The Commercial Aircraft award is for any and all commercial aircraft QSL'd or PFC'd. This award is for aircraft worldwide, not just the USA, and will be for 15, 25, 50, 75, and 100 verifications. Remember, this is for stations heard below 30 MHz and does not include airports.

The RTTY (Radioteletype) award is for any and all RTTY stations. There are no restrictions except that the transmission needs to be in RTTY and it needs to be verified. This will also be for 15, 25, 50, 75, and 100 stations verified.

I have a few new awards that I will mention later; I could use your help, though. If there are any new awards that you would like to see, by all means drop me a line.

I sent the SPEEDX awards pamphlet to K1BV for his **DX Awards Directory** booklet, and we came in 3rd place worldwide for adding 22 awards to his booklet. This will give SPEEDX and the Awards program added publicity. For more info on the **DX Awards Directory**, write to:

DON JOHNSON - "MR. SPEEDX"

I return to the pages of SPEEDX with sad news indeed. I've been informed by Peggy Thompson that SPEEDX's Number One Member, Don Johnson, has passed away. Having known Don and worked with him for many years, I'm honored to have been asked to say a few words about the man

and his role in shaping this club from almost the beginning.

When I first became involved in the editorial end of SPEEDX oh so many years ago, I originally worked with many of the founding members of the club, including Dave Thorne. Dave was business manager at the time, and I believe that Don Johnson was A/O editor then. I started out editing the old SPEEDX-GRAM, and soon thereafter, Dave decided to resign as BM which opened the slot for Don Johnson. I'd gotten to know Dave pretty well and was sad to see him go - after all, who likes change, right? And just who was this Don Johnson guy anyway?

Well, it didn't take long for me to find out who Don was! He gave me a call early on to discuss

business matters relating to the GRAM and we became friends almost instantly. It was easy to tell just how much Don loved SPEEDX and the shortwave hobby, and how dedicated he'd was to us. Don and

I worked many years together while I did the GRAM.

Don had been on disability all the time I knew him. He suffered injuries to his back while serving in the military, and these injuries along with some other health-related problems prevented him from working normal jobs. At one time he'd run a trucking company (I used to get mail from him on his old letterhead), but after awhile, his health got the better of him and he had to sell the business. I'm not sure how long he'd lived in the house in Lake Elsinore with his two dogs, but back in the 70's when I went to visit him, there were still some vestiges of his old business laying around the yard.

Although Don wasn't involved in the formative days of SPEEDX, it's my humble opinion that

Don did more to shape this club than anyone else did since those very early days. Don made every member welcome by sending personal letters to them after receiving an initial subscription. As a matter of fact, no letter ever went unanswered. Don tirelessly maintained contact with all members, young

and old.

Don kept close tabs on the business end of things at SPEEDX too. Don had been both business manager and publisher while I was doing the GRAM. Eventually, the work load got the best of him, and he started bugging me about becoming publisher. He told me the work was easy and really didn't take up much time (NOT!). I ended up publishing the magazine under Don's tutelage for almost 5 years. Those were the years where I really got to know him. We spent hours on the phone each month along with countless letters back and forth, in the attempt to keep SPEEDX viable. Don was a veritable storehouse of knowledge - everything from how to obtain a mailing permit from the post ofvertable storehouse of knowledge - everything from how to obtain a maining perinit from the post office to detecting how much ink was used on a printing roller used to print the magazine. I don't think I ever had a question that went unanswered for long. Somehow Don came up with a solution to whatever problem there was. And I don't want to say that Don was cheap - but he certainly was frugal, and did an excellent job during his tenure helping SPEEDX's finances grow by careful budgeting, coming up with idea after idea for new SPEEDX products (like the now infamous SPEEDX pennants), and so

Not only was Don a spokesman for SPEEDX, but he was an excellent spokesman for the hobby in general. Remember his old "I listen to shortwave radio" bumper stickers? He bought those out of his own pocket! He strongly supported ANARC and was unhappy with some of the club wars that were going on at the time. He attended those ANARC Conventions that he could, and enjoyed meeting the members. Back then there was also a big debate going on regarding the difference between a "DXer" and an "SWL". Remember that? Well, I'd not really taken either side of the issue, however, I always felt that I was more of a DXer than an SWL. There was even a debate scheduled at a convention (don't recall which one) of which I took part, and I've got to say that I'll never forget when during the debate, Don, from the audience, after asking a question about the issue, came up and gave me a custom-made "DXer" tie pin!

As I mentioned earlier, I had an opportunity to spend some time with Don in his Lake Elsinore villa back in the 70's. And what an enjoyable time it was. This happened shortly before I was to take over publishing. I had some spare cash and grabbed an airplane to California - my first trip ever to the state. Don was an excellent host! He was at the airport promptly in his little white car to meet me, showed me all around the area and into the mountains, took me to Huntington Beach to visit a second uncle I hadn't seen in 15 years, and generally showed me the time of my lifel. I returned the favor some years later when Don came to visit me in Menomonee Falls, WI.

Oh, I could go on and on. But this is more than enough. Neither Don nor I had been real active these past years in the club. My family and job and other activities have kept me busy. Don's health these past years in the cutt. My faining and job and other activities have kept the busy. Don's heating had gotten the better of him, and he ended up moving out of Lake Elsinore, a move that I'm sure was tough to make. We'd kinda lost touch the last few years. My wife talked to him last - he'd called to see how everything was, and since I had been out of town on business, never had a chance to talk to him. I'd started this by giving Don the title of "Mr. SPEEDX". Hopefully after reading this brief history you'll know why he had that title. In my book, Don Johnson and SPEEDX are one in the same.

Although the folks that run the club now are doing an excellent job, when Don retired some years ago, SPEEDX lost a little bit of its personality. And now that Don's gone from this world, a bigger chunk of SPEEDX is gone too. Please pray for him - I am.

THE 1993 NORTH AMERICAN DX CHAMPIONSHIPS (NADXC) A Shortwave Listening Contest Sponsored by The Association of North American Radio Clubs (ANARC)

PURPOSE

This contest is designed to promote the shortwave listening hobby and to provide those SWL's and DXer's interested in competing an opportunity to participate in a carefully run, challenging contest.

