The names of all SPEEDXers who send in a qualifying entry by the deadline will be placed in a hat and two names will be drawn out. The first name drawn will receive the three BBC posters mentioned in the July Program Panorama. The second name drawn will receive a 1983 BBC Greenwich Observatory calender. Please note that time and frequency schedules will not be considered in the contest--the schedules submitted must be for English programs which can be heard on the station(s). Participants who send in a schedule for more than one of the stations will have a slip of paper with their name put in the hat for each qualifying schedule. The programs are broadcast in the following order: TODAY IN HISTORY is heard daily, followed by a NEWSCAST 0 every day but Sun. On Mon thru Fri COMMENTARY ON INYERNATINNAL AFFATRS and SPOTLIGHT ON LATIN AMERICA follow. On Sat SPOTLIGHT immediately follows the NEWSCAST. The Mon thru Sat lineup then continues with TODAY IN SPORTS and FROM THE IAND OF MUSIC. Three feature programs follow--Mon PANORANA, LATIN AMERICAN SONGS, EYENITNESS AFRICA; TUE CUBA AND THE WORID, MUSICAL QSL, THE CUBAN STORY; Wed CUBAN PROFILE, LATIN AMERICAN SONGS, SOCIALISM: THE NEW WORLD; Thu POST OFFICE BOX 7026 , MUSICAL QSL, MARXIST REVIEN; FYI CUBA AND THE WORLD, LATIN AMERICAN SONGS, SOCIALISM: THE NEN WORID; Sat CUBAN CUITURE, MUSICAL QSL, NENSLIVE HAVANA. The Sun lineup is: TODAY IN HISTORY, CUBAN PROFIIE, THE CUBAI STORY, FROM THE LAND OF MUSIC, P.O. BOX 7026 , LATIN AMERICAN SONGS, THE WORLD OF STAMPS. ANARC CONVENTION '82: John "KAP" Kapinos was HAP-USA representative at the ANARC ' 82 Convention and sent along a preliminary report on the HAP activities there. The auction cleared enough such that the $50 \%$ for HAP-USA came to about $\$ 1080$ !. Also, arrangements have been confirmed so that the HAP-USA Library can supply service to the Canadian Handicapped Aid Program. This has been wanted by HAP-USA for some time.

The HAP-USA Gene Moser Memorial Award was presented to J. Roland Desrosiers, for his service as Director of HAP-USA during a very chaotic period from January to March, 1981. The Board of Directors of HAP-USA decided two were deserving of the MAP Volunteer of the Year Award. One goes to Robert Wirrell of Brockton, MA, former Membership Chairman of HAP-USA. The other goes to Thomas D. Haskett of Gary, IN, a member of Sam Barto's Fund Raising staff. Both are deserving of the award!

HAP-USA also submitted its formal application for Full Member status in the Association of North American Radio Clubs (ANARC).

## CIA eavesdroppers move into Swaziland

## The CIA has set up a radio station in Mbabane designed to intercept communications. One likely target is neighbouring Mozambique.

The United States Embassy in Mbabne, Swaziland, has recently become the site of a new broadcast monitoring station run by the CIA. At least, that is the report from the June, 1982, issue of Africa Now Magazine. According to a story written by Steven Vegh, under an agreement signed August 3, 1981, by Swaziland's Deputy Prime Minister, Senator Ben Nsibandze, and the US Charge d'affaires, Jeff Hartly, the US embassy now houses a new office of the Foreign Broadcast Info. Services (FBIS). Officially, the FBIS, which produces daily reports of news monitored from "foreign bosts, news agency transmissions, etc" and printed media from around the world, is part of the National Technical Information Svc. of the US Dept. of Commerce. According to Africa Now, it is an open secret that the FBIS is really a part of the CIA. The station is the first of its kind in Southern Africa. The cIA has a vast communications $H Q$ for Africa at the US embassy in Monrovia, Liberia and another, smaller station is located at the embassy in Nairobi, Kenya. Apparently, neither of these stations provided ample reception of Southern Africa. According to William Schaap, co-editor of the Covert Action Information Bulletin (CAIB), the FBIS, besdies monitoring radio xmtns, also eavesdrops on telephone, teletype and other RTTY communications.

