### THE SPEEDX REPORT ON RADIO RSA

Many of you have probably heard of "The SPEEDX Report." lt's of "audio SPEEDX" that has been a part of the "DX Farty Line" tvoe on HCJB for some years. Originally recorded by John Trautschold. the program is now organized, recorded and mailed by Publicity Director David Sharp. Several months ago, the Board of Directors approved the addition of Radio RSA to the small list of stations that broadcast "The SPEEDX Report." Since then, I have received letters from two SPEEDX members for UP FRONT that have expressed In fact, I've received three letters concern over this policy. from Full Member Michael Wegner in Austin, Texas. Mike has graciously consented to the use of his letters in this column, and I have excerpted parts from all three that best illustrate his points of concern:

### Dear Tom,

To me, the distinction here is the difference between listening and participating. Anyone should be able to hear anything they want, that is obvious. And to report, in a factual way, what they heard to a DX club is perfectly legitimate. Loggings in SPEEDX should not be screened to make sure they are only for the 'right' broadcasters.

The line between politics and morality is often unclear. Is one's attitude towards apartheid simply one of political disagreement, or does it go further, becoming moral outrage? Avoid politics as a club, yes; abandon our humanity, no.

Your point about our withdrawing now being disapproval makes sense. It would be an obvious statement, and SPEEDX would be taking, in some ways, a 'political' stand. It would be hard, as you say, to withdraw from RSA without withdrawing from HCJB.


Can the BOD honestly say that any station that came to the club and asked for programming support would be treated the same? Libya, North Korea, Chile, Cuba, USSR, Iran? Could we honestly, and with conviction, send an open invitation to all broadcasters to air the SPEEDX Report? If the answer is no, then the Radio RSA program is indefensible; if the answer is yes, then we have a completely different debate ahead of us.

My thanks again for your time and patience in listening to the concerns of a relatively new member. I look forward to some sort of resolution that we all can agree with. Michael Wegner



Radio Marti Smothers Radio Australia: On its second day of operation, Radio Marti bumped Australian programming from the shortwave dial for 2½ hours & gave American listeners an unexpected burst of Spanish. Paul Buch, a shortwave radio enthusiast in Brooklyn, said he was tuned a SSO kup at 2000 kup to be found in a pooklyn.

Paul Buch, a shortwave radio enthusiast in Brooklyn, said he was tuned to 9580 kHz at 8:00 AM when the familiar Radio Australia broadcast fade d and a voice called out: "Buenos dias, Cuba!" "They just blasted Radio Australia right off the air," Buch said.

tralia right off the air," Buch said. In Washington, an official of Voice of America, which overseas R. Marti, said U.S. technicians had the mistaken impression that from 8 AM to 10:30 AM, Radio Australia broadcast at 9580 kHz only in the Pacific. "We thought it was clear for us," said the official, Pat Sowick."We're very upset that it happened."(An excerpt from the <u>San Francisco Chronicle</u>, contributed by <u>Clay Harada-CA</u>)In a related story from <u>Jeff Elson-MO</u>, it also appears that the Australian Embassy and consular offices were flooded with phone calls regarding Radio Marti's operation on 9580 kHz. Barry Seeber, host of Talkback, seemed very pleased with the response of American listeners to the situation. Needless to say, Radio Marti moved to 9670 two days later. (Tnx again to Clay and Jeff for their input. I sent a letter directly to Radio Australia to inform them of the interference. Did you? ds.)

If This Fails, Try Smashing The Bug With The Radio: A Canadian radio station thinks it has found a chemical-free, odorless antidote to the summer time pest. For its cottage-country listeners north of Montreal,CIME-FM of Ste. Therese, Quebec, is broadcasting "anti-mosquito" frequencies for 1½ hours starting at 11 AM, and 3½ hours starting at 4:30 PM.

