



Part Two: Shortwave Shootout; The airwaves have become so crowded that International conferences have been convened in recent years to try towork out a fair system. An engineering expert says the whole plan may co lapse. "Short-wave radio these days is like being at a crowded party where one who shouts loudest gets heard," says Richard Measham, chief monitor for

the BBC Monitoring Service. The Soviets are the largest, broadcasting in 84 languages 2,174 hours a week at an estimated cost of \$750 millon a year. That figure, contained in a 1982 CIA report to Congress on propaganda costs, includes clandestine In a 1902 GIA report to congress on propaganda costs, includes clandestine stations the Soviets run. The U.S. is the second largest broadcaster, with 2,017 hours at a cost of just over \$250 million. The official government station is the VOA, a part of the U.S. Information Agency. It broadcasts worldwide 990 hours a week in 42 languages and is mandated to give an ac-curate picture of American life, warts and all. It was founded on Feb. 24, 1942, J9 days after Pearl Harbor, and its first broadcast promised it wou-ld give the news both good and bed ld give the news, both good and bad.

Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty, now under the auspices of the Board of International Broadcasting, are younger than the Voice. RFE began in 1950, and R. Liberation, as it was called then, began in 1953, both sup-ported by the CIA. They were formally separated from the agency in the early '70s, but the Soviets still accuse them of being the voice of the CIA. Radio Free Europe, broadcasting to five East European countries, and Radio Liberty, broadcasting throughout the Soviet Union, are supported by Congress, but think of themselves as surrogate stations for countries to whom they broadcast.

In Poland, for instance, 70% of the news is about Poland. The 1,600 staffers are mostly emigres, headquartered in Munich. "Radio Liberty is the voice of the conscience of Russia," says Gene Sosin, director of planning and programming for the Radios.


The U.S. also plans to launch Radio Marti, a Spanish language station on MW to be beamed to Cuba, whose government is less than enchanted by the prospect. Radio historians say the Germans first introduced jamming during World War I, but the Soviets are the greatest practitioners today. The Soviets try to block the broadcasts of Radio Free Europe, Radio Li-berty, VOA, BBC, Radio Beijing, Kol Israel, and Deutsche Welle, amon g

others, experts say. Radio Liberty has been constantly jammed since it went on the air in 1953 in Russian and the other languages spoken in the Soviet Union. The English broadcasts are not jammed. Kol Israel, which broadcasts to is the Soviet Union in Russian, Hebrew and Yiddish, jammed in all three languages, making Hebrew the only national language that is jammed by the Soviet Union. The Soviets also jam the VOA, but not as consistently as Radio Liberty. The Voice was jammed from 1948 to 1973. It had no interference from 1973 to 1980, but

the jamming resumed in August of 1980. In Eastern Europe, Poland jams the BBC, VOA, RFE and Deutschland Funk. Poland had pratically stopped jamming in the mid-'50s, and it was not re-sumed until the Solidarity movement began in 1980 and 1981. Polish gov't spokesman Jerzy Urban, in an interview with the Wall Street Journal, in-directly credited RFE with the success of the Solidarity movement. "The amount of discontent is still great, and trust in leaders is only growing very slowly," he said. "But extremist political tendencies have a small & shrinking roll. If you would close your Radio Free Europe, the underground

would completely cease to exist." Jamming is never completely effective for a variety of reasons. First of all, one frequency is deliberately left unjammed so the jammers can hear what the other side is saying. Secondly, there is a "twilight immunity." Due to the nature of shortwave, bouncing off the ionosphere, atmospheric conditions at dusk make it almost impossible to jam incoming signals. In addition, jamming does not have the range of broadcasting, so residents of a city can drive out into the surrounding countryside and pick up the incoming station. The VOA Voyager: The Voice of America has taken to the road with a new mobile production and air studio. The unti, dubbed the VOA Voyager, will travel throughout the country gathering regional

news for international broadcasts. The mobile studio is expected to be on the road for about 50 weeks out of the year. One of its first stops was Nashville, TN, for a live country music broadcast in EE and 11 other languages. The VOA can produce programs on board the Voyager in several ways. Programs can be broadcast live via telephone loop or satellite circuit to VOA headquarters, or edited on-site and shipped to Washington for la-ter use. The mobile facility is capable of broadcasting up to eight programs simultaneously.

(For soundproofing) An acoustic barrier to outside noise was provided by lining the walls that surround the vehicle's studio with a special lead shield. Acoustic absorption material was then added on the interior surfaces. The air conditioning system was also custom-designed to eliminate low-frequency rumble.

The VOA system is made up of a vast technical network that stretches across the country and around the world. VOA inventory includes: *Studios: 31 in Washington, DC; two in New York, one in Chicago, Los Angeles, and Miami.

*Domestic Transmitters: 34, located in Delano and Dixon, CA; Greenville,

NC; Marathon, FL; and Bethany, OH. *Overseas Transmitters: 77, located in England, West Germany, Greece, Liberia, Morocco, the Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Antigua & Botswana.

*Satellite Circuits: 18 commercial circuits are used to feed VOA overseas relay stations, which in turn beam programs on MW and SW to listeners in Europe, East Asia, and the Pacific. (Tax to El Presidente, John Traut-schold, for forwarding this from a March 1985 article in Broadcast Eng-ineering magazine. Hey John, I guess you read the column after all, hi!)

