A few months ago, DXM carried a story conceming the firing of a R. Moscow newscaster for his unprecedented remarks concerning the crisis in af ghanistan. Becelver reviewne.e the new $D X-4001$ Your editor, having seen the ads for the DX-400, was inspired to give the rig a field test. Sensitivity for SW is listed at 1 microvolt for $10 \mathrm{~dB} \mathrm{~S} / \mathrm{N}$ ratio....and this seems to be fairly accurate, with reception comparing relatively well with my $H Q$. FM DXing was excellent, though overloading was a headache at times. No overloading was present on the BCB band, though I feel this was in part due to less than satisfactory sensitivity. The digital readout is accurate, and quite readable. No doubt a big plus in pinpointing stations. The scan function is also nice, as one can scan in one or three kHz increments. Only gripe I have is the 3 kHz scan seems a bit useless; five kHz increments would have been better. The signal strength meter doubles as a battery meter; a nice feature for the travelling DXer. Conclusion? The DX-400, while having its share of problems, is still a good receiver for listening to SW........ds.

## Technical Roundup

A REVIE: OF THE SONY ICF-2002

longer to make the purchase. read appeared that the 2001 had
 heard about the 2002 with all its features and small size, I knew the time had come for a new radio.

The size takes getting used to. You keep asking yourself, "Iow can a radio this small be any good?" It used to be that the smaller the radio, the smaller the performance but no more. I was concerned with sensitivity, selectivity and ability to handle strong signals. I had been very happy with the 5900 in these areas so I naturally compared the radios side by side.
Sensitivity:
I can tell no difference between the two radios on shortwave but the 2002 cioes have an edge on the lll band. On LW I can hear only local aircraft beacons and no background noise even with an external antenna connected. You have to keep in mind that this is a portable and is not intended as a $L X$ machine. I think the Li: band was included more for the European listener tho can hear broadcasts than for U.S. listeners who have only the beacons to receive.
Selectivity:
Here, again, it is almost impossible to tell any difference between the 5900 and the 2002. If a strong station is only 5 kHz from a veak one there will je noticeable interference to the weak station. If the separation is increased to 10 kiz then good reception is almost always possible. Again, the fact that this is a portainle should ve remeribered. Uithout things like passband tuning, notches and IF filter switching you have to accept occasional interference on weaker stations.
Strong Sicnal Handling (Overload):
The 5900 and the 2002 overload in completely different ways. On the 5900 you will hear two signals coming in on the same frequency. One will be the desired signal and the other will be a spurious signal. By simply hitting the RF attenuator switch the problem disappears. On the 2002 overloac appears as a "chirping" sound rather than as spurious. stations appearing on frequency. Once again, use of the $I F$ attenuator (sensitivity switch) will get rid of the problem. $t$ The 2002 has never overloaded for me when only the built in whip antenna is used and therefore has an edge over the 5900. When an eaternal longwire is connected the 2002 is definitely superior in resistance to overload, especially on the frequencies below 10 IHz . I connected the 2002 to my 125 foot dipole and tuned throough the 9 Jifz broadcast band without hearing any sign of overload; quite an achievement for a portable radio since this was done at night when the band was hot with signals. During the day while listening on 21 and 17 IFiz I did get sone of the chirping mentioned above when using a 60 foot piece of wire over the roof of the house. I simply inserted resistance into the lead in wire until the problem disappeared. I found a value of 100 ohns did the trick without noticeably reducing signal strength. As has been mentioned in other articles, it is a good idea to get an external antenna up if you are using a portable in the house. Even a wire across the room will outdo the built in whip.

