

Powerful Voices

James Earl Jones hosts this evocative sampling of African-American poets, composers, and musicians, from the gospel tradition to contemporary concert music. Joining Jones are artistic director Philip Brunelle, conducting the Plymouth Music Series Chorus and Orchestra, and Gospel Choirs United, a 100-voice ensemble. Highlights of the program include Jones's narration of "Frederick's Fables," by Los Angeles composer Michael Abels, based on the popular children's tales by Leo Lionni; "A Lincoln Portrait," by Aaron Copland, also narrated by Jones; soprano Maria Jette performing "Nocturne," by Adolphus Hailstork and "Golden Days," from the opera "Costaso" by William Grant Still; and excerpts from William Dawson's "Negro Folk Symphony."

WNYC Radio News received five New York State Associated Press Broadcasters Awards May 21 at a ceremony in Lake Placid. The awards included first place for continuous news coverage for the World Trade Center bombing reports and for general excellence of use of medium (Mandalit del Barco) and general excellence of individual reporting (Don Mathisen). A report, "Muslim Life in New York," won first place for best local documentary program or series. WNYC also was cited by the Radio-Television News Directors Association for Best Feature ("Dinomania" by Mandalit del Barco), and Gene Bryan Johnson was awarded the New York Press Club's Nelly Bly/Thomas D. Zumbo Cub Reporter-of-the-Year Award for his work on domestic violence.