The Guide to North American Firste Activity-1984 Edition is finally ava-llable. There were over 500 pirste loggings in 1984, and they are listed and sorted in four ways: By frequency, time, date, and alphabetically. A fifth column shows the area of the U.S. where they were logged. Also presented are articles by several of the top pirate DX'ers in the U.S. It's available for \$6.95 directly from the publisher: Data/Radio, P.O. Bo x 46199, Baton Rouge, LA 70895-6199. Word has reached this desk of a new pirate station: While most hobby pi-rates do not usually make "public" announcements (and for good reason), we have been notified that KCPR, "Gateway Pirate Radio," will soon begin broadcasting from (they claim) the St. Louis area. They hope to broadcast once a week, on Sunday morning from 0030 CST/0630 UTC. Frequencies to be used include 1635 and 7460 kHz. One of the best ways is by having a display in a local library, or perhaps even giving a lecture in a local school. One may think writing to the editorial sec-tion of a newspaper is a good idea, but that's not always the case. No, writing the letter isn't a bad idea, but many newspapers are reluctant to give our hobby any publicity. SPEEDX'er Greg Jordan, in Gastonia, NC had the same problem with a Charlotternewspaper, that is, until one of the local news & talk stations began an FM simulcast. Greg then wrote in to the paper, first to express his disgust at the station format change, and second, to offer shortwave as an alternative. Keeping the local perspec-tive in mind when writing his letter, Greg soon received a positive re-sponse from the editorial editor. Perhaps more of you could do the same; it goes without saying, SPEEDX recently had favorable write-ups in news-papers in AZ and CT, and the response was very positive. CFCF-AM Montreal Combats Tailspin (Ed. note: This station operates CFCX shortwave, heard on 6005 kHz. ds.) Canada's oldest radio station, CFCF, has added yet another bizarre chapter to an already bizarre book with the rehiring of former sports talkshow host, the abrasive and bombastic Ted Tevan.

It was the firing of Tevan three years ago that sent CFCF into a rat-ings tailspin from which it has never recovered and which has resulted in the station having the lowest weekly cumulative numbers of any of Mon -treal's commercial EE-track AM outlets. True to unpredictable form, CFCF

treal's commercial EE-track AM outlets. True to unpredictable form, CFCF AM has signed Tevan on as a midday, non-sports talkshow host. However, in taking Tevan back, CFCF-AM released its most respected announcer. Dawe Fischer, a curious move which has left local media observers puzzled, es-pecially in light of the station's no-name, on-air lineup. Dave Middleton, CFCF's, fifth program director in the last 2½ years, admits CFCF's ratings are "horrible throughout the day," and that action is needed. Middleton has been given a free rein to breathe life into the beleagured outlet, long the sore, spot in the privately owned CFCF empire which includes the profitable CTV-TV outlet, Champlain Prods. and CF ca-ble TV. ble TV.

One of Middleton's greatest challenges will be to spruce up the CFCF-AM breakfast show, invariably in the ratings surveys basement of late. "Our morning show has sounded plastic," said a candid Middleton, with reference to morning man Kevin McGowan (the third morning man in the last 2½ years) and his crew.

Tevan fills a 10 AM to 2 PM slot, that, prior to Fisher, had been handled by seven various personalities. He comes from a 15-month stint at Montreal ethnic outlet CFMB-AM. Meanwhile, Ted Blackman, formerly a morning man and program director at CFCF during this tumultuous period, is. now doing morning sports at CJAD-AM with George Balcan, the number one English-track morning man in Montreal. 

(PUBLISHER'S NOTE: This year marks the fourtieth anniversary of Radio Canada International. The staff of SPEEDX congratulates the past and present RCI staff, and presents the following article in honor of the occasion. The information is from RCI's Ian McFarland, producer and host of the "SWL Digest." Here's to forty more years!)

On February 25, 1945, Canadian Prime Minister William Lyon MacKenzie King's voice rang out over the airwaves: "This evening marks the formal opening of Canada's International Broadcasting Service. The establishment of this service in Canada is of historic significance. It will serve both a national and international purpose; it will also bring Canada into closer contact with other countries." This marked the official launch of Canadian shortwave.

Now four decades later, Radio Canada International's 40th anniversary provides us an opportunity to look back on its origins and ahead to new challenges...

The history of Radio Canada International actually began when the Federal Cabinet authorized its creation by Order-In-Council in September of 1942.

Within a year of its inception, the Service began construction of two 50 kilowatt transmitters in Sackville, New Brunswick on the Atlantic coast. This site was chosen because the soil in the surrounding marshland provided an excellent reflective base for the transmission of shortwave signals. To this day, it serves as Radio Canada International's principal transmitting site.

On December 16, 1944, the first shortwave test transmission was successfully completed. A little more than a week later - on Christmas Day - the first news from home was transmitted to Canadian troops stationed in Europe.

The first decade from 1945 to 1955 saw rapid growth in the service. In addition to broadcasts in the original three languages - English, French, and German - programs were added in Czech, Slovak, Dutch, Spanish, Portuguese, Danish, Norwegian, Swedish, Finnish, Italian, Russian, Ukrainian, and Polish. The International Service was now heard throughout most of Eastern and Western Europe, the Caribbean, Latin America and Australasia.

In 1955, budgetary restrictions forced the CBC International Service to reconsider its priorities. As a result, five of its program languages - Danish, Swedish, Norwegian, Italian, and Dutch - were reduced to weekly broadcasts and Finnish was eliminated. Further budget cuts in 1961 caused the elimination of these five languages.

