Island a Key Site in East-West Dueling: The zone of cold and windy islands in which the U.S. said a Korean Airlines jumbo jet was shot down by a Soviet fighter forms the most important East-West military dueling ground in the Pacific.
U.S. Intelifgence officials routinely eavesdrop on Soviet military communications, using everything from simple ground antennas to sophisticated satellites to decode scrambled or encrypted messages.
For example, the U.S. ability to monitor air-to-ground conversations of Soviet fighter pilots stalking the jumbo jet probably depended on the glant electronic eavesdropping facility that's run by more than 1000 U.S. military personnel at Misawa, on Hokkaido, the northernmost Japanese islarid.

The Misawa facility, whose spying on aircraft voice traffic is performed by the U.S. Air Force's 6920th Electronic Security Group, exists to monitor Soviet military activity in Siberia and the Northern Paoific.

The U.S. maintains hundreds of such posts, including a top-secret in* stallation in China near the Soviet border set up to monitor Soviet missie tests. Although all three services are involved, most of the worldwide gathering and analyzing of foreign military communications is done by the supersecret National Security Agency, based at Fort Meade, Md.

The eavesdroppers' major efforts are in decoding telemetry signals sent by missles being tested rather than to listening to pilots conversations, which are not usually serambled or coded. Nevertheless, the U.S. graduates hundreds of Russian-language experts each year to translate such conversations.

Inteliigence sources said Thursday that the scrambling of 3 to 8 Soviet pighters ordered to tall the errant Korean Airlines 747 would have been unusual enough to trigger instant attention from communications monitors.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes and other U.S. of ficials refused Thursday to talk about details of the intelligence operations that monitored the Soviet action, but he did say that the delay in contirming the alrcraft's crash was partly because of problems in translating from Rússian to Japanese to English.

The intelligence sources, who spoke on grounds they not be identified, theorized that the downed jet had strayed over or near petropavlovsk. A naval base lies on a nearly straight line between Anchorage and Sakhalin, where the U.S. said it was shot down, probably by a Soviet Aphid or Apex air-to-air missle.- Without exception, intelligence specialists considered the downing of the Korean airliner a foolish mistake, while granting that the plane probably set off a host of security alarms......Tnx to DXSF no. 40 and the Sept. 2 M1am1 Herald for this...

Illicit Radio Signals Fill British Airwaves... Radio Invicta, in its 13 years on the air, has developed a loyal audience for its steady beat of soul, jazz, funk and gospel music. But more important for its survival, it has developed a knack for broadcasting from hidden locations.

Unilke the U.S., where dozens of radio stations fill the alrwaves in most major cities, many European nations have strictiy limited access to the alrwaves. Although some countries have recently lessened restrictions concerning pirate radio, the British government isn't budging. It contends that the "radio frequency spectrum is a scarce resource" and that available prequencies are allocated to the four national stations in the U.K. (all operated by the BBC.) and 80 or so local stations that can only be heard in their 1 mediate areas.
Critics retort that there is plenty of space available, pointing out there are large gaps on the radio dial where nothing can be heard. They say the government simply wants to maintain tight control over broadcasting.

So the cat-and-mouse game continues, with the pirates trying to keep a step shead of investigators for British Telecommunications, the state-owned company that helps to police the alrwaves. Many of the smailer pirates set up remote equipment, so if the gov't agents track down the signal, there is no one to answer questions.

But some pirates, like Invicta, brave it and broadcast live. Though Invicta generally stays olear of authorities by occasionally moving 1 ts studio, it had about $\$ 7500$ of equipment confiscated last fear.

Licensed stations, while contending that the pirates are unfair competition because they don't have to pay copyright fees to record companies, scoff that the outlaw stations aren't much of a threat. Radio Invicta claims an audience of 125,000 to 150,000 on 1 ts Sunday broadcasts, but a recent study indicates that pirate stations account for less than $1.4 \%$ of the radio listening hours in Britain..."no one is quaking in their boots," says a spokesman for Capital Radio... Tnx to Abble Mathew for forwarding this from a recent Well Street Journal.

