MYSTERIOUS PROGRAMMING ON KJES

Since its return to the air this spring, many DXers have reported hearing strange programming originating from KJES in New Mexico. The content most often reported has consisted of biblical phrases which are recited by a man and then repeated immediately by a woman. Children's voices are also heard singing inspirational songs. Aside from IDs and the address, the broadcasts consist solely of this continuous recitation and repetition.

Being a teacher of theology by profession and an ardent DXer by avocation, I was curious as to what rationale lay behind this unusual method of evangelization. I wrote the station for a QSL and asked about their programming. Along with a QSL card signed by station manager Michael Reuter, I also received a letter from a Jesuit priest, Rev. Richard M. Thomas, an offical with Our Lady's Youth Center in El Paso, the group that operates The Lord's Ranch and KJES.

In response to my question, Fr. Thomas

writes, "This is the way we pray before evangelizing prisoners in Jail or patients in the mental hospital. Praying the scriptures this way enables us to penetrate the darkness in the minds and the institutions where we are attempting to work. Our intent in broadcasting this type of prayer is similar—to penetrate and dissipate the darkness that envelopes the world."

Whateveryour attitude toward Fr. Thomas' claims, KJES offers a novel listening experiencel. The station verifies readily with a full data postcard QSL. The address is: KJES (King Jesus Eternal Savior), The Lord's Ranch, Mesquite, NM 88408. Their schedule as of 4/1:

MYSTERIOUS SPACE SIGNALS

from the St. Petersburg Times, 6/9/93 via Harold Langlois

A search for life in outer space has detected 164 mysterious radio signals that must be studied to learn if they come from natural causes or from an extraterrestrial trying to phone Earth, scientists said.

"At this point, we have no concrete evidence for signals from intelligent aliens. We have some possibilities we're going to investigate further," said Stuart Bowyer, head of the search and an astronomer at the University of California at Berkeley.

Detection of the 164 unexplained signals since the most sophisticated phase of the \$400,000 search started 14 months ago was announced during the American Astronomical Society's annual meeting.

"If one of these candidate signals is really a signal from an extraterrestrial civilization, it's likely we will be able to confirm it within a year," said researcher Dan Werthimer. (I hope the QSL is full data—DB) "It's much more likely that they are human-made interference or

natural noise sources." (Orthose pesky Martian pirate stations)

Since the 1960s, dozens of searches have been conducted for radio signals from societies that might exist on distant worlds.

Bowyer and Werthimer said the UC-Berkeley search, which uses a 1,000-feet-wide radio-telescope antenna in Puerto Rico, is more powerful and sensitive than any other, analyzing 30 trillion signals in the last 14 months alone. (A truly "active antenna"!)

A \$100 million, 10-year search by NASA will be more powerful once it is running full time and with more advanced equipment. That search started last Columbus Day, using antennas in Puerto Rico and California.

Several other searches for radio signals from intelligent alien societies also have detected radio signals that couldn't be immediately explained. But all of them either were never heard again or were found to be caused by natural or human sources.

MORE ON MAJOR LEAGUE SIGNALS

In addition, Ken Reitz has a very thorough article in the July Popular Communications about the history of baseball on radio that lists every team's flagship station. The only teams that cannot be heard on clearchannel stations are Milwaukee, California, KC, Oakland, Montréal, Atlanta, Houston, LA and San Diego. The Expos, however, can be heard over CIQX (ex CFCX), 6005 kHz, for those of you in the East.

If you are interested in pursuing this

further, I recommend Ken Reitz's *The Baseball Listener's Guide* (\$9.95 including s/h from Grove). This 85-page directory includes over 1300 stations carrying major and minor league games throughout North America. Stations are sorted by team, city, callsign and frequency.

So here's the addendum to my list, just in time for the final push to the pennant.

FM RADIO COMBATS MOSQUITOES

"A French radio station will make tuning in to music outdoors more pleasant this summer, broadcasting a special ultrasound wave it says will chase away hungry mosquitoes. Radio Fugue FM, based in Compiegne, 50 miles north of Paris, says the ultrasound emission will chase away female mosquitoes, the ones that bite humans. The station said it plans to broadcast an ultrasound frequency inaudible to humans but the same frequency as that emitted by male mosquitoes,

to keep the bloodsucking females away."

