor hears about it immediately and from that point on usually takes care when editing my loggings. Similar letters from other DXers affected often help an editor to keep on their toes and not make blatant errors.

So, why the specialized clubs such as Fine Tuning or Numero Uno? Why don't we all support SPEEDX moreso? First of all, the sun doesn't revolve around SPEEDX. SFEEDX is a large DX Club, with many members, but not the best. . .I doubt any club can be called the best. While the sun doesn't revolve around specialized clubs, these clubs don't expect it to as other clubs seem to.

In Fine Tuning, a member is asked to join (the same with Numero Uno) because of a variety of reasons among them being reliability, regularity and credibility in the hobby. The logs in FT are exacting. Thus, if a member on the West Coast logs a particular station at a particular time/frequency, I know that if I check that frequency/time (conditions permitting), I'm going to hear the station. Similarly, another DXer reading my logs knows the same is true. In a club, such as SPEEDX, the chances of me hearing a reported station are probably less than $50 \%$ in dealing with the Tropical Bands, and the reasons are numerous: list-logging, mis-ID, right language but wrong station, error in sunrise-sunset calculations which made the "guess" an incorrect one, etc.

The specialized clubs are usually for "senior" DXers who are experienced, knowlegable, reliable, and demanding. Also, we know that our loggings will be printed as we send them in and not changed by the editor. If the editor feels he knows the ID or wants to correct an item reported, such is done at the end of the report, but the report is not changed. Thus, if an error is made, the DXer can thank himself for not being more reliable/accurate in his logging!
LARRY D. COHEN, PA: Labeling a club as elite does not necessarily make its members experts in the field of radio monitoring; nor should it inply that members of "open to all clubs" are less qualified or have less integrity when applying accepted criteria in reporting stations heard.
A potential for unethical conduct may come about if members of the "by invitation only cluab" become bigwigs in open clubs such as SPEEDX, NASWA, ASWLC, CSWLI and withhold or delay reporting a logging or other pertinent information to their open clubs.

Personally I think if one wants to see the names of an elite group of SW hobbyists; all one has to do is look at the names in this club's contributors list. There you will find a select group of people who cared enough about their hobby to share their information. My record is not perfect, but that is the group I strive to join each moth.

## CHU-CANADA

Chu-Canalat's tume and frequency standard statjon by Leon Kanopka, NY

CHU, the time signal station of the National Research Council of Canada, Time and Frequency Section of the Division of Physics, broadcasts time and frequency information from iits transmitter near Ottawa, Canada. CHU broadcasts in A3H, upper single sideband with carrier re-inserted 24 hours a day. The transmitters are located southwest of Ottawa at $45^{\circ} 17^{\prime \prime} 47^{\prime \prime}$ north and $75^{\circ} 45^{\prime} 22^{\prime \prime}$ west. CHU uses three frequencies. On 3330 kilohertz the main and standby transmitters are 3 kilowatts apiece, and the antenna is a one quarter wavelength vertical. On 7335 kilohertz the main transmitter is 10 kilowatts and the standby transmitter is 5 kilowatts, and the antenna is a three quarter wavelength vertical. The last frequency is 14670 kilohertz, which has 3 kilowatt transmitters for both the main and standby transmitters, and feeds a one half wavelength vertical. The antennas are of steel construction, mounted on insulated pedestals, and have buried ground radials, and oxaxial feed cables. The two lower frequency antennas have fiber glass guy wires. The stations and transmitting equipment have back up batteries and generators to supply power in the event of a power failure. The time and station announcements are in French and English. The station announcements are given in French and English on alternate minutes, with the time announcement given in both languages every minute. The time is announced in Eastern Standard Time. These announcements are produced by two drum type magnetic recorders, one for the English station announcement, and the other for the French announcement. Both recorders provide
bilingual time announcements. This system allows for the loss of one recorder, losing either the French or English station announcement, but still retaining a bilingual time announcement on alternate minutes. The recorders are driven by syncronous motors operated from one of the cesium clocks so that the time announcements are given at exactly the right moment.
CHU's time signals, as broadcast are within . 0001 second of the NRC primary cesium clock, which is, in turn, within 10 microseconds of the international definition of time as defined by the Bureau International de l'Heure. The transmitted frequency is within $5 \times 10^{-12}$ of the NRC standard, and $1 \times 10^{-13}$ of that of the BIH.
CHU also supplies information on UT1, the time scale for navigation and stronomy. This is given by the system of doubled time pips from the first to sixteenth seconds of every minute. This is the internationally accepted system for indicating UT1, used by most if not all stations who supply this information.

