OPENING ANNOUNCEMENTS...Welcome to November! Let me begin this month by renewing my request for more contributions of the program comment variety. This month several of such comments are included in the column, but they are taken from another publication. It would be nice to include program comments from SPEEDKers in the column next monthl... .... It has been a couple of years since we last spotlighted the schedule of English programming over Radio Prague and All India Radio. Any info on these two stations from the membership would be appreciated. (WS)
ALBANIA... (Tom McKeon, IN in Review of International Broadcastine \#80): "For music, I would suggest very strongly Radio Tirana in Albanian at $0200-0300$ on 9790 kHz . It is almost all music from 0235. Signal is very strong and clear. Vusic is about the best on the air...really beautiful--nothing else like their folk music. They also piay Albanian classical compositions and I have even heard an Albanian opera on there. There is very little talk-only ID of station and song."
AUSTRALIA...Two major changes at Radio Australia have been reported recently. The popular DX program SPECTRUM has been cancelled as of early October. No reasons have been given for the suprise move. Ironically, the program had recently worked its way to a weekly sta-tus--due we assume to listener popularity. The second change is the dropping of the non-Pacific/Asian English Services from the November transmission period. This change would include the North American special frequencies. Western Hemisphere listeners can probably still receive the station, but the symbolic nature of the change is disturbing. Letters to the RA Director Peter Barnett are needed to show listener reaction to both moves.

Very listenable mix of French pop music, some American standards and indigenous African music...soft-spoken DJ with low-key remarks between selections. Delightful!" (Another example of a good program comment-WS)

Price unknown at this very moment, but it should be available by the time you read this. A super machine code program by Cliff, NU4VIII This is intended for the amateur radio operator and will transmit as well as receiver Baudot RTTY at 45.5. 50, 57 and 74 baud, ASCII at: 110 and 300 baud. Requires a simple 3 chip interface and a 16 K RAM pack, as well as your choice of Terminal unit. (The MFJ interface should work OK). Has an 8000 character receive buffer and a 1700 character "type-ahead" buffer as supplied. Can be very easily changed to a 9700 character receive buffer if desired. Once the receive buffer is full, it warns you and you can order it to type over the start of the information in the buffer or keap going, the data after the "buffer full" warning being lost after it scrolls off the screen. It must be remembered that you DO NOI take fading and static into consideration when evaluating a signal. The $S$ stands for signal strenght, the I for interference, the 0 for overall quality. Don't put more into the code than you can get out. Frankly, I think the SIO code is coin', the way of the dinosaur. I don't use it anymore, and if you cont want to, then don't! As long as you give your sisal report in a method we can all understand, then that's okay with me.

Thank you for all those loggings you have sent in. I received a letter from Dick Hull thru John Trautschold. Thank you both. Dick has been corresponding with Olav Grimdalen, Frequency Manager of Radio Norway. From the letter Dick received dated 9/28/83 we take the main points below:

Radio Norway International tries to draw a picture of what is going on on this side of the Atlantic. The station has a limited time of each transmission and therefore it does not go along with producing programs just for fun. Their main task is to reach listeners which take an interest of receiving news from "the olde country." Olav would like to receive more reports from DXers with remarks on what station is interfering with the station and clear frequencies which the station can try. If they get the information that their frequency is being disturbed and that's it there is little they can do (this is tme for every station).

I hope this information will assist you in writing more informative reception reports to the various shortwave stations.

European News from the BBC Monitoring Service's World Broadcasting Information..............
CZEGHOSLOVAKIA Tass reported that Czechoslovak Radio b/c pgms for listeners in foreign countries in Arabic, English, Spanish \& French for about 40 hours a day. Radio Prague maintained stable contacts with its listeners and had received over 146,000 letters in 1982.

FRANCE According to information received from Telediffusion de France, the broadcast from RFI in Fussian began officially on 9/5. The program is transmitted daily 0300-0330 on 9745, $7135 \& 6045$. RFI's African Service "Network South" has been redesignated the "World Service" (French: Service Mondial). The former African service had been beamed to western Europe since Sept. 1981, and since May this year RFI's Eastern European service "Network East" has incorporated an increasing amount of relays of the former African service. Parts of this service were also relayed to North America.