Now that's a different use of radio! However, given the reputation of the size of insects in Harold's home state of Florida, I wonder if ultrasonic waves would be enough. Maybe if they were broadcast as part of WEWN's transmissions it might be strong enough to do the trick. Of course, that would affect other things as well, such as migratory birds, New York's weather patterns, and flights landing at O'Hare Airport here in Chicago!

THE PICTURES ARE BETTER ON RADIO

Mr. Powell's editorial on the Op Ed page makes a powerful statement for radio as "a community of the air." Here are some excerpts from his article.

"Within this lucrative fragmenting of populations lies the even deeper power of radio to create community. Consider the disparate economic, political and geographical groups who are bound by a common love for jazz, or for a call-in program for seniors on fixed incomes or for a pair of brothers giving advice about your father's Buick.

"Remember the central role of the local station in Spike Lee's movie "Do the Right Thing"? It was devoted to and defined by its community, an urban Brooklyn neighborhood.

"In real life, inner-city community stations have been broadcasting for years. Harlem's

WLIB-AM is a well-known station, but its appeal extends well beyond Harlem. An even better example is KPOO-FM, "poor people's radio," in San Francisco's Mission District, which broadcasts avant-garde music and talk shows to its neighborhood audience.

"If inner-city neighborhoods can be isolated by poverty, then for rural areas isolated by distance, local radio can be a lifeline. The fictitious station in the TV show "Northern Exposure" is based on life at rural public stations in Alaska. Towns there are so remote that residents may be able to receive only one local signal, their community station, linked by satellite to major Alaskan cities and "the lower 48" for news of the outside world.

"Whitesburg, KY is isolated by rugged terrain rather than by distance. From Whitesburg, WMMT-FM broadcasts to an impoverished rural community at the junction of four states, bringing news from around the world and from the local town hall. Because of the mountains, residents cannot easily travel to town meetings, so the station broadcasts local discussions at the V.F.W., news of visitors traveling through the area and local bluegrass music from a live remote microphone at the general store. They don't go that far in Cicely, Alaska.

"All across the country, community radio is creating such communities of the spirit in its listeners' minds. In other words, we are what we hear, and through radio, we hear who we



LATIN NOTEBOOK

During the first decades of this century, America (they called the United States "America" then) envisioned itself as a "melting pot." They, the European immigrants, would filter through Ellis Island, spread out across the Midwest, and within one generation become "American." Schools were part of the process, and when a University of Chicago football player came to a Bohemian enclave in Iowa to set up an English-speaking school system, he married one of the local girls, and I resulted. And when in short pants, long black stockings, and overshoes I waded through the Iowa snow to attend that school, we learned about the melting pot and almost worshipped the concept. Radio became involved, and as the networks spread across the nation, they tended to standardize the language, made people aware of the other regions, and with prime-time shows like *Amos and Andy*, belittled minority cultures.

Across the Atlantic, the League of Nations tried a "political solution" and created Yugoslavia from a handful of warring ethnic groups. Later, when it became apparent that the country was held together by a dictator, and Communist at that, the "free world" aimed its heavy radio artillery in that direction. Perhaps the result would have been the same without radio, but the country was bombarded with such a variety of political, moral, and religious philosophies that the result, in all probability, was less

than unifying.

In Mexico, then-president Calles faced a difficult problem. Under the guise of political and economic reform, the Church had been stripped of property and power and driven underground, and the unity created by a state church (and Mexico's own apparition of the Virgin) no longer existed. The Revolution had succeeded; but the central government existed largely because centuries of Viceregal rule, the Aztecs before that, and the patron system itself made a strong central government a way of life. Yet it was a nation of historically similar but rather different regional cultures. When a Communist state, successful until the leaders were liquidated, appeared in the south, the government decided to create a Mexican culture by combining a variety of elements from the regional cultures. The turn-of-the-century dictator had failed in his attempt to impose French culture onto the nation, and the people were seeking an identity of their own.

