BBC TO CLEAN UP ITS ENGLISH

British Broadcasting Corporation, purveyor of spoken English to the world, wants to purge its broadcasts of cliches, jargon, Americanisms and affronts to good taste and grammar.

Phrases like "shot in the arm" and "last-ditch bid" are out. Short words and sentences are in. It's the Duchess of York and Princess Diana from now on—no more Fergle and Di. And please, no more of those Americanisms that Jar the British ear—words like diaper, drugstore and sidewalk instead of nappy, chemist and pavement. The BBC has published its most comprehensive style guide in its 67-year history in an attempt to improve its own broadcasts and stimulate public debate about language usage.

In much of the English-speaking world, BBC English is synonymous with good English.

"We may not wish to be regarded as guardians of how the nation should speak, but many of our viewers and listeners regard us in that way," Tony Hall, BBC's managing director for current affairs, says in the guide's introduction. "If we misuse words, can we be trusted to get the facts right?" he asks.

The 50-page book, "The Style Guide," is being distributed to BBC staff this week. Cliches to avoid include "at this moment in time," "brainchild" and "blaze." Try "now," "idea" or "fire." Expressions such as "hopes dashed," "sigh with relief," "trigger" and "spell out" should not be used, either. [However,] the guide says some Americanisms, such as teenager, know-how, gimmick, stunt, commuter and blurb, "add vigor and dynamic expression" to the language. (At least they are giving us a little credit over here!)

In an "internal letter to all interested persons," the details of the now infamous fire were again told. Adam W. Lock, Sr., the International Program Director went on to

"WWCR-3 is again becoming a reality... Current projections are [for early September], depending upon the construction of the permanent building. A time schedule has not been worked out, but frequencies will consist of 15610, 12160 [and] 5810 [kHz].

INFOBITS

- The Christian Science Monitor is planning to sell WCSN in Scott's Corner, ME. They will still be using it in the meantime for broadcasts to Africa, at least until the expansion of WSHB in South Carolina is completed in about 1 1/2 years. Programming may be changed to a one hour block, instead of the two hours currently. It was not clear whether the hour produced for the states (Monitor Radio Early/Late Edition) or the international hour would be axed. (RNMN, 8/13)
- Want a sharp looking, new sticker from Radio Roma? It's available from Radio Roma, Casella Postale 320, Centro Corrispondenza, 00100 Roma, Italy. By the way, it sounds as if RAI has plans to expand operations. A new Telecommunications center in Rome contains dozens of radio and TV studios has been in use since March, and proposals to strengthen antennas and transmitters as well as renting time on other stations are on the books. (RAI direct)
- The Deutsche Welle relay center in Kigali, Rwanda recently celebrated its 30th anniversary. Currently they are running four 250 kW transmitters and ten new antennas. (En direct de Cologne, 3/93)
- RFPI will host its 6th anniversary toll-free call-in show on September 16 at 0000 UTC. (WOR)
- The new VOA relay transmitter in Morocco will be located at Breich, 12 km south of Tanger. (WOR)

- You can catch an actual Costa Rican relay site ID from REE at 0100 on 17890 kHz. (WOR)
- KNLS began broadcasting from Novosibirsk this spring in Chinese. Times are 1300-1500 on 11970 kHz on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Sorry, no QSLs for these transmissions, but reports are appreciated. (KNLS direct)
- The earthquake in Guam did not permanently damage either KTWR or KSDA. Both were knocked off the air due to loss of electricity, but only KTWR suffered any minor damage to the studio. (RNMN, 8/13)
- The Coast Guard officially gave up monitoring the 500 kHz frequency on Morse code. The final message: "Now closing down continuous watch. Fair winds and following seas with 73s from all of us." (AP, 8/6 via Harold Langlois)
- The Italian Radio Relay Service (IRRS), however, has been silenced for an unspecified amount of time due to a lightning strike. (RNMN, 8/13)

THE SLINKY ANTENNA



I love fooling around with antenna configurations, and I don't have much real estate to string up lots of wire. As a result, I do some indoor experimenting. Just this morning I put up a Slinky antenna in the shack, and it works surprisingly well here. As I type this, I'm listening to BBC via Ascension beamed to West and South Africa.

The concept is certainly not new, but many listeners who are strapped for space don't know about this antenna. I used the Slinky, Jr. size which is lighter and less noticeable than the standard plaything. It's mounted diagonally, corner to corner, in the shack. Garden variety teacup hooks are used as mounts and screwed into the wall. Rubber bands serve as insulators. A length of insulated wire, with an alligator clip on one end and a

banana plug on the other, make the connection from the Slinky to my antenna tuner. A short coax length fits into the center of the SO-239 on most tuners. I use the MFJ-16010. For portable receivers, a short length of wire with another banana plug and alligator clip can be used, or the wire can be wrapped several times around the whip antenna. I prefer the more positive connection of the alligator clip. To make the project simpler, I used solderless clips and plugs since soldering connections with an indoor antenna is not critical.

