$++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++$ SINCLAIR $2 X-81$ COMPUTER...It is presumed that some of you have seen ads for the British made SINCIAIR $Z X-81$ computer in the electronic publications as of late? If not, and you have been thinkir"computer", you might carefully consider onel It is a truly incredible machine for the paltry sum of $\$ 99.95$ in kit form or $\$ 149.95$ wired and tested. Unless you are REALLY into building things, the kit is NOT recommended! Assembly, although simple is NOT for beginners. The computer comes with a power pack and quite a good instruction book. The ZX-81 speaks "BASIC", as do most of the current lot of home type computers but can be programmed with "machine language" by experienced programmers. It comes with an 8 K BASIC "ROM" (read-only-memory, the "brains" of the machine) and 1 K of ${ }^{\prime} \mathrm{RAM}$ ' (random-access-memory, the place your program is stored). A Zilog z-80A Microprocesser is used (same type as in the TRS-80) along with a special SINCIAIR 'logic' chip. Additional memory is available in the form of the " $Z X^{\prime \prime} 16 \mathrm{~K}$ (Kilobyte) RAM pack, wired and tested for $\$ 99.95$. Programs can be stored on cassettes with an ordinary recorder. Your Editor has one copying "Morse" code quite well at the moment. Plans here are to soon have a RTTY program and interface to read RTTY transmissions. Practically no radio interference is experienced on the $S W$ bands here from the computer. The computer works with any TV set as a video terminal and is very simple to hookup and use. "Bayoutronics" plans to make available later on this year modifications and an interface module for CW/RTTY operation with the necessary "software" for cassette loading of the program. More on this later if interest is shown. Might be a way for YOU to get into CW/RTTY DXing without spending a BIG bundlel (AND have a computer to boot!)

In closing, TIMEX plans to market the $2 X-81$ built in their factory here in the USA late this year, and have the same distributers market it who now sell TIMEX watchesi (You might be able to buy one at your Supermarket or drugstore: $++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++++4+++++++++++++++++++$ COMAENT: Thanks to you all that have written. ASCENSION ALICE:
By now I'm sure all of you have heard of "Argentine Annie" broadcasting messages to the British fleet down at the Falkland crisis. Well, according to the Associated Press (in the Milwaukee Journal Sat. May 22, 1982) the British have answered back to the soldiers from Argentina with Ascension Alice! According to the article, "Ascension Alice, a sultry-voiced radio announcer... has begun broadcasting in hope of demoralizing Argentine troops on the Falkland Islands in a battle of the airwaves.
"Alice, a British newspapers nickname for an announcer who goes by the name Marianna, made her first broadcast Thursday night from a radio station on Ascension Island, Britain's mid-Atlantic base for the fight to retake the Falklands.
"She is the Spanish-speaking British counterpart of an equally sexyvoiced English speaking woman who three weeks ago began broadcasting propaganda to the British fleet.
"Marianna abd two male announcers known only as Francesco and Juan, are believed attached to Britain's top-secret Government Communications Headquarters, an intelligence unit monitoring Soviet bloc radio signals. They broadcast twice daily on 9710 kHz ."
So, there you have it, first in SPEEDX! The article goes on to talk about what the British will talk about on the broadcasts, stating that they "will be strictly factual". The BBC however, feels quite differently about these broadcasts, fearing "the use of its facilities on Ascension will undermine it reputation for objectivity". Also, the Association of Broadcasting Staffs and the National Union of Journalists "have protested the 'gross interference in the independence and editorial freedom of the BBC'". The article does not mention times of the broadcasts, so try tuning in periodically and of course, if you hear anything, make sure to report it to SPEEDX (W/H column of course) or the SPEEDX-GRAM.

Marjorie Witte drops us this short note. "I picked up Radio Nigeria on a new frequency, $5,955 \mathrm{kHz}$, at 0500 GMT , several times in April with EE/pops and news. Signals were fair." Has anybody else heard this one??? IF YOU WERE LISTENING TO BANGUI MARCH 3, 1982, YOU WERE IN FOR A REAL TREAT