The new culture was to be created in three distinct areas: Art, music, and books. Mexican muralism developed as the national art form. Its powerful expression and its regional elements of form and color are easily identified. Yet when the original revolutionary themes are abandoned, it becomes second-rate muralism. In music there were two lines of development. The Mexican Bolero was an old Cuban rhythm slowed down and with Mexican themes and concepts added. It's great poetry and romantic music, and it remains popular today. Essentially, it's a product of radio, as some stations had staffs of composers, musicians, vocalists, and late-night program hosts geared to present the latest Bolero to an avid audience. Sound, in Mexican movies of the time, meant filling the soundtrack with a series of rather formal musical presentations. The Bolero was too limited to fit the range of situations that the Cine demanded; so the Cancion Ranchera was developed, as regional themes and rhythms were fused into a new musical form. This remains the most Mexican of music, and universally recognized as Mexican, possibly because few artists would dream of singing a Ranchera without getting into costume.

By books, the government meant education and chose radio as the best means of developing a Mexican culture through education. Radio Educación came on the air in 1924. Its call was XEICM and its name Instituto de Capacitacion del Magisterio, a clear recognition that the educational process must start with the training of teachers. With the introduction of educational radio throughout Latin America, and because its preliminary mission had been accomplished, the station changed its name to La Voz del Maestro and its role to that of a teacher. In the early 1980's, the station changed

its name to Radio Educación and its role to supplying educational and new program material to local stations in remote areas of the country.

In the United States, there was a growing interest in preserving "roots" and ethnic cultures. Mexico was quick to follow and sought to preserve (actually to reconstruct) its regional and indigenous cultures. Radio UNAM, with its easy access to the Departments of History and Anthropology, took control of education by radio, and Radio Educación was left without a mission. But it remained on the air, its daytime coverage the World's Largest City, and at night the entire nation by shortwave.

Recently, I taped an ID:

Imaginación...Cultura...Radio Educación...Cultura con Imaginación.

In Mexico, imaginación refers to creativity instead of fantasy. As you listen to the programs, the realization comes slowly. Radio Educación has created a new mission, that of internationalizing the Mexican culture. Which of the newly-obsolete shortwave giants has imaginación?

Okay, so whazzat about the Board of Directors disbanding? Well, 'I kinda hate to tell you this, but it should make no noticeable difference in the way things are being run here. Bob Thunberg, our SPEEDXer of the Year and deservedly so, makes all the business decisions, and does very well at it. The Society is financially quite solvent; one can never tell, but I seriously can't see us going under unless unemployment goes up to 20% and we start losing too many members to personal bankruptcy, not radio apathy. Good job from the Bobster there.

And despite the news about the Board, there isn't any more instability in SPEEDX than there ever has; I would say there's actually less than in any time I can remember, which is about $\frac{1}{4}$ of the Society's existence.

I agree with Don in that I don't think the current personnel of the Board of Directors were the problem; the whole system quit working a long time ago. Even when I first got involved in the Society, it always seemed to take the Board three months to make a decision. Just speaking about my own job here, when an editorial decision has to be made, I don't have three months. If I'm lucky, I have three days. If you think I'm a terrible publisher, that's fine. But if we had 20 people on the Board of Directors, all of whom did nothing but watch over SPEEDX for 18 hours a day, you'd probably still think I was a terrible publisher, because the last-minute hijinks are my call no matter what.

Anyway, Don is doing the majority of the actual work now, and my part is gradually being brought down to a level that I can live with at least for a while longer. When he's done putting as much of the bulletin together as he can, it comes down here where I slap on a few pages and the covers, and then turn it over to my father to print it. I think Dad's doing a better job than any of the commercial printers we've ever had, don't you?

Muhabura, the Rwandan rebel station, is reported on 6340 kHz at 0330-0505, 1000-1135, & 1715-2005. Most programs are in the Kinyarwanda language, but FF & EE have been heard 1815-1830 & 1900-1915 (BBCMS/Jan Nieuwenhaus/SW Echo). South Africa: The reorganization of the RSA domestic service continues. R. 2000 (replacing R. Orion) currently broadcasts 2300-0300 on 3320 kHz. After 0300, this frequency switches over to the Afrikaans Stereo service (Westenhaver-PQ).