GREECE The V. of Greece broadcast in Greek to North America from 0000-0150 \& 0200-0350 have been heard on 12085 (ex-11645), 9865 \& 9420. The 0400-0450 transmission in Greek to the Arab World has been observed on 9865, $9420 \& 7370$ (ex-11645).

Radio Libya has been QSLing rather reliably as of late, so go and get them. The best bet is to mail the reports to the Malta box number.

Australian RDXC will no longer be announcing the availability of QSL cards in any of its pgms, unless for spl occasion. Reports should be sent to ARDXC QSL Service, Box 227, Box Hill Victoria 3128, Australia. Reports which satisfy our revised conditions will be QSLed and sent airmail (outside Australia). Conditions include: must be on club official form or replica; r.p. required--two IRCs overseas; legible and detailed; sent by airmail within one week of broadcast; non-members' reports should follow EDXC Reporting Guide preferably on official report forms of DX clubs. Policy revisions are partly caused by large number of reports received from overseas which are illegible and very badly prepared. These emerge generally from North America, and it is obvious that there are inadequate or ill-conceived guidelines available for the correct manner in which reports should be submitted. This is something that the primary DX clubs in NAm might address. Frankly, we've found that many reports are atrocious, most are mere demands for a QSL, with little authenticating details. Reports that are prepared on official report forms, issued by elubs overseas, are invariably well laid out and properly written. Only one QSL per station, even if heard on more than one frequency. All this concerns ARDXC segments on these DX programs: R. Australia Spectrum, HCJB DX Partyline, TWR Guam DX Listener's Log and SLBC Radio Monitors International. (August Australian DX News, from September NASWA Listeners Notebook).
I think that this release raises some very interesting subjects. The QSL card is the final token, issued as a courtesy by some radio stations, in thanks for a correct reception report. It is issued voluntarily by the radio stations, often at a great experise to themselves. It is not a requirement of a radio station. Reception reports should be polite, asking kindly for a QSL card, not demanding one. There should be enough precise detail to prove the accuracy of the report. The vital details, such as date, time, and frequency are never to be overlooked, as the lack of these make the report useless. Politeness in the report is absolutely essential. These reports, like the radio stations themselves, can help to promote goodwill between the people of different nations. They can also make those very same people think that we have no manners, and are rude, obnoxious individuals. Many stations have stopped QSLing because of these very same reasons. We have a very educational, interesting, and rewarding hobby. I do not want to see it destroyed by people who do not take it seriously.
You can be sure, that when a person gets a QSL from a very rarely verified station (even if commonly heard), it was not due to the fact that he demanded a QSL from them. It was due to the individual diplomacy of the person. To receive (a QSL), one has to give a little (politeness, return postage, etc.). There are many ways to prepare a proper report. The use of forms, as stated above, is the easiest. The ones sent out by the radio stations themselves are best when reporting back to that station, as it asks for what the station wants to know. These can also be used for other stations. Club forms are very good also. For regional stations. personal letters, containing the ingredients above, in the native language of the station, are best. Foreign language report guides are available from most clubs, and are also excellent reporting guides.
For the QSLers who prepare proper reports, thank you. For those of you who do not, -I would strongly recommend that you look into some reading material on the súbject, to better advise yourselves of the techniques.

I want to take the time now to wish all U.S. readers a very Happy Thanksiving.
HCJB reports that they are having a problem receiving incoming mail. They report that up to $90 \%$ of all incoming mail is being lost. Listeners have been asked to refrain from writing to the station for the time being, or to use postcards or aerogrammes. (Don Rhodes \& Tauno Isokangis, ADXN-Sept, thru NASWA LN-Oct.).
The Space Shuttle is making another flight at the end of October. ## Technical Roundup

