Saying Good Bye... Clayton and Helen Howard: ANDEX founder and DX Party Line host for 22 years, Clayton Howard and his wife Helen are retiring after 43 years of active service with HCJB. The quiet couple has become a part of DX history. They founded ANDEX in 1974 and directed it through mid-1981. They are known to many thousands around the world as helpful and inspiring radio friends of DXers.

Clayton was born in 1918 of missionary parents in Canton, China. He graduated from Wheaton College in Wheaton, IL, with a B.S. in Physics, and did graduate work one more year before going to Ecuador with HCJB in May, 1941. Helen, raised in a pastor's home in IL, graduated from Wheaton College in 1942. Their friendship began while they were both at wheaton. After a flurry of letters between Helen in IL and Clayton in Ecuador, Clayton asked Helen to be his bride across the miles during an HCJB radio program as his mother placed the engagement ring on Helen's finger. She came to Ecuador in 1941, and, again, radio played a remarkable part in their lives as they were married before a microphone that broadcast the ceremony to the SW world.

The following years were busy and anything but dull. Their duties brought them into contact with the political turmoil of revolutions and the natural disaster of a devastating earthquake. Assigned to the Engineering Dept., clayton worked in all the technical areas of the growing pioneer missionary radio station. While working with designer clarence Moore he built the first test model of the quad antenna, now widely used by ARO's. At one point clayton was a frightening part of a demonstration of God's protection. He was on an antenna tower when it fell, but because the top of the tower hit a mud wall it didn't hit the ground and Clayton was saved from being crushed.

Throughout the years Clayton has contributed a strong bass singing voice to HCJB choir radio programs and concerts. In 1977 he was honored by receiving the ANARC International DXer of the Year Award. He is a licensed "ham" with the call W9KJZ. Helen taught in the HCJB kindergarten and in Ecuadorian child evangelism classes, and has done much hospital visitation and secretarial work. Three children were born into the Howard's home. All grew up in Ecuador, went to the United states for their college education, and married. Clayton and Helen delight in their ten grandchildren.

After leaving Ecuador, the Howards plan to revisit wheaton and then retire to Orange City, FL. Clayton will remain active, however, compiling historic slides and other material for the HCJB archives. But, he also plans to put his Ecuadorian rocking chairs to some use. (Thanks to Don McCants-AL for forwarding this from the June-July ANDEX bulletin. ds.)

Atmospheric Attenuation of MW and LF SW Signals? By: Adrian M. PetersonIndia: It is an established fact that adverse atmospheric weather patterns do have a deleterious effect on the propagation of FM and TV signals, and this is most evident in the reception of fringe and $D X$ signals. Just recently, this phenomenon was experienced anew, while I was at Kodaikkanal in South India. This is a hill station, some $7,000 \mathrm{ft}$. high, which was established during the days of the British Raj. Because of the height of the mountain range at Kodaikkanal, there is an almost unobstructed radio pathway between this location and Colombo, beyond the foggy horizon. A dozen FM signals from Colombo and the FM relay station at Radula were audible almost daily, as well as two channels of the Rupavahini TV service. However, intervening weather patterns at times reduced the number of channels heard on FM, and also blocked out the sound and picture from the two TV outlets. Generally, it could be forecast, that by the day following FM and TV disturbances the rough weather had progresses up as far as Kodaikkanal.

Intervening atmospheric weather conditions do have an attenuating effect on FM and TV signals. However, is there any effect produced on MW and LF SW signals by the earth's atmosphere? I would like to suggest that the earth's atmosphere, regardless of weather patterns, does have an attenuating effect on low frequency $S W$ signals, and this new theory (con't...ds.)
is supported by monitoring observations in many areas of Asia during the past 17 years. These observations indicate that generally, the higher the altitude, the better the reception conditions for MW and LF SW signals. Several notable examples can be given to support this theory.