I have heard about this, too, with a bit of a twist (no pun intended). Since the Slinky is a series of coils, you can clip several together to shorten the overall length. By using different numbers of coils, you can experiment with different antenna lengths!—DB

RADIO NETHERLANDS HOSTS FREQUENCY CONFERENCE RN Media Network, 8/20

We all know how bad the overcrowding is on the bands these days, and now that the sunspot number is dropping, everybody is using lower frequencies. This is making the situation even more difficult as broadcasters vie for space, especially in Europe. In order to avoid conflicts, Radio Netherlands hosted a frequency conference in August to help stations plan their winter schedules. 45 delegates from 20 countries were in attendance.

Before the meeting, there were 2005 "collisions," 578 co-channel and the rest adjacent channel interferences. Halfway through the conference, the delegates had solved over 600 of these problems. Not all of the collisions were rectified, but they attempted to fix the worst situations. A follow-up conference has been set for next February.

BIG NEWS (which by the time I finish typing it probably will be so old, so trite and so stale you will all wonder why I even mentioned it)—The August issue of Condé Nast Traveler has a full page advertisement for a company named SONY and this SONY company was suggesting that the readers contemplate something called a World Band Receiver. As a side bit of information, SONY explained they have introduced a SONY STYLE magazine. The cost is \$4.95 plus \$1.50 for shipping and handling on your Visa or MasterCard through a toll free number 1-800-548-SONY. This may not really be a magazine as the clerk who took my order, with a three to four week delivery time, pointed out that this was a 300 page booklet which identified 500 different SONY products. Needless to say, all 500 items are not shortwave related.

The Danish ShortWave Clubs International has done their thing again this year. Both the Tropical Bands Survey and the Clandestine List have been updated. Both have an excellent reputations in their special fields.

Good news for those of us who have found any difficulty in reading black print on red paper—the 21st edition of the DSWCI Tropical Bands Survey is on white paper, although the print is green but the contrast is easier to read as compared to last year. The cost is seven (7) International Reply Coupons (or nine (9) Coupons if you want airmail service) from the club treasurer, Bent Nielsen, Betty Nansens Alle 40, I, tv, DK-2000 Frederiksberg, Denmark. Have you found a source for cheap IRCs?

The 9th edition of the DSWCI Clandestine List has a cost of five (5) International Reply Coupons (or seven (7) coupons for airmail)—again directly from Bent Nielsen at his address above.

I have no idea if this next item might interest any of you. I admit to knowing practically nothing about the item, merely what has been printed overseas and the price. The price seems quite high which would make me hope that the information has a related spectacular value. A Latin-America radio enthusiast, Nils Jakobsson of Nordkapsgatan 7, S-164 36 Kista, Sweden has put together a "LA QSL-LIST" (Fourth Edition) but the price from Mr Jakobsson is \$25.US only in single dollar bills or thirty (30) International Reply Coupons.

If any of you had obtained a copy of Ron Montague's WHEN THE OVALTINEYS SANG, you might have interest in a "revised and enlarged edition" for \$3.US directly from Mr Montague, 39 Orchill Drive, Benfleet, Essex, SS7 2LS, England, United Kingdom. This booklet is a short twenty-nine paged effort which might be best summarized as a history of European radio in the 1930's.

Don't forget HCJB from their Public Information office at Post Office Box 39800, Colorado Springs, Colorado 80949-9800, telephone 719-590-9800 always has a couple pages of offerings-books, cassettes and even videos along with trinkets such as t-shirts, a cap, coffee mug, pens, magnets, etc. All the items are tied in with HCJB background, interest and effort. The last price list I had ranged from a magnet for \$2.50 up to a men's or women's watch for \$29.00. Every now and then you get a surprise; on one order they threw in a freebie, a hand carved Ecuadorian bird attached to a magnet. It looked good enough that I finally was willing to put a magnet on the refrigerator door. (Remember I'm strange!) Drop a line off to HCJB in Colorado or give them a telephone call and ask for their latest price list--the items are of good quality and even the books on the station history are interesting.

