Moscow Newscaster Fired. . A Moscow radio newscaster who criticized the Soviet intervention in Afghanistan in a series of news broadcasts over the radio's English-language World Service has told investigators that he did so as a protest against the Kremlin's Afghan policy, sources say.

The 35 year-old newscaster, Vladimir Danchev, was promptly fired Tuesday and is being investigated by authorities.

Several top Moscow radio executives, including the editor-in-chief of the radio's World Service, have been reprimanded over the incident, which involved Danchev's denouncing Soviet forces in Afghanistan and calling on Moslem febels "not to lay down their arms and (to) fight against the Soviet invasion" of their country.

Danchev was said to have told investigators that he was strongly opposed to the Soviet role in Afghanistan and that he wanted to see an immediate withdraw of Soviet troops from there...Tnx to Radio Australia, and DXSF No. 32 (reprinted from Washington Post Service) for this...ds.

## ASSOCIATION OF NORTH AMERICAN RADIO CLUBS <br> Delcome to <br>

THE LARGEST ANARC CONVENTION EVER!!! That's right, ANARC 1983, hosted by WADXA in Washington D.C. so far seems to be the biggest and best ANARCCON ever. Officially there were 245 attendees, however at last count, with the walkins on Saturday, there were unofficially around 310 people. A fine showing to say the least. If you weren't there on the weekend of the lyth of July you don't know what you missed, and if you were there, I'm sure you were glad you attended.

So, what all happened at this years ANARC 83 Convention? There were panel discussions on all sorts of topics including publicising the hobby, should we or shouldn't we (about a $50 / 50 \mathrm{split}$ I would say, being one of those on the panel for that discussion). A talk on trends in broadcasting with some of the best in the field including Kim Elliott, Larry Magne, Roger Legge (this year winner of the NAm SW DXer of the Year award) and Bob Grove. Computers in the hobby were also discussed with working demonstrations of loggings software, automatic report generators, etc presented by Mike Levintow, Bill Krause (who supplied the computer), Skip Arey, and Jon Cohen.
Following lunch we had a number of seminars all occuring at once, but divided into the different areas of interest, including sw naturally, in which I again appeard with host Stu Klein, Jay Goldberg, and Dr. Richard Wood. Other seminars at this time included MW, UTE/PSB, and TV DXing. All of these centered around a free discussion of the various aspects of the hobby in which you had an interest. I can't speak for the other panels but with the SW group we had a very interesting discussion on where our hobby was going and how the clubs could change for the better. I received many ideas that I will later discuss with our BOD for possible improvements in the SPEEDX bulletin.
One of the most attended panels was that of Joseph Costello and George Jacobs. Do those names sound familiar? Well, they should, Mr. Costello is the man who first put a commercial SW station on the air here in the US, WRNO from New Orleans. He talked about his station, how successful they have been, so far, and where they plan to go. Many many questions were fielded from the audience, and it was quite interesting. George Jacobs? Didn't he used to work for the VOA? That's right, he did, but now with his consulting firm, and his first job with WRNO, he is working with Costello on deciding frequencies, working with the FCC, etc.
The final forum of the day was the broadcasters forum, always extremely popular. This years dias included so many broadcasters we just don't have room to name them all, but they came from stations such as VOA, RCI, BRT, VON, WRNO, RADIO BEIJING, HCJB, BBC, ZAMBIA, and so on. Very interesting and informative. Definitely not the panel to miss.
Later that evening we all had a chance to dine during the annual banquet, where we heard
talks from some very well known broadcasters. Pat Gates and Phil Irwin from the VOA and
Joe Costello from WRNO. The day went by quickly and I doubt whether there was a frown on
any DXers face. And then came the awards.....

## DADOBAMA A

BRAZIL...Radio Nacional do Brasil broadcasts in English to Europe and North America daily. Listen at 2000 UTC on 15390 or at 0200 UTC on 15290 or 17830 kHz . Mon-Sat lineup includes WEATHER REPORT, MUSIC, NEWS, MUSIC, BRAZILIAN SCENERY(actualities, the arts, facts in everyday Brazilian life) and MUSIC(the latter two proerams are not on Sat), then a daily feature program--Mon-SPORTS IN BRAZII, Tue-THE NATIONAL ECONOMY, Wed-BRAZIL TOURISM, Thu-THE NATIONAL ECONOMY, Fri-HIGHLIGHTS OF THE WEEK, Sat THE MAILBAG; the lineup continues with MUSIC, IETTERS, MUSIC and CIOSING. Sun consists solely of SUNDAY SPECIAL (whose lineup we feature in Program Panorama periodically). (Thanks to Jim Cox, CA)