At the same time, however, the International Service continued to grow in other areas: in 1961, a daily service to Africa was introduced and in 1962, a third 50 kilowatt transmitter was installed in Sackville. The year 1964 marked the beginning of programming to the USA in English and French. In September 1967, an agreement was made with the BBC to relay RCI programs directed to Eastern Europe from the BBC's transmitter facilities at Daventry. England, thereby improving the sid quality to this important target area.

In 1972, the International Service was officially renamed Radio Canada International. That same year, work had begun on the installation of five 250 kilowatt transmitters and on the expansion of antenna capabilities in Sackville. Five years later, the project was completed. In 1973 an agreement was reached with Deutsche Welle, the shortwave service of the Federal Republic of Germany, for use of their transmitting facilities in Sines. Portugal to relay RCI's signal to Eastern Europe. In 1980, construction began on a new antenna array for the African service. This project was completed in 1984.

In 1977, program personnel were regrouped into five separate target

areas: Eastern Europe, Western Europe, Africa, the United States/Mexico, and Latin America. Because of budgetary restrictions, the Australasian service had to be discontinued.

A sixth target area, the Caribbean Basin, was added in 1982 with daily programming in English and French. In addition, since January 1983, these programs have been relayed on medium wave via Radio Antilles in Montserrat.

In the fall of 1983, RCI began transmitting in Japanese. Programs prepared by our Vancouver office are now fed weekly via satellite to Radio Tanpa in Tokyo for rebroadcast on shortwave in Japan.

In recognition of the growing strategic importance of the Pacific Rim, RUI this year launched a major initiative with the inaugural broadcast of "Canadian Journal," a weekly business-oriented program. Produced in Montreal, this English language program is transmitted via satellite for rebroadcast on Hong Kong Commercial Radio.

Today KCI offers a full range of Canadian news, commentary and information to millions of shortwave listeners in Eastern and Western Europe, the United States, Mexico, Central and South America, the Caribbean, Africa and the Middle East. These programs are broadcast in English and French as well as Russian, Ukrainian, Polish, Czech, Slovak, Hungarian, German, Spanish, Portuguese, and Japanese.

In addition, a topical disc and tape service offers collections of short feature items of varied content for insertion in magazine-tormat programs abroad. Material is specificially selected to appeal to a country or region and is currently available in English, French, and Japanese.

In acknowledgement of the growing number of Canadians who travel abroad. KUI was also mandated to provide "...more Canadian news and information in those areas already served under the primary objective of broadcasting to foreign audiences."

As a result, RCI now broadcasts information programs originating from the domestic network of the CBC (The World at Six, As It Happens, Sunday Morning and The House) as well as from 1a Societe Radio-Canada (Present, Radio;ournal and Le Magazine Economique). These programs are directed to the USA, Europe and the Caribbean. Programming for Canadians abroad is also produced by RCI's own staff.

Today, the policies of the Department of External Affairs form the basis for decisions on KUI target and language priorities. However, programming and editorial policies are wholly the responsibility of the UBC.

In 1976, Radio Canada International began to forge closer links with other international shortwave broadcasters. (ogether with Radio Sweden International, Radio Netherlands International and Swiss Radio International, RCI formed what has come to be known as the international Broadcasting Group of Four.

This year, RCI's obsolete 50 kilowatt transmitters in Sackville are being replaced by new 100 kilowatt units; a new studio is being added to La Fourelle, the headquarters of RCI in Montreal; and an agreement has been worked out with the BBC to replace the obsolete 100 kW transmitters in Daventry with modern 300 kW units to relay RCI broadcasts to Eastern Europe.

Although Radio Canada International is a small to medium-size broadcaster, surveys indicate that RCI is a dynamic organization that has an impact out of proportion to its resources. This has been attributed primarily to the credibility and objectivity of its news and programming and the warmth and professionalism of its on-air personalities.

Have you ever listened to WWV? No, I mean have you ever "really" listened to WWV? There's a wealth of information there. It may not be used by the average dxer but its very interesting. WWV operates on 2.5, 5, 10, 15, 8.20 mhz. They use three atomic clocks to provide the time of day, audio tones, and carrier frequencies. The frequencies of the oscillators at the stations are controlled to be within one part in 10 to the 12th power, (which is 1000 billion) of the NBS frequency standard located at Boulder,Colorado. The time at the stations is not quite as accurate. It is held to within a few microseconds of the atomic time scale. Remember though that a microsecond is one millionth of a second. So therefore no human ear could tell the difference.

The first second pulse of every minute is an 800 millisecond pulse of 1000 hz. The remaining second pulses are breif 5 millisecond pulses that simulate the ticking of a clock. All pulses occur at the beginning of each second. The 29th and 59th pulses are omitted.

Have you ever wondered why the audio from WWV is poor? If you have a good strong signal it is not too bad. But if your signal is weak the audio portion of the transmission must be listened to pretty closely. Each tick is preceded by 10 milliseconds of silence and followed by 25 milliseconds of silence. The total 40 millisecond protected zone around each seconds pulse interrupts the voice announcements. This causes only a small audio distortion but it does make a difference. The ticks have priority though and they must be received clearly.

I will give you a breif rundown on the broadcast format of WWV. The first minute of every hour is reserved for the station ID and address. The 8th, 9th, & 10th minutes are used to broadcast information on storms. This is where I first learned that hurricanes occur somewhere in the world all the time and not just at our hurricane season. The 16th minute is used to give updates on station maintenance and breif shutdowns. This can be valuable if you wish to log some of the time stations in other countries that are on the same frequency. During the 18th minute solar flux readings are broadcast to Keep you up to date on propagation that can be expected. On the 30th minute another station ID and address is given. On the 45th thru the 50th minute the audio tone is omitted and all you wear is the ticks. On all other minutes all you will hear is the audio tone and clicks.