SELECTIVITY FILTERS There has been a lot of talk about this in the various SW club bulletins. once in a while this question arises: "I need more selectivity, and had my set modified to use the SSB filter, but that seemed to be a disasterl what do I do to make the signals more intelligible?" That, my friends, is what you may have experienced after using a "sharp" filter on AM signals! what is the cure?......A bit of trickeryl Normal broadcast AM signals contain TWO sidebands (upper and lower) situated about the carrier. These normally occupy at least 6 Khz . up to about 10 khz . minimum. If the broadcaster is "splattering" or otherwise overmodulating, he will occupy as much as twice to three times thati Assuming he is minding the transmitter in a prudent fashion, and spreading things over 10 khz 。 bandwidth, we have: a lower sideband occupying 5 khz ., carrier nil, an upper sideband occupying 5 khz . You say you have a 2.9 khz . mechanical filter? Turn the selectivity switch to that position, and carefully tune the set about $2.8-3.1 \mathrm{khz}$ to one side of the exact frequency. This will chop off one sideband, but who cares, since both contain duplicate information. Now if the "carrier" slips out of the bandpass "window", the signal will sound grossly distorted, and IF the bandpass window's skirts are very steep, the signal will sound like SSB! You will notice a marked reduction in fidelity with sharp filters. This is normal as you are cutting off part of the high audio frequencies by limiting the bandpass window. More on this subject in a later issue.

Well, finished at last! I have a lot of space left, so I figure that this would be an ideal time to present the lat edition of the Cereghin Guide of $\mathrm{W} / \mathrm{H}$ Reporting and Reportage. I feel that yon, the contributor, deserve to be let in on my philosophy on the subject.

ON STAIE LOGGINGS-m most logs printed in SPEENX are already two months old by the time you read them. And those are the fresh loge. Stale logs could be up to 4 or 5 months old! In W/H from now on, no logs older than 42 -days old will be printed. Fy 42 days, I mean that logs will be accepted from the entire previous month up to the 12th of the current month. Example; for this month (October), logs were accepted from August list to September 12th. No earlier.

LATE LOGS - for obvious reasons, logs received after the 12 th of the month simply corot be used. I start this column on the 12th of the month sharp (the 11th when the 12th fails on a Sunday.), and I send the contributors list to Job T. and his computer on the 12 th or 13 th. I recommend giving your logs at least 5 days to reach me from US locations, Overseas reporters may want to give their logs a week and a half to get hers. The same should hold true if you send your logs via the CDE.
CHEXK YOUR LOGS- you'd be surprised to see how many non-W/H logs I get each month. Don't send me time station, or feeder loge. These go to out very capable UFIE editor Mike Chabak. Don't send me GSL reports. These go to Leon Kanopica, Make sure that the logs you send me are W/h logs, and not Europe or Asia. Make sure your logs are complete. I will not print logs which lack frequency, time, station, country, details, date, or reporter. Make sure your logs are accurate. I once got a report for the Falkland Islands BS on 15395. I'm sure the reporter simply mis*IDed it, but the fact remains it was inaccurate. Make sure your logs are informative. The rarer the station, the more details, please.
LEARN TO USE THE SIOMCODE CORRECTLY_ with a little common sense and forethought, can use the SIO code more effectivly. Be logical in your approach. It is simply impossible for reports of $554,344,543,223$, act. to exist. The overallmquality digit (the 3 rd one) cannot be lower than the lowest figure, ox be higher than the highest digit. Get the BIP on SINPOcode usage for a further discussion on this matter. You can get one from HQ.
BE HONRST_. there is always some moron out there who reports reports that shouldn't be reported. There have been cases of people sending in false reports in order to get a SPEFIK Full Membership the cheap way, or Just to impress all the honest folk out there. So help me, if I catch anyone sending in false reports cop purpose, I will recommend his expulsion from SPHinx to the BOD, as would any staff member. We want to keep our hobby clean, but we need your help.

On the other hand, mistakes do happen. I've mis-IDed my fair share of stations. No one will crucify you if you label a questionable log as tentative. If you didn't hear an ID, then by all means, let us know! Remember the old saying: It is better to trust the man who is frequently in error than one who is never in doubt.
GEI TO KNOW YOUR GDITOR! A few members write me long, personal letters, which I enjoy reading very much. I love to talk to spardorers, either by letter or phone. If you have a hot IX tip, or just want to chat, my number is $301-568-8547$. I'm home from 6PM-9PM weekdays, or up until 9PM weekends. Ne collect calls, or calls in the middle of the night please, or else I'11 get very cranky.