GERMAN DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC...Radio Berlin International broadcasts in English to North America daily at 0015, 0100,0230,0330 and 0630 UTC in the 25 and 31 meter bands. The program lineup is daily NEWS, COMMENTARY and CURRENT AFFAIRS, followed by: Mon SPOTLIGHT ON SPORT and alternating DX features, RBI DX CLUB or DXTRA; Tue GDR KALEIDOSCOPE; Wed QUESTION TIME, POP CORNER; Thu THE LAND WE LIVE IN, MID-WEEK SPORTS REPORT; Fri NEWSREEL OF THE SOCIALIST WORLD, DID YOU KNOW?; Sat gIVE PEACE A CHANCE, DATELINE BERLIN; SUn MAILBAG, WEEKEND MAGAZINE. (Thanks to Dick Hull, CA \& Kraig Krist, VA)

GERMANY (FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF)... Radio Deutsche Welle announced on their English program to North America for July 3, 1983 that the now monthly MAILBAG program would be heard twice a month beginning in November...probably still on Sun. (Larry Talbot, WI)

KOREA (REPUBLIC OF)...Radio Korea has a new English program lineup. Mon-Sat features NEWS \& NEWS COMMENTARY, followed by MUSICAL PROMENADE (not on Sat--ECHOES OF TRADITIONAL MUSIC is heard on that day); a feature program is then heard, including: Mon TOWARD THE SEOUL OLIMPICS, Tue INSIDE NORTH KOREA, Wed THE PUISE OF KOREA, Thu SEOUL REPORT, Fri KBS ROAD SHOW (Wonder if this show is also known as "Seoul Train?"-WS), Sat KOREANS, NOW!; the transmission concludes with LET'S SPEAK KOREAN and HELIO EVERYONE, THIS IS SEOUL! (MOn-Fri only) and SHORTWAVE FEEDBACK(Sat). The Sun schedule is WEEKLY NEWS REVIEW, THE WORID TODAY, KOREAN CUIAURE PAST \& PRESENT, BRIDGE OF FRIENDSHIP. A complete time and frequency schedule for Radio Korea's English transmissions can be found in the June 1983 Station Skeds column. (Thanks to Sam Barto, OT for sending this current information from Radio Korea.)

SOUTH AFRICA...After Radio RSA signs off to North America at 0257 UTC, you can continue to listen to the station in its morning transmission to Africa from 0300 to 0427 UTC. Mon-Fri features NENS and COMMENT at 0300 and 0400 UTC, with GOOD MORNING AFRICA taking up the rest of the transmission time. Sat $^{\top}$ s lineup is 0300 NEWS, SPOTLIGHT, GMA-O400 NEWS, ECONOMIC REVIEW, GMA, while Sun has 0300 NEWS, THE MESSAGE, DX CORNER, GMA--0400 NEWS, MEDIA REVIEW, GMA. Frequencies in use are $9585,7270,5980,4990$ and 3230 kHz . (Clarence G. White, KS \& David

TAHITI... (Dick Hull, WA):"My favorite of all stations is Radio Tahiti. I get a very strong signal here. This is real "fantasy. island" stuff, with soft-voiced women announcers speaking the beautiful Polynesian language, Folynesian music and a phone-in program before sign-off at 0730 that is a real kick-I can't understand a word of it, but the interplay between the young children calling in and the announcer is enchanting." Try frequencies of 15170,11825 and 6135 kHz .

WORLD NEWS - broadcast 17 times a day in the World Service. At 2035, an announcement in FF IO'd the svo as being the "Voice of the Upper Valtan Popular Revolution." The service then carried material hostile to the present gov't of Upper Volta. It supported the "revolutionary" movement led by Thomas Sankara. At 2050, modulation on 17930 ceased and the Libyan radio's AA-lang external svo (Voice of the Greater Arab Homeland) resumed w/o a break in the xmtr's oarrier. The "Voice of the Upper Voltan Popular Revolution" was not hrd again on 17930 kHz . It has been noted on 6009 kHz . "Madio Bardai," the anti-Chadiangovermment stn, was heard to olose at 2027 on the same freq. Approximately two minutes later, with no break in the xmtr's carrier, the "Voice of the Upper Voltan Popular Revolution" started up with its interval signal. The discovery of the Upper Voltan "stn" on 17930 kHz and 6009 kHz tends to indicate that it and Radio Bardai broadcast from Libya. (8BCMS)