What goes on behind the scenes during these other minutes when no voice announcements are heard? Technicians in labs all over the world are using the transmissions to make frequency measurements and set oscillators for everything from transmitters to medical equipment. The signal is also used to set frequency counters. A frequency counter is a device that (yes you guessed it) counts or measures frequency. It has a digital readout much like the readout on modern SW receivers, but is about 1000 times more accurate.

Time interval measurements are probably the most widely Known use for the signal because it is given every minute by an announcer. The signal is used for a great many other purposes most of which are too numerous and too technical to try to explain in this column. Remember though when you listen to the WWV signal that a lot of activity is going on behind the scenes.

THE SPEEDX AMATEUR RADIO NET IS ON THE AIR!

For the past couple of months a handful of us SPEEDX hams have been conducting an informal on-the-air roundtable net discussing shortwave radio topics. We now have the approval from SPEEDX pres John T. to make it the official SPEEDX net. Mark Johnson, N7DYS, Maxon Stouder KB6FYJ and myself N6LUU, gather on 7.260 every Monday (Sunday local) at 00:00 GMT. Topics discussed thus far have included numbers stations, mystery cw beacons and Soviet broadcasting.

It should be pointed out that this net is not a general broadcast but rather a series of station to station transmissions strictly adhereing to amateur radio regulations as put forth by the FCC. Hams do not have to be a member of SPEEDX to join in and we welcome all check-ins when the call is given. The airwaves are considered to be free (unless you're a cable tv company with a microwave downlink) and any swl can tune to our frequency to monitor the net activities.

Our present freq/time should provide good coverage to the western half of the U.S. and as the net grows we may have to move to a higher band for better cross country coverage if it really takes off.

Hopefully by the time you read this we will have printed up a very limited quantity of QSL cards with the SPEEDX logo that verifies participation in or monitoring of this net.

I received a significant amount of mail in response to my article on the numbers stations in the April T&T column. Some members wanted to know if it was on the level, others wanted more information and one former column editor, a numbers station expert, sent me a really nasty letter. For the most part it was an April Fool's story sent as humor to DX MONTAGE but somehow got rerouted to T&T. I thought the part at the end about "cw from the dead" would tip off readers to the parody but some took it too seriously. Gotchal APRIL FOOL!!!!

Ruth Hesch of White Plains, New York has some comments on her radio. "For an uncomplicated, easy to use receiver, my Kenwood R-1000 is excellent. It was modified by Radio West and this radio gives more than satisfactory performance. With the band switch having 1 Mhz intervals the frequency can be secured quickly. One thing I do not like is the speaker which is placed on the top of the set, so I have it hooked up to an external speaker facing forward."

Michael Schwartz, an American SPEEDX'er working in France sent me a trade show brochure describing Russian made shortwave radios.

The VEGA 326 features a built in cassette deck and AM/FM reception. The SALUTE 001 appears to be the high end unit with analog memory presets, narrow and broad filters and bass and treble controls.

The SELENA 217, like the MERIDIAN 237 are medium size portables with AM and FM modes and whip antennas. Several mini-portables such as the NEYWA 304, SIGNAL 304, VEGA 404 and the SOKOL 308 are advertised with similar features as the other models.

The thing that strikes you right away about these portable radios is the inclusion of the VLF band from 150 Khz to 500 Khz. Soviet broadcasters use this band for internal broadcast coverage so its probaly a safe assumption that the same models with Cryllic instead of English legends are sold within the USSR to our Russian DXing counterparts. It's hard to judge a radio by a brochure but taking into account the generally poor quality of Soviet made consumer goods I would not recommend rushing out to buy one, even if they could easily be purchased here in the good ol' USA.

REVIEW OF THE ICOM IC-R71A Part two

The owner's manual is complete with descriptions of the unit's operation, a schematic and instructions on how to install the options. The manual was obviously originally written in Japanese and translated into English with some errors in syntax requiring the average occidental to have to read it again to be sure, but this does not happen often.

My gripes are few and are far outweighed by the remarkable performance of this rig but they do deserve mention.

There is no antenna trimmer on the R71A which means you should use antennas cut for the frequency desired or use an antenna tuner. Don't get me wrong, this radio will pick up quite a few stations using a length of wire wrapped around a broomhandle, but to realize all the potential inherent in this radio you should use an antenna system of equal quality and careful design. The difference will amaze you.

The S meter is very stingy and only functions when the automatic gain control is turned on. Many times I have monitored signals of average strength, particularly on sideband, that are loud and clear but the meter barely moves. The squelch control that switches the tape recorder output seems shy to click on in the same manner and may be related.

The R71A I have as well as 3 out of the other 6 units I have played with locally seem to have an electronic clicking when the tuning dial is rotated. While not pronounced, it can be annoying and occurs mainly on the lower bands and seems to be related to the internal optical sensor that is used to detect tuning dial movement. ICOM was having some quality control problems on it's HF ham transceivers and the R-70 and hopefully the problems have been solved.

The RTTY mode provides what appears to be too narrow of a bandwith for consistently good copy on all shifts. 3 different commercial and military RTTY demodulators were tried and provided poor copy using this mode, but when using the USB or LSB modes instead, excellent copy was obtained.

Many who have seen or tried to use this radio get confused by all the controls, buttons and switches and like it's R-70 ancestor, the R-71A has been deemed by some as "difficult to learn to use". This is not so.

