In addition to her recent interest in shortwave listening, Bernice is into CB radio, Toastmasters, traveling and music. Ed Capen has been in SWLing for about 2 years. Bill Feaster, also relatively new to shortwave listening (one year) uses a Panasonic with an outdoor 50 -foot horizontal antenna. We welcome these new ones into the HAP-USA with pleasure, and hope to be of service to you all.

Some may notice that we have issued HAP number 300. That doesn't mean we have 300 members. Actually, we are somewhere between 225 and 230. I think that two HAPies died recently, but this can't be verified because the mail is just returned. We also went through the files and re-used some numbers we were certain had either passed away, were in foreign HAP clubs, or had indicated they no longer were interested in shortwave listening. So, the precise number of active HAPies will never be known. The mailing list gets revised regularly.

HAP-PEMINGS ON CASSETTE! The excitement [and extra work] around HAP-USA these days is that the monthly newsTetter of the Handicapped Aid Program, the centerfold of the ANARC Newsletter, is now being mailed to all blind HAPies on cassette each month. About 57\% of our membership are blind, so this is a major operation. I didn't make an exact count, but for October, 121 cassettes, and over 110 for November, were sent out. Most of the October cassettes have come back and are ready for the Dec. issue.

The local Sheltered Workshop made up the cardboard cassette mailers for less cost than they could be purchased, and "yours truly" did the recording. A few gliches in the operation appeared, but most of them have been fixed. The big problem is how long the cassette duplicator will hold out! The returnable mailers and the mailing has had another spin-off. We have been able to get address changes for those HAPies that have moved. The forwarding information put on the mailers by the Postal Service appears attached to the inside flap of the mailer when it is returned to HAP-USA headquarters. Keeping up with HAPies who move and forget to notify HAP-USA has been a problem.

A considerable number of favorable comments on the new service have been received. Many have responded to the invitation to record their comments or life story on the cassette before they return it. It looks like we may develop a real dialogue between MAP-USA and the HAPie membership that are blind. I wish the Postal Service would let us do the same for all the HAPies. However, the rest will continue to receive, gratis, the regular ANARC Newsletter with HAP-penings as the centerfold.

While on the subject of the ANARC Newsletter, it should be mentioned that HAP-USA includes other HAP organizations, worldwide, on its mailing list for the ANARC Newsletter, along with several domestic and foreign broadcasters who help out the HAP-USA cause. Some club mailings are also made. If the recipient pays his own way, or ANARC chooses the courtesy, HAP-USA is not billed. Just an item unknown by many.

I wish this page was twice as long as there are a lot of very nice people out there who have been helping HAP-USA, and they should be recognized and thanked. Maybe next time. Meanwhile, Merry Xmas and have fun! Thanks for the Christmas Tree. Look for your name! Cheerio from HAP-USA, and Al Schwaneke. BCNU.

YOU MIGHT NDT HEAR IT FROM THE ZBS．
ZAMEIA＇S MULTI－MILLION KWACHA MASS MEDIA COMPLEX IN LUSAKA SEEMS TO BE SOMETHING DF A WHITE ELEPHANT．In 1970，Zambian President Kenneth Kaunde gave the go－ahesd for what would have been one of the most comprehensive mass media complexes in Africa．Today，the complex is atill not functioning and the dream is in darger of becoming a nightmare．The complex，conceived in the late 1960s at a cost of Kllu million then，will house the Zambia Broadcasting Services（Z日S）， Zambia News Agency，and Zambia Information Servicea，and will provide ultra－modern facilities，but the original cost has since more than trebled．Todey，it could cost more than K50－million．

A number of things have led to the delay in the apening of the complex．The Zambia Broadcesting（ZBS）staff at one time warned the Minister of Information and Broadcesting Sarvices that the complex might turn into a white elephant if measures were not taken to provide necessary staff；to operate smoothly，the complex would need four times the present staff．To avert the risis，the staff than recommended that expatriates should run it until mough $Z 日 S$ staff were trained to take over．