At $11=40$ p.m. (CAR time), on Wednesday, March 3, 1982, Radio National Centrafricane listeners were startled by an announcement by the Minister of Information, Brigadier-General Francois Bozize, who excitedly broadcast that a coup was taking place and that the national gendarmerie were supporting it. Ten minutes later, Lt. Colonel Diallo, the commander of the national gendarmerie, was on the air vigorously denying any such thing and protesting the gendarmerie's loyalty to the regime. At ten minutes past midnight, the Head of State, General Andre Kolingba, made his appearance at the radio station, to broadcast his own message. He said there was nothing to worry about, that everyone should stay calm, that soldiers should go back to barracks and that it was all merely a matter of military personalities. Despite this comic opera at Radio Bangui, there actually was a coup, even though it was easily crushed. There was no mention of whether or not this broadcast was heard on the $5,035 \mathrm{kHz}$ channel, but I'd be interested to hear from any SFEEDX members who may have heard this. ## British radio set for Argentines

Chicoso Tritura Prass Service
LONDON-The Defense Ministry planned Wednesday night to start broadcasting radio programs to Argentine troops on the Falkland Islands.
A government-run station, Radio Atlantico del Sur, has been set up on Ascension Island, 3,500 miles from the Falkjands, to carry Spanish language news broadeasts and popular music.
" It is intended that by this means the Argentine garrison will become accurately informed of events in the South Atlantic and of world opinion of
the present crisis, giving them a better understanding than is currently available through wildly inaccurate Argentine reports," a spokesman said.
He said news reporting would be strictly factual and there would be no propaganda broadcasts.
In early April, Argentine radio began using a sultry-voiced woman calling herself "Liberty" to broadcast propaganda messages to the British task force. But officials said these broadcasts were stopped some time ago.

## NCM $=515$

## JAPAN RADIO COMPAIY'S RCM-51.5 PREQUENCY CONTFOLELZE

Japan Radio Company (JRC) has been a respected name in marine communications for several decades. Recently they have also been involved in radar, satellite mavisation systems, commercial conmunications and industrial/medical electronics. this company has been increasingly involved in the amateur and shortwave listener market as well. Just over a year and a half ago they introduced a general coverage receiver called the TRD-515. It


NCM-515 hes become a popular radio with serious shortwave DXers worldwide. I have been using the IRD-515 for one year and have been pleased with its performance. leing primarily a "utility" DXer I was especially attracted to its excellent stability which is so important when listening to CW, RTTY, or FAX. Host NRD-515 owner's would agree that one of the key benefits to using the NRD-515 is its ease of operation. Tuning is simple, fast and absolutely accurate. Additionally there are 24 or 96 channel memories available. With all this tuning convenience $I$ was surprised to learn of something new to make tuning and frequency entry even better and faster!
The annual Dayton Hamvention is the biggest "hamfest" in the world. Electronics companies often use this event to preview or announce new products. This year JRC introduced a new product of special interest to the shortwave enthusiast. The item is called the NCN-515 frequency controller. The NCM-515 is a hand-held keyboard entry/display device to facilitate frequency entry and tuning into the NRD-515. This controller resembles a large hand-held calculator. The cord connecting the NCM-515 to the NRD-515 is 6 feet long. It attaches via a special adapter (supplied) to the memory port of the NRD-515. Yes, you may attach the NCN-515 at the same time your 24 or 96 chamel memory is attached. Installation takes about three minutes and requires only a screwdriver. You do not have to go inside the NRD-515 to install this device. The controller derives its power ( $+10 \mathrm{VDC} @ 100 \mathrm{ma}$ ) from the receiver. It has a standard calculator keyboard with an audio response tone as well as a six digit LCD display. The unit measures $3 \frac{1}{4} \times 5 \frac{1 / 2}{2} \times 1 \frac{1}{4}$ ".
The NCIM-515 has several modes of operation:
For keyboard entry of a given frequency simply turn the unit on, press the P/WA key once (display will show 0.0), and type in the desired frequency in kHz . then press the $=$ key. Sample legal entries would be: "15070.0 $=$ " or "15070. $=$ " or $15070=$ ". Illegal entries will show "E " on the NCM-515 display. In the remote mode you have taken control from the NRD-515 and its MHz and tuning knob are now inoperative (RIT is still functional). All frequencies on the keypad will also be displayed on the NRD-515. To enter a new frequency simply key it in and press $=$. There is also an add and subtract function. If you are at 15300.0 kHz and want to move to $18350.0 \mathrm{kIz} .$, simply type: $+3050.0=$.
Whether or not you have the NRD-515's 24 or 96 channel memory unit you will now have the ability to store 4 frequencies in the controller itself! To store the frequency you are presently on, simply press 4 and either $H 1 H 2 \mathrm{H} / \mathrm{H}$ or M 4 . To recall any of the four memorized frequencies in the future simply press $1 / \mathbb{R}$ followed by 11102 M or 144 . Note that when you turn the NCM-515 off you will not loose the memories, but turning the power off on the NRD-515 receiver will erase the four memories.