These buzz-like transmissions are supposed to imitate the high-pitched sound of male mosquitoes flapping their wings, The sound is broadcast simultaneously with regular music programming. The reasoning? Only females bite, and only after they've mated. The theory is that the bloodthirsty females will be repelled by the sound of males flying around, and leave the area. CIME's station manager, Gaetan Charbot, says some listeners were convinced after the first anti-mosquito broadcasts last week. According to Mr. Charbot, one listener called to say he sat near a swamp with his radio and was left alone by hordes of mosquitoes. He tried it again without the radio and was bitten to bits. Another caller asked the station to broadcast the frequencies all day long.

cast the frequencies all day long. But scientists are skeptical. The theory "is possible, but highly unlikely," says David Lewis, an entomologist who specializes in mosquitoes at Montreal's McGill University. Art Borkent, a research scientist studying bugs in Canada's agriculture department, observes that mosquitoes attract the female species during mating season, but there's no evidence to show they repel the females afterwards. "I'm not a mosquito expert," he says, "but it won't work."

Says, "but it won't work." CIME-FM's anti-mosquito frequencies were modeled on those broadcast by Voice of the Lizard, a Paris radio station. But while Paris is plagued by only a few varieties of mosquitoes, Canada boasts 44 varieties. So the Canadian station worked with a forestry specialist to reproduce a range of wing-flapping frequencies. There's much work to be done. The station, which also broadcasts subliminal energizing messages in the morning and subliminal relaxation messages in the evening, is working to reduce the noise level of its mosquito-wing reproduction: Mr.Charbot admits that some listeners phoned to complain that they couldn't enjoy the music over the background buzzing. And he hopes to develop another sound-repellant in timefor black fly season. It is our desire to see an efficient, incorrupt and apolitical public service, an impartial judiciary and security forces that are loyal to the state and its people, not to a political party. For all of these reasons, Radio Truth is strongly opposed to the concept of a one-party state, which conflicts with everything we stand for.

Radio Marti Long Overdue: Radio Marti, a U.S. radio station, began beaming news and cultural programs to Cuba on May 20. The broadcasts are long over-due. The station should have been created 20 years ago to give Cubans un-varnished news reports on their own country and of the world. As he had threatened to do, Fidel Castro retaliated immediately by try-ing to jam the broadcasts and by imposing immigration sanctions. According to Radio Havana, the communist government is terminating an agreement with Washington which authorized immigration to the U.S. of up to 20,000 Cubans yearly. The broadcast also announced that Cuban-Americans would be barred yearly. The broadcast also announced that Cuban-Americans would be barred from visiting Cuba. While the legality of the broadcasts is without a real challenge, the ultimate effects are open to speculation. They could be a huge success in moderating Castro's policies, once the light of truthfalls upon the Castro government. They could be a flop if he manages to effectively jam them or to interrupt commercial broadcasting in the United States. And they could be somewhere in between. Southeast

So Radio Marti is admittedly experimental but an experiment that is well worth the cost. The people of Cuba and the whole Caribbean, for that mat-ter, deserve something more than the distortions the Castro gov't presents as news. In the most optimistic scenario, the broadcasts could move Castro over the long term to relax some of his policies and begin to restore individual freedoms and move toward more representative government.

Cuba also has a modest democratic tradition, and through relatives and firsthand experience on visits to the United States, they are generallyaw-are of the fruits of freedom. The island country's literacy rate is also fairly high, so great numbers of Cubans will understand the implicit mes-sage accurate news will provide. If nothing else, many Cubans will have access to broader and more diverse views of world events and relations. ### SPEEDX LOCAL CHAPTERS

PURPOSE: To further enhance the enjoyment of our hobby, SPEEDX is making provision for the establishment of <u>local</u> chapters of SPEEDX members. Through a local chapter, SPEEDX members will be able to exchange hobby information, make personal contacts, engage in social activity involving the hobby, participate in chapter competitions, and, in general, further their participation in our hobby.

### THE LOCAL SPEEDX CHAPTER:

a. Local chapters shall be based on geographical areas. In general, only one local chapter shall be allotted a given geographical area. SPEEDXers requesting a charter for a local chapter shall specify the geographical area in their Charter Application. The SPEEDX Board of Directors approval of the local chapter's charter shall be approval of the geographical area for the chapter.

b. The local chapter shall select the chapter's name. That name shall be included in the Charter Application. The BOD approval of the local chapter's charter shall be approval of the name of the chapter.

