FROM SHORTWAVE TO STAR WARS--AFRTS LIVES! by DAVID BURGIN This week a letter arrived from Colonel Tom Hansen of the Department of Defense: During December, AFRTS resumed broadcasts via the International Maritime Satellite (INMARSAT) system. The DoD was convinced by Naval personnel that INMARSAT would be more reliable..."no shortwave fading!" The bottom line is that this service costs less than renting VOA's transmitters, plus it provides 24-hour service.

You might consider an L-band antenna which would help greatly in pulling in INMARSAT. Another alternative would be to take the Armed Forces Fact Sheet advice and purchase what they call the Basic Unit, which consists of the following:

a 48-inch reflector dish; LNA; mount; 100' of interconnecting cable; and simplified instructions for installation.

Unit cost: US \$5,570; here in Canada, CN \$ 8,114.40, exchange and duty included. OUCH!!

In <u>Colombia</u>, Caracol continues its game of musical chairs. To review the moves:

1. In June Caracol reactivated its shortwave outlet on 4755 kHz to carry the primary (they use the term basic) Caracol program. The station ID's with "Esta es HJKC, 850 kHz," the MW ID.

2. At this time, Caracol, Nieva on 4945 kHz, which had been the shortwave outlet for the basic network, left the air.

3. In September the 6150 kHz station in Nieva, previously the shortwave outlet for HJFR, appeared carrying Caracol basic programs and IDing "Esta es HJJR, 1010 kHz en Nieva."

4. In November the 4945 kHz station reappeared carrying the Radio Reloj programs and IDing "Esta es HJFR, 1210 kHz en Nieva, Colombia." This had previously been the shortwave outlet for HJJR.

The moves left more than a few DXers thumbing through their station lists, but it was nothing more than exchanging the shortwave outlets of Caracol's two Nieva stations so that both networks would have national (?) coverage in the 60 meter band. The "?" refers to the growing competition between Colombia and Venezuela for radio dominance in the Amazon area.

In <u>Venezuela</u>, there's been activity. Radio Continental de Barinas, new to shortwave, started its 24-hour schedule on 4940 kHz in November. Radio Mundial Caracas returned to shortwave on a 24-hour schedule less than a month before. In Bolivar, Radio Mundial Bolivar has been more active than ever, though I wonder who listens to their hour-long ad blocks. And even Radio Mara stays on all night Saturdays. If you listen to the dedications, you'll realize that all these stations have an across-the-border secondary target area.

The increase in activity should continue as the holiday season is approaching and both Colombia and Venezuela extend their broadcast schedules with programs of late-night party music for the season.

At Mass today the priest announced a pilgrimage to the Basilica of Guadelupe in Mexico. I find it a long drive and can't imagine walking that far, but many, some with more years than I, do manage. The thought makes intensive monitoring this season more attractive than ever. I will try to get to Huayacoccatla for an update on that station before next month's column. They're rather isolated from the Capital and should have some interesting broadcasts around Christmas. Remember that the Latin American Christmas continues until Three Kings Day in January.

I have an antenna up, not really up as the supports are temporary and far too low. The cattle walk under it easily, but the wire would behead a horseman. It's a Delta Loop that I mounted horizontally and seems better than ever for the tropical bands. I followed sunrise across Africa, South America, and the Pacific Islands with very good results last night. But I'm most impressed with the mid-day reception from Central America. The stations seem to have more local color when they know their coverage is limited, so don't forget your recorder if you plan a trip south.

A quick note to fill the page. Several have asked if <u>Sani Radio</u> is still on 4755 kHz. They are. I catch them at their 22:30 sign-on before Caracol fades in.

Radio <u>Kek'chi</u>. When the first QSL's began to arrive, information that the name was "correctly spelled with an apostrophe" traveled faster than <u>a DX</u> tip. It was one of those...status symbols.

But that's no apostrophe. It's the typewriter's nearest equivalent to a mark linguists use to indicate a non-Indo-European phoneme when transcribing Kek'chi, the Indian language of the Verapaz region of Guatemala. The spelling has been universally adopted in Guatemala, and through the radio world, in the United States.