But as things stand at the moment， $2 日 S$ has only 10 qualified engineers to run the complex－it requires the services of 200 technicians！And reports from the complex indicate that about K2－ million worth of new equipment at the complex is either already out of order or is not working．The damage caused to these machines is due to a lack of proper training for ZBS technicians．In fact，the technicians handling the machines only attended a four－day orientation course conducted by the Japanese experte－－they were then left to run the complex syetems．

A Z日S spokesperson says，＂To expect such technicians to undarstand fully the operations of such complex machines after only a few dey＇s course is expecting too much．The solution before further damage is done is to send people for more epecialized training．＂

Last July，a permanent secretary from a different Ministry accompanied by a spokesperson for the Miniatry of Info and Services， wes told during a tour of the complex，that some zBS office orderlies had been deployed in technical jobs because of the shortage of trained staff．The Z日S chief engineer also said that the Japaneag were not kesping their contract because they had been allowed 12 months in which to train staff to man the complex．

The govarnment has now arranged another agreament with the Japanese government for the training of personnel for the complex． The National Commission for Devalopment Planning is currently helping the Ministry to look for plees where to train staff，while the Ministry of Works and Supply has promised to supply additional staff to run the complex．At the same time，ghort courges are currently underway with the help of the Zambia Inst．of Mase Communications for Z日S etaff，the government has also released Kz－million for buying vehicles for the complax．

But until all of this is dons，the mass media complex will be criticized．As the Times of Zambia said，＂It is now almost 12 years since the project was conceived．It is one baby that is causing the expectant nation concern．＂

## TECHNICAL ROUNDUP

CCOPARISON OF THE MF SHORTMAVE/LONGWAVE
AMTERTA TUNER AKD THE GROVE MIINI TUNER, TUN 3

to 30 kHz . This unit did, indeed, tune from 10 kHz to 412 kHz in the longwave range. Honever, not in the rages indicated on their dial settings. The tuning condenser is one of those miniature Japanese jobs with plastic dialectric and had such a "sloppy foel" that it gave the inpression I was playing with a 10 year old kids toy.
The range between 412 and 500 kHz was so swamped with $B C$ hash as to be unusable. The united peaked $S W$ redio signals to about 5 NHz . Above 6 MHz all signals were attenuated Irce 10 to 20 dbl Completely worthless on shortwave.
I thea purchased a Grove Hini-Tmer, TUN 3. This unit is solidly built and claims a tuning range from 100 kHz to 30 MHz . The unit tuned (in the longwave band) from 100 to 414 kHz . No sigapals above 414 to 500 kHz were audible, although I could hear CW signals when the tuming unit was by-passed. The Grove unit peaked signals up to 30 MHz . Unfortumately, then comparad to my regular antenna tuner (an MFJ Model 944 designed for anateur use) all the signals peaked on the Grove unit were several db's lower in sigual strength. The Grove unit tuned all signals within the frequencies indicated on their dial ranges.
As indicated, neithar unit tuned betweon 414 kHz and the broadcast band. The Grove wnit just didn't tume this range while the MFJ unit did tune to 500 kHz , but was smemped by BC signals. I rigged a little fliter ahead of the MFJ unit and it then worked ok in this area.
As far as I know, these are the only two units available to the radio listener who alght wigh to tume the langwave bands. Both reflect the poor design considerations given to equipment offered to shortwave listeners. I paid $\$ 79.95$ for the MFJ-955 and \$54.95 for the minituner (TUN-3); both had an extra charge for shipping and handlingo Therefore, as the Roman's said, "Let the buyer Beware." Experience is knowing you made a mistake the second time you do itl

If not a quantitative analysis, this will at least acquaint you qualitatively with its relative merits. As you can see, the unit improved not only selectivity, but also enhanced the sensitivity of my receiver in most of the above cases. of course, your performance will depend upon your receiver, antenna, and location. (3) Its availability. 48