c. To submit an application for a charter for a local SPEEDX chapter, a minimum of <u>THREE</u> members of SPEEDX in good-standing must agree to form such local chapter. At no time shall chapter membership be less than THREE members of SPEEDX in good-standing or the chapter shall be deactivated by the BOD.

d. When a local chapter is officially chartered by the SPEEDX BOD, <u>ALL</u> members of that local chapter MUST thereafter be SPEEDX members in the any of the authorized membership categories. SPEEDX membership application forms and/or renewal forms shall be annotated by each SPEEDX member with the name of his/her local SPEEDX chapter when he/she is such a member. Additionally, local chapter member names shall be included on the various chapter reports submitted to HQS for the BOD.

e.' To assist local chapter SPEEDX members in attaining SPEEDX Full Member status as currently provided for in SPEEDX policy, the following point system is established: Membership in a local chapter, 3 points annually; officer in a local chapter, 1 point for each month in position; attendance at a local chapter-sponsored event, 1 point per event. The SPEEDX BOD shall broaden this point system for the local chapter concept as experience dictates.

f. The local chapter shall develop its own By-Laws. Such By-Laws shall not be in conflict with the SPEEDX Constitution.

g. The local chapter shall communicate with its chapter members by an appropriate means including, but not limited to, regular meetings, personal contact, social events; electronic means; postal including chapter round-robin letters, newsletters and the like.

h. The local chapter shall appoint/elect a Chapter Secretary who shall correspond with SPEEDX HQS and the BOD on local chapter matters such as reports and forms.

i. The President of the SPEEDX BOD shall appoint a Chapter Advisor for each local chapter. That Chapter Advisor shall be a current member of the SPEEDX BOD and/or SPEEDX staff.

j. When a local chapter is established in a particular geographical area, all SPEEDX members in that area shall be requested to the join the local chapter. No SPEEDX member shall be required to join the local chapter, however.

k. Each local chapter shall be responsible for financing its local activities.

STEPS IN APPLICATION FOR A LOCAL SPEEDX CHAPTER CHARTER:

a. Interested SPEEDXer informs SPEEDX HQS, 7738 East Hampton Street, Tucson, Arizona, 85715, of his/her desire to form a local SPEEDX chapter.

b. SPEEDX HQS sends Local Chapter Application Form and roster of current SPEEDX members in the geographical area under consideration to requestor. c. Local SPEEDXers complete Local Chapter Application Form and return to SPEEDX HQS.

d. SPEEDX HQS verifies information on Local Chapter Application Form and circulates to SPEEDX BOD with recommendation for approval/disapproval.

e. When SPEEDX BOD approves Local Chapter Application Form, SPEEDX HQS issues Charter to local chapter.

f. Local chapter secretary completes Chapter Report Form each six months and submits to SPEEDX HQS and to Chapter Advisor.

Thanks to your support this column will now be a monthly feature. This month will feature both product reviews and some computer chit-chat as most of the letters received so far were split in favor of the two. Please let me know what you want to see, and don't forget to send in your contributions, product reviews, info on little known books and equipment, etc.

THE LOW AND MEDIUM FREQUENCY SCRAPBOOK, 4th edition, by Ken Cornell, 225 Baltimore Ave., Point Pleasant Beach, NJ 08742. \$10.00 postpaid.

One of the best kept secrets in the world of hobby radio is the license free experimental 1750 meter band from 160 khz to 190 khz. Many dx'ers with radios that go down that low are familiar with the cw beacons and aeronautical broadcasts that inhabit this region.

Anyone can put their own CW, AM, or SSB station on the air as a beacon or for two way communications with the restrictions of a maximum of 1 watt and an antenna and feedline of no more than 15 meters in total length.

This 120 page, 8 1/2" x 11" book will get you on the air in very short order with several schematics for transmitters, pre-amplifiers, receiving converters and ferrite rod antennas.

The somewhat esoteric subject of winding radio frequency coils and using them with capacitors to establish tuning range is covered with enough detail to enable you to roll your own before long.

I've already built the pre-amp and ferrite rod directional antenna for the 10 khz to 550 khz range for about ten bucks and some recruitment from my junk box. This combination works just as well as some of the high priced commercial units aimed at the hobbyist. The broadband pre-amplifier circuit is ideal for loop antennas or to give your old worn out rig a boost.

