

The King of Smooth Jazz

When Kenny is not in the studio working out the details on a song, he is in the studio hoping the inspiration for the next one will find its way to him. "I wish I had a method for composing music. I don't. It would be great if a melody would just pop in my head while I'm asleep. It doesn't happen that way for me. If it did, I would spend more time in bed," Instead, Kenny will spend days, weeks or whatever it takes for the origins of a song to take form. He says that is the meaning behind the title "The Moment." It is about that moment when inspiration strikes. He writes alone almost exclusively. He initially composes his music on keyboards rather than his horn. If there is some writing collaboration it is usually with his close friend, award winning producer Walter Afanasieff. On the new CD, Walter does lend a hand on some of the tracks but there are two notable collaborative exceptions. He wanted to write a song for Toni Braxton to sing. He had an idea of what it should sound like musically, but for the lyrics he called Babyface. Kenny and Babyface already had a great mutual admiration. As it turns out, they also developed a creative and productive working relationship. On the song "That Somebody Was You," sung by Braxton, the writing and production credits are shared by Babyface and Kenny. The two also decided to record a duet for the album entitled "Every Time I Close My Eyes" in which Kenny and Babyface trade-off leads.

Renny feels this is his most cohesive album to date. The music all works well together even though he incorporated a multitude of textures. There is a song with a Latin rhythm and one with a 1950's sort of Cannonball Adderley feel. They are all unmistakably Kenny. For the first time in his career, the title of the album is also the title of one of the songs. Not unlike his other pro-

jects, his wife Lyndie was the one to make the decision for the album's name. For the record, she was also the inspiration for his first hit recording, "Songbird."

In the studio he is very passionate and reverent about making music. When he walks out of his studio, he walks out of the music business. He doesn't spend a lot, of time listening to other music or following the industry. He doesn't hang-out in nightclubs checking out bands. He chooses instead to shift his passions for a more rounded perspective on life. He is an accomplished pilot, skier and golfer. His lat-* est obsession is a float plane docked on the lake in front of his home in the Seattle area. He has had the plane for a couple of months and flies it almost every day. On the day we talked to him he was about to go exploring in it. He wanted to scout out some areas that he could later fly to with Lyndie and his three-year-old son Max. His family is of utmost importance to him. You can hear him smile when he talks about them. Although he recognizes a significant distinction between the inside and outside of his studio door, his son does not yet

know that separation. Max is free to walk into the studio any time he wants, which is fine with Kenny. Kenny said he doesn't want Max to grow up viewing dad's work as competition for time and attention.

The immediate future for Kenny will involve extensive touring in support of "The Moment." He loves performing live. But, like his recording regimen, his live performance schedule will be on his terms. Everyone in his band is a dad and they build plenty of breaks into the agenda to accommodate adequate play time. In the not-so immediate future, Kenny says he would like to record a follow-up to his 1994 holiday release, "Miracles." He said there are a number of classics he still wants to record and would like to try his hand at writing some more seasonal originals as well. At this point he is shooting for completion next year about this time.

To give some perspective on Kenny G's enigmatic success, consider this: He is the best selling instrumentalist of all time. Every album he has released has at least reached platinum sales status. He is currently ranked number twenty-five in terms of overall recording sales. Thus far, "Miracles" has sold seven million copies, already making it the best selling holiday album of all time. He blows the whole nice guy finishing last bit. Let the other kids make fun. He is laughing all the way to the bank. He laughs, or at least smiles, on his way to a lot of places. He is happy that he gets to do what he loves for a living. His music makes people feel good. That is his measure of success.

Dave Koz Off The Beaten Path

Dave's previous release, "Lucky Man" was enormously successful. The easy thing he could have done was to use it as a blueprint for a follow-up. Instead, he took a different


path. "Off The Beaten Path" is a stylistic departure for the saxophonist. It is less produced, more organic and texturally more diverse with such backing instruments as the mondolin and accordion. The profound contrast in atmosphere found on the new album paradoxically reinforces his identifiable signature as an artist. In this more strippedback acoustic setting, Dave's superlative sense of melody is even more defined than on his previous projects. Koz distinguishes himself as an artist with a unique sound who, at the same time, is not afraid to re-invent himself and evolve.