All of the foregoing proved to me that the 2002 is a good radio but the digital tuning is really what makes it a dream to use. I have never played with a 2001 so many of the features on the 2002 may have made their debut on that nodel; but the ability to sinply punch in a frequency and hear the station is new to me and greatly appreciated. The
keys used for entry of a frequency can also be used for the ten memories. I have programmed several stations that broadcast the news during the day, so no matter what time it is I can press one button and hear the latest news. Another nice use of the memories is to enter all the parallel frequencies in use by one station at one time. You can then jump between them to find the best frequency to listen to. You are free to use any of the memories on any frequency that the 2002 covers. In the scan mode the 2002 will run through the various frequencies at the rate of about 100 kHz per second. If a station is found, the scan will pause for a couple of seconds to allow you to hear the station then it will continue the scan. The scan range is divided up into 13 bands which mean, for example, that you can have the 2002 scan only the SWBC band you are interested in. If you were trying to find a station in the 25 meter band, the 2002 would scan from 11650 kHz to 12050 kHz then jump back to 11650 and start again. You can also jump from band to band instantly using the "band select" button and the up or down buttons at the same time, so if the 25 meter band has gone out for the evening, you can quickly jump to the 31 meter band to continue listening. The tuning works on a 5 kHz interval on SW and a 3 kHz interval on LW. This is true regardless of the way you are tuning; manual, scan or direct entry. If you enter 9522 kHz and press the execute button, the radio will tune to 9520 ; it simply drops the last digit and goes to the next lowest 5 kHz point. To tune between 5 kHz points, you use the fine tuning thumbwheel on the side of the 2002. One final nice thing about the digital tuning is the ease with which you can tune WWV. You don't need to enter all those zeros after the MHz . Just enter 5 and push the execute button and up will come $W W V$ on 5000 kHz . The same is true of any other MHz point that the radio can tune.
The SSB mode of the 2002 is much more stable than any other portable I have checked except the new Radio Shack/Uniden digital model. You can listen to hams without havint to constantly retume and you can even turn off the 2002 and it will come up properly tuned on SSB when you turn it on again, but it is not "rock solid" like the new table model radios.
The tuning indicator is worthless as far as I can tell. It is a single LED and has two states; off and on. In other words it can't be used for fine tuning and the response is so slow that it will remain on for almost 2 seconds after tuning away from a strong station. This probably reflects the slow AGC response time. Since the 2002 tunes directly to 5 kHz points which is where SWBC stations are found and since both the radio and the SWBC transmitters are very stable, the fine tuning is all but unnecessary along with the tuning indicator. You either hear the station whose frequency you have entered or you don't. Once again, this is not a DX machine for those Central American stations on odd frequencies that drift from night to night.
Audio quality is outstanding. It has great clarity and puch. It is not high fidelity with extended low and high frequency response so FM reception leaves a bit to be desired but most would not buy this radio for FM anyway. The 5900 is better in that regard. Speech jumpe right out at you on the 2002 so $S W$ and MW listening are a pleasure. There is a "news/music" switch which controls audio frequency response. I had originally heard that the 2002 had a selectivity switch, but the specs on the radio show one bandwidth. When using the built in speaker, its small size attenuates the bass response. Since in the "news" position both high and low frequencies are reduced, the result is a muffled sound. When using headphones that have a better bass response than the built-in speaker, the audio sounds bassy in the "music" position and switching to "new" gives a more pleasing sound. Soun confusing? For normal use just leave it in the music position.
Finally two oversights. There is no light for the display so if you are out camping on vacation, you will need a flashlight unless you have already entered what you want to hear in memory and can tell the buttons by feel. There is a raised dot on the " 5 " key for this purpose. The second oversight is the lact of a support for the radio. Since it is so small and thin, it is easy to tip over with the whip extended and when standing upright. When lying flat on its back it is difficult to read the display. The ideal position is proppped up so that it leans back at a slight angle and the display catches the room light. It would have been easy to build in a small metal rod for this purpose but they didn't so my solution is a plastic calculator support you can get at Radio Shack for a few dollars.
All in all a very nice radio and one other thing I almost forgot, it is not real sensitive to lower than normal battery voltage so you can use NICAD rechargeables. There is a built in $12 / 24$ hour clock with a 65 minute delayed turn off and automatic turn on at any time you set. It and the memories run off two separate batteries and it is best to use long life cells ( not NICADS) for these.

