ETTERS AND QUIDS FROM 'ROUND THE WORLD!

THE LISTENER'S LAWBOOK by Frank Terranella reviewed by your editor!

If you are a serious radio listener (and certainly you must be since you belong to SPEEDX!) then this book is essential reading for you! The Listener's Lawbook covers in detail our listening rights, or lack thereof!

Frank Terranella, a prominent radio attorney, has written this latest edition of the book which includes sections on new state laws against mobile monitoring, FCC proposals to ban public service frequencies from some radios, precedent-making cases under the ECPA (Electronic Communications Privacy Act) and others.

The 48 pages are a complete and easy to understand guide to listening laws in the United States. Additionally, author Terranella has added summaries and opinions of some of these laws, to help you better interpret them.

Did you know that in Minnesota no one other than ...peace officers within the state, the members of the state patrol, and persons who hold an amateur radio license... may install police band monitoring equipment in their motor vehicles? Well, unless you get special permission, that is! I wonder how many members of the press, including news camera cars, have illegally installed police band monitors in their vehicles?

In addition to the ECPA, the Communications Act of 1934 is discussed, along with other state laws covering California to Maine. Finally, Frank discusses the pending FCC ruling regarding the removal of Public Safety Frequencies from transceivers and scanners.

All told, this book is well worth the \$11.95 price tag (includes shipping and handling). It's published in a 8 1/2 x 11 format. You can order the book directly from Grove Enterprises, P.O. RADIO "M" from Moscow News, No. 24/91 submitted by Stanley Kiselyov - USSR

With the events of the past month in the Soviet Union, I'm not sure how timely this article is. Still, I found it interesting enough to run for you this month. "Radio "M" (as they call Moscow Echo Radio between themselves) consists of only five people. All of them are just a little over or under 30. The chief masterminds - Sergei Korzun and Sergei Buntman - previously worked for the foreign service of Radio Moscow. Sergei Fonton came from the news and music channel Mayak. Staff members Slava Kriskevich and Pyotr Zhuravlyov are students.

"Their manner is distinctive - something very unusual for Soviet radio announcers. Only a year ago personal style and extensive information, ideals they associated with Radio Liberty, seemed unattainable.

"Says Korzun: 'But Radio Liberty is actually far more politicized. Their broadcasts are part of an ideological struggle. We think the mass media in "peacetime" should be different. We don't want to make people's minds up for them.'

"Recently, answering critics of Russian TV and Radio (who were reproached for not concealing their political preferences), Russian TV political analyst Vladimir Tsvetov said that in the present power struggle it maybe couldn't be otherwise. The young men from Radio "M" think differently: ideological commentary is characteristic of all Soviet media and old timers can't abandon their habits. What is needed is a new generation of newsmen.

"Thanks to some influential people who supported this idea Moscow Echo was set up as a joint-stock company. The new radio station was allocated its own radio wave, a low-powered transmitter, a computer and two rooms in an old building on October 25 Street - just next to Red Square. That's all. The rest was in their hands.

"They always strive to be the first. And they are most of the time. They give only hard facts; if there are commentaries, they go on the air uncensored.

"So-called necessary themes and the correct position are nonexistent for us, says Sergei Buntman. 'True, we do have political preferences. But what is of primary concern for us is whether our information is interesting or not.'

"Radio "M" broadcasts interviews with radical Russian deputy Galina Starovoitova on the one hand, and with leaders of the chauvinist Pamyat group on the other. Broadcasts feature a roundup of the most sensational publications in the Soviet press every morning, and the subjective opinion of a listener in the evening. Programmes have included reminiscences by Andrei Sak-



harov's widow Yelena Bonner and recollections by Lazar Kaganovich, Stalin's associate.

"Radio "M" hosts skilfully link their commentaries with pop songs (music prepared by Igor Labunets)."

Things certainly are changing in Russian, aren't they?

GORBACHEV TUNES IN TO SHORTWAVE

Unless you've been totally isolated this past month, you've got to know by now that a coup was attempted in Russia. What you may not have heard was that imprisoned Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev used an old shortwave radio tuned to the BBC, Radio Liberty and the VOA in an attempt to find out just what the heck was happening.

"We found some old receivers in the servant's quarters, and we were able to set up antenna - the lads were able to figure out how to do that - and we were able to catch some broadcasts," Gorbachev said.

Interestingly, the clearest signal Gorbachev received was from the BBC, but it was not a signal that was beamed to the Crimea where he was being held. Apparently what Gorbachev heard was a relay from the BBC's Mediterranean station in Cyprus whose signal just happens to pass directly over the Crimea!

The VOA normally broadcasts 14 hours per day to the Soviet Union with news and entertainment. However, during the attempted coup, it switched to an all-news format.