## THE FIRST SPEEDX SURVEY -- ANALYS IS

Three hundred and eighty four intrepid SPEEDXers responded to the first SPEEDX survey, which was submitted to the membership in January 1982. On the following page there are four tables summarizing the major findings of the survey.
READERSHIP -- We found that, on average, people more often read Tips and Topics and SWBC than other columns. People in the age group 25-29 were most likely to always read T\&T (mean score 2.85 (for an explanation of the mean score see the table on the next page); people $20-24$ were most likely to read SWBC, with a perfect score of 3 . The lowest scores were garnered by QSL Reports, which had a total mean score of 1.07 (among those 65 and over the score was 0.09 ), and also by Utility Scene, with a total mean score of 0.88 (among those $20-24$ its score was 0.09 ). However, among those interested in utility DXing, the column generated a mean score of 2.66 ; among those interested in QSLing, the mean score of QSL Reports was 2.29. Both groups are loyal to their columns. Among full vs. associate members, the associate members generally echoed the results among the total sample, while the full members read SWBC most faithfully of all, with T\&T second.
AGE -- The ages of SPEEDXers, of course, vary widely. The bulk of SPEEDXers are in the 30-64 age group -- the average SPEEDXer is close to 38 years old. An interesting fact emerges when we compare the mean ages for those interested in SW, utes, and QSLs. The average age of the person interested in $S W$ is about $37 \frac{1}{2}$ years; the mean age of the ute DXer is about 38 years. However, the average age of the QSL chaser is a little over 33 years -- almost 5 years younger than the average SPEEDXer. I compare this with my own experience -- when I was younger, I was a very eager QSL hound; now that I am older, I am less interested in QSLs and report very rarely.
DX INTERESTS -- Shortwave listening, of course, swept the field, with $94 \%$ of the sample checking it off as an interest. All the other categories garnered less than $50 \%$ of the sample: QSLs, $49 \%$; Utilities, $47 \%$; Mediumwave, $38 \%$; Ham radio, $27 \%$; VHF/FM/TV DX, $20 \%$; VHF Monitoring, $3 \%$; A11 types of $\mathrm{DX}, 1 \%$. Most interestingly, $1 \%$ said they had no interest in any form of DXing. Well, we like them anyway! (hi!)
COMMENTS ON SPEEDX -- This open-ended question, with no expected answers, produced answers all over the lot. Some of the questions in our next survey will try to pinpoint trends revealed in the comments we got in the first survey. We are pleased to note that $18 \%$ feel that SPEEDX is a fine publication (of course, we know that all of you feel that way, hi!). Eleven percent of you feel that the magazine is fine as it is. Insofar as additions to the bulletin are concerned, $19 \%$ want more technical material (receiver reviews, antenna reviews, and the like); $6 \%$ want more utility material. As for negative comments, $7 \%$ want better typing quality or larger print (among older SPEEDXers, this figure rises to $14 \%$ ). Four percent don't like material on elitism or controversy in the bulletin. Interestingly enough, fewer people reported that they liked listing reports by country in SWBC columns than said they wanted reports listed by frequency (as NASWA does it) -- the figures were $2 \%-5 \%$ country-frequency.
The above are the most important results of the SPEEDX survey. You will see some of these results guiding the club in its future course -- indeed, some of the results have already or will shortly be put into practice (e.g., moving Tips and Topics to the front of the bulletin and putting it next to Technical Topics and Program Panorama).
We hope that this short synopsis of the results, and the tables on the next page, will help you understand what this survey was about and what it achieved. We also hope that it will encourage you to reply to the second SPEEDX survey. We are interested in your opinions about SPEEDX and the SPEEDXGRAM. We also want to get an even finer picture of SPEEDXers in general. Within a few months, another survey will be included in the bulletin -- we hope that you will fill it out and mall it in, so that your voice will be heard.
SOME RANDOM NOTES -- Utility people seem to be more committed to the hobby than others: while only $20 \%$ of total respondents were VHF 1 isteners, $30 \%$ of utility DXers were. While $27 \%$ of total respondents are interested in ham radio, $39 \%$ of utility DXers are. Good for you! The mean age of full members is about 36 ; the mean age of associate members is almost 39. I guess this means we get less active as we get older. While only $2 \%$ of full members answering wanted reports listed in loggings by frequency, $7 \%$ of associate members did. If the figures can be trusted, as we get toward middle age we get more interested in technical material (up to $25 \%$ of those 40-64); we seem to lose this interest as we get toward retirement and that condo in Florida. If we discount SWBC, the most popular DXing interest by age is: Under 25 : QSLs ( $78 \% / 69 \%$ for the two groups); 25-29: QSLs are tied with utility DXing ( $53 \%$ each); $30-39$ is back to QSLs ( $53 \%$ ); those $40-64$ go strongly for utility DXing ( $51 \%$ ) ; and those over 65 seem to like amateur radio best ( $37 \%$ in a close field).