The second installment about computers in COiSSUEER PEPOMS was continued in the Octoier 1963 issue. It discussed adiational hardware and software for word-processing. This requires a printer which is a major expense. The prices of the 13 printers reported upon ranged from $\$ 399$ to $\$ 1050$ and others cost more. A monitor is preferred to using the ordinary TV set and the monitors discussec listed fron 999 to 5250 . Software, which is the word processing application program, range from simple ones costine is 40 to $\$ 100$ to a complex one used by professionals at $\$ 595$.
The first article is "rlow to Choose A Printer" which is used for word-processing and other applications. It is required while writing aprogran anc helpful in referring to things recorded on disc or tape.
The qualities for which to look in a printer are sharp and fast printing. There are two types of printers, impact and dot-matrix. The former uses an inked ribbon on paper as does a typewriter. The latter makes a character ciriving a set of closely spaced wires or pins against an inked ribbon.
Sone printers use standari sized typewriter paper, one sheet at a time. This is gooc for letters as it permits using letterhead stationery. Others use a continuous sheet of paper. That is good for printing programs or lengthy lists. ilso, it uses fanfold or sprocket paper with perforations along the edges.
A number of printers can use different vidth paper, up to 15 inches.
There are two ciifferent ways of feeding paper, tractor, which has sprockets pullinc the paper through, and, pin-fed which has pins alifning the paper with the roller.
The printer has to be compatible, electronically and mechanically with a conputer or it cannot be comnected to the system or respond properly to the computer's comands. Fine interface of both have to match.
fost dot-ratrix printers can ompress, expand or print each character twice to darken the print.

Printers have the same upper and lower case characters as a typewriter. Daisy-wheel ones have wheels of dirferent style and character set.
As to graphics, dot-addressable printers can make sophisticated pictures, but blockadiressable graphics are not as versitile.
Ribbons are the cartridse type but changing it may be messy. best are cartridges that can be replaced without touching the ribloon.
It was noted that for nonbusiness uses a good dot-matrix printer should suffice. Recommendations are made at the end of the article.
Another article is "How to Choose A ionitor", and compares using a TV set and monitors. Comparisons of various monitors are made, under and overscan are discussed, as are display quality, brightness, contrast, screen color, horizontal inearity, freedom from barrel distortion, antiglare screen, controls and a jack. Reconrmendations are made.
The third article discusses "The Computer As Super-Typewriter". The word processor nuts the words typed on a video display. The words can be corrected, eleted, rewritten, moved, and then the writer is satisfied, the printer puts the words on paper. ioru-processing is the most expensive hardware, those on disks costinf $\$ 100$ to $\$ 500$ or more and a few which are on cartridges, cassette tapes or disks from $\$ 40$ to $\$ 100$. Lleven of the nost popular procrans were reported upon and recomendations made.
Another article concerns "lord-Processina Programs" with detailed evaluations of 11 programs including Color Scripset, i'elemriter G4, Vic Typeuriter, The vord ilanuler if, Eand Street Writer, Atari iriter, Apple liriter II, Easy iriter 1.1, Super Scripset, Vord Pro Plus and vord Star.

