For June, the Sun features are: 5th BRAZIL, A SOVEREIGN AND INDEPENDANT NATION; 12th IN a JUNE FESTIVITY; 19th CARAJAS, THE SALVATION OF THE ECONOMY; 26th THE INTERNATIONAL RECESSION AND ITS EFFECTS ON THE THIRD WORLD; note that the program is heard in North America on Sun night local time which is Mon UTC. ECUADOR...HCJB presents a dramatization of C.S. Lewis' fantasy stories THE CHRONICLES OF NARNIA Sun at 0115 UTC on 15155 and 9745 kHz , repeated the same day at 0545 JTC on 11915, 9745 and 6095 , as well as Wed at 0245 UTC on 15155 and 9745. Note that this is Sat and Tue nights in North America, local time. (Thanks to Don McCants, AL; James Cox, CA; Dick Huil, WA for the HCJB info.)

GERMANY(West)...Radio Deutsche Welle broadcasts in English to North America daily at 0100 and 0500 UTC on several frequencies. "MICROPHONE" is a daily current affairs magazine with comments, press reviews, analyses and reports on events in Germany and Europe. JAPAN RADIO (JRC) RECEIVERS: JRC has introduced two new receivers in the US. The first is an up-conversion phase locked digital frequency synthesized receiver covering 90.00 Khz to 29999.99 Khz . (in 10 Hz . steps). It receives CW, SSB, AM, FSK AND FAX modes. Two preset frequencies of 500 Khz and 2182 Khz are also provided. (Obviously for the Maritime industryl) Bandwidth filters of $6.0,3.0$ and 0.5 khz . are standard equipment and can be used in any modes The receiver will operate from $115 / 230$ volts AC or 24 volts DC. A companion receiver, the NRD-93. is the same as the NRD-92 (described above) with added features, such as another position of selectivity and pass-band tuning etc. Although relatively expensive, these receivers are indeed professional equipment, and should retain a high resale price. Your editor has used these sets for short periods of time on JRC fitted radio rooms aboard ship and they are very nice. quite a few accessories are available for the sets including a 300 channel memory unit capable of scanning and sweep reoeption. As mentioned last month, here are some guidelines I will be using for the column: 1) Remember to include the date--"?/" before your name means none was received; 2) No loggings dated earlier than 2 months before the column's issue date will be used--i.e., only April and May loggings were used for this June column; 3) Try to include some program detail of what you heard, not just "OM w/mx \& nx"--when reporting an unusual or rare logging, be especially sure to include enough detail to indicate how you ID'd it; 4) Report loggings of relay stations to the column covering the location in which the relay facility resides-I know many of you do not have the information to identify these, therefore I try to sort out nonEuropean sites with the best information I have available; 5) The SPEEDX country list will be used for all loggings, but feel free to include a sub-QTH if you know it, such as RAI Caltanisetta or R. Moscow via Minsk; 6) Use SPEEDX or similar type logging forms, cut into strips about $1^{\prime \prime}$ wide--however, it's OK to use a postcard for direct reports to me.

