1992 - THE YEAR IN REVIEW

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Well this has certainly been an exciting year on the bands. There have been numerous changes made by broadcasters as well as some that have sent atlas makers into a frenzy. What I have compiled below is my top twenty events and stories in shortwave radio. I am sure you will be able to think of

am sure you will be able to some I left out, or you may disagree with my ordering, but hey—get your own column!

1. The Soviet Union Disbands. Okay, so this technically happened in the last days of 1991, but its impact was felt all through '92.

First of all, we replaced the USSR with twelve separate radio countries. Then, private broadcasters like Radio Galaxy popped up all over Russia. Trying to sort out who was transmitting from where has been very confusing (is Radio Yerevan coming from Armenia or Russia?), but it has been an exciting challenge nonetheless.

2. Tom Meyer Leaves Radio Netherlands' "Happy Station." After twenty-two years behind the microphone, Tom handed over the controls to Pete Meyers last September, leaving a legacy of Sunday night programs that touched the hearts of people worldwide.

3. Radio St. Helena Day. After a successful single-day broadcast in 1990, Tony Leo fired up the transmitter on 11092.5 once again this

October. Judging from last month's Africa column, many of you were able to catch this rarest of rarities. Good luck on your QSLs!

4. KHBN Broadcasts from the Island of Palau. Last May, this new addition to the family of High Adventure's chain of stations began transmitting with very low power. By summer, they boosted their wattage and DXers all over were adding a new radio country to their logbooks.

> 5. WARC '92 Reallocates SWBC Bands. Although many changes they made won't be in effect until the next century, this spring conference extended several bands to include frequencles many stations were already remains to be seen whether

many will use the new 15 meter band, but WEWN (see #12) plans to use 18930 kHz, and more will likely follow.

6. Russia Opens Former Jammer Transmitters to Relay Western Broadcasts. Starting slowly last December and continuing throughout the year, several stations Joined in the race to lease these old sites. Early participants include Deutsche Welle, Adventist World Radio and Radio Beljing.

7. Radio Moscow Pushes Religion and Anticommunism. Along the same lines as #6, the ex-Soviets sold time on the once mighty RMWS

to the Japanese religious station R. Aum Shinrikyo and Vietnamese refugee station The Voice of Freedom—ultimate proof of the end of the Cold War.

8. Kuwait Returns to the Airwaves. After Desert Storm liberated Kuwait from Iraqi occupation, Radio Kuwait slowly rebuilt its programming schedule from Arabic only in February to the full English service by the summer.

9. Several International Broadcasters Undergo Name Changes. You can't tell the players without a scorecard. From Channel Africa to China Radio International, from Radio Czechoslovakia to Radio Vlaanderen International, it seems that everyone was looking for a new identity.

10. Two New American Stations Take to the Airwaves. All-gospel WJCR from Kentucky and the English-Spanish KJES from New Mexico joined the myriad of US religious outlets.

11. Radio Bosnia-Herzegovnia Goes on the Air. Reported just recently in November, will RBH outlast the Serbian oppression and become as well heard as Croatian Radio? Time will tell...

12. Mediumwave Stations Show Up on Shortwave. AM broadcaster WFLA in Tampa began relaying its signal, for some reason, on 25870 kHz. Several Argentine stations wind up in the same vicinity. Go figure.

13. WEWN Announces World Service. Rumored for months, WEWN either began testing its 500 kw transmitters in December with an inaugural broadcast on the 28th, or it didn't. (Sorry, it's an early deadline, so fill-in the appropriate info in January). Regardless, this Catholic station has proposed quite an ambitious schedule.

Check it out!

14. TASS Discontinues RTTY Broadcasts. Okay, so many of us would never notice, but for utility DXers, this was a major surprise and disappointment.

15. Voice of America Celebrates 50th Anniversary. 2/4/42-2/4/92. Enough said.

16. & 17. Radio France International and Radio Exterior de España get new relay sites. RFI is now using Hungarian transmitters. Has anyone really noticed? REE is still trying to get its Costa Rican plan going on a regular schedule.

18. KCBI Returns to Shortwave. After several years' absence, KCBI Dallas returned to its familiar haunts in the 19 meter band with continuous Dr. Gene Scott programming.

19. Deutsche Welle Stops Issuing Full Data Cards. This is a personal vendetta of mine. I managed to get all of their German and ex-GDR sites as well as Malta and Antigua with full data, site verifying QSLs. When I finally get around to sending in a report on Rwanda, they send back a "Sorry, Charlie" letter saying no more full data QSLs. Let this be a lesson to all of you—strike while the iron's hot!

20. New Relay Site Opens in Portugal. Radio Liberty and Radio Free Europe began using new transmitters in Maxoquiera last spring. Not very earth-shaking, and anyway, Gloria and Sines are a heck of a lot easier to spell!

So what do we see in store for us in 1993? Will Dr. Gene Scott buy the BBC? Will Glenn Hauser and Jonathan Marks meet in aneutral spot for a no-holds-barred Texas cage match? Will Greenland separate into several smaller republics? Will the United States wind up with more independent broadcasters than Brazil? And what about Radio Tristan da Cunha Day? Stay tuned to this column for all the latest!