The F'BIS staffs and facilities are separate entities from the VOA stations located throughout the world. Interestingly, the VOA has opened a relay station in Botswana (it went on the air---mediumwave only---in sept. 1981). The US and Botswana share the bcst hours, with the VOA xmting 6 hrs per day in EE. (continued on last page of SWBC DX AFRICA...)

## RECEIVER REVIEW

THE PAIJASONIC RF-085 PORTABLE RECEIVER by Kevin Davidson, SC

In the continuing saga of my search for a suitable receiver to take traveling, I have purchased a Panasonic $R F-085$. This receiver has proved eminently suitable for my purposes. It also provides an interesting study in the trade-offs between price and features.
First, the specifications: Receiver size is $7^{\prime \prime} \times 4 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 1 \frac{1}{2} 2^{\prime \prime}$. Sensitivity is 5 uV. The unit tunes continuously from 2 to 18 MHz plus FM and MW .

After having my $\mathrm{DX}-60$ demolished in airline luggage, I knew that a traveling receiver must be easily carried by hand. The RF-085 fits that bill. It is just the size of a paperback book! Remarkably free from projections and snags, I did accidentally turn it on once when slipping it into a pocket.
There are 5 recessed controls: off/on, band selector, volume, tone and tuning. The unit comes with an earphone and is powered by 4 AA cells or an external 6 -volt supply. Battery consumption is reported to be low (see review in WRTH '81). External antenna connections are available for shortwave and FM. There is a $30^{\prime \prime}$ collapsible whip antenna and a carrying strap. The receiver comes with a 2-year warranty and is available for $\$ 79.95$. The receiver may be hard to find in retail stores, but is available by mail from Spectronics.
In order to keep the price down, this receiver has minimized features and concentrated on doing a few things well. For example, the tuning range is limited (omitting 13 meters). I think that this receiver is suited only for receiving broadcast stations. Since there is no BFO , CW and SSB reception is out. Also images from strong broadcasters plague the in-between frequencies. Next to the compact size, the next most outstanding feature is the excellent audio quality. The sound is truly remarkable and derives, in large measure, from the powerful speaker magnet. (The owner's manual warns the user to keep away from watches and magnetic tapes.) When the receiver is placed on a hard surface, the bass response is tremendous. In addition to the speaker, an unobtrusive AGC and adequate (SWL) selectivity result in above average clarity in reception. In a word, the receiver is quiet.

I suspect that every DXer thins he has a talent for tuning-a special, delicate touch. He will need it here! About $21 / 2$ turns of a $25-c e n t-p i e c e-s i z e d$ knob covers 11 to 18 MHz . Tuning is difficult. The LED tuning indicator is some help in tuning, but is almost useless in assessing signal strength. Tuning is assisted by the absolute inmunity to handling. The receiver can be put on a table or held in hand or lap with no affect on tuning (there are metal shields over the circuit board).
Carrying the radio around the house, I have received Egypt and Lebanon, most of the Europeans and Australia. Bot of the R. Australia 31 -meter frequencies are reliable every morning. I have found tropical band reception to be poor with the whip antenna as would be expected.

The tuning is stable enough to leave the set tuned to a station and return to it the next day. Drift is not noticeable. The radio is free from overloading on shortwave when using the whip antenna. With an external antenna, it's a different story; overloading is so severe as to ruin reception on the powerful international bands. There is an overloading problem on $F M$ even with the whip antenna. Here, near Greenville, $S C, I$ have to collapse the whip to prevent overload. On a recent trip to Oklahoma City, I observed that the tuning indicator LED stayed on solid across the entire Fil band; collapsing the ship helped.

The receiver has another annoying problem. Distorted images of strong FM stations appear on the shortwave bands. In Oklahoma City, there were several of these images-the worst of which obscured the low end of the 49 m band. Here in Easley, only one image (from WNU FH) appears around 11.5 MHz . I say "around" because even though the dial calibration is very accurate, markings appear only on every Megahertz (which is fine if all you listen to is WWV).

It's easy to say that this receiver really needs dual conversion, a trf stage, an antenna trimmer, better dynamic range, a BFO,bandspread, digital readout, a tuning meter, a noise blanker, variable AGC and the like, but then it wouldn't cost $\$ 79.95$.
The reason that $I$ have such a positive overall reaction to the $\mathrm{RF}-085$ is its practical utility. It is portable-put it in your pocket; the sound is clear-no squeals to upset the family and perfect for air travel.
Finally, the $\mathrm{RF}-085$ has a subtle benefit for the DXer like me who listens more of ten for $D X$ rather than content. It allows a more casual and informal opportunity for listening away from the "main receiver." There's a world of easy-to-receive fascinating programming out there.