ELIGIBILITY

The 1993 DX Championship is open to all DXer's residing in North America [as defined by the country list of the North American Shortwave Association (NASWA)]. Members of the NADXC Administrative Committee are excluded from participation.

LISTENING PERIOD, FREQUENCIES, AND TIMES

The contest listening period will begin on Friday, 5 March 1993, at 1900 EST (0000 UTC) and end Sunday, 7 March 1993, at 2359 EST (0459 UTC). This contest coincides with the beginning of Shortwave Radio Week (which runs from 7-14 March).

Plaques will be awarded by ANARC to the top three finishers. The top finalist will receive a pair of JRC headphones courtesy of Paul Lannuier at Japan Radio Corporation. All entrants will receive a participation certificate indicating that they competed in the 1993 North American DX Championships. The certificates for the top 20 will have their place of finish in the NADXC indicated on the certificate.

SCORING

Contestants are to log as many stations as possible from as many countries as possible within the prescribed listening parameters. The first station logged from each country = 1 point. The second station from each country = 3 points; each additional station from that country = 5 points. For contest purposes, all clandestine stations and hobby pirate transmissions will be considered one "country." A station is a shortwave broadcaster whose transmissions are intended for reception by the general public. Each transmitter site of a broadcasting organization will count as a separate station. Different services of the same broadcast organization do not count as separate stations. Transmissions of a single broadcast organization on various frequencies may only be counted once. The use of multiple frequencies does not create as many new stations as frequencies used. For country counting and station counting purposes, the country list of the North American Shortwave Association (45 Wildflower Road, Levittown, Pa 19057) will be the sole criterion.

Participants are required to submit a running log to include country, station, frequency, time, date, SINPO, and the basis of station identification (i.e., spoken ID, interval signal, language, program, known//frequency checked, etc.).

Each contestant is required to total his own entry and provide a summary of the number of countries and stations claimed to support the point totals. receiver(s) used in the contest must also be indicated. Logs will be judged on accuracy, completeness and neatness. If the judges cannot read a log, it will not be counted for scoring purposes. The decision of the judges is final.

SPECIAL HOLLOW STATE CATEGORY

A special category is available for DXer's using vacuum tube equipment. rules remain the same except all contest loggings must be made on hollow state equipment. The NADXC participation certificate will be appropriately annotated and a special plaque will be awarded to the top finisher in this category.

FEES

An administrative fee of \$4.00 plus a business size SASE must be provided for each contest entry. All entries must be postmarked by Friday, 12 March 1993, and sent

Contestants will be notified of the results in June, and a list of winners will be sent to each of the ANARC member clubs for publication.

GREETINGS FROM WHEELING

Well, I feel that I have finally made the big time. This column marks my first year as an editor, and Glenn Hauser quoted last month's column on his *World of Radio* #676. I guess I have arrived! For those of you who missed my 15 seconds of fame, Glenn was speaking about Sudanese stations and mentioned my transcription of Radio Omdurman's interval signal. He then proceeded to play it on the piano. His keyboard skills are not bad for an international broadcaster!

So enough about me, how are all of you out in SPEEDX land? I hope you are hearing plenty o' good DX and taking advantage of the long, static-free winter nights and mornings! Remember to send your loggings in to our columnists, even the commonplace ones (loggings, not columnists). No station is so easily heard that it doesn't bear reporting; there is always someone less experienced than you who has yet to catch it. Plus, you can make your logging more interesting by being very specific about the programming. Some of the best reports are on easily heard stations featuring an offbeat or quirky story such as all of those weird vegetable items we were hearing about from Beijing.

By the way, I received another low turnout for the contest last month. I am going to persevere anyway, because these great prizes are just cluttering up my room, doing me no good. Check out this month's trivia and get in your replies—you might win big! As Ed McMahon says, "You may already be a winner!"

THE BIRTH OF WEWN

On 12/27/92 at 1935 UTC, I heard a WEWN test transmission on 7540 kHz. This is one day before official broadcasts were to begin. They were in the middle of a Spanish language program, with many mentions of "la corazon" (the heart). About ten minutes of baroque music then led up to the top of the hour when I heard this ID:

"This is WEWN, Birmingham, Alabama, USA, broadcasting to Central America on a frequency of 21735 kHz [sic]. The time is just past 2000 UTC." (Interval signal) "You are listening to WEWN, Birmingham, Alabama, USA, a Catholic radio service of the Eternal Word Television Network."

This went into a program called "Mother Angelica Talks It Over." Mother Angelica is a cloistered Franciscan nun who founded the EWTN which they claim is the largest religious cable network in the world. On the program, she and others spoke in front of a studio audience about the topic of balance in life.

On the next day, 12/28/92, I tuned into the same frequency at about 1935 UTC, turned on the tape recorder and waited for the first official sign-on. At 1957, the carrier kicked in with an odd whirring and chirping sound. At 1958, the interval signal began. The signal was quite strong, 555; in fact it was a little distorted even with my Sangean ATS-808's sensitivity switch set to "local."

At 2000 UTC, they gave a station ID as: "This is WEWN, Birmingham, Alabama, USA,

broadcasting to France on a frequency of 7540 kHz. The time is just past 2000 UTC." They then went into organ music and a Dutch voice over (to France?!). This was followed by a responsorial prayer, similar to what is often heard on KJES, New Mexico. At 2015, they signed off in mid sentence. After about a minute, the carrier came back on with the sound of an outboard motor. Obviously, all the kinks weren't yet worked out. The carrier broke again at 2016 for a moment, and then the Dutch program came back, although the motor noise was sometimes heard underneath the audio.

At 2025 there was a new program introduced by baroque music and hosted by a woman. At 2030, there were snippets of music that kept fading out after about four or five measures after which a man came on with a voice over. There was no ID at the bottom of the hour; the program continued on through. Pachelbel's "Canon" came on at 2044 for background music (I guess they are very partial to the Baroque era!)