Peter White Caravan Of Dreams

"Caravan Of Dreams" is the name of a nightclub where Peter White performed in Fort Worth Texas. The guitarist was inspired to write a song during his stay there and

nomed it after the club. That title became apropos to the underlying theme of the entire album. "I wrote many of these songs in hotel rooms or while moving from place to place, and it seemed natural for there to be references to driving or thinking about heading home after a long trip. To me, the journey's an allegory to life. The joy isn't found in reaching your destination, but in enjoying the little stops along the way." This is great traveling music.



David Sanborn Songs From The Night Before

David Sanborn always brings a level of sophistication to his projects: "Songs From The Night Before" is no exception. For three decades the saxophonist has been defining what

we now call Smooth Jazz. His was one of the first to take down the walls between jazz, R&B, funk and blues and create a sound that included influences from all of those genres. On this new album his experience and depth as a musician illuminates. Whether you like your jazz smooth or a little chunky, this CD has both and it is packed with emotion.

We have found that trying to categorize music, more often than not, is futile. The second you use the word jazz, the Jazz Police will cite you for violations of tradition. Forget about trying to describe instrumental music that is not jazz based. A lot of the music that you hear on The Wave is comprised of different influences and therefore hard to denominate. When describing the music of Toni Braxton however, we feel we are not stretching or diluting enyone's definition by calling it simply Soul Music.



If Toni Braxton hasn't felt it, she doesn't sing about it. Her music is dripping with soul—her soul. Her songs convey heartache and the resolve to survive it. She says "The things I sing about, women can identify with. Although they're sad love songs, I always try to portray it like everything's going to be O.K.; I'm still strong." She adds that most of the things she sings or writes about are based on something she has personally gone through or, in some cases. literal accounts of events in her life.

The story became the inspiration for the title of her latest CD, "Secrets." The title grew out of one of the songs on the album, "Talking In His Sleep." She says it is about someone who uttered a bit of incriminating information in his sleep. "The song is about a guy who does that and starts talking about his other lover. It's based on a true story, and I remembered every line he said in his sleep! He didn't know that I'd heard him so I had my own little secret...and that's where we got the idea for the title of the album. I have secrets just like everybody else..."

• ne of Toni Braxton's first hits was "Best Friend," an autobiographical bad boyfriend exposé. When she was in college her then best friend took up with her then boyfriend. Braxton says, "After I released the song, I heard through acquaintances that this exboyfriend wanted publishing rights." He may be on to something. Some of her best material deals with triumph over adversity and he did give her some misery with which to work.

Strength may be one of Toni's most defining characteristics. She measures all of 5 feet, 2 inches. She is very trim and lithe but on stage and screen she seems much more statuesque. Her charisma is all-consuming. At a recent concert at The Universal Amphitheater, Toni summoned about a dozen — very willing — men from the audience to join her on stage. Some of them may have been twice her size but not one dared dance out of the position in which she placed them. She paced back and forth just like a lion trainer as she sang. She did not need the whip and chair. She was in control.

She is also very much in control of her career. Toni's self-discipline can be credited to her upbringing. She grew-up the eldest of six children in Severn, Maryland. Her Father, a minister, and her mother; an amateur opera singer, were strict with their kids. There was a time when she could not wear makeup, nail polish, sandals or even pants. She still looks back on her first pair of Levi's with fondness. As a minister, her father and her family went through, as she put it, "Everything from being Jehovah's Witnesses to being United Methodists." During her formative grade school years it was the Apostolic Church. The faith advises it's members to shun popular culture of any sort, including Disney movies. She did manage to sneak in a couple of Saturday morning episodes of "Soul Train" on TV. "I pretty much

missed the '70's,'' says Braxton but adds "When I think about it. I had a great childhood. We were extremely close." These days her father prays for her albums to climb the charts.

It was in church that she and her sisters found their love for singing. It was at a gas station that her talent was discovered. Bill Pettaway, a then aspiring songwriter heard her singing one day while they were both filling their respective tanks. Impressed, he helped her make some contacts that resulted in Arista Records signing her and her sisters to a group contract in 1990. The Braxton's first single flopped but her voice caught the attention of producers Babyface and Antonio "L.A." Reid who were forming LaFace Records at the time. Braxton was asked to record a demo of a song Babyface had written for Anita Baker. "But Anita was pregnant and didn't

want to go into the studio," says Braxton. "So she Contlaned on page


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

called Babyface and said, 'Why not let the girl on the tape do it? She sounds great." That song, "Love Shoulda Brought You Home," was a hit off the soundtrack for the Eddie Murphy movie "Boomerang." Braxton thanks Anita Baker to this day for that opportunity.