Well, that's all I want to say. Remember, the IX season is here! So what are you waiting for? RFPORT! My thanks to 68 reporters who sent in 283 reports. See you all next month !

Some suggestions for new comers to QSLing. Eastern European countries do not usually require any return postage for QSLs. All are good verifiers, although some are slower =than others. So save your return postage here. If you what to increase your country heard total, you are going to have to get away from just listening to English broadcasts. Many countries that can easily be heard in the United States are only in other languages. For those that do not understand the two most common languages, French and Spanish, I would recommend a good foreign language dictionary or phrase book. Try to pick out the radio-related words and remember them, and when listening one can usually get an idea of what is being discussed. Most importantly, listen for the ID, and be positive of it. South American stations ID many times over, so there is plenty of time to be sure. If you don't get the ID the first time try again the next night. Be absolutely sure of the ID before logging and/or reporting to the station. There are many other languages that are used, such as Arabic and African dialects, but French and Spanish are the easiest to start with. To these you can add Portuguese, which I accidently left out.

## DX Programs

## DOWN-TO-EARTH FACTS ABOUT DX PROGRAMS

Many radio stations today are now offering shortwave $D X$ programs to their listeners; some just as an added extra while others feel it is an important part of their station. In this report, I will look at a few DX programs. I am not going to endorse any one DX program but rather I will give you the bare facts about what is contained within them in addition to rating them from 1 to 10 .

RADIO NEDERLAND, Holland:
From DX Juke Box, which was a mixture of music and DX, to the present Media Network, Radio Netherland has continued to look upon their DX program as a very important part of their radio schedule. They rely on Media Network, which comes on after Newsline on Thursday's, to keep listeners glued to their radio sets for the latest news on DXing and SWLing. The program is hosted by Jonathon Marks who presents the program in his usual cheerful and likeable style. Media Network concentrates on a variety of reports from international correspondents all over the worldso there is something in it for every geographical location. Each week, a separate area is covered by these reporters who offer a wealth of off-air recordings and DX news.

Also contained in the program are various specials on different broadcasters. Their recent series on Armed Forces Radio was very well produced with interviews and off-air recordings. Accordingly, there is more to this show than meets the eye. Some recent specials have been devoted to clandestine radio stations, a look at radio in Holland, a review of the Hitchiker's Guide to DXing, and many others.
It doesn't stop there however. Media Network is backed up with a veritable gold mine of free information on shortwave. They present this in the form of booklets on what is available. They offer in addition to this free sample reporting forms in Spanish, Portuguese, and Indonesian.

Overall, Media Network offers the listener a variety of programs and items carefully researched and well put together. With its receiver reviews and the like, this is certainly one of the best DX programs now produced. Rating: 10 (ten).
HCJB-Quito, Ecuador:
This is one of the most controversial DX programs produced today. It's content isn't controversial but the way it is presented is. Clayton Howard is certainly easy-going about the DX Party Line and one can tell that there is little scripting involved here (at least it sounds that wayl). This program is more of a DXers kind of program with more DX reports than most. In addition, it is heard with two separate editions on Saturday and Monday evenings. This is about where the non-controversy ends.
There are some things you should know about this program. There is a feeling of slight boredom while listening to this program because of Clayton's easy going style. One can feel lost with him. The program tends to move rather slowly and can drag on. All the material in these two programs could be fit into one if the announcer speeded up his voice. Secondly, HCJB is a religious station and therefore his wife and himself presents a religious message in the program. One in the middle and one at the end of the program.
This certainly doesn't fit in with a DX program. It just sounds awkward. The religious messages are too serious and have no place in this type of program. In addition, the HAP report is very boring to hear. All that is done is the announcing of new HAPpies and then requests for money. This tells us just about nothing about what is new with HAP and what they have accomplished.
Overall, this program is probably an easy-going standard DX program. It however, is very helpful in the standpoint of $D X$ information. In addition, the very personal style of of Clayton Howard, both in his announcing, and of his reading letters on the air does give the program some good points. Rating: 7.

