Programming includes: Mon/Ned/Fri LOCAL CITIZENS' MUSIC, HORIZONS OF ICE, OUR FOLKS, JAZZ EROM LRA 36 , TOPIC FOR TODAY, MUSIC AND POEIRY FROM ARGENIINA, GOD'S FIVE MINUTES; Tue/Thu/Sat INVITATION TO MUSIC, CLOSEUP: THE GAUCHO Martin fierro, WHEN a phrase becomes famous, topic for today, white FOLKIORE (contributor notes that this must refer to geographic area), DIRECTION TOWARDS ARGENTINA, GOD'S FIVE MINUTES; Sun MUSIC. CANADA...Radio Canada International now has a new English Service to the Caribbean from 2230 to 2300 UTC on 15190 and 17820. SWL DIGEST can be heard on Fri during the transmission, givine Western Hemisphere listeners an opportunity to hear this fine program early in the weekend--Fri at approxi-
 mately 2240 UTC........Speaking of SWL DIGEST, the program is now heard to North America one time only on Sun evenings (Mon mornings UTC), after the news at 0200 UTC. MAIIBAG is heard during the 0000 and 0300 UTC transmissions the same evening. English programming is no longer heard from RCI at 0100 UTC on Sat and Sun evenings, but a repeat of WORID AT SIX and AS IT HAPPENS can be heard in the 0100 UTC slot Mon-Fri. Try frequencies of 5960 and 9755, though additional frequencies are added for SWL DIGEST transmission. DOMINICAN REPUBLIC/NETHERLANDS ANTILLES...Radio Earth International began broadcasting at approximately 0345 UTC on June 2. The nonpolitical commercial station uses Radio Clarin's transmitter in the Dominican Republic on 11700 kHz . Studios are in the Curacao Hilton on that island in the Caribbean(located near Bonaire). Despite the late sign on for the first transmission the station is scheduled from 0330 to 0430 UTC on Mon-Sat nights (Tue-Sun UTC days). The

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC/NETHERLANDS ANTILLES(COn't)....hour-long transmission is entitled "The World" and is hosted by Jeff White and Matt Bell. A typical broadcast begins with a newscast from Radio Clarin's studio read by Rudy Espinal, followed by one or more features about Curacao or miscellaneous topics. David Monson, formerly with the Belgian Radio-TV, follows with a nightly feature in his unique style. Jeff and Matt try to read some mail from listeners each night, and the transmission concludes with Rudy Espinal's "This is the Caribbean," a mixture of music and chat. After listening to several broadcasts of the station, I'm impressed with what has been accomplished. Radio Earth is a unique venture and needs listener feedback. Initial advertising is mainly of a tourism-related nature, and, in order to "sell" the station in the coming months to sponsors, knowledge of the audience is essential. The address is: Radio Earth, Curacao Hilton, Curacao, Netherlands Antilles. (Goody Seymour, Ir. with imput from William Muzyka, NY)
FINLAND...Radio Finland's latest English schedule shows some program changes. Here is the schedule: Mon VOICES OF FINLAND (music); Tue AIR MAIL(letters); Wed BY-IINE (entertainment); Thu PERSPECTIVES(discussion); Fri SUMMERLIGHT (leisure); Sat COMPASS NORTH (news analysis); Sun SUNDAY BEST (variety). Broadcasts to North America
 are 30 minutes in length and begin at 1100, 1200, 1300 and 1400 UTC on frequencies of 15400 and 17800 (the latter not at 1300) Mon-Sat. Note that the same program is broadcast 4 times per day. On Sun SUNDAY BEST is from 1230-1425 UTC continuously. (David Claytor, MI)

Swiss Radio International broadcasts in English to North America daily at 0145, 0430 and 1315 UTC. Mon to Fri features DATEIINE, a news magazine. This division appears as a green line on the Eur map in the NGS Atlas of the World. The exception to this division I will be using is that all of Az erbaijan, Kazakh, and Georgian SSR's will be considered Asia.