After listening rather closely, and Radio Kek'chi is "like a local" here, I believe that the rather subtle phoneme could have been omitted and Kekchi, which would better express the sound transmitted under tropical band DX conditions, used instead. But there are a lot of "apostrophes" in Kek'chi, so Kek'chi is correct.

Kek'chi is the broadcast language of Radio Tezulutlán, a Catholic station, so now the Kek'chi-speaking people have a choice despite the governments' swings from one Church to the other.

Modern Kek'chi, like other Indian languages in the area, consists of three levels. (1) Basic is the original language as it existed before European contact. (2) Second is a Spanish-based Pidgin covering those items and concepts introduced by the intruding culture. This would include Spanish words that have been adopted without change, but distorted in their adopted pronunciation. (3) Spanish religious terms the missionary hesitated to translate because of their ritual association.

Sometimes, especially in religious ceremonials, the result sounds like heavily accented Spanish, but it's pure Kek'chi.

The Americans have always been a language force in the area. Mexico is a classic example. Originally, and they still do, the Spanish spelled the name "Mejico" as the "h" sound of the Spanish "j" was closest to the Indian phoneme for the middle syllable. But the New World Spanish scholars substituted an "X" which meant, no letter available for this particular sound. Mexico adopted the X-spelling, but retained the original pronunciation, and it was the Americans who forced the X-sound into the name. In time, in the States at least, the apostrophe in Kek'chi will take on its English omltted-vowel meaning, and the soft Kek'chi phoneme will have disappeared.


A quick rundown on the radio languages in Guatemala.

Radio Kek'chi broadcasts in Kek'chi, so does Radio Tezulutlán. Radio Mam broadcasts in Mam La Voz de Atitlán in Tzutuhil La Voz de Nahuala in Quiché Radio Chortis in Chorti

All broadcast also in Spanish with the Indian language/Spanish ratio directly reflecting the language ratio of the local population.

I've been slow getting organized here in Huasca. One day slips into another the way they do in the country where life goes by seasons. Some days are almost completely lost by an all-night DX session when conditions are good, and others by a run to Mexico for the mail, bank, or whatever. The house remains "almost finished," but slowly moves toward that goal. The situation that precipitated my move here was on a civil level, but could have required a residence in the States for a time. It was closed a few days later with the report that I'd left and would be difficult and highly expensive to reopen. By now, I could return to Mexico without problems, but Huasca is so much better radiowise that I have no intention of doing so. Although South American reception is rather improved by the change in QTH, the most dramatic improvement is with the Central American stations, which will undoubtedly be reflected in future columns.

## Principles of Audio Filtering : Part 1. Introduction

Out of the vast range of frequencies which man uses to transmit information, the audio range occupies only a very small portion of the spectrum. Electronic devices can create,transmit and receive information over an exceedingly large and fundamentally limited portion of the electromagnetic spectrum, which ranges from a few cycles per second (or "hertz", abbreviated Hz) to many billions of Hz. Human beings can hear sounds or "air pressure waves" of about 20 to 20,000 Hz at most, while many, particularly the elderly, can perceive only the lower frequency portion of this range.

The transmission and reception of a typical shortwave radio signal involves several frequencies. The RF carrier frequency, the desired audio information such as music and voice, the frequencies of the receiver mixer stage oscillator (which are determined by the type of modulation of interest and the design of the receiver) and several other undesirable frequencies which are unavoidably produced as a result of the physiomathematical behavior of the receiver mixing process. The music or voice information is impressed upon the RF carrier (modulation), the composite wave is transmitted through space to the receiver, the composite wave is amplified and "mixed" or electronically combined with other frequencies and processed within the receiver with only one objective: to recover (demodulate) the original music or voice information. The recovered audio information is then usually amplified and converted from an electrical signal to an acoustical vibration with the well-known loudspeaker.