TWR BONAIRE TO LEAVE SHORTWAVE

I received a rather excited phone call from SPEEDXer David Jones this past week with news that Trans World Radio Bonaire would leave the shortwave bands at 0400 UTC on 7/ 30/93. A letter to all TWR monitors from Chuck Roswell said that they would turn their focus to satellite transmissions and their 800 kHz mediumwave outlet. Since this was such last minute info, I do not know how this will affect Radio Netherlands' relay site or any further details. By the time you read this, hopefully we will know more. If this does go through as planned, you should QSL the station now if you have not yet done so, and if you are a regular listener, write them to let them know how you feel. More next month...

KNLS TO OFFER SERVICES TO DXERS

KNLS now has available a 32-page book titled DX Tips For Beginners, written by veteran DXer Carl Mann. Through a special agreement with Universal Radio, these are free for the asking from the station. Two sample articles in the newsletter give some fundamentals about antennas. Other topics covered include propagation, receivers, logbooks and QSLs. This sounds like it would be ideal for novice listeners.

KNLS also seems to be preparing a DX program called "Radio Today." They give no

times except that it will begin airing on 1/1/ 93. They ask for listeners to provide a "list of shortwave services putting the strongest signal into their part of the world." Reports should include your location, the station, language, UTC time and date, frequency and band, and a SINPO rating. I'm curious to see what course and format this will take. Listen in to find out and send in your loggings. English is on at 0800 UTC on 7365 and 9615 kHz and again at 1300 on 7355 and 9615 kHz. You can reach them at KNLS, Anchor Point, AK 99556.

SUDAN'S INTERVAL SIGNAL

By now you have probably noticed the many loggings of Radio Omdurman (Sudan) on 7200 kHz opening at 0250 UTC with ten minutes of interval signal. For those of you that read music, hear is that tune which is played on some sort of xylophone or keyboard.

It really annoys me that the WRTH no longer publishes the musical notation for interval signals. Back in the 70s, most station listings included this feature. Granted, many of them were not exactly correct, but they were close enough for me. It is one thing to see a description such as "native song played on xylophone" and another to actually see the notes. Therefore, this is my little contribution.

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
PC SHORTWAVE MONITOR[™] SOFTWARE

Another piece of software I received lately is this logging organizer. This is a simple little program that will help you keep an electronic logbook as well as keep track of QSL requests and print reports.

The PC Shortwave Monitor^m 2.0 is basically a specialized database. You type in the all of the typical logbook info and it sorts it by any field. There are single letter codes for programming type and language as well as an area to record comments. You can then view and print all records by country, band or any other characteristic. From here you can print out information for a QSL request. There are also provisions for importing or exporting the data as an ASCII text file.

Some pros about the program are that it will work on a bare bones PC such as an XT or

an 86 without a mouse. It requires no hard drive and very little memory. I see this as being very useful if you like to make lists of programs because of its ability to sort by format, language and target areas. 

The December issue of "Conde Nast Traveler" has substantial information in two articles on Indonesia--just about everything we want to know except how to hear their shortwave radio stations. If Indonesia is one of your special interests, check out your library to see if they have a copy of the magazine, you'll learn something new about that country. The magazine simply described Indonesia as "the mystifying exotic island nation" and went from there in an attempt to explain everything possible to us.

Hammacher Schlemmer's catalog had my Christmas present but apparently I had warned my children too long ago that the prices in this catalog are too high as I didn't find my present on Christmas morning. Oh, bah, humbug! What was the desired present? How would your radio shack look with a Marconi Wireless vintage stock certificate hanging near your radio. Hammacher Schlemmer (1-800-543-3366, or, by mail, Operations Center, 2515 East 43 Street, Post Office Box 182256, Chattanooga, Tennessee 37422-7256) offer item 55010B (unframed) for \$79.95 or item 55011B (framed) for \$139.95, a cancelled Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company stock certificate issued originally between a 1912-1922 time frame. And, back to real life radio information---

That publishing house up in Wisconsin who I thought was filling our end of 1992 with every new item possible fooled me. Three more new books have been published which apparently means Tiare Publications was merely starting 1993 early. These new items are dedicated to the more specialized shortwave listener but you might be one of those specialists -----so here's what's out there.

COP TALK! (subtitled Monitoring Law Enforcement Communications) by Laura E Quarantiello is the first of these efforts. The titles are as good a quick description of the entire seventy-six (76) page book as you might need. Price is \$19.95 plus \$2.00 shipping (\$3.00 foreign) from Tiare Publications, Post Office Box 493, Lake Geneva, Wisconsin 53147. 1-414-248-4845 for the welcomed Visa or MasterCard.

Number two effort from the same publisher (and from the same author) is entitled CITIZEN'S GUIDE TO SCANNING. Same price but 140 pages and the book goes from "What is a Scanner" right on though to take you from primer to advanced. Again if this is your specialty, this book will interest you.

And, now on to number three--COMPUTERIZED RADIO MONITORING authored by Todd D Dokey. Oh, yah, this is computerized all right--the book is identified as "Edition 1.0" and the advertising brochure (a fold-over four pager) includes the teasers that this book discusses many of "today's computer-friendly shortwave and scanner radios"--and tells you how "to set up your computerized shack, develop computerized monitoring strategies, plan databases..." Price is \$22.95 plus the same shipping charges as above.