There is a LOCK key on the NCU-515 which works exactly the same as the imD-515's. Press once to lock, again to unlock. The status of the "LOCK" is also shown on the LCD display of the controller.

The most interesting and unexpected feature of the MCN-515 is its ability to automatically tune up or down (slew) at different rates. I found myself enjoying this feature as much as standard keyboard entry! You can slew by 1 kHz . or 100 Hz increments, in either FAST or SLOw modes. The resulting rates of tuning are: $1000 \mathrm{kijz}(1 \mathrm{HFz}$ in:

| STEF 1 | STEP 0.1 |  |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| FAST | 16 sec. | 160 secs. |
| SLOW | 66 sec. | 660 secs. |

The "SLOW", "STEP 0.1 " is nice for just "scanning" across the band. The keyboard input combined with the 4 tuning rates essentially eliminates any need (or desire!) to tune manually.

The NCM-515 also provides a very fast and efficient means to program your 24 or 96 ch . outboard memories! In summary I am sure every NRD-515 owner (present and future) will want to add this convenience to their listening post.
While in Dayton I talked to the Japanese engineer who designed the NCH-515. He felt it should be available in the US by June. A price has not yet been established for this product.

Nestled among all the other ads in the 1982 World Radio TV llandbook was one for a most interesting product, the $5 . O . C$. Antenna and Booster made by Electronic Overseas Corporation, Inc., 214 E. Franklin Avenue, Fidland Park, [JJ 07432. The price, at $\$ 23.95$ postpaid in the U.S., made me perk up, as with my work with HAP-USA we are always on the lookout for items which can be put to use by those who cannot for one reason or another string up a nice outdoor long wire.

After some brief correspondence with Mr. Alexandre Bellotti, President of EOC, Inc., the unit arrived and was hooked up to my FRG-7. Installation takes but a minute or so, one wire to the receiver antenna input and the other to receiver ground, plug it into a convenient wall socket and it's ready to go. The unit is of straight forward construction, a solid state broadband amplifier, a built in AC Power supply (no need for an $A C$ adaptor) and a $63 \%$ telescoping whip antenna, along with an on/off switch.

I found performance excellent, with results only slightly under my 85 foot long wire which is 30 feet above ground. The specification sheet calls for highest gain at 10 MHz , but I found performance from 60 to 19 meters to be superb. One of the better catches was Radio Atlantida, Peru, on 4790 kHz , not exactly a powerhouse here in the Northeast.
For further testing, the unit was loaned to fellow SPEEDXer Linda Sherwood. Lin is located in an apartment house that does not allow any type of outdoor antennas. Hooked up to her DX-160 she is able to hear a multitude of previously unreceivable Latins on 60 meters and is experiencing most satisfactory results throughout the entire shortwave spectrum, including good reception of HCJB's 100 watter on 26020 kil . She's so happy with it that I'll probably have to send the militia out to repossess it should I decide that I want it back.

All in all, a fine buy for the money. Results are very favorable compared to units costing 4 times as much. For further information, send an SASE to Mr. Bellotti at EOC. Tell him that you read about it in SPEEDX. Also, Mr. Bellotti has graciously offered a special discount for HAP-USA nembers only. Details on this discount can be obtained from me.

I then proceded to remove the record jack from the front panel and mount it in the back of the chasis. ..ith this done I installec a double pole double throw switch in the renaininc hole, and wired up the whole works. I then struck out to find something to listen to on my receiver with its new slectaisle bandwidth.

I thought I was all set then I was aghast to find out that I had a receiver with about a 30 kIz bandwidth. It seens that the signals were ignoring the switch and the filters were doing their ow thing in a very strange way. I then did some research and found that diode switching would be required and I did not really want to get involved with that technology so I just put the 2.5 kHz filter in the unit on the circuit board where the orieinal filter was.
Well I felt like I was in DXers heaven until I tried to tune some amateur stations in the 20 meter Han band. Again I was aghast with personal disgust. I could not tune any voice stations on either sideband above about 10 MHz . I went again back to the books to see what terrible mistake I had made. I had to consult a good friend and long time Ham operator, All Brogdon, K3KAO. Together we found that the BFO was out of adjustment. It was not falling inside the new smaller IF bandwidth. The receiver was evidently misaligned since the day I bought it since I was receiving all SSB traffic on the USB. It was then a simple matter locate the BFO components and make the adjustment. It was T 7 in my unit that had to be fiddled with. The method Al explained to me was to disconnect the antenna and switch from USB to LSB and the audio change should be negligable, you should hear the same sound on either sideband with no station tuned. We then sought out an Ali station to check things out with. We were able to tune each of the individual sidebands of the station thus proving that we were correct with the adjustment. So that is my little tale of fun with filters and SSB. I hope it may be of some help to some of you other tinkerers.

