BOB HORVITZ, Executive Secretary of ANARC, has passed on comments ANARC has officially submitted to the FCC in regards to NPRM RM-5836. Gen. Docket No. 88-281, which proposes that labels be provided with all scanners and other types of receivers advising owners that they may be breaking the law by tuning in to certain frequencies protected under the recently passed ECPA. What Bob and ANARC is proposing is that instead of labels used to warn owners of possible illegal reception, that a page or two of instructions be included with these receivers explaining the law and just what types of reception the ECPA is supposed to protect. Bob points out in his comments that there is no way that a label the size the FCC is proposing could possibly inform a receiver owner what is and is not illegal. Stay tuned for further developments.


<u>GENE HUGHES</u> for his 25 years editing the best-selling "Police Call" frequency directories.

AMERICAN NOTES

The publishers of the Ames, IA, Tribune are going to court to challenge the Smith-Mundt act--the law that forbids the dissemination of USIA/VOA information among Americans. The company intends to make a First Amendment (freedom of speech and of the press) issue of it; as Mark McCormick, a Des Moines attorney who has been retained by the Tribune and its parent company, says: "I think we have a substantial constitutional challenge, and I'll be anxious to persuade a judge." The only thing I like better than news clippings, friends, is letters; I'd like to share with you some comments that Paul had....

On the SPEEDX Poll: I didn't reply, although I went so far as to jot down most of my responses. It just came down to not getting around to writing you on time. The Poll is a good idea; maybe once a year you could get a page opposite the back cover and use it to print the ballot. Or I could staple it in on a separate sheet, as I do with the renewal forms as your memberships/subscriptions come due. What do the rest of you think? Would this make you more likely to vote?

Bill Tisdale's comments on Hawaiian CB bring back some memories. "Talking skip" was a popular hobby among some acquaintances of mine many years back. The outfit of choice was a standard base unit, two high-gain beams cophased together, and a converted Ham linear amplifier, putting out anywhere from 50 to 1000 watts. Two way contacts with the West Coast and Hawaii were common, and, on a good day, Australia wasn't unusual. These people were very conscious of the FCC, and would--in fine old underground fashion--operate only for short periods on an irregular basis. They were technically as proficient as any Ham I know, but didn't want to bother with code requirements, or to observe the etiquette of the Ham bands.

Other antenna articles should add strength to those ultra-weak signals next fall.

"There is also a section on Peripheral Equipment: Tuners, audio filters, spectrum analyzers, and tape recorders. We also offer two articles on computers as adjuncts to serious SW DXing.

"Finally, there are several feature articles. One is, we believe, the definitive article on DXing Papua New Guinea and Irian Jaya. Another is a bibliography of medium wave DXing articles which are currently available as reprints: 180 or so are discussed as being of most relevance to SW DX. There is also an extensively illustrated update from the ANARC Committee to Preserve Radio Verifications.

Difference Dysicist Samuel Ruben passed away in July, at the age of 88. DXers owe more to him than most of us realize.

Although he couldn't afford to attend college, a sympathetic professor at Columbia University let him sit in on classes, and got him a pass for the college library. Ruben opened a laboratory in the 1920's; one of his first inventions was a device that converted household current so that it could power radios. Later on, he invented a sealed mercury battery that worked under any temperature, and which the Armed Forces used for two-way radios and mine detectors.

OBSCURE LANGUAGES

Philadelphia SPEEDXer Louis Delpino writes:

I became intrigued with the Sinhala language when I began sponsoring two foster children in Sri Lanka. I contacted Berlitz and several other nationally advertised language schools, as well as numerous bookstores, but no Sinhala material was available.... I was finally told about Spoken Language Services, Box 783, Ithaca, NY 14850. It proved the end of a long and frustrating search.

This company offers tape cassettes and textbooks of full courses, not merely "handy phrases" and tourist-oriented stuff. My course comprises 34 cassettes and about 650 pages of text, including lessons in written Sinhala as well as the customary transliterated exercises. Amharic, Tagalog, and Telugu are among the other "unusual" languages available; a free catalogue is available, and mail-order service is excellent.