SPEEDX'S RECEIVER, EQUIPNEITT
AND ANTEINA REVIEW SECTION

THE ESKA RECEIVER RX 12 PL
by Rafael Calabuig, Denmark

## GENERAL

I have with great interest read the article "The High Fidelity Future of Shortwave and Fiediumwave All Radio", published in the 1983 World Radio and TV Handbook, written by Lawrence Nagne-a regular contributor to the annual test reports of new receiving equipment. The above-mentioned article revealed very positively the new-made in Denmark--portable receivers from ESKA ELEKTRONTK APS. Amongst the various models, the most interesting for SW listeners and DXers is the model RX 12 PL , because this set is able to provide AH, LSB and USB. reception. Moreover, the RX 12 PL has the most significant feature: the Phased Locked (PLL) AM detection (see elsewhere in this article).
Consequently, I contacted the factory and obtained one set at my disposal for testing purposes. I put the RX 12 PL in my radio-shack, which consists of a Collins 390A/URR and a Drake TR7 (shose receiving section is similar to the R7 model). By means of a special switch, I could without any trouble connect the same antema to the 3 receivers. I used a 41.5 m long Windom antenna, connected via a $6: 1$ balun and coaxial cable to the antenna coupler.

For those of you, who did not read the article of Lif, I would like to explain that the ESKA RX 12 PL is a fixed frequency receiver for the reception of max. 12 frequencies in the range of $150 \mathrm{kHz}-30 \mathrm{kHz}$ (reception down to 50 kHz is possible, if required). These frequencies can easily be exchanged by means of plug-in crystals and coils. This operation can be performed even by the less technically-inclined persons.

The results of this test is as follows:
Dynamic range: The dynamic range of the ESKA RX 12 PL model is, in my opinion much better than that of the Collins 390A/URR and comparable to the Drake TR7. Overloading did not occur, in spite of the long antenna used during this test. Another test, which I previously made with a Sony CRF-1 receiver, indicated that the dynamic range of the ESKA RX 12 PL is undoubtedly better, than this Sony receiver. The explanation of this phonomenon is as follows: The RX 12 PL model has no RF Amplifier, after the filters, the anterna signal enters directly into a dual-gate hOS-FET mixer, a principle also used in the Drake R7 and TR7.

Usable sensitivity: In the SW-ranges below 15 MHz , the sensitivity of the RX 12 PL seems to be much better than that of the Collins 390A/URR and is comparable to the sensitivity of the DRAKE TR7. Above 15 MHz , the sensitivity of the RX 12 PL is superior to the TR7, due to the RF gain incorporated in the high frequency range.
Circuit noise: Comparable to the Collins 390A/UPR and more quiet than the TR7. The RX 12 PL uses quartz crystals and this accounts for the freedom from synthesizer nose.
Stability: Juch better than that of the TR7 and comparable to the Collins 390A/URR, with switched-on oven. The test took place 4 hours after the Collins was switched on.
Spurious response: It is impossible to carry out this test, due to the lack of an external VFO in the RX 12 PL .

Skirt selectivity: The same quality as used in the Collins 390A/URR and Drake TR7, very good for DX-purposes. The RX 12 PL uses high quality ceramic filters ( 1 filter for AM reception and 2 filters for $\operatorname{SSB}$ reception--see technical specifications).

SSB reception: Very clear and intelligible.
PLL, ECSS reception: (ECSS means Exalted Carrier Selective Sideband). As I have mentioned in the beginning of this article, the phased locked All reception is the primary "virtue" of the ESKA receiver. The All stations are received with an SSB
detector, which phase locks on the AM station's carrier. The advantage of this system is that selective fading distortion (which occurs during reflection of radio waves in the ionosphere) is eliminated. The carrier, which disappears for a short while during selective fading, is replaced internally in the receiver. This can be accomplished by switching the "filter" switch into the AM position and the "mode" switch into the SSB position. Then the clarifier is used for tuning "Zerobeat" to the AM station's carrier, whereafter the "mode" switch is switched into the position PLL. In the PLL mode, USB and LSB can be selected independently. In this way, the ECSS-reception can be fully realized. In practice, this means that if we for example tuned an Aff station in the ECSS-mode, with a Drake R7 and managed after a long time to get the voice or the music to sound natural, we will have to retune again and again every 10 minutes. However, if instead of the Drake R7, the DSKA RX 12 PL is used under the same conditions, using the same sideband in the PLL-position, the "natural" sound of the speech or music will continue all the time, without the necessity of re-tuning.
IMPORTANCE FOR SWL'S
The ESKA RX 12 PL Connected to Other Receivers: After having tested and appreciated the performance of the RX 12 PL receiver, I began to think about a receiver-combination, which would perform as a superb DX-machine-using the advantages of the RX 12 PL. This would be an ideal device both for SWL and DXing. Wherefore, I called the Director of ESKA Elektronik ApS in order to discuss this problem with him.