## BOOK REVIEW

RTTY PRESS FREQUENCIES

## by Fred Osterman, OH

The main attraction to most RTTY listeners is tuning the various international press frequencies. The only frustration is they are often hard to find! To help us in our plight the third printing of Vorld Press Service Frequencies by Thomas P. Harrington W80hV is hot off the press and filled with valuable information for the RTTY buff. The book is specifically designed for the RTTY SWLer and concentrates on ENGLISH press broadcasts. Over 65 news and press services, worldwide are covered. The book is organized into the following chapters:

CHAPTER 1. How to Use These Frequency Lists: This is a valuable chapter and serves as an introduction to the book. It covers time zones, transmission speeds, transmission shifts, and other terms which will be helpful to the beginner.
CHAPTER 2. Equipment: This section begins by discussing tuners, antennas and receivers as they relate to RTTY listening. The chapter continues with an analysis of available RTTY terminal units including both the video type and the self-contained "readers".
CHAPTER 3. Sources for RTTY Equipment: Chapter 3 is filled with addresses to contact to obtain information on RTTY equipnent. At the end of the chapter there is a brief, but interesting discussion of "Common Reception Problems" by Eric Kern. This short piece reviews various propagation effects and their impact on RTTY reception.
CHAPTER 4.1. RTTY World Press Services Stations Listed by Tim: This is the primary chapter in the book. The author has organized all available receptions into a list sorted by time. It starts with 0000 GIfT and lists all English Fress transmissions heard at that time giving frequency, shift/speed, service name, and location. The next time indicated is 0015 and so forth in 15 minute increments to 2345 . This section has over 600 entries. You can sit dow any time of day and know what English RXTY Press transmissions are available!

CHAPTER 4.2. R'TTY World Press Service Stations Listed by Frequency: As you might guess this section has all the press stations listed in frequency order. Each entry includes frec., shift/speed, service, location/remarks (GrIT).
CHAPTER 4.3. Press Services Listed by Country: If a key story breaks in a particular country, a quick look in this section will let you know where to tune. Each entry includes country, service and all monitored frequencies. The author included a little bonus tucked away at the ond of this chapter. It is a list of CW Press stations. Yes, a few stations do transmit press in morse code. A list of such stations is included; sorted by time of transmission.

CAFAER 5. Abbreviations of Vorld ievs Services: Unless you fere born lenowing that iIIHA stands for lidale East Hews Agency or that SAPORETII stands for the frgentine ilews

Agency, this chapter will help you. Sixty common RTTY abbreviations are covered. CHAPTER 6.1. Information on Radioteletype Reception: The many factors affecting radio propagation are discussed in this section. Some good ideas for the beginning RTTY listener are also covered. Many stations which "sound" like RTTY cannot be "decoded". Author, Tom Harrington concludes this chapter with an explanation of this.
CHAPTER 6.2. Sources of Other Radioteletype Lists: This section lists other publications such as IDXCSD, SPEEDX, ASWLC which contain information of interest to the RTTY DXer. (Note the Neward News Radio Club is listed but has "gone under" since time of printing). The remaining pages briefly cover other types of services beyond press, that utilize HF RTTY channels. A few blank logging pages are thoughtfully provided to note your own catches. The author closes by mentioning that updates are available and that he is anxious to know of English Press loggings not noted in the book!

## STATION REVIEW

NMA: RADIO STATION MIAMI

Anyone who listens to Coast Guard operations cannot but help hear Radio Station Miami working aircraft and ships of the Coast Guard and other vessels. Radio Station Miami (RADSTA INiami) is located in Dade County, FL, approximately 20 miles south of downtown Miami. The RADSTA is located on a 250 acre segment of the former Richmond Naval Air Station. RADSTA Miami was established in the early 1940's and moved into their present operations building in 1964. There are 30 personnel assigned to the RADSTA, 28 enlisted and 2 officers.

RADSTA Miami is a vital part of the Atlantic Area communications for the Gulf of liexico, Caribbean, and the North, South, and East regions of the United States. Due to the favorable location of RADSTA Miami, it is often able to provide communications services to vessels off the central and northern coasts of the U.S. who are not far enough offshore to receive support from COMSTA Portsmouth or Boston.