The RAI most recent "semestral" bulletin has an offering which apparently costs only your postage to them—it is a sticker with "RAI Radio Televisione Italiana" above a globe and "Radio Roma" beneath the globe. Go for it and write to them at Radio Roma, Casella Postale 320, Centro Corrispondenza, 00100 Roma, Italia. Antarctica - Citing interference with experiments and the growth of local cable radio and television, AFAN has announced that it is not likely to return to shortwave broadcasting on 6,012 kHz (or any frequency, for that matter). (Radio Netherlands, Media Network)

Africa

Comoros Islands - Radio Comoros is reported as weak in Europe on 3,330 kHz at 2100 sign off. (Gerry Dexter, Popular Communications)

Paramilitary police recently raided Radio Tropic Infos, an independent radio station, closing the station and arresting several staff members. (DX Party Line)

Congo - RTVC is now broadcasting 15 minutes of news in English on Saturdays at 2202 UTC on 4,765 kHz and 5,995 kHz. (RVI Radio World via Steven Clive via Monitoring Times)

Kenya - KBC is broadcasting in English on 4,935 between 0200-2100 UTC. (BBCM)

Rwanda - Deutsche Welle's English program to Africa at 2100 UTC on 15,135 kHz is strong in North America. 9,640 and 15,350 are being announced as also being used. (Glenn Hauser via Monitoring Times)

Somalia - The UN's radio Manta is broadcasting in Somali at 0410, 1000 and 1300 UTC in 9,540 kHz and at 1600 and 1900 UTC on 6,170 kHz. (BBCM)

South Africa - Radio Orion which has been off the air for some time now has been replaced on 3,320 kHz by Radio 2000. Programming is in English and Afrikaans and is reported between 2300 and 0300 UTC (SYNTEC via Bill Westenhaver via World of Radio)

Sudan - Sudan National Broadcasting Corporation is very strong on 7,200 kHz at 0330 UTC in Arabic. Signal is severely interrupted at 0400 with sign on of co-channel VOA relay in England (ed)

Uganda - Radio Uganda heard signing on in English at 0259 UTC on 4,976 kHz. (Valko via NASWA Journal)

Indonesia - My report to RRI - Jakarta mailed in January to the
address shown in the 1993 edition of WRTH has been returned as
undeliverable. (ed)

Jordan - Radio Iraq International is now leasing time from Radio Jordan for shortwave broadcasts to North Africa and Europe. (multiple sources - ed)

Korea - BBC relay transmissions from Radio Korea transmitters on have been expanded by one hour. Broadcasts in English are being heard from 2300 to 0000 UTC on 9,525 kHz. Original plans were to have Cantonese broadcast during this time period, but a personnel shortage in the BBC's Chinese section has forced them to broadcast in English, instead. They hope to have Cantonese in place of English by October. (Mark Robinson, Radio Japan Media Roundup)

Nepal - Radio Nepal has replied to a reception report! V.S. is Ram S. Karki, Divisional Engineer. (Fred Kohlbrenner via NASWA Journal)

Taiwan - VOFC's San Francisco P. O. Box has been closed. All correspondence with the broadcaster including reception reports should be sent to the Taipei address. (Bill Westenhaver, DX Daily via Monitoring Times)

C.I.S.

Anti-Vietnam government statio Radio Erina, broadcasting via Radio Moscow transmitters is reportedly back on the air as of July 19th. Station is now identifying as Radio Nadjejda in Russian and as Radio Hyvong in Vietnamese. Broadcasts are from 1400 to 1500 UTC on 11,845 kHz (up from previous, 11,725). Signals are weak and there is interference from co-channel, Radio Pyongyang's French broadcast. (Mark Robinson, Radio Japan Media Roundup)

Europe

France - RFI is planning to increase its English broadcasts from it present 2 1/2 hours per day to six to eight hours per day by 1995. (Radio Netherlands, Media Network)

Italy - RAI Schedule of English language broadcasts for March through September, 1993:

RAI is in the process of making major changes including a physical relocation of its offices and studios and its antennas. Also, RAI is planning to add programming in Japanese and Chinese in future and is negotiating with a number of stations to relay its programming. (ed.)

Sweden - Radio Sweden has been forced to drop Spanish and French due to major budget cuts. The Swedish service is now restricted to relays of the domestic service. (George Wood, Media-Scan via (Who said it could only happen in Canada? -Monitoring Times) ed)

Oceania

Australia - VNG transmitter site in Sidney was vandalized and the transmitter mast was toppled. This put VNG off the air on 5,000, 8,638 and 12,984 kHz. VNG Users Consortium has since made repairs and these frequencies are once again operational. Krupp via NASWA Journal)

Cook Islands - Conditions of summer make Radio Cook Islands a possibility for DXer in North America. Try 11,760 in the wee hours until 1000 UTC. (Gerry Dexter, Popular Communications)

Tonga - A3Z has been heard in Australia on 5,030 UTC a little after 0800 UTC, but the signal was very poor. (Alex Wellner, ADNX via Monitoring Times)

Vanuatu - Radio Vanuatu has reactivated 7,260 kHz with French and English programming at 0645 UTC. Parallel 3,945 has also been heard in North America. (NASWA Journal & Kevin Murray, SPEEDX Shortwave Radio Today)