For example, at $7,000 \mathrm{ft}$. high Kodaikkanal, tropical SW signals in the 120 and 90 meter bands from Indonesia come in exceptionally well, and better than any other area I have visited in Asia. Many of these stations were small lkw outlets which I have never previously logged, except when I have been in Indonesia. It should be remembered that these loggings were made in early June 1984, which is the end of our hot summer just as the monsoon is beginning, when propagation condx from Indonesia are worst.

However, at Madras, down at sea level on the coast, with an open skyline towards Indonesia, none of these stations can be heard, except for a few of the very strong ones. Why do the signals not penetrate to sea lvi Madras when they can easily be heard at high level Kodaikkanal? The LF SW signals from Indonesia, have obviously penetrated up into the ionosphere and they have been reflected downwards. They are available at $7,000 \mathrm{ft}$. high, but not at sea level. Are they "lost" on the way, attenuated by the effort of penetration through the last mile of the earth's atmosphere?

Similar observations were made some years ago at $9,000 \mathrm{ft}$. in the Him- alayan foothills at Mussoorie, where excellent signals almost in any direction were hrd. Yet, when I visited Falakata in Nov. last year, on the plains between the Himalayans and Bangladesh, reception was worse than expected.

Again, there is a similar contrast in monitoring observations between Kabul, Afghanistan and Male, in the Maldive Islands. I consider that mile high Kabul is one of the best DX localities I have ever been in. However, as a contrast, Male, at sea level is not as good as I expected. (This is true for every visit I have made there, except for one occasion which was exceptional, when I logged a MW station from the Caribbean.) It is true that the salt water pathway in every direction produces an enhancement of signals over an inland area, but even this enhancement is disappointing unless an external antenna is used. From these observations, it seems that skywave signals from LF SW and MW stations are attenuated after reflection from the ionosphere by their penetration of the earth's atmosphere. DXM Exclusive Report...the first in a series: Communications in Mauritius: Mauritius, that elusive DX spot off the coast of Madagascar, has been a prime target for SWLs around the globe. Considered one of the toughest African catches, this dubious honor may soon end. Last month, it was reported that one 50 kW xmtr may be put into operation soon. Latest news is that the Mauritius Broadcasting Corporation (MBC) may put two SW xmtrs into operation, thus making it much easier to hear the station. But, before we discuss the future, it would be more appropriate to look into the history of broadcasting in this tiny and isolated Indian Ocean country.

Television was launched by the MBC in 1965. It has now become an essential part of life in Mauritius and is playing an increasing role in the educational, cultural and social, as well as political and economic development of the country. In the education of the people the contributiontof MBC Television is most significant. On the one hand, adult education programs, covering agriculture, health and civics, have been regularly broadcast, and on the other, formal educational television programs, which were introduced at the MBC in 1969, have greatly encompassed more and more disciplines. Finally, the College of the Air supplementing the other educational programs and set up in 1972, is well apprecdated by students of secondary schools:

Even before MBC Television was equipped with an out-
 side broadcast van fitted with cameras, special national events were being covered live. But that was on sound and the viewer missed the vivid visual impact of the instant happening. Now, however, ambitious coverage of major events are undertaken.

To better facilitate such live programming, relay points have been established linking through a microwave chain the cameras in the field and the studios. A further improvement came with the introduction of a lightweight mobile video tape color recording system.........Next month, we will continue our discussion, highlighting the relationship between the TV and radio services. DXM Receiver Review: ESKA RX99PL: The RX99PL is one of the most advanced receivers available on the market. The receiver incorporates a CMOS microprocessor with a 64 bit memory. The RX99PL is operated by means of a multi function membrane keyboard, with 58 keys allowing for numerous features. Just some of these include:

1. Direct frequency tuning by means of keyboard entry.
2. Manual tuning; up or down in fixed steps.

The RX99PL also incorporates a "phase-locked AM" detector, ensuring distortion free reception of AM SW broadcast stations, even during severe fading and interference. The memory is capable of storing 99 channels, direct entry and access via the keyboard. Other features include: A calibrate function (calibrates freq. readout within 10 Hz accuracy). AGC time constants, sleep/standby function, and timer (can be used for control of a tape reconder.) Specs look good, too. Sensitivity is 0.4 uV , dynamic range is 95 dB , image rejection is 80 dB , and $A G C$ range is 120 dB . Really sounds like a set for the professional DYer: If you'd like a complete brochure on this receiver, write to ESKA at: Mollestraede 5, DK-3400 Hillerod, Denmark. He's been an active contributor to many columns (especially "Tips and Topics") for several vears, and knows quite a bit about where to find information on shortwave listening in the media and in published form. Thanks for the several letters and post cards I received on the "Antenna Tips" article by Neal Furdue last month. Rick D. and I were happy to receive the article from Neal and equally happy to present it to you. As promised. I have the second part this month, so without further ado...

ANTENNA IIPS by Neal Furdue, AL
THIS MONTH we'll deal with special types of antennas, the effects of hi and lo impedence, and the weaknesses of modern receivers and how to protect them from damage in a storm.
8) Special antennas. There are many, and few DXers have the room to erect most of them. Most are directive antennas. The Rhombic is out of reach for most of usy including me, unless I wished to erect tall poles down thru the pasture. The extremely LoNGwire is possible for some of us, and the fullwave Delta Loop is the best singleband antenna I have ever used. I will only deal with the LoNGwire and the Delta Loop here.
a) The LONGWire (at least three wavelengths long, by ARRL definition) will definitely exhibit directional characteristics off the far end. However, it is one giant capacitor and will shoot large sparks if anywhere near ground potential in the shack. I suspect it could ruin a modern chip-circuitry receiver in a hurry.
b) The Delta Loop is by far the finest single-band antenna ever used here (thanks to an article by Chuck Ripple in FRENDX some years ago). The formula, as I recall, was about 1 , 050 divided by the frequency in MHz. A coas tuner is helpful. I had one up for bom for awhile, "til an ice-storm got it, and it was the quietest antenna $I$ ever had for the band, with great gain. As they say about Delta Loops...they open and close the band....and indeed they do. It is a triangle antenna with max directivity broadside to the plane, and a very high support is needed for 60 m as each side is about 70 feet long. However, the bottom leg is at ground potential (and connected to the shield of the 50 ohms coax to the receiver), and can actually lie on the ground. Anyone who has a real tall tree should try this one! You will hear eastern South Americans long before their usual fade-in. Of all the antennas that have gone up here, none can really compare with this one. My tree was not quite 70 feet tall, and I had to "bend" the antenna a bit, but it was SUPEFB!
c) Directional "V" Dipoles. Not quite what they are cracked up to be, but if a Delta Loop or three-wavelength antenna is not possible...not too bad.
d) Slopers. I did an article in FFENDX about a year ago on these, and never received any queries on it. They are good for a few dB gain to a particular direction. They must be cut to the halfwave formula as a "tilted dipole" or used thru a quarterwave system with a tuner. If enough inquiries are made, I will make up a sheet on them. A high support is needed at one end, and the directivity is off the low end.

## 9) General information.

a) I have tuned many rigs with hi and loimpedence antenna connections. In every case, the lo impedence connection has proven to be the best. Df course, the antennas here are relatively long. It may be that the hi impedence connections would work better with short wires. One thing to consider is that the nominal 50 Ohms impedence to the antenna circuits on most receivers was chosen because of the better signal-to-noise ratio at that impedence.
b) On modern chip-circuitry receivers, a Transitrap is absolutely essential, as these units are extremely prone to front-end damage due to slight static buildup (perhaps from a lightning strike ten miles away, or snow or wind blowing across the antenna). However, these transitraps work only with coan-fed antenna systems, to the best of my knowledge. It is absolutely essential that with modern receivers the antenna AND power cord be discannected at the first sign of rough weather. Otherwise, you will have an $\$ 800$ doorstop! THIS IS FFOGRESS? Don't ask: me...I still use tube-type gear! The gas-discharge Transitraps will let you know when they "run out of gas." The antenna circuit will go dead. Best deal I know of on these is the Alpha Delta unit from Amateur Electronics Supply: Milwaukee, Wisconsin; at about \$20. Replacement gas-cartridges are about $\$ 10$. They are good for thousands of discharges.

