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

ALL ROADS LEAD TO CERRITOS

funny thing happened in Dairy Valley. The former cow town found itself, no longer in the boondocks, but rather the site of one of the most sophisticated performing arts centers in the world. It happened almost overnight.

Teresteen and the second secon cows helped spur things along, or it may have had something to do with the old real estate adage: "location, location, location." Smack-dab on the border of Orange and Los Angeles counties, in Southern California's geographic nucleus, Dairy Valley was re-named Cerritos in 1967. Cerritos is located 23 miles southeast of downtown Los Angeles and 25 miles northeast of central Orange County. It seemed like a reasonable place for a car dealership. By the 1980's it had become the center of the car-dealing universe. (You probably can sing the directions to the auto square from their commercials: Take six-oh-five to South Street...) It is home to the world's largest auto mall, which generates a nice pile of sales tax revenue for the city - as do a great many other businesses that now call Cerritos home. From those city coffers grew a world-class performing arts center.

The Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts is a state-of-the-art facility designed to adapt to the performance. Need a theater in the round? Cabaret? How about a different ceiling configuration? No problem. The theater can be transformed from show to show. The United States Institute of Theater Technology called it the most sophisticated project they have ever seen in terms of archi-³ tecture, technology and urban design. Charles, the Prince of Wales, caught a command performance by the Royal Shakespeare Company there once: It is that kind of venue.

Tt is also the theater we chose to host our fall series of Smooth Jazz concerts. On October 24th we present Ramsey Lewis with special guest Grant Geissman. Halloween night, it is Bobby Caldwell and his Big Band. On November 7th, Rick Braun and Everette Harp will be on the marquee.

IFE amsey Lewis' career predates both the City of Cerritos as well as the City of Dairy Valley. (Which was incorporated in 1956) Back then, the "in crowd" there were still primarily bovines. Ramsey's breakthrough top-five single, "The In Crowd" was released in 1965, a full decade after forming his famous jazz trio. He has been a regular on the jazz charts ever since. As broadcasters, we can also claim Ramsey as one of ours: For the past two years he has been the morning on-air host at WNUA-FM in his hometown, Chicago. (He's the Paul Crosswhite of the Windy City, if you will.) We would not be overstating adjectives by saying that Ramsey is a living legend who helped put the "smooth" in jazz.

The title of Grant Geissman's latest CD, "In With The Out Crowd," pays homage to the Ramsey Lewis signature song, "The In Crowd." If for that reason alone, we thought the pairing of the two artists would be perfect. Grant is also a guy who has been around long enough to know what retro sounded like the first time. That was his searing guitar solo on the Chuck Mangione classic "Feels So Good." He is an old-school guitarist with his sound firmly planted in the next millennium. You won't want to be left out of the in crowd gathered in Cerritos on October 24th.

Then the Cerritos Center opened its doors in 1993, they wanted their inaugural act to have as much impact as possible. They wisely chose Frank Sinatra. Our second show in the fall series is Bobby Caldwell and his Big

Band. The comparisons between Caldwell and Sinatra come pretty readily. It is not just the suit and the swagger. Bobby truly embodies the tradition of the great vocalists of the big band era. He even records in the legendary Capitol Studio A, where Sinatra created many of his hits, preferring to sing "live," (with no overdubs) surrounded by a full orchestra. There is also that powerful voice. Bobby has the kind of voice that can be put in front of an 18-piece orchestra-and win. On October 31st he'll be performing a stylish collection of 40's and 50's standards as well as new arrangements on his own contemporary classics such as "What You Won't Do For Love," It will definitely be a Halloween treat.

1 SO SO 35 not only saw the opening of the Cerritos Center; it was the year Rick Braun released his debut solo album. It is amazing to see how his career has taken off in that short period of time. He almost singlehandedly re-introduced the trumpet as a primary instrument in contemporary jazz. Prior to his arrival, the trumpet had been slipping out of voque in contemporary circles. It was largely regarded as instrument for more traditional jazz players. He reminded us all how hip and seductive that piece of brass can sound. Before his solo career, Rick toured with such highenergy acts as Rod Stewart and Tina Turner. His own stage presence reflects some of that dynamism. On November 7th, don't expect a polite little trumpet recital. The heat emanating from the stage will put the high-tech air conditioning system at the Cerritos Center to the test.



verette Harp has been known to steam-up a room or two himself. When the saxophonist toured with Anita Baker, she would always make a point of letting him solo during the show. Without fail, his solos would cause grown women to scream like teenagers. He's a passionate player who fuses elements of R&B, Soul and Gospel into one powerful live performance. Check your inhibitions in at the door.

Smooth Jazz on the radio, experiencing it live is a whole other level. We think the Cerritos Center is a great place to encounter a performance. They even have free parking: How many of the world's top theaters can boast that? If you have not yet seen a show at the Cerritos Center, this series provides a great opportunity. If you're waiting for the cows to come home, that's not likely to happen – at least not in Cerritos.

