



BBC Wants to Improve Image: The BBC refuses to accept advertising on its TV and radio networks, but it has no problems with advertising itself in the media. The BBC, financed by license fees paid by television set own-ers, was surprised this year when it asked for a rate increase and disco-vered many viewers and listeners did not think it was worth the price. It had asked for an annual fee of \$84.50,but had to settle for \$75.40. To improve its image, the BBC hired the Lowe Howard-Spink Campbell-Ewald advertising agency to launch a campaign to "keep license payers better in-formed of the rich pattern of broadcasting offered to viewers and listen-ers. Vincent Hevern-NY critiques the ILG: I recently received my S85 edition of the International Listening Guide. Since Tom Sable and Ruth Hesch introduced me to the ILG last year, I have found it a marvelous reference and DX aid.

I saw something new which the ILG promises with its next edition. Having averaged 55-65 pages in the past, the cover of the S85 ILG notes: "The May and November edition is extended to approx. 104 pages, while the March and September edition gives 64 pages. In this extended edition, the World Frequency Survey will be presented in addition with clear and precise computer-generated graphics giving the occupancy of each frequency at a glance.

The cost of the ILG is being increased to \$12.00 (\$14 Canadian or 26 W. German D-M's). Australian Stamps Depict Radio: A 33c stamped envelope was issued on May 22nd, for the 75th anniversary of Amateur Radio and the Wireless Institute of Australia. The cachet depicts the Morse key transmitter, earphones and a world map (designed by Rowan Smith); the impressed stamp area features a young amateur radio operator (designed by Brian Clinton); multi-color photolithography (Who thought of that word? Hi. ds) by Mercury-Walch, Div. of Davies Brothers Itd., Hobart, Tasmania. (From Stamps Weekly Magazine Sent to DXM by John Heaton-FL. Nice meeting you, Jack. ds.)

<u>News From HCJB:</u> After his recent visit to Quito, <u>Ed Soomre-MA</u> passes word that new QSL cards for 1986 are currently being designed. They will feature birds native to Ecuador. Also, if plans went as scheduled, HCJB should be operating a 15 watt QRP transmitter on 11 meters (26020? ds) to relay EE broadcasts. (Maybe if sunspots increase, we'll have a chance. ds)

<u>Cuba Reacts to Marti: Esmeralda is the heroine in a soap opera about a poor blind girl who falls in love with a millionaire. Her story, served up daily by Radio Marti, has attracted a modest following in Cuba. And that represents a modest success for R. Marti, which started broadcasting in Spanish May 20 as an alternative to Cuba's government controlled media.</u>

But after more than five months on the air, R. Marti is causing few political ripples. The Cuban government, which suspended an immigration agreement with the United States in an initial reprisal, has made no further response. The Cubans jam Radio Marti's signal, but it is only slightly distracting for the listener. James Todd, acting chief of the US interests section in Havana, said the Cubans could probably jam the signal more effectively if they wanted to.

The station's Cuban listenership does not appear broad, and many of those who tune in to the news and commentary apparently already were disenchanted with the Castro government. Asked in casual encounters about Radio Marti, dozens of Cubans said they did not listen to it. Many said they considered it to be an insult. A young housewife in jeans, wheeling a grocery cart in a government supermarket, expressed indignation. "It is an offense to us, especially the name," she said.

an offense to us, especially the name," she said. But in the same supermarket, a 16 year old schoolboy said he liked to hear the Esmeralda soap opera when he could manage to. A retired man in the plaza outside said he knew many people who listened to Esmeralda. "It's catching on with the women," he said.

In its news and commentary programs, R. Marti emphasizes information about Cuba and other communist countries. It puts them in a less favorable light than the Cuban media do. Radio Marti is a special service of the Voice of America. The VOA used to aim its broadcasts at Cuba for four hours a day, on the same frequency that R. Marti now uses 14 hours a day. DXM Station Review: NHK: Radio Japan is now entering the fiftieth year of its overseas broadcasting service. Overseas broadcasting became a virtual national policy of the advanced countries of Europe in the late 1920's and early 1930's, as they tried to expedite their colonial policies and publicize their thinking to the rest of the world. Japan, too, feit the need for overseas broadcasting, particularly in

Japan, too, felt the need for overseas broadcasting, particularly in response to demands from Japanese immigrants in Hawaii and the WestCoast of the United States. The government also recognized the need to strengthen its image abroad, as it was effectively isolated from the rest of the world after its withdrawal from the League of Nations. With rapid advances in shortwave broadcasting technology, the inaguration of Japan's first overseas broadcasting station was clearly imminent.