All these extras like the filters, noise blanket, passband, scanning, and notch filter can be turned on and adjusted or left completely off. Anyone can turn it on and get dx right away and later on tinker with these other things. However once you learn how to cancel out hertodyne from that rare 250 watt tropical station, salvage a weak signal from a jammer or wrap the woodpecker up in a noise blanket, you won't know how you ever managed to DX without them. At this point in time the retail is \$799, discounted by some mail order companies to as low as \$599. Is it worth it? Depends on how much time you spend in front of your current radio. For

Depends on how much time you spend in front of your current radio. For those who only listen to the BBC and Radio Australia a couple times a week and not much else, no, do something else with that money. This is not a rig that can be fully appreciated by the casual listener or neophyte.

But for the dedicated swl who spends an average of an hour a day or more glued to the radio, you've already gone through a couple of rigs and you're ready for something to get serious about the hobby with, then yes, it is well worth it. You get what you pay for.

The DXER'S DIRECTORY is now available from UNIVERSAL SHORTWAVE RADIO for \$4.95 + \$1.05 shipping. It lists over 850 swl hobbyists worldwide in both geographical and alphabetical format in addition to providing information on 100 radio clubs.

A great deal of information has been arriving at TNT along with many letters containing kind remarks about the column. Thankyou very much but the real credit belongs to you the readers of the column who contribute articles, tips and other information. We have a lot of material to bring to the attention of the readers, so let's begin.

One of the events that will go down in radio history will be the situation created when Alan Weiner and J.P. Ferraro fired up a 100 watt transmitter to enable the people of Yonkers, NY to hear local programming over their AM radios. Mr. Weiner secured a license from the FCC for an auxiliary station on the frequency of 1622 KHZ and began transmitting but the FCC soon ordered him to stop because the auxiliary station was not being used as a "production tool" with his other station, WOZI and WOZW, both located in Maine. A solution was found and KPF-941 returned to the air. The following is an interview I had with Mr. Weiner.

- Q. There have been many misunderstandings in the radio community concerning KPF-941. It is licensed as an auxiliary station. What is an auxiliary station?
- A. Auxilary stations are licensed to AM, FM, TV or network entities under part 74 of the FCC rules. Basically they are used in news gathering and program production in the field or from studio to studio. Auxiliary stations are a "production tool."
- Q. What is the purpose of KPF-941?
- A. KPF-941 was orginally set up to service the community of Yonkers, NY with non-commerical radio. Yonkers, a city of 200,000 does not have it's own local broadcast outlet, mainly due to its proximity to New York City. We felt that the rules were broad enough to allow us to broadcast directly to the public. However the FCC did not and ordered us off the air. We left the air on Nov. 28th of 1984 after 3 weeks of broadcasting. We returned to the air on March 4th of this year using KPF-941 as a "production tool" to produce programs for our stations, WOZI and WOZW in northern Maine. At present KPF-941 is not broadcasting directly to the public, however anyone can legally tune in to our 1622 KHZ transmissions. We tried to give Yonkers its first radio station, apparently the FCC did not see it in the
- Q. Where is KPF-941 located?
- A. KPF-941 is located in Yonkers, NY. The transmitter site overlooks the famous Hudson river.
- Q. What might be heard while monitoring KPF-941?
- A. If someone tunes in to KPF-941 om 1622 KHZ, they will hear programming being produced for broadcast over WOZI and WOZW in Maine.
- Q. What is the output power of the transmitter?
- A. KPF-941 runs 100 watts using a Western Electric Type 451 transmitter.



- Q. What type of antenna are you using at the auxiliary station?
- A. The antenna is a 40 foot vertical tower complete with a radial ground screen.
- Q. What other equipment is used at the auxiliary station?
- A. Other equipment includes turntables, a 12 channel audio production console. reel-to-reel master recorders, limiters, compressors, etc.
- Q. When might listeners expect to hear KPF-941 feeding programming to Monticello. Maine?
- A. Production times vary. Usually around 8 to 10 PM (local) we start putting together a program. Program time lasts two to four hours. At present we operate 4 or 5 times a week.
- Q. What are your plans for the future concerning KPF-941?
- A. Mario Biagg of New York is currently drafting a bill to be presented before congress to establish KPF-941 as a broadcasting station which will give Yonkers, NY it's <u>first</u> local station. Until then we will continue to produce programs for WOZI and WOZW in Maine, using KPF-941 as a production tool.
- Q. How may listeners obtain a QSL from KPF-941?
- A. We QSL all of our facilities. Correct reports should be sent to:

The January 18 edition of Media Network featured a review by Jonathon Marks of the new receiver from Sony, the ICF 2010 (or ICF 2001D outside North America). Their comments were detailed in the February *CIDX MESSENGER* (page 37). Since I now have one in my

BASIC FACTS and SPECIFICATIONS Coverage: AM 150 - 29,999.9 khz FM 76-108 mhz AIR 116-136 mhz. Built in antennas for all bands. 4 inch speaker, 380 mw of audio, .775 mv tape output (low level for "mic" input on recorder). 3 D cells (2 AA for computer memory) or 4.5 volts external power. Battery life should be 8 hours with standard 1.2 amp/hr D NiCads, considerably (30-40 hrs) longer with fresh alkalines. 32 memory channels, each will store frequency, mode and bandwidth. Keyboard plus tuning knob frequency input system. LCD readout to .1 khz. 4 digit 12/24 hour clock with 4 timers, each capable of selecting the frequency as well as on/off times. Versatile memory and band scanning functions, modes keypad selectable. Size is 288 x 159 x 52 mm (11.375 c 6.375 x 2.125) inches (w/h/d) which is very similar to the 2001. Weight is 1.7 kg, nearly 4 pounds.

