

# Records

Thrillington THRILLINGTON Capitol

Suppose you and I made a bet. I said that quality, firt-rate muzak was possible, even strained out of the Beatles; and you (just to make things easier) disagreed. So I made some great arrangements of Paul McCartney stuff, with a few private jokes thrown in, gave myself a fake name, and sold the thing to a major record company. It would help, of course, if (to start with) I were Paul McCartney—because then I could sell it to Capitol, my old outfit.

And the result would be (surprise) the record mentioned above. It's not bad at all. In fact, it's a lot of fun.





Will the real Thrillington please stand?

The arrangements are actually quite good, the choice of instruments very distinctive and pleasant. The production values are first rate. The obnoxious party voices at the beginning of "Too Many People" make their point without overstaying their leave (and how true is that of obnoxious partygoers?). The humor is dry and understated, too: the "cool jazz" in "Heart of the Country," the "fuzzy' flute passages, the Swingle Singers' treatment; the walrus noises in "Smile Away" (it must be at least an eightyfoot tall walrus, with awfully good rhythm ... maybe it's related to Donny Osmond); the affected reggae in "Eat At Home"; the hilarious quickiechange instrumentation and rhythm in "Back Seat of My Car"-trying to combine 50's trumpet-and-piano with 70's Percy Faith style-and a violent lack of success.

Don't look for bellyaching laughs here. This isn't "Meet the Press." But, in it's own way (as I said), it's very funny. Try playing it to your folks and see if they take it seriously.

(Note: Capitol Records has emphatically denied the involvement of Paul McCartney in this album. Now—will all those who believe in Capitol Records and tooth fairles please clap your hands.

Weapons of Peace WEAPONS OF PEACE Playboy

I'm glad their lead singer is a fox. Otherwise, I might not have picked up the album and subsequently missed out on the fine music this group delivers. Weapons of Peace is a versatile album—and group. The songs here are as fresh and juicy to the ear as ripe mangoes, a welcome diversion from the generally xeric taste of disco.

Especially pleasing were the strong, but not overpowering vocals of Finis Henderson III (the fox I mentioned earlier) and the equally compelling voices of the other four member of the group. They do especially well on "Make Believe You're Near Me" and "City", the latter of which is receiving good airplay. Also of interest are "Roots Medley" (from the Quincy Jones LP) and "Growin' Stronger", their version of reggae.

One complaint, though, is that on some of the songs the lyrics lack imagination ("You never know who your friends are/ That's the price you have to pay for being a star"), but the quality of the rest of the LP outweighs this flaw. A very nice album.

Neil Young AMERICAN STARS AND BARS Warner Brothers

Ever the iconoclast, Neil Young flatly refuses to release another album as polished and overtly commercial as *Harvest*, his biggest popular success, but likewise his biggest critical failure. But while *American Stars n' Bars* will not enjoy anywhere near the sales of, say, the concurrent *CSN*, it is Young's most accessible album in some time.

If Nashville Skyline was Dylan's "country" album, ASn'B is legitimately Young's. About half the material here, expecially "Hold Back the Tears" and "Hey, Babe," is eminently suitable for

airplay on WBAP or KSCS and more deserving than recent crossover hits by the likes of the Eagles, Jimmy Buffett, or the Amazing Rhythm Aces. Honest

What disappoints about this album is how good it could have been. Included here are only two songs out of the excellent unreleased material Yourn brought with him to Texas on his tour last fall.

Nevertheless, the strengths on ASn'B make it a worthy effort. The harmonies of the Silver Bullets, headed by Linda Ronstadt, smooth off a lot of Young's customary rough edges and account in large measure for the album pleasantness.

The man who gave us After the Goldrush, Zuma, and Tonight's the Night has some more great albums left in him—that is clear. But all things considered, this isn't one of them. American Stars n' Bars is a thoroughly listenable, often whimsical LP which unfortunately lacks the bite and emotional impact of Young's darker and artistically better work.

Ben Sidran THE DOCTOR IS IN Arista


Ben Sidran hasn't found the prescription for widespread commercial success, but that doesn't stop him from growing musically. With The Doctor Is In and his previous release, Free In America, Sidran's Mose Allison influence is still evident, but he keeps expanding from there. His piano playing now has a strong easy flow all its own. The wit of his lyrics and the phrasing of his vocam which always complement each other, again resemble Allison in form, but the content is strictly Sidran.

