





Showboat Now Better Than Ever

Woooo ... Woooo ... Woooo ... the calliope booms out ... crowds heard from river landing ... orchestra up ... "HERE COMES THE SHOWBOAT."

Such sets the scenes for Capt. Henry's Showboat. Virginia Ver-rill, Nadine Conner, Tommy Thomas, Warren Hall, Hattie Mc-Daniel, Eddie Green and Alam Kruger, along with 73 players pick up their cues. Meredith Wilson's "concert swing" music bursts into a popular song, and . . . THE SHOW IS ON!

A slight twist of your dial to WOW any Thursday evening at 8 o'clock and the Maxwell House Showboat steams into your living room. But to be different, let's tune in . . . behind the scenes.

A top-notch script and musical routine must be prepared. Perhaps the script is accepted as written and the program is put into immediate production. While necessary script revisions are being made, arrangers revisions are being made, arrangers and composers are busy adapting musical selections. Hard as they work, Showboat players maintain an air of informality at rehearsals. However, dress rehearsal is con-ducted with all the dignity of the finished show.

Hollywood is generally looked upon as an American playground, with people hurrying hither and thither, pleasure bound. This may be true to some extent, but after a month's sojourn there, spent in visting radio and motion picture stu-dios, attending the rehearsals of some of NBC's biggest coast-to-coast programs, and talking with the agency representatives who pro-duce these shows, I am convinced that Hollymood is one of the busiest that Hollywood is one of the busiest places on earth.

Plenty of Work

For instance, a motion picture is in production night and day until it is completed. Those taking part, it is completed. Those taking part, including the stars, often work until late at night and are frequently called to the set as early as 5:30 in the morning. Then again, radio productions such as the Chase and Sanborn Hour, Showboat and the Kraft Music Hall require hours and hours of rehearsal and revision. hours of rehearsal and revision.

Growing Rapidly

During a rehearsal of the new Packard Hour I was amused to see Lanny Ross poised on a saw-horse in a position that looked none too comfortable while he was waiting for his turn to sing. The NBC shows are moving out to Hollywood so rapidly that in this instance they had to use an auditorium that was still under construction, which accounts for the saw-horse replacing chairs. I was surprised to find W. Fields sitting so calmly in front of the microphone during the Chase and Sanborn Hour. Bob Burns looked as if he might have just come up from Arkansas when he appeared on his Kraft Music Hall broadcast recently. In addition to being very for which he refused to apologize because, he said, it was for "art's sake."

While dining at the Vendome, a popular rendezvous for film stars and producers, I rubbed elbows with the genial Wallace Beery. Anita Louise, who was dining at the table across from me, looked just as beautiful as she does on the screen. Television to be Attraction at World's Fair


David Sarnoff, president of RCA, and Grover Whalen, president of the 1939 New York world's fair, have signed an agreement whereby television will be given a public demonstration by RCA and NBC at the world's fair, which is dedi-cated to "The World of Tomorrow." The television show will afford the millions of visitors to the fair

the millions of visitors to the fair from the far corners of the earth an opportunity to watch demonstra-tions of every aspect of radio and television—the modern world's and future world's most effective means of communication and entertainment.

In conjunction with the signing of the agreement, Mr. Sarnoff said: "In the ultra modern radio and television building to be erected by RCA on the world's fairgrounds, we shall show how radio safeguards the passage of ships at sea and the flight of ships in the air. We shall maintain a radio communications center at the fair, so that visitors may send radiograms to any part of the world and to ships on the seven seas. We shall demonstrate how photographs are transmitted across the ocean by radio.

"The youngest child in the family "The youngest child in the family of RCA service is, of course, tele-vision. This infant is not yet out of the nursery, but it is learning to walk and to talk. The progress we are making daily in the development of transmitting sight through space gives promise that by the time the world's fair opens in 1939, television will be greatly advanced over its present-day position.

"While the problems of developing a nation-wide television system are enormous. We have faith in the future of this new radio art. Television is bound to have a pro-found influence on the lives of all of us. It will extend, but not replace, our present-day system of broadcasting. Much yet remains to be done before television becomes available to the general public, but we firmly believe that some day this will be accomplished."

Rev. R. R. Brown's World Radio Congregation

Rev. R. R. Brown, D.D., Minister of Radio Station WOW, Pastor-Evangelist of the Omaha Gospel Tabernacle, Christian and Mis-sionary Alliance.

Some time ago the editor of our Radio News Tower requested that we have our son, Robert S. Brown, write this column. Therefore, it seemed rather fitting that we should ask him to bring a message to you in this month's issue, telling us something of his recent trip to Eu-rope.—R. R. Brown.

I have literally grown up with radio. I was only 10 years of age when my father broadcast the first religious service for WOW, then WOAW. Radio has never ceased to thrill and attract me. Little did I dream that I would one day be associated with my father in this ministry of the air that reaches so many thousands. During the many years that Doctor Brown has been on the air, I have seen him sacrifice on the air, I have seen him sacrince everything for the benefit of the chapel service. It is a great privi-lege to be working with him and the corps of consecrated helpers each Sunday morning. To Capital

This summer I had the opportunity to make a marvelous trip, and I would like to relate some of the high spots. Immediately after the close of school, I went to Washing-ton, D. C., where I studied and visited the places of interest for about a week. Senator Burke, Sen-ator Norris and Congressman Mc-L aughlin were very helpful enabling Laughlin were very helpful, enabling me to get much important informa tion and to meet government leaders.

On to N.Y.C.

The three days spent in New York City were crowded to capacity with visits to NBC, the studios, control rooms and offices. I was privileged to visit many programs and to meet some celebrities, such as Graham McNamee and Jack Pearl.

