April 1, 1933 to June 1, 1935



THUMB-NAIL HISTORY WWVA JAMBOREE

B ack in December 1932 the program department of WWVA, in its untiring efforts to serve radio listeners, came to the conclusion that an informal midnight Saturday broadcast should be included in the station's program schedules. Because it is generally accepted that Saturday night is "stay-up" night, it was felt that a late radio show should be light, full of fun and spontaneous.

Such a broadcast was planned and presented to WWVA listeners for the first time on Saturday, January 7, 1933, from 12:00 Midnight to 2:00 A.M. Because of its carefree nature, its hilarious fun, and its informal atmosphere, the name Jamboree was selected. From that very first broadcast it was definitely indicated that the WWVA Jamboree was destined to make radio broadcasting history.

Listener interest in the WWVA Jamboree was immediately reflected in local and long distance telephone calls, requesting musical selections and also permission to attend the studio broadcasts. These requests were granted, until it became a physical impossibility to accomodate the record number of requests that poured in.

After the first month it was necessary, in order to accomodate Jamboree visitors with the limited studio audience facilities, to permit admission by pass only. Passes were secured by mail request. Immediately requests were received in such a large volume that capacity audiences were reserved weeks in advance. Listeners clamored for an opportunity to see as well as hear their favorite WWVA Jamboree entertainers.

In March 1933, arrangements were completed with the management of the Capitol Theatre in Wheeling which made it possible to use that theatre to present the WWVA Jamboree to the public. The first stage presentation was introduced to a capacity crowd on Saturday night, April 1, 1933.

From that first public presentation to the present time, the WWVA Jamboree has enjoyed a success which has no parallel in broadcasting activities. For 366 Saturday nights (to May 1, 1940) it has provided fun, frolic and wholesome entertainment for thousands. Its popularity has grown year by year, until today it is recognized as the "Greatest Show on the Air for a Quarter", and "The Show America Listens to Every Saturday Night".

Each Saturday night — snow, wind, rain or fair — the WWVA Jamboree takes the air, to entertain its countless thousands of friends, from 11:00 P.M. to 2:00 A.M. Only the devastating Ohio Valley floods of 1936 and 1937 have interfered with its schedule, and then only to interrupt its stage presentations to the public. March 21, 28 and April 4, 1936 and January 23, 1937, Ohio Valley flood waters made it necessary to use the Wheeling Market Auditorium to house refugees rather than Jam-(Continued on fourth page over)

boree patrons. But during those trying times the WWVA Jamboree proved the inestimable loyalty of its listeners by raising thousands of dollars for relief work and securing countless truckloads of clothing and food for flood sufferers.

While the last four years have linked the WWVA Jamboree and the Wheeling Market Auditorium in a sort of friendly embrace, other Wheeling auditoriums have played a part in the Jamboree's development. As has been stated, the Jamboree opened at the Capitol Theatre April 1, 1933, where it continued every Saturday night until February 10, 1934. At that time a change in the theatre management made it necessary to move to the Victoria Theatre. Two performances, those of February 10 and 17, were presented from that house. Larger seating facilities were required to accomodate Jamboree patrons, which resulted in a move to the Virginia Theatre on February 24, 1934. The Virginia Theatre was used until May 19, 1934, after which the Jamboree returned to the Capitol Theatre, showing there until February 15, 1936.

Then came the Wheeling Market Auditorium. On February 22, 1936, the WWVA Jamboree showed for the first time in this large civic auditorium. It has continued to serve as a friendly meeting-place for WWVA Jamboree patrons and entertainers ever since.

The largest Jamboree crowd on record assembled at the Wheeling Market Auditorium October 16, 1937, on which date was staged the Fifth WWVA Harvest Home Festival; and the smallest attendance was on hand on January 20, 1940, which date marked a record snow storm for the Valley.

It was not until April 1939, that the WWVA Jamboree made a personal appearance outside of Wheeling. At that time, and as a Sixth Anniversary celebration of the feature, the entire cast was taken on a six-day Good-Will Tour which included the following towns: April 10, Greensburg High School, Greensburg, Pa.; April 11, Memorial Hall, Dover, Ohio; April 12, Georges Township High School, York Run, Penna.; April 13, Marietta College Field House, Marietta, Ohio; April 14, Ben Franklin High School, New Castle, Pa.; and April 16, City Auditorium, Canton, Ohio. The 1940 Good-Will Tour itinerary is listed elsewhere in this booklet.

With but two exceptions, no entertainers other than those appearing regularly on Radio Station WWVA have participated in Jamboree performances. They are Ted Husing and Tito Guizar of the Columbia Broadcasting System staff.

And so, seven years have come and gone for the WWVA Jamboree. They have been seven years packed to overflowing with many happy experiences, highlighted with a listener loyalty and patronage which have made radio broadcasting history from one end of the country to the other.