RECEIVERS, ANTENNAS, AND NEW IDEAS. . .

THE BEARCAT DX-1000

Electra Company, marketer of Bearcat scanner radios and Freedom Phone cordless telephones, has announced that it is entering the shortwave radio market with the Bearcat $D X-1000$, a radio that makes dialing in the $B B C$ in London as easy as dialing a push button telephone.
Utilizing the innovative microprocessor digital technology made famous by Bearcat scanner radios, the DX-1000 features direct access keyboard tuming. This makes it simple to tume from the BBC world Service to an Englieh language newscast from Radio Ghana instantly, without bandswitching. Covering 10 kHz to 30 MHz continuously, with PLL synthesized accuracy, the Bearcat DX- 1000 will monitor all shortwave bands, longwave, standard broadcast band "AM," amateur radio broadcesta, and even the marine band.
As easy as the new $D X-1000$ is to tune, it has all of the features even the most sophisticated DXer could want. For example, 10 memory channels make it possible to store favorite frequencies for instant recall-or for faster "band scanning" during important openinge. The digital display measures frequencies to 1 kHz , or at the touch of a button, doubles as a two time zone, 24-hour digital quartz clock. A built-in timer wakes the user to a favorite station, or it can be programmed to activate peripheral equipment like a tape recorder to record up to ten broadcasts, in any frequency or mode, while the user is asleep or at work.
Other important features include indepencient selectivity selection, with 12,6 and E .7 kHz IF filters to help separate high-powered stations on adjacent frequencies, plus a twoposition noise blanking system that stops Russian pulse radar interference. In addition, the $D X-1000$ features a two position $R F$ attemator, FM squelch control, tone control, battery back-up system to hold memorized frequencies and time if power fails, LED indicators for mode and functions, front mounted speaker. "fast" "slow" automatic gain control, and separate push buttons for selecting AM, LSB, USB, CW or FM rodies. The rinit comes with a built-in telescoping antenna for portable use, and includes an SO-239 antenn cemnector for 50 ohim leads, and a screw connector for "High Z ."
The Bearcat DX-1000 can be operated with batteries (12vdc), or from an electrical outlet ( $120 / 240 \mathrm{VAC}$ ). The unit measures $141 / 2^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{W} \times 5^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{H} \times 9-3 / 8^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{D}$, and weighs 17 lbs. Each radio comes with a free shartwave information guide that includes listings of stations from all corners of the world.

A most versatile and efficient piece of equipment is produced by MFJ Enterprises in Starkville, MS. The MFJ-1020 Active antema can be used either as an indoor active antenna with gratifying results, as an antenna tuner/preselector; or as a self-contained robile antena for use with a portable receiver while camping or on trips.
The antempa is extremely small, measuring $5 \times 2 \times 6^{\prime \prime}$. It sita a top my ICOM R70 with plenty of room to spare for the MFJ 24-hour clock and an ash trey. It features a five-band tuning scale divided: . $3-.7 \mathrm{MGh}, .7-1.6 \mathrm{MGh}, 4-11 \mathrm{MGh}_{\text {, }}$ and $11-30 \mathrm{MHg}$. There is a gain control divided into 9 steps, an on-off-by/pass switch and LED power light on the front panel. A telescoping antenna is placed on top for use with active antenna only. The rear features input and output jacks which accept RCA phone plugs (not provided). Also a ground pole and power jack which accepts a 2.5 sub-miniature plug with tip positive.

The unit will accept any 9-12 volt power supply. Not wanting to be bothered with batteries I ordered the optional 12 volt powar converter. I haven't investigated but the instruction sheet tells we that by unscrewing the telescoping anterna, revoving two rear acrews and sliding the top off toward the rear, a 9 -wolt bettery smap will be revealed. This will make the antema completely self-contained. As said before, this should be great for camping a trips.

