### **CHYM TURNS ON 570**

June 21st was the day of "The Great 570 CHYM Turn-On" in Kitchener, Ontario. The event was marked by a luncheon celebration attended by close to 1000 guests at Bingeman Park Lodge.

It was the culmination of years of work by Greatlakes Broadcasting System Limited to locate a new frequency for the station, which previously operated on 1490 kHz. The move was made possible through an agreement with CFOS Owen Sound, which operates on 560 kHz. CFOS acquired a new transmitting plant and a rebroadcaster, CFPS, at Port Elgin on 1490 (1 kw day/250 watts night, omnidirectional), providing greatly improved signals throughout its coverage area.

Construction began two years ago, shortly after CRTC approval of the original plan. (A May 16, 1978, decision by the CRTC granted daytime power increases for CHYM, to 10 kw, and CFOS, to 5 kw.)

CHYM's chief engineer, Paul Firminger, who described the project in the article Shoehorning a Frequency (BET, July/August, 1976) reports that numerous innovative engineering features have been incorporated to maintain the stability of CHYM's DA-1 directional array; and, to cope with the "brown-outs" being forecast for the 1980s by Ontario Hydro, an emergency power generator has been installed with a 1000-gallon fuel tank, capable of operating the transmitter for up to 10 days.

For the stations' technical staff, it's been a gruelling two years: almost 200,000 km were clocked, wearing out two vehicles—and for the final proof alone, over 10,000 miles of travel were required throughout southwestern Ontario and the Georgian Bay area.

BET joins in congratulating CHYM and CFOS on the completion of their new facilities.

Nevertheless, warranties will continue to be honored and a complete spare parts inventory will be available for many years to come.

The discontinuing of the transmitter line is upsetting to David LaFrenais, though, and he is attempting to purchase the rights to build the transmitters, along with the remaining inventory, from AEL, so there will be no disruption in the availability of these transmitters.



#### CFGM-1320/CFTJ-960 PROJECT COMPLETED



Bruce Carnegie, director of engineering at CFGM Richmond Hill, Ont., adjusts night phasing equipment for the station's new 1320 kHz installation. The 50 kw country music station was previously on 1310. Research and development for the change of facilities took some five years, and involved three stations. Actual construction took two years and included a new transmitting plant for CFTJ Cambridge, which moved from 1320 to 960 kHz. To further complicate the project, CFTJ also went through a change of ownership last year.



The new CFGM-1320 array consists of four 400-foot towers for the daytime pattern and nine 250-foot towers for nighttime. The 13 towers are spread over half a mile of countryside in Mississauga, west of Toronto, on the same site as was used for 1310. The logistical challenges in rebuilding the array and changing virtually all the tower locations, while keeping CFGM operating normally, were considerable, Bruce admits, but results are "most worth-while", with coverage from Woodstock-London on the west to Belleville-Kingston on the east.

• Although at the time of this writing most of us are wishing for rain, a few short weeks ago Gene Heinz couldn't get rid of the rainfall at the CFCO Chatham transmitter site. The photo shows water 2 to 3 feet deep within a few feet of his transmitter building. Pumps were running 24 hours a day to control the flood conditions. This year has been the worst ever, Gene claims.



- Remember the violent wind storm a few months ago? Bruce Dingwall of CJJD Hamilton had enough when the roof blew off his transmitter. So he hired some help. Martin Weddum, a former Mohawk student who has spent the last while at Stratford Festival Theatre, joins Bruce and claims he has been bitten by the radio bug: doesn't mind long hours, working at night, having to listen to one station constantly. The purchase includes an MRI SS8600 Custom console with provisions for AM Stereo, four SPIO-MkII turntables, and three ITC 750 reel-to-reel machines. The studio space was expanded and completely renovated shortly after the change of ownership last year. Chief Engineer Larry Keats will have a first-rate facility with the completion of this project.

Accountant—Runs into buildings, recognizes locomotive two out of three times, is issued ammunition, can stay afloat if properly instructed, and talks to water.


Salesman—Falls over door sills when trying to enter building, says "Look at the choo-choo," wets himself with a water pistol, and talks to himself.