Communication receiver designers must make several tradeoffs while trying to produce a "pleasing" audio şignal. The bandwidths of the many filters found in a modern receiver determine the overall quality of the output from the speaker. In some designs, fidelity or faithful and complete reproduction of musical signals is the prime objective. This requires a wider receiver bandwidth. A wider bandwidth is fine (and preferred) for casual music listening, but it is very undesirable to a DX'er who is chasing a weak signal a few kilohertz or less away from an international powerhouse! The DX'er is much more interested in selectivity (the ability to select the signal of interest while rejecting other unwanted adjacent signals) and intelligibility of the desired station. Many more sophisticated and consequently, more expensive, receivers have multiple bandwidths which can be selected at the discretion of the operator depending upon conditions. Lower priced receivers usually only have fixed selectivity which is far too wide for DX'ing, or a "wide/narrow" switch which offers a meager compromise at best between fidelity and selectivity. Sophisticated filtering circuitry is expensive; manufacturers try to appeal to as large a portion of the potential market as possible by keeping costs down. They still correctly perceive that the average SWL is much more interested in music and voice fidelity than chasing weak DX hiding in the "background".

Top of the line receivers like the Kenwood R-2000 and R-5000, lcom R-71A, Japan Radio Company NRD-515 and NRD-525 can provide both fidelity and selectivity. But these receivers are all priced new in the over \$600 range! Incidentally, the audio quality of the R-5000 is superior to the others, which I have rigorously tested. The NRD-525 is an incredible receiver, but in my opinion, the audio quality leaves a great deal to be desired. (Now before all the lcom and NRD owners write me nasty letters, note the word "opinion"-- hi!).

Ideally, the overall bandwidth of a receiver should be no wider than necessary to recover only the information of interest. A receiver for only morse code (CW) would only need a bandwidth of few hundred Hz or less, but a receiver for "high" fidelity music would require a bandwidth on the order of 10 to 15 thousand Hz. To recover only voice information, a bandwidth of about 3 kHz (which ranges from about 300 to 3000 Hz) would more than sufficient. This 3 kHz range was determined after be considerable research by telephone engineers and scientists. Intelligibility, and most importantly, the ability of the callee to recognize the voice of the caller, are afforded with this relatively narrow bandwidth. Using a wider than necessary bandwidth will make it difficult to select the desired signal from the mishmash of every signal present in the passband. The socalled ability to "cerebrally filter" the composite audio which DX'ers develop with experience is the special talent of selective concentration which certainly helps the situation. But even the keenest ability often proves no match for the complex jumble of signals simultaneously present in the audio output of a SW receiver.

The overall selectivity of a typical communications receiver is determined by the bandwidth of the intermediate frequency (IF) stage. Anything that is present at the output of the IF stage will be passed on to the audio amplifier stage. It is usually "too late" to do anything about audio selectivity at this point, with the exception of adding some sort of "active" audio filter between the audio output jack and a pair of headphones or external speaker. Next month we will take a closer look at the Autek QF-1A audio filter and find out how it can help us isolate and copy an otherwise unintelligible signal. 73's and great DX,

## BOOK REVIEW, by Don Thornton

The Fine Tuning <u>DXer's GUIDE TO LATIN AMERICA (1989</u> <u>Edition</u>) is a plastic-spiral-bound notebook with over 40 pages of valuable information. In addition to a comprehensive list of stations logged in the past year, both by frequency and by country (with QSL information), it gives helpful information like how to send a thank-you note in Spanish or Portuguese to stations which do send you a QSL. Remember, most of these stations are run on private funds; they pay for the cards and letters they send to you, not their government.

The maps of Peru are also excellent. The part I liked the best, though, was an essay by Don Moore called "The Future for Shortwave Broadcasting in Central America." He explains the religious difference amongst the broadcasters (many of Central America's shortwave stations are run by religious orders), and talks about the listeners that the stations are trying to reach. It's good reading, and worth the \$5.00 if you have any interest in Latin American DXing.