A QUICK PRIMER ON AFRO INSTRUMENTS
by David Sharp, Lutz, FL
KOUNTOUGI: A one-stringed lute with a hide-covered resonator. A thin strip of metal with wire rings in the holes around its edge is attached to the end of the neck, oreating a sizzling suond when the instrument is struck.
WLLK: An end-blown vertical flute with three finger holes. It is most often used ensambles of 3 or more, with the players alternating notes hocket-style to produce a melody.
GULU: A double-headed cylindrical drum suspended from the shoulder and played either with one hand and a curved stick, or with two ourved sticks.
KOUCO:
A small, fretless lute with five strings, two of which (tuned a fifth apart) play the melody, while the other three, tuned to ootaves of the lower main string, serve as drones. The resonator, made of wood and shaped like an oblong bowl, has an animal hide stretched over its open side. A sizzle mechanism like that of the KOUNTOUGI is attached to the end of the neck.
BOUNKAM: This single reed instrument is made from a section of millet stalk and two small gourds. The reed is mounted on the side of the stalk and responds to inhaling as well as exhaling, enabling the player to produce a continuous melady. Pitch is controlled by varying the tongue pressure agajinst the reed and by operating a single tonehole with the left hand.

Although "SHORTWAVE AFAICA" is not necessarily the place to look for new product info, this news is too hot to pass up. Electra Company, manufacturer of Bearcat scanner radios, has entered the SWL market with the $\quad \mathrm{X}-1000$. This new shortwave radio covers 10 kHz to 30 MHz continuously. The DX-1000
features conventional tuning, direct access keyboard tuning, and manual step tuning in 1-99 kHz programmable steps. Among the neat features of this radio are filter selection independent of mode, 10 memory channels, \& a built-in timer that can activate a tape recorder to catch up to 10 different stations in up
 to five different modes! The radio also includes a noise blanker that is effective with Over the Horizon Radar (e.g. the woodpecker), a digital display that doubles as a two time zone, 24-hour quartz clock and a memory back-up system to hold frequencies in memory and clock if power fails. The $\mathrm{aX}-100 \mathrm{D}$ 's suggested retail price is $\$ 599.95$, putting it in the same range as the new Kenwood R-2000 and ICOM IC-R70. I had the chance to work on the marketing and preliminary R\&O of this radio and I'm looking forward to seeing what you think of it. Hope to see some of you at ANARC. I'll be there. mln. 73.

An SASE will get you his latest list. Not to forget DX Stamp Service, 7661 Roder Parkway, Ontario, NY 14519, the best source of "ms" that I've ever found. Again, an SASE to George Robertson will get you the info. of course, SPEEDX itself has a great list of most valuable information booklets. Keep Don Johnson busy, send him an SASE for the list. Of course, how can one forget the World Radio TV Handbook, perhaps the \#1 item needed to "do it right".

Please do not consider an omission of an item as negative. There are so many fine publications "floating" around that it would take me more space than I will ever have to list them all. (Just to char up any possible misunderstandings, send for info to the individuals noted, not to me).
As in any other endeavor, one must do his (hers) homework. Besides SPEEDX, one should have alternate sources of information, and the ones listed above will really help.

Well, a few more lines and my career(?) as SPEEDX QSL editor is over. Did a bit of research in the files and found that over 300 individuals were part of this column since I took over. ## Reviews

POPULAR COIINUICATIONS VS REVIEW OF INTERNATTONAL BROADCASTING by Roger $N$. Peterson, CT

Juch has been written in this column about the merits of the new Popular Communications magazine and, of course, a number of comments have appeared over the years about the Review of International Broadcasting. For the SW listener, which publication is the best, most helpful, etc.?
One measure can be made by comparing identical editorial matters in the April issues of both publications. Both have featura articles listing times and frequencies of English broadcasts. How do they compare?
The answer is not very well. Popular Cormunications lists stations and frequencies for each of the twenty-four hours with a total of 176 listings. Review of International Broadcasting lists each of the twenty-four hours but breaks them down into half-hours but gives its readers a total of 402 listings-more then twice as many as popular Communications! Thus, if you depend only on what Popular Communications gives you, you would only tune into the BBC six times (that is all they list) whereas you would tune in all twentymfour hours with the listings of the Review of International Broadcasting.
Spot checking some of the listings of Popular Communications, I found several glaring errors as well. For example, good luck in trying to get Radio RSA at 2200 hours in English as P.C. savs you can. At 2157, they end their English and go into Portuguese at 2200. Also they list ore frequency for Radio RSA at 1100 GNI (15220). While this is listed in the World Radio TV Handbook, I believe most North Americans find 25790 or 21535 mich stronger. P.C. does not give these frequencies.