WESTERN HEMISPHERE

TWR, Bonaire: The following is part of a interview with Chuck Roswell by Ken MacHarg of HCJB, Quito, Ecuador.

<Ken> Is it true that TWR, Bonaire is leaving shortwave?

<Chuck> Yes! We are terminating shortwave broadcasts as of July 1, 1993.

<Ken> Why is TWR leaving shortwave from Bonaire?

<Chuck> It's a mixture of listenership and economics. Basically our shortwave broadcasts have been carried by the programmers paying for the mediumwave. They've received shortwave in addition to the mediumwave broadcasts.

On July 1st TWR is lauching a satellite network of AM-FM stations in Latin America.

<Ken> What is going to happen to MW on 800 KHz? I heard that tranmitter time is being reduced. <Chuck> Yes! Effective January 3th we will reduce shortwave to 6 hours each transmitter (a total of 12 hours). Mediumwave will also be reduced.

<Ken> Will Morning Sounds still be on MW ?

<Chuck> Yes! but, on a shorter time length.

<Ken> What will happen to the transmitters on Bonaire?

<Chuck> The Inefficient 250kw transmitter will be dismantled. The 50kw one is staying so as to be brought up "on the air" to test it for any potential buyer.

<Ken> Will Bonaire Wavelengths continue?

<Chuck> YesI till the last Saturday in June, 1993.

<Ken> What will happen to you after TWR, Bonaire's shortwave service closes?

<Chuck> I could be going to one of TWR's transmitting sites in Guam, Sri Lanka, or Swaziland. (DXPL, 12/5)

WEWN: test frequencies which should be on the air anytime now. Some will be used later on for their regular broadcasting schedule. As follows are freqs and times:

5825: 24 Hrs; 6000: 0100-1600; 6185: 0800-1700; 7315: 1300-0000; 7465: 0500-2300; 7540: 24 Hrs; 9350: 0400-0200; 9580: 0800-1700; 9730: 1000-1500; 9985: 0500-2000; 11580: 1200-1900; 11695: 0100-2300; 11970: 2000-0200; 12080: 2300-1800; 13615: 1000-0600; 13710: 2200-1500; 13840: 2200-1800; 15140: 0200-0900; 15170: 1900-2330; 15235: 1900-0000; 15300: 0000-1600; 15430: 2100-0500; 15435: 0900-2100; 15610: 0200-2200; 17510: 1600-1200; 17725: 1700-2100; 17725: 2200-1200; 17850: 1600-2300; 18930: 24 Hrs; 21460: 24 Hrs; 21670: 1200-0600; 21735: 1800-0600; 21840: 1800-0600.

WEWN plans to start regular broadcasting Dec. 28th on the following schedule from 2000-1000 (ITC: 7540: 2000-2200; 5825: 2200-0000; 17510: 0000-0100; 9825: 0100-0300; 7520: 0300-0500; 7465: 0500-1000. (WoR #673)

WJCR: has finally come up on 13595 KHz, reception is said to be very good. (WoR #673)

- Christian Science Monitor: cuts back foreign language services. The JP, INDO, IT, and GR transmissions have been stopped. EG is now heard in most of those former foregin language service time slots. (RJMR 11/28)
- R. Miami Intl: Address is PO Box 526852, Miami, FL 33152 (ISA Telephone # (305) 267-1728. Jeff White says they are ready to sign a lease on the land, then construct the tranmitter building, put the antenna up, and reassemble the transmitter (which is semi-assembled at a warehouse in Miami) They hope to be doing some tests at WRMI within two months, depending on how long it takes construction workers to build the building. (WoR #670) Jeff White says they look to be on the air in Feb or Mar '93, and adds, "From the very first day, there will be English." (WoR #673)

WWCR: drops WOR at 0730 UTC Tuesday, a new time is 0800 UTC Sunday on 7435 KHz, due to WWCR adding 0800-0900 UTC on 7435. Another group wanted that time weekdays Tues-Sat. *Let's Talk Radio* is interested in the 3 hour block on Sunday 0600-0900 UTC; that would knock WOR off 0800 Sunday, but they would move to 0800 UTC Saturday, and on to 12160, a frequency that *LTR* would like to use 0800-0900 UTC. The last WOR on Mondays at 1330 UTC is on Jan. 4th.

Current schedule for Glenn Hauser's World of Radio is as follows:

On WWCR: Frl 2215 UTC, 15685 KHz; Sun 0405 + 0800 UTC, 7435 KHz; Mon 0000 UTC, 7435 KHz; 1330 UTC, 15685 KHz. *On WRNO*: Sat 2300 UTC, 7355 KHz; Sun 0300 UTC, 7355 KHz; 2130 UTC on 15420 KHz. (WoR #671)

- WWCR: the target date for WWCR's third transmitter to be on the air is May 1st. They are expecting delivery sometime in late April. (WoR #673)

LATIN NOTEBOOK

Carl Huffaker Domocilio Conocido Huasca de Ocampo Edo. Hidalgo MEXICO C. P. 43500

The other morning I tuned in **Radio Ondas de Rio Mayo** in Nueva Cajamarca, Peru. I wasn't DXing. I was just enjoying the music, good Peruvian music with enough *saludos* and early morning commentary to make it sound like real people. Then at 10:30, a psychologist came on, a regular program diagnosing illnesses that people wrote in about. In most cases, the diagnosis was *brujeria* and the recommendation a *limpia*.