At 2048, the carrier broke once again, but they were back by 2100 with the same Dutch program. When the audio dropped out at 2116, it returned two minutes later with French programming, only to be abruptly switched back into Dutch. At 2154, an English ID said they were leaving 5825 kHz (although they were on 7540 at the time), and at 2200, they proceeded to sign off and switch to 5825 in



WEWN (cont.) German. This frequency had better audio but had similar breaks in the transmission.

Subsequent checks revealed that they were not up to the full schedule even on just one transmitter. I have caught their local evening programs such as Byelorussian at 0500 and Croatian/Serbian at 0600, and I have caught some English broadcasts. For the most part, they seem less heavy-handed than many of their counterparts in the U.S., and I have yet to hear any radical right wing programming.

Here is their interval signal:



It is played once through on some sort of chime-like organ sound as a single-line melody. It is then repeated with a chordal accompaniment. I recognize it as being some piece of a Gregorian chant from a mass, but I cannot identify it specifically. Can anyone help out?

RADIO PRAGUE NOW FROM A DIVIDED NATION

Last month, at the stroke midnight on New Year's Day, a new country was born. Czechoslovakia ceased to exist, and in its place were the Czech Republic and This of Slovakia. course presented an interesting situation for us DXers who tuned into Radio Czechoslovakia. I

received a report from Mike Schulsinger who heard that transmission at 2200 UTC, but reception here in Wheeling was marginal at best. Glenn Hauser had similar problems in Oklahoma but played a tape he had received of the broadcast on WOR #676. The announcer talked about the various celebrations that were going on in the two new nations.

This spurred my curiosity to find out more about Radio Prague's three transmitter sites (they have now gone back to their old name, I believe). Using my Rand McNally atlas and the 1993 WRTH and PWBR, I have come up with the following information and roughly drawn map.

The Czech Republic, with its capital of Prague, is home to a pair of 100 kw transmitters in Litomysl. The other two sites are in Slovakia with its new capital of Bratislava. Rimavská Sobota has two 250 kw transmitters while Velké Kostolany uses one 100 kw. Try for them at the following times and frequencies for a thirty-minute program in English to North America:

A quick check of the bands at 0100 on Jan. 19 turned up WWCR on 5935 making 5930 tough, 7345 very faint and 9580 covered by Yugoslavia of all stations. Catching all three sites might not be as easy as you think!

Now my most recent QSL from Prague did not list transmitter sites, but I wonder if a nicely worded letter might elicit a favorable response. Give it a try and let me know what you find out!

THE 1993 WRTH IS HERE!

Surprise! This year's World Radio TV Handbook arrived at my QTH in the first week of January—much earlier than last year! I was very excited to dig right into it and check out the new edition.

There are many changes. Of course, the most obvious is the inclusion of all the new countries created as a result of the breakup of the Soviet Union and Yugoslavia. The total count is 238 nations, up from 224 last year (an increase of 6%). Since all of the maps had to be redrawn, the editors decided to go all out and expand them, indicating transmitter sites with red dots and including a separate map for the CIS. These are real nice additionsl

Otherwise, much remains the same. Minor changes include complete site info for RFE/RL so that the listener can determine which of the six relays are being used when. Last year they did this for the first time for R. Moscow, and they continued this practice this year. However, instead of listing this info by frequency, they have grouped them by site. Therefore, if you are listening to an English program at 1330 UTC on 9890 kHz, you have

to peruse over 50 lists before finding it to be a transmission from St. Petersburg. This makes no sense to me, and it is a step backwards. Another disappointment is that the frequency section in the back of the book is somehow missing 4800-4922 kHz! Many of us do a great deal of listening here.

But hey, how can you knock the grandparent of all shortwave info books? For the amount of info it contains, it is a bargain at twice the price (\$19.95). Actually, I wouldn't shell out \$39.90 for any book, but I digress. For those of you newer to the hobby, you may remember my glowing review of the Passport to World Band Radio in November. Just which book should you buy then? Well, each has its own merits. The WRTH is much more complete and allows you to look up stations and complete schedules by country. The PWBR has that great 24-hour grid for all frequencies as well as exhaustive receiver reviews. Since they come out at different times of the year and offer different ways of viewing information, I highly recommend both; however, if you can only have one, go with the WRTH.

≥⇒ Radio Canada International has expanded its 2000 UTC broadcast to Canadian forces in Yugoslavia, Somalia and Cyprus. English is now 30 minutes, up from 15. Catch them on 17875, 17820, 15325, 15140, 13670, 13650, 11945, 7235 and 5995 kHz. (Mike Schulsinger)

≥⇒ Glenn Hauser is seeking sponsors for a 15 minute daily DX program. He is requesting checks for \$5 or \$10 made out to him which he will only cash if he gets enough to start the service. He is hoping to broadcast via Radio Miami International's English service in early February over WRNO. If interested, clearly label the check as to its purpose and send it to GH at P.O. ≥⇒ Deutsche Welle's 1993 calendar is now available in a startling new format. It is smaller, more colorful and contains picture postcards that can be snipped off and mailed. However, if you want to use it as an actual

calendar, lotsa luck. Its modern look allows each week to contain anywhere from three to seven days, depending on how big they drew each number. Days of the week don't line up vertically, numbers are occasionally replaced by words, and the name of the month appears in the middle of one of the weeks. Congrats, DW, it looks cool and is absolutely useless. (DB)

≥⇒ Radio For Peace International is examining the possibility of an additional transmitter site in Salmon Arm, British Columbia, about 180 miles northeast of Vancouver. (WOR 676)

The actual call letters of WFLA's 25870 kHz relay is KPM360, according to Wilson Welch their engineer. It's possible they might have to discontinue this feed as it is "predelay" and could allow profanity to get on the air. (WOR 677)

≥⇒ WEWN was recently off the air because their booming transmitters are interfering with other stations including local police radio. Seems like they are having a lot of problems getting started! (WOR 677)

Trash & Treasure

Nothing very special this month--so let's find some trash for you.

An Italian organization, apparently a regular reporting DX Club, GRAL RADIO NEWS has compiled and published their reportings of QSLs for 1991 and 1992 into special booklets. I understand this information has been pulled from their regular bulletin and the 1991 compilation is a twenty-six paged booklet available for \$2.00US or two International Reply Coupons from Riccardo Storti, Via Mattei, 25/1, 16010 Manesseno S. Olcese (GE), Italy. The 1992 effort has been stated to be the same price. The booklets are almost entirely in English, do list some addresses (mostly for European pirates) but the major value of this effort for us may be merely informational.