# happenings

- Don Lawrie tells us that CKWS Kingston, Ontario, lost two of its six towers on a windy day in April. Fortunately, the station was able to remain on the air, obtaining permission for the use of nighttime pattern on a full-time basis. Apparently the guy anchors came loose on two of three towers installed about 12 years ago. Strangely enough, each of the 170' towers came down independently of the other. (A reminder to other stations check those guy anchors!)
- DOC has proposed three new frequency bands for low-power remote control radio devices: 310-320, 350-360 and 380-400 MHz. Most of these devices have been using 27 MHz, but interference from CB and growing demand make the new bands a necessity. Circular TRC-51 provides full details. Another area of DOC action is home TV games: the department is setting standards to ensure that the games will not interfere with radio and TV reception.
- Hats off to Sony of Canada for its presentation of instructional courses. Among them: the Basic Color TV System seminar (three days), which will be held in Vancouver, September 12-14, and the Advanced TV Production workshop (two days), which will be held in Toronto, September 18-22. For further information contact John Tiltman, national training manager, at (416) 252-3581.
- The Maclean-Hunter Cable TV system in Thunder Bay, Ont., has installed two Ikegami cameras, providing full color capability for both studio and mobile operations. Many residents of the area attended a gala Open House to tour the expanded facilities.

- Rupert Neve of Canada Ltd. recently demonstrated the Lyrec TR 532 Multitrack Recorder. Available in 8, 16 and 24-track models, with remote control, the machine, according to Henning Beck, engineer for the Danish firm, is the result of extensive research among many European recording studios. First sale in North America was by Clary MacDonald to Experience Publishing in Montreal, for a new 24-track studio.
- A 32-mile fibre optics link is being built by Harris Corporation for Alberta Government Telephones. The underground cable, between Calgary and Cheadle, Alta., will cost \$6.6 million and is the longest, highest-capacity optical fibre communications link yet proposed. Its capacity will be 274 million bits of digital information per second. To be completed by fall, 1979, the cable has an expected life span of 20 to 30 years, versus 5-7 years for conventional cable.
- Canada's first radio reading service for the blind is now on the air over CING-FM Burlington, Ont. Receivers are loaned, without charge, by the Oakville Public Library, to receive the SCMO broadcasts.
- Frost & Sullivan, Inc., international market researchers, report that the world market for electronic test and measurement equipment will double by 1985 to \$3.6 billion, from last year's \$1.8 billion. The forecast indicates that use of the microprocessor and IEEE interface bus standard will result in a new generation of custom programmable, automatic test equipment, opening up opportunities for new and smaller manufacturers. In a separate report, the same firm predicts "explosive"

growth for the video cassette recorder (VCR) market, with side benefits for many related industries.

- New studio and office facilities have been completed at Peterborough Cable Television Ltd., providing full color facilities—studio and mobile—for community programming. Equipment includes four Panasonic 2-tube cameras and a Sony 1610 portable camera.
- The first VHCM 15 GHz network in Canada will be in operation shortly in western Ontario. Owned by Grey-Bruce Microwave Services, it will carry four channels, initially, fed from Owen Sound and Walkerton to cable systems in the area. The installation is by DGH Television Systems, Canadian distributor for International Microwave Corporation. It will include use of Scientific Atlanta's 6350 modulators, new SAW filters and 6250 demodulators, which are now to be standard equipment in microwave systems supplied by DGH in Canada.
- CKND-TV Winnipeg recently originated a three-part program, Open House Canada. The series had visiting high school students from Newfoundland and Quebec discussing mutual interests with their Winnipeg counterparts.
- A \$6 million expansion of the Philco-Ford electronics plant at Don Mills, Ont., creating 300 new jobs, will be devoted to production of a new-design AM/FM stereo radio and tape player. The new radio replaces the old slide-rule dial, projecting knobs, and pushbuttons with an electronic digital display of AM or FM frequency,

rocker switches and slides, and "memory" touchbuttons. Ford says this electronic radio represents the first major style change in car radios since pushbutton tuning, 40 years ago. Now, a quartz-crystal will fine tune the receiver to a station's exact frequency.

- Pat Hurley, after nearly 13 years with the folks at the Standard Broadcasting, leaves St. Clair Productions on August 31 for his own syndication company, P. J. Hurley Inc. With partners David Hammond and Paul Williams, PJH will market some of the productions coming out of St. Clair, where Rick Loth takes over sales.
- ABC-TV in Hollywood are now using two Canadian-made 12-channel portable mixing boards for mobile operations such as the PGA golf tournaments. Supplied by Richmond Sound Design Ltd. of Vancouver, the M8S-B was selected for its gain and headroom, among other features.

