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album, on the spine of the CD case, it says: "SADE (SHAR-DAY)-DIAMOND LIFE," You would be hard pressed to find another CD in the record store with an artist pronunciation guide in such a conspicuous place. So, it is a reasonable question to ask why we pronounce Sade's name without the "r" when we play her music on The Wave. We pronounce her name the way that she pronounces her name: more like "shaw-day." You can confirm the pronunciation yourself. She wrote her name into the song "Maureen" on the album "Promise." There is a lyric that goes: "Maureen, Maureen, remember when my mother said to me, Sade don't you come home too late ... " No "r." Our only explanation for the confusion falls in the difference between an English and an American accent. "Diamond Life" was originally released in the UK in 1984 before it was released in the US. With your best fake English accent, try to say the word "tar-ko." It kind of sounds like you're saying


wasn't his only motivation to play the saxophone. Kirk's uncle, Hugh "Peanuts" Whalum, was a wellknown saxophonist in St. Louis. "Peanuts" Whalum is 72 years old and still plays nightly in St. Louis. Nephew Kirk just produced an album for him tentatively called "The Peanuts Project." He's shopping it around to record labels right now. When we asked Kirk why they call his uncle "Peanuts," he said, "I don't know, it goes way back, but he is five-foot-three...that may have something to do with it."

KEN BURNS JAZZ

In the filmmaker who brought us the award-winning PBS documentaries on the Civil War and Baseball, is now taking on the most American of art forms: jazz. The tenepisode series celebrates jazz from its origins in blues and ragtime through swing, bebop and fusion. The documentary has inspired everything from a coffee table companion book to an unprecedented collaboration by two major record labels: Columbia/Legacy and the Verve Music Group. They have put out a five-CD box set and 22 individual jazz artist CDs with cross-label content. In all, over 400 selections were chosen and some of the top jazz scholars and writers were commissioned for the CD liner notes.



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


LUTHER VANDROS Luther Vandross has signed to a new record label again. His marriage to Virgin Records was short-lived and only produced one album: "I Know" in 1998. Vandross is the first high-profile act to sign with Clive Davis' new label, J Records. Last vear Clive Davis, one of the biggest record executive big-wigs, you may remember, was squeezed out of Arista Records, the hugely successful label he founded. Luther, meanwhile, was busy losing weight. "I lost 114 pounds," Vandross says, "People speculated as to whether I'm sick or dead. There was a rumor that I was dead! A real live rumor!" Vandross, whose weight has yo-yoed over the years, says, "I defy you to listen to any of my records and tell me if I was heavy or thin when I recorded it." We are happy to report that the rumors of the demise of both Davis and Vandross were, in fact, premature.

peaking of resurrections and record labels, it appears the JVC Records catalog is on its way (back) to a record store near you. Samson Records has licensed the rights to the label, which released albums by Special EFX, Paul Hardcastle and Chielli Minucci, among others. The albums have been out of print since the label closed its American operation in 1998.

"Dream A Little" is on the newly formed HDH record label. The initials stand for the songwriting trio of Brian Holland, Lamont Dozier and Eddie Holland, who were responsible for some of Motown's biggest hits. Eddie Holland must feel particularly good about signing Ronny Laws to the label. Laws says that 25 years ago, Eddie Holland was one of the first record people he met with when he moved here. Ultimately, Holland took a pass on signing Laws to Motown and Laws signed, instead, to Blue Note Records. His debut album "Pressure Sensitive," spurred by the hit "Always There," became

one of the biggest selling debut albums in the history of the label. Laws says, "Eddie was telling me a few years later that he hated hearing 'Always There' on the radio - it haunted him, because he was just that close to signing me. It's one of those typical stories in the record business - it's all about timing and foresight." Incidentally, part of Ronnie Laws' deal with the Holland-Dozier Group gives him the capacity to build his own production company, which means he can sign artists that he may be interested in - or not.

sor for the Montreaux Jazz festival, they did more than park one of their cars in front of the venue. They built the first-ever fuel injected jazz instrument. The "Jazz Obsessed Aurora" is a car that emits the sounds of instruments ranging from wailing saxophones to jazz guitars. When you open the door, you get the sound of applause. The horn is wired to sound like a trumpet squeal. Press the hazard button and you hear a cymbal crash. The button next to it delivers a Kurt Elling "Ouch, don't touch that one" vocal. Turn signal: congas. In fact, almost every function of the car triggers some kind of sound. It seems like it would be pretty hard to appreciate the music coming out of your radio in that thing.