Performance wise, the 2010 comes off as a very competent package. Readout to .1 khz, with stability to match, 32 memories and key pad tuning might make you think I was describing the ICOM R71! And in many ways, the 2010 is a more "portable" version of the R71. Many of the comparisons in this review are made with my R71.

Tuning the set is accomplished 3 ways. A very easy to use keypad - just hit the numbers, then EXECUTE and there you are. Slightly simpler than the R71 - no leading or trailing zeroes need be entered. Tenths of a khz entry is not allowed in the 2010, only a small complaint here. A manual tuning knob is also provided - two tuning steps (1 and 1 khz increments) are switch selectable. 50 khz / rev in fast, 5 in slow. Minimum steps are 100 hz with no provision for fine tuning (RTT) - this is a unfortunate situation, but with the special "sync" feature it becomes much less of an annoyance. More on that later. But for utility and ham listening it still is a shortcoming, especially if you have a CW/RTTY decoder - they may require unusually precise frequency resolvement.

The third way of tuning is via the 32 button (64 function) memory preset system. Each of the 32 presets will store frequency, mode and bandwidth (plus a "skip" feature). Each button (most of them, anyway) has a second function that is used to define scanning parameters, and can also take you to a preset band edge instantly. Example, hit shift and C1/41m and you'll be at 7.000.0 instantly, no matter where you were before. Hitting scan will then only scan that portion of the spectrum. Conventional upper and lower scan limits can also be defined. Key are provided for LW, MW, 120 thru 11 meters, FM and AIR. It may sound complex but it is very easy to use and requires an absolute minimum of keystrokes to accomplish a function. The 4×8 matrix of memory preset buttons is more versatile than the rotary stepper switch on the R71, since any memory may be selected in any order.

Other than the minimum 100 hz tuning steps - 10 hz may be a bit much to expect in a small portable, especially in this price range (to build a good spectrally pure 10 hz PLL is not a simple or cheap task - the R71 is probably the lowest priced set to have such a good PLL) but some form of fine tuning like the 2001 had, would be nice - the only other complaint is the noise the PLL makes as you tune. There's a popping sound as the PLL unlocks momentarily. The same noises are found in the R71 but they are much less

Sensitivity using the built in whip seemed to be low, however compared to other sets which I know to be at least of average sensitivity (Sony ICF 7600A, Panasonic RF 6300) it was almost identical. It should be significantly better than the 2002, which was insensitive. With an external input, it was very good, and kept up with the R71 on all frequencies above the BCB range. The R71 became the leader as the frequency decreased, but then my R71 is not "stock" - the front end has been modified for better MW performance.

Measured performance (HP606 RF generator) indicated that it could just detect a .06 microvolt signal at 9.5 mhz, and at 1000 khz sensitivity had fallen to 1 uv. Quite comparable to a stock R71, actually. The 10 LED S meter reads values of 1/1.5/2/2.5/3/5/10/25/50/80 uv (at 9.5 mhz) for the 1 thru 10 LEDS. Notice that the "9" LED is exactly 50 uv. At 1000 khz the meter started indicating at 20 uv with all values correspondingly higher. One nice feature with the antenna input - unlike almost any other portable - is that the external antenna plug, when inserted, cuts off all internal antennas. Not just the whip but even the LW/MW internal loops. Very nice for the DX'er who wishes to use an external directional loop (or FM/AIR directional beam system). Surprisingly, the shielding is very good too. With a dummy plug inserted to cut off the internal antennas, only faint audio from my locals could be heard. My locals are VERY local, by the way! My compliments to Sony for incorporating this into their design!

FM performance was only fair, in my opinion. It seemed reasonably sensitive (2 stations about 100 miles away came in fair) but it seemed on the verge of overloading as well. AIR band performance was poor - using only the telescopic whip the set received no audio on the local airport flight information frequencies, while my Radio Shack-PRO-30 handheld scanner was able to provide just barely readable audio. And I don't consider the PRO-30 to be above average in sensitivity.

Surprisingly, an external SW^bantean did not introduce severe overloading from my strong locals. At my DX'pedition site near Cooking Lake (still with strong locals but free from externally produced spurious signals) the 2010 suffered no more (or less) overloading than the R71, on the SW bands. MW held up quite well, but LW wasgawash with images. Here the problem is compounded by the already low sensitivity on this band. Still. LW is not that important to the majority of listeners, I'm sure. Onfortunately, it is important to me so the 2010 is not my dream LF receiver. And it only covers LF down to 150 khz. Overall it performed surprisingly well, better than any other portable with the exception of the much higher priced Sony CRF-1.