Radio Station Miami also provides medium range air-to-ground support for Coast Guard aircraft in the Florida and adjacent Search and Rescue Sectors.

RADSTA Hiami also maintains a continuous watch on the 500 kHz distress frequency and makes both scheduled and unscheduled broadcasts.
RADSTA Miami does not listen on 2182 kHz as Coast Guard Station Miami Beach has the responsibility for 2 MHz operations.
The station is divided into two areas, the operations and receiving building and the transmitter building. Ten antennas are used to receiving, ranging from a rotatable log periodic to a homemade dipole antenna fo5 5 and 8 MHz .
The transmitter site is about $1 / 2$ mile from the operations building and includes 6 HF and 2 MW transmitters. The transmitters are remotely controlled from the operations building and can be tuned in seconds. For transmitting there are 9 antennas which includes a 300 foot guyed tower as the 500 kHz antenna.
The operations building contains offices, a recreation room, and the radio room. The radio room has 4 positions, each with Collins 651 receivers. The positions are: Air-to-Ground with 5 receivers; Ship-to-Shore position with 6 receivers; 500 kHz with 6 receivers; and the Supervisor Position with 2 receivers.
At this time a major recontruction project is in progress which will further increase the capability and responsibilities of RADSTA Miami.

RADIO FREE KABUL' EXPANDS: Opponents of Soviet intervention in Afghanistan are broadening a network of radio transmitters beaming underground political programs to Afghan citizens and Soviet troops, an organizer of the broadcasts said a few weeks ago. Low-powered, mobile transmitters are being operated inside Afghanistan by Afghan rebels using recored tapes sent in from outside the country. Station operators transmit some of their programs on frequencies used by Soviet entertainment programs and communications among Soviet tanks and helicopters. (York Daily Record, May 3, 1982 via John H. Demmitt, PA)
RECEIVER REVIEW ARTICLE: The February 1982 issue of Radio and Electronics World concluded a 3 part article called "The Big Match: FRG-7700 vs. R-1000." Included are diagrams to change the $\mathrm{R}-1000^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$ dimmer switch and tone control into NBFM mode switch and squelch control respectively. The article concluded that there was no detectable difference between the two and preferences come down to a personal choice. The add on accessories will probably favor the Yaesu. ARGENTINAN "TOKYO ROSE" BROADCASTING TO BRITISH: An Argentine counterpart of Tokyo Rose has taken to the air to tell the men of the British fleet how much happier they would be back home instead of in the South Atlantic. "Argentine Annie" is a soft-voiced woman who speaks perfect English and intersperses her remarks with recorded songs about death. She is presently broadcasting on the 16 meter ham band. (Wilder A. Pickard IL)

ANTI-RED RADIO SILENCED: For two years, "Radio Alpha" beamed a half hour broad-
cast nighly to Cuba, mingling anti-Castro propagenda with ads urging counter-revolutionary attacks. Then the U.S. government pulled the plug. Alpha 66, amilitant organization of exiles urging the overthrow of Cuban President Fidel Castro, used a bulky Army surplus transmitter of World War II vintage in three secret Miami locations. Occasionally the broadcasts would go out over the airwaves through a modern 66 foot antenna. At other times it would originate from a wire stretched taut over the roof of a suburban Miami home, strung between
a television antenna mast and a tree. But two weeks ago, the FCC stepped in to silence the Voice of Alpha 66. Levying Fines of $\$ 2,250$ and issuing stern warnings of jail, the FCC said the transmitter was not licensed. Radio Alpha transmitted from the three Miami sites to keep interference with neighbors ${ }^{\text {' }}$ TV and radio sets to a minimum. Diego Medina, a physician who serves as Alpha's spokesman, told The Miami Herald. The anti-Castro messages were broadcast each evening from 9 to $9: 30$. Medina, 49, wrote the broadcasts and recorded them at Alpha headquarters in the Latin section of Miami. The ads asked listeners to act to sabotage the Castro regime. Listeners were told to set fire to sugar cane fields, tobacco curing houses and anywhere else it would hurt the Castro regime. One commercial said, "Ihe most beautiful sight that can be observed in a tobacco growing zone is a curing house full of tobacco-and buring away like a torch. . If the Russians want cigars, let them grow (tobacco) themselves. But Abruptly the broadcasts ended when US amateur radio operators and the Cuban government complained. The FCC sent engineers to the broadcast sites and found the transmitter to be without an operating license. Each of the three residents of homes where the broadcasts had taken place were fined $\$ 750$ and told not to transmit again. (PassaicClifton Herlad News, April 6, 1982, via Craig Mellinger, NJ)
CUTTING YOUR OWN THROAT DEPARTMENT: WO radio, where President Reagan began his broadcasting career in the 1930s may be the first casualty in a radio war between Cuba and the US. The Reagan administration is planning to build a radio station, named Radio Marti after a Cuban patriot, to beam news and propaganda to Cuba. It will broadcast on the same channel as WHO. Cuba has threatened to build a 500 kilowatt station, 10 times as powerful, on the same frequency to drown out the US broadcasts. WHO said the Cuban station would wipe out the station's sports and callin programs in the Southeastern US, a section jammed with a loyal following of listeners and University of Iowa sports fans. WHO is a clear channel 50,000 watt station founded in the 1920 s. (John Demmit, OA)

