SELECTIVITY \& DIGITAL RECEIVERS... There has been on occasion the question. Why do I hear WWV on 14995, 14996, 14997 etc..15001, 15002, 15003 etc??? and not on Just 15000 Khz ?" Digital dials have made listeners aware, MORE aware of "selectivity", or that characteristic of a receiver that will allow it to seperate one station from one next door at say.... 5 khz away. We must realize two major factors when we compare receiver selectivity....first: any signal (even a CN onel) occupies some space and "spreads" out over portion of the radio spectrum. For example: An "AM" or amplitude modulated voice transmission is composed of three basic signals. The "carrier" wave (at the center of the signal you hear) and two "sidebands" (upper and lower) situated about the carrier wave. The "sidebands" are the components that actually contain the "information" we detect and enjoy as music, news etc., the carrier being sort of a conveyance (so to speakl) for said information. Most AM stations will occupy from 6 khz . (In the case of a communications station-UTE station) to as much as 20 khz . (in the case of a hi-fidelity station or an overmodulated stationt) of spectrum space. The AM station will appear, therefore, to be "spread" over about this much space and this is NORMALII SSB and CW stations will appear to be narrower (which they arel) Secondly... we must take into consideration the "bandpass" of the receiver we are using. At the present "state-of-the-art" a "perfect" $1: 1$ "shape factor" selectivity "window" (See Fig 1) is not possiblell We can get close by using some kinds of mechanical or multi-pole crystal filters. A "typical" selectivity window is shown in Fig 2. Both these graphs are plotted as relative signal strength VS. Khz.+ or - what The filter in question is tuned to. Since the "sharpness" of the curve falls off (gets widerl) as we progress DOWN the curve, it will make the receiver appear to be LESS selective than the manufacturer
 might claimll Most receiver makers quote their figures near the top or *nose
of the curve where it looks goodi This is also the reason that say a 3 khz . of the curve where it looks good This is also the reason that say a 3 khz 。 mechanical filter will still sound relatively decent even though it should cut off half of each sideband of an AM signall More on this in a later issuel SINCLAIR AGAINII. . There has been considerable interest by readers in the ZX-81 computer. August "Popular Science" carried a cover story featuring the machine under the name of TIMEX-SINCIAIR 1000 . No sooner than this happened, there was an announcement by Clive Sinclair that he was soon to release a NEW computer called the SINCLAIR "Spectrum" which will boast a full size keyboard, and 16 K of built-in RAM for $\$ 225$. The new machine will operate with a $\mathrm{B} \& \mathrm{~W}$ or COLOR TV and have color capabilities and sound generator (for you arcade game types!) MORE at a later date. As the SINCLAIRS take hold on the hobby scene, we will be seeing more and more use being made of them in communicgtions applications. Out of space.....so until next month...73 and DXII

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## LIST-LOGGING

This is the time of year when I have a little space to fill -- I often devote this space to an exposition of the evils of list-logging.
LIST-LOGGING, (1is't-log-in), $n$, the activity of refusing to listen to a broadcast for an ID and looking in a list under the specified frequency to determine the identity of the station. Often engaged in by DXers with overactive imaginations. A cure can only be obtained by isolating the DXer from all lists until he can be trusted with them.
Facetious, but true. As an editor for too many years, I can compare editing to walking a tightrope. When a logging has been sorted, and you come to it while typing, you have a split second to determine whether you can print it or not. If you err too much on the side of caution, you have a column filled with everyone's routine DX. If you err too much on the side of permissiveness, you end up with a column filled with figments of DXers' imaginations. List-logging is the major cause of editorial upset.