For you specialists in Time Stations, author Gerd Klawitter has revised and has a new printing of his ZEITZEICHENSENDER/TIME SIGNAL STATIONS booklet available. This, the 12th edition, includes 136 pages (the prior edition was 126 pages). It covers all time stations, by country, identifying all frequencies, times, signals, policies and QSL details with each page divided so the left column is in German and the right column is written in English. This book should by now be available from your regular radio bookstore.

If you live in some city other than Westlake, Ohio which has laws against television dishes (something about the original cable company offering this city a piece of the profits on their actions) and you are equipped to pick up every football and baseball game available in this world, you might want to contact Deutsche Welle for information. Several months ago, Deutsche Welle added a new mail-out booklet to their mailing list--IHRE WELLE. This every two month issue identifies German television available on Intelsat-K and Satcom C-4 for your (but not my) enjoyment. Write to Cologne if you are not now on their mailing list.

Ted Melinosky is now offering the 1993 edition of THE K1BV DIRECTORY OF DX AWARDS. He advertises this as 2187 different awards from 122 DXCC countries—you realize this is primarily awards for HAMs but each issue has included some awards (not many, but some) which we SWLs could achieve. Ted's address is HCR 10, Box 837A in Spofford, New Hampshire 03462—9740; price is \$17.00US.

And while we're into awards (all of which probably aren't as great as all those special SPEEDX awards you could obtain through Harold Woering), a unique offer comes from Germany. KurzWellen-Freunde Bremen offers an ISLAND series of diploma-awards. A list of verifications from broadcast stations or utility stations on any islands in this world, in batches of 10, 25, 50, 100 or 150 stations may be sent to Hans Gotschlig, Kutscherweg 18, D-2804 Lilienthal, Federal Republic of Germany. Price for each award would be 6.DM or 6 International Reply Coupons. (Go see Harold first but this over-sized, heavy-paper award is still nice looking around our radio room.)

Again, if your radio interests are wide and varied, SPEC-COM Communications & Publishing Group Ltd, Post Office Box 1002, Dubuque, Iowa 52004-1002 might have something of interest for you. WRTH: announced its industry awards for 1992 recently. The winners were: "Best portable receiver," the SONY ICF-SW55. "Best communications receiver," the YAESU FRG-100. "Most innovative receiver designer" went to Lowe Electronics in Great Britain. (RNMN, 12/24)

WESTERN HEMISPHERE

VOA, USA: announced more details on its new Somali language service. It will hit the airwaves daily starting Dec 27 from 0245-0300 UTC on 6155, 7265, 9575, and 9885. (RNMN, 12/24)

VOA, USA: Eugene reports good reception of VOA broadcasting to the Caribbean in Creole, from 17:30 to 18:00 hrs: The frequencies given in French, verified and approved by Eugene are 17800, 17785 and 13740 kHz. The recording was made on 17785 kHz. (RVI RadioWorld, 1/9)

WEWN, Alabama, USA: a Catholic station which first went on the air on the 28th of December. At 20:00 hrs that was. The electronic ID tune is from the "Salve Regina" song, Eugene presumes. What he heard on the 28th is this: At 20.00 hrs the station was on the air on 7540 kHz but propagation was so bad he couldn't even tell what language it was in. At 21:00 hrs the programme was in Dutch, also on 7540 kHz. This went on for 55 minutes when there was a frequency change, from 7540 to 5825 kHz with German first at 22:00 hrs and English at 23:00 hrs. So, in short, on the 28th of December the frequency of WEWN was 7540 kHz from 20:00 to 21.55 hrs UTC and 5825 kHz from 22:00 until 24:00 hrs UTC. When Eugene monitored WEWN from 5 to IO hrs on 7465 kHz During the first 2 hours reception was so bad that Eugene couldn't figure out what language was being used, except that it probably was a Slav tongue, at 07:00 hrs there was a programme in Albanian, at 08:00 there was German and at 09:00 the programme was in French. There was no transmission from 10 to 13 hrs, from which time the broadcasts resumed on 18930 kHz. But propagation is so bad that virtually nothing is audible here before 16:20 hrs. (RVI RadioWorld, 1/2)

WEWN, Alabama, USA: Last Sunday the station was observed by Eugene Gebruers from 14.00 to 18:00 h UTC on 18930 kHz with Arabic at 14:00, Dutch at 15:00 and French at 16:00 and 17:00. All programmes have a length of 55 minutes. Also on Monday, Dutch was heard at 15:00. From 18:00 to 20:00 Sunday, WEWN was heard on 13740 kHz with two 55-minute programmes in EG, at 18:00 and 19:00 hrs. At 22:00 hrs the programme was in English and no longer in Dutch as heard on the 28th of December. It is all a bit chaotic and the station makes no useful announcements: on Friday morning there was Dutch at 08:00 hrs instead of German, and German at 09:00 hrs instead of French. (RVI RadioWorld, 1/9)

KNLS, Alaska, USA: will be starting a DX segment (gh says "god forbid if they should call it that") starting January 1st. A program called *Radio Today* will feature listener supplied shortwave station reception information. They are inviting people to send in such info. They said nothing as to the broadcast times, but if they handle it like other KNLS features it may only be about 3 minutes sometimes during their 1 hour broadcast, perhaps everyday of the week. Their current EG schedule is: 0800 UTC on 7365, and again at 1300 UTC on 7355 KHz. Their tentative schedule starting Mar. 28th shows 9610 replacing both the 7365 and 7355 frequencles. (WoR #674)

WWCR, USA: World of Radio is coming in quite well in Great Britain Sunday 0800 UTC on 7435. That would probably be the best time for listeners in Europe to hear WoR. (RNMN, 12/24)

WWCR: has a replacement time for World of Radio which had been on Monday 1330 UTC. The new program time slot will start either Jan 5 or 12. That new time is on Tues 1230 UTC making 15685 KHz their usage frequency. (WOR #675)