If you want to get a verification from CHU, they verify with partial data QSL's. Their address is: Radio Station CHU; National Research Council; Ottawa, Canada K1A OR6. No return postage is necessary.
I think that I have covered everything necessary for this article. If you wish to find out more about CHU, write a letter to the address above, and ask for their book, Canada's Time Service. It is published in both French and English in the same edition, and contains 10 pages in French, and 10 in English.

Next time I will deal with WWV/WWVH, the station everyone is familiar with here in the United States.
 VOA PROBLEMS

NEW VOACE FOR VOA?

As I was reading the front page of the Wednesday, November 25 morning edition of the Los Angeles Times I came across an article written by David Lamb, a Times staff writer. The article had to do with the possible change of broadcasting style on the Voice of America, requested by white House officials.
The article began by recalling the first broadcast ever transmitted from the VOA, some 39 years ago. The first broadcast was transmitted in order to promise all American listeners that, on the VOA, the news of the day would be told truthfully and accurately, no matter if the news hurt or not. Thus, the station was based on the belief that truth, even when unfavorable, can be a "powerful took in promoting a government's credibility and a nation's interest."
Lamb then went on to point out that the Voice of America is the fifth largest station in the world, using credible reporting to build a weekly audience of 80 million listeners from Chania to South Africa.
However, writes Lamb, it seems that some of VOA's 2200 staff members fear that the Reagan administration is in the process of dismantling this credibility. They feel that if such a process went through, the VOA would be exactly like a lot of the other stations of the world that broadcast only favorable news or alter news items and present mushy features to promote a good, but perhaps false, spirit of nationalism.
Actually, the white House has stated that the Voice of America should be more proAmerican, portraying the country in a more favorable fashion, in order to counter the Soviet propaganda machine. The Soviets, states the article, put 2.5 billion dollars into external propaganda, while the VOA only receives about 107 million dollars from the government. Some white House officials feel that some VoA correspondents are too soft on the subject of Communism. For instance, Charles $Z$ Wicks, director of the U.S. International Communications Agency, actually stated that the VOA is in favor of the "other side."
Personally, I disagree with the administration's plan to broadcast propaganda-like transmissions. I realize that there are a few good points to the plan, but I still believe that the VOA should stand by the original policy of total truth and honesty in the news. That approach has and probably will work well for a long time in the future. News includes bad points as well as good points, and to get the full effect of news, one must get all the news. I would very much like to know the opinions of others.

GOPS DEPARTMENT: In my editorial of December, 1981, I incorrectly stated that the Atlantic States DX Association restricted their membership to the East Coast. Let me now state that the ASDA does not now, and has never, limited its membership to those living within a specific geographical location! ed.

From time to time we hear critics accuse the radio hobbyist of being involved in an impersonal. hobby. This criticism is based on the log hours spent alone in front of a receiver while copying various details to be used in a reception report to some distant station. After a generally long period of time, the hobbyist receives an impersonal reply from the station in response to his impersonal request for a verification. As a result of this, our critics claim to be justified for their condemnation of the radio hobbyist and his pasttime.
The first reaction to the remarks made by our critics is undoubtedly indignation. Unfortunately, this indignation often degenerates into outright anger or even hatred directed at the one making the critical remarks. On the surface, the hobbyist may seem justified in his or her indignation since none of us likes to see our hobby criticized. However, the remarks of our critics may be warranted.
It is true that some phases of this fascinating hobby can be construed as being impersonal. Anyone involved in the hobby of communications, be they SWL, DXer, or other "specialists," must spend long hours alone with their equipment in pursuit of that elusive station or country. It is easy to see this as an impersonal activity since we are participating in one-way communication, namely, broadcaster to listener. The only possible exception to this is the ham operator who engages in two-way communication via CW , phone and other means. However, even this is considered to be impersonal by some because of a lack of face-to-face contact.