## DXING AIDS

TWO NEW VERY USEFUL PIECES OF EQUIfMENT BY R.L. DRAKE

THE "SURGE SHUNT" TRANSIENT ARRESTOR: It's that time of year again. . our old friend lightning is back to put crashing bolts of static through our headphones. Lightning makes low frequency DXing unpleasant if not impossible, but there is an even more serious side to this menace. While lightning may give you a mere headache, it can blow the "brains" out of your receiver!


Some listeners feel that since their antenna is too low for a direct strike, that they need not worry about lightning. Folks this is not the case! According to a recent article in CQ Magazine, damage to solid state receivers is one thousand times more likely to occur from nearby strikes or static build up, rather than a direct hit. The state-of-the-art receivers that are in abundance now, have FET "front-ends" and extensive CMOS circuitry and are very sensitive to static charges. A technician I know who works on communications gear says that, this stuff "blows" if you look at it wrong! That is an exaggeration, but not by much! Most of the components in this new gear can aptly be described as eight or sixteen legged fuses.
You say you already are using a lightning arrestor? If you were to break it open you would be surprised to find what is inside. . . nothing! Most arrestors work on a "gap" principle. There is a small adjustable air gap between the inner conductor and the outer ground. Ideally, when a large voltage enters the antenna it will "jump" across the gap and go to ground. These arrestors provide adequate protection to tube radios, but afford almost no protection to solid state radios. The air gap arrestors are too erratic and unpredictable since the breakdown voltage cannot be accurately controlled with such a primitive device. To address this deficiency a new gneration of protection devices have been developed. The respected Drake Company of Miamisburg, Ohio calls their new arrestors the "SURGE SHUNT". Now the "gap" is enclosed in a hermetically sealed ceramic tube filled with a special gas of known breakdown characteristics and response time. Since the gap is sealed, the response time will not be affected by temperature, humidity, pressure, etc. This makes for more reliable and predictable protection of your valuable equipment. The SURGE SHUNT offers other benefits over a conventional arrestor as well. When a high voltage is detected it is sent directly to the attached ground wire verses back into the ground of the receiving system. This "isolated ground" design is safer. The SURGE SKUNT can be installed at ANY convenient point in the coaxial feeding line with very low insertion loss.
Although the SURGE SHUNT cost more than a regular arrestor, it is a small price to pay for the improved protection of your receiving equipment. For more information contact your Drake dealer.
LF2 and LF6 LINE FILTERS: Computer and radio buffs will be interested in two new R.L. Drake products. These are the Model LF-2 and LF-6 Line Filters.


AC line noise can ruin reception and $A C$ line transients (spikes) can ruin radios! The new Drake line filters can help us with both problems! Both filters are designed to pass the 60 Hz line frequency, but block radio frequency noise, called hash. Also these filters will block interference between equipment in the listening shack that is transmitted through the line. The LF6 cured the interaction experienced between a teleprinter and radioteletype demodulator used in our RTTY setmup. The filters achieve this with a 3 stage filter built into each duplex outlet. Also these units will give excellent spike protection blocking transients of up to 100 amperes. These transients can be caused by nearby lightning strikes and other high current line problems.
The LF2 has one grounded duplex outlet (accomnodates 2 plugs) and the LF6 has three grounded duplex outlets (accommodates 6 plugs). Both units have 6 foot heavy-duty power cords. The LF6 has a 15 amp (3AG) fuse plus an illuminated on/off switch.