## HOW TO TELL IF YOU'RE A LIST-LOGGER

-- You're a list-logger if the first thing you think of when you come across a new station on the bands is "What does the WRTH say about this frequency?"
-- You're a list-logger if you ignore the possibility of catching a good ID because the list you use has pinned down the ID.
-- You're a list-logger if you send in a logging as a positive, not a tentative, and say, "On that frequency, at that time, what else can it be?"
-- You're a list-logger if you send 100 loggings to an editor, don't mark the tentative ones tentative, and then complain because only 3 were printed.
-- And, finally, you're a list logger if you never EVER question the accuracy of the list you use. After all, why would they publish the list if it wasn't totally accurate, Your attitude is: "If it's on the list, it must be broadcasting."
List-logging is for a DXer what the heartbreak of psoriasis is to the American public. It is also very annoying to DX editors, to the membership, and to my self-image (I hate it when I print a logging that later turns out to be questionable.)
THE FIRST STEP TO A CURE IS TO ADMIT THAT YOU HAVE A PROBLEM
If you saw yourself in three or more out of the five criteria above, you have a problem. Once you've admitted that you sometimes list-log, you can pull yourself up, dust yourself off, and start all over again. Usually, by the time a DXer realizes that he has a list-logging problem, it is too late to save his reputation, and he has to take up $C B$ or something of the sort. I am always ready to print loggings from anyone, and try not to damage anyone's reputation by overly questioning his logging. If I have a serious question, I either circular-file the logging, or run it without attribution and question it anonymously.
The cure continues when you listen to the broadcast for an ID before turning to the WRTH for confirmation. After you have heard an ID, you then turn to your list for further information. When you hear a broadcast, listen for an $I D$, and don't hear one, you help your cure along by referring to lists sparsely, making a reasoned judgment on the ID based on (1) What has been heard on that frequency recently (After all, that's why you are members of SPEEDX, isn't it?), (2) What your list says might be on that frequency, (3) The language you heard the $b c$ in, (4) The time of reception, and (5) Any program information you can glean from the broadcast (e.g., if you hear an ad for Inca Kola, you should be narrowing your search to Perv. If you hear $S S$, you don't look in the Brazil section of the list.)
When you mark a logging tentative every time you hear a broadcast but don't hear a positive ID, you know you're cured. Good luck, and think good thoughts. Clios A Arke

## MORE ON THE R-600

AN ADDENDUM TO BOB RAYMOND'S JULY REVIEW by Robert B. Flick, MO

The $\mathrm{R}-600$ sells for $\$ 325$ here in St. Louis compared to $\$ 425$ for the $\mathrm{R}-1000$; with the same selectivity and sensitivity specifications less the digital clock, the analog dial and two or three rather shiny switches.
I rate the receiver as excellent in the AM mode. The dynamic range of this receiver is exceptional and it handles the big signals on the international bands without a hitch. In the "narrow mode" the audio is muted, but can be improved by tuning 1.5 kHz higher or lower than the carrier frequency. It also helps to turn the tone control to "high".

My QTH is surrounded by FM, TV and broadcast stations. Poorly designed shortwave sets become sieves permitting the above signals to pour through. There was no TV or FM breakthrough that I could detect--and I searched forit. There was All broadcast band breakthough up to the 4 HHz band. A filter would be required to eliminate this problem, if DXing is anticipated below i. 5 kHz .
SSB and CW reception is excellent. However, the tuning rate for these modes is a little fast and I had to practice tuning $s-1-0-w-1-y$. When I use my MFJ-721 CW filter I had trouble capturing CW signals when it is set for sharp selectivity.
The R-600 is certainly "plain-Jane" when set next to a R-1000. However, for a hundred bucks less, it may be the current "best buy" in shortwave receivers.

Also, he can now afford to send me to a better school, so I will transfer to Duke in the fall. Long live the revolution! Sarah Werling, Washington-DC, September, CRIB - I disagree with the editorial in the August CRIB that US pirate stations are no different than the commercial stations. Pirate stations differ from comercial stations in two ways: 1) Commerical stations play music on cartridge tapes; pirates use the actual record. 2) Commercial stations play the same song 12 times a day. A pirate station, during its average 20 minute broadcast, will play a song only once. I heard a new station last night: Voice of Nude S:I. ##  BOOK REVIEW