KCBI, TX USA: Is heard 1430-2130 UTC on 15375 KHz blocked by Spain till 2100 UTC in New Zealand, then "in the clear" the last 30 minutes. Heard 0230-1430 UTC quite good on 9815 and received very poorly on 15725 KHz from 2130-0230 UTC. (Arthur Cushen, RNMN, 1/14)

- KJES, NM, USA: was noted on the air on an expanded schedule including Friday, Saturday, AND Thursday since it came back on the air Dec. 15th. (WoR #674) gh found this station gone off the air again since Jan 1??? (WoR #676)
- Radio Havana, Cuba: has abandoned 6000 for a transmission in English to NAm 05:00-07:00. The new frequency is 9510 kHz, but that's high for us here, and moreover Radio Romania International is very active on that frequency. For its transmissions to Europe, Radio Havana is now on 15165 kHz instead of 17705; using 15165 for 57-minute programmes in Arabic at 19:00. French at 20:00 and English at 21:00 hrs. (RVI RadioWorld, 1/2)
- **4VEH, Haiti:** Is no longer on shortwave. Their transmitter is off the air for repairs, it needs some work done to it. They may come back on the air shortly but, then again may not. However, 4VEH CAN be heard on 2 frequencies on mediumwave. One in use is 840 KHz (used by WHAS, Louisville so may be hard for those in NA to hear), the other is 1030 KHz. They are on with different language services from 1000-0300 UTC. (DXPL, 1/16)

RFPI, Costa Rica: "World of Radio" on RFPI now scheduled Fri. 2000 UTC; Sat. 0400, 1200, and 1800 UTC; Sun. 0200, 1000, and 2300 UTC; Mon. 0700 UTC; Tue. 1900 UTC; Wed. 0300, and 1100 UTC. (WoR #674)

- RFPI: has chosen Salmon Arm, British Columbia Canada as their 2nd site along side their current operation out of Costa Rica. Licensing work is now underway with the Canadian authorities. RFPI hopes to be broadcasting to Asia from the new site by the end of this year. (RNMN, 1/7)
- AWR, Costa Rica: picked up EG broadcasting on 5030 KHz about 1118 UTC with religious programming, fair signal. (Jim Clar, DXPL, 12/26)
- R. CARACOL, Columbia: heard around 0240 UTC on 5995 KHz In SP. Heard network broadcasting, ID, fair signals. (Jim Clar, DXPL, 12/26)
- R. Populares, Riobamba, Ecuador: heard from 1000-1100 UTC on 5010 KHz in SP. (Quito Logbook, 1/16)
- R. Atlantida, Peru: was received in SP on 4790 KHz at 0930 UTC. (Quito Logbook, 1/16)
- R. Cultura do Para, Brazil: heard at 0815 UTC on 5045 KHz, again at 0300 UTC with news headlines. (Quito Logbook, 1/16)
- R. Portal da Amazonia, Brazil: received on 4775 KHz at 0048 UTC in PT with ID, poor reception conditions. (Jim Clar, DXPL, 12/26)
- R. Nacional Paraguay: good signal in Sri Lanka with Paraguian music on 9735 KHz from 2330-0130 UTC. (Victor Goonetilleke, RNMN, 1/7)
- RAE, Argentina: heard on 11710 KHz which was coming in good before 0000 UTC in Sri Lanka. (Victor Goonetilleke, RNMN, 1/7)

EUROPE

- R. Norway Int'l: Bob Thomas says that R. Norway Intl will continue EG broadcasts both Saturday, and Sunday till Feb. 1st but, then after that they will drop Saturday, and go back to Sunday only broadcasts in EG. One frequency change reported is for EG at 0400 UTC now on 9565 KHz instead of 9560. (WoR #674)
- R. Free Burma via Norway: Bob Thomas heard from the frequency manager of R. Norway about a change in frequency for R. Free Burma, their frequency is changed now onto 15140 from 1430-1530 UTC however, they are thinking about changing the time to 1000 UTC. (WoR #674)
- R. Sweden: on Jan. 18th, because of the reorganization of their domestic service, R. Sweden will lose the extra evening 1/2 hour in EG and Swedish. Look for them in EG at 2200 UTC as from 18 January. The frequencies will be 1179mw, 6065, and 9655 KHz to Europe, and Africa, and 11995 KHz to South and East Asia and the Pacific. They will have a new EG broadcast at 1830 UTC to Europe and Africa on 1179mw, 6065, and 9655, and to the Middle East and East Africa using the frequency of 15270 KHz. (RNMN, 1/7)
- R. Netherlands: again stated their latest frequency schedule for EG broadcast via the CIS which is: 0030-0130 UTC on 7305 KHz, then from 0130-0325 UTC using 12025 to S.Asia. EG is on later from 0930-1125 UTC to FE, + SEA using 7260 KHz, and 9860 KHz. (both at 250kw) (RNMN, 12/31) R. Netherlands will begin relay via transmitters in the CIS as of Jan.1st, 1993 using the revised schedule of 0030-0127 UTC on 7305 then switch to 12025 from 0130-0325 UTC via a 500kw unit located in Alma Ata. EG runs again to the Far East, and Southeast Asia from 0930-1125 UTC on 7260 KHz, and a 31 meter band frequency which is not yet fixed. You might want to check 9810, or 9860 as from Jan.1st. (RNMN, 12/24)
- R. Luxembourg: from 1 January RTL uses 6O90 kHz as a relay for the programme in French on longwave 234 kHz, instead of, until now, as a relay for German on mediumwave 1440 kHz. (RVI RadioWorld, 1/9)
- R. Portugal: a different frequency for their broadcasts in EG 2000-2030 UTC Norm Blakely has found them on 9705 KHz. Edgar Cronen heard R. Portugal on a SUNDAY 0915 UTC on 11800 with news, followed by news in FR. (WOR #675) The international service has made a

frequency change for the transmission in English to Africa 20:00-20.30 hrs UTC. The station says 15250 kHz has been dropped and replaced with 17970 kHz. But Eugene can't possibly confirm this because at 20:00, 17970 kHz is too high to be audible in Antwerp. (RVI RadioWorld, 1/2) Adding to Information in an earlier programme, Eugene monitored Radio Portugal on 21515 kHz at 15:30 hrs on 1/4 to the Middle East. (RVI RadioWorld, 1/9)