Average White Band BENNY AND US Atlantic

The Average White Band may be the drawing card for this record, but r&b veteran Ben E. King, in the midst of a successful comeback, fronts the show. His work in front of a better-than-average band is a joy to hear.

Derringer LIVE Blue Sky - Columbia

Rick Derringer and his band are offering two guitars-bass-drums thunder with ferocious in-concert energy—nothins more and nothing (not even for an instanless. On those terms this is a very successful recording. If only shows a fraction of what Derringer is capable of (this is not music chosen-





offices asking for help in talking to him, They discussed the upcoming Buddy Holly film, among other things. Waylon had been Buddy's bass player on that last tour in 1959, and gave up his seat to Holly on the plane that crashed, killing Buddy, The Big Bopper, and Ritchie Valens. Waylon told us that he had been having some problems with his throat on this current tour and had been drinking a mixture of warm water, salt, and honey before going on stage. He explained that his throat was only suffering from too much use, and he was looking forward to a planned five day rest before continuing the tour through the southwest and midwest . .

We met Kiki Dee, a former Buddy cover girl, at Six Flags after her knockout SRO performance there. With her

was Rocket Records publicity whiz Ronnie Lippin, who introduced us to the opening act, Blue, a Scottish group that is visiting America for the first time. It's hard not to compare a Scottish group to The Bay City Rollers, but unfortunately in the comparison Blue does not come out too well. If they only had more showbiz schtick! They should at least dress in blue or something. The kids at Six Flags wanted more show, more flash, more Elton . . . Former Houstonian John Lomax (of the folk music Lomaxes) dropped off Townes Van Zandt's new double LP on the Tomato label. These are the venerable and justifiably famous Old Quarter tapes of Townes and his guitar, the late, great, lamented Martin. Townes' own version of his popular "Pancho and Lefty" is on the album and any singer searching for new material could do worse than listening to this live set. Townes is one of America's great songwriters . .

On Friday, July 15, Nitzinger and Phren-Z joined forces to dazzle the crowd at Lawton, Oklahoma's Great Plains Coliseum. Both did their usual excellent job and had the crowd in the palm of their collective hand for the whole evening. There were a few police problems, (they described it as a "near riot"), but the most serious offense of the 10 arrests reported was a kid who

had a few reds on him . . .

As we go to press, Dallas' own All Fingers Band is appearing on a show with Ruby Starr in Tulsa. They'll play the Buddy TGIF Party on September 9... It may be our imagination, but The James Buck Band seems to be emerging as the greatest proponent of rock theatre in the Dallas-Ft. Worth area . . . U.S. Kids are completing the final mix on a demo tape and should be ready to begin shopping it in about 30 days . . . Since local rockers Southern Cross made the additions to their personel roster, raves have been coming in from clubs all over Texas about their new sound. Three of the new additions are Chuck and Alan McDaniels (kevboards and bass respectively) and legendary drummer John Listi, all of whom are veterans of stapher Ben Ferguson's now defunct band, Candella. Some say that the band sounds better now than they ever have in their threeyear history. Check 'em out at The Buddy TGIF Party on Sept. 23 ...

Possibly through an oversight over the last few months we have inadvertently overlooked letting you know of the latest change in the Phren-Z band. Some 8 months ago, Eddie Deaton joined the band as the bass player and we feel as though his credentials bear some notice. Eddie has been playing and writing for about 14 years, and while you may remember him as a member of Texas for a while, you may not know that he has also appeared on several albums, most notably The Courtship and The Lee Pickens Group recordings. Eddie penned "Save My Place" one of Phren-Z's more

popular current numbers . . .

Tequila rock with a Texas twist, that's Hummin'bird, one of the KZEW Zooberry Jam bands. They'll be appearing at Faces, September 13-17 with a new face on stage. Tom Nuckles, formerly of Snapp, plays drums and other percussion instruments . . . Balcones Fault, after headlining at the Roxy in L.A., opened for Jesse Winchester at the Bottom Line in New Yawk, Yawk . . . The North Texas-based jazz ensemble Aurora will have their album out soon, at least by the end of the year . . . And our pal Ann McGowan has started her own label, Rattlesnake Records (named in honor of all the rattlers on her property outside Mineral Wells.) Her first release is "Rattlesnakes and Rusty Water" b/w "A Texas Lullaby." She also penned both tunes ...