It was on the 1st of June 1935 that Radio Tokyo beamed the first of its daily programs in English and Japanese to Hawaii and WCNA (refer to photo on right). On the same day, Japan was also commemorating the 10th anniversary of domestic broadcasting and the new ratings which showed the achievement of 2 million listeners.

Radio Tokyo's initial objective was to supply domestic news & entertainment to the Japanese who were living overseas, while also introducing Japanese culture to



the peoples of other countries. As Japan's involvement in China deepened and the world drifted into war, Japan lost sight of this initial objective. The service in course came to be used as a propagandist mouthpiece for the national war effort.

Both the range of languages and broadcasting hours were greatly expanded, and by November 1944, daily transmissions totalled 32 hours, 35 minutes in 24 different languages. The war finally came to an end on the 15th of August, 1945, when Japan unconditionally surrendered to the allied powers, and in the following month Radio Tokyo suspended its activities by order of the Supreme Commander of the Allied Powers Headquarters in Tokyo. Radio Australia Has Labor Dispute: If you listened to Radio Australia on Friday, September 27th, all you heard was their interval signal. Member William Dickerman-PA provides us with an excerpt from a September 13th Media Network broadcast, which sheds some light on the situation: "Subject to a last minute settlement, the ABC and R. Australia services will be suspended for 24 hours from 14 hours UT, that's today, until 14 hours UT on Friday due to an industrial action by the members of the ABC staff union.

It's basically about the establishment of staff review committees, & union representation on those committees. To date, ABC management hasn't agreed to this, so we have a strike. (The transmitters) will be on the air, and we'll be playing "Waltzing Matlida" and announcements every half hour." (First the BBC, now R. Australia. I wonder who's next??? ds.) East and West Radio Club to hold contest: This international DX contest will be held from November 14th-18th, 1985, and each participant will recontest ceive a certificate with number of points and classification reached.Further details may be received by sending 1 IRC to: EAWRC, c/o Hardy Borger, Eifelwall 46, D-5000 Koln 1, West Germany. "Kelpers" to get Argentine Side: The Argentine government plans to broadcast programs in English via a MW station facility of the Patagonia reg-ion (in the south of the country), beamed to the "Kelpers" and foreign troops that have illegally occupied the Argentine territory of the Islas Malvinas since 1833.

The reason these transmissions are planned is because the invaders only know the English language and NATO's point of view about the Islas Malvinas, but also must know the Argentine point of view, and just rights of possession on these isles.

The English programs beamed to the Malvinas will be musical, cultural, and informative of the "Argentine actuality." The nearest stations to Puerto Argentino (Port Stanley, ds) is in the Patagonia region. (Needless to say, this was excerpted from LADXR, a DX bulletin published in Argentina. It was forwarded to DXM by John Friberg, Jr-NH.)

Hudson Kids Talk to Space Shuttle (August 2nd Jersey Observer): The space shuttle Challenger will make spaceflight history tomorrow in Secaucus when crew members attempt to transmit video images to earth with the use of amateur radio frequencies. The Panasonic headquarters in Secaucus will be on

the receiving end of transmissions on slow-scan TV. Audio and video imag-es have been broadcast in the past from space, but this is the first time amateur radio frequencies are being utilized. A number of areas nationwide will pick up TV signals from the space shuttle, but what lends special significance to Panasonic's operation is that it'll be one of the few locations transmitting back. Panasonic has invited area youngsters to communicate with the astronaughts; between 30 & 40 young people between the ages of 8 and 15 are expected to participate . (Tks to Luis Mendez-NJ for this. Anyone know how things went? ds)

Scott Schmautz-NY says we should give thanks: Hopefully, SPEEDX'ers were able to catch some of the transmissions from WA3NAN, the Goddard Amateur Radio Club station, as they relayed the air-to-ground communications between the space shuttle Challenger and the Marshall and Houston Space F1ight Centers.

The commentary by the Houston Manned Space Center and Marshall Space Flight Operations Center was excellent, and provided some good insight into the sometimes very technical nature of the missions. Reception here in NY has been excellent; 3860 is great in the early mornings, while 7185 is very good in the afternoons. Many thanks must be given to the Goddard Am-ateur Radio Club in MD for their dedication in retransmitting these very interesting communications. Hopefully, they can continue to do this for future missions. (The broadcasts are indeed very interesting, though I wonder if the upcoming "secret" shuttle missions will be rebroadcast? ds)

While all staff members are vital to SPEEDX, there are always those who put an extra effort into their work; service above and beyond the call, you might say. Through their hard work and long hours, SPEEDX has grown to be one of the best SW clubs around.