sade

I hope more mature. I'd like to think that something happens that's good as you get older (laugh.) I'd like to think that I feel a bit more solid...I don't know if that's 'cause I'm a mother and as a mother you have to be solid, you have no choice – and maybe that is reflected in the album. I don't know where it comes from but I feel I've grown up.

paul

Is raising your little girl IIa something that takes up virtually all your time when you're not in the studio?

sade

Yeah. All the time. She's quite demanding and passionate, you know, and she doesn't rest for a moment and so I don't either...

paul

Keeps you busy ...

s a d e

... I love it. I love that, and I think that's the best thing you can do, really. I mean, I love my work, and I love that I've had the opportunity to do it and go back in the studio. But she's really my priority.

paul

How did you put "Lovers Rock" together? What cities were you in as you did that, and how long did it take?

sade

It happened over a period of a year and we were in the studio for about six months, writing and recording as we went. We started out in London, in Andrew's studio – Andrew Hale, the keyboard player. Then we went to Spain for a while – up into the hills in Spain – and sort of cut ourselves off for a while, and started out. Then we ended up in the countryside in England...sort of woody, kind of lovely, deep English countryside. It was nice. I like it when the scenery around us changes a bit, as we go along and develop the album.

paul

Do you find that the woodsy environment brings out the best of you in terms of creation of music?

sade

I just like to be cut-off, you know. I like to be cut-off from reality a bit ... to sort of dig down and get stuff out of me. I find it hard if I'm in my normal environment. That's why "Lovers Rock" is slightly different. In the past I've just sort of cut-off completely, and obviously I couldn't this time 'cause of IIa. I had to have short periods in the studio and then short periods out. But all the time I was there, I was able to just switch off from the stuff going on around and just get into it.

paul

On this theme of Sade being kind of cut-off sometimes from the outside world, you've spoken out in the past saying that you are not reclusive or shy. But for all those adoring fans who nonetheless wish that you were more visible day-to-day...

... give us an idea of what your personality is like. Are you the more serious type, as some might think, or do you laugh a lot, joke a lot?

sade

I'm everything. I'm sort of all those things. I'm shy. I'm shy and I'm confident. It just depends on how I feel at the time and what's going on in my life. I'm funny, generally. Maybe I'm not funny today (laughter)... but I love humor. Humor is one of the most important things to me and laughing is an essential ingredient in my daily life. You know, I think most people don't function on one level and I'm kind of complex in that way. I've got... different feelings and emotions inside of me. Just like most people, I suppose.

paul


Speaking of emotions, tell us about the feelings that went into your first single from the new CD, "By Your Side".

"By Your Side" came about almost from the ether. It suddenly appeared... one of the first songs that came together when we were in Spain. Just arrived, got off the plane, went into the studio and started to sing. It was quite magical. So, it came about very naturally and, in a way, the sound of it sort of preempted the rest of the album, gave the flavor for the rest of the album. We kept its sort of crudeness and rootsiness. It's unpretentious and simple and it's just how it was and we just let it be, you know.

paul

I'd like to get your sense of some of the other songs. "King of Sorrow," tell me about that.

"King of Sorrow" is about feeling like the ultimately sad person, I suppose. When you feel moments where you've got something heavy weighing on your shoulders and something happens that's changed your life, but everything goes on around you the same... and you have to continue. And, in a way it's the continuing that brings you through it. But the song is about being crowned, like the one who's the Royal Regal Sad One... (laugh).



paul

And I would imagine that the "Sweetest Gift" explores the opposite end of the emotional range?

"Sweetest Gift" is about children and especially about IIa. About the light that children carry and that the best things you get given in life are things that don't necessarily come from the material world. That's what that song's about.

So, that's one way in which your motherhood is touching your music now.

Mmmm, yeah.

paul

You also have a song called "Slave Song."

Yeah, the idea is sort of becoming victorious over your history, and so I think it's an uplifting song and a positive song. It's about becoming wise and rising above the stigma of having been a slave and not becoming a parody of what's expected of you, but rising above it and being wise and riding off into the sunset and being victorious through being proud.

paul

As a woman of both African and English origin, do you give much thought to any of the current political conflicts around the world, which so often seem to divide people along ethnic or racial lines?