## TECHNICAL ROUNDUP

EQUIPIIENT, ANTENNAS, RECEIVERS, ACCESSORIES, AND NEW IDEAS

COMPARISON OF THE ICOM R70 TO THE DRAKE R7 AND NRD 515

Since the recent release of the Icom $R-70$ general coverage receiver, there have been several reviews of this product, with quite a few comparisons with the Drake R7 series or the NRD 515. Having used regularly a Drake R 4 B and a NRD 515, and having had the opportunity to use an Icom $R 70$ there are some distinctions which I feel have not been well delineated.
First, all the reviews I have read, except one by David Newkirk in the "Equipment Forum" column in Review of International Broadcasting, seem to have a mistaken concept of passband tuning. The Icom's passband tuning is not equivalent to the Drake's passband tuning or the NRD's PBT. The NRD or Drake truly allow you to move the receiver's passband around allowing reception of either sideband without main dial tuning. For example, with the ISB VOA feeder on 6873.0 kHz , one can, by merely turning the PBT knob, select which sideband is heard-no retuning is needed. The Icom's knob, labeled 'PBT' appears to actually only vary the bandwidth of the received signal. This Icom feature certainly has uses, but it is not what some have made it out to be. Some receivers, such as the Kenwood TS-930 (a ham transceiver) actually have both features, a true passband tuning control plus a variable IF bandwidth. The NRD does have true passband tuning; the only difference between the NRD's and the Drake's PBT is the direction the knob is turned to select the sidebands. With Drake receivers, the knob is turned to the left for LSB and to the right for USB-the exact opposite is true for the NRD. Additionally, the NRD had the option, via the mode knob, of selecting either LSB or USB in lieu of using the PBT control (which is activated by placing the mode switch in the 'cw' position).
Another item eluded to in reviews of the Icom $R-70$ was the pecularity of the receiver to pick up signals one megahertz higher than the true frequency when the receiver is tuned to near ( 1.5 kHz ) the beginning of the megahertz. For example, one would hear why at 4, 9, 14 , and 19 kHz . Neither the Drake nor the NRD have this oddity (thank goodness). Furthermore, the Icom shifts the received frequency (and the readout) when the mode is changed. For example, when switching from USB to LSB, the frequency is shifted by 3 kHz so that the readout will always show carrier frequency. This can de rather annoying at first, but is tolerable. Neither the Drake nor the NRD shifts the readout frequency when modes are changed. Also these receivers allow you to manually chose your bandwidth filter instead of forcing you to use the mode-selected bandwidth as does the Icom.
One thing I noticed when using the Icom was the repeating range that you are limited to in tuning. By this I mean the tuning range goes from X .000 .0 to X .999 .9 kHz then starts over a X.000.0 again. In contrast to this, the NRD will tune continuously up the band for as long as you spin the dial (or push the button), and only when it reaches 29999.9 kHz does it $100 p$ back to 000.0 kHz . This feature again is a nicety of a well-designed receiver, but Icom's method isn't totally bad.
With the use of the external keyboard, the NRD has the equivalent of four tunable VFOs. One tunes these VFOs by use of the keyboard direction and rate buttons, adding an even greater degreee of flexibility. When combined with the IRD's 96 channel memory, nothing can compare for quick frequency selection.
One cannot deny that the Icom R70 will find a proninent place as a good receiver for DKers but it has quirks which the more expensive units do not have. Certainly the basic receiver section of the R70 is escellent, but the CPU leaves a little to be desired. The variable selectivity (a.k.a 'passband' tuning by Icom), is nice, but different than most accustomed DXers would expect. One thing certainly in Icom's favor is its price, which is more reasonable. One local store is selling the k70 for $\$ 599$-one can't touch the Drake or NRD for that.

Basically one gets what you pay for, and though the Icom appears to be a good receiver, one is not getting all the well-thought out features of the Drake or NRD.

TO SPEND OR NOT TO SPEND: THAT IS TIE QUESTION

THE NARRATIVE: When faced with the exciting opportunity of getting a new receiver, many of us ponder as to what to do with the venerable "old" rig. It was during such pondering that I discovered the Electronic Overseas Corporation (E.O.C.) Shortwave Antenna and Booster, portable model. I had read the "Antenna Review" article by John Kapinos (SPEEDX, June 1982, page 47) which described the E.O.C.'s non-portable antenna as "a fine buy for the money." Still, I was skeptical that a unit costing less than, say, 100 bucks could even begin to compete with an inverted-L longwire, a tall inverted vee, or with any other exterior installation.

