Badio Deregulationi Deregulation of radio broadcasting has neither bankrupted the industry nor led to abuses of the new freedom, according to the president of the National Association of Broadcasters.

Edward Fritts said during a recent San Francisco meeting of the NAB that the marketplace acts effectively as its own regulator of the radio industry. If stations don't produce programming the public wants, he said, those stations go out of business.

He said deregulation ended unnecessary rules such as the one limiting the number and length of commercials. "Our govermment in the last 20 years has grown into a bureaucracy," Fritts said. "A lot of people in Washington do things to keep other people employed." Fritts himself owns eight radio stations in Louisiana. Thanks to the Tampa Tribune for this....ds.

AUSTRALIA...Radio Australia's new schedule confirms what was reported here last month--that a separate North American frequency would no longer be used during the transmission day. However, the practical effect of the move may be to provide North Americans with extended coverage from RA. Beams to the Eastern \& Western Pacific Islands are well heard here and provide a possible 14 hours of daily programming from the station. Times and frequencies include: 1200-1600 UTC on $9580,0200-0800 \& 2100-0100$ UTC on 15160(only 10 kW ), 0200-0400 \& 05000730 UTC on 15320 and 17795 and, finally, $2130-0100$ UTC on 15320 kHz . The 9580 frequency has been well-heard here in the morning hours and this 4 -hour block will probably be the most consistently heard of the frequencies. The other frequencies are not consistently heard here in the East--reception varies with the seasons. Programming-wise, RA has replaced SPECTRUM with TALKBACK. Host Barry Seeber's DX program is a new one, so we would welcome comments from SPEEDXers about it. Next month we will report on some new programs from RA. (Direct)

CHINA(REPUBLIC OF)... UThe Voice of Free Chinia broadcasts in English $0200-0255$ UTC on 5985 kHz . This is broadcast...as a relay from WYFR Florida. The fact of its local origin should not detract from its interest. Taiwan sets up a "featured artist" whose songs(usually Chinese language pop songs with much U.S. rock flavor) are interspersed occasionally throughout the program. The music is worth listening to, although one would desire more traditional Chinese music. The program contents are quite propagandistic when news or economic reports are given, bragging about constant progress and dedication to Reaganite Free Enterprise. Taiwan often, but not always, gives in the middle of its broadcast a lengthy reading of folk tales (which, for those of us interested in such-I am a professor or comparative religion--are useful.... However, I wonder if they would not bore the lay audience.) The quality of reception here is superb, but I would wish for more music and less obviously self-slanted talk." (Thanks to Stevan Davies of PA for this interesting comment)

ECUADOR...HCJB broadcasts SONGTIME WEEREND 0200-0230 UTC Sunday (right before DX PARTY LINE) on 9745 and 15155 kHz . The program features contemporary Christian music, interviews and messages from well-known evangelical Christian leaders. Sun features IN PERSON(Swiss personalities talk about themselves, 1 st Sun), ROUNDABOUT SWITZERLAND (tour of lesser-known Swi.tzerland, 2nd Sun), SUNDAY SUPPLEMENT(in depth of topics of the week, 3rd Sun), LET THERE BE RUSIC(4th Sun), TAKE FIVE (Richard Dawson takes a tongue-in-cheek look at life in Switzerland, 5th Sun). Notwithstanding that present day receivers are vastly improved from those of fourty/fourty-five years ago, there was one, the Scott, which was always recognized as an outstanding performer for its time. Most of the famous ocean liners of the day were equipped with one or more of these receivers because of their extremely high quality performance and an uncanny ability to receive broadcasts from all corners of the world.

Circumstances in the 1930 's prevented my owing one, but a love affair with the scott receiver was begun at that time and continues to this day. I wrote for and obtained brochures, regularly, from Mr, Scott and my interest was constantly increased. Not the least of my appreciation stemmed from the knowledge of the rigid standards under which each set was assembled, something virtually unheard of today.