SUMMARY... The convenience features on all the latest gear do not impress me. These rigs have so many negatives that I don"t believe I"d care to own one. Anyway the best receiver in the world is not worth anything without a proper antenna. If a proper antenna overloads the receiver, it is a poor receiver. Convenience versus performance? I"ll tate the performance any day!

## EDXC CQNEERENCE 른

The EDXC Conference is now over. This year's conference was held in Stockholm, Sweden June 8th to June ilth. It was another great conference. The weather was nice the first day but then rained and got cold the rest of the time. But that did not dampen the EDXC Conference spirit.

The conference started off with registration at the Hotel Domus. We then got on the but and were taken to the broadcasting house where we were given a nice tour of the studios and news rooms of Radio Sweden. Later that day we had the reception hosted by the Swedish Radio Company.

On Friday evening the special amateur radio station 7SFOAC was on the air. This station was housed in a small room on the roof of the Eroadcasting House. I visited the station and listened in on the hame there. One of the hams who operated the station was the well-known Victor Goonetilleke.

On Saturday, the conference had its official opening with greeting by George Wood of "Sweden Calling DXers." We then heard speeches by Eengt Gustafsson, head of Fadio Sweden International: Arne Lodin, Secretary-General of the Swedish DX Federation; and Michael Murray, Secretary-General of the European DX Council.

Then we heard two lectures, one by Arne Skoog, founder of "Sweden Calling DXers", and the other by Jens Frost, editor-in-chief of the WOFLD FADID TV HANDBOOK. Jens told us about how he goes about making the Handbook. We also heard from Eertil Olstrup, from the Swedish Telecommunications Administration.

It was then time for our tour of the Kaknas Telecommunications Tower, the Telecommunications Museum, the Nacka Transmitter Station and then lunch. It was an interesting trip going up to the top of the 150 meter high tower and seeing all over the countryside.

We then returned to the Broadcasting House for the International DX Parliament dinner. After dinner there were more speeches made by Anker Feterson of Danish Shortwave Clubs International; Rolf Lovstrom of Verdens Gang (a Norwegian radio elub): and Victor Gocnetilleke. There were also some films shown between the speeches.

Sunday got started with a Fun Run. A few people ran from the Eroadcasting House to the Kaknas Telecommunications Tower, about a two mile run. Then we started our workshops. The workshops held were "Tropical DXing", "Computers and DXing":"FM DXing", "Frogram Content Feviews", "DX clubs and magazines", "DXpeditions", "Receivers and Antennas":" and a broadcasters" workshop. I attended the compter workshop. We decided that an organization should be started similar to the ANAFC computer committee. It has been proven that computers are becoming more popular in the shortwave radio hobby. So it is helpful to have a committee where you cam go for help and to get computer software related to shortwave radio.

Sunday afternoon there was an EDXC exhibition. Numerous radio stations had station stickers, schedules and other souvenirs for the taking. There was also some radio equipment on display.

Then on Sunday night we had the EDxC banquet. This was a very different type of banquet. Inmtead of being held at a banquet hall or restaurant, it was held on board a boat. We boarded the M/S Victoria and cruised around the waters of Sweden. The meal was smorgasboard style. While on board, the Swedish Telecommunications Administration demonstrated its Nordic Mobile Telephone by offering free phone calls anywhere in the world. Just about everybody got to call home for a few seconds. The batteries were low in power and could not be charged up long enough to make a long call. You would have enough time to say hello before the phone would go dead.