In any event, upon obtaining an Icom IC-R70, I had some difficult choices to make: To keep or not to keep the Yaesu FRG-7-That was the question. After much deliberation, and finally realizing that I could never get adequate resale value for my modified $F R G-7$, I decided to keep the Yaesu, principally to be used as a portable receiver on trips to visit the relatives, on outings to the coast, to the hinterlands, and so forth. Since the Yaesu runs portably with D-cell batteries, my next major problem involved finding an adequate portable "active"-type antenna to use for mobile applications. To spend more bucks or not to spend--That was the question.

I reread John Kapinos' article, laudatory of the E.O.C., and decided on impulse to purchase the portable version, which runs on a 9 volt cell, for the complete price of $\$ 25.95$. I figured that if the antenna were only midiocre, I would still get my money's worth in having obtained a portable antenna for outdoor use as well as for use as a backup to my external wire antennas. (Incidentally, one of the latter was blown to its death this past winter.) My final question resolved itself into the following: To have been a fool or not to have been--That was the question.

THE RESULTS: Only 11 days later the unit arrived- $\$ 25.95$ complete. Surprisingly, the unit has worked well, exceptionally well. The antenna is very compact, consisting of a $31_{3}{ }^{\prime \prime} \times 5 j_{2}^{\prime \prime}$ plastic box in which the "guts" of the booster are housed. A whip which pulls upward can be extended to a height of $47.5^{\prime \prime}$, or almost $4^{\prime}$.

I found reception to be consistently best with the whip extended fully to the height of 47.5". An on-off switch located on the housing box is the only control, and a 9 -volt battery well is located on the underside of the unit. Two alligator clips, both connected to the unit via a two-foot length of RG-174/U coaxial cable, attach instantaneously to the receiver's ground terminal (i.e. the black clip) and to the receiver's antenna input (i.e. the red clip).
I have found that I receive image-free reception by attaching both alligator clips to the receiver's SO-239 input; that is, by attaching the black clip to the outside shield section of the SO-239 connector and by attaching the red alligator clip to a banana plug directly through the center of the SO-239. In this way strong, spurious images fron liv overload are avoided but which are ever-present if I connect the antenna in any way other than via the So-239 input.

The portable antenna is truly a broadband, preamplified whip that, I'm sure, rivals the best active antennas around. To borrow the words of John Kapinos, "results are very favorable compared to units costing 4 times as much." Just how favorable have I found the E.O.C. unit to be?

Switching back and forth from ny 95' inverted-L longwire to the E.O.C. portable antenna, I have observed the following comparisons, taken over a three-day period and based upon the ol' reliable SINPO.

Generally speaking, the E.O.C. portable antenna falls short of my longwire antenna. At times, however, the E.O.C. matches the longwire exactly in terms of gain and receivability. Based upon the data, I would dare underscore the following observations:

1. that the E.O.C., from about 49 meters through at least 13 meters, came awfully close to rivaling my 95' longwire in overall merit;
2. that the E.O.C., from 120 meters through about 60 meters, achieved an overall merit degradation factor of $-11 / 3$ (average) as compared to the longwire; and
3. that especially above 60 meters with strong, clear signals, the E.O.C. unit almost matched the SIMPO efficiency of the $95^{\prime}$ exterior antenna.

I didn't test the E.O.C. under extremely poor DX conditions. Frankly, as I get older, I am losing my patience for extreme "muddredging" DX catches. However, for most SWL applications, I jucige the E.O.C. portable antenna as a top-rate value. If for nothing else, the antenna is excellent as an inexpensive "insurance policy" in the event that your external antenna were to meet an unexpected death.
Used in conjunction with a battery powered, portable loop antemna-such as the Radio West Ferrite Loop Antenna-the E.O.C. unit can provide the listener with gapless indoor reception from LW through the end of the $S W$ spectrum. Show me another "active" type of antenna or preselector that words as well for 25 bucks! For ordering information, see page 61 of the 1983 World Radio TV Handbook.