One note of caution: The anterma should be well grounded at all times, especially with portable sets. If not grounced, oscillation will most likely occur. That is, as you tune through a frequency range with the tume control on the active antenna, you will hear umodulated carriers pass by. As you tune through, stations will appear and disappear as if you were tuning your radio. Stations other than your desired station will appear. Usually medium wave broadcast stations in your vicinity.
Another caution emphesized in the instructions is NOT to extend the telescoping antenna when using the unit as a preselector/antenna tuner with exterior antemna.
As an active antemn, the unit really works. Ky exterior antenna is bare wire, about 75-100 feet long, 15-20 feet high. As an active antenna, I cansot see very much difference in signal strength as compered with my exterior antema. Any advantage goes to the active antema. As an antema tuner, I can see an appreciable increase in signal strength. For example: I live in Bremerton, wA. Last night I mas listening to R. Impacta in Costa Rica. With the gain turned to maximu and tumed to 6150 kitz the signal registered plus 20 to 40 on wy signal meter. Turning down the gain and detaning, the signal dropped to 5 .
The price of the antema is $\$ 79.95$. The VAC converter is an additional $\$ 9.95$. Add $\$ 4,00$ for the antenga and $\$ 2,00$ for the convertar for UPS shipping charges (blue label in my location).
Another useful dewice for those DXers without a built-in 24 hour clock is the yFJ-104 digital clock. This features a six-digit main display on the left and four-digit sub-display on the right. I have the main diaplay timed to WWV and after a weak it is right on the dot. The seconds change in time with the time beeps. It features an alam which offers a choice of foum tunes as follows, according to the instruction aboet (I kid you not): Happy Birthdsy, Yankse Doodle, Sur Le Dont Du Avignon and (of all things) Hum Oreske. For thope slow on the up-take I shall translate: Happy Birthday, Yankee Doodle, the French eqpeliling may or may not be accurate, but the fourth tune is the well-knoma Humoresque.
The price of the clock is $\$ 39.95$ rith no shipping charges mentioned or charged to me. For those possessing WRTH, see the ad facing pages 304-305 for other MFJ products. For those who do not have WRTH, the address is WFJ ENTERPRISBS, Box 494M, Mississippi State, MS 39762.

REVIEU OF THE PANASONIC RF-2200
by (Author please inform me)

Most beginners in the field of shortwave do not want to spend several hundred dollars on equipment that could be absudoned in the attic or basement. Therefore, the portable receiver is usually the first choice of beginners because of practicability and price. However, in the beginning, many people are not able to afford a high priced digital portable. Although digital technology has come a long way in the past ten years, most digital portables atill cost a little nore than the novice likes to pay.
The novice may turn to a low cost analog portable as an answer, but may find that most have very poor reception characteristics. However, the Panasonic RF-2200 is able to bridge the gap between the $\$ 30$ apalog portable and the $\$ 300$ digital portable.
I know, first band, that the RF-2200 gave me the ability to really get into shortwave and not wind up with a receiver that could only pick up trensmitters in North America.
The RF-2200 covers from 525 to 1605 kHz for $\mathrm{AM}, 3.9$ to 28 MHz , for shortwave, and 88 to 108 MHz for FM . This is all covered in eight separate bands, two for AM and FM, and gix for shortwave.
The RF-2200 lacks the accuracy of a digital readout; but it has the best sensitivity of most of the portables, digital as well as analog, that I have listened to. Selectivity is nothing to brag about; however, it is satisfactory for most receiving conditions. The receiver has a wide and narrow position for control of the band width.

The reception with the receiver's own built-in, telescopic antema is fair under most conditions. However, with a good outdoor antema, this receiver can really pull in the DX. The RF-2200 works well with most high impedence antennas and accepts lead-in wires easily with screv antenna terminals at the back of the set.
The sound quality of this receiver is excellent and is much easier to listen to than many of the other portables and commanication receivers I have listened to.

The BF-2200 can use either AC power from a wall socket or 6 volts DC power from a coapartment on the back of the receiver which holds 4 D -size batteries.

The calibration of the analog dial can, at first, be confusing. However, once you understand the procedure of calibration and work with the receiver for a while, calibration becomes almost second nature. The real disadvantage of the calibration system is that for any real dial accurecy, you must calibrate the recaiver every 125 kHz . This is not a real big problem, but can be a hassle when trying to get to a certain frequency quickly. Calibration instructions in the mandal are relatively clear and should answer most questions.

The RF-2200 has two built-in crystal markers set at 125 and 500 kHz positions up and down the dial. The AM and FM bands require no calibration as their frequencies are read from the main tuning dial and not the shortwave band spread dial.
The RF-2200 has a BFO switch for reception of CW and SSB signals. Although reception in the BFO position is not really good; as with most portables; the receiver does a fair job with morgt of the signals in this area.