SPEEDX's way of saying 'thanks' to these special volunteers is to award 'Honorary Full Memberships' to them. This means that they will always be Full Members of SPEEDX, as long as their dues are paid, except in the case of Life Members, who also have their annual/dues waived.

For their special service, the following people were honored by the SPEEDX Board of Directors prior to 1985:

ROBERT BODELL: Bob is currently Editor & Publisher of SPEEDXGRAM, but he's also served as editor of Asia/Oceania. He was on the BOD for 3 1/2 years from '77 to '81, including a stint as Vice-President from June 1980 to March 1981.

ALAN W. BROOKS: Alan wrote DX Montage for seven years from 1972 to 1979, and was on the BOD for four years from 1975 to 1979. BOB BUTTERFIELD: Bob edited Station Skeds from '71 to '73 and Europe/Africa from '73 to '76. He also was a BOD member for one year in 1978-79.

STEVE D'ADOLF: Steve was the editor of Asia/Oceania and Europe/Africa during his time on the staff. He was on the BOD for two vears from 1973-75.

I"ve received a few letters from members about the Sony 2010. It seems "everyone" is advertising it and will take your money, but can't deliver. The ONLY 2010 I have seen in the flesh was at a consumer electronics show, but none were to be bought there either. If you plan on ordering one, be sure to specify a order cutoff date. I tried to order one over the phone in this manner and the salesman who just minutes before assured me there was no problem, now was saying there might be a few weeks delay. Buyer beware.

#### BURN IT IN SO YOU DON'T

How often have we chuckled at a cartoon that shows some poor soul having his new consumer appliance blow up exactly one minute after the warranty expires? Maybe you're not so amused because something like that has happened to you?

If you've recently purchased a new radio, computer, or some other kind of device that uses integrated circuits, take out your copy of the warranty and look at the length or term of it. Chances are that it's only good for 90 days. There's good reason for this as most IC chips will fail, if they are going to fail, within the first 100 hours of operation. If you use your radio an average of an hour a day, everyday, you may not hit that 100 hours until the warranty is dangerously close to expiring. Some manufacturers will burn in their systems for a few hours just to weed out the obvious problem cases, but this is the exception rather than the rule with consumer electronics.

When you buy something like this, don't feel you have to baby it. BURN IT IN YOURSELF! Within the first month or less you should put at least 100 hours on the unit to weed out the bugs and save yourself from becoming that poor soul in the comic strip. When I bought my ICOM R71A I left it on after each night of use, overnight. Within a few weeks I was confident that the unit was working properly and not likely to fail due to chip failure. Be sure to try all the special functions like scanning, mode changes, and timers; all of which are controlled by tiny segments. One bad bit of memory could cause trouble in only one obscure place(like the R71's scanning bug), or shut down the whole works. Some chips have custom programming and can only be gotten from the factory.

chips have custom programming and can only be gotten from the factory. Recently, my new ATARI 520 ST computer went throught the same boot camp and sure enough, blew the DMA chip after only 20 hours. I promptly took it back and exchanged it for a new one and did the same process all over again, this time with no problems. While this process may sound a little brutal, consider the fact that the store you bought your new radio or computer from probably has a showroom demo unit that stays turned on most of the day. Also remember all the hard hours of work you had to put in to afford the price of your new toy. Paul Donegan of Glendale, Calif. sends us some information on the "INTERNATIONAL LISTENING GUIDE.

"While visiting the BBC I came across a computerized paperback publication from West Germany. It is in the English language consisting of 64 to 104 pages about the size of SPEEDX. It lists all international shortwave stations in two sections. Section 1 by UTC and section 2°by frequency, 5.850 to 24.5 Mhz. Also includes schedules for DX programs, news and commentary. It will tell you what station, target area, '' language of the transmissions and the frequency and times. I found it to be an excellent pocketable source of information for the traveller or at home use." Cost in the US is \$12 for 4 issues sent first class airmail. Send to Bernd Friedwald, Merian Str. 2,

I recently built the shortwave radio kit available from DICK SMITH ELECTRONICS and it turned out pretty good. It consists of approx. 24 Components that mount on a single sided pc board. Everything is supplied except a 9 volt battery, a case, and a coil winding form.