Each and every component received from the supplier was tested; not by a ramdon sampling, but EACH one was individually tested! Capacitors were tested to several times the voltage values to be encountered in the receiver. After component selection, the receiver was built, not on a production line, but individually; by expert.laboratory technicians. Upon completion, alignment, and initial testing, the Scott receiver was put thru a formidable series of tests, the last being a rack-test over a 12 -hour period (one hour on, one hour off, etc). This alternate heating and cooling represented the final effort to bring out and weakness or defect which might exist.. If any of the characteristics had changed, the cause was determined and corrected and the entire series of tests were performed again, including the l2-hour rack-test!

So, perhaps you can understand now why I searched at intervals over the past 35 years to find a used Scott receiver, and finally found one: For fourty-five dollars, in "as is" condition, I at last obtained a Scot.t Philharmonic receiver in Trenton New Jersey. Upon unpacking it, its apparent condition was extremely disappointing. It had been stored in a damp place and rust spots appeared thur the chrome finish. The 12 coil shield cans were black from. lack of care and the twenty-two tube shields were almost beyond restoring. I accepted the challenge and began the restoration, much as an antique car buff restores an antique auto.

A liberal use of chrome polish, fine sandpaper, and muscle power gave a start to the like-new condition I wanted. Grounds were located and corrected by replacing capacitors and resistors, and soon, the receiver was in operating condition.Another surprise! This time a pleasant one. Such' sensitivity, selectivity and fidelity I never expected! A brief description of the circuitry will explain the reason for this excellent performance.

As can be expected, the circuitry is complicated when 30 tubes are employed. Starting with the antenna pick-up, this model of Scott incorporates two RF stages, with three tuned circuits, which account for its sensitivity to weak stations. The converter and oscillator are two seperate tubes, voltage regulated to eliminate drift. The two convert the in-coming signal to the IF frequency of 465 kHz . A four stage $I F$ amplifier is used. This is also a complicated but interesting series of many novel features that add materially to the receiver's high quality. After detection, the signal, or audio part, pases to yet another complicated audio amplifier circuit, using a total of ten tubes. At the start, it features the usual first amplifier feeding the second stage, a phase inverter; then comes a push-pull volume range expander; this into a two tube driver stage followed by the output stage of four 6L6G tubes utilizing the inverse feed-back principle. These four tubes used in push-pull parallel, together with the specially designed driver stage, allow $75 \%$ of the gain of the 6 L 6 G tubes to be used for distortion cancellation in the tubes themselves! This means that the last traces of distortion are cut by a factor of 4 to 1 , resulting in an output of 40 watts of pure class "A". One has to actually hear one of these old classics to appreciate the difference. If you ever get a chance to listen to such a receiver, by all means do so. You will be amazed!

The speaker was especially designed for high-fidelity reproduction and heavy duty performance. A $15^{\prime \prime}$ curvilinear diaphram and a heavy $2^{\prime \prime}$ voice coil was built to Scott specifications by Magnavox. Certainly different from the $3^{\prime \prime}$ or $4^{\prime \prime}$ speakers in todays receivers!

The receiver covers a range from 150 kHz to 60 MHz in six bands on an eight inch lighted dial. A travelling spot points to the approximate frequency and a logging dial is provided. In practice, as I used it, the Drake SPR4 is tuned to the station being received on the Scott, and the Drake dial read out gives the frequency to which the Scott is tuned. There were no digital frequency readouts in the 1930's!

By carefully adjusting sensitivity below the local noise level, and the selectivity to the required amount (Which is continuously variable from 2 to 16 kHz ), then with careful tuning and volume adjustment, any weak signal can be brought up to a comfortable listening level.