The dealer told me MFJ will highly promote this model, and it should be at your local MFJ supply store soon, if not already.
The tuning range of the MFJ-1070 preselector is $3-30$ NHZ. Listed average gain ( $3-22 \mathrm{MHz}$ ) is 26 dB . Image rejection at 15 MHz is 11 db . Judging by my experiences with this model, these specs seem accurate. The unit is a compact 7 " $\times 4^{\prime \prime} \times 3^{\prime \prime}$. It is relatively easy to operate. The knobs are large, and are easily tuned by even inexperienced DXers.

In conclusion, the MFJ-1070 is an excellent preselector, and would be a fine addition to any DX shack.

A DIAL MODIFICATION FOR THE FRG-7 (That Didn't Work!) by Mike Schulsinger, OH

Why, you might ask, would anyone want to read about a modification attempt that failed? Well, when I asked myself that question, I came up with two good reasons. First of all, many aspiring inventors give up after their first try, or even before. If things aren't perfect the first time around, they figure the basic idea must be at fault. Second, just because the idea bombed on my FRG-7 doesn't mean it won't work on someone else's receiver.

The idea for the modification came from my work with precision analog meters. Before the spread of the digital meter, analog meters used to achieve improved accuracy using the trick shown in the accompanying figure. A mirror was placed on the meter face near the index markings. A light placed behind the person reading the meter would strike the meter needle, leaving a shadow on the mirror. The user would then line up the needle with its shadow and take the reading at that point.

The Yaesu FRG-7 has a wide space under it kiloHertz dial markings. I purchased a roll of recorder sensing tape (Radio Shack $44-1155$ \$1.99), removed the Frog-7's cover and applied the aluminum tape around the base of the kiloHertz drum. I then reassembled the Frog and turned it on.
Well, it didn't work. The difficulty here is that the $F R G-7$ dial is illuminated from inside, not outside, the case, so there was no distinct shadow to get a fix on. The light outside must be greater than the light inside in ordor for the mirror to work. But I'm not giving up yet; unless, of course, someone sends me a digital readout dial kit for my birthday!

##  BOOK REVIEW MAN OF HIGH FIDELITY: A BOOK REVIEW. . . by Dave Maxfield, MI

Chris Hansen's "Shortwave Center" recently advised us (FRENDX, 10/82, p. 3) to read Lawrence Lessing's biography of Edwin Howard Armstrong entitled Man of High Fidelity. This 320 -page book was first published by the J.B. Lippincott Co. in 1956, and was reprinted as a paperback in 1969 by Bantam Books. Hopefully, it is still available in libraries; for it is "must" reading not only for SWL/DKers, but for radio amateurs, and for anyone else concerned with the electronic arts.
The words "high fidelity" in the title refer to Armstrong's life as well as to some of his achievements. While an engineering undergraduate in 1912, he took the hitherto misunderstood and misused vacuum tube, and invented regenerative (or feedback) circuits for both transmitting and receiving. As a World War I Signal Corps Major, he developed the invaluable superheterodyne. As Professer of Electrical Engineering at Columbia University in the $1930^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$, he perfected equipment for FM reception and transmission, incidently discovering principles upon which Shannon (and others) based the modern information theory which has led to computers and the age of automation. His radar work, almost completed at the end of World War II, is still largely classified.
Amstrong's regenerative circuits ended the spark-gap era of wireless, and made possible the great broadcasting developments-and industries-of the 1920s and 1930s. His superheterodyne discoveries brought improvements not only to broadcasting, but to other forms of radio as well. His FM contributions gave the world static-free radio, and allowed TV to become a practical daily medium. Though his radar inventiond cannot, as yet, be fully assessed, they are basic to some of America's most important defense capabilities, while various implications of his theoretical discoveries continue to unfold.