SRI. Switzerland: picked up at 1310 UTC in EG on 15500 KHz. (Quito Logbook, 1/16)

R. Austria Int'l: announced on Tuesday that Austrian Shortwave Panorama has been discontinued, although the German-language edition of the program will remain. David Herrnges, host of the English language edition has retired, and no replacement editor has been found. (RNMN, 1/14)

European Christian Radio, Italy: heard on 6220 KHz at 1720 UTC with an ID and requests for reception reports. (Arthur Cushen, DXPL, 1/16)

- R. Czechoslovakia: the country will split up as of Jan. 1st (Czech Republic and Slovakia) It was noted by GH that both republics have transmitters with their borders so, it will be interesting to see if they divide into two radio stations. Their current EG schedule is as follows: 0000-0030 11990, 9580, 7345 0300-0330 9810, 7345, 5930 0100-0130 9580, 7345, 5930 0400-0430 9810, 7345 (WoR #674)
- R. Prague: was re-launched on Jan. 1st as Czechoslovakla split into two. That clearly meant some reorganization, and resignation of external service Czech Radio. The Mailbag program on Jan. 3rd consisted of farewells. As regards to R. Czechoslovakla external service, all the studios were in Prague although the transmitters themselves are both in the Czech Republic, and Slovakla. On the morning of Jan 1 the former R. Czechoslovakla external service had been renamed "R. Prague, the external service of Czech Radio". R.Prague has taken over the whole schedule of R. Czechoslovakla. All its programs in EG, FR, GM, Etc are being presented from Prague. The only thing that they (R. Prague) have done is added two 1/2 hours in Slovak specifically for Slovak listeners, in otherwords, it's an external service from the Czech Republic to listeners in Slovakla. As regards Slovakla on shortwave the only thing the Slovaks are doing at the moment is that they've now gotten 1 hour on shortwave broadcast from 1400-1500 UTC on 6055, 7345, and 9505 KHz. All it is is a rebroadcast of the Slovak Radio domestic service news from the service which is known as "SLOVAKIA 1", in otherwords, the first program of Slovak Radio. (BBCM, RNMN, 1/7)
- R. Prague: From 1 January, the International service of Radio Czechoslovakia has changed its name into Radio Prague. Monitoring by Eugene failed to reveal any changes in the schedule of the ex-Czechoslovak station. The Home Service of Radio Prague is now heard in Antwerp on LW 270, MW 1233 and 954 kHz, and SW from 04:57 until 1700 hrs on 5930 kHz. This latter frequency is also used from 17:30 until 18:00 hrs for an International programme in Czech, after which 5930 kHz closes down. So far, the other republic, Slovakia has been heard on shortwave by Eugene from 14:00 to 15:00 UTC on 6055, 7345 and 9505 kHz This is a relay of the first national programme in Slovak. Slovakia has not been heard in any other language. That first national programme in Slovak comes booming in on mediumwave 1098 kHz. Also on 702 kHz from Bansk# Bystrica. There's also a new 600 kW station on 1521 kHz, presumably from Kosice. (RVI RadioWorld, 1/9)

R. Stantsiya Mayak, Russia: Eugene, who is a great music lover, regulary listens in to Radio Stantsiya Mayak from Russia, and only a few days ago, he heard to his delight the great Shalyapin sing "The Flea" of Moussorgsky. That was just before 01:00 hrs UTC on 7360 kHz. Why do I tell you this? Simply because Eugene is much pleased with his latest receiver, the Lowe 150, which produces excellent results, as long as you don't go lower than 900 kHz. There's a parallel frequency for that 7360 kHz of Radio Stantsiya Mayak, namely the feeder in USB on 9180 kHz until midnight thirty UTC. (RVI RadioWorld, 1/2)
- AWR, Russia: heard their EG broadcasts 0430-0500 UTC, and the repeat from 1600-1630 UTC both on 15125 KHz. (Arthur Cushen, RNMN, 1/14)
- R. Shark, Russia: has changed frequencies as of Nov. 1992. This change is from 5780 KHz, to 6185 KHz. This is an independent station in Russian. (RJMR, 1/9)
- R. Vilnius, Lithuania: has added an additional broadcast in English to Europe at 2000 on 666, 1557, 9675 and 9710 kHz. The 2230 transmission remains unchanged on the same frequencies. Meanwhile the relay of Radio Vilnius by stations in the Russian Far East, with programmes directed to WCNA on 17605 and 17690 kHz has been stopped. - R. Yerevan, Armenia: was on in EG 2247 UTC using 11920 KHz, signals were fair to poor, news, commentary, ID. (Jim Clar, DXPL, 12/26)
- R. Baku (R. Dada Gorgud), Azerbaijan: has a NEW English service at 1700-1800 on 6175 kHz using a transmitter in Russia. (RVI RadioWorld, 1/9)
- **Turkmen Radio, Ashkhabad, Turkmenistan:** Domestic service has a new frequency, now on new 5015 KHz. Sign on is around 0100 UTC. Reception in the UK is exceptionally good, 5015 KHz seems to be better than the former 4825 KHz. (BBCM, RNMN, 1/7)
- R. Tashkent, Uzbekistan: forwarded by Alan Roe, winter frequencies in EG. 0100-0130 UTC on 9755, 9740, 7325, 5955; again 1200-1230 UTC, and also 1330-1400 UTC using the same 17815, 15470, 9540, 7325 KHz. (WoR #677)

- RTN, Bujumbrua, Burundi: good reception on 6140 KHz at 1600 UTC in till past 1700 UTC. (Victor Goonetilleke, RNMN, 1/7)
- V. of Kenya: VR service on with good signal on 6160 KHz which was overpowering the VOAI (No time given?) (Victor Goonetilleke, RNMN, 1/7)