Lou adds that he first heard about SPEEDX via HCJB's "DX Party Line," and listens on a Radio Shack DX-360 to practice foreign languages and to hear English-language news which is unavailable elsewhere. Lou, thanks for writing, and we all hope that SPEEDX continues to be a helpful and fun club for you!

GUAM...AWR-Asia's LISTENER MAILBOX in English, hosted by Greg Scott, airs for 15 minutes every Sat 0200 UTC on 17865 Khz, 1500 UTC on 11810 KHz and 2115 UTC on 9465 KHz. (Yukimasa Matsushita, JAPAN; James Kline, CA)

KOREA...Listen to Radio Korea this month for news and information on the 1988 Summer Olympics. They should provide an interesting insight into the excitement of a country hosting its first Olympiad.

SOUTH AFRICA...As the seasons change, Radio RSA's reception should improve in the Western Hemisphere. An interesting transmission to try to hear is the 0400-0426 UTC broadcast to Africa and the Middle East. Heard daily, it features NEWS, LISTENERS QUESTIONS and NEWS IN BRIEF. (RSA info from Peter Card, RI)

SWEDEN...Radio Sweden broadcasts an interesting lineup of English programming. On Mon-Fri you can hear WEEKDAY, followed by: Mon NORDIC MUSIC Tue SWEDEN CALLING DXERS Wed Studio Guest Thu Studio Guest or HORIZON Fri NORDIC MUSIC. Sat features NORDIC NEWSWEEK, while Sun has a different program every week of the month--MAILBAG, STAMP CORNER, SWEDISH SPECTRUM, SPECIAL FEATURE PROGRAM MAGAZINE. The NORDIC MUSIC feature on Mon has classical, folk or jazz, while the Fri edition has rock, pop or folk. (James Kline, CA)

TURKEY...The Voice of Turkey is an interesting station to listen to. The reports that I received from Gabriel Barrera this month set me thinking. It was a regular air mail envelope with an intentionally broad selection of smalldenomination stamps, a policy that we could all well follow for our reception reports, and carried the following imprint:

> ACTIVIDAD DE INTERES NACIONAL TARIFA REDUCIDA RADIOAFICIONADOS Resolucion D.u.C. 26/66

Yes, Argentina does have a special postage rate for the hobby, and because they have found it a hobby that promotes the national interest. In the Third World especially, and I include those countries that have aquired the status of developing, the DXer is an unofficial ambassador. A friendly report to a small station in Latin America is mentioned on the air. The listeners realize that they have friends in the North that are interested in them. Remember this the next time you write. It creates more international goodwill than building a station whose mission is to change a religion or a political philosophy or the multi-million dollar shocks to the economy that we throw into a country and then leave hanging.

Reduced postage for the hobby is something that might well be discussed at the next ANARC, or the next time you write your congressman. Economically, it would probably make little difference to the Postal Service, or to us more than an extra dinner or show during the year. But it would recognize the part that shortwave, and those who listen to shortwave, plays in iternational relations. Certainly, it would be a reversal of the VOA's unilateral policy of denying printed material to American citizens and residents. I don't deny the validity of the legal technicality that is the basis for this, but I feel that it is a selfish denial of the DXer's international role.

Gabriel had been on another DXpedition, to Coronel Vidal 340 kms south of Buenos Aires. DXpeditions seem always to favor the tropical bands, this column, Al Quaglieri's, and Bill Westenhaver's. Using only a 20-meter "L" antenna, he demonstrated dramatically that leaving the electrical garbage and RF saturation of an urban area puts "the world at your fingertips". Guy Atkins spent a Night on Bald Mountaim (actually Baldy Mountain in the wyoming Bighorns) and managed to find room for 2500 feet of wire which he pointed towards SE Asia with amazing results. I know of only two DXers who live in sufficently isolated locations to have room for multi-wavelength tropical band antennas so most are temporary and usually a group project. If you plan a DXpedition for the fall, point a Beverage toward Latin America. The pattern will cover the continent neatly. A few things to remember in planning the trip; the far end of the antenna should be terminated with an impedance equal to that of the antenna (300-600 ohms); if your receiver has only a 50-ohm antenna connection, you'll need a transformer; and this type of antenna works best over soil of extremely poor conductivity, so keep away from moist areas and salt water. Properly, it should be about 30 feet above the ground, but length is far the more important factor, and even lying on the ground, it's a good antenna. Even with a group, things will happen too fast, record everything, and if you can split your tape (stereo), keep the second channel for WWV and your voice notes on frequencies. The easiest way to do this is an open mike and a second receiver tuned to WWV. Like any expedition, the time spent in planning and optimizing equipment pays off.