Besides providing me with excellent DX, the Scott receiver also serves quite well to keep the shack(in Eastern Washington State) nice and cozy, hil As an actual fact, the room is at 70 degrees. A the rmometer was placed on the speaker (which produces no heat in itself)but the power supply/amplifier just below, with its two 5z3's and four 6L6 tubes, causes the thermometer reading to reach 95 degrees! The back of the console is open so the heat circulates into the room. Truly a "HOT" receiver, hi!

So, after nearly four decades of searching, I fqund my "Dream Receiver". I enjoyed the many hours it took to restore this fine old receiver.

Here is a thought to keep you awake nights: Can you imagine what kind of a SW receiver could be produced today with the modern components and technology if the same "hand crafted" care was used? It would certainly be a fabulous receiver! as a side note, this editor had the privelege to see Russ's Scott receiver in person a few years ago. Really a sight to behold! All that chrome in a beautiful cabinet. QUALITY audio! Not like the tinny sounding rigs of today. Oh well, I guess that is what is called progress.......... Don Johnson)

SHACK DX-4OO PLL DIGITAL READOUT RECEIVER

Leave it to Radio Shack to come up up with a new radio shich has all the features of the Kenwood R-2000, plus all the receiving ability of the $R-2000$ for $\$ 300.00$ less.

On 9/28/83 I just purchased Radio Shack's DKi-400 PLL Aif/Fii Direct Entry Comnunications Receiver. This baby will equal and in some cases outperform even the Kenwood $\mathrm{k}-2000$. I did a test on $9 / 28 / 83$ and 10/1/83 with my new radio against a friend of mine--Kenwood's R-2000.

The $D X-400$ for $\$ 299.95$ comes complete with continuous coverage from 150 kHz to 29999 kHz . It also has AM/CW/SSB and 87.4 through 108 mHz Fil. There is an illuminated liquid crystal digital display and signal strength meter in addition to direct entry tuning. All you have to do is just enter the frequency you want on the keyboard and you're there. You have six All and six Fld memory channels for presetting your favorite stations. In adidion, there is automatic scanning for new stations, wide and narrow selectivity as well as fine tuning for clearer $A \mathrm{~N} / \mathrm{SSB} / \mathrm{CW}$ reception. Also, an antenna trimmer to adjust the Af antenna and RF gain controls of $5 \mathrm{db}, 10 \mathrm{db}$, and 30 db to maximize signal strength and reception. It also comes with external antenna terminals and an autonatic sleep button which you can use to set your radio to shut off in 10 minute intervals fron 10 to 90 minutes. Furthermore, there are headphone and external speaker jacks, a $D C$ 12 volt jack for use in your car, scanning limit buttons which set the limits of the scanning range, tone controls to adjust the tone quality of the received signal, a telescioic antenna for Mi/Fli reception, a light, and battery check buttons in order to check batteries in the back-up computer memory as well as power storage. It also has a stept button. This button selects the frequency intervals on scan or manual tuning. The choice is 100 or 50 kHz on FM or 1 or 3 kilz on Ah.

I have found that I have received 10 new stations in one night with this radio. The out of frequency rejection is $100 \%$. I have received no out of requency images in my testing. I have also found that unlike the $\mathrm{R}-2000$, the $\mathrm{DX}-400$ will let you receive two stations on the same frequency of different signal strengths and completely block out one or the other station. For example, by using the antenna trim, I was able to listen to Radio Polonia as well as R. Havana at 0200 on 9525 at the same time with no interference. The R-2000 could not do this. Now, this test was conducted with two separate longwires of equal length at the same location. The DX-400 also outperformed the R-2000 on scanning ability. The scanning mode on the R-2000 would come within + or -3 kHz of the actual broadcast frequency of the the station. The DX-400 on scan mode stopped everytime on the exact frequency of the station. The $D X-400$ also outperformed the receiving ability of the k-2000. The following list proves my point.