RADIO YUGOSLAVIA

Dan Brame of Wheeling, IL (gee, just down the street from me...hi Dan!) sent in a short fact sheet he received from R. Yugoslavia. In case you didn't know, Yugoslavia broadcasts in two foreign languages including English, Russian, German, French, Spanish, Albanian, Italian, Bulgarian, Greek and Arabic. It also broadcasts 11 hours of *original* programming every day. Why did I italicize "original"? Well, maybe

Why did I italicize "original"? Well, maybe because it looks like Yugoslavia is going capitalistic! Their notes say that the station has 96 frequency hours of broadcasting time available, and that since part of this capacity is not being used, it can be *rented out* to interested partners. (emphasis added) Gee...I wonder if *Radio Earth* is still looking for transmitter time! Hi!

The station has four 500kW transmitters available, so don't delay, sign up for your time today!

The bulletin ends with, "Radio Yugoslavia is a station listeners trust." Sounds good to me!

A JACK BY ANY OTHER NAME IS A DONALD

Greetings SPEEDXers!

As we head into a new DX season in North America, it's time to take a look at some recent activities in the Association of North American Radio Clubs ("ANARC"). SPEEDX has been a member of ANARC since 1972, the year our club first became eligible for membership. We have been a long time supporter of this organization and continue to maintain an active interest in the Association's affairs. Through a periodic column in the bulletin, I will endeavor to keep the membership informed about current ANARC activities.

During the first week of August, Interim Coordinator Sheldon Harvey attended the Leningrad Hamvention on behalf of ANARC. The Club Representatives are waiting for a report on that function.

A new publication, the ANARC Information Booklet, describing all the ANARC clubs has been developed and is being distributed to those interested in the promotion of the hobby. The booklet was designed to introduce ANARC, its member clubs, and its services, committees and publications. The booklet is available for distribution at various club functions such as hobby shows, promotional exhibits, club meetings, hamfests, etc. by writing to Sheldon Harvey. The SPEEDX page was developed by our Publisher (what's his name?) during one of his better moments, hi!

I have been appointed the Association's Awards Coordinator by Sheldon Harvey. In that capacity I will be responsible for the reinstatement of the old ANARC Awards Program. Plans are developing to issue three separate awards: (1) DXer of the Year (shortwave broadcast), (2) Specialty Band DXer of the Year (AM, FM, TV, UTEs, etc.) and (3) International DXer of the Year. These awards were extremely popular in the past. Nominations of candidates and voting by the Club Representatives will take place during the remainder of the year. ANARC plans to announce the winners each year at the Winter SWL Festival in Kulpsville, PA.

ANARC is still searching for a permanent Executive Secretary. The position has been vacant since the resignation of Robert Horvitz in the first half of 1990. Shortly thereafter, the Executive Council appointed Sheldon Harvey as ANARC's Interim Coordinator with the express purpose of leading the search for a permanent Executive Secretary. Former Executive Secretary Dave Browne is interested in the position as is Interim Coordinator Sheldon Harvey. At the moment, the Executive Council is considering three constitutional amendments which could dramatically impact ANARC operations in the future. The first amendment would allow club executives to become ANARC's Executive Secretary. The current constitution forbids that from happening. If adopted, a final call will go out for Executive Director as the ANARC Club Representative. The third amendment would suspend the existing ANARC Club Representative. The third amendment would suspend the the constitutional amendments must be approved by a two thirds vote of the Executive Council. If approved, all the Club Representatives vote with each club's vote weighted proportionately according to the size of its membership (one vote for each 100 members). A two thirds vote by the Club Representatives is necessary for passage of each constitutional amendment.

I have been asked by the current SPEEDX Board of Directors to stay on as your club ANARC Representative. This will help provide a smooth transition as the new Board settles into office. October is the month that Executive Council elections are held. Each year, three of the six Executive Council seats are up for election. This year, the terms of Bob Brown (NASWA), Arlene Luskin (WADXA) and Tom Gavaras (MDXC) expire. With the support of our Board of Directors, I have notified Interim Coordinator Sheldon Harvey that I am a candidate for ANARC's Executive Council. Naturally, I will keep the membership informed of the results.

If SPEEDXers have any questions about ANARC matters, do not hesitate to write to me. Please send a Self Addressed, Stamped Envelope (SASE) for a reply. Input from the membership will help shape the direction of future ANARC Reports. 73 - RAD

Part II: A visit with Steve Rosenfeld, one of AT&T's last radio repairmen

The building where Steve Rosenfeld spends a few days a week doesn't lend itself to conversation. The hum one might expect in a room filled with high-voltage radio equipment sounds more like a low roar.