Selectivity is rather typical for a portable. The wide filter is w-i-d-e and provides good audio when conditions permit. The narrow filter is adequate in that it provides much relief from QRM but still allows quite respectable audio. Measurements I made indicated a wide value of $_{\rm B}$ 10 khz (16 at -50db) and a narrow value of 5 khz (8 khz at -50db). A third, narrower, choice for SSB would be useful. Using the 2010 in either USB or LSB while listening to a conventional AM signal is nearly totally unsatisfactory, since the 100Åz tuning steps are far too large to permit in phase tuning. However a small button labelled "sync" does the job very well and automatically. Tuning to the high side of the signal will cause it to lock onto the USB portion, and vice versa. As to whether it helps much it can reduce the impact of fades, and does allow you to choose the least interfered sideband with ease. But it also adds some background noise (a high frequency hiss), quite noticeable on weak signals. On some signals (ones with a lot of random fades and rather weak too) it adds another noise - a burbling sound. It's no doubt caused by a confused PLL circuit, wandering about looking for a signal to lock on. However sometimes the noise would stay even after the signal came back, turning off the sync and then turning it back on would get rid of the noise. Not unexpectedly, if there are two carriers present within the lock range of the circuit (typically +/- 400 hz), the circuit cannot choose between them. Tahiti on 15170.25 was producing a strong het this morning and the audio on the 2010 was hopeless, and without fine tuning there was no way to manually zero beat the signal. The R71 fared much better, as it should. Listening to RCI on 11945 at 2130 for the SWL Digest, which suffered severe splash from Gabon on 11940, the ICF2010 again fared worse than the R71. n j

A separate clock display (only 4 digit) is 12/24 hr selectable. It is also the heart of a useful timer function which allows you to program 4 "on" times, each of which selects a frequency stored in a particular memory channel. The tuning dial is used to set the clock times - both forward and reverse setting make it very easy to use.

Memory and band scanning are quite versatile but the scanner will only stop on relatively strong signals. It scans so quickly that weak signals are not even audible, and unlike the R71, there seems to be no adjustment to slow down the scan rate. On FM the scan consistently stops before, during and after a strong signal. You can scan several ways predefined "bands", user defined limits and all memory channels (you can program in a "skip" function too; and the set can either pause for 1.5 seconds on each strong signal or stop scanning altogether.

Audio_from the 4 inch speaker is certainly not in the "ghetto blaster" tradition, and bass²⁷ response is obviously lacking in such a small set. A 3 position tone control is provided. I would rate it to have good audio for the SWL but only fair for FM. Panasonics and other portables have better FM sound, possibly at the expense of their weak signal SW audio.

Overall, I quite enjoy the ease of using the 2010, and it makes an excellent companion for use with the R71, but when reception conditions get difficult it scon becomes obvious that there is nothing terribly exceptional about its ability. The "sync" feature does little 'to improve things. A narrower filter would certainly help matters, but I haven't checked out the inside of the set yet - there may very well be no room to do any experimenting with better filters. Grave-Yard Long-Wire


Graveyard listening is blessed with some stronger signals because of night power increases. An aid in receiving longer distances signals is the use of a longwire that can deliver more signal to your receiver. Most receivers have a low impedance input and more signal current is transferred when the end of your antenna and lead-in combination is a quarter wavelength. All you need do is make certain your longwire antenna and lead-in length is:

Total length = 234/Fin MHZ

A good compromise length for graveyarding would be about 1360 KHZ because lowest and highest graveyard frequency are 1230 and 1490. Hence:

Length in Feet = 234/136 = 172

Assume the lead-in to your house and to the radio antenna terminals is 37 feet. If so your antenna length should be about 135 (172-37) feet. When you don't have the stretch-out space neded, arrangement is shown. Works out easily if you use PVC piping masts. Stretch out as much as you can of course but if you Can't, you can still gain some in signal level as compared to a shorter antenna wire. You may wish to give it a try on the low-frequency tropical bands too.

A very active supporter of SPEEDX and a regular contributor to TNT is Ruth Hesch of New York. She freely shares her enthusiam with the membership with lots of loggings, articles, ideas, information, etc. Below you will find two excellent articles Ruth would like to share.

Not being a Ham I can only be an associate member of the International Mission Radio Association (IMRA) which is on 14280 kHz daily Monday through Saturday from 1900-20 GMT. As a SWLer I can be of service. Once in a while a phone patch is needed in NYC so I telephone a Ham friend living there that he is needed on the Net. Also, the address of HCJB was needed one day and none of them knew it. So I telephoned another friend who was on the Net that day with the information to give it over the air.

Their newsletter is sent to me and in the November-December 1984 issue was an item about one of the IMRA members, Mardy Picazo, HH5MV, the Director of Development for Radio 4VEH on 4930 kHz. It gives the information that the station is owned by the Evangelical Church of Haiti and receives some 20,000 letters each year.

Mr. Picazo produces the Spanish programs and is assisted by his wife Rachael, who is a script writer of Bibical dramas and disc jockey for programs of gospel music. He was born in Texas of Mexican parents.

The station broadcasts 17 hours daily. The principal parts of it are over 20 years old so sometimes there are difficulties in keeping it operating.

OMS International, formerly known as the Oriental Missionary Society, is the operator of 4VEH. This organization was founded in 1901 by two Chicago telegraphers. Their work began in Japan training native workers and establishing an indigenous Church. OMS is now involved on three continents and twelve countries.

New technology has affected the hobby of SWLing in recent years. Manufacturers have improved radios dramatically as to performance, size and price. Computers are making columns in the bulletins easier to write for the editors and those who send reports to them. The use of cassette recorders enable those who listen to DX and other programs to get full information rather than having to take quick and sometimes incomplete notes. New periodicals have started like Monitoring Times, Popular Communications and The Shortwave Guide to add general and specific information.

It seems though, there is one area that is not keeping pace with these advances. There is little publicity about the hobby. Those SWLers who are on High School and College staffs could bring portable radios to school and demonstrate to language and history teachers the value of listening to overseas broadcasts. Many of the youth of today have money for "boom boxes", casester players and records so a moderately priced SW radio is within their reach. Those in offices, factories, stores and outdoor work who have lunch with their fellow workers could bring in a radio and while listening to it would attract the interest of some of them.