It's easy to see that the Radio Shack DX-400 is going to give Kenwood's R-2000 something to worry about. The DX-400 outperforms the R-2000 on the following:

1. Receiving ability and signal strength.
2. The user is able to pick up two stations with ease, with no bleedover from the other station on the same frequency.
3. Scarning to exact frequency.
4. And all this for $\$ 300,00$ less. And so simple a child can use it. Unlike the $\mathrm{R}-2000$ which is somewhat harder to use.

In my opinion, the serous BCB DXer, SWDXer or even the utility scene DXer will have hours of enjoyment with this radio for hundreds of dollars less. I checked the specifications of the DX-400 and the R-2000 in ail fairness. The DX-400 has better specifications in some cases while the $\mathrm{R}-20000$ has better specifications in other cases. But overall, this radio will outperform or equal the $\mathrm{R}-2000$ in head-to-head combat. It's your choice. But for me, and probably for many other novice or serious DXers, Radio Shack's DX-400 will be the common radio name of the future.

## COMPUTERS AND RADIO FREQUENCY INTERFERENCE

The FCC is completing its phased implerientation of regulations controlling RFI (radio frequency interference) from computers and peripherals. The regulations are worded so that they apply to digital products that generate timing signals or pulses equal to or greater than 10 kHz . Computers and peripherals do not seem to'be mentioned as such. The regulations have applied to new products since 1981 and apply to all products as of Oct. 1, 1983. Manufacturers have had to decide whether to retrofit older products or to let them die.
The regulations are summarized in a table that can be obtained from the editor. The full regulation is very complex and the FCC has had to issue interpretive rulings and form an advisory panel. The first thing tho be noticed is the division into industrial. and . . commercial devices (Class A) and consumer devices (Class B). This division did not come from the FCC. It came from the Office of science and Technology (OST). The specs on Class $B$ devices are much more stringent and more closely controlled because there will be much more equipment in consumer use thar in industrial or commercial use.

Class B products must be certified by the FCC. . Hanufacturers must. test them to ensure that they are within spec and must submit the results to the FCC. If the results are satisfactory, the FCC will issue a certification. If there are questions, the FCC can request a test sample for verification of the results. Class A products are verified only. The manufacturer must test the products but only has to subrit the results on demand by the FCC. Both classes of products must have verification or certification labels on them when they are sold. FCC field offices (25) and monitoring stations (13) conduct spot checks on Class B equipment for sale in retail outlets. In 1982, about $30 \%$ of all devices checked (including items like Fu receivers and cordless telephones as. well as computers and peripherals) were out of compliance.
A manufacturer has to be certain that his test results would be the same as those obtained by the FCC. The FCC uses a full array of test equipment in checking devices for RFI but the actual testing is manual since they keep moving the cables. PFI levels can vary considerably depending on cable orientation. They look for the worst case situation. The FCC uses a special, custom-built dipole antenna to detect fFI from 30-1000 1.Fiz. I infer that this type of antenna has been in such use for about 30 years. It has a vSun no greater than about 1.5 over this frequency range except for a peak which approaches 2 at about 88 lHz . Antenna losses are no greater than $1 \mathrm{~dB} / \mathrm{balun}$ over this same $30-1000 \mathrm{mHz}$ range. This antenna is available from Roberts Instrument Corp. (address unknown). I shudder when I think of its probable cost. Document OST from the Office of Science and Technology gives details on setting up an FCC-type test site.
There is no clear-cut directive on classifying equipment into Classes A or B. Hanufacturers have had to make their own decision as to which class to qualify products in. When there are questions, from a regulatory standpoint, about classification, the FCC has been going to OST for rulings. There are no objective reason except, perhaps, for the very important one of cost, why equipment meant for Class A use could not be certified in Class B .
The main responsibility for compliance with these reulations lies with the manufacturers. However, end users could be cited and held in violation if they know or had reason to know the equipment was not in compliance. Some of the first marketing citations from the FCC did go to end users. There is quite a lot of room for interpretation here such as whether a radio hobbyist should or should not know that some piece of equipnent was in or out of compliance. The FCC holds hams responsible for a certain degree of RFI control (but hams are licensed).