To follow up on Jim and Rich's loggings of Australian Armed Forces Radio, this *1200 transmission is beamed to Australian UN troops in Cambodia daily, via a 40 kW SSB xmtr located at HMAS Harmon, a Royal Australian Naval facility in Canberra. There are other transmissions beamed to Cambodia daily at *0300 on 23678.5 and *0900 on 20418.5, all in USB, all lasting one hour. AAFR have recently reduced their schedule of broadcasts to Australian UN troops in Somalia, since most of them have been withdrawn. These xmsns, via a 40 kW SSB xmtr at the Harold E. Holt Naval Communication Facility at North West Cape, W.A., now operate Mondays and Fridays only, at *0300 on 19037.5 and *0900 on 25322.5--also all USB, all lasting one hour. Reception reports are welcome (preferably with self-addressed envelope + an IRC or two), and may be sent to the following address: Australian Armed Forces Radio, Anzac Park West, 1-B-07, Reid, ACT 2600, AUSTRALIA. (Did you guys get your cards yet?) [By the way, some people might call these utility transmissions, given the USB mode and the out-of-band frequencies. I don't suppose Mike Wolfson would turn them down, if they were sent to him, but I consider them more broadcast transmissions; they aren't, as far as I know, being rebroadcast in the target areas, so you can't really call them feeders. At any rate, if you can pull them in, more power to you!]

Since I recently received the latest schedule (effective 5/1/1993) from Radio Korea, I might as well pass along their English times and frequencies. I'll start with the 60-minute broadcasts. (Unless specified, these are all via the RK site at Kimjae, Korea): 0100 UTC--7550 (Europe), 15575 (NAm)



Wow, August already! Time flies when your having fun. This month I'm going to try a FAX graphic, supplied by Robert Hall (RSA). Robert also sent along these items that will be of interest:

AN IMPORTANT NEW FAX FREQUENCY !! By Robert Hall, RSA.

In recent weeks I have been picking up some excellent fax charts on 17443.7 khz USB at 120/576. Transmissions are frequent through the day and come in strongly here in Capetown although there is some QRM from Nairobi Meteo RTTY signals on 17442.0. The FAX also emanates from Nairobi which


has now become a "Regional Meteo Centre" with links to Offenbach and Bracknell (and re-broadcasts from both). The FAX charts cover a wide area with some stretching from north of

Norway to south of Cape-town and taking in all of Europe and the African Continent. The emphasis is on East Africa and the Middle East including Iran and mast of India. These new FAX and Meteo frequencies are not listed in CFL or the latest Kilngenfuss guides.

Robertalso reports "during March/April 1992 good fax signals were received here from SAAM Molodezhnaya and USN Diego Garcia (on 20310.0 khz). No Tx received from either this year although Diego Garcia still transmits on 20300.0 khz USB".

NAVTEX FOR CAPETOWN RADIO By Robert, Hall, RSA

I have just (29/5/93) picked up a SITOR B transmission announcing that test transmissions of NAVTEX will begin on Friday, July 9th, 1993, at 0700 UTC and continue on the following Fridays at the same time. NAVTEX is part of the Maritime Safety Information service (MSI) which is itself part of the Global Maritime Distress and Safety



System (GMDSS). NAVTEX is transmitted in the SITOR B mode on 518.0 khz up to a range of around 400 miles. By international AGREEMENT, all ships of 300 gross tons or more must be equipped with NAVTEX receivers by August of this year. These receivers automatically print out all the latest weather information gleaned from various satellite and terrestrial collecting systems. There are 81 listed coastal NAVTEX transmitters in operation around the world at this time; Capetown will be No. 82 - and not before time!!!!

Thanks for the information Robert. Robert also provided the FAX picture shown above, the southern tip of S. Africa is visible.