#  BOOK REVIEW <br> HOW TO TUNE THE SECRET SHORTWAVE SPECTRUM - A REVIEW by Kirk Baxter, KS 

Harry L. Helms, How to Tune the Secret Shortwave Spectrum

While perusing the books in our county library the other day, I noticed in the new books section a title of interest. They had recently acquired a book by Harry Helms entitled How to Tune the Secret Shortwave Spectrum. Having read this book over the last couple of weeks, (it's really not that long-about 180 pages), I can recommend it to anyone that tunes between the regular $S W$ bands for their listening enjoyment.
The book contains eleven chapters which I shall try to briefly describe. Chapter one discesses the evolution of clandestine broadcasting in the post-war era and in the different continents of the world-this gives a good historical perspective. Chapter two deals with espionage radio activity and discusses in full detail (but with few new revelations) all about those mysterious number stations. The book contains many freequency tables, and despite the fact that the book was written about two to three years ago now, some of the frequencies are still active. Chapter three deals with government and military communications and there are cursory discussions about diplomatic communications and the S.A.C. This material is fairly elementary for the average utility listener. Chapter four covers space communications and discusses satellites of the U.S. and other countries, along with a list of frequencies. Included is a list of launch support frequencies with some of the frequencies for Cape Radio (Cape Kennedy), a brief description about weather satellites, and Soviet satellite activity.
Chapter five covers 'illegal communications", which Helms has subtitled "funny stuff in the ham bands". As Helms points out, the ham bands provide a good cover for spy communications because the large volume of stations offers a good canouflage. Also discussed is how the ham bands have been used by drug smugglers, terrorists, and other unusual groups. In this chapter the $10 \frac{1}{2}$ meter band is discussed along with eavesdropping techniques. Chapter six deals with pirate broadcasting in Europe and it covers such stations as R. Mercur, R. Nordsee International, Voice of Peace, R. Viking, Westside R., and Free F. Bnoadcasting Corporation, to name a few. For those (like myself) that don't know too much about European pirates, this chapter is a good summary of some of the activity that has been heard; and again there is a table of stations and frequencies of these pirates, although many are now inactive.
Chapter seven deals with pirate broadcasting in N.A., with a table listing stations from 1973 up to about 1979. The history of pirate radio is given, and WTIT is listed as one of
the first pirates, initially heard in 1973, along with Radio Clandestine. Other stations discussed were Wild Turkey Radio, R. King Kong, WAPL, WHBC, WCPR, WDEX, KVFF, and the Voice of the Voyager. Anyone interested in the full history of this station is urged to read this section of the chapter. The station was reported to first be on the air on $12 / 25 / 77$, and put off the air (what was thought to be once and for all) on $1 / 14 / 79$.
Chapter eight deals with unknown and unidentified signals such as beacons, echos, the Russian woodpecker, and strange RTTY signals (which every RTTYer has heard). Chapter nine deals with receivers and clubs, with tables of the morse code and addresses of clubs. Chapter ten talks about the FCC and radio, and chapter eleven lists more recent loggings since Helms began writing the book in early 1979.
The book covers many interesting aspects of SW that are usually ignored, and does not contain the usual chapters about receivers, antennas, headphones, filters, propagation, and paraphernalia used in SWLing, which is common for this type of book. Wy only complaint is that for a 'new' book, the most current listing is for late 1979; I suppose it takes a long time for editing and publishing. Perhaps Helms' newer book The SWL's Manual of Non-Broadcast Stations will be more current. (This newer book is listed at TAB \#1235, $\$ 12.95,272$ pages. It appears to deal mainly with utility stations and not the 'unusual' stations on the SW band.)
I would suggest that anyone interested in utility listening, or the ususual signals heard in our hobby, should take time to read this book. It provides a good summary for the beginner listener, and even the old timer could probably learn from this book.