But get Rosenfeld to explain how an "exciter" works, and his voice breaks through the noise. His eyes light up, his shoulders loosen, and his step begins to spring. Radio turns him on.

"This is like a big hobby shop to me," he says, bouncing from one massive hulk of metal to the next, to explain how these radios work, and how he fixes them. What he cannot make a layman understand, he communicates in pure enthusiasm.

He pops open the back of a huge amplifier. "If this isn't grounded, it could arc." What would that mean? "It would fry you right where you're standing."

That said, he hunches over and literally climbs inside the machine. "It's the only way you can get at these parts," he explains.

For 62 years, the AT&T ship-to-shore station in Ocean Gate has stayed pretty much the same. The black-and-white checkerboard floor looks like it's retained its original polish. The radios Rosenfeld maintains haven't been replace in more than a quarter of a century.

Time just stands still inside the station's thick masonry walls, where a part of the building added in 1947 is still called "the new wing." The only thing that has changed, it seems, since Rosenfeld came to Ocean Gate in 1973 is the pace.


"It used to be, we had eight people and a supervisor. Then they dropped the midnight tour. Now we're just part time," he said. Rosenfeld and another transmitter technician put in two to four days a week here, often of their work week at the Manahawkin site.

Satellites orbiting overhead have acquired much of the oceangoing communications business. With a decline in ship-to-shore radio traffic over the years, earnings have dwindled and, with them, the work force. It simply doesn't take a lot of people to keep these old radios working.

With his dated black horn-rims and his plaid flamel work shirt, Rosenfeld, 47, who lives in Forked River, is truly an artifact from a technological age gone by. Like several of his colleagues, he received all the education he needed after high school in the Army, where he worked with radar, radio, and satellites. As one of only half a dozen AT&T employees nationwide with the skills necessary to repair high-seas radios. however, he is somewhat indispensable. "For the most part, they don't teach this any more."

He points to a 10,000-volt amplifier. "I fix that," he says. "Nobody does that. They send it back to the factory, or they order a new one. This is the last place in the whole country that fixes the parts."

Concluding Receivers under \$400 by MARK SEIDEN, FL.

<u>ICOM</u>: The only Icom receiver you'll find for less than \$400 is the R-70, which was the predecessor to the curren R-71A, and some hard-core DX'ers believe it was a better radio. Digital readout to .1 kHz, RIT, good filters (especially if the optional FL-44A is installed), notch filters in AM mode, dual VFO's and excellent SSB capability make it a desirable set. It is difficult and cumbersome to tune and the audio won't win any prizes, but it is an excellent value for under \$400, particularly if one's bent is more towards DX'ing than SWL'ing.

<u>KENWOOD</u>: Two good used values here are the R-600 at about \$150-\$200 and the more sophisticated R-1000 at under \$300. True general coverage, pleasant audio in ECSS mode, digital readout, two filters, decent stability, good SSB capability and fine resale value. A friend who is a professional monitor for the BBC says that when recreationally listening at home, he finds himself using the R-1000 more often than his NRD525! One warning: the R-600/R-1000 does have a reputation for generating spurs and being critical to tune in tough signal environments (ed's note: having used a R-1000 for $3\frac{1}{2}$ years, I agree with the unwanted spurs!).

<u>LOWE</u>: Lowe is a British manufacturer whose products are generally not available here in the U.S. However, a few now discontinued HF-125s are here and may turn up on the used market. The HF-125 is a very well built radio with fine audio, one kHz digital readout and easy to use controls. It is particularly well suited for SWL'ing and lends itself somewhat to portable use, though it is not a true portable. While I haven't seen one on the used market yet, \$400 would seem to be a fair price for an HF-125 in excellent condition.

PANASONIC: Panasonic makes a nice portable called the RFB-65 which sells new for about \$250. It is general coverage, with keypad frequency entry, a tuning knob, digital readout, 36 memories and SSB capability. I believe it be a better radio than the Sangean 803A/Realistic DX-440, but not in the league of the Sony ICF-2010.

Sangean ATS-803A/Realistic DX-440: The '803A is also marketed by Radio Shack as the DX-440. They are otherwise identical. Keypad frequency entry, digital readout, nine memories, two filter positions, general coverage and a BFO are among its features. SSB tuning is quite difficult. If you must have a new radio for less than \$200, this is it. A good first radio for someone with limited funds and modest listening requirements.

SONY: The Sony ICF-2010 is simply the best shortwave portable ever built (as indicated by your editor in this column in the April issue of SPEEDX). General coverage capability, good audio, true synchronous AM detection (this feature is also available on the NRD535D at a cost of \$1,600!), good SSB capability, two filter positions, 32 memories, keypad frequency entry and .1 kHz digital readout, all at a selling price (new) of \$350-\$360. The performance of this radio rivals that of some semi-professional communications receivers that cost three or four times as much. An excellent choice for all but the most critical applications. If you want a new radio for under \$400, this is it.