U.S. Navv

*Destroyer Squadron 26, including the USS San Jacinto (CG-56), USS Deyo (DD-989), and the USS Doyle (FFG-39), are participating in "Baltic Operations '93", a U.S. invitational multinational yearly exercise. The exercise, which began June 8th, involves warships from over 13 countries, and will involve the U.S. ships making numerous port calls in the northern Atlantic and Baltic Sea.

*On June 7th, another exercise began, "Eager Mace '93". This one involves the USS Barnstable County (LST-1197) with the 24th MEU (Marine Expeditionary Force) and the USS Wasp (LHD-1) Amphibious Ready Group (ARG). The exercise involves Kuwaiti and United Kingdom units also, in amphibious exercises in the Arabian Gulf. Also with the Wasp ARG are the USS Nashville (LPD-13), and the USS El Paso (LKA-117).

*The USS Nimitz (CVN-68) remains in the Arabian Gulf, in support of Operation Southern

Watch, the enforcement of the no-fly zone over Iraq.

*The USS Saratoga is off the coast of Southern California, where the carrier and the tanker Kanawha recently completed a two-day refueling test demonstrating the ability refueling carriers

*The USS Independence Battle Group recently made a stop in Perth, Australia, where members of the group took up a collection for the family of a police officer killed in the line of duty. Other ships assigned to the Group include the USS Independence (CV-62), USS Mobile Bay (CG-53), USS Thach (FFG-43), USS Bremerton (SSN-698), USS San Jose (AFS-7), and USNS Andrew J. Higgens (T-AO-190).

*For those that keep lists, the Navy recently commissioned the Guided Missile Cruiser USS Cape St. George (CG-71). She is the 25th of 27 Ticon-deroga-class Aegis guided missile cruisers to be built. The Navy also recently christened the Avenger-class mine countermeasures ship USS

Chief (MCM-14). Chief is the last of 14 such ships to be built.

The U.S. Navy's squadron of six Patrol Combatant Missile Hydrofoils (PHM's) I wrote about last month, began their journey north from Key West, Fl., to Little Creek, Va., where they

will be decommissioned.

There's quite a history on these ships. Anyone interested, drop me a line with a SASE and I'll send it. In fact, I have about 30 pages of Navy info I've posted on the local SWL Sig in the last couple of months, to keep Navy UTE's up on the various ships and op's they may be hearing. More than I can present each month. Send a disk or floppy with your SASE, or I can "snail" mail all the pages, but I have no idea what the cost would be.

U.S. Air Force

B-2 Training

Flight testing of the B-2 is being done at Edwards AFB, Calif., where they are temporarily assigned to the Combined Test Force, where pilot train-ing is done. The pilots will be assigned to the 509th Bomb Wing at Whiteman, where the first operational B-2 will arrive in December. The Air Force is scheduled to receive 20 of the flying-wing design aircraft.

Transfers

On Oct.1, 1993, all of AMC's (Air Mobility Command) C-130 aircraft and Little Rock AFB, will transfer to ACC and almost all of the tanker aircraft will transfer to AMC, along with several additional bases to support those tankers. Air Force officials said the transfer "will allow ACC to better integrate combat forces in support of theater commanders".

AFCC Changes Name

Air Force Communications Command (AFCC) became Air Force Command, Control, Communications and Computer Agency (AFC4A) on May 28.

The Air Force took this action as part of it's ongoing efforts to "achieve operational

efficiencies, adjust to fiscal constraints and make organizational changes".

AFC4A is a field operating agency which reports directly to the Air Force deputy chief of staff for command, control, communications and computers.

U.S. COAST GUARD

No sooner do I pass on Mike's information about the recently modified 1721 aircraft, than Mr. A. Nonymous wrote to say that the 1721 has been grounded indefinitely due to the lack of budget funds for needed repairs.

CAPE TOWN RADIO, STATION ZSC

I recently received my QSL request back from Station ZSC, Cape Town Radio, RSA. Besides my PFC being completed rather nicely, a QSL card, made from a post card depicting Ostriches was enclosed. Also received was a letter from Gary Carter, signed "for Control Coastal Radio Officer", which further described what I had heard.