TVO HEATHKIT 12/24-HOUR CLOCIS

The Xrmas 1933 catalog of the lleath Company (Benton narbor, i: 1 49022) offers an amazing build-ityourself clock for the radio experimenter or St:L/ DKer who has plenty of money. In fact, radio and TV stations, laboratory researchers, astrononers, sea and air navigators, hi tech and computer people, etc. also will love it.
Called "The Iiost Accurate Clock," and denoted "Kit $B C-1000$," it is houseu in a block box $37 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ high, $9^{\prime \prime}$ wide and $\mathrm{Bi}^{\prime \prime}$ deep. Its face carries red LEDS that show hours, minutes
seconds, and tenths-of-seconds. Switchable to either 12- or 24-hour mode, and for any time zone, it is guaranteed accurate to within plus or minus 10 milliseconds. It works on $120 / 240 \mathrm{VAC}$ and-for portability and back-up-on 12 VDC. It not only sets itself automatically when first turned on, or after power failures, but adjusts automatically for leap seconds and leap years. An extra-cost add-on accessory kit (RS-232C) provides readout for month, day and year.
Heath proudly states: "Almost any other time reference which differs from the GC-1000 readout will be wrong!" How can such a thing be? Very simple! This timepiece is a single conversion AM heterodyne receiver with tuned RF amplifier, and one microvolt sensitivity. Moreover, it has the ability to sample continuously the complex 5,10 and 15 MHz data signals of WWV's (or, if one wishes, WWVH's) cesium-stomic chronometer and to lock on to the channel that is most QRN/M-free. Tiny amber, green and red scanner LEDs indicate reception and processing of these channels. If ever all of them are unusable, a microprocessor-controlled inboard oscillator maintains the readout until clear reception of WWV resumes. If any channel is especially bad, it may be manually switched off. Equipped with a 54" telescopic antenna, the ec-1000 also has input for an outside antenna-preferably one especially adapted to WVV frequencies.
In addition to providing zero cumulative error, this clock also talks. A volume control permits muting or amplification of the voice portion of WW's output. Purchasers who are really fussy will relish certain other capabilities: ASCII time for computer applications, USC1 time which compensates for earth wobble, correction factors for propagation delay, a "daylight savings function," and a port for output of a frequency referenced signal of 3.6 MHz .
What does such a super clock cost- $\$ 2,000$ ? No, $\$ 249.95$ in its kit form (plus $\$ 49.95$ for the RS-232C add-on). Those who are very rich-especially those who are no good with soldering iron-will, of course, want to order assembled and tested units (i.e. the GCW-1000, which includes the add-on) for $\$ 389.95$ each.

After exclaiming "Gee whiz," most of us may well ask if heath also offers the hobbyist "common man" a simple unit that he can readily afford and understand. Happily, this firm does so. Their kit GC-1107 ( $\$ 29.95$ ) provides a smaller box with green LEDs showing only hours and minutes. Heath claims that an eight-year-old (with the step-by-step manual) can readily assemble it with a minimum of tools. This clock can be permanently wired for 24 -hour or 12 -hour time, for 120 or 240 VAC , and provides flashing indication of power failure. It also may be set and used as an alarm clock. No pre-assembled version is available, however.
Left continuously undisturbed for many months, the GC-1107's accuracy-according to the present writer's experience-will vary little more than plus or minus 15 or 20 seconds. It is, however, somewhat tiresome to set into exact synchronization with WWV, even if one unplugs it, and waits for the precise moment of 00:00. Moreover, it must be frequently reset, if such synchronization is to be approximately maintained. To reduce this inconvenience, the writer has installed an on/off toggle switch in the AC line. when operated rapidly enough to defeat the power-off fail-safe feature, this device greatly facilitates exact setting to WWV.
In closing, the GC- 1107 makes an excellent clock for most hobby purposes. On the other hand, for most of us, the $G C-1000$ will remain as an ideal for our "dream shacks."

This is unbelievable in this age of computer technology. Recently, President Reagan made a speech in a studio that is unchanged from the Eisenhower Administration. Replacement parts are no longer available so the government is forced to manufacture these parts themselr. Hopefully, funds will be soon approved to upgrade this ancient equipnent. VOA SAYS IT REACIES LORE LISTENERS IH THE SOVIET BEOCK: An AP article puolisined in the NOV. 28,1983 ITY Times says the VOA is get'ing through to Eastern Europe's population despite wide spread Soviet jamming. VOA is reaching 14.7\%'s of the population of the Soviet Union, $43 \%$ of Poland's adult population, 35\% of Czechoslovukia's population, 25\% of Hungary's popuiation, 22\% of Bulcaria's population and 24\% of Rumania's population. (R. Hesch, IV $\%$ )

GREINADA: I have received many articles on the impact of the Grenadan invasion upon "our favorite radio station". An article in the 50 V . 19,1983 Boston Glove sheds the most light on the situation. Three paragraphs in the article deal with the fate of Racio Eree Grenada.
"The U.S. Army "Psychological Operations" team lost no time setting up its press outlet on Grenadia. Less than three days after U.S. bombs decimated the facilities of Radio Free Grenada, U. S. Lavy Technicians were busy airing Lob fiarley, Stevie Woncier and regional news announcements over the same frequency but from the back of a military communications truck."
"The people are happy now because they're finally getting the truth," said Navy Lt. Iichard Ezzell, who oversees the operation. Asked whether he felt the station's news programming, which relies heavily on handouts from the Grenadian governor generals' office, was being censored,