## BOOK REVIEW

THE WORLD OF THE (FINNISH) DK LISTENER
by Dr. Richard E. Wood, Saudi Arabia
Review of: Simo S. Soininen (editor in chief), DX-Kuuntelun liaailma. Toinen Laitos. (The World of the DX Listener.) Helsinki: Tietoteos, 1983. Pp. 288, paper. ISBN 951-9035-54-0
As an Esperantist, a believer in an equable, politically neutral solution to the world's language problems, it gives me a certain delight to be able to report that the major, most comprehensive, most useful book on a particular subject is written, not in English or another of the world's major languages, but in Finnish--a non-Indo-European language little known, studied or understood outside the country to which it is native. The feeling is all the stronger when the subject covered happens to be my favorite one, one where I can perhaps judge the importance of the book despite the major linguistic obstacle.
Such, then, is my judgement on the new, richly illustrated guide released early in 1983 (despite a 1982 printing date on the reverse of the title page) by the Tietoteos publishing firm (the name means roughly "The book of knowledge,") founded and owmed by DXer Jyrki K. Talvitie of Helsinki. Tietoteos is a respected general publishing house which, besides DX-related titles, offers, for example, the first Finnish and Spanish dictionary, books on historic aircraft, and other subjects. The work is advertised as a replacement for the 1972 book DX-Kuuntelun Opas ("The DX Listener's Guide").
Despite its obvious orientation to the Finnish listener, it is to be hoped that the book will be translated into other languages-it could be translated almost unchanged into Swedish (though the many Finnish-language bibliographical references could then perhaps be deleted), and adapted for other readerships in English, German, (I think it would sell well in Germany; a German-language edition of the World Radio TV Handbook is under active consideration in Hvicovre), Japanese, etc. Indeed, when translated, not all the specifically Finnish contents need be deemphasized. In fact, this reviewer would have liked to read more on some Finnish topics, e.g. in-depth coverage of the remarkable midwinter DXpeditions to the Finnish Arctic, which have contributed so much to our knowledge of trans- and circumpolar propagation, especially on the jin band; lists of North American, Pacific and other MW stations heard in Finland as correlated with sunspot and other values, statistics on MW reception in Finland including lists of the likeliest reception from each U.S. state and Canadian province.
But let us not put the cart before the horse by first discussing what isn't in the book, before we consider its actual, rich contents. It begins with a foreword by Simo $S$. Soininen (who is professionally an adviser to foreign stdents at the University of Helsinki, where he is able to put into daily use his skills in languages, especially in Spanish, gained through DXing, and also boost student morale, in a cold, linguistically alien environment, by helping them keep in touch with their countries of origin through $D X$ listening); Simo would welcome comments at: Asematie 12 E 12 , SF-02700 Kauniainen, Finland. Next, the well-known Finnish DXers Pentti Stennan and Rainer Weurlander ask "What is DXing?". Jorma Mantyla follows with a discussion of the administration of world broadcasting, with maps of IBU regions and a useful listing of the old and new broadcasting bands (WARC 1959 and 1979), with years of planned introduction of the new and extended bands. Sterman and Gunhard $T$. Kock then consider the world's time zones, with an unusual map of Soviet time zones and a time zone gadget from the VOA which most U.S. DXers will not have seen before. Rainer Weurlander proceeds to consider "Types of