When it comes to the quest for verifications, the critics are once again justified in some of their remarks. Too often we are guilty of sending thinly disguised demands for QSLs to stations which simply answer our letters out of courtesy. These letters to stations offer a plethora of program details and technical comments, but they rarely offer any personal information about the writer. It may be true that the vast majority of stations have little or no interest in a biographical sketch of each of their listeners, but for the overworked personnel of the small station these personal touches are a welcome relief. While we cannot go to the individual stations we hear in person, we can add some personality to our letters and reports.
The most cutting remarks from critics are directed at the often questionable relationships between radio hobbyists. Those who collect verifications often treat the one who just listens as a second-class member of the hobby because he or she does not actively pursue QSLs or pennants. Shortwave buffs have been known to direct some rather sarcastic remarks at hams and other members of the radio fraternity for their lact of interest in international broadcasting, utilities, etc. Every branch of the communications hobby has been guilty of making these remarks at some point-.there are no exceptions.
Related to the above is a problem that plagues virtually every club and association of radio hobbyists-internal dissatisfaction. The breakdown in interpersonal relationships between members and staff has the potential to destroy clubs and create animosity between individuals. Those in leadership or editorial positions are usually at the receiving end of criticism and scathing remarks from the embership. While constructive criticism is welcomed by every club leader and column editor, no one appreciates derogatory remarks about. club policy and procedures, column content and format or his own personality. Why does this dissension occur? Why do some become bitter and begin to create problems for others? Faulty interpersonal relationships are often at the heart of the problem.
How can we solve the problem and help defuse some potentially explosive situations? By getting to know each other we can overcome many problems which, if left unattended, could grow and destroy our club or association. Personal remarks by club leaders and editors in the bulletin allow the membership to see these dedicated men and women as individuals. Humor in a column gives an editor a chance to "blow off some steam" and maintain his sanity. The joking and teasing also gives us, the membership, a chance to laugh at ourselves. If we cannot laugh at our own foibles and mistakes, we should find a profession which allows us to use our advanced condition of stuffiness. We need to loosen up and enjoy our hobby while getting to know our fellow hobbyists. After all, our involvement in the hobby should be for personal enjoyment-not hardnosed competition.
Many times critics are guilty of overstating a problem in order to simply generate controversy. However, in this case the critics may be right in their analysis of the radio hobbyist and his activities. We spend so much time with equipment, bulletins and technical materials that we tend to forget about the other people involved in the hobby. By cultivating our interpersonal relationships we can make our hobby more enjoyable for ourselves and others. We might even develop some lasting friendships along the way.