RADIO EXTERIOR DE ESPANA:
Iiere we have a good example of a short and to-the-point DX program which is somewhat nonprofessionally produced, yet is still interesting. They generally have a feature on something which can be anything from a contest announcement to a feature on one of the Volmet stations. However, the DX news presented is little more than totally useless because it is usually only for the Spanish language transmissions of various stations. This should ce changed to English programs. This DX program is just something that REE thought would se somewnat interesting but it is not a large part of their schedule. Overally, the program is short, yet it is a little more than entertaining for a DX program. Rating: 5. RMDLO SiEDEN INTERNATIONAL:

This progran produced by George wood is a DXers dream with a wealth of current frequency information. It is full of station schedules. This program is especially recommended for the blind and handicapped who are unable to use printed DX bulletins in their conventional sense. Jverall, lots of DX news. Rating: 8.

RNO:
is first heard about Glen Hauser on SWL Digest. Now we can hear a program all about radio croduced by himself and aired on the new WRNO. This program has rapidly grown in popularity and with 500 d reason. This is the only DX program targeted to radio listeners in North America only. This program squeezes a lot of material into each weekly broadcast and is one of the best to hear. Glenn does a great deal of commenting on his SW publication Feview of International Broadcasting sometimes which results in a mild "hard" sell zreatment, but he deserves the chance! Most commenting is done by himself with a limited 'Ise of taped material. He presents a number of shortwave schedules plus news about $F M$, in, TV, rimateur, and many other forms of DXing. He also gives schedules of CBC and other romestic/semi-foreign countries. This program is another one with a wealth of DXinformation. Occasionally, he devotes entire programs to off-air recordings and station specials. Sone of these are very interesting, while others, frenkly, are not. The treatment of this program by WRNO however is very harsh.

Gne has to be very devoted to the program to put up with the mishaps. For instance, I renember one occasion where the Russian language religious broadcast continued right through the world of Radio's time slot causing the show to go on one half hour later Another time, everything seemed right for the World of Radio program to go ahead as scheduled. They even played Blue Bayou because there were a few minutes to go until. iC30 EDT. At 1030 , Blue Bayou was faded and then there was dead silence. My hope was that the next thing I would hear would be the theme of the World of Radio. Instead, more rusic was heard. Finally, the world of Radio started but alas, it was last week's edition. Ihey soon faded that. More music. Finally about one quarter of an hour later, someone who sounded 17 years old came on and said the World of Radio would not be on this day. Hopes fell like a ton of bricks! I figured that the folls must have lost the tape! I'll never know.

Anyway, the program seems to be rumning regularly now and can be heard three times a week so you shouldn't miss it.

Overall, the program has a wealth of news on all aspects of the hobby, however sometimes this information packed program is interrupted for a special program or a wRNO mess-up. Rating: 9.
RADIO MOSCOW:

[^3]Overall, a DX-packed program with a wealth of tips on SW and receivers and the like. Rating $91 / 2$.
Well, those are only a few DX programs that I have decided to review for you. Most of the others I have never been able to listen to well enough to make a judgement on them. I suggest that you not look so much at the overall ratings of the progrems but instead look for what you want to hear in a DX program and listen accordingly.

INFORMATION AND REVIEWS OF various
SHORTWAVE STATIONS ON THE RADIO DIAL
SIXTY YEARS WITH ADVENTIST RADIO
by Adrian M. Peterson, India
broadcasting from Emmanuel Missionary College (now Andrews University) in Berrien Springs, Michigan, USA, on April 29, 1923.