We agreed that the most simple solution was to insert a coil and crystal in one of the 12 positions of the PX 12 PL for the reception of the IF (Intermediate Frequency) of any receiver, and connect the IF output of this receiver to the antenna-input of the RX 12 PL. (The sensitivity of the RX 12 PL receiver is reduced for the IF channels to approx. 50 uV for $10 \mathrm{~dB} \mathrm{~S}+\mathrm{n} / \mathrm{n}$, in order to improve large signal handling capabilities). In this way, the ESKA RX 12 PL becomes a general coverage receiver.
The following was done:
On the rear of the Collins $390 \mathrm{~A} / \mathrm{URR}$, there is a jack for the 455 kHz IF output. Together with the ESKA RX 12 PL , equipped with a crystal for 455 kHz , an interconnection cable between the IF output of the Collins and the antenna input of the ESKA, the Collins 390A/URR will be converted into a superb DX-machine.
This procedure can be accomplished even by the nontechnically inclined individuals in the following manner:

1. Disconnect the speaker-unit from the Collins 390.
2. Connect a suitable cable between the IF output of the Collins and the antenna input of the ESKA.
3. Switch the channel selector of the ESKA into the 455 kHz IF positien.
4. For improved sound quality, connect the speaker-unit for the Collins ( $4-80 \mathrm{hm}$ ) to the earphone output of the ESKA.
This receiver combination performs according to my opinion better than any other actually existing receiver, tegardless of its price class. All above-mentioned operations, can obviously be applied to any high stability receiver. Just connect the IF output of a given receiver to the ESKA RX 12 PL, equipped with a crystal corresponding to the IF frequency of that receiver. For example, the JRC NRD-515 and the Collins R-392 have both 455 kHz IF outputs available, and the earlier described interconnection procedures applies for these two types of receivers as well. For the Drake R7, which as a 50 kHz IF , the RX 12 PL must be equipped with a corresponding crystal and coil. It will be necessary to make an IF output inside the Drake R 7 , as this is not readily available.
THE ESKA RX 12 PL AS A PORTABLE RECEIVER WITH BUILT IN WHIP ANTENNA
This test took place during the DSWCI DX-meeting at my home near Copenhagen in April 1983. The ESKA RX 12 PL was compared with the SONY ICF-2001 which we had at our disposal. This test clearly showed the superiority of the RX 12 OL over the SONY ICF-2001--especially for "difficult to catch" stations, which is mainly due to the high quality filters inside the ESKA, and its earlier mentioned phased locked AM system.

The major advantage of the SONY ICF-2001 is according to my opinion the high quality of its loudspeaker which is specially evident when tuned to local or strong stations. The RX 12 PL as a portable receiver has one main shortcoming-namely, its 12 fixed channels, regardless of the fact that the exchange of crystals and antenna coils is very simple, even for the less technically-mined individuals. The audio quality of the built-in loudspeaker is very intelligible, although somewhat crispy, with the tone-switch in its "high" position. However, this receiver--as a portable-has been aimed at and built for SWL and DX applications, e.g. travellers or residents who wish to listen to programs from their country of origin, giving optimal intelligibility and easy operation.

## WCKAY DYMEK-FADELESS HIFI!

No shortwave radio is more underrated and overlooked than the McKay Dymek DR33C. The villain in this case is the review in the 1980 WRTH (pp. 557,560-61)/ I own the DR33C and wouldn't sell it even if you
offered me $\$ 15001$ For listening-and even some DXing-the Dymek is in a class by itself.
To set the record straight, as far as the handbook's review is concerned, the rig is sensitive enough with the preamp off, does not "hiccup" in ECSSB (you must reduce the IF gain), and has very quiet circuitry. There may be slight circuit hiss, but it goes mostly unnoticed along with the shortwave static. The AGC is no problem, but can be fixed. The noise limiter does distort some. This is normal and is mentioned in the manual. There is more, but you get the message.
The basic specs are what you would expect in a high priced rig. The receiver does need it companion passive preselector if you do serious DX-but this radio is basically designed for listening.
Now for the good things that make the Dymek a GEM-tuning ease, signal quality, and fadeless music reproduction:

1. Tuning-It takes oniy about 4 seconds to switch frequencies. It's a pleasure using the novel digit-by-digit system. Furthermore, bandscanning is not as difficult as you aight imagine.
2. Audio-Most radios have $10 \%$ THD in their audio. The DR33 has only $1 \%$ distortion, has very quiet circuitry, and has clear background on most frequencies. This produces excellent signal readability and outstanding audio quality. Contrary to the WRTH review, the McKay is high fidelity. The mediumwave is better than the average stereo receiver, not only in selectivity and sensitivity, but also in noise immnity. Also, the audio on the DR33 is comparable-considering the limitations of SW-to the sound on an FM stereo receiver. The Dymek looks hifi, and sounds like it tol
3. Fadeless Music-The Nckay's filters can be employed in any mode. Amazing as it seens, the product detector (BFO) can be used with a double sideband, wide AM selectivity. This produces high quality music with no fade distortion whatsoever! Needless to say, the SSB and ECSSB audio is superb. However, in all exalted carrier modes, there is an internally generated spur. It sounds like "purring" in SSB Selectable Sideband position. An audio filter can minimize this interference on voice reception, with an equalizer doing the job with a wide frequency signal.

Conclusion:
Computer aids, memories, and other gadgetry is not going to do you much good on your Low Fi shortwave sets-most of the time. The McKay Dymek DR33C offers the listener a substantial improvement in audio quality and readability-and it is the audio that courts. A word of warning before you buy this radio-check the inside!!! My receiver looks like it was assembled by a drunken wino straight from the Salvation Army! But the DR33 works well, and seems to be very dependable. Finally, the McKay Dymek Company was bought out by Stoner Communications. From personal experience, I have found out that the only thing you can expect from Stoner is--the parts.
(Instructions to Dymek DR33 owmers on using the radio in fadeless music mode: 1 . go to cw position. 2. Switch to 8 kHz selectivity. 3. Zero beat and carefully fine tune for clear signal. I may add that the Japan Radio NRD 515 is not capable of AM product detection-I tried it.)

As an active radio amateur and SWL enthusiast, I wought to couple my computer, an Apple IIt, to my radio equipment. I decided on an inexpensive approach and purchased the Kantronics Interface. This unit is compatible with a wide variety of computers such as the Apple, TRS-30, VIC 29, TI-99, etc. Kantronics also merchandises appropriate software to complete the necessary package needed to copy CW, RTTY and ASCII.

Specifically "The Interface" may be used for receiving and transmitting, and may be connected to suitable equipment with ease. All software, except for the Apple II, are on program boards that plug directly into the computer. For the Apple II, the interface plugs directly into the computer without any additional boards. In addition, an ample array of plugs are provided for almost any system. For receiving only, the only necessary connection between the interface and the receiver is to the headphone plug or across the receiver speaker to receive all modes. Kantronics has provided a well written manual that thoroughly explains the method of operation as well as all pinouts on the back panel. All internal filtering is of the active filter type, regardless of mode.

The audio input to the interface from the receiver requires a level of 70mv. RMS as a minimum. This requires a rather loud volume setting. In my case I compensated for this by using a step-up transformer. I used a $110 \mathrm{v} / 6.3 \mathrm{v}$ AC transformer and connected the 6.3 volt winding to the receiver and the 110 volt winding to the interface. This provided a step-up in audio level while keeping the volume at a comfortable listing level. The input to the interface is protected from too high an audio level with large diodes.

Actual use of the unit is quite straight forward. One only need select the mode and then the speed. For example: To select the RTTY mode simply press the "R" key. The screen displays the mode and current speed along with a split screen format. The receive speed is then set using a CRTL-S key. Repeated pressing of the key moves the speed level higher. In the $C W$ mode the computer autonatically selects the speed to match the speed of the received code. This will change as the sending rate changes. I have used the $C W$ mode in full receive and transmit at speeds up to 65 wpm with good accuracy. If hard copy is desired the interface supports all Centronics type parallel printers.