For all of these incredible achievements he should be vastly rich, intensely happy and justly famous. Right? Wrong! A ruined man in 1954, he comnitted suicide, and is relatively unknown today. Ruthless little men (and their shyster lawyers) in the gigantic corporations that were built upon his inventions took advantage of him, misrepresented his work, infringed his patents, refused him royalties, and got rich by mass-producing inferior products. Whenever-zealous for his rights, concerned for scientific truth, and faithful to visions of optimum communications-he protested, they harassed him in multiple, ruinously expensive lawsuits that took whole decades from his creative life. The tactics and chicanery they employed were destructive in the extreme, and included disparaging, misleading and lying propaganda that was widely spread abroad.
Inasmuch as he stubbornly persisted against all odds in fighting for his rights and principles, litigation continued until much of his public reputation was destroyed. Finally, his personal and economic health was undermined, and his family life so disrupted, that-despite widespread acclaim from scientific societies and the academic world-he leaped from a 13 th story window in despair, and few popular histories of radio currently give him his due. Lessing's book, therefore, depicts a true American tragedy. A great and good man was brought down by jealous enemies, who relentlessly destroyed him.
The author began writing only a few months after the inventor's death, had full access to all his archives, and was able to interview many of his relatives and associates. Thus the book is wholly authoritative. Its style, moreover, is so readable that one cannot put it down until the end. This is particularly true because Lessing relates Armstrong's life and personality to the rapidiy-changing social and communications conditions of his times: the smugness of pre-war America, the idealistic excitement of World war $I$, the hyperactivity of the $1920^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$, the discouragements of the great depression, the grim activities of the second world war, and the unfairness of the McCarthy era of the 1950's. Not only does Armstrong come alive as a man, but so do years as far away as the early 1900s.

The book uses little technical jargon, employing the simple language that Armstrong always preferred, although no oversimplification of difficult material occurs. Eight pages of readily-grasped circuit diagrams are included, and the original edition contains a number of interesting half-tones. A three page bibliography of Armstrong's scientific papers-foundation stone classics of electronic progress-is provided as an appendix.
This volume not only merits frequent rereading, but constant reprinting. In telling radio history as it should be told, it offers fascinating insights into our past, and suggests many frightening things about the blindness, ruthlessness and cruelty of the American Way" of capitalism. Get it and read it.

##  STATION REVIEW <br> RADIO AUSTRALIA RELAYS OVER BBC FACILITIES <br> by Adrian M. Peterson, Director of AWR-Asia

For the first time in its more than 40 years of broadcasting, Radio Australia has specifically commissioned relay services outside the island continent. These new and temporary relay facilities were utilized during the Comnonwealth Games in Brisbane.
Over the years, Radio Australia programming has been relayed in many overseas countries, but his has always been as a service to the listeners in the country involved, rather than as a specific outreach by Radio Australia itself. For example, cricket and tennis commentaries have been rebroadcast on relay from Radio Australia for the benefit of listeners in Great Britain, the Caribbean, India and Pakistan. The program "Americans Calling Home" was relayed during World War II by several hundred MW-AM stations in North America. The BBC and Radio Australia services in French were relayed by the AWA SW outlet in Suva, Fiji, station VPD2. Likewise, during World War II, and after, Radio Australia programs have been carried on relay by AFRTS, BFBS, and Australian Amenities stations located in New Guinea, Indonesia, Philippines, Jerusalem, Japan, and in the Pacific, as well as Korea and Vietnam. Also, large blocks of programming from Radio Australia have been rebroadcast from such stations as VLU2 Christmas Island, VKw Cocos Island, VL2NI Norfolk Island, and 2 LH on Lord Howe, and the stations on Naura and in the Maldive Islands.
By specific request, Radio Australia has also acted as a feeder service on behalf of other large radio stations. For example, RA relayed the $B B C$ service to the British Fleet in the Pacific in mid-1945, and the South East Asia command, SEAC, news commentaries to the US soon afterwards. One of the most significant feeder relays by Radio Australia some years ago was when the Voice of America program, "The Philippine Hour" was broadcast, on behalf of VOA to the Philippines. This relay, in 1944, was carried over the 50 kW VLC in Shepparton, which was a new RCA transmitter at the time.
In addition, Radio Australia has acted as a feeder service for Radio New Zealand, United Nations Radio, and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. Soon after the end of World