- Yvonne C. Brill has been appointed manager of the NOVA Propulsion program at RCA, Princeton, NJ. A native of Winnipeg, Mrs. Brill will be responsible for onboard propulsion systems and launch operations of the program, which includes three navigation satillites being built for the U.S. Navy.
- This summers' Good News reporters on CFRB Toronto are Paul Allen, Conestoga College; Brenda Finley, Queen's University; Bob Aykler, Ryerson; and Debbie Walker, University of Guelph.
- Avcor Audio/Visual Corp., now 50% owned by Southam Business Publications Ltd., has taken over the AV Activities of Southam's Videotel division.
- Canadian Robert F. Black of Eddie Black's Ltd., Don Mills, is now vice-chairman of the Photo Marketing Association. Succeeding Black as national chairman for Canada is Ian Greenberg of Astral Bellevue Pathe Ltd., Montreal.
- The newest development in audio recording and reproduction is the Philips of the Netherlands Compact Disc—expected to be on the market in the early 1980s.
   Sound information is recorded digitally, with a 14-bit linear pulse coded modulation encoding system, on single-sided discs having one hour (stereo) playing time. It is

- played back *optically*, by means of a diode laser mounted in a pick-up arm. As there is no physical contact, the disc can remain sealed, eliminating problems such as dust, scratches and rumble.
- CHLO St. Thomas recently celebrated its 30th anniversary with a week-long series of events in southwestern Ontario.
- Some interesting facts on CB radio: In 20 years, close to 13 million CB radios have been licensed in the U.S., with probably 30 million, costing over \$3 billions, actually in use; last year alone, the FCC received nearly 5 million applications; one out of every eight vehicles is now equipped with two-way radio, and this will become one out of every four by the early 1980s.
- RCA is looking for a buyer for its recordprocessing plant, which employs 290 at Smiths Falls, Ont. The company has decided that automation of the plant is impractical and plans to have other Canadian plants handle its record manufacturing, effective in 1979. The question is "who?" We understand that the other manufacturers—pardon the pun—are already hardpressed...
- The 1978 Canadian Education Showplace has been cancelled. The 14-year-old trade show is "indefinitely postponed until market conditions improve".



A comprehensive studio and mobile facility was recently supplied and installed for Shell-bird Cable Ltd., by DGH Television Systems Ltd. The local origination facility is for both color and monochrome production, and includes post production capability. Shell-bird, which serves the Corner Brook, Nfld., area, became operational early this year.

(As all government departments have a permanent postal code, the CRTC's remains K1A 0N2.) The new telephone number for Information Services is 997-0313.

#### CRTC APPOINTMENTS

Communications minister Mme Jeanne Sauvé has announced the following appointments:

- Paul H. Klingle, an Alberta lawyer, as full-time commissioner (7 years);
- Steve Patrick, Winnipeg real estate/insurance agent, former football player and Manitoba Liberal MLA, as part-time commissioner (5 years);
- Mrs. Rosalie Gower, of Vernon, B.C., and Harry Bower, of Regina, as part-time commissioners (5-year renewals).

The term of part-time commissioner **Brian Land**, of Toronto, was also renewed for 5 years, however Land has since resigned to become director of the Ontario legislative library, research and information services, effective September 1.

#### "PIRATES" LEAD TO LAKEHEAD HEARING

David Brough decided to go into the broadcasting business. He put a number of lower power TV transmitters on the air in Northern Ontario, feeding video-taped programs to communities that previously had little or no TV service.

Unfortunately, Brough neglected to obtain licences from the CRTC before launching these enterprises. Earlier this year he began making up for this deficiency, with submissions for 24 locations—including Kenora, Fort Frances, Dryden, Sioux Lookout, Geraldton, Wawa and Moosonee, in Ontario, as well as locations in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories—where he either had started or planned operations.

Alas, the CRTC, getting wind of several other projects which Brough had neglected to mention, remained unimpressed. The proposals are deficient, it says, in many fundamental respects—for example:

- copyright on program material;
- reliability of equipment, details of its ownership and arrangements for its operation;
- · financial stability;
- · Canadian content quotas;
- future use of scrambled signals, making the service, in effect, Pay TV.

