

WOW - Promoted Show is Big Success

More than 30,000 persons at-Food Show, promoted by WOW, at the City Auditorium during the last week in September.

The show was sponsored by members of the Independent Gro-cers and Meat Dealers Association of Omaha.

It was the fourth year in which WOW had been assigned the task of arranging for and supervising the entertainment and publicizing the show.

President Ben Perelman of the grocers association declared the 1941 show was one of the most successful in history.

"Both the night shows and the afternoon cooking school sessions were very successful," Mr. Perel-man said. Elmer Gross, General Show Chairman, and Louis Kavan, Secretary of the association and Show Manager, expressed similar sentiments.

John Gillin, Jr., General Manager of WOW, paid tribute to the fa-mous radio personalities who came to Omaha as guest stars for the Food Show.

"Most of the folks who came to Omaha to perform did so at a per-sonal sacrifice. Each of them was in Omaha only a few hours, and most of them came to Omaha by airplane in order to appear at the Food Show. All of them were excellent entertainers, and I am very proud of WOW's part in bringing the distinguished group to Omaha, Gillin said.

Mr. Gillin paid high tribute to Miss Martha Bohlsen and Nebraska Power officials, who conducted the all-electric cooking school each afternoon. (See page 3.)