MORE FUNDS ARE SOUGHT FOR VOA: The ICA, saying that the US was "waging a war of ideas with our adversaries," asked for more funds today for broadcasts to the Caribbean, Asia and Africa. Charles Z. Wick, the information agency's chairman said he was seeking an increase of $\$ 161.7$ million in agency funding over the $\$ 482.3$ million requested in March. The total fiscal 1983 budget request is now $\$ 644$ million compared to $\$ 489$ million for fiscal 1982. Mr. Wick said there was a serious gap between the time the Soviet and the US devoted to broadcasts beamed abroad. He put Moscow's broadcasts at 2000 hours a week compared with the 952 hours weekly planned by the VOA. Efforts are now under way by the VOA to complete new relay stations in Botswana and Sri Lanka for broadcasts beamed to Africa and Asia. Mr. Wicks also said there was also an urgent need for mediumwave stations to reach the Caribbean Basin and Central America to counter Cuban and Soviet broadcasts. (New York Times, April 20, 1982 via Ruth Hesch, NY)
NEW ATTACHINENT FOR THE R-390A: I want to pass along some information on a new attachment to use on the $\mathrm{R}-390$ and $\mathrm{R}-390 \mathrm{~A}$ receivers. It's for SSB, CW, and RTTY. Can't verify the RTTY as that part of my shack is down just now, but I find the unit is very good on SSB. What makes it so handy is the small size. Mine was sent to me in a heavy duty envelope, about standard letter size for $40 \%$ first class mail. The unit is solid state, and 'potted' and is mounted on one of the terminal strips on the rear of the set with one lead to the other strip. It took me more time to get at the back of my $\mathrm{R}-390 \mathrm{~A}$ and put it back in place than it did to attach it to the receiver. There is no outside power supply. I find it much easier to receive SSL with the unit than it is to either follow the manual instructions for the receiver or to use the outboard SSB attachments made by NATERIAL SERVICE CORP. I had been using. I just ordered another one for use on my R-390. It can be ordered for $\$ 30.60$ from $G$. B. Communications, 963 Birch Bay Lyndon Road, Lynden WA 98264. Literature sent with my unit says they are working on (still on the drawing board) frequency converters to extend the range of the receiver to 230 HHz ; and they have a working prototype of a narrow band FM unit with literature available soon. If a person wants to order in quantity as a dealer, the price is $\$ 25.00$ but they did not tell me how many would have to be ordered to get this price. (Paul Gunn, IL)
COURT LIMITS RADIO'S RANGE: The US Court of Appeals has upheld a regulartory decision to limit the range of the nation's most powerful AM radio stations. The court said there was no evidence the FCC had abused its discretion or acted in an arbitrary manner when it decided in June 1980 to begin breaking down the last of
what are known as "clear channel" frequencies. Before its 1980 decision, the FCC had maintained clear channels on the AM radio dial for a small group. of "Class $1-\Lambda$ " stations-the only AM stations allowed to broadcast at night in all directions using the maximum 50 kw of power. The designation clear channel stemmed from the fact the FCC kept the $r$ radio frequency "clear" by refusing to 1 license any other station on the frequency that could cause interference. Clear channel protection was established in the days when millions of Americans in rural areas had no access to their own local stations. (John H. Demmitt, PA)

So like any other enterprising young DXer with a communications background I wrote to Yaesu and asked what other filters were available. I chose one that vould sive me a 2.5 kHz bandwidth.

    So with idea in mind and soldering iron in hand I went to work and built a switching unit that would give me selectable bandwidth. I installed the platform I had just