Stations", with some fine illustrations including one of a local beauty queen contest organized by Radio Centinela del Sur, Loja, Ecuador.
Next comes Kai Nieminen's"fistory of Raciio Broadcasting," quite a lengthy article and not perhaps of strong current $D X$ interest. Again there is a fascinating picture, of a $\mathrm{S}:$ antenna twoer at Pori, Finland, which collapsed during a windter storm in 1982. Tino Kajamaa and Simo S. Soininen then briefly cover "Domestic Receivers" including portables; injamaa alone continues with "Communications Receivers." Jari Peltoniemi talks about "Tapes and Tape Reports". The longest single chapter follows: "Antennas," by Ilkka liartikainen. As might be expected, there is a good deal of reduplication with what might be found in The Radio Amateur's Handbook; of course, such references written in Finnish might not be so easily obtained. Perhaps the best, clearest pictorial diagram of a loop antenna which this reviewer has seen appears on $p$. 89. The book is up-to-date: active antennas are described and illustrated. There follows a rather sweepting chapter by publisher Jyrki K . Talvitie on aspects of DXing including topographic factors, Deverage antennas, the special characteristics of Finnish Lapland and northern Swedent for reception, and the WRTH. Sven-Erik Hjelt then writes about the properties of radio waves. (iany of the contributors, like Hjelt and Weurlander, are Swidish Finlanders, and from the perspective of this reviewer's linguistic capabilities, it is a pity they did not write in Swedish).
Jorma ilantyla then offers a richly illustrated article on daylight and darkness at different times of day and year; this is of very great importance in a northern location like Finland. Unfortunately, the article does not refer to the availability of The DX Edge sliderule-type gadget, which is an indispensible aid to Dxing, nor to the sunrise and sunset maps produced by American DX clubs. Jyrki Talvitie considers reference works and necessary knowledge for the successful DXer; a list of Latin American currencies and administrative units is given. Tapani Laitinen considers languages used on the air, an article which is rather heavily dependent upon this reviewer's "Languages in International Radio" in How to Listen to the World 1969/70 (which is in Laitinen's bibliography) but not properly undated since then; e.g. Laitinen still talks about the French-Swahili of the "Congo"--or course, that was correct in 1969-70, but such Swahili is not spoken in the only country now called Conço, only in Zaire. Likewise, the Fadio Rabaul ID cited on p. 132 is no longer valid. A team of three authors discusses "The Reception report." Finnish DKers can be proud of the quality of their reports, which are the best in the world. The quality is maintained through training, competition, peer pressure and a close-knit local DK club life. ilovever, the Spanish report on p. 140 is influenced by Portuguese. Risto Vahakainu considers QSLs and their storage, and illustrates QSL card, letter and pennant albuns, sticker-decorated cars, and souvenir tapes and records.
The next major section covens the world geographically. It begins witin the British Isles, which are now a major target for when and with over 100 local stations, with powers as low as 100 watts; a type of DXing which was unknown when this reviewer was living in the U.K. Esa Hanninen has one of the most disappointing articles in the book, on DXing Iberia --too short and superficial, and it fails to convey the delight of bZing the very numerous small stations in Spain. It does not list the different Spanish networks, mention the dedication programs for Nordic DKers, talk about visits by Nordic DKers to stations in Spain, mention the Spanish enclaves in Horth Arrica, illustrate the enormous variety of pennants and souvenirs available from stations in Spain and Portugal, or otherwise "hook" the DXer on the most fascinating DX country in Europe. This reviewer hopes that Finish and Swedish nul and Fil DXers, just because they are generally more fluent in English then in Spanish/Portusuese, will not begin to neglect Iberian stations, just because they now have a large and expanding selection of small stations in the British Isles. Jorma liantyla then deals with Africa-again, as for Spain, there could have been more tips on individual stations-and with Asia and Oceania-providing more in-depth coverage, with useful hints on China, Japan and Korea. The fabulous northern Finnish autunn ini receptions of Hawaii and, later in the day, Australia, are discussed.
