




Through its affiliation with the great NBC network WLOF can present shortwave reports from the foreign scenes of action and the foremost analysts and commentators to evaluate each event The far-flung International News Service maintains correspondents in every imaginable nook and cranny of the nation and the world, and their stories, edited by expert central staffs, pour into the WLOF news room on automatic teletype printers twenty hours each day.

With these facilities giving WLOF an eye and ear at all points of world activity, it is no hollow boast that WLOF is "The News Station of Central Florida."




