Interesting Development at Radio Sandino: The organization USOCA (US Out of Central America) has cooperated with the Nicaraguan task force, Westside CISPES (Committee in Solidarity with the People of El Salvador), and radio station KPFK (L.A.) to disassemble and transport a 15 kW xmtr being donated to R. Sandino in Nicaragua. The Archbishop Romero Fund provided trucks to take the xmtr to the OXFAM ship that transports supplies to Nicaragua. (Tks to Doug Ulmer-LA for forwarding this from the June Central America Alert.ds)

Ouagadougou is still there, but Upper Volta isn't: The military leaders of Upper Volta, who seized control of the country last year in a pro-Libyan coup, celebrated their first anniversary of power by changing the national anthem and name of country on August 5 th. The country is now known as Bokina-Fosso (this is presumed spelling as taken from a Radio Australia newscast, ds.) As of present, the status of their $S W$ station isn't known.

DXM Station Review: Radio Mayak: The term 'hot line" is taken literally by the members of Mayak's staff. News is broadcast two or three minutes after coming across the teletype while the takes are still warm. Information supplied by Mayak correspondents and by TASS pours in from a hundred Soviet cities and from all around the globe. Stenographers are constantly busy taking down phoned-in stories. A three to five minute newscast has to be put together from a huge amount of material. This is the editor's job.
"You can't prepare a broadcast with just the average listener in mind," Marina Shmekova, a senior editor at Mayak said. "You've got to work around a specific audience. The programming is geared to listeners at home. Our editors work around the clock, in shifts. During my shift, when $I$ select material for broadcasts, I try to imagine a warm apartment where the mother is preparing dinner, the father and son are playing a game of chess and our program is on in the background, adding to the home's atmosphere. But when the news comes on, it's up to me to orchestrate the broadcast in such a way that the family turns up the volume and forgets what they were doing for a short while."

After the news items have been selected for a broadcast, they are revised by the editor in chief. I didn't have to ask editor in chief vladimir oleinichenko my usual question "What's the most difficult thing about your job?" before I realized what was going to be the most difficult for mefinding a moment when he would be more or less free for an interview.

His office looked like a film running on fast forward. Reporters and editors kept running in and out. Teletype pages several yards long floated over the desks followed by small sheets with writing on them. The newscast was to go on in ten minutes. The imperturbable Oleinichenko looked like an experienced sea captain in a storm. On the dot of 2 P.M. the broadcast began. Oleinichenko had four minutes to spare for my interview.
"So it's captain now? I see. My colleagues and I have been compared to orchestra conductors and stage directors. All are apt comparisons. We coordinate the work of our departments, choose what is most important and order material for the next program. (With the news) we cover both big things and little things. Once I noticed the tiny yellow flowers of a coltsfoot in bloom. So I requested a commentary from a phenologist. The first flowers, the coming of spring. Isn't that an important piece of news

At that point, someone broke in with new material that would have to be read on the air. In a few minutes, the announcer on duty, Vladimir Kostylev, would be alone with millions of listeners. For eight years now, I have heard his voice on the radio, and thought he was an elderly gentleman. But the man $I$ ret was young and energetic. "What you need at Mayak is a friendly voice and an air of confidence," he told me. "We're not here to read in a dispassionate manner. We have the right and every opportunity to express our feelings about the text."

During every 24 hour period Mayak broadcasts 59 news updates for all 11 time zones in the Soviet Union. Early in the morning there is the International Chronicle, the Pravda Political Observer's Commentary, summaries of news, and in the evening, special programs for commors can be heard. Although Mayak will soon be 20 years old, many of the original staff members are still here. Does Mayak ever change?
"The program changes just as we change," remarked Nina Skalova, deputy editor in chief. "The arrangement of broadcasts is different now, with the most important information aired in the morning. The treatment of the material has also changed. It's our aim to give our listening audience a sense of participating directly in events." This interview came to an abrupt end when Skalova had to look through material for a new broadcast without further delay. (Obtained from a March, 1984 Soviet Life article by Tatyana Basova. "Our QSL card is standard size, negotiated through international agreement. It fits into an international-size envelope, like the one you just opened. Since the U.S. has decided not to adhere to the international system of weights and measurements, our QSL would not fit into your standard size envelope. Your problem is one which is shared by many listeners." Aha: So that's why London Calling may be so long and all sorts of skeds don't fit into a 3 -ring binder and so on.......Thanks to RCI's friendly followup to a puzzle. Part Two in a Series: Communcations in Mauritius: In August, we discussed advances made in television broadcasting. This time, we are going to examine the radio services on the island.