Yeah, it's sad, but it's sort of a human thing. You know, I come from Nigeria where there's real tribalism and casts and classes and racism within our people. It's as if it's an inherent part of human nature and it's a shame. So, I'm conscious of it, and it's one of the things that I least love about people – that you can divide people in that way. There's no such thing as a bad race or a good race, you know. People are either good or bad in degrees, each and every one of us. And so, I abhor racism personally, and I'm a product of two people – one black, one white – who loved each other.

Amen. Now, Sade, you're known for the immaculateness of your music and for the high quality that you put into every single project. And, like so many great artists, you make it look so easy. Is it easy for you to create the music and to perform it?

No, it's not easy to create it. Certain things come so easily...it seems unfair. Like, 'how could this just have come to me like this?' And then other things, I have to sort of fight for and work on and dig deep for. So, it's both things. Some of it I really earn – I'm not talking about money – I feel like, 'I bled for this one.' And other times it just comes... like an anointment: There it just is.

paul

No two songs quite the same then, huh?

No. Even within a song. One part of a song can come about within seconds and then you're struggling to make it work as a complete item.

paul

Indeed. Now, are you aware of the tantalizing mystique that's come to surround you? How you are seen as a mystery woman to so many people who just can't wait to find out more about you?

.

Yeah, in a way. I guess it's 'cause I've never done a Pepsi ad or anything (laughs.) I don't know, I don't think I'm so distanced, but I don't go to the parties to be seen, and I don't go to celebrity places. I live my life pretty much as I did before our success and before I became famous, so I think that's why, really.

What's a typical day like for you? If you're not in the studio at the time, what's normal living like for Sade?

-

I've got a very colorful life (laughs) I can tell you. It's sometimes shocking, you know, some of the things that happen in my life. I always have adventure in my life. My days are never quiet or dull. There's always something happening in my life.

Any hobbies?

I don't have any time for hobbles. I'm too busy trying to get through the day. Ideally, I would've loved to have been a gardener, if I hadn't been a singer. I'd love to have been out there digging in the dirt. I really love planting stuff and growing stuff...

Also, on a personal note, a lot of people don't know that your full name is Helen Folasade Adu. The band takes its name from your own nickname. What do your buddies call you?

"Shod." (Laughs) If they're feeling friendly, they call me "Shod." I get called all kinds of things (more laughter,) but ... yeah, "Shod" is the affectionate term that everybody uses with me. And some people call me "Sad Day" (laugh). But mainly "Shod."


I think this may be the most important question for your fans, Sade: Tell us about your plans to tour in support of "Lovers Rock." Will you sing in LA for us?


Oh yeah, definitely. I've really had good experiences singing in LA, actually.


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

In addition to the academy, an after school enrichment program is offered providing students with instruction in the entertainment arts taught by industry professionals.

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
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



BABY FACE Meet the Freshest Face in Smooth Jazz

Entertainment Weekly magazine's annual power ranking of industry heavyweights places Kenneth "Babyface" Edmonds' name ahead of record company executives from Warner Brothers, Elektra, Atlantic, A&M, Geffen and even fellow artist-turned-media-mogul Madonna.

■ is a songwriter, performer, record producer, record company executive, film producer and, as of about six months ago, a dad, Babyface may still be blessed by a youthful appearance but the name is starting to take on more of an incongruous twist for this 38 year old music magnate. Babyface is all grown up now.

Behind the scenes, as a songwriter, producer, and/or arranger, Babyface has helped shape more than one hundred top-ten singles. As a recording artist he has become a collector of awards. The unprecedented string of landmark hits has been staggering. Aside from the numbers, what really sets Babyface apart from the rest of the world of pop music is his level of quality. He is raising the bar of musical integrity on the charts. He is proving that classic songwriting and melody are more important than hype.