Other features of the RF-2200 include a built-in light for night operation, built-in speaker, FM AFC control, separate bass and treble controls, taning speed control, separate shoremave band selector, RF -gain control, and jacks for an external speaker and a recorder outpat. Also incluched with the receiver is a carrying strap and an earphone for private listening. Tuning, marker, and battery indicators are all on one meter on the froat. Although the meter is not calibsated, it is useful. There is also a gyroantema for the AM band that is useful in nulling, but not very good for direction finding.

Thore is only one real fault with this receiver. The receiver can often exhibit a problem knowa as "band switch cross-talk," Let us say, for example, that you are listening to UWV on 15 Mis. If you turn the shortwave band selector up or down one position, you are likely to find the signal on the adjacent band selector position as vell. Fortumately, panasoaic arranged the major bands in such a way that two separate broadcast signals almost never come together.
The RF-2200 lists for about $\$ 174$ here in the US. However, this receiver is widely available from many sources including varicus radio and applance stores. If you look aroumd, you can find one for about $\$ 10$ to $\$ 20$ leiss.

Over all the Panasonic RF-2200 is your best bet for a receiver if you do not have a lot of noney, but want to learn a lot about sbortwave.

## REVIEW OF THE SONY ICF-7600A FW/KW/SW

9 BARD RECETVER

What does a SwLer do then he is in the navy and lives on a ship and doesn't have room to take a large rig to sea with him? Usually he doesar $t$ get to Swil unless he's home on leavel well. I got tired of not having a receiver with me
while sailing all over the globe, and nissing all the news from home and all of the Dxinge I boucht a Scay ICF-7600A.
This little radio is no bigger than three packs of cigarettos laid side by side, but it does a very good job in spite of its size. It is powered by four aize As batteries. According to the omer's manalal the average battery life is 21 hours with alkaline batteries. I have foumd that I can go for a whale month of average use before it is time to replace the batteries. An opitional AC power adaptor is available from Sony.
Features of the ICF-7600A include an LED twning indicator, a locking power switch (to prevent accidental battery drain), an easy to read taming scale, and a tone control that not only has the traditional high and low settings, but has a special "news" setting, which seems to cut out most of the high frequency noise and makes voices more easilty understood. There are also output jacks for earphone and recorder.
of course, Sony had to sacrifice some performance in order to cram all of those features into that one little box. The nost noticible problem that I have encountered is selectivity. When tuning in a weak signal, it is almost impossible to get rid of the interference generated by very strong stations that are within approximately 250 kliz of the weak signal. Another problem is that the audio from the speaker begins to distort when the volume is turned up a little past half way. This is eliminated by using the earphone that is included with the set.

To put it quite simply, if you want to do some serious DXing, you are going to have to buy a bigger and more expensive rig. However, if you want a good little radio for general Swh, that you can take just about anywhere, the ICF-7600A is for you. I am quite proud to say that I am a full member of SPEEDX, and almost all of the loggings that got me there ware from my little ICF-7600A.

A USER REVIEW OF THE SLINKY dIPOLE ANTENNA

I purchased one of these antemas last fall for $\$ 49.95$ from the Backsburg Group. In the Jume issue of SPEEDX's Technical Topics, I see the price has risen to $\$ 67.95$. Perhaps this is for the assembled antemnas mine came in kit form.

The antenna is extremely well contructed. The slinky part is made out of galvanized spring steel to prevent rust and you would have a difficult time bending it out of shape. The coax assembly is also top quality. There is also a fiber glass form through which the coax is wound to form a balun. A more than adequate length of nylon cord is included to string up the antenna.
It was fairly simple to assemble. Wind the Coax through the form and solder the slinkies to the coax. Solder the plug an the other end of the coax if needed for connection to your radio. Tie on the nylon cord then mark the cord for the frequencies that you plan to listan to. A list of lengths for ham and popular Sw frequencies is included.
I then placed the antenna between two trees at a height of 16 ft . and carefully connected the ccax to mi FRG-7 following the directions for coax longth and position. I am also using a Palomar Enginoers P-308 Tunable pre-emp since the directions suggest that this will help tume to frequencies that are slightly different than those that the anterma is set to.
COMPARISON: I am currently using a 65 ft . dipole made from Radio Shack speaker wire, a convenient piece of tree branch for a center insulator, and the cheapest 50 ohm coax that I could find at Radio Shack. Total cost about $\$ 10.00$.