The origins of this first, historic, Adventist radio station go back to the early days of radio experimentation in the United States. In 1920, just a few months before the worldfamous first broadcast by KDKA, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, John Fetzer established an amateur radio station at his home in Lafayette, Indiana. This station was licensed as 9FD with a power of 990 watts. Less than two years later, Fetzer was invited to transfer his radio equipnent to Berrien Springs, where he went on the air as $8 A Z$, with a minimal 10 watts output.
This original transmitter, 9FD-8AZ was licensed by the Federal Radio Commission in Washington D.C., on April 23, 1923 to radiate programming under the callsign KFGZ, on 360 meters ( 833 kHz ). Just 6 days later, on April 29, 1923, the first official program was broadcast from this now historic Adventist radio station.
During the following year, 1924, station KFGZ acquired the transmission equipment of a silent station, WLK in Indianapolis. This new KFGZ took to the air in Berrien Springs, March 24, 1924. In January 1925, the callsign was officially changed to WEMC, signifying its broadcast location, Emmanuel Missionary College.
During its 8 years of broadcast history in Berrien Springs, station KFGZ-WEMC chalked up many notable events. It was a pioneer station in Michigan as well as in the United States. It was listed at one stage as one of the 10 best stations in the US. It was heard frequently in Europe, as well as in Hawaii, Australia, and New Zealand.

When the college hit hard times in 1.930 financially, the station was closed, and sold to its operator, John Fetzer, who transferred it to Kalamagzoo, as wKZ0. In its new location, this unit became the key station of a regional radio network. It is still on the air today.
Another pioneer radio station established by Seventh-day Adventists is VOAR, in St. Johns, Newfoundland. This station began as 8RA in 1929, and, though it has gone through a successive series of callsign changes, it is still on the air today, more than 50 years later.
Subsequently, a whole series of Adventist radio stations were established in North America, and today, there are 12 of these stations on the air, covering major population areas, such as Washington DC and Los Angeles, CA. (Continued on bottom of next page.)

ABOUT KGEI

In the late $1930^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$, the General Electric Company built their first shortwave transmitter. It was a 35 kilowatt transmitter to be used at the General Electric exhibition at the 1939 San Francisco World's Fair on Treasure Island in the San Francisco Bey. February 1939 was the "On-The-Air" date operating under the callsign of WGXBE - The "Showcase Stations" for general Electric. Shortly after, the power was raised to 50 kilowatts and the callsign changed to KGEI (General Electric International).
Following the World's Fair, in June of 1941, General Electric moved their new shortwave transmitter to its present location on the salt flats of Redwood City, California. The station became known as the "Voice of Freedom." The station was called KGEI for the following reason. The $K$ designates all United States' radio stations west of the Mississippi River. The GE stands for General Electric and the $I$ is for International.
In 1941, when the United States entered World War II, KGEI, still owned by the General Electric Company, was operated by the US office of War Information. It was used to inform servicemen overseas of the activities at home, as well as in other parts of the world.

It was during this time that General Douglas MacArthur transmitted his most fanous message to the people of the Philippines: "I shall return!" That broadcast was aired over KGEI.

Following the war, GE resumed operation of KGEI which was primarily used as a sales aid to promote the use of GE products in Latin America. Stanford University used KGEI for audience research during this time.
In 1956, ( $E$ turned the license back to the Federal Communications ommission-terminating transmissions. In 1958, GE sold the station to a group of businessmen who desired to use KGEI as a commercial venture. In October 1958, KGEI returned to the air. The venture failed. In 1959, the businessmen contacted a Christian missionary organization, the Far East Broadcasting Company, who they thought might be interested in buying it.
On March 27, 1960, KGEI was transferred to the Far East Broadcasting Company, KGEI became the Latin American Service of FEBC.
In October 1962, during the Cuban Missile Crisis, KGEI cancelled its regular programming and re-broadcast the Voice of America broadcasts to Cuba for over a month, receiving official recognition from the President.
In December 1972, KGEI relayed messages to Managua, Nicaragua, and used amateur radio to receive messages from there to aid in rescue efforts, during the earthquake relief. During that same year, KGEI sponsoreda Christian US Soccer team tour of Latin America.

In 1973, a 12 year freeze on expansion of shortwave broadcasts imposed by the FCC was ended. October of that year saw the expansion of KGEI's broadcasts to include Japan, China, and the East Siberian section of the Soviet Union. KGEI then became an Asian Service of the Far East Broadcasting Company as well as a Latin service.

In November 1974, KGEI inaugurated its 250 kilowatt service to Asia by installing a new 250, 000 watt transmitter. This transmitter is used in conjunction with the 50,000 watt transmitter at times to Latin America. This is the largest privately owned shortwave transmitter in the United States.
During 1975, KGEI was once again called on to help relay messages in an earthquake torn zone. This time it was to Guatemala. All regular programing was cancelled and messages of Health and Welfare made up the broadcast schedule for over a week.