Like Anita Baker, Toni Braxton has an incredibly deep and sultry voice. As a teenager, she discovered her voice was often too low to sing the songs she would hear on the radio. She ended up modeling her voice after male singers such as Luther Vandross and Michael McDonald. She says, "I don't record until late at night — around ten or so because you haven't heard deep until you've heard me at 6:00 a.m. You'd swear I was a man." Certainly not a mistake you could make by looking at her.

It is hard not to focus on her looks. She is striking. The closely cropped hair style that was her early





trademark was responsible for launching a trend at the time. The look was, for her, the result of an overheated curling iron burning off a chunk of her hair. She cut it off to even things up. About the time of her second album's release, Toni was sporting a long weave, having been the victim of a home dye job. "My hairdresser told me not to do it, but I was bored, and of course my hair all fell out. in the sink," recalls Braxton. "This business is hard on a black woman and her hair." It seems she's back to short hair again — for now.

The business has taken its toll on more than just her hair. She has had her bouts of insomnia over the pressures of stardom. "I can't seem to turn it off. Working breaks you down. I don't want to start aging because of that." True to form, she deals with it head-on. "I've been to sleep-disorder clinics," she adds. "There will be no bags under my eyes for a photo shoot."

She is mesmerizing on video and acting is something she wants to pursue. Babyface is confident about her future: "She's gonna be a much bigger star than she already is... someone who's going to be around for a long time." Toni has come a long way since winning her best new artist Grammy in 1994. The place she has never strayed from is her own inner truth. The lady's got soul.







Various Artists A Twist Of Jobim

As a guitarist, Lee Ritenour is a music business veteran. Now with the launch of the record label he is co-founding, "i.e. music." he is in the business of music. The label's first release is a who's who of Smooth Jazz and R&B

artists paying tribute to Brazil's most heralded composer, Antonio Carlos Jobim. Ritenour says, "With 'A Twist Of Jobim' we have brought together a great ensemble of jazz and pop artists to pay homage to the songs and the composer. I believe we have taken a fresh and respectful approach that is proof positive that Jobim is a composer for all generations who will stand the test of time in the tradition of Gershwin, Ellington and Berlin." Ritenour is not showing the telltale signs of becoming a big-time record executive cliché vet. He produced and played on the proiect and had no time to "do lunch."



3rd Force Vital Force

3rd Force is all about the future. This is the band's third album and with each release they break new ground. Producer and band leader William Aura explores creative synergys on "Vital Force." Techno-grooves meet

ethnic influences in a pro-active approach to the evolution of modern music. Also woven into the mix this time around are Wave artists Rick Braun, Craig Chaquico and Peter White. The music is playful, it has momentum and most of all, it is innovative.



Zachary Breaux Uptown Groove

It is hard to accept that "Uptown Groove" is Zachary Breaux's final album. It is, nonetheless, a wonderful testament to the soul we lost this past February. His unique guitar signature is the result of his life experi-

ences. The tone reflects his Southern roots combined with his migration to New York creating a sort of jazz and blues gumbo. If the music were not haunting enough, the last track on the CD entitled "I Love This Life" takes on special meaning. It is a background groove with Zachary and one of his childhood idols, guitarist Ted Dunbar, candidly talking with one another at the end of the recording session. That is the way he chose to end his album, graciously paying respect to someone who helped him.

very once in a while a record company comes along that defines and helps establish a sound. Years ago, people bought CTI records without even knowing the artist, simply because of the label's impecable repu-

tation for a certain genre of "Jazz." The same can be said

for the early days of Windham Hill. Now, we are seeing another such label emerge. The genre this time is Acid lazz, and the label is Instinct Records. It began in 1988 in the New York apartment of lared Hoffman when he decided the corporate life on Wall Street was no longer tolerable. He became aware of a new sound coming from London. Europe, and in particular the UK, has always had a knack for capturing the best ideas in American music and re-inventing them with a unique twist. In that tradition, London gave birth to a new


> generation of musicians who worshipped the legends of American Jazz as much as they loved the masters of American Soul and R&B. To these young musicians, there were no rules, there was no reason not to mix Jazz, Soul, Funk, Blues and




he passing of guitarist Zachary Breaux in February was devastating to all who knew him. Breaux died of a heart attack after attempting to rescue an






