O. E. Richardson, President and owner of WASK and WFAM-FM, was born in Hartford, Kentucky. He graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1921 with a degree in Mining Engineering. He started his business career with Western Electric as an engineer on machine switching (dial telephone). In 1924 "O. E." became radio sales engineer in New York City for Western Electric Graybar. He sold and supervised installation of the leading radio stations in the USA until May 1937. At this time he decided to purchase an interest in Radio Station WHIP, at that time a Chicago-Hammond radio station, and WWAE, now called WJOB, in Hammond. In 1940 he became President and General Manager of the South Shore Broadcasting Corporation in Hammond, Indiana. In 1941 he purchased interest in WFAM in South Bend with the provision that the station be moved to Lafayette, which is now known as WASK. In 1947 he acquired all of the stock of WASK and moved to Lafayette. In that same year he established Radio Station WIMS in Michigan City. In 1950 he sold his interest in Radio Station WIMS to devote his entire time to WASK. "O. E." has been active in the Radio Pioneer Club and has served as a director of the Indiana Broadcasters Association. He is married and lives in West Lafayette. He enjoys fishing and talking a good game of golf.

AND A LOOK TO THE FUTURE . . .

This year we celebrate our tenth anniversary in Lafayette. Our success in these years has been due largely to you, our faithful listeners. Our operation and planning has not always been pleasant with one world-wide war, a flood that inundated our transmitter, a drastic fire which destroyed our entire studios, and now another worldwide disturbance threatening our very liberty and freedom. In spite of all this we have kept you abreast of local, state and national news, sports and music.

Our operations started on March 23, 1942 with small studios in the Wallace Building and transmitter and antenna in the Wabash Valley along Route 43, West Lafayette. Our antenna was too close to the hills of West Lafayette for good coverage, and only 175 feet high, which was too short. In the spring of 1943, a flood in the Wabash River put us out of commission for two whole weeks. We then planned to leave the banks of the Wabash with our transmitting plant and antenna system and move to higher ground with more land for future expansion. Since moving our transmitter and erecting a 400 foot tower required approval of the Federal Communications Commission, it took 3 years to get located at our new plant on McCarty Lane, with a modern building and ten acres of land. In 1947 we applied for and obtained W F A M, our F M Station. It appeared both to us and to the Federal Communications Commission that F M would replace A M in the not too far future. This proved erroneous as everyone now knows.

In the spring of 1949, we built six modern air conditioned studios with suitable offices in the Wallace Building and began to program WASK and WFAM separately. We felt at the time that our studios were the finest and most modern in the State. Our new set-up lasted only four months and twenty-two days, when on the morning of October 22, 1949, a disastrous fire destroyed the entire top floor of the Wallace Building and we again had to start to build from scratch. We anticipated television in the not too far future, so we built a new modern building at our transmitter site on McCarty Lane. We moved into our new studios on February 12, 1950. Our planning must have been good for now, as you well see, we are entering the field of television as soon as the FCC's freeze on TV is lifted. We have placed an order for the latest and finest television equipment produced by Radio Corporation of America, (the world's largest manufacturer) pending the grant of our application now on file at the Federal Communications Commission in Washington. Upon the granting of said application, installation will start immediately, and be completed with all possible speed. Ours will be a new and modern television station, capable of producing local, regional and national programs. Television will be an added service to Lafayette, not a replacing one for radio. Radio and Television working together will offer to our public the greatest service for education, enlightenment and entertainment known to science today. Never will our cherished freedom, honorably, and at great sacrifice, obtained by our forefathers, be destroyed as long as these services are yours openly and without restraint.

We look to the future with fondest hopes for everlasting peace, understanding, and good will the world over. We pledge ourselves for a better service to our community, our State and our Nation, God being our helper and you being our guide.





World Radio History



Radio Station WASK was formerly operated by the South Bend Tribune in South Bend, Indiana as WFAM... dividing time with WWAE, now known as WJOB in Hammond. The present owner of WASK, O. E. Richardson, was a part owner of the Hammond station and wanted full time operation in Hammond. The South Bend Tribune sold WFAM to the Hammond owners with provisions that the station be moved to Lafayette. The Federal Communications Commission refused the call letters of WFAM to be used in Lafayette so the call letters WASK were assigned and a grant was obtained in the fall of 1941. The transmitter was installed and the new studios were opened in the Wallace Building. Radio Station WASK began its regular daily broadcasting of programs on March 23, 1942.





In 1943, WASK "went under" in the raging torrents of the Wabash River spring floods. That was an unfortunate experience, leaving the people of Lafayette without "radio protection" when they needed it. This will happen no more, because . . .

soon construction was started on WASK's new 377 foot Wincharger Antenna on which was erected the Frequency Modulation Antenna. The new site is near the Aluminum Plant, high and dry, on McCarty Lane just outside the city limits. Floods and water will no longer be a menace to WASK's service to the community.

Flames and dense smoke are seen coming from the Wallace Building in an early morning fire Saturday, October 22, 1949, as firemen pour water into the brick structure, housing many offices and the radio studios of WASK. This picture was taken a few moments after Joe Bertha, fireman, fell from top of the ladder shown at left center, sustaining serious injuries; he had just been moved from the scene and his fire helmet is still to be seen on the sidewalk, near the building. The third floor was gutted and the entire structure badly damaged. The loss to the WASK radio studios, which had been newly equipped and redecorated only recently, was placed at \$30,000 to \$40,000 by O. E. Richardson, owner. Firemen had the fire under control by 8:00 A.M., but remained on the scene several more hours to ensure against rekindling of the blaze. All WASK radio equipment and records were destroyed, the roof over the building was burned away, and the interior of the third floor was gutted.





SKETCH OF WASK-TV's PROPOSED NEW STUDIOS