Danny Crow's new project is the Fort Worth-based Pier One Records. Their first single release will be Jim Daniel's "Rocky Mountain Wine." The backup group is Waco Smith's Gypsy River Band ... Don Nix completed cutting tracks for his next Cream LP at Dallasonic Studios, with Nix producing



# Nugent is a "Killer"

Talkative Ted ends tour at Tarrant. By Bobette Riner.

Eardrums are facing extinction along with the buffalo-both are getting killed off by a mutual predator: Ted Nugent.

The Motor City Madman commits his assault on the former with any one of 17 Gibson Byrdland guitars, amped up to the decibel level of-say, your

quietest SST.

We've all fallen prey to his fantastically fast riffs, but Nugent has been known to use weapons other than audio ones. The biggest game he ever shot with a bow and arrow was a "one ton buffalo," he admitted after his concert recently. What, no humans as victims?
"Not yet," the wild guitarist warned.
"Nobody's †@\*\*+!!! with me yet. I keep 'em all on a rein."

The Gestapo-like security also kept an even tighter rein than normal at Tarrant County Convention Center for Nugent's two shows, which included Foreigner and Rex. Several fans made unsuccessful attempts to climb on the stage and join in Ted's last performance

of this tour.

"We go home for a whole week! For a rest before the European tour," a relieved Ted said. Home for Ted is his Michigan farm, and he really looks forward to the break with his family. As much as he loves doing what he does, a guy's still gotta take some time to recharge, especially before puttin' the hammer down overseas.

"We'll play London-but mostly Germany-ten cities in Germany. We'll give them a shot, you know?" And he doesn't mean their buffaloes. Europe, get your earplugs ready! My days as a music critic are numbered-I'll have to turn to reviewing books or judging homemade jelly at the state fair-'cause the decibels drummed up by the Snakeskin Cowboy's threatened my hearing with its life.

But what a way to go! Nugent and his band, consisting of Bob Grange on bass, drummer Cliff Davies, and Derek St. Holmes, rhythm guitarist and vocalist, whipped out "Just What the Doctor Ordered. " A frenetic, lightning-fast lineup of favorites from their three alburns followed, along with one new tune, "Walking Tall" (What Buford Pusser say?), and a few cuts from Ted's Amboy Dukes days.

Ted is the talkingest performer, both on and off stage. And either place he

talks withthesamespeedthatheplays.just likethis! Each song is prefaced with a rap: "Dallas, Fort Worth, I'll tell you what I know-when we got here tonight, it was nothin' but a Free for All!" and it was just that. Or, "Well, now you know where you got me. You got me where you want me-in a Stranglehold!" You can probably guess what he tore into then. When Ted emitted some doggy sounds, we all strained our leashes for an onslaught of "Dog Eat Dog".

Cat Scratch Fever was well represented by both the title cut and "Death by Misadventure". In "Wang Dang Sweet Poontang", Derek St. Holmes did a little guitar solo, proving he could do more than just prance around to Ted's licks. (Well, what's an organ-grinder's monkey to do, when King Kong's

And the Metroplex is Kong's Big Apple. We're at his command. "This is a good area for us," Ted told me in an almost human voice. "I've been comin' here for a bunch of years. You get the feel after a while," he added. We got the initiation to this area at

From the Ballroom beginnings to sellout crowds of 14,000, several times a year, Ted has won us over. And how could he not? After playing clubs for so many years, he really seems to understand the audience. In the words of the man himself, "It's easy (to give the audience what they want.) You know, everybody's here for the same thing. Ain't that right?" I nodded vigorously. One usually nods vigorously to anything Mr. Nugent says.

Such unconditional agreement is a result of being raised on a slew of "Nugentisms". A "Nugentism" is a story along the following lines (and always true): (KENOSHA, WISC.)-Two rough-looking guys in the audience at The Amboy Dukes concert were engaged in a pretty brutal fight. Suddenly, the guitarist (Ted Nugent, who else?) spots them, lays down his axe, leaps off the stage, and proceeds to beat up both guys. Within minutes, he was back on stage, playing away, and stops cold again. "Who in the \*\* & %++!!'s got my watch??!!?" he roars. "I'm gonna kick everyone's ass in here 'til I get it back!!" Dead silence in the crowd, then: Plink!-the watch gets tossed on the stage. That's a mild "Nugentism."