The kit is easy to build. Even a 12 year old child could construct the radio after first becoming acquainted with soldering and component identification. (Quick, run out and find me a 12 year old,hi!) The only critical part is the handling of the static sensitive IC chip, and I recommend buying a socket rather than soldering the chip to the board.

The coil that you wind, used in conjunction with the tuning capacitor, establishes the tuning range. My first coil was 50 turns on a 1 inch piece of coax jacketing and yielded a range from 5.6 to 6.8 Mhz. The price of the kit is only \$6.95, but no instructions come with the kit. You have to buy a \$6.95 FUNWAYS VOL.'2 book that has the plans for this and dozens of other projects they sell. A section on kit building is must-read material for the novice and will help assure the, successful completion of the radio.

It worked the first time power was applied and picked up the BBC, V of Nicaragua, VOA, a Chinese domestic and even a numbers station. The sensitivity is decent and the audio crisp and clear through the supplied, speaker. In no way does this six 'hundred and ninety five cent radio equal the overall performance of my six hundred and ninety five dollar R71A, but it does pull in the stations and is a lot of fun to build and use because you learn how it works. The catalog costs \$2.00, refundable on purchase, from PO Box 8021, Redwood City, Ca 94063.

For years, amateur radio operators have been using beam heading charts to help them project their signal to a desired location or to better capture an incoming signal. Most often, beam heading charts are used to orient the antenna in the direction desired or to erect a fixed antenna that will pick up the signals coming from the desired general direction.

SWLs have been a little slow to see the benefits of having such a chart custom made for them. John Daley KB6JGH, has put together an interesting package at a price of \$9.95, postage included.

What you get is a ten page computerized report with 540 worldwide dx locations calculated from your EXACT location. The data provided for each of these locations includes callsign area, country, city, latitude, longitude, beam heading in degrees, Great Circle Distance in kilometers, statute distance miles and nautical distance miles. That's a heck of a lot of personalized data at your fingertips!

Dozen of sites are listed for the USSR and China, giving the SWL some good information to estimate unknown transmitter sites with. Even if you don't have a big outdoor beam antenna you can still use the information for direction finding bearings, fade in/fade out times and general information. won't ever need factory service on my new Yaseu VHF ham radio, hi! Winter is on it's way and it's the time to check those antennas and feedlines. Old and weathered feedlines can do more to drain your antenna's gain than high SWR.

Editors Larry Magne and Tony Jones did an excellent job in providing DX ers across the world with one publication that will serve all regardless of the language using a format of graphics on a chart for each page listing by frequency which is then broken into the countries using each frequency and each of those countries shows the names of those stations using the frequencies. Across from each entry is a line showing the time the station uses that frequency on a 24 hour line chart. A key at the bottom of each page shows you at a glance what language the broadcast is in. Additional data such as seasonal, jamming, fading, etc is also prowided. A three page lexion of terms is given at the start of the reference book showing all the terms and meanings found in the book. A chart shows where all the information is found. The print is large and easy to read.

Both the IBE and the TBE have informative receiver and equipment reviews.

Many people well known in the radio hobby such as Terry Kruger, Tony Jones, Ralf Munster, Don Jensen, Jonathan Marks, Ian McFarland, Lawrence Miller, Steven Reinstein and others have worked together to make this a valuable tool for the DX'ing community worldwide. Gentlemen, you have given a reference book that will take much of the mystery out of DX'ing. This is a publication that should be in every library of those interested in knowing what stations can be found on any given broadcast frequency at anytime.

Tips N' Topics

WHAT IS AN ID? ..... Terry Lindley, AL

To me an ID is exactly what the name implies. An identification beyond a shadow of a doubt. Although I have been DXing for about 20 years I still have not hit the Century mark yet in the number of countries logged. I like to log a new country as well as anyone, and have sat up long hours trying to get the elusive dx signal. I have seen loggings in Speedx as well as every other club that are questionable at best. Just because we have a sked for a particular country and you hear them on that freq at the right time that don't mean it is them. Most of you Know that many sw stations may be on the same freq at once. Therefore without a positive ID you can't be certain of who you are listening to. I have been trying to log R.Dublin for years on 6910. I have heard them many times, but every time they give the ID something Kills it. Usually a hair dryer or a faraway crack of lightning. I have'nt heard the ID so therefore they will not go into my logbook. I don't think loggings should appear in the bulletin unless they are properly IDed. This is my opinion. Whats yours?