For any American reader, "The Yanks," to translate Raino Kaksonen's slangy title, has a particular fascination. Like the other top finnish Iorth Anerican specialists, Kaksonen is very well informed. This reviewer once conducted an impromptu "Horth Anerican ifi DX Quiz", in English, at a Finnish DX camp, and the participants knew their stuff. Terms like "promo, public service announcements, broadcast band, IRCA Alnanac, clear channel, format, talk, easy listening" appear in the article. Ifeed I say more? Editor-in-chief Soininen writes about his favorite area, "Latin America," pp. 193-203. The modest premises of Radio Luz y Vida, Ecuador, are illustrated. Sven-Erik Hjelt and Isa aanninen consider "iW Listenine", with useful graphs. However, tables of North Anerican and other distant stations heard under particular conditions would have made this article less theoretical, and perhaps attracted more linnish DVers to that part of the hobby for wich their location uniquely equips them.
Kimno Vornanen is the author of "Fir DX." The stations discussed are, of course, those audible from Finland, and countries mentioned include iceland, the Faroes, Spain, Yucoslavia, etc. Naturally, North American Fi: DKers receive a completely difeerent set ốn
stations, and even approach the hobby differently. It is a pity that the possibility of transatlantic FM DX was not at least mentioned, since it has been reported, notably from a listening post in the Azores to FM stations in Atlantic City, INJ. FM DXers in Northern Finland should try possible catches fron Greenland, northern Canada, etc., under auroral or other conditions. Seppo J. Pirhonen and Petri Popponen deal with "TV DX", which again is approached differently in Finland. More examples of actual catches, and more pictures, would have enhanced the value and attraction of the article.
Probably the most disappointing article in the whole collection is "Program Listening" by Petri Silmala. It covers only two pages; in fact, when blank space and a picture of the defunct listening magazine Voices are discounted, there is only one page of type. Two questions: why illustrate a dead listeners' magazine (which took many subscribers' dollars with it, when it bit the dust) rather than an existing, flourishing one, RIB (nowhere referred to in the book)? And how can one write an article on program listening which fails to refer to the name of a single program? Maybe the author is not a program listener himself. I get the impression that all contributors to the book are dedicated DXers, but could not one writer in Finland be found who enjoys and could describe "The World at Six," "As It Happens", "Radio Newsreel", "Our wild Heritage" (Radio RSA), or their equivalents on Finnish-speaking stations?
On p. 234, Simo S. Soininen publishes a valuable and intriguing list of DX "indicator" stations, beacons to likely DX reception on certain bands from certain directions; for example, for North America on MW from the EST zone he cites VTOP 1500 (a surprise-I would have expected WNEW 1130, WBZ 1030 or HINS 1010); for MST, CFAM 950; and for PST, KEX 1190-many US DXers have never heard that one. A short article by Talvitie and Laitinen considers DX clubs and mentions ARARC, but not one individual US club such as NASWA or SPEEDX. A pity. I would like to see more Euro-American club interchange, and Nordic DXers attending ANARC meetings. The last part of the book deals with abbreviations, terminology and concludes with DX vocabulary, Finnish/Swedish/English/German/French/ Spanish/Portuguese/Indonesian; it is reasonably accurate although some diacritics are omitted or wrong and the Indonesian spelling is not fully updated.
This, then, is a book North American DXers can envy. There is nothing like it in English. We have DXing According to NASWA but that is SWBC only, and not widely distributed. What are we North Americans waiting for? We have competent writers; our language is more widely known than Finnish, and English-speaking DX clubs probably have a total membership at least equal to those in Finland. And, we have a greater interest in program listening, as attested to by the success of RIB. DX-Kuuntelun Maailma is, as we have pointed out, not perfect, but it is better and bigger than anything in English. Will we let it hold this record?