I lend my first SW receiver, a portable, to acquaintances who were born in other countries so they can listen to programs in their first language. Almost all of them did not know SW radios exist in the U.S. LONGER TRANSMISSION COULD MEAN BETTER RECEPTION Betsy Robinson, TN

From my Radio Norway International schedules comes the following... Due to low solar activity the conditions for shortwave listening are at present very unfavorable and good frequencies hard to presict. For this reason listeners should also try transmissions beamed in the opposite direction, so-called long route reception. For example, transmissions beamed to South America (220/250) degrees may sometimes give better reception in the Far East than signals travelling the shortest route..... (30/50) degrees.

RAIDIO FEIRSTE LE TOSU LA PADRAIG Paul McKee, Ireland

On St. Patrick's Day the people of Helfast listening to 1000 KHZ were treated to programming in the Irish language. No, this was not provided by the BBC but from a pirate station operating inside Belfast calling itself RAIDIO FEIRSTE which translates to mean The Mouth Of The River. The station does have plans to expand its range in the future. HOW TO ID MEXICAN FROM CUBAN MW STATIONS Carl Huffaker, Mexico

Musically, it is difficult since both types of music are popular. There are many differences in common words, but radio in both countries use a more educated language with very little of the common idion. At 10:00 to 11:00 P.M. Sundays (local time) almost all Mexican stations carry "La Hora de Mexico". It's a good time to check the MW dial. On the regular programming, check for commericals. If they seem endless, suspect XE. Cuba is not a constomer oriented ecenomy. There's few chaims (networks) in Mexico so the stations all have different slogans instead of calls. The WRTH list is accurate for the most part. The Cubans use the name of the chain. Not many use call letters in either country.





Carl Huffaker sends us this: "The Japanese "Radio Nuevo Mundo' has an interesting section, the canned identification taxes. They...are mostly s/on taxes. It might be an idea to start a list of canned ID tapes and s/offs for...the evening transmissions." Carl brings up a good point. Just like here in the States, Latin stations use taped s/on and s/off announcements, so if you tuned in at either the beginning of ending of a broadcast every day, you should be hearing the same thing.





The Voice of the Libyan People, also a clandestine, on 15040, has not been heard here in a while. Interestingly enough, the "siren" jamming often heard cochannel, is no longer present. Here's something unusual . . . a new broadcast from the FPLA has been heard early mornings (1300 or so, the time is variable) on approx. 9600v, with broadcasts in AA and EE. Announcements clearly mention this is an FPLA broadcast, but a bona fide station ID is never given. Good strength of broadcasts seem to indicate a possible transmitter site in Libya.



I erred in the April issue on RTTY log 18047 khz, KVV 21 Chicago which should be labelled Consulate instead of Embassy. Robert Margolis submitted it correctly but I botched the entry.

Has anyone got a confirmation of the identity of 72JKL? The controversy is about whether or not it is Spanish Naval Radio. Anyone got a QSL?

With this issue I started using my new Kaypro 16 computer with 10MB hard disk and dBASE III database manager. I have written software to automatically lookup the callsign in a callsign database and return with the city, ident, and country. New calls are added to the list automatically, and the log is automatically classed by the headings I use for the column; North America, RTTY, etc.

A question has come about the numbers section, and why the date is presented first. My reasoning behind this is that popular opinion holds that the numbers stations broadcast in a Date-Time-Frequency cycle, and I chose to present the information in that format. If this is a problem, I'll change it if enough of you let me know.

A reminder and a plea: <u>PLEASE</u> use the standard log forms and <u>PLEASE</u> cut them into strips, left more logs in a month than most editors get in a quarter. With this kind of volume, those of you who do not use the forms (or facsimiles) or do not cut your logs into strips will available from the Business Manager; see the back page for the address. It will only take you a few minutes to cut your logs, but it can take me hours to chop up or transcribe several dozen sheets of paper. I will not continue to be so generous. Be warned.

Next month I hope to have enough room to start listing the corrections you have provided and answer some of the questions you have been asking. Until then, 73.....

Every now and then I'll be scanning one of the major SWBC bands and hear it cluttered from end to end with awful-sounding spurs from a sole Radio Havana Cuba transmitter, usu ally smack mid-band. This seems to be just one transmitter causing the garbage, and it's in use almost around-the-clock on one band or another. Now we've all heard some nasty hum and sideband splatter from RHC... it seems to be part of their programming philosophy... but this QRM is intense and quite unnecessary. The question is, 'am I the only member hearing this slop and grinding my teeth? I never hear anyone else even so much ás mention this menace; maybé[†] we believe it'll just go away and why bother! Well, it's been happening, to my knowledge, since late last year, and it's not my receiver's problem... the FCC monitoring station has also noted it.

Now, members who are avid DX'ers or casual SWL'ers know too well that there's enough frequency pollution in the SWBC bands to last

several lifetimes, and a situation like this one is your chance to do something positive for your fellow hobbyists and for other international broadcasters: the next time you hear 40 duplicates of RHC's broadcasting in one band, write them a note about it. Any broadcaster seeking a wide audience cannot afford to be insensitive to a problem brought to their attention by <u>many listeners</u>... don't be nasty or abusive about it when you write, just tell them something like "I really enjoy your broadcasts of Cuban music which I listen to frequently" or something similar, and then kindly ask them if they're aware of a technical problem you've noticed (and describe the problem, of course). Don't wait for someone else to write that letter, do it yourself... there's power in numbers, and several hundred letters is a significant number to a SWEC'er. Who knows... if this works, maybe next we could ask for some non-sedative programming on Radio Tirana! Best 73.
