

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

TV Boosts All Business

The impact of television on busi-The impact of television on busi-ness, the pocketbook and family life has been phenomenal during 1950. Back in July of 1949 — when WOW-TV telecasting was in its infancy — only 1,892 sets were be-ing used in this area. On Septem-ber 1 of that were reached processor. ber 1 of that year regular programming went to 6,000 sets. Three months later 12,400 sets were in operation, and on December 22 of this year, with network television in full force, the figure was 55,529. There are 249,000 homes within

the area covered by WOW-TV.

Taking the national average of four and six-tenths viewers per set. that means more than 230,000 knobtwisters are watching TV at one time or another in WOW-TV-Land. The investment in TV has totaled

\$18,000,000 in the Omaha area during the past 15 months. And, even if an anticipated manufacturing cutback takes place, estimates point to between 85,000 and 100,000 sets in use by October of 1951. Television in the WOW-TV area

has also been a tremendous boon to business in other lines. Furniture dealers have sold countless davenports, chairs, drapes, lamps, foot-stools and end tables. Food dealers and confectioners have reported tremendous increases in snack materials, candy, potato chips and nuts. Beverage dealers have noted a boom in sales to television families. A national trade paper said popcorn sales were up 70 per cent in tele-vision over non-TV homes.

Incidently, television isn't strictly a city cousin affair. Farm families rate among the top video fans-about 19 per cent of the sets are sold for use on farms. Network shows which started September 30 provided the big boom for television. Of about 80

hours of programming weekly on WOW-TV, 50 are direct, the re-mainder by delayed telecast or film. Sandwiched in with this is between 10 and 15 hours of local program-ming, both live and film. -waw-тv--

A Big Year in WOW-Land The arrival of 1951 will mark the beginning of the second half of the 20th Century. It also marks the end of the first phase of a revolution in the field of entertainment.

With year-end "sets-in-use" fig-ures crowding 60,000, the WOW-TV audience is now well past the quarter of a million figure.

One home in every four in WOW-TV-Land now has a television set. Barring worse - than expected material restrictions there will be 85,000 to 100,000 sets-in-use by next October.

TV viewers in the WOW-TV area now have their choice of viewing more than 200 programs during 150 hours of telecasting every week.

WOW-TV-Land is keeping pace -ahead in fact-of the national television "boom."

Here at a glance is the national picture:

SETS-11,000,000 in use in 65 markets. National audience about 35,000,000 (equal to 21 per cent of the nation's families).

STATIONS-On December 1 there were 107 on the air. More than 360 more are awaiting approval by the FCC after it lifts the "freeze" put on 27 months ago.

PROGRAMS—More than 4,000 sponsors are spending at the rate of \$31,000,000 a year for television programs. Every week the sponsors pay out about \$1,750,000 in talent bills.

NETWORKS — Four in opera-tion, with Omaha the most west-erly city on the "main line." Barring war-time curtailments coast-tocoast service is expected to be started before the end of 1951.

COLOR TV — Tied up in the courts. Subject to defense economy delays. Allen DuMont says its eight years away. Other experts guess two, three, four or five years.