ONE NIGHT'S BALCONY IS ANOTHER NIGHT'S STAGE

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The Cerritos Center is the most flexible theater in the world. The foremost experts in the field of theater design teamed up to create a facility like no other. The result was an innovative concept: one theater space that could be rearranged into six different theaters by way of moveable components.

Inside the 6,000-square-foot auditorium, are the basic elements required for a theater: a stage, floor, ceiling and seats. But this is where any similarities to other theaters end. The Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts is a designer's dream, where all the pieces can be rearranged to create a number of different configurations. While balcony seating remains fixed, floor seating is adjustable on wagons with air casters, enabling them to be raised, lowered or even removed. The stage can be transformed into various sizes either manually or by electronic controls. The towers, which hold the Center's distinctive box seating, are also equipped with air casters and can be

angled to face the stage in any one of a number of positions. One of these towers is the 3,000,000-pound rear tower, which holds the boxes located behind the stage. This massive seating tower can be pushed out for In-the-Round and Concert seating, or hidden behind the stage for the Lyric configuration.

The Cerritos Center's movable components are not just limited to items that can be shifted on the floor. Three ceiling panels hovering overhead can be deployed to create the appropriate acoustical environment. This is accomplished by use of a 27.000 pound ceiling panel called the "flipper" that adjusts to various positions.

Surprisingly, as massive as these pieces are, the Cerritos team is able to move from one seating configuration to another in eight hours or less. The six basic configurations (Arena, In-The-Round, Lyric, Cabaret, Concert and Orama), enable the Center to provide the ideal theater setting, audience sight lines, and sound quality for each performance. This offers audiences a new experience with every visit.



"That sounds great, but let's go to Sonoma instead - I have friends who live there," replied Shirin.


"sonoma! Is that in the wine country?"

he main route, that connects the historic downtown Sonoma Plaza with the over thirty wineries located in the valley proper, is a simple two-lane country highway. 

■ ne of Sonoma's greatest attributes is its abundance of small family farms that produce a comucopia of local specialties, from organic produce and lavender, to award winning jack and goat cheeses and olive oil. Their Vineyard Tram Tour is the only one of its kind. The tour features grape growing exhibits, a comparative tasting in the vineyard, very knowledgeable and entertaining tour guides and some of the most captivating vistas in the valley.

The entire winery is open to the public. Visitors are encouraged to browse the grounds, which include the original home built in 1873, the winemaking artifacts garden, peacock aviary, wine shop and tasting room. You can also stroll through their Imagery Collection Art Gallery; home to the original works of art which grace the labels of their Imagery wines.



Saxophonist Richard Elliot and his tour manager co-own PacificNet, one of the largest Internet providers in Southern California.



Kenny's uncle and father were two of the others. Schultz, being a coffee purist, was initially against the notion of serving a cold, blended java drink. We can thank Lyndie G, Kenny's wife, for helping to convince Schultz that a frosty drink would be a good idea and thus, the Frappuccino was born. The chilled concoction has proven to be quite refreshing to Starbucks' stockholders. Though coffee has been very good to Kenny financially, he decided that he wouldn't want to profit from the use of Louis Armstrong's voice on his virtual duet performance of "What a Wonderful World." Proceeds from the recording, which appears on Kenny's latest CD, "Classics in the Key of G," go into music education via the newly formed Kenny G Miracles Foundation. He is doing more than just writing checks for the cause. Kenny explains: "As I go city to city for my tour, I'm going to visit the schools. I will bring new instruments to the schools. I'll come and play a couple of notes. If there's a school where they need a music teacher, maybe we'll pay the salary that year."

"Summertime" was among the classic songs Kenny G included on "Classics In The Key Of G." Kenny was not the first to take a go at the tune. The song has been recorded more than a thousand times already. "Misty" was another of the standards recorded – but rejected – for Kenny's project. For those of us in radio, it is just as well: Ever since the movie "Play Misty for Me," the song gives us the heebie-jeebies.





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

The fans were ecstatic to hear a new Norman Brown CD. but no one was more excited than Norman Brown. For the past three years the qui-

tarist found himself caught in the riptide of the record industry. He was warming the bench while his contract was being passed around an office somewhere. When the red tape was finally unstuck this year, and Warner Brothers was able to claim him as one of theirs. Norman was ready to go. He called the album "Celebration" because that's the kind of mood he's in. He even busts out some vocals on this CD - and you know something, Norman can sing!

ARTIST DAVE KOZ THE DANCE LABEL CAPITOL

Dave Koz began the decade, and his solo career, with two highly successful CD's. He chose not to allow that success to interfere with his creativity. In 1996 he released the aptly titled, and decidedly more organic, "Off The Beaten Path." It was a bold move.



Taking such a complete artistic departure not only served to validate his earlier achievements, but also his depth as an artist. As we near the end of the

decade, Koz's latest release ties things together. "The Dance" is a refinement that combines his earlier, more funky sound, his mid-decade experimentation with acoustics, and a whole new level of lush production.

ARTIST KENNY G

CLASSICS IN THE KEY OF G LABEL ARISTA

TEBecause the album consists of standards, it represents all new ground for saxophonist Kenny G. The process was also different from the way Kenny normally makes records. In the past,

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
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
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
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