On Monday, we had the final session of the conference. Feporte of the workshops were given and there were some final discussions. Then it was the close of the EDXC * 84. Some of the people attending the conference went on the broadcasters" conference cruise. This was held on board the M/S Finlandia. It went from Stockholm to Finland.

So all in all, it was another great conference. There were over 200 registered at this year"s conference. They came from 19 different countries, including Sweden, India. France, the United Kingdom, Norway, the Federal Republic of Germany, the Netherlands, Switzerland, Spain, the U.S. Turkey, Denmark. Sri Lanka, Italy, Austria, Finland, Malaysia, Australia, and the German Democratic Fepublic.

Next year the EDXC Conference will be held in Madrid, Spain. It will be held in cooperation with Fadio Exterior de Espana. It will be from May 24-28. 1985. So if you are planning a trip overseas, try and put the EDXC Conference on vour itinerary.

I also need people willing to do reasearch and writing for the guide. The more input I get, the better this guide will be. And if this guide is done right, just think of all the glory SPESDX would bask in. The Guide to Soviet Broadcasting was a classic, and I want the Guide to Latin American DX to be just as popular. So drop me a SASE to get a more detailed fact sheet on this project. If all goes well, we just might have this thing done around the first of next year. I'll probably coordinate this effort since I'm WH editor, and am a more central figure, and have greater access to you and the rest of the membership.
Well, I'm all talked out now. I'll sign off now and get to work (I have a few letters to get out) so till later, Ill see you later...

COMMENTARY: Give us an idea of the topic they were commenting on.
MISC. : other details that should be mentioned, if possible are: Names of Programis heard, s/on \& s/off times, and GPM (type and source) if any. Of course, any comments you have on the bcst are always welcome.
As editor, I may not be able to include all reported details in the column, but $I$ will try to list the items that I feel will be of most interest to the membership. My goal is to make the $A / O$ column as useful and interesting for the readers as possible. Also I believe that by taking the time to listen closely for details, you will find the time spent at SwLing to be more enjoyable and rewarding. IRAN: The Persian language domestic service of the VOIRI has been heard since 3 rd June on 6105 kHz , in parallel with 15084 kHz , during the daytime period. The xmtr carrying external service programmes on 4990 kHz has on occaisions been switching to 4985 kHz during the evening period to avoid interference to the VOId's Arabic service.

Hello and welcome to the start of my second year of editing for SPEEDX. I am very pressed for time this month, though. I will be leaving for a few days on vacation tomorrow, and have little time to do this. I will try something different again this month though. I will not be using your contributed material this month, but everyone received credit, and all will be held for next months column. What I intend to do today, is to list the countries one by one, with the qsi policies of the countries station(s). This might be of help, since I will try to cover all countries rather than the ones that have been reported most of ten. I would appreciate your comments, and I hope this proves interesting to you. So on to the material.


## EUROPE

ALBANIA-R.Tirana, provjdes $f / d$ cards in varying time for no return postage. However sometimes a second report may be required. Make sure you report on the full length of their program, not just half of it. R.Gjirokasterprovides $p / d$ cards, at times requires f/ups.

AUSTRIA-ORF-provides f/d cards in about $1 \frac{1}{2}$ months. RP not necessary. Also sends out stickers.

BELGIUM-BRT-Provides QSLs to members of its listeners club, and form letters to others. RP not necessary. ORJ-La Voix de l'Amity-provides cards, pennants, and stickers for varying return postage.

BULGARIA-R. Sofia-provides f/d cards, no postage is necessary.
CZECHOSLOVAKIA-R. Prague-Provides f/d cards, magazines, pennants, and other goodies for contest entries. Also has a monitor club. No RP.
DENMARK-AI though this station doesn't broadcast in English, they are very receptive of $E E$ rpts and QSL wiliingly. An irc or 2 may help-R. Denmark

FINLAND-Does not send QSLs, but sends useless thank you letters-R.Finland
FRANCE-R. France Inti-QSL in about a month for no rp. AIso sends pennants on request.