Ezzell said, "the local people tell us they didn't know what was happening here before. Now they're getting the information they need."
"itwo miles from the new "Spice Island Radio " studio, the remains of Radio Tree Grenada lie in charred upheaval. The building was bombed so precisely that none of the houses nearby were damaged. Drapped among the concrete rubble and twisted cables are several phonograph records melted from the heat of the bombs: llayon's Sonata No. 46, Ravel's "Bolero" and a piano concerto by Franz Liszt."
Despite the rhetoric, I always enjoyed listening to RFG, especially the steel drum, calypso and Reggae music. I hope that Grenada's voice on shortwave will not be silent for long. (John Fisher, LIA; also IVY Times, 10/20/83 via R. Hesch; $V Y$ Post $\overline{10 / 31 / 83}$ via Lynn Lurke, VA and others)
RADIO IMRTI TO AIR: After easy passage in the House and Senate, President Reagan has signed legislation to set up R. Nartia gov't radio station that will beam US programs to Cuba. It won Congressional approval because a compronise was reached making the station part of VOA. The station will broadcast from VOA's ilarathon Transmitter in Florida. It will offer news about political events in Cuba. According to Cuba's Deputy Foreign Hinister, Cuba will now wait and see before considering its next action. The Foreign Hinister ruled out the possible jamraing of the station Instead, he said Cuba may set up a counterbroadcast station to the US via powerful transmitters capable of overriding signals of scores or hundreds of US stations. However, the Foreign linister has said that if R. iiarti is objective and neutral as its proponents claim it will be, Cuba may do little or nothing. (Cincinnati Enquirer, 9/14/83 via D. They want the relay to broadcast to the liestera and Central regions of the USSR where Turkish dialects are spoken. Turkes in the past have turned dow this proposal not jo riffle the Soviet's feathers but now because of an underground Soviet controlled Turkish lang. station, Turkish leaders mag change their mind. (Lanclois, GA)


HAPPY NEW XEAR! I hope that 1984 will be as DX-productive for you as 1983 was (or more productive, if 1983 was not a good year, hi!)
Our first question this month is from SPEEDXer Philip Dampier. He asks: "Why do (some) stations such as Radio Beijing play some of their programs backwards?'" (or sdrawkcab, hi) Well, Philip, the Chinese wouldn't answer this question were you to ask them, but I'11 essay an answer. Let's say you are a Chinese telecommications person responsible for relaying Radio Beijing programs from an outpost in western China. You are also charged with getting the program on the air as soon as possible after it's broadcast. When you record your backwards relay from Radio Beijing, you simply have to put the recorder into "play" at the end of the broadcast and, without rewinding, you can play the program forwards. This is the best explanation $I$ have heard; there are others (plain orneryness is one).
I have received several queries about utility broadcasts. I am not a utility listener (although I suppose I could be persuaded!), and, coincidentally, I received from a rabid Utility Chaser a paean to ute listening. With her permission, I below reprint Cornelia Campbell's explanation of why she is a utility listener.
"The UTES both fascinate and excite me. Here are all these men and women serving us all 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, year in, year out. People at work -- not trying to con anyone into believing anything, not trying to entertain or to sell, they are simply going quietly about their lawful occasions in the air and on the sea. They rescue people, they transport people, they help homesick service people talk with home, they fly or sail their military missions. Those on the ground or sea do care about those in the air or at sea.
"My college major . . . was geography. This in the years before American colleges and universities really considered Geography a subject fit for their attention. . . . I've travelled a fair amount and the UTES let me bring the world to me now that i can't go out to it.
"And, I suppose the UTES provide a sort of refuge from the present climate -- one in which it is no longer possible to believe anything our goverment tells us, and only about $50 \%$ of the media presentations. You should explore the UTES a bit, but, be warned, they can be addictive!"
A very fine presentation of what many people have felt is a specialist's domain, Cornelia! I am indebted to you. If any of you are now interested in utilities, contact HQ for information about the SPEEDX Utility Guide, currently being issued, which will tell you more about utilities than $I$ will probably ever know!