Much of the programming on the MBC is produced locally but some special entertainment and educational programs are obtained from sister broadcasting organizations, networks, and producing companies. These include well known serials, dramas, musical entertainment, and the like.

It is the duty of the program section to ensure that a fairly balanced output is maintained on radio to serve the Corporation's important objectives and to meet the varied audience needs and preferences.

Events of national importance are covered live on radio and, on special occasions, even international events are brought live to the listeners in Mauritius through communication-satellite-linked international relays. Important cultural, religious and sporting manifestations are also covered via microwave. The MBC has been encouraging public participation programs like song competitions, quizzes, and community action programs to stimulate mass interest and involvement.

Keeping in mind the fact that a large section of the public speaks oriental languages like Hindi, Urdu, Tamil, Telegu, Gujrati, Marathi and Chinese, the MBC program schedules specially feature several programs in these languages. Such programs emphasize the cultural heritage and richness of each ethnic group.

The Corporation has a special staff of producers and presenters competent in the various languages and also draws upon a panel of free-lance contributors for various types of programs. The MBC allows for compercials on its broadcast services. Besides spot advertising, sponsored programs are also put out. But care is taken that program interests are not adversely affected. (Tks to the MBC for helping make this series possible. We'll continue our discussion next month. ds.)

In July DXM, we carried an article concerning an experimental station in New South Wales, Australia, VL2UV on 1692 kHz . At 500 watts, we noted that this station would be an exceptional catch. Through member Richard D'Angelo-PA we are informed that the station has been heard in North America. The following is an excerpt from Glenn Hawser's Listener's Notebook:
"During a EXpedition to Seven Mile Flats, Alberta, 70 km SW of Rocky Mountain House, using a kilofoot beverage, VL2UV, University of NSW, Sydney, was hrd on $1692 \mathrm{kHz}, 16 / 50912$, good ID 0957; 1000 lecture/discussion pga; still in at SIO 242 at 1030, virtually gone by 1100; again 17/5 but no audio." So, that just goes to prove that almost anything can happen on shortwave. By the way, congratulations to Don Moman, who made this extraordinary catch! ids.

DXM Receiver Review: RF-B600. By: Jeff Elson-MO: The following represents my view of the RF-B600. I also own an R-2000 and an ICF-2002, so most comments reflect a comparison to them. Features: Keypad and knob tuning, 9 memory channels, 5 kHz up/down freq. slewing, white flourescent digital display; signal/battery meter, meter light on/off, display on/off, $1 \mathrm{kHz} /$ 100 hz tuning speeds, bass and treble controls, freq. lock, RF gain contron, memory scan and band scanning, $F M, S W, M W$, and $L W$ coverage; earphone, headphone, record, receiver mute jacks; internal battery and exeternal 12 v and AC power capability, antenna coaxial and clip connectors, telescopic antenna, carrying handle, stand-up bail, switchable noise planger, wide/narrow AM filters, $3 \frac{1}{2}$ in. speaker; weight 10 lbs .2 .3 oz , size $1413 / 16^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{W} \times 413 / 16^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{H} \times 1 \frac{1}{2}^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{D}$.

The $\mathrm{RF}-\mathrm{B} 600$ is a dual conversion, synthesized, general coverage rectiven in the $\mathrm{R}-1000$ and $\mathrm{R}-2000$ class. It offers AM, LSB and USB continuous tuning from LW through 30 MHz . Selectivity, sensitivity and stability are very good. I have noticed no drifting after months of extensive use.

The main advantages of the B600 over the R-2000 are: RF gain control, keypad tuning, multiple scan capability; simple portable operation using 8 "D" cells and separate bass and treble controls. The main disadvantagees of the B600 relative to the R-2000 are: high impact plastic cabinet, to clock, no provision for CW crystal filter, small speaker and smaller controll knobs and buttons.

The B600 is packed with convenient operational features. Perhaps the most enjoyable is the 4 way scan capability. By pressing a key one may program the 8600 to: scan up and down in 5 kHz steps until a station is found and stop, scan until a station is found and hold for approx. 2.5 sec. then resume (like the ICF-2002), manually step through a band in 5 k 位 steps by pressing the "up" or "down" key, or scanning of the preset frequencies contained in the 9 memory channels. All scan functions may be interrupted by pressing the "stop" key. Scanning does not function within the $L \mathcal{W}, \mathrm{MN}$ or FM bands.