Before I go on, I just heard AFRTS running some of their feature feeds at double speed. To copy these broadcasts, set your recorder at double speed (marked as "High Speed Dubbing" on most machines) and replay them at normal speed. The results here were excellent with no loss in quality. As Ed mentioned in his last column, AFRTS is scheduled to end -- and the several million Americans oversea will all vote for whichever candidate promises to revive it -- so with many of their programs on tape, or tape-delayed, this seems an experiment in packing more hours of program into less air time. I first knew AFRTS as an alternate to Tokio Rose, and they are many times over my most listened to station in the 45 years that have followed. This is only the second page and the second time I've climbed on a soap box, but more than the VOA, AFRTS is America overseas, but lacks tempermental, top-heavy bureauacracy whose main target area is Washington. If cuts have to be made, let's start with the propaganda mills. As DXers, to understand a country, we tune, not to the official outlets, but to those stations whose programs are intended I hope that some of you can transmit some of this DXpertise to for the nationals. your congressman.

Back to the south. Argenting is in winter, and Gabriel is enjoying the season that we're all waiting for. His logs of seldom reported stations will make a valuable reference as the season develops. I'll list some of them here so you can refer to them easily during the coming months. All were logged from Coronel Vidal using an ICOM IC-R71D and a 20-meter "L" antenna, and all are in Spanish. Because of the special nature of this section, I am listing the logs by frequency, but have added the location after the station name.

Gabriel logged many other stations during the three day session, but these were the most seldom reported of the long list. He reported the music on La Vez de Cimeruco as "miúsica llanera". For years, I've been trying to remember that term but it's been one of those mental blocks. In my log, I note it as "cowboy musie", but wisely, never use that term in my reports. The Llanos is, as are many areas in Latin America, a seperate region and culture and are proud of their idenity. In writing reports to tropical band stations, replay the tapes carefully and try to pick out the regional terms in the announcements. It's these terms, rather than the exact time of any announcement, that will convince the station that it was them that you listened to.

In this last few lines on this page, I'll mention that reception from southeast Asia has been very good around sunrise here when the South Americans fade abruptly, so continue monitoring for another hour and get your reports in to Bill Westenhaver. Now to the logs. The mail here has been late, late, late, and as I'm hesitant about using old logs, those that should have appeared last month, I'll have to omit quite a few. I'll use my own (ch-MX) to fill in wherever I can in hope that the column will serve a a better reference, the month that it is on your desk. Unless noted other wise, the language is Spanish, and for Brasil Portugese. The frequency is in kHz., and the time UTC.



If you tried to visualize the "Grounded Random-length Antenna" described in the August issue, perhaps I can clarify it. First, "random-length" means only that the designer did not specify a design frequency. Until you reach lengths of half a kilometer, all antennas have a resonant frequency. I believe that the description was of a short horizontal antenna with a vertical downlead to ground at one end. The receiver was tapped into the downlead at a point somewhat above ground. The antenna functions as a vertical (the downlead) with a capacity hat (the horizontal) and a shunt feed (the tapping point of the receiver lead). It's a good antenna and has been widely used in MM for years. If you build one, I'd suggest that the length of the horizontal section is less important than that of the vertical, the ground should be of good quality, and the receiver tapping point adjusted along the downlead to match the imput impedance of your receiver. 73's ch-MX