Western Hemisphere

Brazil - Justice Minister Mauricao Correa has stated that recent radio broadcasts in Rio de Janeiro advocating the elimination of criminals and wayward street children may have been a factor in the recent slaying of 8 homeless children. Correa has requested that the Ministry of Communications provide him with transcripts of recent radio broadcasts including those of call-in programs. (DX Party Line)

Costa Rica - Radio For Peace International has temporarily abandoned 21,465 kHz, as broadcasting this frequency and 15,030 simultaneously using the same antenna was causing problems. RPI intends to return to 21,465 as soon as construction of a new antenna is completed. (Glenn Hauser, World of Radio)

Honduras - Radio Copan International is reported as being on the air with a test schedule of 1400 to 1500, 1745-1900 and 2100-2230 UTC. The station is operating on 15,675 with a 100 watt transmitter. (Jeff White via World of Radio)

Paraguay - ZP-30, Radio La Voz del Chaco, a medium wave broadcaster, plans to add a shortwave outlet on 4,900 kHz. Broadcasts are expected to begin in July or August of this year and may include English programming. (Frank Krocker, ZP-30 on DX Party Line)

South Cacaos - The Atlantic Beacon station has been purchased by a group in the New York area. Old Atlantic Beacon programming has been replaced by new and gospel programming in Spanish. Frequencies reported to be in use are 530 and 1570 kHz. WWRV, the call of the new station, also holds licenses for FM and Shortwave broadcasting. No plans for using these licenses have been announced, however. (Glenn Hauser, World of Radio)

Venezuela - Radio Tachira is reported to be airing programming from the United Nations in English at 0445 UTC on Saturdays. Radio Tachira broadcasts on a frequency of 4,830 kHz. (Ron Young, British DX Club via World of Radio)



existing schedule. Although most Radio Budapest broadcasts are on three frequencies, I could
not find a third frequency for this one.

Hello and welcome to Radio World. There seems to be a slight panic in radio and television broadcasting circles in Russia. This is what I gather from reports in the latest issue of World Broadcasting Information, the weekly publication of the BBC Monitoring Service. The first deputy chairman of the Ostankino television and radio company, Mr Kirill Ignatyey, said on Ostankino Channel 1 TV in Moscow on 14 July that the present situation was characterized by the fact that the television and radio companies were not receiving the necessary money from the state, but they had not been given the opportunity to become independent of the state, self-financing and economically free. As a result the viewers could end up without television and radio channels by September, according to Mr Ignatyev. Of more direct importance to shortwave listeners is the threat hanging over Radio Moscow International. On that same fourteenth of July the Russian Communications Ministry suggested sharp reductions in the transmissions for listeners abroad. Almost the entire Russian foreign service would be threatened. Once again, Mr Ignatyev came to the defence of Ostankino and its division Radio Moscow International. RMI is doing a very important job, he said on Radio Moscow World Service in English. "How else can one get the latest first hand information about the situation in dynamically changing Russia?", he wondered. And on 21 July the chairman of Radio Moscow International, Mr Arman Oganesyan, appeared on a morning television programme and strongly defended his company. Radio Moscow International, which today broadcasts in 46 languages and which can be heard all over the world, has changed entirely lately, he said. Instead of propaganda there has come objective information, the dissemination of knowledge and presentation on the international arena of natural state interests which every country has, Mr Oganesyan said. He further claimed that 100 million people in all countries of the world listen to RMI programmes regularly. So far for Radio Moscow International.

Last week I told you about Radio Moldova International. For lack of time I did not include the Spanish-language programmes. Listeners who tune in to our Spanish-language programme "Aqui Bruselas" might already have heard the details of these transmissions in the DX programme of my colleague Ximena Prieto. The schedule is as follows: Spanish to Europe from 1100 to 1125 UTC on 15105 kHz, as monitored by our man in Antwerp, Eugene Gebruers. He made a recording of an announcement by Radio Moldova International in Spanish last week, and although reception quality was very poor Ximena Prieto thinks she hears the station wrongly announcing 15159 kHz instead of 15105 kHz. A second programme goes out to Europe in Spanish from 2030 to 2055 UTC on 15220 kHz. This is announced in the recording we have as 15229 kHz. There's also two transmissions to Latin America: a first one from 0030 to 0055, or as on the day Mr Gebruers made his recording, until 0058 UTC, on 15135 kHz. So far Eugene has not checked this frequency, but that's what the station announces. And a second transmission to Latin America goes on the air from 0900 to 0925 UTC on 9510 kHz. Incidentally, this latest BBC Monitoring Service publication carries the schedule of Radio Moldova International, in French, Spanish, and also Romanian, That's two daily transmissions to America: from 2230 to 2255 UTC on 15220 kHz and from 1200 to 1225 UTC on 15335 kHz. It's up to you to verify that...