One of the transmitters is almost completed and should be on the air by the time you read this. Listen for the cw beacon "MIKE SJ" somewhere between 160 and 190 khz, and I will QSL!.

Rudimentary knowledge of electronic construction is required to build these very simple circuits which are mostly one evening projects except for the transmitter that can be as bare boned or full blown as you like.

Parts of the book seem a little disjointed at times with coil winding data for projects found in other parts of the book rather than with the schematics. In some cases not enough coil winding data is presented making construction difficult unless you want to take the time to hassle with complex formulas found in other books or manufacturers data sheets and in the process learn something about permeability of iron and ferrite cores.

the process learn something about permeability of iron and ferrite cores. This book appears to be the only hands on reference work for MW and VLF experimentation and even though it does have some technical shortcomings, I still recommend it as relief if you've been bitten by the low freq bug.

This book should have been subtitled "What you always wanted to know about the R71A but Icom won't tell you". It has an in depth review of the radio and it's shortcomings, and tells you EXACTLY how to go about upgrading it's performance. Projects include increasing SSB level, enabling the pre-amp in the VLF-EF-MW bands, fooling the radio into tuning below 100 khz, using the notch filter on AM and much much more. An alignment section will aid you or your repairman should this ever be necessary.

Ten bucks for a 40 page book might sound a little steep but when you consider that most radio manufacturers have a tiny service manual they sell for as much as \$35.00, its not such a bad price after all.

to repairmen for as much as \$35.00, its not such a bad price after all. Except for a few of the easy no solder modifications ONLY those of you with experience in desoldering and modifying state of the art pc boards should attempt these modifications. You know who you are and if you're not sure, don't even think of trying it. But if you have an R-71A or you're leaning toward the purchase of one, you will benefit from having this book. I haven't done much computer talk in previous columns so here goes... When it comes to radio applications there are basically two types of activity; on the air and support programs. Transmission and reception of CW, RTTY, AMTOR, ASCII, FAX, and SSTV is now very commonplace and economical using just about any personal computer. All installations require software and in most cases some type of hardware interface.

Off the air, or support activities can include using a database or word processor to mantain a logbook, forcasting propogation, learning morse code, designing antenna systems, and analyzing numbers transmissions.

An ever growing grey area combines on the air activities with support functions such as feeding rigs with computer interfaces frequency data from a logbook for unlimited memory channels.

All computer systems, especially home computers generate various levels of RF noise that always seems to get sucked into your antenna circuit. The C-64 is perhaps the most notorious in this regard and the golden rule for all computerized shacks is shielded cables for ALL interconnections and coax for the antenna feedline. Using anything less will downgrade the overall performance to a disappointing and noisy level.

There is not a great deal of difference between a modem for computers communications over the telephone lines and a modem that transceives using a radio. Both are able to convert digital pulses to audio tones and vice versa. All a modem really cares about are the frequencies used for mark and space and the resulting shift employed. Radio modems need a tuning indicator and shift selections and perhaps some better filtering for QRM and QRN. A modem doesn't care if you're sending RTTY or ASCII, they are both combinations of on and off signals creating words which in one case uses 5 bit words while ASCII uses 7 bits per word.

Software tells the computer what to do and how to do it. Most commercial software is written in machine code, not Basic, which is just a beginner's language and nothing more. Machine language is essential for high speed data processing as in the case of RTTY software that can sample bits for inversion while at the same time (or so it seems to the operator) receiving incoming text and printing it to the screen. Try doing that in Basic!

A few months ago I wrote a program to analyze those mysterious FEMA cw transmissions. One part did a character repetition analysis. The machine language version can process and tally about 5000 characters per minute while the same program written in tight structured Basic takes over half an hour to do the same job. Enough said.

When you go shopping for software don't buy until you read at least one review in a magzine that is NOT tied or connected with a particular computer maker or software vendor, or talk to someone who already is using the program. Any product review for software, radios or whatever, that does not mention any shortcomings (nothing's perfect) isn't really a review, but a product announcement. Big difference.

As the market grows and production increases, prices for setting up a computer assisted shack are falling and component size is shrinking. Advanced Micro Devices has their 7910 modem-on-a-chip with incredible digital filter performance. My guess is that it won't be long until the next generation of radios will have a built in RTTY/CW modulator/ demodulator interface and an LCD O'scope tuning screen near the S meter.