ASPECTS OF AFRICAN DX by David Sharp, FL

How many times have you flipped through SPEEDX, wondering how all of those 60 and 90 meter band stations can be heard? I claim to be no expert in this field of DXing, but hope to help other DXers with their monitoring efforts. Since I specialize with African DX, that is what I'll concentrate on.
First, it should be noted that these low frequencies are a hybrid between $\mathrm{S} W$ and RN. You could monitor until your face it blue-if the conditions aren't right, you won't hear the DX. However, intelligent monitoring, in confjection with SPEEDX and URTH, is necessary if you want to hear good DX.
Here in Florida, I have noticed constant trends in DX. If reception to Latin America is good do not count on good African DX. The reciprocal is also true; good Afro DX usually results with poor DX openings to South America. Interestingly enough, I have also noticed that reception to Africa, and even Asia, on lower frequencies improves JUST BEFORE and JUST frIER the passing of a cold front.

Those of you wanting to hear DX from Africa should also note that the overall best time to listen is Gll Monday mornings. At this time, many Latin stations sign-off early, thus leaving clear frequencies. I dare say that I hear Botswana and Zambia, for example, at this time more than others.
When IDing stations, several things need to be remembered. First, A DXer should learn to recognize different types of music. This may be helpful in determining, for example, whether a station is sub-saharan or East African. Other questions to ponder may be: the language, frequency, propagation possibilities, and regularity of reception, as noted through DX bulletins. All of these will help you to determine the station to which you are tuned.

The equipment needed to hear this DX does not have to be expensive. Receivers, such as
a $D X-160$, have the ability to hear rare $D X$. The key to success, as always, is the antenna. Personally, I use an HQ-129X and a DX-160. Both receivers are used in conjunction with a 3 element beam. If a DYer (for whatever reason) cannot use a bean, I suggest using a dipole. Those people in ECNA should, for the most part, keep their antennas as high as possible and give them an easterly heading. This will give maximum signal reception.

After hearing this good DX, I suspect most SPEEDKers will send off a reception report. When doing this, remember to be as accurate as possible. However, being accurate does not mean a 32 page report. Llany African stations have small staffs, and time means money. Try to keep your report brief and concise. Also, never, NEVER be political. Some African countries are very paranoid about their neighboring countries, and to casually mention one might mean a zero percent chance of receiving a QSL card. It should also be noted that some countries will not accept English reports. Check John Kapinos' QSL column or WRTH for current trends with station policies. An IRC or mint stamp would also be a nice gesture; often, a station will not issue a QSL unless return postage is included. Oh yes, one last thing-keep the report legible. A report that cannot be read is useless, and will find its way to -a waste paper can in a distant country.

I hope these comments will help SPEEDXers with certain aspects of African DK. Have fun, and good DX!

This publication is a list-loggers dream. However, it is also a host valuable tool for legitimate DYers, whether "elite" or not. Order it and use it properly. (Dave Hayfield, III)

The only name the computer will recognize is the one on the mailing label! Period! So, if you are listed as Robert on your label, but send in logs under Bob, then you may not get your credit for that month, even though your name shows up on the listing at the back of the book. So, if you want credit for your loggings, make certain that you submit them using the exact same name as printed on your address label. We are working on trying to get peel-off labels that you can remove from the magazine and stick on to your contribution to the CDE or whomever. In the meantime, please write on your contributions the name exactly as it appears on the label. If you would like your label to read something else, such as Bob instead of Robert, please let us know and we will change it. Also, you will see the first part of this this month, and the rest of it later, an added bit of information on your address label. Instead of just printing your expiration date at the upper right corner of your label, we will now also be printing your full-member date as well as credit points earned year-to-date. So, this is how your numbers on the label will look: $8 / 8303 / 8312$. The ' 8 ' means 8 credits to date, with your full-member date being March 1983 (8303) and your expiration date being December 1983 (8312). A '9999' for the full-member date means you haven't contributed to the magazine. This will be an easy way to keep up-to-date on how many credits you have as well as when your year is up for full-membership status. We hope that it proves to be helpful to you.

One other thing before getting to the want ads...concerning the HAP page. It was to have appeared this month, and in fact we did receive one from Al Schwaneke. However, it was the decision of the M.E. and myself not to run it due to statements made by the current HAP president concerning problems with that organization. Al does state that he will be shutting down operations this month, and plans on closing down HAP altogether quite soon, unless someone steps forward to take it over. I'm sure that all HAP members have already received word of this and hopefully a plan is in the making to take them over. The HAP page will no longer appear in SPEEDX from this point on, at least until new blood has taken it over.