Oliver P. Ferrell, Confidential Frequency List. 5th edition Gilfer Associates, Inc., 52 Park Ave., Park Ridge, NJ 07656 225 pages, paper, $\$ 9.95$.
Finally released at the end of June, and up-dated to April 1982, this work (hereafter CFL) lists non-broadcast stations between 4.0 and 28.0 MHz , except for anateur and RTTY outlets. Thus one will find therein fixed, mobile, land, marine aeronautical, CW, SSB and facsimile UTE stations. It is not explained why listings begin 2.4 lHz above the MW BCB band, but RTTY UTEs are covered in Ferrell's Guide to RTTY Freguencies, whose latest edition will appear in Fall 1982. The word "confidential" in the title does not refer to any data appearing in the book, but to content of the messages carried by the listed stations, which is protected by law in most countries.
This revised and enlarged 5 th edition is nicely formated and contains twice as many pages and $50 \%$ more stations than the 4 th edition, so that some 6 to 7 thousand now are listed. Moreover, for the first time, stations appear by call sign as well as by frequency. CFL's compiler is an old-time SW monitor, who has been an editor of Popular Electronics, Stereo Review and CQ. Currently, he is the chief executive of Gilfer Associates, SW equipment purveyers. For the CFL he has had the help not only of a word processor, but of a great many foreign and domestic contributors.
The work begins with 12 pages of introduction, which should be read by all users. Next comes 144 pages of one-line station listings ordered by frequency. These are followed by 63 pages of the same stations appearing by call sign. The book ends with $1 / / 2$ pages of a single-alphabet key to the abbreviations that are extensively used.
Although basically worldwide in scope, below 6.0 MHz chief emphasis is placed on stations most readily heard in North America. In the by-frequency listing, the information for each station is sequenced: frequency, mode, call sign, location, type of service, power, remarks. In the briefer call sign listing: call sign, location, service, mode, frequencies used. An especially helpful feature is provision of section headings in the frequency list to indicate each particular band in the HF spectrum (i.e. "Fixed Service," "Aeronautical Mobile," "Harine Coast," etc.) All frequencies are exact carrier frequencies, even in the case of SSB stations, whose "carriers" (about 1.5 kHz above or below actual frequencies) are, of course, missing on the air.
One warning perhaps is advisable, however, for potential nevcomers to the UTE field who buy this book. To understand a high percentage of the listed stations, one must be able to read Morse code fluently, or at least possess (and know how to use) a code reader or converter. (Many UTE fans are, of course, ex-hams.)

Can this much improved work now be considered to be "complete" or "definitive"? Emphatically FO! INon-broadcast stations are so numerous through the world, so frequently popping up and disappearing, so constantly changing their characteristics, that no book of this type can ever be more than temporarily "helpful." However, without them one is helpless indeed. (Even the records of the International Telecommunications Union are shockingly incomplete and out-of-date!) Thus a 6th edition will be required very soon, but those who need more frequently revised data can suiscribe to the by-frequency section on monthlyundated floppy disks.
In conclusion, CFL, together with its companion Guide to RTTY Frequencies, provides SV UTE station listings analogous to (but much, much briefer than) the SW BCB listings appearing annually in the World Racio TV Handbook. UTE fans have found earlier editions of Ferrell's lists most useful, and will find the 1982 editions even better. In fact, they are "must purchase" items, just like WRTH.

##  A PERSONAL VIEW <br> TALE OF THO EROTHERS <br> by Eob Raymond, IMA

Burning the midnight oil, rising early from a warm bed, enduring a worladay red-eyed with fatigue from a good night's rest lost to the pursuit of elusive DX stations, the glorious victories, the sad defeats; that is what our mutual avocation is all about! People may wonder why we enjoy such an activity--I wonder how we each got started in it. . .
For my brother Greg and I, it all started a long time ago. My parents told me that my interest in radios probably had its genesis back when I was a youngster. I had this strange desire to stick my fingers in electrical wall outlets back then which was a sort of shock therapy that modified my behavior and generated my interest in radio! Greg chose the more normal route of learning from his older brother!
In all actuality, I became interested in radio due to the radio's mystique! Imagine! This unique appliance could receive programs from stations many miles avay allowing me to eavescrop on what was going on. Truly anazing! I had to learn more about them and use then as often as I could.
After realizing the radio's potential to receive distant stations, it seemed logical to me to keep a record of what I had heard and to get someone else interested in listening with me. My older brother Gary and I were actually the first two in my farily to do some DXing. Together, we logged quite a few $\operatorname{BCD}$ stations with the exact number a mystery to me since this occured more than twenty years ago!
While Gary eventually lost interest, my fascination with DX was increased by those BCB sessions. The farther the station was away from me the better! At that time, I didn't know about shortwave; imagine how pleased I was to hear of its existence!
Shortwave radio was introduced to me by my father and my great-grandmother. The former had brought home an old Normende portable and the latter owned a Bulova radio. I was anazed upon hearing Radio Hoscow in English one night witin my father. That did it! I had to have my ow shortwave radio and tune these stations!
I inherited the Dulova portable upon my great-grandmother's death in 1905. Aware of my interest, she wanted me to have her radio. With thanks to her, I embarked on a hobby that will stay with me until I go to that great DXheaven where QSL's from Radio Dotswana are commonplace!
After setting up a monitor station logging a few stations, my mother ordered me a subscription to Radio-TV Experimenter which was a bi-monthly magazine that contained the old White's Radio Log. Shortiy thereafter, Greg became interested and together we DX-ed quite often.