In 1978, a total of 53 letters came to the Far East Broadcasting Company from Communist China. Since the normalization of United States relations with China in January 1979, KGEI has received over ten thousand letters from there.
KGEI receives an average of 1,100 letters per week as a direct result of their broadcasts. This is approximately 750 from Japan and 350 from Latin America.
It is estimated that from 2 to 3 million listeners are tuned to KGEI each day. Most of their listeners are steady and write many times. It is noted that many professional people write. ( $41 \%$ of all letters are typewritten). Students and professors number $40 \%$ of the total writers. Young people in general write to the station. $73 \%$ of the writers are under 30 years of age.
KGEI programs self-improvement/educational progarams such as English by Radio, (in Spanish, Russian and Chinese) health and sanitation (talks by Medical Doctors) Cultural, folkloric music which includes the literature, history and folk music of the various countries in their broadcast areas. They utilize the magazine format of radio broadcasting extensively. By using a large quantity of informative material such as news, commentaries and features, KGEI can convey their programning to the largest segment of the population in the shortest possible time. with this they interweave Bible readings and inter-denominational programs as well as programs from well known religious groups.
KGEI is supported by donations and gifts from interested individuals.
(SIXTY YEARS OF ADVENTIST RADIO continued from previous page) An additional series of Adventist radio stations has been established in several countries in Europe, as well as in Indonesia, Philippines, and the Caribbean. Currently, there are more than 40 of these local service stations on the air in some 15 different countries.
Although Fetzer, of the original KFGZ, made an application for a shortwave broadcasting license in Narch 1928, Adventists did not venture into international shortwave broadcasting until the organization of AWR-Europe in 1971. This shortwave unit, the first of three currently on the air, has made its broadcasts over powerful shortwave facilities located at Sines in Portugal, Cyclops in Malta, and Andorra in the Pyrenees. The sister unit, AWR-Asia was organized in 1976, and AWR-Latin America began broadcasting from Guatemala in mid 1979.

A VISIT TO RADIO NYAB BHUTAN
by Adrian M. Peterson, India

Recently, a seniro staff member from AWR-Asia made a visit to Thimpu, Bhutan, specifically to visit Radio NYAB. The journey into Bhutan by bus was through the rugged Himalayan foothills over the narrow and
at times tortuous highway.
The small mation of Bhutan is 250 miles long and less than 100 miles wide, with a total area of fewer than 20,000 square miles. Most of the land is ruggedly beautiful, and there are many grand snow covered mountains to the north. In the southern jungles, there is an annual rainfall of 300 inches.

The total population of Bhutan is three quarters of a million, some 10,000 of whom live in the capital city, Thimpu. This small capital lies at an elevation of $6,000 \mathrm{ft}$. , and it is the location of one of the world's exotic radio stations.

Back in the year 1970, according to the WRTH for that year, a MW station was projected for Thimpu. It was intended to operate with 1 kw on 1210 kHz . However, this station was never erected.
The first and only radio station in Bhutan is Radio NYAB, which is operated by the National Youth Association of Bhutan. It appeared suddenly and unheralded on the radio dial soon after mid 1974. It was on the air initially for about $11 / 2$ hours each Sunday afternoon on 7040 kHz . Soree months later, a Wednesday evening program was commenced, on another frequency of 4690 kHz .
Radio NYAB is located on a knoll just beyond and above the capital city, Thimpu. It is located in a 2 -storey natural colour cement building, which houses the studios, offices and transmitters. The single self-supporting steel mast is located on the side behind the main station building. The transmitter is a 300 watt unit suppressed to 100 watts.
Programming from Radio NYAB consists of contemporary music from overseas, as well as local instrumentals and vocals.

Radio station NYAB verifies all correct reception reports with a full data QSL card bearing a serial number. Their address is Box 1, Thimpu Bhutan, and the current schedule is as follows: Wed, Fri. from $1100-1400$ on 4620 and Sun. from $0600-0900$ on 7040 kHz .