While African DX can be heard on every meter band, 60 meters, by far has the greatest concentration of stations from the Dark Continent. On a good propagation evening, scores of stations can be heard, but h ow does one know if there is going to be a good opening to Africa?

By far, the best way is to check particular stations, to see how they are being received. Africa Number One (4810) usually fades-in here around 2200 or so in the summer. If the station is heard prior to that time, or if the signals are unusually strong, that could indicate better than average openings to Central Africa. For East Africa, I usually check the Voice of Kenya on 4934; if you can manage to "snag" their signal, you can bet top dollar that Tanzania, Uganda, and others will be heard, too. Radio Southwest Africa (3270 and 3295) is always an excellent station to check propagation to Southern Africa; Mali (5995 & 4783 kHz) is a good indicator as to what's happening in West Africa.

Fortunately, my QTH is normally very quiet, so weak DX can usually be heard. However, the antenna you use will make a big difference in what you will, and will not hear. Whether you use a dipole, longwire, or a "super-duper DX scooper," make sure it is directed towards Central Africa (that will give you best overall reception of the entire contin ent). From my location in Florida, that means a SE heading, for example.

For my own use, I prefer antennas with directional capabilities; however, that does not mean an antenna appropriate for my listening purposes will suffice those of another. If you like to tinker around with antennas, it would be worth your while to do so. After stringing up different antennas and checking their performance, I finally found a combination suitable for my needs. You will, too. It's part of the fun of shortwave listening!

Finally, one last tip in hearing African DX, and that is patience! All too often, the tropical bands open up for only a short period of time; letting that African DX come through the static. It also goes without saying...conditions can change drastically from one day to the next. The band may be dead one day, and hopping with exotic DX the next....

Upon hearing all of the rave reviews about the Uniden CR-2021/DX-400 receiver, especially when the Uniden went to \$99.00, I decided that it was time to retire the DX-55 which permitted me to hear FIBS and Sao Tome E Principe, but also allowed me many hours of frustration in trying to figure out where the devil I was on the SW dial.

I ordered the Uniden from Grove Enterprises and awaited my "prize". What came instead was a rejection letter telling me that the Uniden went like hotcakes and Uniden had dumped the model. A severe dissapointment I can tell you, and I thought Uniden foolish for discontinuing the model.

In any case, that shelved the idea for a new receiver until January, 1985 when Radio Shack dropped the ridiculously high price of \$299.99 to \$199.99 (it is now selling at \$179.95 in their spring sale) as they finally discovered the bargain basement price the Uniden was selling for. I grabbed up the receiver like a shot.

Unfortunately, Radio Shack fell into the trap of listing some frequencies for int'l. broadcasters. As any SWL'er knows, these frequencies are usually long out-of-date by the time the receiver hits the market, and this is the case here. Yet it is a rather effective inducement to get the user to search the dials for some interesting stations. It also lists not only English language broadcasts, but also some sample broadcasts in foreign languages, another way of providing the facts that not all SW stations broadcast in English exclusively.

Upon turning the receiver on, the radio tuned to 150 kHz, and a good deal of noise I might add. The radio is set up in an interesting manner. The front panel is laid out rather well, with the keyboard entry facilities slightly recessed from the front panel, which prevents the wrong button from being pushed if the radio is laid flat.

However, the power switch is like a toggle switch, and it protrouds from the receiver. It is a good deal like a light switch, and it is very easy to flip on or off, so this is a definite drawback if one wants to travel with the radio (in other words, take the batteries out before you pack away the radio).

The DX-400 is controlled completely through buttons, with the exception of the volume, tone control, antenna tuner, and BFO fine tuning (which are all knobs). There is no tuning knob, and this is a major drawback as if one wants to bandscan, he is forced into using the cumbersome and slow scanning function. It takes up to 4 minutes to complete a bandscan through a single band.

The scanning rate can be preset at either 1 or 3 kHz steps. Using the 3 kHz step is a pain, and 5 kHz would have been much, much better. The 1kHz rate is OK if you have time to waste.

I was glad to see direct entry in this receiver though. The radio is simple to operate in this regard. One simply punches in the frequency and presses the execute bar. The buttons on the keyboard are soft. Unfortunately, one cannot enter the frequency too quickly, and it is a bit difficult to punch in a frequency when the radio is in the upright position. Sometimes, keys pushed do not register because one hasn't pressed the button hard enough.