"I got to keep tearin' it up," Ted admitted. "I got no choice." I agree (would I dare to disagree? Would you?)-once you get that reputation, you can't slack off. "That ain't what worries me," the ever-confident Nugent emphasized. "It's just that it's too much fun to screw around. Why mess up a good thing?"

The fact that Ted has fun during a performance is evident, if you've ever been a witness. Besides stroking his guitar like a sweet lil' pussycat, he makes sure the fans are treated to an enjoyable visual show, as well as some of the most feverish, flercest, feline

rock 'n' roll around.

With teeth flashing, (meow? woof, woof?) Ted summed up his attitude about his rapport with the audience by saying, "They expected the world and I gave 'em the universe. There's only one way to keep me from doin' a good show, man-don't allow me in town. It's true."

We believe you, Ted-even if you didn't have that bow and arrow!

# Casey is the Disco King



Or, Shaking Booty for Fun and Profit!

Six Flags Over Texas recorded the biggest day in its history when KC & The Sunshine Band visited the park. A record crowd of 45,000 people jammed the park to see KC.

KC and The Sunshine Band was the only debuting group to ever have three number one singles in the same year since The Beatles.

Harry Wayne Casey, known as KC, has played an important part in the rise of disco music in the world. The Sunshine Band's popularity is not limited to just America, their appeal is universal, from Japan to Moscow. On their first tour of England, they were amazed at the response they received from the audience. "People were just going crazy," said Casey, "I'd never seen anything like that since The Beatles. We were up there singing songs that no one had heard of, and they were really getting into them, they just loved the beat."

In 1973, Casey and Rick Finch (bass player and co-writer) wrote, arranged, produced, and performed on the first Sunshine Band record Blow Your Whistle. The group was then called KC and The Sunshine Junkanoo Band. (Junkanoo is a percussion-oriented sound from the Bahama Islands.) Their second release, Sound Your Funky Horn, went top 15 on the r&b charts as had the first.

Casey and Rick write all their songs, instrumentals included. They also write for other artists on the T.K. label, and most of their songs are very popular and successful for the artist. Such artists include: George McCrae's "Rock Your Baby," Jimmy Bo Horne's "Gimme Some," and Betty Wright's "Where Is The Love."

Casey tries to appeal to everyone with his boogie music. One of the things he strives to do is to get everyone in the audience up to boogie. I asked H.W. Casey, "Mozart and Beethoven were great composers, and they had certain inspirations to write their compositions, where did you come up with the inspiration for 'Shake Your Booty'?" He laughed and replied, "Well, I try to put everyone into my music, and half the people were just sitting around, and half dancing. So I designed this song to break their shyness. It worked too! People got up and started shaking their little 'booties'."

Casey was really inspired by the early soul sound of Aretha Franklin, The Rascals, and other Motown recordings. One other strong influence was his mother, "who danced around the house to soul music."

It would take more than the disco phenomenon to explain the success of KC's music beat. When the concert begins it's almost like an explosion of human energy bringing everyone to their feet. The music seems to "activate" the audience into immediate boogie movements. Some are so captivated, they stare at the band in awe and love,

almost like they are hypnotized by the vibrations.

Sometimes this fantasy can lead to danger. It's almost as if KC's music incites the crowd to react in a chaotic way. They get so heightened by the rhythm they rush the stage, just to touch Casey. He even has a "flower performance," where he throws carnations into the crowd. Needless to say, this causes a lot of problems with violent reactions from the girls. On one occasion a poor girl was crushed up against the wall and had to be taken to the hospital. A security guard in Arizona broke his leg chasing a fan across the stage.

Casey was asked if he enjoyed inciting the crowd. He replied, "Of course not. I like to feel a unity with the audience and if I ask them to be cool, and work together, this will usually settle the audience down. I really don't get into violence."

When "I'm Your Boogie Man" hit the charts, there was some protest from some of the black radio stations, especially in the South. They were offended by the use of the word "Boogie man," as though the word had something to do with blacks. But as Casey puts it, "I really didn't intend to insult them, they just took it wrong. To me a boogie man means a lot of things and the thing I intended it to be was a dancing man, boogieing around. I guess some people take their own meanings out of songs."