As with all devices there are limits. While the interface provides the user with the convenience of solid state technology, the level of techrology in this unit is less than most envision. Accurate copy is affected by static, fading and adjacent channel interference. The filters employed are quite sharp and intollerant of straying from the center frequencies. A stable receiver with selectable sidebands is essential. Tuning is accomplished with a ten segment LED tuning bar on the front of the interface that helps a great deal, but one must develop a feel for tuning to be successful. When tuning in CW sigmals the audio level is quite critical and requires only enough audio to completely light the tuning var. I also use an Autek Audio Filter and have found that using such a device ahead of the interface makes a substantial improvement to the degree that I can copy through all but the worst conditions.
While many commercial stations use shifts of 850 and 425 Hz ., the interface is broad enough to copy up to 425 Hz . shift, but the 850 Hz . shift is beyond the limits of the filters. Inverse copy, that is reversing the mark and space pulses, is done by merely changing the sideband on the receiver. Normal copy is done using the lower sideband. The interface is a good compromise considering its modest price of $\$ 169.95$. An additional AC wallplug power supply is also needed if suitable power cannot be taken from the receiving equipment. Software varies in price from $\$ 29.95$ to $\$ 99.95$ depending on the computer. Generally, the more inexpensive the computer the more expensive the software. This is necessary to compensate for those items left off the computer which made the lower price possible in the first place. I have absolutely no problems with my unit and have used it almost daily for the past six months. Telephone conversations with the Kantronics people concerning software and modifications has been courteous and helpful. The interface can be ordered through various dealers or directly from Kantronics, Inc., 1202 E .23 rd Street, Lawrence, KS 66044.

COMPUTERS IN YOUR RADIO HOBBY by Tony Kobylski, MD

The computer has made its way into our hobby. There are many to choose from but I chose the Commodore VIC-20. As a computer service engineer I found the VIC-20 gave the best price feature ratio. Well enough of that stuff. On to the meat of this report.
I would like to discuss a program $I$ use in my listening station. The program will enable the computer to take the longitude and latitude of 2 points on the globe and tell you how far apart they are in miles and kilometers and give you the bearing in degrees to the second point from the first.

There are a few instructions and considerations to make here. This program uses the arc-tangent function. I'm told that some versions of the BASIC language do not support this function. If yours does not, you can contact me (through the editor of $T \& T$ ) and $I$ will send to you a short routine to do this calculation. Now, the instructions for using the program. Consider the first location. If the second one is in another hemisphere, you will have to enter the degrees of either longitude or latitude or both as a negative number. As an example, lets look at Baltimore, liaryland and Warsaw, Poland. Baltimore is located at Longitude $76^{\circ} 37^{\prime}$, Latitude $39^{\circ} 18^{\prime}$ and Warsaw is Longitude $21^{\circ} 0^{\prime \prime}$ East and $52^{\circ} 31^{\prime \prime}$ North. Since this is in the opposite hemisphere than Baltimore, you must enter the degrees of longitude as a negative number. If the second location was in the southern hemisphere, you would have to enter the degrees of latitude as negative numbers. You can not enter any element-degrees, seconds, or minutes as a 0. If you have this, enter it as a 1. The resulting error will be negligable. The results of entering these coordinates will be that Warsaw is 4410 miles and 7098 kilometers on a bearing of 42.21 degrees from Baltimore.
I use this information in my reception reports. It will also be helpful if you have a directional antenna and maybe in some phase of propagation forcasting. After each entry to the program, it will ask you if your input is correct and allow you to correct if needed.
There are some special characters in the program listing that will be strange to you if you do not have a VIC or CBM 64. When you enter the progran into your system ignore them. These are just some control and formatting characters used by commodore. These characters will have no effect on the operation of the program. I have inserted some lines that begin with the word REM. This is a basic statement that says this line is just for information and have no operational purpose. They merely explain what is happening in the program. They may also be ignored when entering the program.
Give "the program a try if you can and I hope you will like the results. The program can be obtained via Tips and Topics. Send a Self Addressed Stamped Envelop plus $60 \phi$ to cover the xerox to Arthur S. Getzel, 170-40 Highland Avenue, Jamaica, NY 11432.
Now a word about using computers. You do not have to be a computer professional to use one. The VIC-20 is very easy to use and to learn to program. BASIC is a beginners language and is very easy to learn. I am living proof of that. It has been said by some very foresightful people that in 10 years there will only be two types of people in this world. Those who use computers and those who are used by computers. DON'T BE THE LATTER!!!