A PERSONAL VIEW
HAM VS. SWL

"Shortwave listeners are either too lazy or too stupid to become anateur operators." "Oh, yeah? Hans are a bunch of inconsiderate slobs who are so wrapped up in their dits and dahs that they forget about the real world."
Does this exchange sound familiar? It should because it has been occurring whever hams and swLs confront one another. Unfortunately, this verbal confrontation of ten degenerates into an attack on the talents, mentality and ancestry of the parties involved.
Not only are these exchanges harmful to the radio communications hobby, they are ridiculous. Comparing hams and SWhs is like comparing apples and oranges-they're similar but also different. About the only thing hams and SWLs have in common is the fact that they both use electronic devices capable of intercepting radio waves. Utility DXers may have more in common with amateur operators than the typical SWL does because they monitor similar transmissions (CW and SSB).
Why do these confrontations oocur? While there may be several insignificant reasons behind these confrontations, the underlying cause is misunderstanding. Rather than spending time in useless confrontations, hams and SWLs need to get together and discuss the differences that make their hobbies so unique.
In general, hams tend to view SWLs as lazy or stupid because it is difficult for the average amateur to understand why someone would spend $\$ 1000$ for a receiver when the same amount of money could be used to furnish a respectable ham shack. After all, why would anybody want to listen to the Beach Boys on the BBC when they can hear them on the local AM radio station? It's more sensible to engage in meaningful two-way communication with a foreign amateur than it is to spend time writing reception reports to some foreign broadcaster who could care less about the SINPO evaluation sent by a listener in Spudville, Idaho.
On the other hand, SWLs tend to classify hams as overbearing, superior and inconsiderate. Even casual monitoring of the more popular segments of the amateur bands reveals the operation of the self-proclaimed Frequency Policeman. This misguided individual believes he has a God-given responsibility to keep the prime frequencies clear of any amateurs who don't measure up to his own arbitrary standards. Many SWLs who run across these individuals automatically view the amateur community with disdain and turn away from an active participation in amateur communications.
Participants in all aspects of the communications hobby who are openminded will admit that they don't know all there is to know about the other segments of the hobby. The tropical band DXer may know virtually nothing about the utility DXer, but that doesn't make one DXer more intelligent than the other. By the same token, the amateur who works high speed CW is no more intelligent than the ham who enjoys roundtable QSOs and has trouble deciphering code at 5 wpm .
The whole conflict can be resolved with a little understanding of what makes each person choose a particular aspect of the communications hobby. An individual might become a
shortwave listener because of an interest in politics, geography, folk music, literature or a myriad of other reasons. This does not mean that the SWL is incapable of learning the code or theory required to obtain an amateur license. it simply means that he or she is not interested in that particular branch of the hobby.
On the other hand, a person may enter amateur radio because of an interest in public service, a desire to meet new people, curiosity about improving operating techniques, a desire to develop a new circuit or many more reasons. Participation in two-way comsunication does not mean hams are superior to the Swh. It means that these individuals are more interested in actively commanicating with persons from other areas of the United States or foreign countries,

Hams and SWLs can coexist without conflict. How? By taking the time to understand each other and their respective hobbies. it's always easier to condemn that which we don't understand than it is to take the time to learn about it. Hams should visit the shacks of their counterparts, and vice versa. It's possible that some hams and SWhs might branch out and find that they can combine the two hobbies and provide even more enjoyment for their leisure time pursuits.

## JAMMING

THE NOT SO WONDERFUL WORLD OF JAMAING

Jamming is caused by a witches brew of politics, radio and people. The equipment used in jamming costs at least 250 million dollars, the operating costs are well over 100 million a year, and the work force involved totals over 5000. This is a lot of effort when all you are producing is noise.
In this article, we will attempt to answer some important questions: What are the various types of jamming equipment? Who has jammed in the past and who is jamming today? When are jammers ineffective? And how much power is consumed by the jamming equipment?

The first type of jamning equipnent I'd like to discuss is the "skywave jammer". This works by calculating where the incoming broadcast is coming from. Then the jaming signal is bounced off the ionisphere at just the correct angle to bring it down to earth at the same point as the incoming broadcasts. The second type of jammer is called a "groundwave station." Groundwave stations are local jammers. These are smaller transmitters than the skywaves mentioned above. They produce a high intensity, but low range jamming signal designed to drown out broadcasts coming into their local vicinity.
However, neither system is perfect. The skywave jammers may be advantageous in the fact that they cover larger areas, are directional and can be used to jam one area today and another tomorrow. But they use a lot of power-between 100 and 250 kw per hour. And aiming these jammers can never be done perfectly so often 4 or 5 jammers are uned and they are all aimed at the target broadcast. Also, skywave jammers are crippled for a few hours every day. Take for instance the USA beaming a signal to the USSR, and the Soviet Union is using skywave jammers to make the broadcast unintelligible. The Western stations are immune from jamming during the twilight hours because it is the sun that gives the ionisphere the electric charges that turns it into a reflecting ceiling. The sun goes down a few hours earlier in the East than in the West which means the ionisphere begins to break up a few hours earlier in the East than in the West. And during those few hours, when the "ceiling" is gone in the East but is still there in the West, the jammers in the East can no longer bounce jamming signals off the ionisphere, while the West can transmit jammer-free. On the other hand, the groundwave stationd do not use the ionisphre. They are cheaper to run. They consume only 10 to 20 kw hours of electricity. They seem to be more effective. But their range is only local so that many transmitters must be used during the twilight immunity period mentioned above, to block out an entire country from Western broadcasts.
The first recorded case of jamming dates back to the First World War, when the Germans used a five-kw jamner to try to block out telegram traffic between Paris and St. Petersburg. In 1926, monarchist Romania jammed Moscow radio broadcasts on the Bessarabia question. In 1934, the Dollfuss government in Austria jammed the Third Reich broadcasts od Dr. Goebbels. In 1936 Italy jammed Abyssinia. And both sides used jammers during the Spanish Civil War. In the Seond World War there was some jamming by Italy and Japan and the Germans mounted a major jamming effort to block out the BRC. By 1950, the USSR had several hundred jamming transmitters on the air. The USSR stepped up their janmers when Radio Liberty began broadcasts to the USSR in 1953, while they also jammed Radio Free Europe since 1951. Within five years, there were 2000 jammers on the air in Russia. Then, in 1956, Poland stopped jamming. That was the year of the Poznan riots-during which the rebellious workers attacked the jamaing transmitters. Jamming returned in Poland in 1959.