If you are leaning toward the purchase of a computer, wait a month or two and check out the soon to be released Atari ST "Jackintosh". I've played around with one of the hand wired prototypes and I'm convinced this system will do the same thing the C-64 did; redefine how much computing bang for the buck you will get. Atari and Apple are about to go to war and the heat here in Silicon Valley will brew a very tasty deal for the radio/computer hobbyist as communications programs become available.

hobbyist as communications programs become available. I received some letters asking if FAX reception is possible on their brand of computer. It can be acheived in one of two ways. First, if you have at least 64K ram for the program and picture storage and have zero centering on the audio of your cassette port, all you need is some software without any other hardware interface other than an audio cable between your radio and computer. The other approach is to build or buy an external video board and FAX modem circuitry, an expensive proposition indeed.

With all the new radios and accessories coming out, I find it very difficult to include or exclude certain reviews, announcements or just kick back and talk about computers like I did this month. This column, like all the others in this magazine depend upon your input and they are what YOU make it. Tell me what you like.

If you sent a reception report on the SPEEDX net you should already have your QSL cards. 'Till next month 73! N6LUU

### SOUPING UP AN OLDER RECEIVER

Many folks speak of the "Good Old Days" of our hobby. Less crowded bands, better propogation, and less stringent QSL policies.[Yes, Radio Canada International used to QSL ALL valid reception reports]. Radio Botswana, perhaps today's most notorious non-QSLer, was most obliging until they were inundated with literally thousands of bogus reports from "SWLS" in a certain High Tech Asian country. But, QSLing is not the subject of this discourse.

Back in the 1950's and 1960's some of the world's great DX machines were produced. Gems such as the Hammarlund HQ180 and SP600 series, the Hallicrafters SX series and the fabled Collins R388 and R390A. In today's world, all but the Collins rigs have a major problem, the inability to ascertain the exact (or very close to it) frequency one is tuned to. We are so used to Digital this and Digital that that we don't care to take the time to use crystal calibrators, BC221 frequency meters, or as many folks did, handmake reasonably accurate calibration charts.

With a minimum of electronics knowledge one can know add Digital Readout to these older sets. If one is an "appliance operator" (as is the author), the local TV fixit shop can install the little gadget for you in a few minutes and minimal cost.

The two Digital units that come to mind are the KRS series distributed by Radio West (3417 Purer Road; Escondido, CA 92025) and the Torrestronics TK distributed by Universal Shortwave (1280 Aida Drive; Reynoldsburg, OH 43068). Fred Osterman at Universal and Grant Manning at Radio West are most knowledgeable folks and should be able to help with any set-up instructions.

The author has had experience with both units and can vouch for their reliability. I've used them with many receivers, including a 1936 model National HRO to the old standby, a Realistic DX160A. At around \$150, a pretty good investment, even for a backup receiver to your brand spanking new ICOM, Yaesu or Kenwood.

The courtesy of an SASE is always appreciated by suppliers and authors alike.

RECEIVER SHOPPING TIPS ..... Ruth Hesch, NY The monthly magazine CHANGING TIMES had an article under "Shopping Tips" about shortwave radios in the November 1984 issue, the author not identified.

It stated that the increased popularity of shortwave listening is due to the introduction of computerized receivers. Discussed were the Panasonic RF-9, Toshiba RP-F11, Panasonic RF-2200, Sony ICF-6500, Sony IF-2002, Panasonic RF-799, Panasonic RF-B50, Realistic DX-400, Sharp FV-610GB, Sharp FV-310 GB, Sony ICR-4800, Sony ICF-7600A and the Uniden CR-2021.

Mention was made of the "types of programs availible and from which countries." Also information was given about Sony's "Directory of World Band Radio", "The World Is Yours" by Sam Alcorn, Review of International Broadcasting, Miller's "Shortwave Guide", WRTH, Gerry Dexter's "QSL Address Book", "Radio Receivers-Chance or Choice" by Rainer Lichte and, ANARC.

Explanations are given about shortwave signals, Hams, maritime and military transmissions, the effects of ionosphere and solar radiation, season and time of day upon reception. The effect of geography upon fading was explained.