Iraq Intl EG 0044-0056 UTC on 15180; 0215-0515 UTC (AR + EG) on 11860 with possible EG 1/2 hour 0345-0415 UTC; 1400-1700 UTC to Asia In EG. 13680; 1900 UTC using 15210 with possible EG; possible EG 2200-0000 but, News In SP, FR, + GM at 2345 UTC; heard EG from 2000-2100 UTC on 13680 KHz. (gh, WoR #677)
- R. Bangladesh: noted EG at 1236 UTC on 15200 KHz poor conditions, commentary, ID. (Jim Clar, DXPL, 12/26)
- AIR, Port Blair, Andaman Islands: Dave Valko reports receiving a QSL from this station, and also received the following schedule: 0025-0215 UTC on 4760; 0230-1015 UTC on 7170; and 1030-1630 UTC on 4760 KHz. (WOR #675)
- TWR-Sri Lanka: will be testing their 12.5kw transmitter on 5040 KHz between 0000-0130 UTC starting Jan 3. (WOR #675)
- R. Ulaan Baator, Mongolia: via Alan Roe, winter schedule in EG. M, Th + Sat 0910-0940 UTC (Pacific) on 12015, 11850; M, Th + Sat 1200-1230 UTC (Far East) on 12015, 11850; M, Th, + Sat 1445-1515 UTC (Southeast Asia) using 13780, 7260; and again M, Th, + Sat from 1940-2010 UTC (Europe) on 11850, 11790 KHz. (WoR #677)
- R. Japan: Greg Fairbrother notes Ian McFarland announcing additional frequency for 0300 EG broadcast. That frequency is 17675 KHz but there was no mention of whether it was from a relay, or not, nor was it mentioned of any specific target area. (WoR #677) R. Japan: Introduced new 300kw transmitters for its regular transmissions on January 3rd, and is adding even more power in early March. All are based at the Yamata station. La Epoca de Oro

Mexican radio had its Golden Age, but unlike its neighbor to the north, it was more the story of one radio station, and a music, the Mexican Bolero, that swept throughout the Latin world and remains the romantic music that many in Mexico have forgotten.

XEW came on the air in 1930. Up north, we were singing "Buddy, Can You Spare a Dime?" and "Let's Put Out the Lights and Go to Bed." But Mexico, where none had invested in Wall Street or Midwestern farms, was experiencing an oil boom. XEW set a firm and clear-cut policy to sponsor not only Mexican music, but quality in that music. To that end, they quickly established a staff of vocalists, musicians, and composers. Unnamed, but probably more important, were program directors with

excellent judgment of both music and musicians.

The Bolero was a century old. In Cuba, it was somewhat more strident and demanding, but in Mexico, a softer version proved an excellent rhythm for serenade or ballad. Too, it fitted the Spanish language; and Mexican composers—they were soon referred to as poets-wrote lyrics of poetic quality which contrasted startlingly with the jingles of Tin Pan Alley. XEW established its Amateur Hour. Perhaps there were failures, but most vocalists and composers who appeared on that program gained their first recognition there. The station guided the development toward Boleros with poeticquality lyrics, and the public tuned in constantly to hear what was new. The musical quality was not ignored. I remember an old Mexican movie with a full symphonic arrangement of Solamente Una Vez (and have regretted ever since that I hadn't turned on my VCR).

There was a certain formality to XEW's broadcasts, the standing formally in front of the mike, full dress, and controlled orchestrations. This was copied by the nightclubs that abounded in the Capital, and the movies of that day usually worked in a scene or two. XEW had probably the best audio-visual documentation of any station of the era. Appearing on XEW constituted recognition; and movie directors found a location shot of an XEW broadcast a convenient way to carry a story along. Although romantic music served well for a serenade, the Bolero is, first, music to dance to. XEW featured Boleros and the public danced to them. And, as one historian pointed out, this was not dancing in a roomful of people but dancing with a city of thousands. It was Mexico, and Mexican.

But music of the quality of the Mexican Bolero cannot remain regional for long. The music and dance quickly spread throughout Latin America. Here again, XEW led the way. Agustin Lara, the greatest of the composers, had a late-night program on XEW. Americans who remember Hoagy Carmichael have a good picture of Lara, halfslouching at a honky-tonk piano, the inevitable cigarette, and producing great romantic music. He smoked too much, occasionally coughed during a song, but the poetry of the lyrics got across, and the music became background for many a romance. It remains so, and throughout Latin America, many stations work in a late-night program of romantic music, the Mexican Bolero.

In the north, we'd returned from the war, inventive, looking for something different, and once again with the dominant dollar. Our rhythms and dances swept into Mexico. The Golden Era ended suddenly. Even XEW has limited the music that they so carefully nourished to an occasional program.

It was an era, but, as Lara prophetically predicted, "Una vez, nade mas...."



Greetings from the sunny southern U.S.! It has been a good month for us on the DX front, judging by the number of loggings you have sent me this month. As promised, I am devoting the majority of this issue to those logs. Thanks to Ed for giving me an extra page to do this. That is the good news. The BAD news follows.

Effective August 1, 1993, all United States Coast Guard Communication Stations and Cutters will discontinue watchkeeping on the distress frequency 500 KHZ, and will cease all morse code services in the medium frequency radiotelegraphy band.

More efficient telecommunication systems are now available to provide the mariner with options for initiating or relaying distress alerts, and passing and receiving maritime safety information.

These options include INMARSAT, Radio Telex (SITOR), MF/HF single sideband and VHF radiotelephone, satellite EPIRBS (for distress alerts and telecommunications), and INMARSAT SAFETYNET.

Navtex Broadcasts include the same notices to mariners, weather, search and rescue and fixed fishing gear location products that have been provided by the MW morse broadcasts.

Distress and other calls to any U.S. Coast Guard Communication Station can also be made on any of the following HF single sideband radiotelephone channels: 424 (4134 KHZ), 601 (6200 KHZ), 816 (8240 KHZ), or 1205 (12242 KHZ). Meteorological broadcasts are also made over these channels. We believe these options provide sufficient redundancy to ensure that adequate distress and safety coverage.

David Ross reports in with several interesting observations from his loggings during the past month.

David mentions that Peter Rouse in the U.K. publication Shortwave Magazine lists 5310kHz as being used by the UN Forces in former Yugoslavia. He reports that there is a net operating in Yugoslavia which includes ships and aircraft. Shipping reports have been monitored on the frequency.