OFFUTT AFB, NE -SUNN (Speedx Utility Notes News)

Welcome to another month of Utility Notes! I started this column at Offutt AFB, NE, where I spent two days for their annual open house and air show. We got there in time for "ZOOMIE 42", a Schhweizer TG-7A training glider from the Air Force Academy, to land for the show. Also present was QUAIL 80, a T-1A Jayhawk specialized pilot trainer, 64th Flying Training Wing (FTW), Reese AFB, TX, a DRAGON or HAWK callsign B1-B from Dyess AFB, TX, a CUJO or RISKY callsign B-52G from the 34th BS, and BLUE ANGLE 01 through 09. The 09 is the C-130 support aircraft. There were of course many others, many of these callsign's are heard on the GHFS (Global High Frequency Station) frequencies, Offutt being one of the GHFS stations.

Got to talk to a lot of the crews, including the crew of a 412 (Transport) Squadron Canadair Challenger (tail 144616) based at Ottawa. They did confirm the proper radio callsign of Canadian Forces aircraft to be "CANFORCE". Some have debated the term being CANFORS, despite CANFORCE also being listed in the "tower" ICAO voice callsign lists. This is a VIP transport squadron, who uses the callsign CANFORCE 01 when transporting the Prime Minister of Canada, as does any Canadian Forces

aircraft. When not transporting the PM, these aircraft use the 3700 numeric series for VIPs.

We drove out to the various Offutt annex communications centers located in the area. First stop was Elkhorn, NE, location of Annex 2, the transmit site for Offutt GHFS. The antennas, about 3 conical and 6 others, were all surrounded by cornfield's. Next was Scribner, NE., where a sign directed us to "Scribner Air Base". Well, Scribner Air Base was an abandoned air field for the most part, but sure enough we found the Offutt GHFS receive site. There were only one conical, and two of the LPH-89 antennas. After that, a failed attempt to find Annex 3, listed in the book "Nuclear Battlefields" as in

Hooper, NE. (any idea's?).

The next day the VLF transmitter site at Silver Creek, NE., was located. Built in the 1950's, this was a SAC airborne command post ground entry point, or GEP, where they were capable of beaming the multiplexed (MUX) wide-band FM signal used for communications for links with the autovon/DSN military telephone net. The VLF system is used to maintain comms between the bombers, missile sites and other Strategic Command (STRATCOM) assets. This was a large single tower with a large insulator at the base, with a tunneled entrance visible below it. The tower supported what looked like strings of insulated wire antenna on the upper third, or half. There were also several VLF loops visible, probably used to receive GWEN (Ground Wave Emergency Network) VLF signals. Also a lone HF conical antenna could be seen, and what may be a UHF wide band MUX antenna on the tower. With SAC gone, the sign at the gate showed the facility as 1 ACCOOMG, USAF. This site sends out STRATCOM coded data on 58.5 Khz. It's also is in the middle of a cornfield, quite away back from the public road we sure stayed on due to the other signs.

What kind of signs could so easily prevent your illustrious editor from "digging" deeper for this story? How about "Use of Deadly Force Authorized", a lot more sterner than the typical "subject to

search" signs seen at the other sites!

The USAF has undergone some major changes in it's structure in the last year. More than in it's previous 46 years! Next month I'll try to recap some of these changes for you military UTE folks, as many do effect what we listen to, now back to our regularly scheduled column...

We have a ton of information to pass along so let's get to it. Jim Navary (VA) came up with another

mystery station.

Maritime Packet Racket By Jim Navary

"I captured the text which follows from 0325 - 0420 UTC on 16 June 93. These were packet radio transmissions (300 baud) on 6262.0 (zero beat freq.) in the maritime service band, any ideas?" When Jim first sent this to me, I thought these may be aircraft due to all the "SATNAV Fix" entries. Due to the reference to NAMACS, I knew this had to be Navy comms. I asked Jim to send some more data, which he did the next day:

Jim added a little info for the "packet dumb" (me). "The first line of each transmission is a sort of routing and ID header. The first ID is the originating station. In this batch we have four different stations originating traffic (SATFAC -8, OCEAN, YP693, and DANDY). The last ID on the header line (BEACON, and APRS) is the station the packet is intended for. In the ham world, and it appears to hold true here, BEACON is a broadcast transmission. With ham packet, BEACONs are generally automated to be sent every "nn" minutes. Usually used to announce the presence of a BBS station or a digipeater. Looks like these guys are using it for traffic meant to be copied by all on their net. The middle ID (RELAY) is just that - a relay station or digipeater (digital repeater). The asterisk indicates which station in the link you are actually copying (it is appended by the receiving software, not sent by the packet station. So, in the first case, I copied "RELAY" rather than SATFAC-8. It seems strange that I never heard any "acknowledgment" packets being returned by the receiving stations. This makes me think that there is another duplex freq out there. The six digit number at the beginning of the second line of each packet (e.g., @251000) seems to be a date/time group with the month "understood" (1000 hours on the 25th). Some of these DTGs were reasonably close to the actual time (local time for EDT). These first four packets were received shortly after 0700 UTC (0300 EDT). What is confusing is that some of them are not remotely close to the actual time. Seeing how some of them are repeated throughout the night, perhaps they are truly "beacon" type messages sent periodically, over and over": YP681*>RELAY>APRS:

Based on this new data, it became apparent that we were dealing with things that float, not fly. Then it stuck me that those YP numbers did look a little familiar. YP are seamanship training craft! They are kind of all-around craft...and can also be used as patrol vessels, diving tenders, and mine countermeasures. These craft resemble a large commercial ocean-going cruiser. They have a wooden hull with aluminum superstructures, and displace 172 tons with a full load. Speed is 12 knots with a range of 1,500 nautical miles. Status of YP680: Assigned as seamanship training vessel, Naval Academy, Annapolis, MD. I checked all the other "YP" numbers Jim picked up, and sure enough, they are all valid numbers, all assigned to Annapolis. This system may be used at Annapolis to keep track of the YP's. Another good catch. Thank's Jim, and welcome back to Speedx!

New Products

Just in from Klingenfuss Publications, Germany, is their July 1993 line-up of publications on utility radio stations. Brand new is the Compact Disc Recording of Modulation Types (1st

edition). This a double CD containing various types of electromagnetic emissions recorded recently by a professional monitoring service in Europe. These two CDs allow the identification of all present emissions of utility stations transmitting on SW and cover a total of 2-1/2 hours.

71 different recordings cover speech, morse, facsimile and teleprinter systems such as ACARS, Arabic, ARQ-E, ARQ-E3, ARQ-M, ARQ-N, ARQ6, ASCII, ATU-Arabic, AUTOSPEC, bit inversion, CIS, Cyrillic and third-shift Cyrillic, DUP-ARQ, FEC-A, GOLAY, HC-ARQ, HNG-FEC, ITA2, ITA5, MCVFT, NATO Link, Packet Radio, PACTOR, Piccolo, POCSAG, POL-ARQ, QAM, RS-ARQ, RUM-FEC, SI-ARQ, SI-FEC, SITOR, SPREAD, SWED-ARQ, and TWINPLEX.

The digital recording technique is suppose to prevent any play-back speed deviations. While I haven't heard these disc's, the reputation of Klingenfuss, especially in these areas of RTTY and FAX, is very good. All this can be yours for DEM 100 plus DEM 10 for overseas airmail. I'm not up on the current conversion rate, but I'm sure the normal distributors will have these available here in the U.S.

and elsewhere.

Also, new editions are out for their <u>Guide to Facsimile Stations</u> (13th edition) and the <u>Air and Meteo</u> Code Manual (13th edition). Guide to Facsimile has reportedly been "drastically" modified with new and revised station information for a large number of stations, and now contains 337 sample charts and pictures. Air and Meteo explains the new revised aeronautical code forms ARFOR, METAR, ROFOR, SPECI, and TAF used since July 1, 1993. This book also includes station index numbers and ICAO location indicators and aeronautical company designator's.

Other publications for the UTE available include Guide to Utility Stations (11th edition January 1993), Compact Cassette Recording of Modulation Types (5th edition June 1989), Radioteletype Code Manual (11th edition January 1993), and Guide to Former Utility Stations (5th edition July 1991). U.S. NAVY

If the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission recommendations stand, the Navy will close two major installations, Charleston Naval Shipyard, S.C. and Mare Island Naval Shipyard in Vallejo, CA. The Navy would also close six air stations, four naval stations, 12 technical centers, two training centers, three aviation depots, 35 Naval and Marine Corps Reserve Training Centers, two hospitals, and 32 Naval and marine Corps data processing centers.

Ship News

In other news for military UTE's, the Navy has: Decommissioned the USS Iwo Jima (LPH-2) after 32 years of service; commissioned the Fleet Missile Ballistic Submarines Nebraska (SSBN-739) and Rhode Island (SSBN-740), the 14th and 15th of 18 Ohio-class subs to be built. U.S. Navy Arleigh Burke-class Aegis Guided Missile Destroyers: USS John Paul Jones (DDG 53): Recently completed sea trials. Taking on fuel and munitions. Should depart Bath for commissioning in the next month, possibly to Norfolk, VA. USS Curtis Wilbur (DDG 54): On sea trials. USS John S. McCain (DDG 56): Launched, fitting out. USS Laboon (DDG 58): Launched, fitting out. USS Paul Hamilton (DDG 60): Launched July 24, fitting out. USS Fitzgerald (DDG 62): Building. Superstructure work being done. Will be launched December 11. USS Carney (DDG 64): Preparations for keel laying. USS Gonzalez (DDG 66), USS The Sullivans (DDG 68), USS Ross (DDG 71), and unnamed DDG 72 are planned. DDG 75 and DDG 76 should be ordered soon.