The DX-400 is supplied with an analog signal strength meter, not with the bargain basement LCD lights the Uniden model offers. This signal strength meter is most useful when using the antenna trimmer to receive optimum performance, however, the meter is not the most accurate I have seen..

Another important part of the DX-400 is the antenna trimmer, which requires manual setting when changing frequencies. This is a bit of a hassle, but it useful for attenuating overloading frequencies like VOFC @ 5985 and WOA on 5995 kHz. It also helps the radio do the best it can with the antenna you have. Here, the signal strength meter is quite handy in helping you find the correct position.

Another nice function is the RF Gain switch, which has three positions labeled "DX", "Norm" and "Local". I almost always leave mine in the DX position, although normal and local are used sometimes when one has a minor overloading problem. However, these positions are useless on the VOFC and VOA overloading indicated above. Even in the "Local" position, the radio continued to suffer overloading. Now to some serious problems. Firstly, when it comes to installing an external antenna to the DX-400, several problems arise. Firstly, the antenna and ground terminals are recessed rather far back into the radio, making connection of the antenna somewhat difficult. Also, the ground and antenna screw connections are somewhat close to each other.

Upon installation of a 70' longwire, the DX-400 seems to blow it's transistors! All sorts of intermodulation, assorted hash, and other undesirable elements invade the DX-400. Apparently, the folks at Radio Shack knew what they were doing when they threw in the 30' longwire. They felt that with only 30', the receiver wouldn't be overloaded. They were right. Even attenuating the signals down as far as possible still only produced intermodulation of all kinds. It didn't help much that I am located about 2 miles from 5 kw WWWG here in Rochester on 1460 kHz. WWWG is a religious station and I knew something was definitely wrong when I turned to 11840, Radio Moscow's frequency and heard "Back to God Hour".

I disconnected my external antenna and went back to using the other antenna supplied with the receiver. I ordered a Grove Minituner 3, an antenna tuner selling for about \$40.00 from Grove Enterprises. Within a week the tuner arrived and I began using it. This seemed to clean up 85% of the intermod problem, but it also wiped out the DX! No good:

Finally, I noticed another problem which I still haven't figured out how to solve entirely. I use external speakers for my DX-400 and also I have a patch cord to my recording system. I found that when I disconnected the audio patch cord, much of the intermod and hash dissapeared. Apparently, the audio cable was not too well shielded.

When using an audio cable with this receiver, be sure that the cables are well shielded.

Shortwave performance was very good for a portable. I have tuned in FIBS already as well as other DX stations I haven't heard before. However, synthesizer noise is a problem on the lower frequencies, especially on AM/MW and LW. So watch out if you DX the tropical bands.

Also, the radio is prevalent to intermodulation, so unless you live at least 10 miles away from a radio station's transmitters, expect some problems here as the Dynamic Range is below what it could be.

The audio quality of the radio is fair. It does allow for fairly loud listening, but the overall audio quality is compromised by a single tone control knob instead of two independent Bass and Treble knobs.

Overall, the DX-400 is an excellent receiver if you want to spend less than \$300.00. The radio is fairly portable and offers stability, ease of operation in most cases, good audio quality, and excellent SSB facilities. The radio is well suited as a portable, as it is sensitive and fairly selective. However, when using an external antenna, severe intermod problems can make themselves known, and noise levels do increase. As with many other radios in this price range, MW, LW, and FM reception is poor to dismal. Yet at only \$179.00-299.00, the radio offers good value.

My recommendations to you are: if you want a decent, stable, portable with digital frequency readout, and you can install a good ground and perhaps invest in a passive antenna tuner, this radio may very well be for you.



HEADPHONE CORDS ..... Kobylski, MD

Have you ever found yourself in this situation? It is the wee hours of the morning and everyone else in the house is asleep and you are being Considerate and using your headPhones. You are trying to make log entries or take notes for a reception report and that darn headPhone cord is getting in the way. The same Problem occurs when you have a reference book on the table like the WRTH or the ILB, that cord just keeps getting in the way. Well I have the answer to your dilemma. Put the headPhone jack under the table in front of you. This will forever end that dangling Froblem on your table. Beleive me this will help, I did it 4 years ago and have been happy with it ever since.

Here is a list of the materials you will need to rid yourself of this Problem. A Plug that will fit the external speaker Jack of your receiver, a three conductor Jack the size of the Plug on your headPhones, some wire and an external speaker. This is one solution to the Problem. Here is the schematic for this circuit.