YAESU: A number of good possibilies here. The FRG-7 (nicknamed the "Frog Seven") was a benchmark radio that is still very popular. Dial accuracy is only 5kHz and, in unmodified radios, there is only one bandwidth, but the audio quality is fairly good and the radio does offer true general coverage. These radios were often modified by adding high quality extra filters, which make them an even better buy. Expect to spend \$150 for a standard FRG-7 and \$200 for one with a quality filter. The FRG-7000 is basically a Frog Seven with a digital readout and 1 kHz tuning accuracy. The AM filter isn't too effective and DX stations are best tuned in the ECSS mode, which requires a careful touch on the controls. In ECSS, one tunes an AM station as if it was an SSB station, which kicks in the SSB filter and improves selectivity. Expect to pay \$200 or less for your used FRG-7000. Both the Frog Seven and its sister FRG-7000 require an external antenna tuner for optimum performance.

Last on our list is the FRG-7700. This radio, also now discontinued, is a fairly serious piece of equipment which considerably improved on the FRG-7/FRG-7000. Audio quality is very good, as is stability after warm-up. Two filters of only average quality are included, which some owners have upgraded, and the digital readout is accurate to 1 kHz. As with the FRG-7/FRG-7000, an antenna tuner helps performance and Yaesu makes a dedicated unit especially for this radio. A good buy at around \$300 or less.



Dear Tim

Thank you for your letter of 18th February and please accept my apologies for this rather late reply.

As you will be aware, our shortwave transmissions, aimed at our forces in the Gulf have now ceased. However I am happy to answer your attached questions.

BFBS Radio has a five part brief:-

- 1. To entertain.
- 2. Inform.
- 3. Educate.
- 4. Provide a link with home.
- 5. Reflect service life.

My belief is that if you don't do the first one well, you can't do the rest because no one will be listening.

I began my career in broadcasting in May 1969 having attended three years at Theatre School, two years as an actor and three subsequent years working in television.

BFBS is administered by the Services Sound and Vision Corporation. The SSVC is a registered charity and any profit made by the commercial department is returned to service charities. They charge the Ministry of Defence for administering our eight radio stations overseas in Germany, Gibraitar, Cyprus, The Gulf, Hong Kong, Brunei, Belize and the Falkland Islands. Our studios in London provide a sustaining live news service by satellite and 130 hours a week of music and speech programmes, some of which are live by satellite, others on tape.

At the peak of the Gulf crisis we were receiving approximately 750 letters a week from servicemen in the Gulf, their families in Britain and Germany and other interested DX'ers like yourself.

Our shortwave transmissions began on the 13th August last year. We opened our own FM station in the Gulf on 17th December and we are now heard in Riyadh, Tabuk and Kuwait. Nobody really knows how long we will continue to broadcast in the Gulf but I would guess that we will be on air there until the end of September.

Our studios in the Gulf are built into air conditioned portacabins capable of being airlifted at any time.

Thank you for your interest and I hope you will find some of the above interesting. I am enclosing a couple of information sheets.

PROFILES

This profile features one of shortwave's most popular personalities. Vasily Strelnikov of Radio Moscow. It will appear here in two distinct and separate parts. The first part is a prepared biography piece from R. Moscow. Many of you may have already seen this piece, but I've included it for those who haven't and because it supplies some good background information. The second part consists of an exclusive interview for SPEEDX as transcribed by Woody Seymour Jr, (with help from Lynda Gears). Enough talk, let's rock...

*** Vasily Strelnikov ***

Vasily Strelnikov was born in 1962 in New York City where his father Boris Strelnikov was a correspondent for the Soviet national daily PRAVDA. He spent his childhood in Washington, DC growing up to the sounds of Top 40 stations in the nation's capital and shortwave stations around the world. It was this combination that led him to try his luck at Radio Moscow's World Service broadcasting in English. At age 17 he got an announcer's job at the World Service to become the youngest full-time on-the-air personality on RM. In 1982 Vasily launched his own pop music request show which is now heard around the world and ranks among the most popular on shortwave.