In declining to issue licences to Brough, the CRTC called for applications to provide services to remote areas of Northern Ontario, to be heard on October 17-18, 1978 at the Airlane Hotel, 698 West Arthur Street, Thunder Bay, Ont. Deadline for applications or comments is August 1.

#### **DECISIONS**

#### AM/FM Radio

#### NEW AM FOR VERNON

Gilway Enterprises Ltd. are the successful bidders for a new radio station at Vernon, B.C. It will operate on 1050 kHz with 10 kw (day), 1 kw (night).

Denied were competing applications by Sun Country Radio (AM and FM), Dennis J. Gerein (AM) and Interior Broadcasters (FM).

While all of the proposals were judged sound, Gilway won points for local ownership and support, and its plans for local news and community access programming.

#### KAMLOOPS: FM YES; AM NO

Two new FM stations have been licensed at Kamloops, B.C.—NL Broadcasters (CHNL), 4.3 kw on 97.5 MHz; and a CBC French rebroadcaster, 4.75 kw on 96.5 KHz. The CBC is to employ a local news correspondent.

Two applicants for AM at Kamloops were given denials: Joe Chesney and The King's Men, both for 910 kHz.

#### ST. ALBERT APPROVED

A new AM station has been licensed at St. Albert, Alberta, 10 kw day and night on 1070 kHz.

St. Albert Broadcasting Ltd. proposed local information and cultural services not presently available and a "distinctive alternative" in programming.

#### TRENTON OK FOR CJBO

Quinte Broadcasting (CJBQ), Belleville, Ont. has been licensed for a station in nearby Trenton, 1 kw on 1270 kHz. While the station is to be identified with Trenton, initially 40% of the programming will be rebroadcast from CJBQ.

#### AM denials include:

- Grande Prairie, Alta. (Pioneer Broadcasting)—while application had merit, new station would adversely effect existing stations in Grande Prairie and Peace River.
- Walkerton/Hanover, Ont. (Paul A. Webb)—application failed to demonstrate real knowledge of area, financial viability.

#### NEW FMs LICENSED

----

• Final approval has been given for **Radio Fanshawe Inc.** to operate a non-commercial FM station in London, Ont., on 106.9 MHz with 3 kw power. (The proposal had been approved in principle on October 6, 1976.)

To be operated in conjunction with Fanshawe's course in Broadcast Arts, the station will initially be on the air 117½ hours weekly from mid-September to mid-April, eventually expanding to a year-round schedule. It will be under the control of an 11-man board representing the college and community.

 An FM stereo station licensed to the CBC at Saskatoon, will operate on 105.5 MHz with a power of 98 kw.

Other new CBC rebroadcasters:
Marystown, Nfld., 100 kw on 90.3 MHz,
Aiyansh, B.C., 278 watts on 102.3,
Kitimat, B.C., 160 watts on 105.1 (Fr.)
Terrace, B.C., 95.3 (Eng.) and 96.9 (Fr.),

- ●Twin Cities Radio has been granted a power increase from 3.9 to 4.3 kw for CFFM Kamloops, B.C., and licences for two rebroadcasters at Chase (140 watts on 93.1) and Pritchard (19 watts on 106.3).
- A 15-watt rebroadcaster of CJOB Winnipeg has been approved at Limestone, Man. Licensed to G. H. Shapera, it will operate on 96.1 MHz.

#### COMMUNITY FM

Approval has been given to a new community station at Rouyn-Noranda, Quebec, 4.8 kw on 88.7 MHz.

Radio Communautaire de Rouyn-Noranda is described as "a democratically controlled instrument of education, information and entertainment". Revenue will come from listeners' donations, sample statements of sponsorship and classified advertising. The CRTC called on the licensee to increase proposed verbal content, with less music, to ensure interest and participation by the audience.

Meanwhile, the licence of a similar station has been revoked. **CHUT-FM** Chicoutimi, ceased operation on October 14, 1977; a rebroadcaster at Chambord, Quebec, never went on the air. Members voted to liquidate the corporation and surrender the licences, following sustained financial problems.

Another station, CFRO-FM Vancouver, has met with greater success. In renewing its licence to 1983, the CRTC commended CFRO for providing "a valuable alternative".