A chart of 11 small and simple radios was given based upon Larry Magne's report of them in WRTH.

This magazine is available in public libraries.

#### AFRICA ON 60M

Here in eastern USA summer twilight is a good time to "listen" to the Africans on 60 meters. They have been peaking at 2200-2300 here in eastern PA. Time translates to  $6-72 \pm$  just before the atmospherics come up with approaching darkness. Tune in Gabon, Cameroon, Senegal, Kenya, Swaziland, RSA, Togo, etc. My scout signal is GABON on 4810. If it comes in well an hour or so earlier it suggests good signal levels are on the way for other stations.

Programs are largely musical. Expect interesting and often enjoyable listening. Treat yourself to some good "listening" with a dipole antenna for 60M. Use inverted-V for easy erection. Cut it 47 foct on a leg and mount it broadside to central Africa.

### AM SIDEBAND RECEPTION

Don't forget to try sideband for AM reception if your receiver is so equipped. When a station is in a murky situation sidebad.can help to reduce the effects of noise and interference and improve clarity. You must develop some additional tuning skill so don't be discouraged if all doesn't go well the first several attempts In fact it takes more patience to bring out a good sideband audio from an AN signal with its carrier and two sidebands than tuning in a strictly sideband signal. No question that sideband improves ID voice clarity when you must receive narrow band. When you switch to sideband you will hear a heterodyne whistle. Tune it to the low frequency end to a zero. Around this point tune very slowly for best voice reproduction. For most receivers the zero will come on station frequency for one sideband (upper or lower) and slightly off zero (about 200 hertz) for the opposite sideband setting. Choose the sideband away from the interference is a general rule.

SW-7800 TIP Ruth Hesch, NY The April 1985 issue of QST contains an evaluation of the Heath SW-7800 General Coverage Receiver, by Paul K. Pagel, NIFB. He mentions the "IMD dynamic range of this radio limits its sensitivity when strong signals are near the weak ones. A fairly strong, clear signal is necessary for good reception." "The radio is relatively free from 'birdies'." After turned on it "drifts about 3 kHz in the first hour." "The radio is suitable for the casual SWL or as a ham shack add-on."





<u>Purpose:</u> To gather current data on the worldwide interference caused to shortwave broadcasters and their audiences by the high-power pulse emission sources known colloquially as the "Woodpeckers". This data will be analyzed and presented to telecommunications ministries of countries participating in the 1987 World Administrative Radio Conference for High-Frequency Broadcasting, in an effort to convince them to support a protocol statement condemning this interference.


Data needed: 1) In order to map the "Woodpeckers'" general band use, we need large numbers of volunteers to monitor parts of the spectrum between 5 and 23 MHz for 3-hour periods during October 1985. If each monitor covers 3 MHz, and at least 3 geographically-separated monitors are scheduled for each time- and bandsegment, then at least 144 monitors are needed for 24-hour coverage. We would like to gather 5 days worth of data. That requires at least 720 volunteers. Attached to this sheet is a sign-up form. Please fill it out, indicating what times you can commit to monitoring. Return it without delay - in any event, before 15 August 1985. We especially need people able to monitoring report form is attached to this sheet. It is a simple graphic system requiring minimal effort to complete.

2) We also seek reports of specific instances of "Woodpecker" interference to stations operating in the shortwave broadcast bands. Reports should include the name of the affected station, its frequency, the date and time, duration and relative strength of the interference, the type of receiver, and your location. A sample report form is attached to this sheet. Reports not using this form are acceptable, too, so long as they contain the same information. Mail us your reports before 1 November 1985.

- <u>Recognizing "Woodpecker" signals:</u> They're called "Woodpeckers" because that's what they sound like on a shortwave radio. Technically, the signal is a 3 millisecond square-wave pulse with a stable pulse-rate of 10/second. (Rates of 17 and 7.4/sec have also been heard, but rarely.) The signal is wide-band, with most of the energy concentrated in about 15 kHz, and a weaker "pulse-scape" filling the adjacent spectrum. The energy concentrations can be clustered together to cover 100 kHz or more. The "Woodpeckers" change frequency akruptly and often. Their "dwell time" varies from a few seconds to a few minutes.
- <u>Money:</u> This project is organized and staffed entirely by unpaid volunteers. We need your help to pay for printing, postage, etc. To raise money we are selling T-shirts with our symbol (at top, right) printed in red and black, for \$10 each postpaid in North America. 