The only complaint I have about the scanning feature is that the scan operates over only a 300 kHz range from the tarting freq., ie. 150 kHz above and below the starting frequency. Since most SW bands exceed 300 kHz this can be a nuisance. Perhaps an example will further illustrate this point. Assume a starting freq. of 5000 kHz . If the "up" key is pressed the receiver will scan up to 5150 kHz then abruptly jump to 4850 kHz ( $5000 \mathrm{mi}-$ nus 150 kHz ), scan to 5150 kHz and repeat the process. CLARIFICATION ON RECENT 2-PART ANTELNA ARTICLE..... Those interested in constructing the antenna project Neal perdue showed in the July \& August SPEEDX should make the following corrections. Part l, July SPEEDX, Page 7, (2) The last sentence of this paragraph means that the antenna iss brought close to a ground rod, the antenna is soldered to the coax center-conductor at the rod and the shield is combed and attached to the rod. THEN, the coax is fed to the rx. Part 2, August SPFEDX, Page 8, (b) The Del ta Loop is fed to the tuner or rx in the following manner: The combed coax shield is attached to the bottom leg of the antenna and the center conductor is attached to either of the semi-vertical legs at the lower corner. All three legs must be equal in length. Page 8, 9(C) Addendum: Perhaps the worst part of the possible damage to modern microchip receivers from static buildup is that the rig won't necessarily "blow-up" but the damage can be insidious. That is, deterioration of performance can occur gradually over a long period of time and unless you have another rx with which to compare, you can think "Conditions are poor lately". Indeed they are - in your rx! (Neal Perdue, AL)

KOL ISRAEL GOES BACK IN TIME. Kol Israel announced it was going back to standard time effective August 25 th. All Kol Israel transmissions (International) in terms of UTC move back by one hour. (Ralf Munster, GA)

EASTERN EUROPE AND THE GAMES. It is 5 a.m. in beautiful sowntown Budapest, Hungary. The morning drivetime DJ for Radio Free Europe, broadcasting from Munich 350 miles to the northwest, interrupts a Barry Manilow tune and cuts to..."Gyula Borbandi in Los Angles!" Eungarian sports reporter Borbandi and five other Radio Free Europe sportscasters have been delivering $20-22$ live reports a day in seven languages to their native East-bloc nations since the 1984 Summer Games began a week ago. Thanks to the Soviet boycott and blackout of the Los Angles Gänes, reports from RFE reporters are the only regular live updates that are able to be heard of the LA Games in the Eastern bloc. RFE said that Romania's Radio Eucharest has a contingent covering the Games here, but that Radio Moscow and the other Marsam Pact nations' broadcast entities are unpresented. IMPROVED HIGG FREQUENCY RADIOS. U.S. troops will be able to communicate reliably at extended ranges with a new family of high-frequency tatical radios. Three versions of the improved high frequency radios (IHFR) will operate beyond normal line-of-sight and over rough tettain, including desert, mountain and jungle environments. The radio family is an advanced design that combines, totally automatic turing with high performance in a rugged lightweight package. Units are constructed in modiles, which permits rapid troubleshooting and repair and allows for improvements to be added as new technolegy is developed. One radio is a 20 -watt Manpack unit (AN/PRC-104) that is carried on a solider's back. The second is a 20 -watt radio (AN/GRC-213) deployed on vehicles. The third is a 400 -watt high-power mobile command radio that provides communications over longer ranges. Hughes produces the radios for the U.S. Army. (Hughes...Al Smith, WY)

EMERGENCY: Broadcast involving TMI was a test. A communications tést pretending there was a radiation leak at Three Mile Island apparently upset a number of emergency band listeners. The broadcast over the Dauphin County (PA) emergency channel told of 600 millirems of radiation at the source and the need for everyone within two miles to be under shelter. Civil Defense officials in York County said they were advised in advance of the test, billed as a "Unit One Drill" but called TMI just to make sure it was a test. They said the radio test was part of a full scale drill in Dauphin County under the direction of the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency. Local officials said they received a number of calls from people who wanted to make sure the "emergency" was not real. (A clipping taken from the York Dispatch...ed.) (TMI uses a number of shortwave frequencies which provide for interesting listening. ed.)