GERMAN DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC-R. Berlin Intl-F/d cards in about 2 months. Also has a listeners club, and sends pennants.

GERMAN FEDERAL REPUBLIC-DW-No longer sends $f / d$ cards, but sends $n / d$ cards, and sometimes pennants on request. A SAE helps. VOA-the VOA sends $\mathrm{f} / \mathrm{d}$ site cards from Washington in about a week. GERMAN Regionalsusually QSL EE rpts, providing RF is enclosed.
GREAT BRITAIN-The VOA is the best bet here. Card in about a week, and request site on it. The BBC-sends n/d no site cards like the DW does. Canada (RCI), also has a relay here via BBC, and an alert listener can often get a RCI do-it-yourself card for here.
GREECE-VOA maintains 2 sites here, Rhodes and Kavala-card in about a week. V. of Greece-F/d cards provided. 1 or 2 irc usually gets you the card a little faster, but not required.

HUNGARY-R. Budapest-Provides f/d QSLs. Has a listeners club to join, with a very interesting bulletin. Also provides pennants to club members.

ICELAND-R.Reykjavik-F/d QSL in about 150 days, an irc or 2 helps.
IRELAND-R: Dublin-Provides cards in about 3 months, but ircs should be . sent. Also has periodic pirate stations operating.

ITALY-RAI-This station is a slow, but reliable station to get a QSL from. Usually takes about 5 months. No RP.

LJXEMBOURG-R. Lux.-This station is an unpredictable QSLer. Some first time reports are answered, while others require 3-4 follow ups. Just keep sending reports, and you should get a card.

MALTA-DW-No data, no site cards sent. Intl Cristian Radio-QSLs via Canada address and RP helps. R. Mediterranean-sends $f / d$ map cards in about 4 months.

MONACO-TWR-QSLs in about a month, and sometimes sends stickers ans pennants. Return postage is necessary.

NETHERLANDS-R. Nederland-LOPIK is the only transmitter site in Holland, and one should have a card marked with this site to count this country. Very reliable QSLer, no RP.

NORWAY-R. Norway-Sends card and stickers in about 3 months or so.
POLAND-R. Polonia-Sends $f / d$ cards in about 4 months. Has a DX club for listeners to join.

PORTUGAL-R.Portugal-Sends out f/d cards in about a month. DW-See German Fed. Rep. RFE-RL-no site, freq only cards. R. Renascenca-F/d cards in varying time for $1-2$ ircs and EE or PP rpts. AWR-sends QSL and sometimes pennants for 2 ircs.

ROMANIA-R. Bucharest-sends f/d cards and no rp is necessary. Sometimes a pennant upon request.

SPAIN-REE-f/d cards and no rp is necessary.
SWEDEN-R. Sweden provides $f / d$ cards and stickers in about a month.
SWITZERLAND. Provides $f / d$ cards, but sent surface mail, unless return postage is enclosed. Station is Swiss Radio International.

VATICAN-R. Vatican-Provides $f / d$ cards in about a month.
WEST BERLIN-RIAS-This is usually a tough on to hear because of QRM on 6005 Khz , but a QSL is available. Usually about a month with some stickers.

YUGOSLAVIA -R. Yugoslavia-Very un predictable. Does periodically QSL, but many f/ups and RP is needed. Can take years for this one.

These are hard ones to follow, and there are many stations in each country. I will try to list the best way to get a QSL, but some countries will be left out because of lack of knowledge about the QSL policies.

ALGERIA-RTVA-This one has been hard to get, but in the last few months has sent out many cards. 3 ire are required, and best get them now, because we don't know how long the easy QSL policy will last.

BOTSWANA-No QSL cards at all is their policy.
CAMEROUN-R. Douala, R. Bertoua, and others answer periodic reports. Best to send return postage and to continue to send f/ups until reply is received.