## THE BIRTH AND DEVELOPMENT OF RADIO broadcasting in egypt <br> Direct via Charles Hodgson, R.S.A.

When wireless appeared in the world in the twenties, radio broadcasting appeared in Egypt in the form of private transmission stations owned and operated by individual radio amateurs and merchants who sold radio sets. Their prime
objective was profit. These private stations, therefore, broadcast commercial ad- g vertisements with songs in between as an enticement to listeners. Stations also had a subscription system whereby a subscriber could have his name broadcast together with the songs he wanted to listen to and have his birthday or marriage anniversary celebrated on the air against a monthly subscription of 10 piastres, the equivalent of two English shillings.
There were no fixed hours for broadcasting. The government tried to establish fixed times but the stations were able to get by these hours by broadcasting their programs on the pretext that they were testing their transmitters.

As time went by and competition between the private stations grew stiff, they engaged in a war of words on the air. This made the Egyptian government order the closing down of the stations finally in 1931. There were however, some stations that maintained proper conduct, and educated people joined these stations and broadcast talks of a political and patriotic nature at a time when broadcasts were as a rule confined to songs, music, children's programs, advertisements, competitions and crossword puzzles. The stations did not broadcast political talks and news bulletins to steer clear of government action against them as Egypt was dominated by British colonial rule. On the 15th of July 1931, the Egyptian Communications Ministry sent a note to the Cabinet conveying its desire to found an official broadcasting station and proposing that the English Marconi Wireless relegraph Company be assigned to set up a broadcasting station in accordance with the international treaty on Telegraphy and wireless concluded in Washington in November 1927 of which Egypt was a member. In its contract with the company, the Egyptian government set a period of ten renewable years after which Egypt would take over the station and run it.

The contract stipulated that British experts would give Egyptians the experience they required in the art of broadcasting requiring training of engineers, technicians, program organizers, announcers and other personnel.
Marconi Comany set up the transmission installatins two years before inauguration in the area of Abu Zaabal north of Cairo on the Cairo-Islamilia road.

The Egyptian State Broadcasting Service was inaugurated on the 31st May, 1934, that is nearly half a century ago.

## From The Papers <br> RADIO MARTI TO BE APPROVED: Unlike last year, ac-

cording to the June 27, 1983 US News and World Report, Radio Marti stands a good chance of passage in the House and Senate. Last year it was defeated because of the proposed use by Radio Marti of an AM frequency set aside for WHO and other local stations. Midwest senators blocked the legislation fearing who would suffer Cuban jamming. This year the bill was altered to remove such objections. In the bill's present version, Radio Marti would share VOA's AM frequency, buy time on US stations heard in Cuba and use a shortwave frequency either just above or just below the AM band. (W.J. Stutterhem, NY)

JOLLY ROGER HEADS FOR ENGLAND: In an article entitled "Pirate Radio Stion Leaving Rcther Than Walk FCC Plank," the Aug. 3, 1983 Indianapolis Star states that Bruce Quinn, the station's main operator plans to move the station which operates now on FM to England before he would be closed down a second time by the FCC. The station was closed in 1980 after it was detected by the FCC's electronic tracing equipment and Quinn was fined $\$ 750$. A government engineer said that Quinn can't afford a second fine which would be doubled and a possible jail sentence. It is for these reasons that Jolly Roger is headed for England where Quinn feels pirates are better accepted. (Gregg Watts, IN)

TREES MAY MAKE GOOD ANTENNAS: An article in the June/July Modern Maturity states that during World War I, an army officer demonstrated that growing trees could be used as radio antennas and that the areas covered by vegetation absorbed some of the electromagnetic waves passing over them. (So the next time you need a good antenna, just look at that maple in your backyard. asg) (John Heaton, FL)
NEW RTTY SERVICE TO FORM: According to the May 14, 1983 Editor and Publisher, the Third World plans a news agency in competition with AP and UPI. This new Third World news service is being formed by the Aga Khan. Claude Hippeau, vicepresident and general manager of UPI's international division, will become the new general manager of this service.