Mr. Weinberger was the first foreign official to appear on "It's Your World", a program in which callers phone in questions to be answered by the guest. The program is broadcast worldwide by the British Broadcasting Corporation. (New York Times... Ruth Hesch, NY)

WORK RESUMES ON PROJECT ELF. The United States District Court of Appeals has overturned the injunction filed by environmentalist in Michigan to stop the US Navy from installing a hugh antenna system which would allow commumications with submerged submarines worl'dwide on the extremely low" frequency of 76 Hz . The Navy is now resuming the installation of the wire array strung on 55 foot poles along a 100 foot wide, F-shaped corridor in Marquette and Dickinson counties. (Monitoring Times...Bob Skwirsk, MI)

CUBA VOWS REPRISALS OVER RADIO BROADCASTS! Charging another act of US aggression, Cuba has vowed to respond with powerful counterbroadcasts when the Reagan administration ${ }^{3}$ begins beaming anti-Castro messages to Havana over Radio Marti. "We are preparing to respond at the level of the aggression," said Vice President Carlos Rafael Rodriguez. His comments raised the possibility of multiwatt Cuban broadcasts toward the United States with enough signal strength to cause interference to stations from Florida to the midwest. (David Claytor, OH from the Cincinnati Enquirer)

CUBBANS SEEM SKEPTICAL ON RADIO MARTI'S AIMS. In a speech broadcast to Cuba over the Voice of America early this year, President Reagan said the object of Radio Marti will be to provide news simple and straightforward, telling the truth to the Cubian people about cuba. Many cubans interviewed belived that the station would create anxiety and uncertainty because it would probaly transmit, "a lot of lies". Many felt it was simply an anti-Castro station. (New Yorir Times, Julian Kratter)

TWO, WAYS TO HEAR THE CHATTER FROM SPACE \& ONE IS FREE! While thousands of Americans will pay 50 cents o'r more for a telephone call to hear the shuttie austronauts, thousands. of others will be able to eavedrop for free. Amateur radio clubs around the country are relaying shuttle-chatter on ham frequencies that can be monitored not only on amateur equipment but on shortwave receivers and popular police band scanners, accordint to Peter (Didel, a spokesman from the American Radio Relay League, which represents many ham operaters. The Anerican Telephone \& Telegraph Company is azain effering it!s "Dial-A-Shuttle" service, "harging 50 cents for the first minute of conversation between Mission Control in Houston and the shuttle Challenger. Fach additional minute will cost 354. Callers in the Tuited States can listen in by dialing (900) 410-6272. People hoping to take advantage of the free amateur radio retransmissions will have to hunt the correct frequencies. The Goddard Anateur Eadio Club in Greenbelt, Ma., is relaying shuttle communications on as many as three of the following frequencies: $3860 \mathrm{KHz}, 7185 \mathrm{KHz}, 14295 \mathrm{KHz}, 21390 \mathrm{KHz}$ and 28650 KHz . (New York Times....Mendez, NJ)

ZUSSIAN HOODPEGKER TO GFT A MATE. The United States Air Force is preparing to build two powerful radar installations on the Zast and Yest coasts and it plans to build a third on the Gulf coast. These installations, to be built by General Electric Co., will use the so-called over-the-horizon radar systems, which bounce beams off the ionosphere and back down to earth. How there's an announcement to make the radio hams of the world break out in a cold sweat, imagininf that the "Russian wöødpecker" may be about to get a mate. The Russian woodpecker is a Soviet över-the-horizon radar signal that chatters up and down the shortwave spectrum disregarding international acreements that go back to 1906 and were desiened to avoid interference that threatened the safety of life on the sea and later in the air. To the radio hams as well as the other users of the shortwave spectrum for international communications, the "woodpecker" sounds like a bird rapping on an old barn or perhavs a wood lath being pulled across a picket fence. More familiar forms of radar operate at microwave frequencies that penetrate the ionsphere and continue into space without following the earth's curvature, making them useless for long distance surveillance; hence the assignment of the Pussian radar to the high frequency bands. The woodpecker has been raising hoö with"amateur long distance reeeption at least as far back as 1978, when Harry J. Dannals, tyen president of the American Radio Relay League, the hams national society, expresséd concern over the Air Force building an Anerican version of the woodpecker at Hanscom Air Force Base in Maine. The installation was to have 21 transmitters usiff frequencies from " 5 to 30 mHz . Seven transmitters each with an output of 100 kilowatts would be on the air at one time. Mr. Dannals wrote a letter to Sen. Sarry Goldwater; a rađio ham, who was assured by the fir Force that there would be "no significan't signal transmítted....in the amateur radio frequency bands... The ERS transmitters have been built and tested to very stringent specifications that have virtually efiminated out-ofband interference...the highest ampli゙tude of any hormonic interference would be...less than fout watts." Four watts will travel great distances when conditions are right, but there seems to have been no great fuss over problems with the American experimental installation on thich the new radars will be based. The hams may properly wish that the Air Force would pass the blueprintis along to the Russians. Their Siberian installation, which keeps a check on the U.S. aircraft and ships, operate in total disregarid of the users of the air dispite international agreements. The problem has been acute in Alaska and Japan. The Japanese are responding by building a new two thousand dollar ham transeiver with a built-in noise blanker to rid the woopecker. (Well street Journal...Clay Harada, CA)