Vasily has interviewed such stars as John Denver, Benny & Bjorn of the group ABBA, Carlos Santana, The Doobie Brothers, UB-40, James Taylor, Quincy Jones, Billy Joel, Peter Gabriel and many others for his show. In 1986 he did a special with Casey Kasem for Radio Moscow. Vasily was the creator of the TASS TOP 20 radio show in 1987. The show was aired on Power 105 WAVA-FM Washington, DC during President Gorbachev's visit to the USA. He also did the voice-over for two gold discs released by TASS and presented to Nancy Reagan and Raisa Gorbachev during the 1988 Soviet/American summit in Moscow. Vasily took part in several live satellite link-ups between Radio Moscow and KPBS Sandiego, CA. His is a familiar voice on the soundtrack of Soviet-made animated cartoons dubbed into English in Moscow and distributed worldwide by SOVEXPORTFILM. He also does live rock and roll radio in Moscow on RADIO M.

Exclusive interview for SPEEDX of Vasily Strelnikov.

SPEEDX: Please tell us about the early years of your life?

- Vasily: I was born in New York on May 14, 1962. My dad was a correspondent in New York for PRAVDA in the late 50's and early 60's. A couple of years later we moved to Washington. We were in the US for about 15 years. After my father's term of service in the US ended, we moved to the USSR. I didn't know what to expect in the USSR, apart from what I'd been hearing on Radio Moscow! One of the first stations that I heard on shortwave was Radio Moscow in English, and I thought it was funny that Russians were speaking English. English has always been my first language.
- S: How did you wind up as an announcer at Radio Moscow?
- V: When I was in the Soviet Embassy school in Washington, all my classmates wanted to be either diplomats or correspondents, but I wanted to be in broadcasting. That's why I didn't get along with the Soviet kids there. I always loved radio broadcasting and would go for walks in Washington listening to the AM stations there. When I went to the Soviet Union, I couldn't read or write well in Russian, so I couldn't go to a university and there wasn't much for me to do. One day in 1980, a friend of my mother's mentioned to her that she had heard that Radio Moscow had started a World Service in English and was looking for announcers. I went in for an audition and I guess that they were so desperate for voices that they decided to hire me.
- S: How did you become a DXer?
- V: My friend Phillip Gentry in Washington got interested in DXing, and since he was so interested in it, I decided to give it a try. I started tuning in 1973, and the "DX Bug" bit me.
- S: Who are your favorite Rock artists?
- V: I like most all rock music. I play the music that I like best on the program.

S: What are some interesting experiences while at Radio Moscow?

- V: Back when I was doing "Listener's Request Club", I had to submit my script in writing for approval. When glasnost hit, things changed. Now I record my program and submit the tape. The person that listens to my tapes does not always understand everything that I put on the program. One time I played the entire "Lumberjack Song" from "Monty Python" on "Vasily's Weekend", and the person who listens to my tape thought that it was a Canadian worker's song, so it got through. I enjoy making tongue-in-cheek comments on the program.
- S: What kind of equipment do you have for listening?
- V: FRG-8800 with a 10 meter longwire antenna on the roof. Also a Sony ICF-2010 and a SW1. I have these receivers thanks to my friend Gary Gears.
- S: What is your favorite aspect of the radio hobby?
- V: I like to take my radio to my country home about 60 kilometers outside of Moscow. Reception is clear there; there's no interference to speak of. While I like to listen to regular programs such as the two Bobs from Switzerland and Jonathan Marks' program on Radio Netherlands, I also like just tuning around to see what I can hear. This hobby fascinates me.
- S: What do you think of listener feedback to your show?
- V: I love my listeners; I love the letters that we get from them. We get some crazy letters, but we also get some touching letters. That's one of the greatest parts of shortwave radio - the contact with the listeners. I've made some good friends through shortwave radio, including Gary and Lynda Gears.
- S: Are there any other things that we should know about you?
- V: I fall asleep every night listening to Radio Liberty in Russian.

Thank you Vasily, and thanks also to Woody Seymour Jr and Lynda Gears for passing this piece on to me. I hope that everyone enjoyed it as much as I did. I found out that Vasily and I have two things in common. We were both born in 1962 and we both like "Monty Python", (or at least the "Lumberjack Song"). Keep on Rockin' Vasily!

PROCEEDINGS 1991 Reviewed by Edward Janusz

The new **PROCEEDINGS** arrived here on September 17. I haven't had time to thoroughly digest it, and will have to rush through some of the articles, but I wanted to write a few preliminary comments.

Additional Notes on Tropical Band Propagation, David Clark and John Bryant. A follow-up to articles in previous PROCEEDINGS. For those who were daunted by last year's profound but dense treatise by these same authors, this shorter and somewhat clearer article might actually serve as a good introduction to the mass of theory the series explores. Essentially, Clark and Bryant attempt to refute the long-established theory that radio waves "hop" across the earth's surface, and make a case that signals are actually transported through the ionosphere and "dropped" back to earth at certain predictable spots. (I trust that this over-simplification is reasonably useful.) The article also contains some early results from a long-range survey of dawn enhancement and the post-local-sunset "sweet spot" of enhanced long-range propagation. It's not for everybody, but it's fascinating.