It was then that Greg and I, not knowing anything about how to design a proper antenna or how to obtain QSL's, began our DXing mostly at night. We would stay up all night, except for scheduled rest periods, DXing stations on the Bulova using only a telescoping antenna. It was during these $D X$ sessions that I first noted Greg's deep affection for sleep! INany times after his first scheduled rest period, that was it for the evening! To this day he is very difficult to wake up and quite insistent that one not try too much! I always vear safety goggles and padding when I try to wake him now!
Then we discovered QSLing, we decided to break-up our mutual station and DX arrangement. Going solo, we set up a friendly and cooperative competition on who would obtain the most quality-QSLs. Le vired an intercon between his upstairs station and my downstairs station. then either of us received a station the other had not we pressed the intercom into service!

Our outdoor antennas were not ones that would have appeared in the various radio books of the day. They were constructed in keeping with the Raymond Axiom on Antennas: just put
it up, any length will do, and connect it! And, by all means, put up at least five antennas a piece! We put up so many antennas that one could not see the sky if he stood below them! We ran the lead-in wires through the cellar to my station and, along with the intercom wires, through an unused furnace duct to Greg's station. To this day, my father still finds more of those "damn wires" in the cellar even though he thwught they vere gone after the house was revovated.

The daily vigil for the mailman in the hope that he would have QSLs was also a frequent occurance. We could hardly wait for "John-the-tiailman" (our regular carrier whom we never called "John", just "John-the-mailman" ever since we were quite young) and were disappointed when the QSLs just weren't in the cards that day!
Many different rigs followed through the years and we did, finally, come to understand what comprised a proper antenna set-up. In 1970, we decided to start our own radio club. Since we both were using Radio Shack rigs, we thought it would be a nice idea to start a club composed of people who used the same style receiver. We called the organization the Realistic DX Club (RDXC) and put out a monthly bulletin of feature articles and loggings.
We had a lot of fun writing the RDXC bulletins with our only wish being that our members enjoyed reading them. Apparently they did not since participation was low and we achieved a membership of only twenty people across the US and Canada. Our membership did boast some notables such as SPEEDXers Ken Earhart and Wayne Oliver with Wayne serving as an editor at one point.
Greg and I occasionally read some of the bulletins of ten years ago. Some are really a riot to read; others were very good. Particularly humorous are Greg and Wayne's guillotine-sytle pleas for more participation. One of the better bulletins was our ANARC ' 72 review where we printed an interview we had with the late Eddie Startz of Radio Nederland. At that convention, Greg represented the RDXC in a panel discussion on shortwave. He spoke of the talent it takes to $D X$ with a Radio Shack-style radio (with all due respects to our now-mutual employer!!).
In 1973, I left the family fold to start an ill-fated marriage. Later, Greg left and, as sometimes happens in adolescense, we drifted apart. But it was DXing as a mutual hobby that provided that common denominator that makes us more than just brothers today. I consider Greg to be my best friend!
Even since our reemergence into the hobby after a five-year hiatis in 1980 , we remain close friends and share many things in common. Greg works for Western Electric as a technician full-time and as a salesman at Radio Shack part-time. I also work for the Shack as a manager. Greg just obtained his ham license and has the call of KAlINX while I have held one since 1978 -KAlBAM. We live in the same apartment complex and are getting married this summer (No, not to each other! Greg to Cheryl Morse and I to Cathy Chaff).
As I look back now, my DX association to Greg and DXing in and of itself was quite rewarding and still is! I hope that the story of how we got interested in this great hobby has been interesting to you the SPEEDX reader. I encourage all SPEEDXers to share with each other the story of how it all began for you.