CLANDESTINE RADIO ATMED AT CHINA. When President Reagan arrived in China, a radio station broadcasting in Chinese likened his visit to "the weasel going to pay his respects to the hen," an old Chinese proverb for treachery. It's broadcast the next day, taking note of Mr. Reagan's smile, warned that "a smiling tiger is the most treacherous." Another broadcast the third day lamented that the Chinese leaders failed to understand the danger of receiving an anti-communist like Mr. Reagan to Hitler. All the broadcasts came from a station caling itself "August First Radio," after the day the People's Liberation Army was founded in China and purporting to speak for disgruntled elements of the Chinese Armed Forces. In fact, its broadcasts have been traced to the Soviet Union and are part of an effort to undermine the policies of Chima's leader, Deng Xiaoping. A monitoring service of the British Broadcasting Corp. discovered in October, 1982, that when the August First Radio failed to appear one day, its frequency carried Moscow Radio's domestic programming, Mayak". The station, first heard five years ago, is one of the many clandestine radio stations around the Chinese borders. Another station calling itself "The Voice of Democratic Kampuchea" has reported the successes of Peking-backed guerrillas fighting the Vietnamese in Cambodia. The station itself it belived to be based in southern China. A newer station called "Vietnam Resistance Radio" reports such resistance activities inside Vietnam as the assassination of a Soviet officer at Camranh Bay on March 28 th . Hanoi Radio has charged that its broadcast from Thailand. Since last year, other clandestine radio stations pretending to represent China's armed forces have gone on the air with criticisms of Peking. They use such names as "Radio Spark", Radio October Storm, "The Voice of the PLA" and "The Contingent of Proletariam Fighters." Some references to Nationalist ideology led to speculation that they come from Taiwan, but their signal has prompted theories that they are based in Vietnam. Western diplomats in China say they belive all the stations are Soviet operated. (New York Times...Hesch, NY, Cincinnati Enquiere...David Claytor, OH)

EXPANDED SHORTWAVE LIKELY TO POSE PROBLEMS: It's the voice of democracy in many nations, the only means of lomgdistance comunication in some underdeveloped countries and the source of the news, sporting events and just plain talk for millions of people around the globe. But because of the popularity of shortwave radio, its high-frequency broadcasts are in danger of crowding themselves off the air. In February, 115 nations agreed at the United Nations International Telecommunications Conference to changes that will expand shortwave's capacity-but eventually make existing wquipment obsolete. And no direct action was taken on the problem of jamming by govermments to block Western programs from their countries. No one knows exactly how many people listem to shortwave broadcasts, which can travel thousands of miles as the signal skips off the ionosphere. Richard Butler, secretary general of the International Telecommunications Union, said in January that more than 1,600 transmitters broadcast 25,000 hours of programs each day. Leonard Marks, a Washington attorney who led the U.S. delegation to the UN conference, estimated that the shortwave changes will effect at least 100 million listeners, many in Third World countries and Eastern Europe, Meeting in Geneva, Switzerland, the delegates to the ITU voted to convert the world standard for $S W$ broadcasts from the current double-sideband transmissions to single-sideband. Communications specialists say the change, for which the Third World nations lobbied heavily, will provide about one-third more broadcasting channels than are now available. The change over will take place over a 20 year period. (San Francisco Chronicle...Clay Harada, CA)