I realize that this comparison alone does not the sole measurement factor but it would seem to be significant-at least for those interested in international shortwave listening.
In his larch issue, in the "Mailbag" section, the Editor of Popular Comanications comments about the Review of International Broadcasting as follows:
"I've found it pompous and self-inculgent, often containing unintentional chuckles, but essentially a hammess little effort."
I wonder which one is the real "harmless little effort"?

# Station Review 

In recent weeks, the small island of Saipan in the Varianas has hit the international radio headines with the commencement of the new $S W$ service to Japan from station KYOL. In addition, another Sil station is meder construction for FEBC Manila, and is expected on the air later this year.
This is the fascinating forty year story of radio broadcasting from Saipan, Northern liarianas.
The island of Saipan is located in the Western Pacific, midway between Japan, the Philippines and New Guinea. It is the second largest island in the ilarianas, with an area of 47 square miles. Saipan is a hilly island, 14 miles long and $5 \frac{1}{2}$ miles wide, and its highest point is at an elevation of 1500 ft .
Saipan, and the harianas, were discovered by the explorer fagellan in the year 1521, and they have been controlled by Spain, Germany, Japan and currently the United States. The original inhabitants are descendant from the Micronesians, and speak Chamorro. Saipan is the capital of the liarianas, with a population of 10,000 .
Throughout the years, there have been a total of five different radio stations operating from the island of Saipan. The new KYOL is the sixth station, and the FEBC Sul station still under construction will be the seventh.

The first radio station to broadcast from the island of Saipan was the AFRS outlet, WXLO. This unit commenced broadcasting on August 15,1944 with 1 kw on 600 kHz . In April 1945, the channel was changed to 1280 kHz , and late in 1945 , the station left the air when US forces were transferred. At first, programing for this station was locelly mpoduced, but when KRHO-KSAI began broadcasting from Saipan, station WKLD took a tandem relay from the new station.
The next station on Saipan had quite a remarkable history. At first, the 50 kw Nu transmitter was located on a US freigiter, probably the "Phoenix" which had been fitted out by OWI as a broadcast station, similar to the more familiar "Courier". Broadcasting from this ship began off the coast of Hawaii in January 1945, with off-air relays of the shore-based VOA station KRHO. No local announcements were ever given over the ship station. lhany channels were used, in an effort to dodge jamming, such as $1000,1010,1012,860,960$, and 1090 kHz .
The mill transmitter was removed from the freighter and was installed on a building on the island of Saipan. The first broacicast from this new location was made on March 11, 1945, when the location was given in announcements. However, no callsign was announced, and the outlet continued to be known in the DX world as KRHO, simply, because it relayed the programs from this station in Hawaii. However, in June 1945, a QSL was received in New Zealand, identifying the station with the callsign, KSAI.
This 50 kw station was used specifically for HW broadcasting to Japan, and it was last heard in September 1945. Programming was tranferred to the 5 kw MN station in Planila taken over by the US in mid 1945.
(The US Navy station, NPLH 7350 kHz , which was heard in February 1945, was probably a communication transmitter on the sane freighter.)
The 50 kw MW transmitter on Saipan was removed and transferred this time to the Malolos VOA base in the Philippines, where it began broadcasting on March 7, 1948. In 1969, when VOA Tinang becane operational, the Malolos base was given to the Philippine government, and the MW outlet became DZRP on 920 kHz . Thus, this unique 50 kw , $\mathrm{m}_{\mathrm{l}}$ transmitter broadcast for VOA from a ship, from Saipan, and from Malolos.
After the closure of KSAI Saipan, there was a gap of some 20 years with no broadcast station on the island. The first new station, erected in 1965, was designated as KJQR. This govermment owned station took to the air in mid 1965, with 1 kw on 1350 kHz . This station left the air fourteen years later in 1979, some three years after the commercial station WSZE became operational.