They are Libyan Service, Radio Omdurman, and the clandestine Voice of the Sudanese Popular Peter is uniquely qualified to clear up this confusion as he is fluent in re are his Arabic identifications accompanied by the accurate English :
LIBYA: Domesti	<u>c</u> <u>Service:</u> Itha'atu ul-Jamahiriyyat il-'Arabiyyat il-Libiyyat ish-Sha'abiyyat

External Service: Sawt ul-Watan il-'Arabiyyi il-Kebir, Sawt uth-Thawrat ish-Sha'abiyyah. (Voice of the Great Arab Homeland, Voice of the People's Revolution).

### CLANDESTINE:

Sawt uth-Thawrat ish-Sha'aabiyyat is-Sudaniyyah. (Voice of the Sudanese Popular Revolution). Sawt ush-Sha'ab il-Libi. (Voice of the Libyan People. An anti-Quaddafi station probably based in Egypt or perhaps Algeria).

#### SUDAN:

Huna Omdurman, Itha'atu ul-Jumhuriyyat is-Sudaniyyat id-Dimuqratiyyah. (Here is Omdurman, Broadcast of the Sudanese Democratic Republic).

Note: Peter advises that Arabic pronunciation can vary depending upon the diligence of the announcer. His transliterations above are in perfect modern standard Arabic. However, announcers may drop the "t" at the end of some words and change the "j' to a hard "g". (35)

Peter has provided some additional information regarding some recently reported loggings from this column which he indicates can be misleading if the listener is not familiar with the Arabic language. In the March issue was a log for the Voice of the Arab Homeland on 17940 kHz, but the details indicate that it was more likely the Voice of the Sudanese Popular Revolution. In the May issue, this same station was reported as Radio Omdurman, although the description clearly pointed to the clandestine. Peter truly doubts that Radio Omdurman would use a frequency in the 16mb. Further, that the clandestine has not been heard since the coup d'etat in Khartoum when Nimeiri was overthrown, although he has not monitored the frequency enough to definitely state they are off the air. I also have not heard this station, and after checking with David Sharp, he also concurs that they are probably not on the air currently.

David further adds that he has never know Radio Omdurman to utilize a frequency above 25m, although awhile back they tested on 11941, and some unconfirmed reports indicate they are now using 11880. However, David further comments that a mis-ID is quite easy to anyone unfamiliar with the Araoic language. On or about November 23, 1984, another incident occurred to only further this confusion; that is, a punch-up error took the Voice of the Sudanese Popular Revolution off its normal frequency of 17940 and placed it on 17930, the frequency usually used by Libyan Radio. Since then, David has monitored similar errors on four or five more occasions.





As set down in the SPEEDX Constitution, no SPEEDX publication is to be used to promote personal views on religion, politics or ideologies. Mike's letter was printed with the approval of the BOD in this instance because there is a "gray area" which needs clarification. That means we need to hear from you.

What is "non-political"? Is it reasonable or even possible to be truly "non-political"? Does the SPEEDX Report fall into the same category as other club publications? Does its broadcast on Radio RSA imply support for the government of the Republic of South Africa? Does its broadcast on HCJB imply support for Christianity? Would the elimination of the program from Radio RSA also be a political decision, although in a negative manner?

These are some of the questions that the BOD has been discussing for three months. We'd like to hear from you. We will make a decision on the final status of the SPEEDX Report around September, and your input will be vital. Please write, whether you're a Full or Associate Member.

Because of the Constitution's prohibition on advocating political views in the pages of SPEEDX, this debate will not take place in this or any other column. Please address all comments to one or more Board of Directors members. Their names and addresses are on the back cover. If you like, you may send letters addressed to the entire BUD to me at the address on page 2, and 1 will forward copies to the rest of the board at my expense.

Thank you for your patience in reading this rather long commentary. The BOD does feel that the topic is important, however, and we hope you will find a few minutes to let us know your opinions.