AT FADIO TREF EUROPE, A FEW CHANGES OF PACE. After years of entrenchment and sels-efsacement, which followed the disclosure in the early 1970's of the Central Intelligence Agency financing, Radio Free Jurope and Radio Liberty are being strengthened and expanded by the Reagan administration. Reflecta $\$ 21.3$ million supplemental appropriation by Congress, the once-ramshackled, barracks-like headquarters of the twin radio station is being refurbished. Three correspondants have been sent to Afghanistan to get radio interviews with Soviet defectors, and a full time office will soon be opened in Pakistan to monitor the war. A new correspondent will be based in Hong Kong to keep tabs on Soviet moves in the Pacific. There is a buildup in the sections dealing with the languages spoken by the Islamic empire. The changes appear to have bolstered morale among many of the stations' 1,674 polyglot staffers who broadcast in 21 languages to the Soviet Union and its European allies. But for others, the advent of a conservative, ideologically activist manasement closely tied to the Reagan administration has caused concern that the stations are losing their political autonomy and professionalism. The trouble saga of the radio stations, which were set up in the early 1950 's took a new turn two years ago when Senator Claiborne Pell, Democrat of Rhode Island, pushed through a law designed to make the two radio stations responsible to the semiautonomous Board for International Broadcasting in washington. The Pell amendment turned out to give the ?ieagan administration a firmer hold on the station. Erank Shakespeare, chairman of the broadcasting board, also became chairman of the two radio stations, and James T. Buckley, the former New York Senator, was named president. George Bailey, an American who had worked for the ri-ght-wing Springer press group in !est Germany, became the head of Radio liberty, which broadcasts soley to the Soviet Union. To lead Radio Eree Europe, which beams its programs to Eastern Europe, the board selected George R. Urban, a longtime British radio broadcaster of Hungarian extraction. Like Mr. Bailey, Mr. Jrban had no significant managerial experience. one of Mr. Sailey's first innovations was to remove the American supervisors who had traditionally watched over the copy broadcast to the Soviet Union. "It has to be an Jzbek who has to decide what Uzbeks want to hear and not a sunburned American from Iowa," "r. Bailey said. He also abolished a daily news budget analysis that had recommended some items for broadcast and classified others as "background information only." The Bailey changes were popular with the newly promoted Soviet-born desk editor, who for years had chafed under what one called the semicolonial tutelage of their American supervisors. Some of the sharpest in-house criticism of Madio İiberty comes from Eastern European emigres at ?adio Free Furope, who privately air views of "backward Yussians" that could be heard in tarsaw, Prague or Budapest. It's like handing over Zussia to Solzhenitsyn one aghast Fastern Furopean staffer said. Nr. Buckley said the innovations had "increased the self-confidence" of some services. "Has there been a change of tone?" he asked. "Certainly not at my instigation." "In our broadcasts, we let the Soviet Union speak for itself," he continued, when asked whether President Reagan's "empire of evil" statement had reached Hunich. (New York Times...Ruth Hesch, NY)

Do any of you remember the columof Sandy's where he mentioned the CW interface for the Timex. Sinclair? It was a kit to be built from scratch and plugged into the back of the Timex and along with the proper software it would print out CW onto the screen. I built this kit and am still using it with the Timex to receive CN. The kit cost about $\$ 30$ to build and works fairly well. You must have a good receiver with excellent frequency stability. I use a $D X-300$ and it is not quite stable enough to stay on frequency all the time. If someone walks in the room or fans air on the receiver it drifts off freq a bit and you lose the copy. Also unless the receiver has been on for a few hours the oscillator drifts just enough to require constant tuning of the receiver via the fine tuning control. If you would like more information on this send me a note and I will tell you where you can obtain info on it.

CPBS-1 has a preference for NEWS which runs from 2000-1730 UTC( 4 AM to 1:30 PM Bei,jing time). CPBS-2 offers more feature programs from 2100-1600 UTC(5 AM-Midnight local Beijing time)."

ECUADOR...HCJB had its "Open Line to the World" phone-in shows on August 17-18. All four shows were different, and your editor was able to hear one of the programs--the one at 0530 UTC. Caller No. 1 was Jim Conrad of IA. Later in the broadcast, I decided to get into the act. It was my first experience at participating in an international shortwave phone-in and what an experience! Despite a clear connection, I was able to hear everything I said repeated with a one-second delay at the other end. To say that this "echo effect" was distracting was an understatement. However, I had a good chat with Host Ken Maciarg and DX PARTY IINE'S John Beck. Since I was calling late at night and got the direct dial rate, the five-minute phone call cost less that $\$ 5.00$--quite a bargain, Mr. Watson!........A few minutes after I had completed my call, a call came into the program from a gentleman in Mexico City. Several months ago, you will remember I mentioned that a certain style QSL card used by African stations that were former french colonies were called OCORA cards. To answer the contest correctly, all ane had to due was tell me what OCORA stood for. Easy, right.