Also, Britain and Greece jamed each other during the Cyprus Var of the 1950's. Rhodesia and Britain used jamers during the Rhodesia dispute of the 60's. Lastly, Greece and Turkey used jammers during the Cyprus crisis of 1975.
Today, China has stopped jamming the VOA. East Germany has also stopped jamming the broadcasts of RIAS-Berlin. But the USSR continues to jan. So does many Eastern European countries within the Soviet orbit.

You can try to get around jamming by turning your FINE TUIING KNOE, or whatever, on one side of the station's transmission. But, on the whole, jamang is impossible to silence on your receiver.

Today it is interesting to note that if Radio Marti, a US station that still hasn't been approved, begins broadcasts, Cuba will increase ten fold their broadcasts on 1 to the US, causing havoc with US broadcasters in addition to jamming the station itself. Whatever happens it will not be good news for INW DXERS.

VOA TO MODERNIZE: In his syndicated column of August 3, 1982, Jack Anderson commented on President Reagan's proposal to modernize VOA's old and deteriorating equipment. The proposal will cost over $\$ 300$ million. The money will be earmarked for the improvement of transmitters-especially in Europe, North Africa, and Southeast Asia in addition to an increase in broadcast hours and languages. Negotiations are under way for transmitter sites in the Cayman Islands and Sri Lanka. In addition, 500 kw transmitters would be installed at the Tangier and Germany relay sites. (From Roger W . Pettengill, AE, Lawrence Wagner, PA, Peter Schulsinger, OH)
PUSSIAN RADAR INTERFERENCE: In an article by Leslie Wyatt entitled Woody, the Russian Woodpecker which appeared in the "Naples Star" of July 30, 1982, much is made to do about anateur radio's battle with powerful Soviet radar signals dubbed "the Woodpecker" The article notes various ways the hams are fighting back, such as the use of noise blankers and sending return signals to the Soviet Union which block out the woodpecker's echo. CB ANTENNA SAFETY RULE: According to the Ann Arbor News of July 8, 1982, the Consumer Product Safety Commission has adopted a rule making all CB antennas shock-proofed on account of the fact that 45 people each year are electrocuted while putting up CB antennas. This happens when the antenna inadvertently hits an electrical power line. (David L. Claytor, MI)
VOA'S OBJECTIVITY: The Ann Arbor News of July 20, 1982 reports in an article entitled "Keep VOA Objective, Report Advises," that the US Advisory Commission on Public Diplomacy has advised the Reagan Administration that the VOA's new policy called "Project Trutin" is casting the VOA as a propaganda station. On the other hand, the Commission said it has found no evidence that VOA's objectivity has been compromised. It's just a matter of worldwide perception. (Claytor, MI)
VOA DIRECTOR LEAVES POST: The Harrisburg Patriot and the Birmingham News reports
former editor of The Christian Science Monitor on the same day a report criticizing the VOA for its frequent turnovers at the top was released by the General Accounting Office. The GAO's report basically said that VOA's problems consists of continuing changes in leadership, vacancies in key positions, poor facilities, outmoded equipment, etc. An unidentified former director said most of VOA's equipment belong in a museum (Lawrence Wagner, PA, Donald McCants, AL)