One other way is just simply to get a headphone extension cord. You can lay the Plug on the table next to your radio, rout the cord down behind your table and mount the Jack under the table in front of you. When you want to use the Phones Just Plug your Phones into the Jack and the Plug into the headphone Jack of your receiver. This is by far the cheapest way and the simplest. Let me add one caution to you in using this method. Transistor or IC audio amplifiers don't like to work without a load on them. There is a long technical explanation for this but it can simply be said there is a danger of blowing the amplifier if there is no load on the amp for a period of time.

I have found favor with the first method as is told by my using it for so long. The external sPeaker often gives you a 10% to 20% improvement in the audio you hear. I have done this on Yeasu and Kenwood receivers and it has been my experience that this is true.

Try my little suggestion and you will find a little help in the shack.


Hello folks! It's time to say hello for the last time in the STATION SKEDS column. The new editor is Ralph Bowden whose name and address appears at the top on the masthead.





A note from Russ Lay of GA: "My motivation in writing was in regards to two loggings of TWR Swaziland in your October column. I thought the timing unusual based upon my past experience with TWR, so I tuned down and gave a listen. Sure enough, the only EE religious programming i was able to hear belonged to TIFC-Costa Rica. <u>Generally</u>, TWR does not sign on until <u>0400</u> GMT (both loggings were well before that). About <u>0353</u> or so they crank up-their interval signal, interspersed with EE IDs "This is Transworld Radio, Swaziland". At 0400 they sign on. On a good to excellent African night, you will be able to hear both stations mixing it up after 0353. Before that time, you are most probably tuned in to TIFC."

You know, folks, as wintertime draws near, our daylight hours grow shorter and shorter (I hope this didn't come as a rude surprise to any of you!), until the year's poorest excuse for a day, December 21 (I believe). Mid-day activity on 40 and 49 meters has really picked up in the past few weeks, and, for about 30 days on either side of 12-21 there will occur some excellent opportunities for spectacular 49 and 60 meter band catches, propagation deities willing. DX'ers on ECNA should be on the lookout for those early signers: Burundi-3300-2100\*; Congo-4843-2000\*; Kenya-4804 & 4934-2010\*; Mozambique-3338-2215\* and \*0300, also 4902-2000\*; Rwanda-6055-mixing w/Czech to 2100\*; Senegal-6045 and 6180-1800\* (good luck); and elusive little Tristan-3290-2205\*. Those of you in the Midwest thru the West Coast will want to try for the guys who quit between 2200-2400, that EC DX'ers take for granted. Elsewhere in the northern hemisphere, expect lo-band reception from your east at early afternoon hours also. Seems like the perfect way to while away a chilly December Sunday afternoon to me (several other perfect ways also come to mind, so use your imagination if your receiver poops out). I have high expectations from the lot of you, and you can bathe in your own glory by sharing your amazing DX-catches with me and thus with the world.

Here are my admittedly-flexible guidelines for AFRICA contributions: Please submit on standard report forms or reasonable facsimiles..and cut them up, please. Print or type your info as clearly as possible..I can't read foreign alphabets. Send them either to Peggy, your friendly Central Distribution Editor (address back page), or to me..if you're a procrastinator like myself, send them directly here. Deadline is the 12th, so don't pop your stuff into the mailbox on the 10th and expect them to make it on time. Try to give some details of your reception to keep the column interesting..."OM nx & mx" is hardly the stuff of great literature. You can usually skip song titles, though. If you didn't hear an ID, your report should be labelled (t). The oldest logging I'll use will be the first day of the previous month, so if deadline is December 12, don't send anything you heard before November 1, for example; exceptions will be made for overseas contributors or exceptional DX. Please let me know how you feel about any of these guidelines, and about the column in general this month. I need your feedback to keep AFRICA responsive to your needs!

 $\underline{\text{DX}}$  A/O : A quick scan thru the pages of any A/O column will reveal a noticeable lack of Far East and Pacific loggings from ECNA SWLers, excluding, of course, those of the high powered International broadcasters (R. Beijing, R. Australia etc.). Many East Coast and Central NAm listeners shy away from tropical band A/O DXing because they deem it as too difficult and not worth the trouble. I agree, it is difficult and frustrating at times, but not impossible. Granted, DXers on WCNA do have a decided edge over their East Coast and Central NAm brethren when it comes to logging the Asian and Pacific Island outlets. However, with patience, the right propagation, and some know how, it is possible to log the low power tropical band broadcasters anywhere on the continent. I have no control over your patience nor over the propagation, but I do hope to increase your knowledge. This month I will discuss the best times to listen for Asian/Pacific tropical band (90m and 60m) stations.