Well, after increasing the stakes to a $\$ 10.00 \mathrm{Gift}$ Certificate to Gilfer as the prize I received several entries and one of them was correct.

The winner is David Robertson of Spokane, Washington. The correct answer is Office de Cooperation Radiophonique Africaīne. This was set up by the $\bar{F}_{\text {rench }}$ to help the newly independent nations with their radio stations. The OCORA then issued QSL cards for all of the stations which needed them. They all had the same map of Africa on the front with a dot for each capital. Each station had its own name on the front but the reverse was identical.

These cards were issued during the 1960s and were still being used into the early 70 s . I know of no country which currently uses this design.

Dave Robertson-WA has passed along some followup information on his "Unidentifieds" listed in the June $84 \mathrm{~A} / \mathrm{O}$ column:

6348 kHz : Pegey thompson told Dave that a Korean friend of hers says this ${ }^{\boldsymbol{\lambda}} \mathrm{a}$. Korean regional, possibly transmitting from Seoul.
7185 kHz : Dave gave a recording of this transmission to Joe Talbot-ALB, who passed it to an Asian friend. The station was IDed as a Chinese clandestine named "Song of Liberation". "Shen Da Yi" loosely translates as "Attention Please". The announcer is a "leader" who subtly denigrates the Chinese Army. According to Joe's friend, the reported NA is actually the "Internationale". Dave heard the same type of broadcast on 3 June 84 and has a recording available for any interested listener (addr: N. 4208 Calispel Spokane, WA 99205). He wishes to know if anyone else has heard this station. Maybe someone who subscribes to the Clandestine Confidential newsletter could help Dave.
Thank you Dave, Peggy, and Joe for this information. Special thanks also go out this month to Koji Yamada-JP who was kind enough to send me recordings of $R$. Tanpa's relay of R. Canada Intl's JJ pgm on 9595 kHz , FEN (of AFRTS) on 6155 kHz , and R. Korea's test transmissions on 13670 kHz . The latter's tests were beamed to the NE and Africa during July, and were heard daily in Japan at a 555 level.

AFGHANISTAN: Voice of the United Muslim Fighters of Afghanistan: This station which bcsts material hostile to the govt of Afghanistan is currently heard at 1500 to 1600 on 15050 kHz in parallel with 11630 kHz .
IKAN: Radio Iran Tollers: 0330-0400, 1600-1630, 1630-1700 (rpt xmsn) all on 6230 kHz and all in the Persian lang. Hostile to the Govts of Iran and USA, and supports the Iranian Tudeh Party. This station was first heard on 7 July 84, however it may have been in existence for some months. It is believed to operate from the same xintr which carries the $R$. Afghanistan 2nd Pgn for minority-language speakers. Announces a postal addr. of P.0. Box 49034, 10028-Stockholm, Sweden-the same addr. as that used by "R. Iran Courier" (Radyo-ye Peyk-e Iran) which closed down on 30 Nov. 1976.

ISRAEL: The newspaper "Ha'olam Haze" reported on 25 July 84 that a group of ME businessmen was secretly developing plans to set up a radio station which would be operated from a ship off Tel Aviv. The name for the proposed station was the "Voice of the Orient". Probably unrelated is a report by Juan Carlos Codina on the 12 Aug. 84 bcst of "SWL Digest" of a presumed Israeli station heard at 2200 on 6565 USB.
Editor's Note: Rumour has it that the World Broadcasting Information (WBI) is to cease publication as of June 1985. The BBC Monitoring Service which publishes the information states increasing costs as the reason. I for one will be sad to see this excellent source of SW info be discontinued. Jsually the first reports of a new SW station or relay can be found in the pages of the WBI. It is also a very good source for info on Clandestine stations. Let's hope this is Just another "R. New Zealand to cease SW bcsts" type of rumour and publication continues. RBT

Richards, who began his regular broadcasts in 1930. Orginally heard in CA. over one station, it is now heard worldwide with the program, "Voice of Prophecy".