CANARY ISLANDS-REE-Relay-F/d site QSLs via Spain.
CAPE VERDE ISLANDS-La Voz de Sao Vicente-date/freq cards for return postage. May require f/ups.
CHAD-Rdf Nat Tchadienne-time/date form letters in varying time for FF rpts and 2-3 ircs. (This was from material contributed this month).
DJIBOUTI-RTVD-date only card for FF rpts anf return postage. Unpredictable responses, so f/up might be needed.

EGYPT-R. Cairo-QSLs reliabily, no rp.
GABON-R. Japan Relay-date/ freq cards vià Japan, no rp. Af No One-freq. only logo cards. RTVG-date only folder card for FF rpts and rp. GHANA-GBC-F/d logo cards, but my require many followups. RP is needed. IVORY COAST-R. Abidjan-date/freq map cards for FF rpts and 2 irc. KENYA-V of Kenya-Sometimes replies with letters, in about a month. All replies received have sent 2 or more ircs.

LESOTHO-R. Lesotho-Sends flag cards, but responses vary in time and return postage. Sometimes needs follow ups rpts. BBC-n/d no site cards.
LIBERIA-Best bet here is the VQA, or UNR. Both in about a week. Also ELWA or ELBC qsl, but not as predictable as VOA, both need rp.
LIBYA-R. Jam--E; QSLs very good lately, a faster response is received by sending report to the Malta P.O. Box. An irc or 2 are needed.
MADAGASCAR-R. Nederland-Sends site cards within a month, on request.
MOROCCO-Best bet is the VOA relay. Also R. Morocaine-recent response brought a map card.in $12 \overline{0}$ for 2 ircs...

NAMIBIA-R. SWA-f/d cards and books for 1-2 ircs.
NIGERIA-V of Nigeria-Very slow, but fairly reliable QSLer. The regionals are faster, but most require return postage. Replys from FRCN-Educational Service, RRCN Ibadan, FRCN Kaduna, Sokoto State Bcstng recently.
RWANDA-DW-N/d no site cards.
SAO TOME E PRINCIPE-R. Nac-form letters for rp and PP rpts. Unpredictable. SENEGAL-ORTS-Date/time logo cards for rp of ircs or US\$1. Unpredictable.

SEYCHELLES-FEBC-Sends out $n / d$ thank you QSLs for rp.
SIERRA LEONE-SLBS-Slow, and sometimes requires a f/up but work usually gets a QSL from this one. Rp is required.
SOUTH AFRICA-R. RSA is a good QSL station, and no rp is required. Capital Radio sends date/freq cards for rp of ircs, ms or US\$1.
SWAZILAND-TWR-Sends folder cards for 2-3 ircs.

- TANZANIA-R. Tanzania-date/freq cards for rp.

TOGO-R. Togo-date/time map card for 2 irc and EE or FFrpt.
TUNISIA-RTVI-Recent brought a date/freq personnal letter for 2 irc and a FF rpt.

JGANDA-R. Uganda-Used to respond to about 1 report a month, and in about a year, but recently no replies have been reported.
ZAMBIA-ZBS-f/d card, but requires work. Rp of $2-3$ ircs or $U S \$ 1$ ", and f/ups can pay off with the QSL here.

ZIMBABWE-ZBC Radio \#1-p/d map cards available with some work here. May answer first report with or without rp, or may require follow up reports.

Remember, almost all African stations are a little erratic in their QSL posicies. If a first report doesn't pay off, often a f/up will. Work pays off with these stations. Good-luck!

KIRIBATI-f/d cards, but un reliable. Rp is required and often so are f/up reports.

MARIANA ISLANDS-GUAM-KTWR-cards, pennants for US ms. SAIPAN-KYOI-card for US ms. KFBS-f/d card for $20 \phi$ US ms.

NEW CALEDONIA-R.Noumea-n/d logo card for 2 irc and FF rpts.
NEW ZEALAND-RNZ-Requires at least 3 ircs. Also has a paper pennant.
PAPUA NEW GUINEA-All the stations here have unpredictable policies, and alot of $f / u p s$ may pay off.