Systems integrators who buy verifled or certified modules (CPUs, printers, etc.) and assemble them into systems do not have to test the entire assembled system unless they have built their own chessis and added their, own electronic components. The FCC position seems to be that there might be some risk that the entire system is out of compliance but it would not generally be so great as to require repeated re-testing. This seems chancy to me. My experience has always been that the whole will turn out to be greater than the sum of its parts.

The regulations might be taken to imply that, when trying to reduce the effect of existing RFI, the major effort below 30 MHz should be in shielding and isolating power lines and above 30 dHz in properly orienting cables and shielding and grounding cable, lead-ins and connectors. Reducing RFI potential in existing equipment is a chancier matter. Many of the useful approaches are hardly suitable for the quick fixes or weekend projects. Some of them are:

1. Metal-shielded cabinets. These are necessary at both ends of the cables since RFI can be shunted.
2. Special I/O bulkheads. I/O ports are a major source of RFI leakage.
3. Shielded cables. Cables can act like antennae. This is not always feasible since some cable types (e.g., ribbon cable) are not readily shieldable.
4. Filtered connectors instead of or with shielded cables. This is expensive.
5. Array capacitors at connectors instead of filters.
6. Board-level bypass capacitors. These draw problem radiation from the circuit. They have lower impedance back to the power supply.
7. Reduce curfent magnitude of the circuit.
8. Reduce cable and lead lengths.
9. Reduce system operating frequency.

I have seen some discussion of the FCC regulating electronic devices so as to make them less interference prone. My personal opinion is that this is unlikely. The effort put into the emission control program and regulations make it seem that this is regarded as the main chance.

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WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN A HOME CONPUUER? by Ruth Hesch, NY

The September 1983 issue of CONSUNER REPORTS had a special 28 page section on home computers. It explained what they can do, 17 brands were compared, how they are being used and suggestions what to consider when buying one.
Computers suitable for use in the home cost from $\$ 100$ to $\$ 3,000$ and more. There is an illustrated article explaining the parts of the computer system, the input devices consisting of the keyboard for typing in data or commands, joysticks for games, a central processing unit containing the microprocessor; and the ouput devices of a monitor or TV set and printer to record on paper; and storage devices consisting of a tape recorder and disk drive.

Another article explained, "What Home Computers Can Do". This includes word-processing which eliminates the need to return a carriage, to hyphenate at the end of a line, retype an error or change what was written. Errors can be corrected before being put on paper. Letters, words, sentences and paragraphs can be be added, deleted, and moved. Games are explained. Teaching programs on all educational levels give drills according to the pace of the student. The computer can be used to plot curves from data and simulate experiments. For home finance there are programs for making a budget, balancing a checkbook, keeping track of items like interest payments and charge accounts. Ways to load programs on different types of computers are explained, as well as programming and storage. There is a comparison of the Membrane, Calculator-style, Typewriter-style and Elaborate keyboards.

Hardware and software are explained as well as their differences. Note was made that in the future, Japanese computer manufacturers may make a standard cartridge to fit all cartridge-driven computers.

There is an article on how the CONSUMER REPORTS readers are using their computers and what they paid for their systems. Simple, more-versatile, bundled and unbundled systems and differences of displays are illustrated and explained. There is a chart of various computers, their costs, hardware, options, keyboards, storage, display and documentation.

Another article gives information on which computers to consider according to the needs and desires of the family. There is information on "Where And How To Buy A Computer" and a computer vocabulary guide with illustrations. The last article answers the question, "Is A Computer Hard To Learn"? The answer is, not for games and education but for sophisticated programming, yes.

The September 1983 issue of CONSUCER REPORTS is usually available in public libraries.