Greetings, dear readers, Because this is my first column, a short introduction is appropriate. I'm 27, married (Judith) and have no children (who has time for children ? hi!). By profession I am an Electronics Engineer, currently designing and developing sophisticated intrusion detection systems for the military. I have a formal background in R.F. circuit design, and I guess it is only natural that I have an interest in shortwave radio. I have been DX'ing since 1975, but I was totally inactive from about 1980 to early 1987, due to college, marriage and work. The DX bug bit again last year, and about 10 minutes later I picked up the phone with MasterCard in hand and bought a new receiver! I vigorously pursue new countries and QSL's, particularly the Africans, but I also spend a significant amount of my SW time listening to news and music. When I am not at the dials, I am attending to the needs of two successful businesses that I own and operate (brag, brag). I supply chemicals to the numismatic (coin collecting) industry and I also run a growing "pseudo wholesale" jewelry business, specializing in diamonds. (Gee, that's a weird medley of interests, aint it ?!).

Writing this column is "another iron in the fire" as they say, but with intelligent time management (the secret to success) AND support from YOU, I believe that I will be able to contribute to the technical needs of the SPEEDX readership. A technical column is both appropriate, and in my opinion, essential to a hobbyist magazine such as SPEEDX. It is my sincere desire that this column will be beneficial to all', regardless of background or experience. I will try to present a blend of both "milk" and "meat" as far as topics are concerned. Please let me know what subjects are of interest to you, and by all means , contribute ! Having said that, here we go:

The Kenwood R-5000 Scanning Modes (Written by Mike Schulsinger)

The May 1988 <u>DX Montage</u> carried a request for information on using the Kenwood R-5000's "program scan" mode. Since many SPEEDXers now own R-5000's, and the R-5000 manual is not correct, I thought it might be useful to publish a procedure to activate the useful "program scan" mode.

The R-5000 has two scanning modes; memory scan and program scan. Memory scan is useful when you wish to monitor more than one frequency at a time, and is similar in function to the normal operating mode of a VHF UHF programmable scanner. To use it, you enter the frequencies, modes and antennas desired as shown on p.21 of the instruction manual, then follow the memory scan instructions on p.23.

Program scan allows you to scan all frequencies between any two of your choice, for example 15,100 kHz to 15,600 kHz. Better VHF/UHF scanners tend to have a similar feature, often referred to as "search". Program scan is of limited value to the casual SWL, but it can tell a "hardcore" DXer a lot

about current conditons in a given frequency band. For example, if you use this feature to scan the same band each day throughout a season, you will tend to hear the same stations on the same frequencies each day. But when the band opens up or closes down, the pattern will be altered and the change will be immediately obvious to the listener. You can accomplish the same thing manually, but with less speed and accuracy than when using program scan.

Program scan actually permits you to enter as many as ten pairs of frequencies, if you are willing to relinquish two of the 100 available memory channels for each pair. To begin, store the lower frequency of the first pair in memory position #08 and the higher frequency in #09. The second pair can be stored on memory locations #18 and #19, and ending with the tenth pair stored in #98 and #99.

To operate, start in Memory mode. Move the tuning dial to either channel of the pair you wish to scan, #18 or #19, for example. Now press the VFO/M switch to enter the VFO mode. Press SCAN and the R-5000 should begin slowly scanning the chosen band. You will hear static on unoccupied frequencies. To speed up the scanning process, adjust the squelch (SQL) until the background noise is muted. The STEP button also affects scan speed. Remember to set the squelch back to its minimum (CCW) position when you finish scanning.

I have used program scan to store ten of the most active shortwave broadcast bands, but hams and ute DXers could use it in the same manner. Now, how many of you R-5000 owners would like to be able to print out a list of active frequencies obtained by program scan while your RX runs unattended? Using Kenwood's IC-10/IF-232C computer interface accesories, any microcomputer with an RS-232C interface and a BASIC program, I think a reasonably accurate printout would be possible.

I would be glad to hear from any reader regarding the content of this column, and I will try to respond to everyone on an individual basis, IF possible. I am a very busy man, but your questions,opinions and desires are important to me. If that were not the case, I would not have offered to edit this column. Questions of a general nature and of interest to all SPEEDXers will be addressed within this space.

Please do not write me with questions like: "Which receiver is best?", or "Which antenna is the most efficient?". I would only be able to respond with an opinion which is necessarily limited by my personal experience. I will present receiver and other SW equipment reviews in this column and I will not censor any author's opinion regarding the items they review.