CONCLUSIONS: The Slinky performs fairly well compared to my dipole but is very suseptible to MW harmonics and local electrical interference. At the higher frequencies it is considerably shorter which is nice if you lack space or need to keep it hidden from the landlord.
The main question I guess is why spend almost seventy bucks when you can do better for a lot less.

REPLY TO TCOM REVIEW

This is in refutation of the June SPEEDX article discussing the ICOM IC-R70, Drake R7A, and NRD-515. (I don't have the author's name at present). To say that you get what you paid for, and that the R70 does not have the thoughtful features of the R7 or the NERD is totally uncalled forl Just about everycne agrees that the ICOM has the most useful features. The axiom that you get what you paid for cortainily does not apply to shortwave receivers, as I have painfully found outl Would it have made everyone feel better if ICOM put a $\$ 2000$ price tag on their rig? The R70 would certainly be worth itl NO, the truth is that both Drake and (especially) Japan Radio bave short changed their buyers with overpriced rigs which should be near perfect, but leave much to be desired.
Let's talk about the Drake. The R7A has a passband-selectivity-mode system without par. However, the Drake people did not follow through in many other aspects. The receiver has only fair audio, a poor tuning setup, a main dial with no hole for your finger, and less than average stability for its price class. If you want state-af-the-art tuning and stability that approaches the ICOM, you sust invest another $\$ 200$ for their external VFO.
The Japan Radio NRD-515 is a very BIG disappointment for a radio that costs $\$ 1400$ or so: No AM passband tuning, no notch, a poor fine tune control, substandard ECSSB-which isn't as good as the Kenwood R-1000, an unsmooth main dial, no internal speaker, and I could find more. I used this rig for 4 hours. The rig does bave excelient selectivity, passband tuning, and a very clear signal.

Back to the 870 , the reviewer in Jume QST, who is a radio engineer and commercial equipment appraiser, said that the ICOM IC-R70 would make a fine laboratory grade instrument. The bottom line is that the Drake R7A is the best DX radio; the NERD, with keyboard/memories/ AM product detector is the top rig for automatic, serious listening; and the ICOM is rated as the most ideal, all-around hobby set. I think that if a person is going to write an article comparing certain radios, he or she should present facts and not dwell on some minor flaws or discuss into the gound a few features. It is the total radio which must be judged. . .and the ICOM IC-R70 is as near to perfection as any receiver will ever be.

TECHNTCAL TIDBTIS: According to Gilfer the ESKA RXI2PL
receiver that they advertized and Larry Magne reviewed in the 1983 WRTH are not being made available in the US. Gilfer feels the compans should redesign the RF circuitry and improve the receiver's sensitivity. They are amaiting a new prototype receiver. (Stephen B. Pacelli, CO)-According to Universal Badio, the RRD-515 now has a keypad controller available for $\$ 149.95$. In addition, they announce the availability of two nem marine receivers from the Japan Radio Company-the NRD-92 and the KRD-93. These tep-at-the-line receivers are available for prices most of us unfortumately camot afford. For a complete price list and dutailed speciflcations of these receivers and their accessories write to Fred

UNHTRD KINCDOM: The managing director of the BBC External Services, Douglas Muggeriage has criticised wat he calls "a politicallymotivated and carafully crchestrated campaign" against intercitional broadcasting, led by the Soviet Union and the Eastern Block. Speaking to the Dipilomatic and Conmenweelth miters' Association in London, be predicted the inminent breakdown of law and order on the airwaves unless thare was "a new spirit of understandinge" "The ridespread use of jaming by the Soviet Union and other countries in many parts of the world is rapidily making nonsense of all international conventions for the orderly use of the airwaves", Muggeridge said. He also repeated his concern about some nations preventing the use of satellite technology in international broadcasting (This article from The Times appeared in the April 26, 1983 issue of the SCDX bulletin via Don McCants, AL)
NOISY COMPUTERS: Many of you may be considering to buy a computer to use with your shortwave gear. So a word of warning. Many computers are very noisy, i.e., RF noise, and will interfere with your AM reception. FM is not affected. This will especially affect you if your antema is in the same room as your computer. I use a Yaesu FRG7700 so it especially effects me. My TRS80 Model I is incredibly bad. Newer computers are not as bad and my TRS-80 PC-2 is very clean but the printer plotter causes interference when its actually in use. It morely being on causes no interference. I
half considered buying a Kantromics "The Interface", so I checked out a couple of the computers that can be used with it. I borrowed a portable radio and walked up to an operating computer with the portable radio on but with no station tuned in. of course both computers caused some RF but neither was too bad. The VIC-20 caused RF out to about $18^{\prime \prime}$ amay, while the TRS-80 color computer only caused RF about $3^{\prime \prime}$ away from the machine. If you are going to buy a computer to use with your SW radio. I recommend you check out its RF first. You may be in for a surprise on how much it generates especially if its a used older model. The FCC passed a law in about 1979 or 80 which limits RF from bome computers and most older computers probably would not pass the test. In fact, that is one reason why Radio Shack dropped the Model I. (Bruce K. Opitz, VA)