Perhaps it's "just in case;" but if a belief in witchcraft is not universal in Latin-America, belief in its countermeasure, the *limpia*, is, and it exists quite apart from religion. Several churches practice faith healing, but this is to cure illness, not to counter witchcraft. *Limpias* are performed by psychologists, spiritual advisors, and "old Indians." Although the address and office hours where *limpias* are performed are stressed during the broadcasts, the programs are not completely commercial, but are more real-life dramas used by the station to attract listeners.

Limpias are referred to, but never described, on radio. Published descriptions are limited to anthropological papers and esoteric books. Some have taken on Christian aspects, and most churches tolerate rather than oppose them. But they are part of Latin-American culture and a pivot for many early-morning broadcasts. In hope that it will help you tune Ondas de Rio Mayo more as an SWLer and less as a DXer, this story is from my limited personal experience.

It was years ago. The Mexican economy was down and a couple of engineering projects that I had sewed up fell through. It was hard luck; but my friends who had more faith in my stars than I had said it was witchcraft: It was time for a *limpia*, but by someone very special.

It developed that a lawyer who was taking care of the President's investments in American real estate had an Indian grandmother who had years ago performed *limpias*. It wasn't easy, as she'd been wearing shoes for ten years, but she was persuaded to come out of retirement "for this once." She was one of those Indian women whose strength of character vibrated through everything she did, delicate yet immeasurably strong.

To perform a *limpia*, one most know the exact nature of the curse they're trying to remove. Most use cards to interpret the details, but she had asked me to bring four dried chiles. She threw them into the fire. They crackled, sputtered, and twisted into contorted shapes. She studied them for a long while and then said it was the worst she'd ever seen. It would be a difficult *limpia*, but she thought that she could manage.

We went into the patio. In the exact center, there was a blanket spread in the sun. I lay down and closed my eyes. She lit a fire, a scented smoke that I could not identify. She began to chant and brush me with a handful of aromatic plants. It was hypnotic. I drifted off, floated into nothingness. I was exhausted.

I slept for half an hour. When I awoke, I asked my wife, "Where's Doña Maria?" "Upstairs," she said. "She was too tired to wait for you to wake up."

A month later, I saw the grandson. "How is your grandmother?" I asked. "She's all right now," he said. "She can walk. Her legs were paralyzed for three weeks after that *limpia*."

There was no dramatic change in my life at that point, but those involved were awed by the strength and magnitude of the forces that were moved that day.

Three times during the broadcast, the psychologist said *brujeria* and recommended a *limpia*. I wonder what forces were moved by that almost matter-of-fact radio broadcast.

NEIGHBORS TURNED OFF BY WEWN

Atop one of the tallest mountains in Alabama on Monday, TV nun Mother Angelica showed off her newest network, touting the shortwave radio station WEWN as a way to share God all over the globe and send hope in times of crisis.

"There are millions of people in those newly freed Communist countries who have never heard of God or who have been told there was no God," she said. "I want to reach the heart of the people."

But the station, which begins broadcasting December 28 from a mountain on the border of Shelby and St. Clair counties near Vandiver, arrived this year to a cold reception from neighbors who have sued the network and Alabama Power Company.

Residents along the mountain, which rises to an elevation of 1,200 feet, said they resented WEWN taking over an old logging road, clearing off the picturesque peak, and bringing Alabama Power in to install a substation and zigzag large power lines across land served by the lines of the Coosa Valley Power Company.

"They've taken a pristine area everybody wanted to preserve and ruined it," said Dr. Lane Friedman, a physician practicing in Las Vegas who grew up in Birmingham and owns 180 acres on the mountain. Friedman has sued the network for trespassing on his property and widening the old road that curves up the mountaintop. "That road is on my property," he said. "They wanted a right of way and initially offered me a dollar. They proceeded to use the road at will. I never wanted it to be a public road and it never has been."

Matt Scalici, senior vice president of engineering for Eternal Word Television Network in Irondale, said the road has been in use for more than 80 years, and EWTN and its radio service have the right to use it. As for the environment: "It all depends on your perspective," Scalici said. "Environmentally, we haven't destroyed anything." Construction work, which began in April 1991, required clearing about 10 acres of trees and draining a man-made pond, but the area will be revegetated and landscaped, he said. "It will be quite beautiful."

Friedman said if the road that goes through his property is public, the radio station shouldn't have it blocked with a large security gate at the entrance to its 160-acre mountaintop complex. "They want to have it both ways. They want to close it off at the top yet call it a public road."

Fitts Smitherman, a landowner and retired businessman who was a member of the Birmingham Water Works and Sewer Board from 1972-82, said that since the road was closed, it cut off the main access he had to his property on the other side of the mountain. "They've just run over us right and left," he said. "The problem is that they're upsetting the lives of families who have lived here for generations."

Scalici said Smitherman never asked for access; and, besides, the road ends and turns into a small trail, formerly used by some people for recreational riding, on the property bought by EWTN. "There's no property owner who needs access on the other side," he said. "The road does end on our property."