The twin outlets of WSZE began broadcasting in June 1975 from Navy Hill with 1 kw on 1050 MW, and 200 watts on 93.9 FM . This commercial outlet is still on the air today.
The Gospel station KSAI, the second broadcaster on Saipan with this callsign, is located at Susupe. It began broadcasting on Easter Sunday 1978, with 1 kw on 940 kHz . The station is owned and operated by FEBC Manila, and is programmed with Gospel and community features. A lo kw transmitter is currently under installation.
The newest station on the air in Saipan is the commercial SW outlet, KYOL, which was first heard with a test broadcast on December 18, last year. The first test was a tone signal on 15190 kHz . Subsequently, test programming has been introduced, and at least two outlets have been observed, 15190 and 11900.
This station identifies on air as "Super Rock", and it broadcasts contemporary music to Japan interspersed with English and Japanese announcements. The programs are produced by Drake-Chenault in California.

The next station for Saipan, the seventh, is the FEBC S $W$ outlet currently under construction at the northern end of the island. Work at this site, a 400 ft cliff overlooking the oceam. begam om Kamiaru 1981, but it was halted temporarily on the death of the contractor. The 100 kw transmitter, currently being installed at the FEDC site, was originally a VOA transmitter in California. It operated as KGEX fron Beln ont, with Spanish programming to South America. This unit was transferred to Okinawa in the late 1950s, where it carried Chinese progranming to Asia as OKI-5. It was on the air in Olinawa from 1959 to Naj 1977, when the VOA base was closed.
Although Saipan is but a small island, it is strategically located for international broadcasting to Asia, for this prupose, and for the benefit of tile local inhabitants, the 7 stations have been erectéd, with transmitters operating on SW, FII and IN.
wCC CHATHAMRADIO

In 1914, the larconi Direless Company of America built a radio station in the southeast corner of hassachusects for point-to-point traffic between the US and Europe. The transmitter, Vin, was located at harion, on the west side of Buzzards Day and 10 miles northerly of wew Bedrord. The receiver, wCC, was established at Chathan, on tine elbow of Cape Cod, 40 miles due east of the transmitter, and 15 miles south of iarconi's original wireless station at South Uellfleet. ihe two stations were connected by wires on poles marching over the hills.
The US IVave assumed control of the station during World War I. At its ending, the Radio Corporation of Aherica was formed to tale over the Morconi holdings. Uithin the next few years, the services of WIVWCC gradually slifted from point-to-joint to marine traffic. In 1922, it became the first RCA station to handle ship traffic exclusively.
$\because C C$ is the laryest US marine coast station. It covers the whole Atlantic Ocean, Gulf of iexico, Caribbean, ilediterrenean, Persian Gulf, and Indian Ocean. WII, ilarion, was closed in 1946 and its equipment transierred to South Chatham. The antenma at marion slowly rusted away although it was still standing as late as 1970.
WCC has always vorked in code only. How the station operates is detailed in the FallWinter, 1981, issue of RCA Relav, the compan organ, and Chris Drown's article, "Hands Across the Vater", in the June 1982, issue of 73 [iagazine.
The station has tiventy-one CUl operators, nine marine telex clerks, and four technicians. Of this number, thirteen are licensed hams and tre alloven' to use their own keys at WCC. Dae men is experimenting with a cw leyboard, a mpewriter whose internal workings transform the letter typed into its equivalent iorse Code simal. There are eight operators on luty at all times.
CW traffic moves at about 15 upm , often slower if the shipboard radio operator is unable to keep up with the UCC crew. The received message is typed by the operator who sends it along to a printer clerk via a small conveyor belt. he, in turn, places the typed message into a teleprinter which is connected directly with the RCA message center in inew Jersey. Here, a computer automatically telex's the message to its destination. The station averages 900 messages every 24 hours and the cost of $C H$ is $52 ¢$ per word.
WCC also uses SITOR (Simplex Information Transmitted on Radio), an answer-back, self-correcting, RTTY. It operates at 75 baud, actually 50 whas it has two check pulses to setect errors. SITOR is probably the cheapest of any radio service. A ship with a good transmitter/receiver can add SITOR equipment for about $\$ 15,000$, onposed to Satellite conmunications equipment which can cost upwards of $\$ 50,000$. Also, usin:s SILOR, a threeminute message costs $\$ 9$, whereas the same message by Cu would cost around $\$ 00$, ind, when a SITOR message is received, it is automatically prepared for imediate transmission to its destination.
The CW tramsititter are RCA T-3s for shorwave and a RCA 603 F for $436 / 500 \mathrm{kliz}$ long wave. Transmitting antemas are dipoles, curbain arrays, a verical wire, and a 300 foot tover for long wave. Su power is 10 kw .
Receivers are a tlatkins-Johnson 8718 and an $I 7^{\prime \prime} 3030$, both covering 0 to 30 NFLE , and a few Jational hino-500s. Receiving antennas are six rhonbics, tiree dinoles, a "i" bype long wire, plus some general purpose dipoles and lonc vires.