War II, Radio Australia relayed a daily news bulletin from the NZES to the NZ HW station WLKE, Kure in Japan. In 1950, RA relayed the UN broadcasts in Chinese from Lake Success to East Asia. And for 3 years, from October 1952 until September 1955, RA relayed a 15 minute daily program of news and commentaries from the CBC in Canada to Canadian troops in Japan and Korea.
However the recent relays of RA over four different BBC facilities is a remarkable new development, which indicates a shift in Australian government policy, and which could herald the extension of regular RA programming on a much wider basis.

Beginning on Thursday September 30, and with little prior publicity, the familiar tuning signal from $R A$, Waltzing Matilda, was heard over transmitters located at the BBC relay stations on Masirah Island, Cyprus, Ascension Island, and from the United Kingdom itself. A special half hour summary of the days events at the Brisbane Commonwealth Games was compiled specifically for the purpose. The program was fed from Melbourne to London by Satellite. From London it was distributed to the BBC Overseas SW bases by the usual feeder distribution network. The 100 kW BBC SW transmitter on Masirah carried the service to Southern Asia, loud and clear on 9605, for a half hour beginning at 1300 GMT. The transmitters in the UK, Cyprus and Ascension Isiand, carried the service to Africa beginning at 1400. The three outlets for Africa were all heard here in India, but at a lower level and with some interference. This RA relay service from the BBC concluded at the end of the Comnonwealth Games, on Saturday October 9.

##  PUBLIC SERVICE <br> FIREFIGHTS'S SCANNER MONITORING HALTS TYLENOL DEATHS by Mike Nikolich, IL

A "scanner" radio is not standard equipment for the Arlington Heights, Illinois, Fire Department. But Arlington Heights Fire Lieutenant Philip Cappitelli purchased one at his own expense, so he could monitor important area fire and police calls when he is at home.

His dedicated listening recently paid off in a big way. Cappitelli, along with fellow firefighter Richard Keyworth of Elk Grove Village, Illinois, were recently presented the "SCAN PUBLIC SERVICE AWARD" by the Scanner Association of North America. They

Two borthers were being rushed to the hospital. . and both were suffering from the same symptoms as the Elk Grove girl. In addition, both had taken the pain relief capsules before being stricken. linutes later, a solemn transmission from the Arlington Heights Police Department announced that one of the brothers was dead and that the other was near death.

Armed with this news, Cappitelli imediately phoned Keyworth to compare notes. Out of
their conversation, the two fire-fighters realized that all three victims had taken extrastrength Tylenol that day. Cappitelli immediately phoned his mother-in-law who is a registered nurse, and asked her if there was any possibility that the over-the-counter drug might have caused the fatalities. When she agreed that Tylenol could be the cause, Cappitelli immediately contacted Arlington Heights Fire Station No. 3 to report his findings. Within minutes, medical authorities confirmed that all three of the ictims did take the drug, and that their bottles were from the same lot number, and had the same expiration date.
Soon, millions of people were warned not to take the Extra Strength Tylenol capsules. The total time that had elapsed from Keyworth and Cappitelli's first phone conversation was $1 \frac{1}{2}$ hours.
Cappitelli, who has owned a Bearcat 210 scanner since 1976 , listens to the radio then he is at home because it serves as a back-up warning system for monitoring important frequencies. But he never dreamed his listening would help save lives.
"If I hadn't been listening to my scanner," he says, "I don't think I would have followed up on the story. I guess the radio made me pay more attention to the details. . ."