The six topic categories listed in the heading are not all-inclusive. It is conceivable that there are other appropriate sub-headings, and anything that I feel is within the scope of this column and of interest to the majority of readers will appear as space permits.

Some of the topics that may appear in the near future include primers on interpreting specification sheets, a peek behind the dials of modern communication receivers, how NOT to construct an antenna, understanding solar and geomagnetic phenomena and related articles.

I also would like to express my gratitude toward the BOD for their trust in my abilities, and special thanks to Peggy Thompson, Ed Janusz and Ralph Bowden for their advice and contributions.

As most of you have probably noticed, I have included FIXED AERONAUTICAL & VOLMET stations under the more general heading of OTHER FIXED & RTTY; this is due to the small number of such loggings this month. Also, some RTTY stations are listed twice, under both FIXED CASTAL/NAVAL, and also OTHER FIXED/RTTY. These stations are somewhat ambiguous. Example: 12195.5 FUF Tahiti is French Navy, but generally functions as a fixed point-to-point station, not a coastal.

Last month, I inadvertently omited loggings from Fred Belghaus, NJ, and Ken Roberts, FL, although they were given credit. Their loggings appear this month. Sorry, guys.

Almost all contributors are submitting their loggings on the standard forms, cut into strips; this is fine. My only request is that the cut strips <u>not</u> be stapied, as this makes sorting difficult at my end. Also, a lot of time can be saved if each contributer checks his submissions for duplicate loggings before sending them to me. Please avoid logging any station more than once per frequency.

I've been playing with FAX the last few days, and I've listed some of my loggings. There doesn't seem to be much to be heard (seen?), but I've been having fun. The equipment I'm using is the Info-Tech M-800 at home, and the Universal M-7000 at work. With the popularity of the M-7000 growing I hope to see more FAX loggings in the future. The parameters for FAX stations that I have listed in the Remarks column indicate the LPM (lines per minute) & IOC (index of cooperation, or scan density). So, 120/576 = 120 lines per minute, 576 IOC.

Some LW beacon loggings have been sent in from a few members. I haven't included them, and will not unless there is an overwhelming demand from the membership. Personaly, I would rather stick strictly to SW stations. Comments welcome.

Once again I'm embarrased about the bland masthead, but I've not been able to come up with anything better. I know that life is too short for cheap mastheads, but please bear with me on this for a short while...



BOOKS

WORLD SATELLITE SURVEY: A GUIDE TO COMMERCIAL SATALLITE COMMUNICATIONS, by R. Stanyard. This book is a major new definitive work which sets out to review the world's commercial satellite systems from a business viewpoint. It is aimed at all companies and organizations using satellites, providing satellite or ground equipment and hardward, communication carriers and regulatory agencies. Technical and business consultants, financiers, insurers, and research academics will also find this book invaluable.

SECTION I: INTRODUCTION, MARKET SURVEY. This section consists of a qualitative review of current trends and developments in the satellite communications sector. It also covers launch vehicle and space business in general, as well as discussing the specific applications of satellite communications. Specific markets considered are satellite television (including direct-to-home DBS, cable television channel distribution, networking and satellite news gathering), telephony, business communications (including VSATs), mobile satellite services, radio determination sattelite services, and ground equipment sectors.

SECTION II: SURVEY OF SATELLITE SYSTEMS: Ninety-two major satellite systems, current and planned, are reviewed in this section, with commercial summaries of each satellite system operator. These include addresses, telephone, telex, telefax, prime contact names, launch dates, project costs, and project status. Future developments in the operators' plans re also discussed, where available. The section includes many photographs and technical illustrations of the systems, together with footprint maps. A full glossary of terms is included.

SECTION III: LAUNCH SYSTEMS. This section provides detailed support information on launch vehicles available to commercial satellite operators over the next ten years. Past launch records are available, together with current launch manifests. A summary of upper stages for use with the SHUTTLE and other United States and international launch vehicles is included.

Finally, SECTION IV profides a glossary of terms and a summary of the main platforms used for commercial satellites. (TELECOMMUNICATIONS JOURNAL, June, 1988. Via RSB.)