SITOR uses fized-tuned, single-channtel, equipment.
Frequencies used by Cli 24-hours a ciay are: 430, 500, 0536 , and 8030 kdz . Others, whose use depends on propagation, are: 4331, .0370, 12925.5, 13033.5, 10927.0, 16933.2, and 22516.0 filiz.
Cil traffic list broadcasts are transmitted at 10 minutes beriore each odd hour UrC, exceft at 0650.
SITOR uses 6405.5, 8715.0, 13031.5, 13090.0, 17207.5, 17216.0, and 22571.5 kiz.
MCC is nov our olcest and largest comercial CW station. RCA Global Commuications, Inc. (RCA GLOBCOK) also owns marine radio station NOE, Lantana, ML; UPA, Port Arthur, Ti; and $\mathrm{KPH}, \mathrm{San}$ Francisco, CA. RCA GLOBCOM is one of the world's largest comunications companies. Its parent, RCA, Inc., is now one of America's largest diversifiec incustries, no longer pure radio.
Persons may visit UCC at Ryder's cove, Morth Chathan, just onf state route 28 . However, the hours are limited from 6 a.m. to $4 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. , weekdays only. It is strongly suggested that intenced visitors call at least one daj ahead.

HCJB CORRECXS INTERNAL IINERFEREINCE

For many months HCJB has been troubled by interference with its 31 and 25 meter evening transmission to North America.

After observing the unwanted audio was in Spanish with inspirational music and was heard simultaneously on 9745 and 11910, it seemed obvious the interference was HCJD Spanish programing going where it shouldn't.
Since I listen closely to at least 90 minutes of HCJB programming each week, the interference was becoming very annoying. In early April I taped the final ten minutes of $D X$ Party Line (DXPL) at the 0230 GIIT release on 9745 and sent the cassette to Clayton Howard, hoping he would take it from there. He did.
On Hay 16 I received a letter from Clayton expressing appreciation for the cassette, which he turned over to HCJE's director of engineering. The problem has been solved and the interference has ended. Investigation revealed that apparently HCJB's Soanish language programing was getting into the program lines of the 31 and 2.5 meter transmissions beamed in English to North America.