To sum up his work in a word;

he is eloquent. Important fall his accomplishments, Babyface holds songwriting as his most important. In a recent Los Angeles Times interview he said: "At the end of the day, my goal isn't to be remembered as a record producer who had tons and tons of hits, but as a songwriter. That is what pushes me to keep going... Trying to write songs that not only work today, but that people will always listen to... the way they do songs by Stevie Wonder or the Beatles." When asked if he thinks melodies are more important than lyrics, he replied: "Yes. The emotion of a song is found more in the melody than the words. You can only write "I love you" one way, but the music and the voice can add a million inflections. That's why we can write love songs forever and still find new ways to express it."

Dion, Aretha Franklin, Whitney Houston, Aretha Franklin, Whitney Houston and Madonna are just some of the artists who have expressed love in a song written by Babyface. "End Of The Road," which he penned and produced for Boyz II Men, became one of the best selling singles of all time. Boyz II Men's next single, "I'll Make Love To You," which he also wrote and produced, shattered their own record. Toni Braxton, signed to the LaFace



record label he co-founded, reached number one with her debut album. Another number one worth mention was the soundtrack to the motion picture "Waiting

To Exhale." Babyface wrote or cowrote 15 of the album's 16 songs, and produced the entire set, crafting personalized arrangements for an allfemale vocal cast of superstars. Newsweek wrote: "Babyface may be the most successful songwriter and producer in pop... It seems everybody wants a piece of his broken heart."

Williams singing in the Broadway

musical "Kiss Of The Spider Woman" he persuaded her to bring some of her mysterious "Aurora" character with her into the recording studio. On the songs he wrote and produced for her album "The Sweetest Days" he had her sing in the lower range she used on stage when in character, as opposed to the mid-range pop style in which she was accustomed. In doing so, he brought Vanessa into a new light as a singer. "He's genuinely humble, just so humble, sweet, no attitude," Williams says of Babyface, "He's got the gift of melody. It just comes out of him. The melody lines were memorable and the whole mood that he evoked was very different but also very commercial." Noted Smooth Jazz producer leff Lorber echoed Vanessa Williams' sentiments when we talked about Babyface's style. "He has a wonderful sense of melody, and melody is everything. He has such a great way of creating new twists. Just when you think he is doing something you have heard before musically, he will turn it around in the last line and make it something totally fresh and new. The production can be pretty simple and yet carry with it so much emotion. He is really amazing."

Ithough Babyface's work with other artists has been varied, his solo work has been largely focused in



included a track that was a beautiful folk-soul ballad that instantly broadened his audience. The song was titled "When Can I See You," and Babyface told us that it was a turning point for him: "For most people it was a left turn for me. In fact, I think it wasn't as left of a turn as it was that they just never heard me do that on my own records. I think it opened a lot of doors actually."

His new album, "The Day" is a testament to his diversity. He takes a lot of turns musically. His roster of guest artists says it all: Included are rapper LL Cool J, rock guitar legend Eric Clapton and Babyface's musical guru Stevie Wonder. The opening track, "Every Time I Close My Eyes" is a song he wrote for Kenny G's latest album "The Moment." When Mariah Carey heard the song she fell in love with it. She offered to sing back-up vocals. He couldn't refuse and re-mixed the song adding her vocals for his album. We cannot decide which version we like more. You hear them both on The WAVE.

Babyface has a new priority in his life. He and his wife Tracey have a new son, Brandon. The title track to his



album "The Day" is sub-titled "That You Gave Me A Son," written about the day he found out he was about to be a father. As for the other hats on his crowded rack, he is still wearing more than one at a time. He is currently working with Vanessa Williams; but this time it is not on a record. They are filming "Soul Food." The movie stars Vanessa and is being produced by Edmonds Entertainment, owned by Babyface and Tracey. Before heading for Chicago to begin shooting he told us: "As a writer, artist, producer, label co-president... Most of the time I spend working with other artists as opposed to working on my own career. It took three years to put this record together for myself." Don't expect that schedule to lighten-up in the foreseeable future. People are starting to call him the Quincy Jones of the 90's.

Behind that baby face is emerging a mature artist. Even critics like him. He remains humble. Vithen asked about the success of "Change The World," a song he wrote and produced for Eric Clapton, he said: "I couldn't believe he had heard of me."

When they did meet, Doc recalls "I was really excited about meeting him and letting him know who I was and immediately he made me go get my guitar...We had this little dressing room. It was just big enough for two guys and two guitars and he locked the door and we sat there and he said lets play something. We started playing some of his songs! It was great." George has to be