CLANDESTINE RADIO IN EL SALVADOR: For a good overview of rebel radio broadcasts in El Salvador, the May 18, 1983 Times Picayunne has a very interesting article. Discussed is a description of rebel broadcasts and
what the Salvadoran government is doing to counter these broadcasts. The article focuses on Radio Venceremos which has the biggest audience, best programs and is listened to by diplomats, journalists, and middle class Salvadorans. (Jim Andrews, LA)
gIANT ANTENNA TO BE BUILT BY NAVY: According to the Rocky Mountain News of July 16, 1983, the Navy plans to build a 57 mile-long antenna. This would be used to send extremely low radio signals to subrerged submarines during wartime. The proposed site of this antenna is in Michigan. The antenna is opposed by Michigan's govenor and citizen's groups which clain that such low frequency radio waves cause cancer and other illnesses. They plan to go to court to stop its construction. (Stephen Pacetti, C0)
USA ACCUSED OF PSYCHOLOGICAL WARFARE BY RADIO MOSCOW: The May 22, 1983 Ann Arbor News reports that Radio Moscow has accused the US of interfering with the internal affairs of foreign countries by using psychological radio warfare. They accused us of setting up an anti-Cuban radio station and that we also run the Voice of Free Kabul. Radio Moscow claimed "Soviet radio stations don't attempt to insult other nations or interfere in their internal affairs." (Oh yehl!! asg) (David Claytor, MI)

VOICE IS WEAKER: In an editorial in the July 5, 1983 Boston Herald, the case is being made to free funds in order to help the VOA overcome poor signals to the Soviet Union and Eastern Bloc countries. In the last seven months, Congress has sidetracked or blocked bills authorizing the spending of 20 million this year and more than 1 billion by 1990 to update VOA's facilities. And these facilities are in drastic need of update. Most VOA transmitters are between 15 and 30 years old and VOA's news bureaus do not have the staff to do basic research and translate foreign publications. (Ed Soomre, MD)

SOVIET JAMMING: The July 14, 1983 Wall Street Journal published an interesting article entitled "Soviets Continue Jamming Western Broadcasts, Often Causing Havoc on The Airwaves Elsewhere." The article discusses the fact that Soviet jamming of American and British broadcasts to the Soviet Union is destroying needed frequency space in the shortwave spectrum needed by other countries which are not participating in what is termed a radio war. Also discussed are the ways the Soviet people try to get around this jamming in order to listen to Western broadcasts. Some methods are
modifying the radio to receive frequencies not found on Russian sets and acquiring black market tapes of shrotwave broadcasts. In addition, discussed are the various ways Russians jam Western broadcasts, ie.e, size, strength, location, as well as cost of their jamming transmitters. Also, strategies in which Western stations are using in order to get around this jamming are brought to the point. In conclusion, the article states that 80 percent of the usable shortwave chamnels are now affected by jamming in the evening and that the Soviet Union is now trying to convince the Third World that jamming is legitimate. For example, last year at the ITU conference in Nairobi, Czechoslovakia made a proposal to legalize jamming on the grounds that a country has the right to prevent incoming signals from countries shich are hostile in nature. This, of course, was withdrawn. However, next year, the Third World will attempt to restrict the number of frequencies used by Western broadcasters, which would make jamming easier (Ton Keesling, IN)
INTERESTING ARTICLES: For an overview of the history, programs, and problems of the VOA, the August 7, 1983 Dayton Daily News Magazine has an interesting 2 page article. (Michael Schulsinger, OH) -Larry Magne offers an interesting overview of the reasons behind the increasing popularity of SW in the July, 1983 High Technology magazine. His basic premise is that microprocessors as well as other technical developments is making $S W$ radio more attractive to the average listener; thus increasing its popularity. MCKAY DYNEK DR33C: I have discovered that my newly acquired Mckay Dymek DR33C is capable of high Fidelity music reproduction with no fading. Here is what to do: (1) CW mode (2) 8 kHz filter (3) zero beat (4) carefully fine tune-very critical-for clear signal. There is a drawback in that the DR33C has a spur heard in all exalted carrier modes. It sounds like a cat purring in SSB position. Has a higher pitched sound in CW mode for AM product detection. As far as the overall performance of the DR33C is concerned, the radio has audio with the least distortion, and very quiet circuitry. You should hear the clear SSB signels and hifi audio. GREAT!