QSL TIP: If any of you send out as many letters as I do then surely you bave faced the problem of what I call "envelope stuffers". When I send out a reception report to a hard-to-verify country, or for that matter, an easy one, I stick in several local post cards and a shack photo. Obviously I want to make the letter as interesting as possible in hopes of getting a response. Well, post cards can get expensive if you send out $20-30$ per month. I have found excellent substitutes for 25 cent post cards that are not only free but are more interesting: The local tourist office and all the major hotels keep a large supply of tourist brochures picturing all the local attractions. For example, here in San Diego, I can find folders on Universal Studios Tours, San Diego 200, San Diego Harbor Cruise, Tijuana and so on. They are very colorful with plenty of photos and just the right size for a business envelope. Everyone makes out when I send these brochures out. The tourist attractions get worldwide exposure, the recepient sees some interesting pictures of my area, and I save money. Not a bad deal. (Allen Rising, CA)
TRY A STEREO GRAPHIC EQUALIZER FOR YOUR SWL/DX WORK: Some SWL's are finding audio active filters useful for emphasizing voice frequencies and eliminating noise. However, these devices are expensive, and not always easy to manipulate. One or two SWI's have taken graphic equalizer units from their high fidelity systems, and fed their receiver's (or tape recorder's) audio
directly through one or both equalizer channels before feeding their speakers. Success with such hook-ups usually has been minimal, because nost equalizers alter their audio frequency ranges by no more than plus or minus 12 dB . SPEEDXer Dave Newiric's "Radio Equipment Forum" (Review of International Broadcasting, July, 1983, p. 31), however, suggests a possible answer to this frustretion. If your equalizer is a sterreo device, feed the sound from one channel back through the seccond champl before feeding the spoaker! Dave claims that such an arrangement may provide 24 dB (or more) of total modification for each frequency segment thus processed twice. Nost sounds above and below a selected narror voice range (my for example, 400 hz 1500 hz ) can be eliminated, thereby releasing that precious ID (and much) more for easy listening. Hopefully, carious SWh/DX types with couposent hi-fi systems will try such hook-ups, and report their results in RIB and elsenherein our hobby press. (Dave Maxfield, MI)

General hints are offered on what type receiver to choose, as wall as several cautions in making a selection. A caution is also expressed in dealing uith the so-called "grey market." CELEBRITY DXER: Jonathan Marks, on Radio Netherlands! "Nedia Network" program reported that Ronnie Milsap, woll-known Nashville songmiter and singer, is a shortwave radio listener, and is a frequent listener to Radio Netherlands and Jonathan Marks' "Media Networik" show! It seems that there are more listeners to shortwave radio than we may be aware of. (Don McCants, AL)

RADIO JAPAN: Radio Japan is hoping to build two relay stations and buy time on a third, according to a letter from Mr. Kazuhiko Tajiri, manager of the programang division of the overseas broadcasting department. Two studies of ways to improve reception started in 1982. In one, a group from Japan visited major international broadcasters to examine their methods. In the other, research was carried on by a committee in the Ministry of Posts and Telecomunications. Both units issued reports in the middle of March. The recommendation of the ministry of communications was that new and more powerful transmitters be installed at the Yamata site north of Tokyo and that relay stations be built in Central America and Southwest Asia. The report also called for renting 500 kw transmitters at Moyabi, Gebon. At Yamata the present transmitters would be replaced by four with output power of 300 kw each and four with output power of 100 kw. The report has been subsitted to the Government and discussions are underway. Radio Japan hopes that the plans will be included in the budget for fiscal year 1984. (Wilder A Pickard II, IL)

NEW STATION FOR CURACAO: A new shortwave station will soon make its debut at 0330 GIT on 11700 kHz . The 50 kw station with an omidirectional antenna will be called Radio Earth and will broadcast from the island of Curacao in the Netherland Antilles in order to serve the western Hemisphere. (Gunter, NC)
CHANGES AT THE CBC: On Narch 30, 1983 the director of the CBC announced that the radio and television services of the CBC will no longer be under joint control. In addition, the French and English radio services will also separate. (John H. Demmitt, PA)