KANTRONICS SIGNAL ENFORCER AUDIO FILTER: As you tune across the dial, you come across a station that you have never heard. Just as you go for pen and paper to get some details down, a strong station goes on the air only a few kHz away. You could just hit the roof and unless you have a great computerized filter on your RX, you could not do a thing about it. Ah, but the Kantronics signal enforcer helps tremendously. When connected in line with a speaker, you can do many things. This audio filter has 2 filters built inane main and an aux. Both have the capacity to peak weak signals or strong signals can be notched out. You can even peak a weak signal and notch a strong one on the same frequency. It's also possible to use both filters to super-peak a weak station. Even if the Kantronics costs a little more, it is very well worth it. (Mark Eramo, MA)
MORE ON MINI-RECEIVERS: A couple of days after receiving the September, 1982 SPEEDX and reading about the new SONY miniature SW receivers, I had a chance to go into Boston. I had a chance to stop at the New England Radio \& Television Company at 33 Stanhope Street, an authorized SONY dealer. (A free plug for putting them out.) Being only interested in the sizes and coverage of these new receivers, I glanced at the slick pages of the SONY catalog. The ICP-7600A is $45 / 8$ inches $\times 71 / 8$ inches $\times 1 / 4$ inches and covers the $49,41,31,25,19,16$, and 13 meter bands. I did notice that the 25 meter band went all the way up to 12 MHz . The ICK -4800 (which should read ICR-4800) measures 2 15/16 inches by $5 \% / 4$ inches by $7 / 8$ inch. This covers the $49,31,25,19$ and 16 meter bands. Both radios have only the regular BCB in addition, no FM. They also seem to be the ICF-7600 receiver of a few years ago reissued. In fact, both new radios and the older ICF-7600 very closely resembled each other. (Re reading about the ICF-7600 in the 1981 WRTH, it mentions that this receiver does cover the FII band. Admittedly, I only glanced at the pages in the catalog and it is possible that the ICF-7600A and