Please do submit your questions to me. I will do my best to either answer them myself or solicit expert help in answering them. A question which was asked of me I will pass along to those of you who use computers in conjunction with our hobby: "How exactly can computers be used to help a person $D X ?^{\prime \prime}$ I can think of several ways off the top of my head, but I want to find out what YOU do with your computers. Please write, and I will reprint some of your answers two months from now. To those of you who worry that SPEEDX, like some other journals, will turn into a computer jpurnal; Fear Not!!! We are a DX magazine and a DX magazine we will stay!

In response to another question, I think I should introduce myself to new members here: I am a 31 -year-old computer programmer who has been DXing for about 13 years now. I have been a Director of SPEEDX for 4 years, and was, for 5 years, the Western Hemisphere Editor, retiring last year. I was educated at Columbia University, receiving a B.A. in Latin and Greek in 1974. I am a member of Mensa and am on the Board of the New York Mensa organization. Occasional references to Arkie and Blackie have puzzled some: Arkie is a 5-year-old tabby cat (very proud, as he was named after a bishop), and Blackie is, of course, all white! They fear US military invasion, of course, but as we are invading them from Honduras and threatening to repeat Grenada on them soon, they have good reason. From 0300 to 0310 they give news and comment in English. They switch to Spanish thereafter, and give quite a number of local songs interspersed with short Spanish comments on primarily political and social matters. They are to be commended for playing local music, but criticized for frequently interrupting the songs or cutting them short by comments... Listeners will enjoy the music if they pay attention to the pride exemplified by it. The music is Cuban-influenced and salsa-influenced without being either Cuban(influenced some by African music) or Salsa.. ...Radio Nicaragua gives another English news broadcast from 0350 to 0400 UTC sign off."

POLAND...Radio Polonia broadcasts concerts of Frederic Chopin's music from 0500 to 0530 UTC on the frequencies of 7270 , 6935 and 5995 kHz . This same program is also broadcast from 1130 to 1200 UTC on 7285, 6095 and 5995 kHz . (Don McCants, AL)

Radio Tanzan$\bar{i} a^{-}$Zanzibar is expected to begin bcsting an external svc by the end of 1984 following installation of two 50 kW shortwave xmtrs at Dole, 9 miles from Zanzibar city; per the Director of Dept. of Info \& Bcstng, installation expected by October 1984 by 50 experts from China. Fe ancd that RTZ vould be able to best pgms to Arabian countries and the Comoros in EE and AA. (perhaps QSL policy will be modified also; anyone remember the Omar M. Omar fiasco of years past when an unsuccessful attempt was made to supply this stn with printed GSLs? They were revd but apparently found "unsatisfactory" by the stn. I still have two aerogrammes from Mr. Omar in reply to a rpt \& follow-up, thanking me for both and saying "Ry all means, preparations are now being made to supply you with what you would like to have"; I did finally get a QSL from them via Radio Tanzania, Dar-es-Salaam. This was in 1970--MK)

F/d meand full data (Date, time and frequency); p/d means partial data, when one of the above is missing. Recd means received. ms or MS means mint stamps were sent for return postage, see above paragraph for more. $F F=$ French, $S S=$ Spanish, $G G=G e r m a n, P P=P$ ortuguese, $R R=R u s s i a n$, II or Indo is Indonesian. Most other languages are spelled out. \#\#\#d=days, mo= months, and then yrs. irc=International Reply Coupon, these are available at all post offices, and are to send return postage to other countries. They cost $65 \neq \mathrm{US}$ apiece, and usually at least 2 are required for a reply. This is why ms are used, they are usually cheaper, and also simple for the stations to use. They don't have to be exchanged. I know I missed many, but these are some of them.

Before I forget, I want to thank everyone for the holiday greetings. The BEST information about the use of frequencies and Transmitter sites in the USSR is the UHN; USSR High Frequency Broadcast Newsletter. It is published by Roger Legge, Box 232, McLean, VA 22101.