#### POWER INCREASES

- CJDV Drumheller, Alta., to 10 kw (night).
- CJSL Estevan, Sask., to 10 kw (previous deferred pending agreement with CJME Regina, which has now been reached).

- CFAN Newcastle, N.B., to 5 kw (day).

 CJCW Sussex, N.B., to 1 kw (day), with proviso that CJCW relinquishes its right to interference protection in Nova Scotia should CKCL Truro (adjacent frequency of 600 kHz) increase power in future.

The application would have placed CJET under the control of a board of directors for over 5 years, until the sole beneficiary of the estate, J. W. Pollie's nephew, John Hugh Colton, reaches 25 years of age. The CRTC rejected the proposal as not in the public interest, and renewed CJET's licence to March 31, 1979, so that alternate proposals may be submitted.
- Approved: CJBR Radio/TV Ltée, Rimouski, Quebec—Acquisition by CBC.
- Approved: Radio des Plaines Ltée (CKRV Drummondville)—transfer to P. Germain, M. Bourget and G. Leblanc.

- In renewing CKLW Windsor, Ont., for a full 5-year term, the CRTC called for a progress report within one year on further improvements in the presentation of Canadian news and public affairs, in the development of Canadian musical talent and in the scheduling of Canadian recordings throughout the 6 a.m. to midnight period.
- In renewing several CBC licences in British Columbia, the CRTC noted that 80% of the province's French population would be receiving French radio service by mid-1979.
- In short-term renewals for CFMS-FM Victoria, B.C., and CHEC-FM Lethbridge, Alta., the CRTC called for improvements during the coming year.

### PERFORMANCE OF WESTERN STATIONS TO BE REVIEWED

In renewing the licences of a number of western Canadian television stations, the CRTC has ordered improvements in their programming and service:

- •CITV-TV Edmonton renewed for only 18 months, received the sharpest warning. The CRTC said that "CITV has failed to provide the essentially local service for which it was licensed and has failed to meet many of its major commitments." The Commission directed CITV to meet its original commitments to local production or risk non-renewal of licence.
- CFCN-TV Calgary and CFRN-TV Edmonton, renewed for full 5-year terms, are to submit new Promises of Performance by March, 1979.
- A major technical problem will be solved for CJDC-TV Dawson Creek, B.C., when the CBC provides a microwave feed via Prince George, along with other technical assistance. The station was urged to improve standards, especially in the on-air presentation of news.
- The Commission suggested that CJOC-TV Lethbridge, Alta., re-instate its late evening local news.
- CBWFT Winnipeg, now producing 4½ hours weekly of local programming, plans to add 3 more hours over the next 3 years.
   Additional rebroadcasters in Manitoba will extend CBC French service to over 90% of the province's French population by 1980.
- CKY-TV Winnipeg was commended for its local service to both Winnipeg and the communities served by its rebroadcasters, and for its co-production efforts with Winnipeg Videon (Cable TV).
- CKND-TV Winnipeg, renewed for a 3year term, is to submit a new Promise of Performance by March, 1979. The CRTC expects CKND-TV to produce 24 hours a week of local programming (its original plan of 33½ hours was termed "unrealistic") and to follow through on extension of service to the Interlake and Dauphin areas.

- Transfer of CKTM-TV Trois-Rivieres, Que., from COGECO Inc. to its whollyowned subsidiary, Television St-Maurice (1976) Inc., approved.
- Licence for CHEK-TV-5 Campbell River, B.C., owned by British Columbia Television, revoked. Operation ceased last fall, for technical reasons.

#### Cable Television

#### CDN. RE-RUNS APPROVED

Rogers Cable TV, Toronto, has received CRTC approval for its plan to rerun Canadian TV shows on local origination channels.

However, it is conditional on satisfactory arrangements being made with the Toronto stations and other holders of program rights—something Rogers has not yet been able to achieve. The plan would have set aside a cable channel for each local station's reruns. A proposal for part-time carriage of FM signals on the same channels was withdrawn when consent of the FM stations was not received.

#### DUPLICATION DENIED

In recent decisions, the CRTC has stated that three commercial U.S. signals will as a rule, be the maximum allowed in the future. Similarly, requests for carriage of signals which duplicate a network service already carried are being denied.
