This year marks the 56th time that WNYC toasts America's musical artistry. For seven days, between Lincoln's and Washington's birthdays, audiences are treated to a vibrant mix of America's musical past, present, and future. Along with American Music Festival specials, regular programs *Morning Music*, *Evening Music*, and *While the City Sleeps* spotlight an array of American genres. The American Music Festival was established by WNYC Director Morris Novik in 1940 to contrast the extensive censorship in Nazi Germany with America's freedoms. Today WNYC still celebrates that creative freedom, with the station's greatest musical tradition.

Mark has been *Morning Edition's* local program host on AM820 and FM93.9 since 1992. "This is the perfect job for me," says Mark. "Very few people seem to want to work the early morning shift. I would find it difficult to work any other."

"I consider it a privilege to work at a station with people like Steve Post, Brian Lehrer, Lenny Lopate, Dick Hinchliffe, and my news colleagues. I love it when Steve Post calls me a nice boy," Mark says, "but I hate it when Steve Post tells his listeners that I charge him for a ride home!"

Sweet Honey in the Rock

The renowned a capella group, led by Dr. Bernice Johnson Readon, founder and artistic director, celebrates its 22nd anniversary with two special programs. The first program is music-rich and the second information-rich, combining live performance material with an in-concert interview.

The African-American Music Tree II, FM93.9, Fridays, 8pm, beginning February 2

A four-part series of one-hour programs about black composers, many of whose compositions have never been played for a national broadcast audience. This series pays special attention to the influence of the Caribbean Basin on 19th and 20th century black American composers.

The Port Chicago 50: An Oral History, AM820, Saturday, February 3, 10:30pm

On July 17, 1944 two Liberty ships anchored at the Port Chicago Munitions Base near San Francisco exploded, killing 320 men and injuring 390; most of them were African-American. Shaken by the death of their workmates and afraid that another explosion would occur, 50 men refused to go back to work. *The Port Chicago 50: An Oral History* is about how the lives of these 50 men were changed forever.

Bitter Lake, AM820, Saturday, February 3, 11pm

The historical drama, set in Alabama in the 1890's, presents the moving and powerful tale of an African-American outlaw known as "Railroad Bill," who robbed the Louisville & Nashville line and divided the spoils with impoverished sharecroppers.

Oh, What A Time!, AM820, Saturday, February 17, 11pm

This documentary explores the experience of black America during World War II. The program gives an overview of the social and political issues concerning the African-American community as the nation prepared for what some considered a white man's war. Popular songs that comment on events, literary excerpts from documentary writings, and historical narration are included.

Color Gives Birth to Rock Music

Crossing the Color Line is a series written and narrated by historian and civil rights activist Julian Bond, who reflects on the racial, social, and historical events in music history that led to the creation of rock 'n' roll.

February 3 *Before Rock and Roll*. This program looks at the styles of music that laid the foundation for rock 'n' roll and the people who created it.

February 10 *Black Music Breaks Through*. After World War II, independent record companies spread black music across the nation. And for the first time in music history, black music made a breakthrough in the white market.

February 17 *DJ's and Teens Make An Impact*. Black and white disc jockeys were playing and promoting rhythm 'n' blues music, aimed at

black listeners. But to their surprise, this music began to captivate white teenagers as well.

February 24 *Rock and Roll Conquers America*. The success of Bill Haley, Big Mama Thornton, and Elvis Presley had fixed rock 'n' roll firmly in enough American hearts to guarantee its staying power.

Hosted by Lou Rawls, this series continues the story of radio's role in the 20th century transformation of the African-American community.

February 4 *Let's Have Church* explores the importance of religious broadcasting to the black community

February 11 *We Were the Only Mayors*. In the 50's and 60's black disc jockeys did more than play music. They were among the first messengers of the civil rights movement.

February 18 *In Control*. The successes and challenges of African-American station owners are explored.

February 25 *A Women's Touch*. Women in radio broadcasting share their experiences.

Blacklisted

On October 20, 1947 the House Un-American Activities Committee began hearings that brought blacklisting to Hollywood. Written, produced, and narrated by Tony Kahn, *Blacklisted* details how his father, screenwriter Gordon Kahn, was the target of surveillance by the FBI and its chief J. Edgar Hoover from 1947 to 1962. The sources of Mr. Kahn's material for *Blacklisted* are his father's diaries, correspondence, and a 3,000 page FBI file. This series of six programs begins with *Hollywood on Trial* and stars Alec Baldwin, Wallace Shawn, Stockard Channing, Eli Wallach, Julie Harris, Spalding Gray, Martin Mull, blacklisted veteran John Randolph, Paul Guilfoyle, and Josh Mostel, playing his father, Zero.