One reason for the unpopularity of tropical band A/O DXing among NAm SWLers is the fact that the best time to log these stations is the early morning hours-your a local time. 0900 to 1200 GMT are the optimum hours for ECNA listeners, while those on the West Coast can expect good copy until 1500 GMT or later.

Fall, Winter, and early Spring are the best seasons for tropical band DXing, as the lower frequencies are not plagued as much by static. Also, there are fewer hours of daylight, giving the sun less time to ionize the atmosphere, thereby causing less absorption of the relatively low power signals usually found on the 90m and 60m bands.

A "darkness path" between the transmitter point and your receiving location is required for these low powered signals to reach your antenna. So how, you may ask, do I know what areas of the world are in darkness at a given time? One of the best sources for this info is the SPEEDX publication SUNSET/SUNRISE TIMES. This 16 page booklet, available from SPEEDX HQ for \$1.50 (\$1.25 to full members), gives the sunset/sunrise times for over 260 sites worldwide. All you need to know is your local sunset/sunrise times and a darkness path is easy to figure out. For example, say it is mid-November, you live in Boston, and wish to try for Sarawak, E. Malaysia. The SUNSET/SUNRISE TIMES lists Sarawak's sunset/sunrise times as 1037-2241 and Boston's as 2134-1154 (all times GMT). The optimum listening time thus would be between Sarawak's sunset at 1037 and Boston's sunrise at 1154. By checking RTM-Kuching's sked on 4950 kHz, you see that they s/on at 0830 thus making it possible to hear them during the optimum time. It has also been observed that reception at or near a station's exact sunset or sunrise time further enhances their signal quality. Thus, the Boston SWLer should try for the 10kW signal from Sarawak between 1030 and 1100 for best results. As mentioned before, the right propagation conditions must exist for reception, but at least now you know the best time to listen. I will discuss propagation in more detail in the Dec. A/O column.

For those of you who find it impossible to drag yourself out of bed on cold winter mornings, there is one other portion of the day when tropical band Asian DXing is possible. During the Fall and Winter months around 2100-2300 GMT, it is possible to receive signals (especially from Indonesia) via the "long path" route. Instead of crossing the Pacific or polar regions, these signals pass over Africa and the Atlantic on another darkness path. Long path signals are not as consistent nor as strong. So for the unique enjoyment found only in A/O tropical band DXing, TUNE IN EARLY!

If you need to get mint stamps (ms) for return postage, the best source is the DX Stamp Service; 83 Roder Parkway; Ontario, NY 14519. Mint stamps for postage are usually more effective, and most often cheaper than sending the 2-4 IRCS that are usually required for an air reply.

Do you have the <u>QSL Address Book</u> by Gerry Dexter? It is a book that should be owned by all QSL hounds. It lists the addresses and QSL policies of many shortwave broadcasters. It is available from: Gilfer Associates, Inc; P.O. Box 235; 52 Park Ave; Park Ridge, NJ 07656. Ask for a catalog when writing.

Another book that is a must for ALL DXers, QSL hound of not, is the World Radio and TV handbook. This is the bible of radio. It lists stations, addresses, frequencies, schedules, and a wealth of other information. It is a MUST HAVE book. This is also available from Gilfer.



NUMBERS STATIONS REVEALED Ian Kerr, of Surrey U.K., kindly sent a letter explaining the source of some German numbers stations :

"Now we have an official explanation of NUMBER STATIONS in German. On 29 August one of the official British national TV networks (C4) on its nightly news interviewed an East German agent who had confessed to the authorities." "She worked for the HVA, that is, the East German intelligence. She listened to two frequencies and copied down number groups. These contained three types of messages: instructions, confirmations of messages, and Christmas/ birthday etc. greetings to provide encouragement. There was stated to be at least 10,000 illegals like her still operating in West Germany."

Along the same lines, Dan Sheedy of California writes:

"Some info on the North Korean [numbers station] on 5872a... their sked is \*1000-1030\* & \*1400-1430\*. ...begins with about 3-4 minutes of IS, into 'Song of Gen'i Kim II-Sung' & then a [VL] with number] groups (3-4 per group), occasionally has classical mx as a bridge.....Peggy Thompson [taped some brasts] and contacted some Korean friends.. [they say] these are 'a North Korean spy network aimed at infiltrators in South Korea from Pyongyang'"