Long Path and Skewed Path Propagation on the Lower Shortwave Frequencies, by Bill Tippett, W0ZV. The author shares some observations on working DX on the 80- and 160-meter amateur bands, including odd paths found during auroral and other disturbed conditions.

The Wave ("Beverage") Antenna, by Bob Eldridge, VE7BS. Beverage-full-wavelength or more-antennas are out of the question for many of us. But this is great writing, worth a look if you have any interest in antenna theory. As usual, there are some equipment reviews:

The Racal RA-17, by Bruce Portzer: The Icom IC-R71A: A 1991 Appraisal, by David Clark (I can't disagree with anything David says here); The Philips DC-777, by Terry Palmersheim and John Grimley; A First Look at the Fully Automated McKay-Dymek DR-333, by John Bryant. (How about...a radio with <u>no knobs</u>, designed to be run by your computer); The Icom R-9000: The Rolls Royce of Receivers or a Pentagon Toilet Seat?, by George Zeller; The JPS NIR-10, by Guy Atkins (Digital signal processing for shortwave): The Dymek FC-11 Fog Cutter, by John Bryant (a passive audio filter); DXing QRM: The Universal M-1000, by Chuck Yarbrough. Also, Guy Atkins discusses NRD-525 Upgrades and Modifications.

Now for a look at the ever-popular Features section

Shortwave Broadcasting in Bolivia, by Kevin Atkins. Too short, but beautifully written, and puts broadcasting in the unique social context of this bizarre and rather scary society.

International MW DXing from East Coast North America, by Jim Renfrew. Bob Colyard, four miles up the road, can hear this stuff. I can't, except when Castro bombs the Phillies on 1210 kHz.

An Interview with Hank Bennett, by Harold Cones. Mr. Bennett was Elmer One for a generation of DXers. Candid but occasionally bitter.

Shortwave Radio as a Teaching Tool, by Chuck Yarbrough. OK, Teach, get out your checkbook, send some money to the address I'm thoughtfully going to provide below, and dig what "Teach" Yarbrough hath accomplished from string, chewing gum, and the discretionary budget of a small college in North Carolina. I never really believed all those stories about how young Americans are geographical cretins--maybe it's because I memorized the globe when I was about 4, and don't really consider myself rocket science in action, so it's not that difficult, and I can't understand why someone wouldn't be fascinated by geography-but Chuck had kids in his classes, 10% of whom couldn't find Canada on a map, and a third of whom couldn't find Australia. And Wingate College isn't a linebacker factory, either, it's a real school...and a <u>better</u> one now. This article is great!

Shortwave Broadcasting in the 1980's: A Hobby Perspective, by Mitch Sams. This probably would have meant more to me if I had started, or at least resumed, shortwave listening before 1985. And, unfortunately, the normally relentless proofreading crew let a few typos get by here (in the obituary section, no less...). Still, veteran DXers and hobbyist types will no doubt find a lot of old friends in this chapter.

Shortwave Transmitter Locations, by F. T. Staff. Couldn't find this guy in the bios. Essentially, it's a list of geographical coordinates of transmitter sites, probably just the thing to help you, duhhh, fine tune your DXing hourglass if you keep copies of Clark and Bryant's propagational theories under your pillow.

Overall...this is the most readable **PROCEEDINGS** yet. There are fewer very long articles, fewer very short ones, and, unlike previous years, nothing that this *homme moyen technique* found indigestible. Is it the **best** yet, then? Hard to say ...they're all good. But I believe it stands a good chance of being the most popular and the most widely-circulated. If you've looked at earlier volumes in this series and said to yourself, "This looks really important and great, but it's just too much for where I am right now," there's a very good chance that you will, indeed, enjoy **PROCEEDINGS 1991** the way you thought you should have enjoyed its predecessors. And if you <u>did</u> like the last three, this one certainly won't let you down.





A relay agreement has been signed between Deutche Welle and Radio Moscow to use former jamming transmitters for relays to Asia. No start date was announced. [S. Galato via USEnet]

Radio Netherlands has reported a new 100 kW shortwave transmitter located just south of Moscow, using 9535 kHz. Estonian Radio was the only station in the Baltic area not closed or taken over by forces supporting the hardliners during the coup. As a result of the coup, Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev has fired the head of state broadcasting. Major changes are expected under the new head, Yegor Yakovlev. [SCDX 2139 via USEnet]




That's all till November -- hope you'll be around then, too!

SPEEDX UTILITY WORLD

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News and reports from the world of non-broadcast shortwave radioDeadline for articles and loggings the 12th of each month......