There's rather more room left than I thought there would be, so I'll throw in a couple of DX tips I heard just this morning (1/14) on the BRT's "Radio World" px (both furnished by Eugene Gebeurs in Antwerp, Belgium): <u>CHINA</u>--the RFI relay via China at 1400-1500, beamed to India, has moved to 7125 kHz from 7130 kHz, to avoid Iran/Iraq 2RM; <u>JORDAN--R</u>. Jordan is now using 11955 kHz for EE in the period 0630-1450, moving down to 9560 kHz thereafter. (No, they didn't mention if RJ is still on 9560 kHz before 0630 UFC.)

Thanks to all of you for your many contributions this month. I again had to cut most of the frequencies listed last time; without that, I would have filled at least another page, which would have given our Esteemed Publisher a few headaches and/or nightmares. Now that the column is finished, I can move on to answering the notes and letters which came with the loggings.

JANUARY 1989 saw plenty of good DX opportunities on all frequencies high and low. Welcome back, sunspots! Hope you can stay awhile.

THE BOMBING AND CRASH OF PAN AM FLIGHT 103 created some activity on the HF bands. Andy Gordon monitored Edinburgh Rescue in Scotland working rescue helicopters. Reports of many casualties on the ground and severe fire at the crash sight were heard. Frequencies used included 3939.0 and 5680.0 kHz.

AS MENTIONED IN LAST MONTHS "DX MONTAGE", Symington and Henault's <u>Utility QSL Address Guide.</u> <u>Yolumes One & Two</u>, are now being published by Tiare Publications (Lake Geneva, WI). These books are excellent sources and have the official SPEEDX Utility Seal of Approval. Radio InfoSystems, the former publisher, will continue to offer other radio-related publications, including their Scanner Frequency Guides. Their address is PO Box 399, Holland, OH 43528.

HELP WANTED: ID of station UVA needed. This one has been logged by Peter Conway, Ed Janusz, and yours truly on various frequencies, including 4231.5, 5050.0, 8455.0 & 12830.0 kHz, all CW.

KAWN, CARSWELL AFB, TX is being regularly reported here and elsewhere. Art Blair (CA) wonders if KAWN is the actual callsign of the station besides being it's ICAO identifier. My sources show the call to be AFF33, although USAF bases seldom seem to use callsigns during transmissions except for MARS operations.

CW GOING QRT? So some people think. In November, the International Maritime Organization (IMO) announced that the traditional use of Morse code is to be replaced with a new high-tech system which will automatically send distress signals via satellite. The Global Maritime Distress and Safety System (GMDSS) will be implemented in 1993, and its use will be compulsory under IMO regulations. It is wonderful that safety and resuce operations will have another more reliable mode of communications. But will it really spell the end for CW communications? I think not. Since all current sea vessels already possess CW capability, it is unthinkable that the mode will simply be abandoned. Besides, everything that I have heard about the GMDSS system indicates that it will be mainly used for emergency and distress communications. Normal inter-ship and ship-to-shore traffic that occurs every day on CW can not be replaced entirely by the new system. Past developments in digital communications, notably RTTY and SITOR, have not brought about CW's demise. The bottom line is, when conditions are less than ideal for voice and teletype, CW is the most reliable HF mode.

Tradition is also a reason that CW will endure. CW has been around practically as long as radio itself, dating back to the 1890's and Marconi's ground breaking experiments with wireless communications. US radio amateurs are presently split over the issue of no-code license, and the strongest argument against such a license is that it breaks a century long tradition in ham radio. This tradition also exists in the maritime radio service, and too will contribute to a sound future for CW. (Thanks to Geoff Halligey for a clipping from the Dairy Telegraph, 11 November 1988.)

SOFTWARE NOTE: I have changed software to Appleworks GS, which allows me to integrate database, word processor, spreadsheet and graphic documents into will initially result in a large mess. The major problem I 've encountered is fitting all the information for a given logging on one line, which is why you'll notice those items with longer "Remarks" entries have been carried over to a second line. I have a wide range of fonts available, but prefer to stick to the simple (and readable) New York 9-point font for the loggings, and Helvetica 12-point for the text. Appleworks GS also includes a communications module, and I've found this to work great with my Kantronics KAM.