MORE ON THE SSB CONVERSION

In past months I have expressed my opinion regarding the proposed conversion to SSB by WARC. After obtaining a copy of the 1982 WRTH , and reading the article by Wim van Amstel on SSB conversion, I once again feel
compelled to express my views on this subject.
Being an avid DXer, I too am in favor of measures to reduce the severe interference problems on SW. Perhaps stations could be limited to the number of frequencies they use at one time; if Radio Noscow, the VOA, or the BBC didn't broadcast on 39 frequencies at one time, I assure you that conditions would be much more amiable to the DXer and program listener alike. Also, a uniform lowering of power would be desirable; a station broadcasting with a power of 10 kw doesn't have a chance against a powerhouse of 500 kW .

Why do I propose different solutions to the problem, a problem which has progressively gotten worse in the past few years? I do so because I feel a switch to the SSB mode will, overall, be unfeasable. While rading Mr. van Amstel's article, he says, in part, that, "A potentially large market or not, when the shortwave broadcasting scene changes over from AM to SSB transmission, listeners will have to buy a new receiver."

That statement certainly glosses the subject, doesn't it? I suppose Bir. van Amstel doesn't realize that many listeners in third world countries, let alone in developed countries, may not be able to afford those wonderful new breed of receivers. Theoretically, when new technology is introduced in the market place, the initial cost to the consumer is high, and only after a period of time will the prices lower. A case in point, no matter how old, is the introduction of Ail radios. It's whimsical to think an An receiver of the $1930^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$, which may have cost several hundred dollars, is out-performed by Ali radios today costing 25 dollars. liy point? When new SSB receivers are introduced, there will be an initial period in which many listeners will not be able to afford buying another receiver. Even Win van Amstel alludes to this fact in the above quote.

And how about the transition period? I doubt that many third world stations will be able to convert to SSB. What would our hobby be without those wonderful Brazilian and African regionals? All we would have left are the large international broadcasters, who, for the most part have programming similar to that of local broadcasters. Fiany people may disagree with my view that smeller stations would shut dow with a conversion to SSB. But, it is my niew that if these stations have trouble providing such picayune items as QSLs, etc., imagine what the station might do when confronted with the cost of conversion? Ihany simply could not afford a switch. Of course, bir. van fmstel is learned with this subject. But considering this affiliation with Radio Netherlands, I feel he (at least to a certain extent) ignored, or did not understand the plight of the small station, who does not have the financing of their international, high frequency brothers.
In closing, I would like to say that a switch to SSB is probably an imminent part of our hobby. But, I would like to think that station engineers, WARC officials, and other interested parties, will have the innovation to discuss other alternatives. IIr. van Amstel closes by saying "...(if) shortwave had at least some of the organization seen on the VHF FH and TV bands... then we could confidently end this story with 'and they all lived happily ever after'." I am all for such an arrangement, but is SSB the way to do it, and will it really be an ending of 'they all lived happily ever after?' I don't think so.

TECHNOLOGY AND SHORTWAVE: As we all know, there has been great strides in computer technology and this, of course, has impacted on our hobby. But what is needed is a synthesis. This is what I am requesting. Tips and Topics is interested in articles synthesizing the hobbies of computers and shortwave. lhany of us have written some very good programs that are useful to shortwave. We need articles explaining the uses and functions of such programs. Now, we all know that some programs are very long. Thus, most cannot be reproduced in this column. Such a procedure vould limit the contents of this column. There is, of course, more to our hobby than computer technology. Ve must be fair. However, as a service, I would reproduce by xerox any program that comes my way for the general membership. After all, only those members with computers would have such a need. Furthermore, articles pertaining to hardware and interfacing devices which could incorporate computer technology into our hobby would be most velcone. Let's all contribute to this growing need in the coming months ahead. asg.