SOCIETY ISLANDS-R. Tahiti-2 irc and FF reports to get a QSL here.
SOLOMON ISLANDS-Iogo cards for 3 ircs here. SIBC
VANUTU-R. Vanutu-This one has answered reports fron time to time, but not recently.

AFGHANISTAN-RA-f/d cards, but requires $2-3$ ircs.
BANGLADESH-R. Bangladesh-time/freq form letter for 2 irc, received recently.
People's Republic of CHINA-R.Beijing-Very good.QSLer and also supplies lots of goodies. The Chinese regionals are verified thru $R$. Beijing, with good results.

CYPRUS-CBC-Iogo card for rp.
INDIA-AIR-Fairly good verifier with or without Rp. Regionals require rp.
INDONESIA-V of Indonesia-fair QSLer, rp. Regionals require patience, II reports and rp for repliés, but are fairly good.

IRAN-VOIRI-cards and gross propaganda. No rp required.
IRAQ-R. Baghdad-Good QSLer sends a large folder card.
ISRAEL-Kol Israel-Very good QSLer and often sends extra goodies. No rp. JAPAN-R. Japan-very good QSLer, but sends p/d cards. FEN-good QSLer, but send RP. R. Tampa-date/time QSLs for 2 ircs in about a month.

KAMPUCHEA-V of the People-QSL via $V$ of Vietnam or direct, does QSL. Make sure if via Hanoi, you send VoV a reception report also.

KUWAIT-RK-QSL folder is sent in about a month.
LEBANON-King of Hope-QSI via Calif. or Israel address, and send rp.
MALAYSIA-R. Malaysia-Kuching-QSI in about 2 months for Rp. V of Malaysia $\mathrm{f} / \mathrm{d}$ card for 3 ircs. Other stations also verify, but send rp.

MONGOLIA-RUB-QSLs and even pennants in varying times.
NEPAL-Very erratic QSL policy for R. Nepal
North KOREA-R. Pyongyang-QSI Policy is hard to understand. Sometimes takes several letters to get a reply, others get a response on first try. When a reply is received, it is usually loaded with goodies. No rp.

OMAN-BBC-N/d card. R.Oman-QSLs have been reported, but unsure of the usual policy.

PAKISTAN-R. Pakistan-time/freq cards, no rp.
PHILIPPINES-AFRTS-believe that AFRTS only QSLs no American reports. VOA-Poro and Tinang sites here are QSLed easily. FEBC-Good QSLer, and sends pennants Rp is appreciated. R. Veritas Asia-QSL and goodies for $r p$.

QATAR-R. Qatar-QSLs have been reported in the past, but policy is unknown. I think it is fairly reliable though.

SAUDI ARABIA-BSKSA-fairly good QSLer, no rp.
SINGAPORE-BBC-no date cards. R. Singapore-Has been reported in the past, but I am unsure of the policy at present. Required rp of irc or US\$1.

South KOREA-R. Korea-good QSLer and sends lots of goodies, including pennants. No rp.

SRI LANKA-SLBC-is very erratic, and very few reports are answered.
VOA is a good way to get the QSL. Also AWR via the SLBC stations, via

TAIWAN-VOFC-Make sure that what you hear is not via the WYFR relay.
Sends plenty of goodies, including pennants. Rp not necessary. Returns taped reports with Chinese music on the tape. V of Asia-unknown policy, but has responded to reports.

THAILAND-R. Thailand-recent reply received for 2 irc.
TURKEY-VoT-Relaible QSLer and also sends a large pennant. No rp.
UNITED ARAB EMIRATES-UAE Radio-good QSLer, and has pennants at the present. No rp necessary.

VIETNAM-VoV-good QSLer, and no rp necessary.
YEMEN ARAB REPUBLIC-R. Sanaa-sends a form letter, no rp necessary.