To England

While in Edinburg, the king and queen of Great Britain paid their first official visit to Scotland, so I was able to see their majesties on a number of occasions and witness interesting ceremonies.

The crossing of the North Sea from England to Norway on a small boat was uneventful, but most unusual, because the sea was so very calm. To try to describe Norwegian beauty would be futile. The Fjords, snow-capped mountains, beautiful waterfalls, wild reindeer and, most pleasant of all, the friendly people, which thrilled the tremendous made my stay there entirely too short. RECORDING

Frequently radio listeners hear the words . . . "This program is brought to you by electrical trans-scription." Frequently over WOW special events programs are broad-cast in this manner. Radio station WOW is expired with both ports WOW is equipped with both portable and stationary recording equip-ment. Wherever the WOW mobile unit can go, recordings can be made.

Solve Problem

The purpose of making recordings rather than using broadcast lines is obvious. Things often happen when commercial schedules prohibit immediate broadcast. Oftentimes lines are not available at all, and hence the recordings are made and broadcast at a later time.

Two Units

If necessary the portable record-ing outfit in the mobile unit can be dismounted and taken any place that a man can go, providing he has electric power to operate the unit.

Army Maneuvers

Some of you may have heard the descriptions of the war maneuvers at Fort Riley, Kans., on August 22 and 23. These were first recorded in the mobile unit on the camp site and then brought to Omaha for broadcast. Some of the brograms were made in a hay field several miles from power or tele-phone lines. In this instance the gasoline power unit in the mobile truck supplied the necessary cur-rent. Cavalry charges, artillery barrages, machine gunners, air atacks and Foster May's verbal explosions were successfully recorded and later broadcast to you over regular transmitting equipment.

State Fair Coverage

At the Nebraska State fair WOW found it impossible to broadcast the auction of the grand champion baby beef just at the moment it was actufather's relatives. In spite of ally taking place, so a record was daily rains, the Scottish scenery, made and a few minutes later it was carried on the air.

Studio Recorder

In contrast to the mobile equip-ment of WOW, the stationary re-

cording machine is located in the control room at the studios. On it studio programs are recorded. Frequently we record important events such as the abdication speech of King Edward, Ak-Sar-Ben races and numerous interviews which have been made semi-permanent by this method. The type of recording made on both the mobile and permanent recorders is of an instanta-neous nature. That is, the record-ings can be played immediately after being made.

Limited Use

However, the nature of the material of the recording blanks is such that the records cannot be played indefinitely, as the surface material is too soft to permit constant use. Listeners, from what we have been able to learn, appreciate this

service, which permits us to preserve programs until we can broadcast them, and broadcast them if necessary several times. The recordings of WOW are kept in a permanent file for further use,

and many of them may some day have great historical value.


Ghost Drama Returns...



For in the midst of a kick Gracie lost her balance and fell, pulling her two sisters down with her. The audience roared.

Allen Meets Burns

With a friend she went to Union With a friend she went to Union Hill, N. J., where the friend was trying out an act. Backstage, she met George Burns, then doing a song-and-dance act with Billy Lor-raine as Burns and Lorraine.

As for George, his first stage per-formance had been at a New York political dinner with the Pee Wee quartet, which three other youngsters and himself had organized. They split \$5 afterwards. A singer at the same dinner, who also re-ceived \$5 for his "single," was a young man, aged 15, by the name Eddie Cantor.

After a few years of many-sided experiences, George teamed up with experiences, George teamed up with Sid Gary, who later became a star in his own right. After playing 30 weeks in small theaters, they finally hit the "big time." During the years which followed he was in hundreds of vaudeville acts with many partners.

Allen Joins Burns

After meeting Miss Allen, Burns dissolved his partnership with Lorraine and teamed with Gracie. Since he had written the act, he made himself the comedian. Miss Allen asked the questions and he gave the funny answers. Then, as George says, everyone laughed at her ques-tions and none of his answers. After the first show, he switched parts. Miss Allen had been with the

Allen Marries Burns

After four years as a team, Burns and Allen signed a unique contract with RKO theaters. It was for six years straight. With the contract signed, they were married.

They continued to play through-out the country, with annual trips to Europe. During those six years they received a number of offers for Broadway stage shows, but could not get a release from their long-term vaudeville agreement.

And - believe it or not - they started their radio act on the other side of the Atlantic. On one of their European jaunts they made their radio debut, appearing for 15 weeks for BBC.

During the latter part of 1930, George and Gracie made their first films in short subjects for Para-mount, and at the termination of their RKO contract signed a film-stage agreement with Paramount.

The last nine weeks of their RKO contract they played at the Palace theater in New York. While there, Eddie Cantor, who was on the same bill, asked Gracie to do five minutes with him on his radio program. She did, and was so well liked that broadcast officials signed them as radio stars. Their radio broadcasts skyrocketed them to even greater brighter heights.

With the exception of one 13-week period in 1934, for one broad-cast of President Roosevelt and for one broadcast when Gracie Allen was sick, the team has not been off the radio since they first appeared as guests of Cantor.

VITAL STATISTICS: Gracie

The radio control room of any Burns and Allen broadcast is a pic-ture of restraint at all times. When the audience is laughing the wildest at the Gracie guips, the two writers who help George with the script only look at one another and nod solemnly.

Let other celebrities of radio swim, play tennis, golf and ride horseback! Robert Armbruster, the musical director of the NBC Chase and Sanborn Hour, says he will ex-ercise with nothing except a baton. "Exercise," he declare, "makes one tired." P. S.—He keeps his figure, too.