## Tidbits

SIINPO CODE: As a new member, I may be bringing out a Topic which has been beaten to death. I note both SPEEDX and the ASWIC uses SIO for reception reports. I always use SINPO in my logs and had to convert for my reports here. In so doing, I noted how imprecise the SIO code really is. SINPO's of 45444, 44444, $43444,43554,45534,45354$ etc. would probably all be reported as "about" SIO 444. But they are in fact very different. The three SINPO's 43554, 45354, and 45534 all convey very different meanings to me. The first indicates bad interference from some other station which may possibly be corrected by using a narrower filter. The second tells me there was some bad noise that I probably have to live with. The third says it was a very clear signal with noticable fading. How do you distinguish these three with SIO ratings? As I said, I use SINPO's for my own logs. Why can't we use SINPO for club loggings. Am I missing something? What do the other members think??? (Bruce K. Opitz)

MAKING WAVES: Because radio waves travel at 186,000 miles per second and sound waves saunter along at 700 miles per hour, a broadcast voice can be heard sooner 13,000 miles away than it can be heard at the back of the room in which it originated. . . (John Gunter, NC)

PROGRAM. ENDS OVER WRNO: In a letter from Esther Di Guatha, assistant to Dr. R.C. Sproul of the R.C. Sproul Study Hour, she informed me that the staff of the R.C. Sproul Study Hour staff has decided to cease broadcasting the program over WRNO. However, she did say that there is the possibility that the program may resume radio broadcasting at a future date. MORE ON CQAST GUARD HELICOPTER FREQUENCIES: Referring to the May 1981 issue on page 56 , you put some good words in about Coast Guard Helicopters listing 5.694 as primary and 8.984 as secondary. This service $I$ do spend quite a bit of time listening to but also listen in on VHF and UHF too. Not often, but at times, 5.692 and 5.696 are primaries depending on how busy a rescue turns out to be. Another frequency 5.690 is also used at times in certain areas like Chicago, IL. In this part of the country (Michigan) 5.692 is usually primary with 5.696 and 8.984 used for secondaries. On VHF 157.05 (21); 157.10 (22) and $157.15(23)$ are commonly used on the Great Lakes as is the Worldwide Calling/Distress Frequency 156.80 (16). On UHF, 381.0 and 381.8 are used via Detroit Air and Traverse City Air, 381.8 being used more often than the other even though both are used. (Larry A. Smith, MI., President of R.C.M.A)

SRGU REVIEW: After spending an entire weekend reading the SPEEDX Reference Guide to the Utilities, I would like to offer 52
the following as my review. Being looseleaf style the guide can be corrected in the future simply by sending replacement pages concerning the outdated info, errors and new information. Each section is printed with a color of its own so the reader can quickly refer to the desired section. Abbreviations are freely given out to compress information. Tables of abbreviations are easily found in the SRGU. The section on BASICS is loaded with useful info. All radio buffs, not just utility buffs would be interested in this section as it covers in great detail such topics as: spurious signals, sunspots, transmission modes, ionosphere, propagation, frequency and call letter allocations and many more. There's more to morse code than dots and dashes and this is shown in a section of its own which happens to include a very handy code chart. Although the Commercial Aeronautical section contains many outdated frequencies, it servies as an excellent example why the current SRGU format is arranged to allow for an easy update service. Readers can simply remove affected pages as the replacement pages are received. A great deal of effort went into the Single Letter HF Beacons section and those reponsible deserve much appreciation for presenting the readers with a thrilling adventure of a detailed and time consuming investigation. Perhaps one of the best sections to date is the one entitled. . United States Coast Guard. It starts with an interesting history of the USCG and later goes into the duties and problems. Detailed information is offered on aircraft, cutters and even goes as far as listing the USCG inventory. Frequency and transmission charts are given as well as coverage on other important areas of USCG communications. Tips are offered which will assist in getting more QSL's and complete addresses are given. The SPEEDX Reference Guide to the Utilities is a must for all utility buffs. Those just entering the DX hobby would find lots of enlightening material in the SRGU. I recommend SRGU to all DXers.