U.S. AIR FORCE

The Pentagon's efforts to help fight the nation's drug war is under review because of an overall examination of counter-drug programs. The review is expected to take about two months and will

examine all aspects of the Department of Defense's counter-drug program.

The review comes at a time when some critics "have questioned the effectiveness of military efforts, particularly in air and sea interdiction of illicit drug flow". Air Force E-3 AWACS aircraft are one of the many command and control systems that routinely spend hundreds of hours searching for airborne drug smugglers. The aircraft augment the federal government's counter-narcotics detection and monitoring programs in the Caribbean, the eastern Pacific and around the world.

The Air Force also manages the Caribbean basin radar network, which is a string of high-tech radars that can track a target aircraft until it is met by U.S. agents or host country authorities. In addition,

the Air Force helps train federal, state, local and foreign law enforcement officers.

The Pentagon's counter-drug program -- coordinated by the Office for Drug Enforcement Policy and Support -- involves all the military services, the five geographic military commands, the National Guard Bureau, and agencies such as Defense Intelligence and Defense Security Assistance. Although the Pentagon played a small role in the national anti-drug efforts until 1989, the tempo has grown by more than 250 percent since 1990.

Operational F-15E Squadron

The 492nd Fighter Squadron at RAF Lakenheath, England became the only operational F-15E squadron in Europe with the arrival in June of its 26th aircraft. The F-15E Strike Eagle replaces the F-111F previously flown by the 48th Fighter Wing. The wing's F-111s were transferred to Cannon AFB, N.M., with the last F-111 departing in December. The wing's 494th Fighter Squadron also is converting to the F-15E and currently has 19 of its 26 aircraft.

T-3A Rollout

Air Force officials attended a rollout ceremony for the T-3A Firefly at the Slingsby Aviation Limited of Great Britain manufacturing facility in York, England, July 8. The T-3A will replace the T-41 trainer currently used to evaluate Air Force Academy cadets and pilot candidates for fighter or transport career tracks. The Air Force is buying 113 of the enhanced flight screeners and will accept the first two aircraft in November. The other 111 will be delivered over the next 25 months.

U-2 Supports Flood Relief

The 9th Wing at Beale AFB, CA., sent a U-2 high above the Mississippi and Missouri rivers July 13 to get photos of the flood-ravaged Midwestern areas. To date, the U-2 has made four photo reconnaissance flights at the request of the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Base officials said the U-2 will continue flying these missions to detail the extent of the damages and

allow for future studies of the Midwest river channels.

U.S. COAST GUARD

Gremlins

The "gremlins" got into last months column, and in Jim Navary's information on the Island-class WPB's the Knight Island is shown both as WPB-1347 and WPB-1348. The Knight Island is WPB-1348. There is nothing shown for the 1347, but as Jim recently heard the Pea Island, I would agree that it's probably the missing WPB-1347.

A few other new addresses for cutters are: USCGC Point Baker (WPB-82342): P.O. Box 488, Sabine Pass, Tx., 77655-0488, and USCGC Mariposa (WLB-397), c/o CG Support Center, 1519 Alaskan

Way South, Seattle, WA, 98134-1192. One last point of interest is a coup

One last point of interest is a couple new frequencies for the U.S. Coast Guard in Operation Able Manner (Haitian Refuge Op's). 7626. Khz seems to be primary with 5223 stated as secondary, but nothing heard there yet. Both USB. 7626 is suppose to be tactical channel ID "3 Echo 10" (3E10), while 5223 is "3 Echo 5" (3E5). Cutters are using plain ID by name, while aircraft have been using tactical callsign's.



U.S. Army

Yes, we have news on the Army this month! I have been listening to comms for months on 6227. Khz, USB. I've found this to be the U.S. Army Transportation Corps, at Fort Eustis, Va., primary



An odd choice as it's a limited coastal station frequency! The AAC in comms with, is listed in Gayle Van Horns! International Callsign Directory as USAV Bunker. I strongly suspect that it's either a For Eustis Transportation Corp callsign, or the 10th Battalion's callsign It's apparently a shore station, the ships always check in there and tell them to secure their guard for the day. The Transportation Corps is the Army's, Navy.

Marine/Non-Military Ships

Also on 6227 Khz I caught the R/V Atlantis II in comms with the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute, Atlantis is a Woods Hole research vessel. Atlantic II carries the DSV "Alvin", which you may remember found the wreck of the Titanic. They sent a ton of information of their ships, and the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute. I'll try to pass more on next month.