NEW BOOKS: Three new (copyright 1981) books from TAB. The SWL's Manual of Non-Broadcasting Stations (TAB \# 1235, \$12.95, paper) by Harry L. Helms (co-author of "The Complete Shortwave Listener's Handbook') is a very good introduction to utility listening and covers RTPX, beacons, air, marine, VHF/ UHF commercial, and government services. How to Tune the Secret Shortwave Spectrum (TAB \#1185, $\$ 6.95$, paper) by Helms covers clandestine stations, pirate broadcasting, espionage radio activity, space communications, numbers broadcasts, and more govermment/military communications. Both boths have sections on receivers and anternas, plus very informative appendices and lots of requency information. How to Build Hidden, Limited-Space Antennas That Work (TAB \#1254, $\$ 9.95$, paper) by Robert J. Traister goes into such things as antenna principles, limited-space principles, problems of the apartment dweller, the art of winding coils, indoor antennas, TVI, VHF antennas, and making antennas from existing structures. VOICE OF AMERICA DIRECTOR STANDS BY OFFICIAL'S SELECTION: James B. Conkling, director of the Voice of America, declared recently that he was standing by his appointment of an official who had urged turning VOA into a propaganda angency. Conkling's statement came in the face of mounting criticism on Capitol Hill and among the VOA chief's own staff to a memorandum written by Philip Nicolaides before he was named as a deputy programming director for the US overseas broadcasting service. The chairman of a key House subcommittee called the memo "ideological overkill" and said implementing Nicolaides' proposals "would destroy the
credibility of VOA." According to a Washington Post story, the suggestion for emphasizing propaganda was made by Nicolaides in a memo written Sept. 21 when he was in the public affairs office of VOA's parent agency, the International Communication Agency, before moving to the VOA position. The Post said Nicolaides wrote in the memo to Conkling that "our news should be factually accurate. "But he added that it was necessary to recognize He are - as all the world understands - a propaganda agency. Propaganda is a species of the genus advertising." Nicolaides also said VOA should portray the Soviet Union as "the last predatory empire on earth, remorsely, enslaving its own diverse ethnic populations, the newspaper reported. ICA issued a statement saying the Nicolaides memorandum "reflects a private assessment only and has definitely not been adopted as the policy of VOA." (Ann Arbor News, $11 / 14 / 81$ via David L. RADIO 'COLD WAR': On the edge of the frozen Beaufort Sea in Canada's remote Northwest Territories, radio station CFCT in Tuktoyaktuk was in finacial hot water last year. Bereft of steady income, the 1000 watt non-profit station pared its paid staff to two and considered an offer from Radio Moscow to provide free programaing. But when word of the Communist offer got out, representatives of oil companies in the area began talks with the station's manager, John Steen, hinting at aid to keep CFCT alive. The station claimed 5000 listeners, including oil field workers. The capitalists are delivering, Mr. Steen reports, and he has not accepted the Radio Moscow offer. So far, he says, Dome Petroleum Ltd. has granted a temporary subsidy of $\$ 1500$ a month and has given the station a new control console, new turntables, record players and tape recorders. "Āt a later stage our transmitter will be replaced," Mr. Steen continues, and the station's power raised to 10,000 watts. And he is counting on a new studio. The Tuktoyaktuk Town Council has also offered aid, he says, and "we are looking now to accept advertising." (Ruth Hesch from the New York Times, 8/9/81)

HOW DO YOU USE SPEEDX? by Ruth Hesch - NY

In the October issue, on the inside of the back cover, after the list of contributors, Chris Hansen noted that only $13.9 \%$ of the membership sent in reports, schedules, information, etc. To me, that sounds like more Outgo than Input. So, I thought about what each issue of SPEEDX gives to me. The Keynotes column provides general information on the hobby; Program Panorama directs my attention to things on various stations that I have been missing; Technical Topics is beyond my understanding for the most part but often $I$ can profit from information about equipment and stations; Station Skeds keeps me up to date; the Utility scene gives me ideas for a different kind of DXing; QSL Reports shows that patience is necessary and there are some stations that do not answer reception reports or rarely so; and Tips \& Topics is a gold mine of information of all kinds. I left the monitor reports for last as $I$ work with these columns throughout the month and subsequent months. My initial.check is to find out when my hard to find stations are being heard by members in my geographical area and, they help me to identify stations with indistinct or no IDs. All of this leads to trying to figure out why the $86.1 \%$ of the membership do not contribute. Are they unwilling to share their goodies with us? Do they begrudge the time it takes to fill out slips? Are they not putting the monthly bulletin to good use? Are they unwiliing to personally identify themselves with other members? I know some research organizations consider $10 \%$ an adequate reply to questionaires, but belonging to a SWLing club is not a "one shot deal". It should be a social, sharing and learning group. I would be interested in learning how others use SPEEDX to better my appreciation of it and, perhaps do the same for those 86.1\%