Well, for the most part the bands have been fairly good this past month. Expert propagationists are predicting one of the best DX seasons in recent memory this year, so we all have a lot to look forward to.

I'd like to start off by alerting all of you utes out there that President Bush has ordered the Strategic Air Command (SAC) to stand down from 24-hour alert status for the first time in over 30 years. This is great news, but it will probably mean a substantial cut in the number of SAC intercepts. I just wonder if we ever will hear a 'Skyking' call again?

I'd also like to amend my lead article last month. I assumed that everyone knew that all of your equipment should be well grounded. I didn't receive any dirty letters about it, but it was an unconscious omission.

This month my long promised article on the U.S. MARS Network begins. Once I started writing the story it grew into a twopart monograph! The second half of the article will follow next month--so if your membership is about to lapse, better renew NOW!

A U.S. MARS Primer

Most of you who have reported to this column have included lo ggings which have a callsign something like NNN0xxx or AAR0xxx. For many utility buffs, these calls are quite mysterious and are hard to identify. This month I will provide you with an introduction to the marvelous world of the United States Military Affiliate Radio System, or MARS.

The MARS network provides military personnel a low-cost, efficient means of communicating with 'back home' while they are on duty overseas. There are three different military branches with active MARS nets, the Army, Navy, and Air Force. These are indeed separate groups, but they all coordinate upon occasion.

Each service has its own methods and protocols, but they all exist to serve a similar purpose, to provide a channel through which U.S. servicemen (and women!) can communicate with the folks back home. There are two primary means of communication you are likely to hear on HF MARS nets. The first is the ever-popular TELEX. This is a printed message usually sent via RTTY or CW (less common) and is broadcast 'in the clear'. The other type of message is SSB voice, primarily through the use of phone patches. Both types of broadcasts are technically 'unclassified', but as an unauthorized party in the communication, you are expected to observe the non-disclosure rules found in the Communication Act of 1934 (the one that says you can listen, but you can't repeat it or use the info for personal gain).

I personally think that of all the radio intercepts I have lo gged over the years, I like MARS intercepts the best. They are certainly the most personal. During the recent Gulf War/Conflict I read at least a dozen proposals for marriage from troops in the Middle East to their girls and guys back home as well as hundreds of 'letters to mom'. When war is personalized to such an extent, you really get a feeling for what our troops went, and are going, through.

The Overall Arrangement

With the three-part division within the overall U.S. MARS network in mind, it is easy to recognize which station is affiliated with which military branch. Each service's callsign starts out with different letter combinations.

The U.S. Army MARS network station calls all start with the 'AAA' through the 'AEZ' letter prefixes. Generally, any callsign with an 'AAx' prefix is a domestic station (ie. AAT4USA=Ft. Gordon, Ga.). Calls which start with the 'ABx' prefix are mostly Asian stations, and 'AEx' calls are located in Europe. This three-letter prefix is followed by a 'region designator' number which locates that particular station. Most amateur radio operators are familiar with this type of designator, although the regions. The final three letters in an Army MARS callsign are the specific station identifiers.

The U.S. Navy MARS network station calls all start with 'NNN0'. According to Symington and Henault (Utility QSL Address Guide), the way to tell whether the station you have heard is an actual Navy ship/shore station or a civilian affiliate station is to look at the letter after the zero. If that letter is a 'C' then it is a shipboard station. If it is a 'M' then it is a Marine Corp station. If it is a 'N' then it could either be a shipboard or Navy shore station. Any other letter would indicate that it was an affiliate station.

The third service, the U.S. Air Force, has a large contingent of MARS affiliates worldwide. the callsigns from 'AFA' through 'ALA' denote this service. However, to date only the 'AFx' and the 'AGx' prefixes have been used. An 'AFx' series callsign denotes a civilian affiliate. This means that the station does not reside on a US Air Base. The 'AGx' series denotes a military-based MARS station. The best that most SWL/DXers can hope for is to log the 'AGx' stations, since I have not been able to locate addresses for the civilian stations. The three-letter prefix is followed by a region number, just like the other services. That is followed by either a single or double letter suffix which denotes the specific station. Often if the suffix appears to be an abbreviation for a state, that station is probably the state MARS coordinator.

What Next?

Next month I will conclude the MARS article by looking at some of the best frequencies and resources which are available to you. I will also examine the U.S. Air Force MARS system in a more detailed manner. If you have any additional information, or would like to read about a particular aspect of MARS, let me know.

Postal Service Changes APOs, FPOs

Mike Hardester reports in with information about a change in how the U.S. Postal Service handles military mail. An article in the *Camp Lejeune Globe* stated, "On 15 July [1991], ALL FPO and APO designations on mailing addresses changed. Many postal patrons received NEW zip codes. The address change will allow the U.S. Postal Service to use optical scanners to expedite mail sorting.