The fence surrounding the transmitting facility, topped by razor wire, was necessary for safety, Scalici said. "There is a radiation hazard near the antennas, but not beyond the fence line. Most definitely, in the antenna field itself it would be dangerous."

Although the danger is relatively slim, precautions are taken to prevent long-term exposure to high voltage and radiation. The transmitter building has copper mesh between the concrete wall and the brick exterior, and in the ceilings and floors.

Ed Evans, senior station manager at Christian Science Publishing's WSHB in Pineland, SC, agreed that there is no danger to anyone outside the fenced-in area. Evans said that WSHB was previously the largest privately owned shortwave radio operation in the world, but that Mother Angelica's project has exceeded it.

So far, the effort to add shortwave radio to EWTN's outreach capability has cost \$20 million, Scalici said. All of the cost for the radio operation has been picked up by Dutch philanthropists Piet and Trude Derksen. Derksen sold his sportswear company and build 14 amusement parks before retiring, Mother Angelica said.

Derksen's money bought the best for WEWN: four 500-kW transmitters from Continental Electronics in Dallas. "They are the most modern and powerful made in the world today," Scalici said.

Mother Angelica, who founded her TV network in Irondale in 1981 next to her Our Lady of the Angels Monastery, envisions being able to send prayer messages to any part of the world in the event of a catastrophe such as an earthquake. The most vital need for emergency victims is prayer, she said. "They need to pray. Before the bulldozers get there, I want to get there and give them hope."

Audio from Mother Angelica's TV shows will be aired on shortwave, along with Scripture readings, prayers, and devotional programs. The tapes to be played on shortwave radio are being made at EWTN and at a studio EWTN owns in Rome, Italy. Programming has been done in more than 20 languages. "Our aim is to get 52 languages," Mother Angelica said.

Enriching and expanding Catholicism also will be a goal, she said. "As a Catholic, we do have doctrines and dogmas and depositories that I'd like to explain."

While Mother Angelica talks of worldwide evangelistic outreach, the disrupted residents of Vandiver discuss more mundane problems. "Whatever they do on the top of the mountain doesn't bother me," said Buford Brasher, showing where Alabama Power cut a 100-foot-wide swath through his 40-acre plot to make way for power lines to WEWN. "My daughter had planned to build a house. The right-of-way is right up there where she was wanting to build." The property was ruined for that purpose, and the value of his land was degraded by the way the power lines cut through, he said.

Dennis Murphy, who raises thoroughbred racehorses and is an international show-jumping rider, also said an entire section of his property has been devalued by Alabama Power. "They came right through the middle of my property."

A petition with 34 names was gathered at Vandiver Community Center on November 4, 1991, protesting Alabama Power's handling of the installation of power lines.

Michael D. Garrett, vice president of the Birmingham Division for Alabama Power Co., said he reviewed the possibilities for routing the power line and said alternative routes were impractical because of inaccessible mountain terrain. Going straight up the mountain or coming in from the opposite, less residential side was not possible, he said.

Alabama Power corporate spokesman Chris Conway said that the situation was handled according to standard procedures: Complaints were heard, alternative routes examined, and court permission obtained. "There will always be people not satisfied," he said. "It was a difficult location. The alternatives were not acceptable."

Shelby County Probate Judge Thomas A. Snowden Jr., who on June 26 denied Alabama Power's application for condemnation but was overturned, said he visited the site, talked with engineers for both sides, and thought Alabama Power convenienced itself at the unnecessary expense of residents. "I thought there was a better way," he said. "They should have presented an alternate plan to avoid disrupting so many property owners...They could have done less harm with a more direct route."

Shelby County Circuit Judge Al Crowson ruled August 6 in favor of Alabama Power, which posted bonds on its proposed settlements to eight landowners—ranging from \$300 to Dianne Brasher Poe to \$13,210 to Dennis Murphy—and began work. The residents are pursuing a lawsuit against Alabama Power.

Although residents of the area voted to be served by Coosa Valley Power rather than by Alabama Power, the radio station is a large enough commercial customer that it could select who to buy from. But EWTN executives expressed concern at the way Alabama Power handled the situation. EWTN President Bill Steltemeier wrote a letter to Alabama Power last year after the community meeting, expressing surprise at the complaints from area residents. "It is my sincere desire that [Alabama Power] immediately address the above concerns of the Vandiver community," he wrote. "I do think this is a serious problem." Scalici said EWTN didn't mean to get on the wrong side of its neighbors. "The power company has a tendency to be a little strong-armed."

Steltemeier and Scalici said that building the station and getting the power company to run in new lines was bound to leave people upset. "You're always going to have that," Steltemeier said. "You can't satisfy everybody."

Let's see if I can fill some of this remaining white space with some useful information. The VOA is in the process of making some additions to their services out of the Asian relays. One--a new weekly programme in Nepali--started on 5 December. It runs Saturdays only, 0115-0130 UTC, on 11920, 15210, 17780, 21475 kHz; all frgs via the Philippines. [Per info given on the 10 Dec. "Media Network."]

