Demonstration to Start on June 13

Real television will be shown on ten to a dozen different brands of modern television receivers all in the same room at a free Television Preview Show, starting June 13, under sponsorship of the Nebraska-Iowa Electrical Council, in conjunction with WOW-ТÝ.

The Television Preview Show will be conducted in the Greyhound (air conditioned) Bus Depot (second floor) at 18th and Farnam Streets.

Five separate half-hour television shows will be held daily, at 12 noon, 2 p.m., 3:30 p.m., 7:30 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. Admission will be free with tickets

which may be procured from any radio dealer or from Radio Station WOW, Room 280 Insurance Bldg., Omaha (no tickets will be given out by mail). The Television Preview Show will

be opened on Sunday, June 12 with a special show for distributors at 1:30 p.m. Later the same day shows will be held at 3 p.m., 4 p.m. and 5 p.m. for television dealers only.

The Television Preview plan will give prospective set-buyers a chance to see real television programming, on many different types of sets on just one visit to the show.

The programming will be specially produced film material, designed for this particular demonstration. Addi-tionally, filmed programs of sports events, football, relays, etc., will be shown so that the prospective set-buyer will see some of the types of programs he may expect to receive on his set when WOW starts regular television service on September 1.

We dare not interpret freedom to mean license, nor can we flaunt our defiance in the face of Divine law and expect to escape judgment. When it comes to religion, we give everything precedence over it. We think that probably in our old age we will be able to catch up by paying more at-tention to our souls and in that way compensate for present day neglect.

BUT THIS is the hour when we need to hear again the words of the inspired writer when he said, "Today if ye will hear his voice, harden not your heart, as in the provocation." "Now is the accepted time." If we are to make our contribution to the security of tomorrow, we must have God in the center of our lives and programs today.

Plans Made For Three-Nation Tour

WOW's Farm Service Department is planning another great trip for farmers-this one so that the wives can go along!

Set up like last fall's WOW Farm-ers' Trip to Europe, this tour will permit inspection and study of farm projects and activities along the west coast of the United States. It will include brief excursions into both Canada and Mexico.

It will be a 16-day tour in a deluxe special train leaving Omaha about September 15.

Mal Hansen, WOW's Farm Service Director, will lead the group. Lawr-ence Youngman, of Travel and Trans-port, Inc., and Bill Wiseman, WOW's Promotion Manager, will aid Hansen in planning the type of tour of special interest to farmers and their wives. Like the European tour, this trip





Senators, Representatives, administration leaders, and farm organiza-tions are as far apart as the poles when it comes to farm legislation. In fact, they are so far apart that we don't see any hope of a new farm bill during the current congressional session.

NBC Voted High Praise in 'Musical America' Poll

For the third successive year, the National Broadcasting Company has been voted the "network most faithful to the cause of serious music" in the annual poll of "Musical America" mag-azine. Many other awards by NBC artists and programs were won in this sixth annual national poll of 700 music editors and critics, conducted by Miss Quaintance Eaton, associate editor of the magazine.