##  Opinion

Frankly, I was a little disappointed in Phillip Dampier's slap at the VOA (September SPEEDX). Although the paragraph didn't exactly deal with either the station or the programs, it might be well to analyse it in detail, line by line.
"Our voice simply isn't our voice." This indicates very little faith in the democratic process. The VOA is controlled by, and paid for, by ourselves through our elected representatives. Although public opinion in the US could conceivably change faster than that of their elected representatives, history shows very few meaningful differences for anything more than extremely short periods.
"Their opinions go in one direction while the opinions of the American people go the other." For the reasons above, this is patently false, and sounds a bit like something from a $R$. Moscow script.
"They also broadcast 'propaganda'". Propaganda is a dirty word for opinion. I would call this statement "anti-VOA propaganda".
"When traveling abroad, how many SPEEDXers out there tune in this station for the latest news and sports scores? Host people tune to the AFRTS." VOA news is at the top of the hour. AFRTS has several newscasts during the hour. I look at my watch before I decide where to tune. I assune "most SPEEDXers" do the same. The AFRTS does have more complete sports coverage reflecting the interest of their particular audience.
"However, this station only transmits in languages where there is either a Communist revolution going on, or where the opinions of a country's people are not favorable to the USA." Outside of the Soviet-block languages, most of the VOA's language programs (and beams) also cover countries friendly to or allied with the US.
Representing the American people is a difficult job. There are a lot of people and the US is (Thank God!) a country that permits individual differences and opinions. Being American, I do not legally qualify as a VOA listener, but I am here and anong the people to whom some of the broadcasts are directed. From this QTH, they seem to be doing a good job.

 KICKING THE TUBES: HOW TO EVALUATE A USED RECEIVER

Well, you've been and gone and done it -- you bought a receiver sight-unseen from a fellow SPEEDXer. Being a good SPEEDXer, and a good sport, the person who sold you the set mentioned that you could return it if it didn't work to spec or if you weren't satisfied with it, So, you ask yourself, am I satisfied with it?
Leaving aside the obvious fact that one should be familiar with the receiver you are buying (if you bought an SW4A and expected to hear sideband, you'11 be disappointed, but don't blame me, hi! The SW4A doesn't have a BFO), how do you evaluate a used receiver when you've unpacked it?
(1) Compare what you can hear on the used set with the reception on the set you've been using. If the used set is noisy, much less sensitive, or otherwise less desirable than your old set, you must decide what to do.
(2) Get to know someone in your area who does receiver tune-up and repair. When you get a used set, bring it to this person immediately for a check-up. Better yet, get to know something about receiver repair yourself! Remember, however, that the friend who looks at your receiver as a favor to you can't be held to a schedule to fix the receiver or even check it up! Better to make the transaction a business one where a consideration is exchanged for an early date on your friend's workbench.*
(3) Before you arrange to have the set shipped to you, find out whether the seller is willing to take it back if you are not satisfied. Most reasonable people will be willing to return your money if the set you receive is not the one in the shape you thought it would be. Get the seller to describe the condition of the set in down-to-earth terms. "Charming" could be the description of an antique receiver that exudes the sweet odor of burning capacitor when turned on. "Gave me many hours of DXing pleasure" could mean that the set is just about played out!
(4) If possible, buy a receiver from a person nearby whom you can visit, check out the receiver in its native clime, and about which you can make a decision in an informed fashion.

I only twice have bought a receiver new -- all other receivers of mine were second hand, and I have never had a rotten deal. Perhaps I've been lucky, but if you are careful, you too can enjoy used receivers as much as, or more, than new ones.

(hi!) Serious ly, as you know people seem to pick up and then drop hobbies like chickens pecking for food. One can't force a former DXer to pick up the hobby again. If you organize a good local group down there, Charles, you might just be able to inject that spirit of comeraderie into DXing in Dallas that will make the DXers forget about the cheerleaders and turn on their receivers instead!