On edition #672 of "World of Radio," Glenn Hauser noted that the printed W92 VOA schedule gives the frequencies for the new VOA relay in northeastern Thailand, at Udorn. (It's not on air yet, but they must have hopes of getting it on air by late March, when the schedule ends.) Apparently, the antennas there will only use two azimuths--30° to China and 300° to South Asia. The projected frequency schedule is as follows:

Of course, these frequencies may be changed by the time the relay comes on air--and don't forget that some of them are also used from other VOA sites. No languages were given, but the 9760 kHz usage would probably be for Tibetan--it fits the sked for that language.

Speaking of VOA in Tibetan, Glenn Hauser, in the same "WOR" px, quoting from the revised W92 schedule (which he got from Kirk Baxter, who got it from a "SW Echo" posting by the VOA's Dan Ferguson [yes, I <u>know</u> it's confusing!]), says that VOA in Tibetan at 0100-0130 UTC on two frqs-6090 & 7180 kHz--is actually via the Wertachtal relay in Germany. If you get these, please be sure to send them along to Bob Colyard, instead of me. (Bob doesn't get many loggings in Tibetan, he'd probably especially appreciate the diversion.)

I'd be tempted to pass along some frequency information for Radio Japan, but it would be out of date by the time you read this, since their printed winter schedule is valid only until 3 January, instead of all the way through until the beginning of March. That would seem to be because they're planning to bring on line some new transmitter capacity at Yamata, and because they're adding 3½ hours of programming to their schedules in January. Maybe I'll be able to pass along more information in next month's column. (I wonder if the addition of transmitter capacity at Yamata will get some time on that relay, in exchange for the RJ relays via Skelton?)

Going back to the 10 December "Media Network" for a moment, Arthur Cushen noted that RFO Tahiti has moved their long-standing 15170v frq to 15175 kHz. (With all the WYFR usage of 15170, I can understand why.) You'll remember that Robert Babin had noted that they'd recently been spot on 15170, rather than on .7 or .8, as usual; maybe they were peaking up the transmitter in preparation for the big move.





Special Discussion:

I decided to devote a little space this month to a discussion of the Hoka Code3 multimode decoder. I will provide you with my thoughts on the machine, but I felt that more than one opinion might be informative.

To that end I solicited a review from several Code3 users-only one took me up on the offer. That brave soul is Ed Deasy of Charlottesville, Virginia. Ed has used the Code3 for several years and, from his discussions seems to be quite expert with the unit. Take it away, Ed.

Code3: A Detailed Review Ed Deasy, Charlottesvile, VA

I first heard of the Code3 RTTY decoder from an advertisement in Monitoring Times more than two years ago. At the time I had been curious about the RTTY modes mentioned in the *Klingenfuss Guide to Utility Stations*, some of which were not available on U.S. made RTTY decoders. The Code3 seemed to cover all of the Klingenfuss modes, and quite a few others. With some trepidation I mailed my mega-dollars overseas to someone I *thought* understood my order on the phone.

What I got was much more than what I expected. In fact, the function of many parts of the software were beyond my compre-hension. Unfortunately, I also got an extremely complete German manual, and a halting, sketchy English translation. I couldn't afford much transatlantic 'quasi-German-English' tech support, so I had to tough it out. Fortunately, Hoka Electronics, who make the Code3, had their manual re-written by Hoka's U.K. office and now is quite understandable.

Hardware description:

Code3, other than software, consists of a small box with two cables and one jack, and no adjustments. One cable is for AC power, one is for a 9-pin RS-232C serial port, and a RCA jack for audio input. Unlike many serial port adventures, I just connected everything together, installed the software, and it worked.

The Code3 works primarily by analog to digital conversion. The audio passband is "sliced" into digital values, and then processed to determine timing and placement of tones. This is the basis of most of the Code3's "analysis" modes, they are all mathematically derived from the digital information.

Software considerations:

The software is copy protected, with a numbered install routine. The word that come to mind is 'onerous,' but I can understand the company's need to protect their product. Other decoders have their key code in ROM; you can't use the program without the hardware. The Code3 hardware is quite simple, so the company has found it necessary to make the software 'locked.' The trouble with locked software is that it can be inconvenient. Also, if you should have two hard disk failures you'll need to return the software disk for renewal.

Features of the Code3

A unique feature of the Code3 is derived from the Analog to Digital signal conversion. The digital information is stored in a buffer during receive. This information can be stored as a disk file (about 500k). Hoka U.K. says this is rather like DAT tape.

The entire audio passband is stored in digital form. When you play back this file through the decoder it is just like being tuned to the original station again. Thus, you can store an unidentified mode for later identification. Furthermore, if you have a fast PC, like a 386, the playback is much faster than real-time. The software kicks up the speed in the decode and analysis modules to synch with the file dump.

The speed of the playback will also depend on the module -some are more numerically intensive than others. It may only take a minute to listen to 3 minutes of saved digital info. In most cases it's more convenient to use this feature to identify or analyze a signal than to do it in real time. Since there are more than 24 different modes and 11 analysis modules to check the signal out on, the signal may be gone before you've found out what it is.

I should also point out there are two analysis modes that can act as decoders for modes not covered above. They are 'character analysis' duplex and simplex. These modules search for bit patterns of known RTTY alphabets in the data flow. Many parameters exist within these modules for customizing. In practice, only rarely does this actually work. Modern systems are often quite complex, with interleaved inverted characters, making alphabet analysis a fairly complicated procedure. Nonetheless, I have been able to log several keying systems not covered in the decode modules using this analysis module.