The net seems to use 3-digit callsigns and is run similarly to the USAF nets, according to David. He monitored RZU working M3U on 26 December at 0310UTC. This might be an interesting frequency to monitor in the coming months.

David is also currently writing a

book on NASA and the Space Shuttle in particular. He graciously included the Shuttle missions, dates, and payloads for the upcoming year. Here they are:

January 13: Endeavor. Launch tracking and data relay satellite.

February 25 Columbia. Conduct experiments with the Germans in Spacelab.
This will be the second German
Spacelab mission.

March 23 Discovery. Carry an atmospheric lab for applications and science (ATLAS) which will measure solar radiation and its effects on the earth.

April 29. Endeavor. Retrieve Eureka satellite, an unmanned lab with year long experiments.

July 9. Discovery. Launch experimental communications satellite.

August 26: Columbia. Conduct life science experiments in microgravity.

November 11: Discovery. Conduct experiments. Mission will include a Russian cosmonaut.

December 7: Endeavor. Astronauts will go outside the shuttle and install parts to repair the Hubble Space Telescope.

The newest edition (11th edition) of Jorge Klingenfuss' annual Guide to Utility Stations has just been published. While the previous edition of this classic got raves from us here at Ute World Central, the new edition surpasses it.

The updated version of the work contains nearly 500 new frequencies and has approximately 3000 changes from the previous edition.

The guide covers all frequencies between 17.1Hz (LW) and 29936.0kHz (HF) as monitored by Herr Klingenfuss at his QTH in Southwestern Germany.

In my opinion, the most important and improved feature of this work over previous editions is the reporting of the more 'esoteric' RTTY modes. Klingenfuss has substantially improved his monitoring capabilities over the past year (he got the new German/Swiss dream decoder the WAVECOM 4100 as well as the top-of-the line Universal M-8000 decoder). The results of his new acquisitions shows in the

number of newer modes reported and the increase in the number of frequencies with a positive ID. The result is a much more complete and modern database than contained in previous editions.

It is good to see that Herr Klingenfuss is not sitting on his laurels. Rather, he keeps up with the fast-paced world of utility reception.

Of course, as in previous editions, the book includes just about every ITU regu-lation as well as a quite complete callsign database of utility stations.

In conclusion, I commend Klingen-fuss Publications for another fine edition of their Utility Guide. I also heartily recommend it to all utility buffs.

RTTY Code Manual (12th ed.)

Another offering by Klingenfuss Publications is the 12th edition of their classic Radioteletype Code Manual.

If you own a previous version of this fine work, you will definitely want to get this latest version. Klingenfuss has added much to the 12th edition.

The most important improvement in the book comes in the heart of the book, the discussion of the various modes. 15 NEW MODES ARE INCLUDED!!! This more than doubles the number of modes discussed over the previous edition.

If you are curious about RTTY, an old hand at decoding them, or a casual user wanting to learn more about the technical details of the modes, this book is for you.

If you have been keeping up with our discussions of the new RTTY modes here in Utility World, then you will recognize the majority of the modes included in Klingenfuss' new book. However, some of the modes included haven't yet made their way into our discussions. Examples are RAC-ARQ and RS-ARQ. I believe that most of us will 'grow into' this latest edition.

Of course the book also includes the usually excellent discussion of telegraph alphabets, definitions, and ITU rules and regulations.

In my opinion, the 12th edition of the Radioteletype Code Manual is the single most important resource for learning the ins and outs of RTTY decoding. It is also indespensible for owners of the new microprocessor-based RTTY decoders like the HOKA Code3 or the new Universal M-8000.

This month we have a special feature on

the LKA (Landeskriminalamt), or German State Police. It was contributed by one of our European reports.

Most monitors in Europe have at one time or another come across a strange type of closely spaced signals with callsigns like "HFFBW", and "GOVHF". These signals are those of the German National State Police, or Landeskriminalamt (LKA).

The LKA is a national organization in Germany and uses a series of local HF radio stations to communicate with its headquarters, located in Bonn. Approximately 15-20 different local offices in all parts of Germany are linked with Bonn via this network.

All of the LKA frequencies monitored so far have been between 2200 and 7900 kHz and seem to operate 24 hours a day. Now lets let our European friend tell you about how to monitor the LKA.

"The stations are in groups of 1 up to 6, usually 85Hz shift but some use a 170Hz shift. Channel IDs consist of 5 letters (ie. BWVHF). I think this means "BW" (local station), "V" von (from), "HF" which seems to be Bonn (control) and the BW indicates the Baden-Wurtenburg (Stuttgart), so the reverse link should be HFVBM.

There are day and night frequencies and irregular midday (7MHZ) frequencies as well. As to be expected most message activity takes place during German local business hours from Monday through Friday.

Most stations will send a "QVL" message every four hours: 0300, 0700, 1100, 1500, 1900, and 2300 UTC, but their message will indicate German local time. The format is:

ZCZC 060 GKVHF 231200 SSS GKGK QVL e: 004(1200) NNN

Most traffic is encrypted, but always begins with the circuit ID. Day/night channel changes and other operator service messages are given in German and would seem to give location information: HFVGS will always end with "Munchen kf".

The following table is a possible analysis (incomplete) of how some of the IDs fit locations. However, many do not fit the pattern. For instance, "G" abbreviations seem to duplicate others like "BY" - Munich,

and GS - Munich. Here is the table:

As you have probably noticed, all of the LKA frequencies on the previous page are 5MHZ and under. This will definitely make the monitoring difficult here in NAm, but readers in Europe and Africa should stand a good chance of catching them. Our European author says that the Bonn stations seem to put out a much stronger signal than the other stations. Remember that if you tune these stations that they all use the radioteletype mode ARQ-E. The baud rate will almost always be 96 baud (see the list), and the shift will be 85Hz, except where noted on the list. We will conclude the LKA Report next month with a few more frequences.

If you have any further information (or corrections) please pass them along to us here at Ute World Central. Monitoring the LKA is still largely unexplored territory (at least here in NAm), so any contributions are important.

Well, as promised last month I am going to provide a few more loggings than have been included in the past few issues. Keep them coming! Now on to the loggings!