Mr. Carter also enclosed a short history of ZSC, which he thought I might find interesting. I did, and I thought others might be also. So, here is the history of the station, exactly as it was

sent:

"Cape Town Radio was established in 1910 at the old lighthouse site at Kommetjie on the western seaboard of the Cape Peninsula. The first call-sign allocated was VNC and the station operated on the 400 khz Frequency using Spark transmitters. The operators had to work with the windows of the station wide open to the elements, summer and winter, to release the sulphur odours created by the apparatus.

In 1928 the call-sign ZSC was allocated and is still in use today. During World War Two Cape Town Radio played a valuable role intercepting distress messages from allied ships under Axis submarine attack or being shelled by German pocket battleships. It is recorded that on one

occasion the station monitored eight distress calls in ten minutes.

Towards the middle of the war, the station moved to Wireless Road, in Kommetjie where it shared premises with the Royal Navy until 1960. In September 1965 the station moved to its present location in Koeberg Road, Milnerton, to premises that had recently been vacated by the South African Broadcasting Corp. The main operations room is in the only sound studio. Nearby is the building in which Marconi established the Wireless and Telegraph Co, in 1919.

Cape Town Radio established itself on the world maritime map from June 1967 when the Suez

Canal was closed by the Arab/Israeli conflict. The station played a vital role in controlling communication traffic of the thousands of ships that diverted to the cape route. Congestion on the airways was chronic at times with as many as 27 ships waiting in turn on the various circuits for service. Congestion was just as bad at the ports. Frequently there were more than 100 ships at anchor in Table Bay roadstead seeking bunkers, stores and water. The reputation earned by Cape Town Radio during the eight years that Suez was closed has been maintained to this day. It is common practice for ships passing through the Suez Canal to communicate with Europe via Cape Town Radio.

The station is today manned by an operating staff of 70, plus technicians maintaining the transmitters at Klipheuwel 50 km north east of the station. Klipheuwel has long been the preferred site for radio transmitters. On relatively high ground clear of mountains, it is far enough from the Milnerton operations centre to prevent transmitted signals interfering with reception at Milnerton. Marconi erected 245 m high radio masts at Klipheuwel in 1923. This was part of a plan to establish long-wave radio links between London and the entire British Empire. These high masts were never used, because in 1924 Marconi introduced shortwave radio which cost 1/20th of the long- wave system, used only 1/50th of the power and trebled the trans-mission capability.

It's been a long walk from those sulphur-laden rooms and the Spark transmitters. Today's Capetown Radio operator sits at his computer console and works morse, telex and radio-telephone from the one position. Marconi would have been very proud indeed."

I want to also add that my mint stamped envelope was returned, as they use "official pre-franked envelopes". So for those who want to QSL Cape Town Radio, I'd suggest you send IRC's in place of mint stamps. The address is: Cape Town Radio, Private Bag X01, Milnerton 7435, S. Africa. It seems they really went out of their way to answer an intrusion into their daily business, and it was appreciated.

AERO

The Blackbird Flies Again

Remember the SR-71 "Blackbird"? Well, NASA now owns three of them as follows: Tail #64-17956, SR-71B trainer as N831NA, tail # 64-17971, SR-71A at Dryden Flight Research Facility (DFRF), Edwards AFB, and tail 64-17980, also to be at DFRF, as N844NA.



NASA is about to start another series of SR-71 flights, which are always accompanied by "chase" planes, safety chase and photo chase. Flights will depart from Edwards AFB, but some may land on the Rogers Dry Lake lakebed runways. NASA aircraft can be identified by their color, white, and the blue "cheatline" stripe. Most of the prior flights have been FCF, or Functional Check Flight's. These are done when the plane's been down for a while or when major maintenance has been done.

Check for these comms on 9132, 10780, 11104, 11205, 12107 and 13878 Khz for starts. ARIA (Advanced Range Instrumentation Aircraft) flights have been monitored on these frequencies. Of course they can turn up on just about any NASA frequency, but these would be a good place to start looking!

UTILITY NOTES TIP OF THE HAT

This months tip of the 'ole SWL hat has to go to Cape Town Radio, and Gary Carter. It's apparent they are very proud of their station.