ICR-4800 both have FM.) Anyway, I was somewhat disappointed in these two new radios. SONY should have just continued on with the ICF-7600, upgraded it of course. What surprises me is no new small set has digital readout. Now I see little stickon liquid crystal read-out clocks in department stores for about $\$ 5$ and even computers in the tops of ball-point pens. Why then can't any small radio be equipped with a read-out of liquid crystal or LEDs? The circuitry can't be all that difficult, especially as I am looking at a wrist watch which has a couple of those video games included in it. (I suppose this watch does everything but tell time.) (Robert Fraser, MA)
INEXPENSIVE EXTERNAL SPEAKERS: I recently bought a Kenwood R-600, and am generally very satisfied with it. However, the sound from the receiver's integral speaker is somewhat tinny and hard to listen to for long periods of time, and when the receiver is set for narrow bandwidth, voice is muffled and hard to understand. So I went down to the local amateur radio store to try out the various external speakers they sold. I knew they were expensive, but to my disappointment, they did not sound much better than that from the receiver itself. The SP-230 (about $\$ 75$ ) did sound better, and it comes with some switchable audio filters, but I was reluctant to spend that much money. I decided not to give up so easily, and went to Radio Shack. They sell a number of small speakers-in-abox at low prices. I tried them out in the store, using a weak Al BCB station to test for voice intelligibility. I ended up buying a Minimus-3 for about \$13; it is a 4 -inch speaker in a considerably larger box, and is meant for use with cheap stereos. It has the usual vinyl "walnut" case, which clashes nicely with the gray metal of the R-600. Hy R-600 sounds much better now. Even narrow bandwidth voice is quite intelligible, and $S W$ broadcast music is finally pleasant to listen to. Listening is noticeably less fatiguing. The receiver has no trouble ariving the larger speaker. I also discovered that all the clock radios
and other snall radios around the house sound much better when this better speaker is plugged into their earphone or external speaker jacks. (Dan Halbert, CA)
VARIABLE ATTENUATOR: Have you ever had the problem of an extremely strong signal bending your s-meter around the pin? I've found very often that $B B C$, Radio Wetherlands, and various other pumpers of megawatts have made their reception difficult at best. It usually helps to plug in 10 db of attenuation to reduce signal strength and the resulting distortion. IN IC-720A has a built-in 10 db attenuat or which makes life easy. On the other hand, my R-1000 has three rather unusable attenuation steps: $20 \mathrm{db}, 40 \mathrm{db}$, and 60 db . Fortunately, the American Radio Relay League has cone to the rescue. On page 11 of the September 1982 QST, the League's official journal, there is a very simple project which will ease attenuation problems. The article describes in detail how to construct a step attenuator that is variable in l-db steps up to 81 db . According to the article, the attenuator can be fabricated from readily available parts. Otherwise, a kit is available from Circuit Board Specialists, P.O. Box 969, Pueblo, CO 81002. The price given for the kit is $\$ 15.00$ complete. You can probably find the September, 1982 QST in the library about now. If not, it is available for $\$ 2.50$ from: ARRL, Inc., 225 Main Street, Newington, CT 06111. For you technically-inclined R 1000 fans, it's a very easy thing to select three attenuation steps and plug them directly into the $\mathrm{R}-1000$. I intend to modify my own by replacing R-10 through R-18 on the RX Unit circuit board with the appropriate resistor valves. Once I've done it and it works, I'll write a brief article describing the modification exactly. (Donald K. Black, ILA)
IEW GE SHORTWAVE RECEIVER: SPEEDXer Larry Wagne on RCI's DX Digest $9 / 18$ recommended General Electrics new World Nonitor II as a first receiver. It resembles Panasonics soon-to-be-discontinued $\mathrm{RF}-2600$, and is comparable to the RF-2900 though cheaper. (A paper clip, however, must be used on the digital readout switch to keep it "on"!) Larry did not say so, but it is already available in the USA for $\$ 229$ (plus $\$ 5.50$ UPS) from: The Sharper Image, 406 Jackson St., San Francisco, CA 94111. (Dave Maxfield, HI)
ATMEITTION LVI AND UTE FANS: Now that a subject index of chief articles 1974/81 (v.1-v.8) has appeared in its August 1982 nurber, the back files of The Lowdown (monthly organ of the Longwave Club of America) constitute a virtual encyclopedia of longvave listening and experimental transmitting. RECEIVERS DROPED FROII [GDIO SHACK: Uissing in Radio Shack's 1983 catalof is the EX-302 and DX-200. I contacted our local Raaio Shack and was advised that these have been discontinued. At the present there is no replacement for these receivers. The dealer said that they may come out with a replacenent model sometime next year, but he dici not know. The DX-100 and two low cost portaioles, the $D X-66$ and the $D_{i}-55$ are still avaiaile. (Sarn Alexander, iNC)
HAII ENCOURAGES SULING: Vart: Johnson in SPEEDX ( $9 / 82, \mathrm{p} .55$ ) states that "hams and Suls can exist without conflict. . .by taking the time to understand. . .their respective hobbies." Reinforcing this view, Bill Welsh (S6DDB) has just concluded six installments entitled "Shortwave Listening" in tine amateur monthly $C Q$ (iay-Oct., 1982). Even though these welluritten articles condescendingly appear in the "Sovice" section of the magazine, stress ham viempoints, and sometimes fall short of what a true SWL/DA fanatic would urite, they are technically very good and should help to improve our image in the amateur world. Hopefully, some equally illuninating articles dealing with har radio sonetime will appear in the S!J/DX press. (Dave inaxfield, III)
HORE OIN POPULAR COIHUIIICATIONS: I was not impressed by the first issue I saw of the new Popular Communications magazine. It's an attractive, slick paper monthly but the information it contains is not nuch. Two pages of SPEEDX gives more info than all 8 pages of Popular Communications.
