






7he Tevin


Minneapolis in 1870 was a thriving infant with growing pains. Compare this photo with the ones on the following pages depicting the city of today.

This hexagonal block tower of Fort Snelling was one of the important early landmarks of this early midwestern military reservation. The fort was built in 1819.




#### Cities THEN

American initiative has been the byword of the progress of this abundant land and the same spirit and foresight that established the destiny of this territory paves with promise the road that leads to the future.





The first bridge to span the upper regions of the "Father of Waters" was this suspension bridge from the village of St. Anthony to Minneapolis.














The Institute of Arts, one of Minneapolis' cultural centers One of the large flour mills located in Minneapolis



Campus of the University of Minnesota from the air One of the 371 churches of all faiths found in the city