Clayton did not learn the exact cause, but assuned it was either in the studio to transmitter program link or a malfunction at the Pifo transmitter site. He said the signal sounded clean as it left Quito.
There was no explanation why the technician on duty at pifo did not hear it, but with several transmitters broadcasting at the same time they probably don't listen closely, much less to an off-the-air monitor. Apparently no one at HCJB headquarters at ifiami, Florida complained either.
This should illustrate how we can be of service to shortwave stations by advising then of problems unknown to them.
"If you hear anything like this in the future, we would appreciate your letting us knov right away," Clayton said.
Clayton Howard must now be the dean of the on-the-air missionaries at HCJB. He first joined the engineering staff in Quito in Hay, 1941. He founded the AMDEX cluo about 12 years ago and was responsible for the club as well as hosting DXPL whtil he and his wife returned to the United States on furlough a couple of years acso. At that time he relinquished his responsibility for ANDEX, and Roger Stuobe, FCJB Director of Communications handled DXPL. Clayton and his wife Helen resumed their work on DXPL after returning to Quito.
Clayton is an active ham and SWL. His Ecuadorian call sism is HC1CY, and his FCC call is $W 9 \mathrm{KJZ}$, which he has held for 50 years, since he was in high school. For equiprent he uses a Heathkit HW-101 which he assemble?, with a dipole antenna. He operates on the 15 meter amateur band. For sit, he uses the Fain 7 , wich he says is his main receiver, and the ICF-2001 which he uses quite a bit and enjoys for portable operation, as when he was in the United States.
Clayton will be retiring from the mission field at HCJB by the end of this year. "It will be very hard to say goodby to Ecuador and HCJB," he said. "ile yonder how we will adjust to life back in the USA again." After 42 years, it will be different, Clayton, VERY different!!!
I'm sure many listeners around the world will miss the easy-goins and friendly voice of Clayton Howard on HCJB. I know I will:!!

DUTCH PIRACY: According to the April, 17, 1983 Billboard, there
is a guerilla war between Dutch telecommunication authorities and the country's 10,000 pirate radio stations. Some equipment used by the government to monitor these broadcasts have been destroyed when the government raided a pirate station called "Decibel". There is now a fear violence will escalate and lives may be lost. (Thompson, CA)

GOOF AT PADIO TOSCOV: According to ABC Hews and several newspaper articles, Vladimir Donchev, ank announcer with the Englis $h$ department of Radio iloscow, has been making derogatory remarks, on the air, about the Soviet invasion into Afghanistan. For about the past five or six days, until he was caught, Donchev apparently admitted that the Soviets had an invasion force in that country, and that the rebels were having difficulty in resisting the "Soviet invaders." According to published accounts, Donchev told his housekeeper on May 22 that he was going for a walk. He has not been
heard from since. Radio Hoscow notes that Donchev made some "Personal mistakes." (Bill Shamblin, Jr; James E Berri, CA via Los Angeles Times, Nay 25, 1983; Dave Robertson via The Spokesman Review, Hay 20, 1983 and May 25, 1983)

WARSAU PHOTESTS BROADCASTS BY US: According to the April 28, 1983 New York Times, the Polish government is denouncing RFE and the VOA. They claim these stations are being used to destabilize the country and that their prograns are aggressive and slanderous. (R. Hesch, NY)

FiBI thidIO: According to the Lawrence Journal Vorld of Dec. 21, 1982, the FBI wants their hish frequency Fil frequencies encoded because too many criminelas axe spying on their broadcasts by purchasing scanners. The FBI claims these frequencies are classifed but many electronic stores find ways to give them cut. (Rick Baxter, KS)

VOICE OF AIIERICA: LOUD AND CLEAR: The April 17, 1983 Los Angeles fimes has an interesting article on VOA Director Kenneth Tomlinson who is not moving the VOA to the political right as many have feared. He has inaugurated programs which give a diversity of viewpoints as well as breakfast commentaries which express a broad range of opinions. He states that his goal is pluralism. In this way no one can accuse him or slanting the news. In addition, he hopes to update VOA's ancient equipment. The article states that some of VOA's equipment date back to World War II. Thus, he wants VOA's technical capabilities to match other international broadcasters. Basically, he wishes to pattern the station after the BBC. He knows very well that nore people consider the BBC superior because of the consistency of its programs and its reflection of a wide range of opinions. (Marc Schlossman, CA)