On the other hand, The Sunshine Band has mingled into the black audiences with its soul sound. Their music is usually No. 1 in the discos. They have been called "America's number one party band," and their fans say their music brings happiness immediately when you put on your boogie shoes.

The group has two bands, one for recording and one for performing on stage. The performing group really explodes on stage with their dancing and parading around. They really put on a show. The group consists of nine people: H.W. Casey (KC) on keyboards and vocals, Rick Finch on bass, Jerome J. Smith on guitar, Robert "Shotgun" Johnson on drums, Fermin "Bongo" Goytisolo on congas (he's Cuban, in case you're wondering), Ronnie "Tad pole" Smith on trumpet, Denvil Demp Liptrot on saxophone, James "Brown' Weaver on trumpet, and Charles "Funky" Williams on trombone. And not to mention the backup vocal group, Fire, two very pretty and talented ladies.

There seems to be something to this pulsating sound KC produces. Not only do young people enjoy it, but older people as well. Moms and dads are "shaking their booties" around the house when the kids play his music. Harry Casey has accomplished his purpose of unifying people with his good dance music. He's put his sensitivity into his music and come up with the right combination to capture the spirit and feet of a young generation.

# Dear Elvis

Dear Elvis,

They told me today that you had left us, without any warning or preparation for the shock that came with the news of your death. In a lot of ways, it reminded me of the death of my grandfather—I never thought that either one of you would die because you both were around as far back as I could remember.

I remember when I was 5 years old, living in Biloxi, Mississippi. Our maid had a black, plastic radio, sort of shaped like a bread box, with an oversized tuning dial on it. The only song that I was really cognizant of at that age was "Jailhouse Rock." I used to sit by that radio every afternoon, waiting for it to be played, and when it came on I would jump around the kitchen, strumming my imaginary guitar. You were different, but, boy, were you good!

Nobody called it rock and roll at first. They just said, "That's Elvis!" Older people laughed at you and thought you were strange or weird, but we kids didn't care, because for the first time we were buying records and we had our own music and our own art form. (Although we never thought of it as "art;" we just knew that we liked it and our parents didn't.)

Some people tried to tell me that Ricky Nelson was as good as you were, but I didn't believe them. Even if Ricky was always on "Ozzie and Harriet" each week, I always thought of him as an imitator.

As you got older, and some of the traumas of aging set it, some people made fun of you (called you "an old man still trying"), but whenever you came to town, your shows were sold out. You kept on performing for those fans who had supported you in the past.

I still can't believe that you are gone. When Jimi Hendrix, Janis Joplin, and Jim Morrison died, we kind of expected it, but you didn't give us any warning, Elvis.

You just up and left us, without giving us a chance to say, "Thanks." Thanks for making it possible for Dylan, The Beatles, The Stones, and Elton to enjoy the success that they have reaped. You showed the record companies that kids would buy records—and lots of them. You showed the television networks, when you were on "Ed Sullivan," that the nation would be watching (even if television wouldn't let you show your hips.) You showed the world that young people were starving for their own culture, their own music, and we responded by going to Woolworth's each month and picking up those 45's of "Hound Dog," "G.I. Blues," "Teddy

Bear," and "Don't Be Cruel."

Thanks for rock 'n' roll, you ol' Houn' dawg, you.



# Ramones Rock Dallas

Or, Big Apple Punk Comes To Big D! by Ben Ferguson



I had just finished jamming at one of the Lee Park Freddie King Memorial Concerts one sultry Sunday afternoon when Bugs Henderson approached me backstage and asked to borrow my guitar to sit in. We walked to the back of the park building where my guitar had been stored in the pick-up and I explained that I would love to stay for the jam but was committed to an interview with The Ramones, who were to appear at the Texas Electric Ballroom later that evening, and that I needed to get home for a bath before the show.

"Aw, come on, Ben," Bugs laughed. "You don't need a bath to interview The Ramones!"

He was right. From the first ruptured guitar chord to the last pair of shredded blue jeans, these guys make you understand what the term "punk rock" is all about. Even I, who adore this band, still found myself asking, "Why do these guys play and look like this? Is it the ol' 'let's-make-ourselves-so-repulsive-that-we-become-fashionable' routine that the Stones exploited so profitably? Or do they really enjoy it? Does it really sound 'good' to them?"