Analysis and Tuning:

You tune while viewing a spectrum analysis of the passband. You simply tune the peaks corresponding to the tones until they are equidistant from the center frequency. A baud readout, accurate to .00 (!), shows in 10 to 30 seconds, with both synchronous and asynchronous speed equivalents listed.

I don't know what the maximum speed reading is, but I've measured rates above 400 baud. This particular baud readout will be effected by noisy signals. The 'correlation mod signal' module should be used in this case.

Oscilloscope. This is a real oscilloscope, totally synchable, and with a storage feature. This feature costs extra.

Correlation Mod Signal: This determines baud-rate to .0000. You can get a readout in this module when the noise level is too high to get a consistent readout in the standard tuning screen.

Correlation Bit: This 'exclusive Xor' analysis of bit patterns reveals CRC (character repetition) or other repeated patterns in data. Since it is statistical, it will work with very weak signals. Uses a graphical screen. This soon becomes an indispensable aid in identifying modes.

Mark-Space analysis: This determines whether the signal is synchronous or not, even in high noise. Uses graphical display.

Speed Preset: In high-noise, this modules does a statistical analysis to indicate which standard baud rate you might have.

Speed-Bit analysis: This shows bit length graphically, which can be measured in Milliseconds using on-screen pointers.

Bit analysis: This is the same as databit mode

on M-7000.

There is also a 'Save as ASCII' feature, which, oddly enough, costs extra.

Performance:

There are two issues here; how well the decode module is implemented and how well the unit actually senses tones in the audio passband.

The decode implementations on the Code3 are in many cases better than the M-7000. There is no need for auto-synch or manual synch on synchronous modes. It doesn't matter whether the station is idling or sending traffic, the Code3 synchs up immediately. ARQE is very poor on the M-7000, does not easily synch on the 4 CRC version of ARQE. Code3 does this mode correctly. Baudot also seems more readable at lower signal levels than M-7000. The M-7000's TDM decode is very good on maintaining synch on very weak signals, if they are idline.

The complexities of evaluating performance can be seen by taking an example from a recent monitoring session.

I was trying to get an I.D. on a very weak 200 Baud TDM two channel station. I had both the Code3 and M-7000 on the signal. The M-7000 was maintaining synch on the idling signal much better than the Code3, which was holding synch for stretches, but then dropping it. When the actual traffic started, the M-7000 lost synch during a fade, so I had to hit the manual synch button to try to regain synch. I lost all the traffic on the M-7000 because it refused to re-synch on the traffic signal. The Code3 also lost synch during the fade, but regained and held synch long enough during the traffic to get an ID. On other modes, such as Sitor-A, the situation would probably been reversed, with the M-7000 catching more of the traffic.

When it comes to sensing tones in the audio passband, I would rate the M-7000 higher in certain conditions. In wide shifts combined with high noise levels, lets say, an 850Hz shift signal below 10 MHZ in typical evening conditions, the M-7000 will pull the tones out of a surprisingly high level of noise. The general signal to noise tolerance of the M-7000 is higher, although the differences narrow substantially as shifts get narrower. The Code3 seem particularly sensitive to static and noise bursts in wide-shifted signals on the lower frequencies.

It's easy to understand these performance differences when you consider how the 'front ends' of the two decoders differ. The Code3 scans the audio passband, so, in the above example, an 850 hz.'window' has to be open in between the mark and space tones. This gives it multi-tone capabilities, and perhaps makes other modulation schemes decodable in the future. The M-7000 and other 'dedicated filter' type demodulators must be programmed (or auto-tuned) with the shift, after that there are only two very narrow windows of filtration at both the mark and space frequencies. This is very effective in reducing off-frequency noise. For instance, it's possible to copy a wide shift RTTY signal on the M-7000 even if a heterodyne is between the tones. The Code3 must scan across the het, so it chokes.

Hoka Electronic is aware of this, hence, the Code30, which has a automatic DSP prefilter, and numerous other features. The DSP filter constructs "windows" in the proper places, rather like the dedicated filter approach. In this case, the "window" will configure tightly around a multi-tone group. However, this product costs much more than the Code3. (approx. \$1200)

I can also compare the Code3 to the M-1000, which I have used for years. The signal to noise tolerance between the Code3 and M-1000 is very similar. One obvious observation here: the M-1000 is NOT comparable in this respect to the M-7000. In other words, I have found the M-7000 outperforms the M-1000 in most situations. However, the M-1000 seems to have an additional weakness on high baud rate synchronous codes. I've found that 192 baud ARQ-E3, and 200 baud TDM that I can easily synch on the M-7000, will not synch on the M-1000. It can't just be a matter of baud rate, since the packet module on the M-1000 is fine. So, while the Code3's signal to noise tolerance is similar, it does not have the shortcomings of the M-1000 mentioned above.

Comparison of important features:

The Code3 also uses a slightly different manner of printing text to the screen than the M-7000 and M-1000. If an error is received, a 'tilde' [-] character is printed. That means when copy is really broken, paragraph spacing and columns still show reasonably correctly on the Code3. This also makes broken copy much more readable. The Universal equipment, with the exception of Sitor-B, lumps whatever is received together with no spaces. So, broken copy is much harder to make sense of.