RFE AND RL INCREASES PROPAGANDA: According to the Warch 27, 1983 Los Angeles Herald Examiner in an article entitled "Tuning in to a new Cold Uar on the Airwaves," Radio Liberty and Rzdio Free Europe are toughening their propaganda to the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe. Under RL and RFE head, former Conservative US Senator James Buckley and his deputy George Bailey, American managers were removed from the stations so all native editors and writers are not restrained by such personnel as to what is broadcast. A major aim of this new policy is to create ferment among the Soviet Union's national minorities by broadcasting the fact that the USSR is the world's only renaining imperial empire. (Thompson, CA)
INTERESTING ARTICLES: The Varch 13, 1983 New York Times has an advertisement paid by CID Radio which is a clandestine station broadcasting to Cuiba. The ad reviews the reason for the station's existence, lists a program schedule, and, of course,
solicits contributions. (Ruth Hesch, NY) -The Nov. 29, 1932 Christian Science Honitor has an interesting article entitled "Radio Free Kabul: Rallying tine Afghan Resistance" which offers a general overview on this clandestine station (Erica Heftmann, CA) --If you are interested in why hadio hoscow's signal seems stronger than anyone elses, I recomend an article entitled "Why Radio lioscow is Vinning the dB War" in R-E Annual 1983 (Rodney Guffer) -An interesting feature on kiddy pirates appear in the itarch 15,1083 Christian Science Honitor entitled "Pirate Radio Operators Plunder the Airwaves." ## Receiver Selection

A personality whom we all know in this hobby has an unvaxying policy: No questions about receivers. Some DXers and SWLs think he's stuck up. I believe he's quite prudent. Since I have been a personality in the hobby for about 10 years, I often get phone calls from SPEEDXers and others who want to ask me questions about the hobby. I don't mind at all; that's why I began this column. One question which I find difficult to answer, however, is: 'Which receiver should I buy?"

I always offer my opinion, of course. However, I have never come away from a conversation of this sort without the conviction that the caller already knows what type of receiver he wants. He's seen a new DX-300 in the window of the local Radio Shack, or his close friend Joe DXer happens to have an R390A for sale, or any other of a myriad of situations. This narrows his choice down to one receiver -- what he wants from me is my blessing on his choice. I always give it.

After some thought, I have concluded that the best way to help my callers narrow their choice down to the one receiver best for them before they call me is to write about my criteria for receiver purchase. I will then be sure that when I give my seal of approval on your choice, I'll be right. Perhaps I can even save a few DXers some money on their phone bills!

The first criterion I think of when buying a receiver has nothing to do with the circuitry, the number of knobs, or the manufacturer of the receiver -- it's price! The prudent DXer will estimate how much he can spend on his equipment and stick to that sum, no matter what. It won't matter how many stations you can receive on that wonderful new DX machine if you can no longer afford to send out reports.

Consider also what kind of listening you're going to do in relation to the price you're going to be paying. A dealer friend of mine once said that a good deal of his business in high-priced receivers was with goombahs with plenty of money who had married foreign-born women. When his wife got homesick for (India/Japan/England/Wherever) hubby would rush to keep her happy by going to my friend the dealer and ordering the best in the store (at the time priced at about $\$ 2100$ ). 'Don't wrap it -- I'll take it with me!" they'd invariably say.

How did our goombah use the receiver? He'd ask the dealer where to find (India/ Japan/England/Wherever) on the dial and the dealer would set the frequency to (All India Radio/Radio Japan/the BBC/Radio Wherever). He would hear from the goombah only when the broadcasting period changed and a frequency switch was necessary. Presumably, Mrs. Goombah was contentedly listening to her favorite station unaware that a receiver that cost $\$ 2100$ was doing the work of a $\$ 300$ receiver.

A high priced receiver does not guarantee great reception. We all know about that great DXer who uses a DX- 160 for his catches -- we also know about the DXer who has the latest in gear but constantly complains that all he can hear is his neighbor's light dimener. (I have even heard stories about people who listen to the WRTH instead of their receiver. I don't believe that, do you?)

So, we shouldn't go off the deep end and try to spend more than we can afford; we shouldn't pay for more receiver than we're going to use; and we shouldn't assume that spending a large amount of money will increase our DXing successes.

For those who want to hear about technical matters -- stay a moment! Next time we're going to discuss how a person should assess his needs in receivers in relation to their features.

Of course, this series won't last forever, so if you have any questions you'd like to see answered in this space give me a call or drop me a line. In the meantime, any receiver you want to buy is fine with me, hi!