Joey, Johnny, Dee Dee, and Tommy have got to be some of the funniest and nicest guys in rock 'n' roll, whatever trip it is they're on. As I walked into the tiny Ballroom dressing room, these four skinny Yankee fellas reminded me of myself circa 1966-67; I had cut my teeth in a band which looked much the same and played tunes like "Gloria" by Them, "(I Can't Get No) Satisfaction' by The Rolling Stones (before they became THE STONES). and, of course, the immortal "Louie, Louie" by The Kingsmen. (We even used to sniff carbona and glue if there was nothing else around to get high on . . . and this was in the middle of Kansas!)

Johnny, who talks just like Bobby

Kennedy, slouched in a chair in front of me; Tommy paced nervously back and forth twirling his drumsticks; Dee Dee sat next to me ogling the picture of Ruby Star in the August issue of Buddy; Joey hovered over me and made frequent trips to the restroom as our conversation began.

"You know, the question that's been burning in my mind since I saw and heard your first album," I began, "is, "Why do you look and play like you do?" Didn't you realize that a lot of people wouldn't like hearing the same chords and rhythms over and over at maximum volume?"

"Well, at first we did it as a goof," explained Johnny. "Then, we found out that people liked the tunes and we began to feel that they were really good songs. We thought nobody would like it at first. Besides, it's the only thing we can play."

"Will you ever make your music any more complex than it is now?" I asked.

"Our music is already complex," answered Tommy, as though the entire universe could be summed up in three chords. (I think he's right, though. Bluesmen have been summing up the

universe in just three chords for years!)

"There's only so many chords you can play," Tommy elaborated. "There's an "A" chord, a "B" chord, a "C" chord... We've used up all the chords. I guess we'll go back to the basics."

Turning to Dee Dee, I asked, "Seeing as how Texas is so country, and into music like Willie Nelson and ZZ Top, don't you think your music is liable to seem rather incongruous here?"

"I don't know what that

"I don't know what that word means," he replied.
"Out of context, out of

place," I defined.

Johnny bailed Dee Dee out by saying, "Well, there's punk rock bands in Texas. How about The. Nervebreakers or The Werewolves?"

"The Werewolves moved to New York," I informed him, "and you saw how the crowd reacted to the Nervebreakers." The Nervebreakers were the warm-up band for the Ramones' Ballroom show and were so rude and obnoxious that they were first booed, and later became the targets of bottles and other paraphernalia. (Don't get me wrong, I enjoyed the Nervebreakers; their music and show was simply too...uh...'visionary for the audience. Very Sex Pistolish!)

"I hope this is not gonna be a rough one," sighed Joey, having just returned from one of his restroom sojourns. (What was he doing back there?)

"We had a good show in San Antonio," boasted Johnny, proudly displaying his official 'Alamo' T-shirt. "You know, this is our first nationwide tour. Anyway. we write about Texas. We wrote a song about the Texas Chainsaw Massacre."

"That's something else I wanted to ask you about," I said. "Why are your songs always about such seemingly

"Oh, I like Hank Williams," said Johnny, lighting up at the name of the legendary country star. "I like older music like Dolly Parton or Buck Owens. We play country music; of course, it may not sound like country when we play it. The bridge to 'Carbona Not Glue' is country."

"Wait until Willie hears this," I chuckled. In a few years, I'm looking for these cats to come out with an album entitled, The Ramones' Hank Williams Songbook,

During the course of our conversation, The Ramones revealed the titles to some of the songs on their next album. They include "I Can't Give You Anything," "Cretin Hop," "Teenage Lobotomy," and "Sheena Is A Punk Rocker." They also disclosed their plans to remake the sixties' hits "Surfin' Bird" and "Do You Wanna Dance."

Following our conversation, I shook hands with the guys and braced myself for the forthcoming show. They needn't have worried about the audience. From the time they first appeared until the end of their encore they had the Dallas audience completely mesmerized. Those who were not on their feet cheering and rushing the stage were simply too dumbfounded to react. It was like attending an early sixties Beatles concert (and I did); it was one of the healthiest events I've attended in years. GABBA GABBA HEY!