Of course, there are also some features on the M-7000 which are omitted on the Code3. The Code3 does not have the M-7000's selcal function, which allows certain defined elements in the received traffic to turn on the printer, and turn it off. I don't miss this on a software decoder; it's much better to save to disk than to print out. In fact, the M-1000 is most advanced in this respect, the selcal can control 'save to disk.' This does add to convenience, keeping disk file sizes small.

Rating the Code3

The problem of comparing the Code3 to "decoders" is that is a bit more than just a decoder. The tuning and analysis features have no comparable parallel on any other decoding equipment that I'm aware of. While daunting at first, these modules soon become 'eyes' on the spectrum. Many of the modules reveal the actual bit structure of the received signal; they become interactive lessons in RTTY structure and function.

This brings new descriptive powers to new keying systems you can't actually decode. If you come across a 125 baud signal, you'll be able to say it has a 8 character repetition rate, that it's idling with pseudo-random characters, etc. For true code 'hackers', which I am not, you can go further still.

If you can very accurately describe a keying system, using the analysis features of the Code3, apparently Hoka will consider writing a module for it. I have no idea what this might cost, though! They do seem to be actively working to expand the base of systems.

Here's a good example of the difference really knowing what you are receiving can make. I of ten see the statement on Shortwave topics that most RTTY in the spectrum is encrypted 75 baud. The problem with the statement is that it's incorrect. The majority of these 75 baud signals are synchronous RTTY systems: Baudot is an asynchronous RTTY system with start and stop bits. If you have a decoder which indicates whether the code you're receiving is synchronous or asynchronous, it soon becomes clear that only a very small percentage of those 75 baud signals are, in fact, Baudot. The rest come out garbled on your decoder because 'they are not Baudot', not because they are encrypted. Even if they were sending in the clear it would print garbled on a Baudot decoder.

On the other hand some folks just want to print out press Baudot and faxes and couldn't care less about statements on code structure, etc. More power to them, they're still sane. The Code3 is more suited to "enthusiasts" who can go on endlessly about such things as I did in the very last paragraph. There are many economical options for beginners in RTTY these days, including the nearly shareware "Hamcom".

I hope this information will be of help to prospective RTTY decoder buyers. As you can see, a comparison of equipment and software of this complexity is complex in itself. It can help, where overwhelmed with features as in this case, to carefully consider what you really need in a decoder before making a decision.

Thanks Ed for that fine review. After using the Code3 for about 6 months myself, I have to agree with most of what Ed said in his article. I would like to add a few comments, though. I think the last paragraph in Ed's review is worth noting. If you've never decoded a RTTY signal before, you will be overwhelmed by the flexibility and sheer decoding power given to you by this unit. The learning curve is fairly long when learning how to use the Code3. I am (he said humbly!) fairly proficient on all the M-7000 modes, yet I have only managed to decode fewer than *half of the modes contained in the Code3*? I HAVE learned much more about RTTY and data structures than I ever would have by using the Universal machines.

While the Code3 is a great analysis tool, I do have some questions about the implementation of one mode-the Facsimile decoder. While I have been able to decode weather faxes, the tuning is difficult for someone used to the Universal implementation. Most of the decoding is automatic and the resolution doesn't match the M-1000.

I would also like to see Hoka beef up their documentation so that non-Computer Scientists could understand the fundamentals of data structures and, more importantly, how to decode them. This point is the most frequently mentioned point of Hoka users, "its just not very user-friendly". The graphic interface is just as friendly as any other decoder, but the features/modes documentation leaves many gaps for the user to 'discover' on his/her own. Perhaps Hoka NAm could expand the manual? Ed is right-the Hoka U.K. manual is MUCH more understandable than the Dutch/German version.

From an operational standpoint, the Code3 is easy to install and easy to navigate. The windows-like interface is simple, but it does not support monochrome VGA displays unless you run it under Windows 3.1. If you are still a DOS user, you must have a color monitor. The Code3 will not install on a hard disk with modern disk compression software. (ie. Stacker, DR.DOS 6.0, Xtradrive). Since I run Xtradrive, I had to partition an uncom-pressed segment of my disk (2.3 Megs is enough for Code3). It works fine now.

One problem, which I think Hoka NAm has solved, is the power cord on the A-D Converter box. Mine came with a European 2-pin plug which, even with an adapter, didn't stay plugged in. I eventually replaced that plug with a 'clip on' US-style power plug. Now it works fine. Another minor 'gripe' I have with the Code3 on the operational level is that I must give up my COM2 (serial port) to keep it plugged in. I run Windows all of the time and must have a mouse on COM1. I also have an internal modem installed, so every time I want to use the modem I must physically unplug the Code3. I would like to see an internal PC card version of the A-D converter.

Despite the above comments, I really like the 'feel' of the program. This decoder has rejuvenated my interest in RTTY decoding in the months since I first got it. As Ed said, it allows you to make the jump from simple 'reactive decoding' to actually understanding what is going on within the signal you are receiving. Indeed, as Ed said you will probably become a 'radio hacker' if you get this unit. If you have grown a bit bored with the same old modes on RTTY, or tired of all those '75 haud blackholes', then you are probably ready for a Code3.