##  <br> FRENCH POLYNESIA AND DX

 STATION REVIEWby Norman Hill, VA
French Polynesia is made up of 700 islands spanning nearly 1000 miles, north to south. Tahiti, Moorea and Bora-Bora are the main islands. Huahine, Rangiroa, Raeatea, Australs and Marqueses form an outer group of islands. In 1980 my friends and I visited this area. Shortwave and mediumwave DXing was interesting, as was my visit to FR-3.
Telecommunications on the main islands are via telephone and VHF radio ( $25-512 \mathrm{dHz}$ ). The outer islands are dependent on shortwave ( $4-25 \mathrm{IHz}$ ). Post Office, Telephone and Radio matters are under the PTT, as are the hefty and very expensive radio licenses (nearly $\$ 1000$ per year).
FR-3 Tahiti has a radio service on mediumwave ( 738 kIIz ) and on shortwave ( 6135,11825 and 15170 kHz ). It is on from $0600-2300$ local time. The main languages are Tahitian and French. An Fin network is in the making, but at present Fil is now being used for studiotransmitter linking. Studios are located at the center of the island. According to Louis Larrieu, of FR-3 Radio, most reception reports come from European DXers.
FR-3 TV operates TV services on most islands, except in the Australs and iarqueres. They use the French TV system ( 625 lines) and SECAH colour. Droadicasts are in French and Tahitian, and generally between 1900-2230 daily.
There is a supply of Grundig, Philips and Japanese receivers in most stores. To conclude, if you go there, some stations to try for are: R. Cook Islands ( 630 kHz ), KFI ( 640 ) KAMU
(940), 4Qi (612), R. Kuwait (15345), RiNZ (15485) and î. Solomon's (5020). (A personal thanks to Louis Larrieu of FR-3 Radio for supplying most of this information.)

I'm sure that many SWLers have encountered people totally in the dark (out of band?) in regards to our hobby. All the crazy questions, remarks, and thoughts about our antennas and listening habits. The following seems to be the standard sequence of events.
I notice my neighbors peering at me around corners. I also encounter my neighbors dumbfoundedly gazing at my antennas on more than one occasion. I'm sure the mailman has informed them about the amount of foreign mail I receive. Their courage builds as it's not long before they're asking me, "Are you a spy or what?".

FCC PLANS TO SHUT-DOWN LEGAL ONE-IMAN RADIO STATION: According to the May 11, New Yonk Times, the FCC plans to take away the broadcast license of WVCA-FM which is a oneman radio station run by Simon Geller. The station which broadcasts classical music is fighting back with its supporters and listeners raising money for a court fight and writing protest letters to the FCC and President Reagan. Mr. Geller feels his license is being removed because the FCC wants to award the license to the Grandbanke Corp., whose officer is a Mr . Josiah Spalding, a man prominent in Republican politics in Massachusetts where the station is located. Geller has stated that the FCC is playing politics. (Getzel, NY)
CHANGES AT VOA: According to a New York Times article of July 11, entitled "VOA to Broadcast More Opinion," there are some major changes happening at our local external broadcaster. First, Mr Hughes, VOA's director, has stated that the VOA will broadcast more editorial opinion reflecting the viewpoint of the Reagan Administration. The man who will carry out this new endeavor will be Seth Cropsey, a former reporter for Fortune Magazine. He will be VOA's first Chief Editorial writer. In further developments, the VOA has opened a new studio in New York and has added two new languages. The languages are Pashto to Afghanistan and Azerbaijani to the Soviet Union, Iran and Turkey. TUNING IN AIR FORCE ONE: A June 10, New York Times article focus' in on various efforts by SWL's to tune in the President. However, the article has many mistakes. It shows a picture of the $R F-2200$ and calls it a ham rig and identifies the SVL in the article, Stuart Stogel, as a ham operator. (Ruth Hesch, NY)

RADIO CATRO AIRS HEBREW LESSONS: According to the May 16-22 Jerusalem Post, R. Cairo is now broadcasting Ilebrew lessons which were broadcast by Israel Radio's Arabic section. (Norman Hill, VA)