Ships Callsign's By Robert Hall, Capetown, RSA

"Many months ago I asked where I might buy a list of Ship's Callsign's; the question was posed in a number of publications and was followed by a pretty long "hush"! A search through UK libraries and book shop's was commissioned, and enquiries made with famous "Janes Publications". At last a kindly SWM reader came up with a good bookstore address and at the same time I followed up on another suggestion (by fred Osterman of Universal Radio) to write to: "Union Internationale Des Telecommunications, Place des Nations, CH-1211 Geneva, Switzerland".

"The ITU replied immediately with a pamphlet giving interesting details of all their many publications and their prices. For GBP60 they airmailed me some 10 kilos (yes, kilos!!!!) of Ships Callsign and Name Lists, and each month I receive updates - also by airmail but weighing only around 1/2 kilo! This seems a very good value to me especially since I have now heard that the same material is being sold in the UK for GBP130 plus postage (cost of 10 kilos by airmail - the mind boggles!!). Ships Callsign and Name Lists provide interesting detail for RTTY buffs equipped to receive the SITOR A & B modes".

Thanks Robert. The new 1993 ITU ship callsign book "List of Ship Stations - List V, 33th Edition" plus supplements, has just been released. For \$85.00 you can order this "little" gem from the ITU, as Robert describes. Payments should be made out to the General Secretariat of the ITU. Tale of a Ship

In a recent veri letter, Efstathios Dimou, Chief Radio Officer and Dionysios Apostolatos, 1st Radio Officer of the S/S Britanis sent copies of an article from a 1957 magazine, whose name I can't make out.

The article, written by Edward F. Oliver, "It Happened on old Monterey" tells a fascinating WWII

story of the present day Britanis, which is the ex-Monterey.

Pressed into service as a troop transport ship during the war, the ship was part of a convey (KMF-25A) bound for a Naples. On November 6, 1943, the convoy was attacked by several waves of German aircraft.

Although the Monterey was not hit, several other transport ships were, including the S/S Santa Elena. The article goes on to describe in great detail what the author describes as "one of the greatest sea adventures of the war", the rescue of more than 3000 troops and merchant crew from one troop ship by another, at night and without a single casualty.

The ships peacetime Captain, who remained at the helm during her war years, Elis R. Johnson, received the highest award that can be bestowed upon a member of the American Merchant Marine -the

Merchant Marine Distinguished Service Medal.

It was great reading, Monterey went on to become the Matsonia and the present day Britanis. A sticker on the cover of this magazine shows it belonged to "Capt. Elis R. Johnson, San Francisco, CA".



While I have a little room, I'd like to pass on a few tips. Tim Braun suggests that 7741 be monitored be some interesting tfc. I've been hearing quite a bit of coded tfc on DEA freqs lately. They might be worth following. Refer to Grove's Shortwave Directory for a list of freqs. Bill Bergadano asks if Berne LDOC on 6643 is off the air. Does anyone know? Also, I've been having problems getting good reception of RTTY/FAX tfc. I installed 2 piece toroid cores (380-0020F, 380-0043F) from MEMDELSON'S (1-800-344-4465) on every cord in the shack and things improved ALOT. A good ground system is next. Finally, Robert Hall sends the following re/aero RTTY b/c from Africa.

AERONAUTICAL RTTY

One sees much material and chat about aero USB but very little about aero RTTY. Here is something to fill the gap!

There are two different and distinct types of aeronautical RTTY; semi-continuous coded meteo weather signals covering wide geographical areas, and uncoded occasional traffic relating to aircraft movements and weather reports. The two traffic types are seldom transmitted from the same station. In this report, we are concerned only with the latter type broadcasting information about a/c movements and weather. The African Continent is dotted with these stations which come alive at night when most of the long haul overflights occur. Most of these stations are located in former French Colonies and communicate with each other in networks which fall under the titles of ASECNA or AFTN, respectively meaning -"Agence pour la Securite de la Navigation Aerienne en Afrique et a Madagascar", and "Aeronautical Fixed Telecommunication Network". Modes used are Baudot RTTY, ARQ M2 and ARQ E3, the latter being a French military code. The following is a short list of active stations from my 1992/93 database:

Fiscal Year 1993 was not a profitable 12 months for SPEEDX, as we experienced losses in all four revenue catagories of renewals, new members, Supermarket Sales, and donations, when compared to FY 92. - Do <u>not</u> send loggings, QSL reports, etc. to club HQS in DuBois; this only delays their publication, Please mail them directly to the column editors, or to the Central Distribution Editor (CDE), whose address is on the back cover of the bulletin.

Do not order SPEEDX Supermarket items from club HQS; send all such orders to John Carson whose addres is also located on the cover.

- <u>Do</u> mail all renewals to HQS as early as possible, to ensure a timely delivery of your monthly bulletin. For example, if your mailing label has "9310" printed on it, this means your last bulletin will be the October 1993 issue. Please mail in your renewal, so that it is received at HQS by October 15th, etc.