"Instead of FPO San Francisco + zip code OR FPO Seattle + zip code, the new designation for the PACIFIC will be FPO AP + zip code (the city being deleted).

AP + zip code (the city being deleted). "The U.S. Postal Service will continue to deliver mail with the old overseas military address for one year. Any overseas military mail without the new address and zip code AFTER 15 July 1992 will be returned to the sender."

After reading the article, Mike investigated a few questions he had about the new system (What is the designation for FPO New York and Miami? What designation(s) is(are) used for APO addresses on both coasts? Where can I obtain a copy of the new FPO/APO codes? Will ship FPO zip codes change or only the designation?). He checked with the base military postal unit, but found they knew little more than what was in the article. He did learn that "mobile units" using the FPO 966xx zip code won't change, however, the FPO standardization will be required.

He then found some updated info in the September issue of the "NCOA Journal" which stated that about 40 percent of all APO and FPO numbers will change because of the new system. A two-letter code, either AE (Europe), AP (the Pacific), or AA (Central/South America) will become standard parts of the last line of the address cards. City names after APO and FPO such as "New York" or "San Francisco" will no longer be used. For example, the last line of address for a letter destined for Germany will read 'APO AE 09XXX'.

"Though there is no guarantee, the 1992 Zip Code Directory should reflect changes to the military bases and ships overseas [look in the back of the directory]."

Mike promises to keep us informed as soon as he gets new info on the subject, but he wanted to let SPEEDXers who correspond with military stations overseas know of the changes.

Some 'Low-down' Mysteries

Al Underwood reports some strange CW calls being sent in the 1600-1800kHz frequency ranges. From his QTH in western New York state, all signals have been fairly weak and all were logged between 0000 and 0530 UTC over the past month or so.

Here are the callsigns and the frequencies of Al's loggings.

A Final DX Mystery--Solved?

In response to Robert Hall's appeal several months ago regarding those 75 baud, 850 shift RTTY signals, Peter Conway responds with his latest information. His sources tell him that many of these signals are possibly NATO forces and are 'Psuedo-random', so forget them!

This is certainly an interesting bit of info. I often have suspected that the 75/850 signals might have been a giant (and expensive!) shell game. I would be interested if anyone else has any info on these signals.

And How Much is the Postage?

I recently received a copy of the new and improved U.S. Postal Service publication, International Postal Rates andFees. While reading this might sound as interesting as watching grass grow, I have found it very useful in giving me the exact postage for every class of international mail from the United States. It also gives you a listing of all the international mail services the good old P.O. can provide you.

How much does it cost to send a letter to London via Registered Mail? This book tells you. What is the current rate for international post cards? Its in the book.

The best thing about the book? Its free from your local post office. Ask for Publication 51 (February 1991 Revision) at your post office. In many offices they will have the book in stock, but if they don't (as was the case for me) they can order it for you in a week or so.

All I know is that during the course of my DX career I have spent a fortune in unnecessary postage on envelopes destined for overseas. Never again!

A Review: Radioteletype Code Manual

Joerg Klingenfuss recently published the eleventh edition of his classic reference The Klingenfuss Radioteletype Code Manual. Upon a systematic comparison of his new book with the tenth edition, I can recommend this fine reference to all utility buffs.

While the bulk of the book is very similar to the earlier edition, Herr Klingenfuss has greatly expanded the section on modulation types to include a discussion of RTTY types with the aid of spectrum analyzer displays. This visual record makes the topic clearer, at least to your humble editor.

Klingenfuss also updates the terms and modes of emission "labels" to reflect current useage in the new edition. Instead of using the term 'Duplex ARQ System', he now uses the accepted term 'Multiplex ARQ-M System'.

Another improvement in the new edition, as with all of his current books, is that it is laser printed. This is a small point, but an improvement all the same.

What does this book do for you? For most utility buffs it will be too specialized for your needs. However, if you are interested in RTTY or CW, then this book is the best resource you can buy to explain the technical theory and application behind the various modes of emission. In fact, it is the ONLY book of its kind.

The discussion of the various alphabets is perhaps Klingenfuss' strongest point in the book. The eleventh edition is particularly notable because the vocabulary of Arabic words as printed on a Latin teleprinter has been expanded. This is an excellent resource when attempting to translate many of the signals originating in the Arab World.

In conclusion, this book is a specialty publication. If you are interested in learning about the nitty gritty of RTTY, this book is for you. If you are only interested in the common signals or in voice comms, you probably will be confused by the book. The topic is confusing, not the book itself.

I can wholehertedly recommend this book to serious RTTY monitors as the best and only resource of its kind.
