

## **BROADCAST BEAT**

The CRTC denied Allarco Broadcasting's bid to buy CKO All-News Radio, saying they were not amenable to the changes contemplated by Allarco . . . Alain Gourd, vicechairman of the CAB, was made president of Mutual Broadcasting Ltd., and vice-president, radio, Civitas Corporation Ltd., by Ed Prévost . . . A survey conducted for the CRTC revealed that only 14% of all cable viewers would be "very likely" to subscribe to pay-TV if the system came to Canada. About three-quarters of those surveyed said they would not pay an additional \$9 a month (over and above the present \$7 average spent for basic cable service). So, whereas the CRTC had felt that dealing with pay-TV introduction had been a matter of urgency, John Meisel now says "there's no major stampede for pay-TV services in Canada" . . . Did you know that Home Box Office, a unit of Time Inc., is the largest U.S. pay-TV operator, with almost 5 million subscribers-second is Showtime, a joint operation of Teleprompter Corporation and Viacom International Inc., with 2.5 million . . .

The purchase of CKFH increases Telemedia's Ontario holdings to six AMs and two FMs, in addition to its stations in Quebec . . . Peter Green, president of Andres Wines is not exactly a fan of Alberta TV station rate cards: he says costs of advertising Andres products, particularly in Alberta "have gone through the roof" and the company is considering more print ads or public relations to sell its vinos . . . Erna Cava**nagh** is now v.p., research director, at Leo Burnett Company Ltd . . . A lot of teenagers who don't go job hunting this summer hope their parents will make allowances . . . The January, 1981, Atlantic Magazine article, The Rise of the Newsocracy by Louis Banks takes issue with the press-print, radio and TV-becoming the arbiter of North American life. Banks says the values of the media are not always the values of the society they serve. Good stuff here. (Atlantic Magazine is at 8 Burlington Street, Boston, Mass. 02116; price per copy, \$1.95 U.S.) . . .

Robert G. Graham, chairman of the Winnipeg Jets Hockey Club and holder of many other directorates, became a director of Moffat Communications Ltd . . . Friends are still congratulating Tak Negoro on becoming v.p. engineering, at British Columbia Television. Ernie Rose, the man Tak succeeded, has been around broadcasting for 45 years and served the industry with great distinction . . . Some readers might recall Curly Morrison, the former pro football player and sportscaster. He's back home in the U.S. and would now make an excellent contestant for What's My Line? It is highly unlikely that even the most astute panelist could guess Curley's current career: he owns and operates a cemetery! . . . Pierre Duhaime, who was v.p. & g.m. of CFCM-TV/CKMI-TV Quebec City, is now executive v.p. & g.m. of the parent Tele-Capital Enterprises Ltd . . . Same company also promoted long-time staffers Gilles Gregoire to v.p. & g.m. of CFCM/CKMI, and Paul Leclerc to commercial director...

Graeme Fraser, a major figure at Crawley Films for many years and author of a witty, widely-read newsletter, asks: "Why can't we slow down inflation by putting the Post Office in charge of it?" . . . Andy McDermott, in his chatty Broadcast Executive Society newsletter column, picked up that apocryphal story that the call letters of CKTB St. Catharines stood for "Canadians Know Their Beer". Not so, says Bob Reinhart-the letters TB do go back to the original licensee, a local brewery called Taylor & Bates. All Canadian stations must use an initial C, and there was no particular significance in the use of K for the second letter (private stations can use F, H, I, J or K). Also, the St. Catharines Taylor had no connection with **E. P. Taylor**, the Canadian Breweries magnate . . . Les McMahon was appointed chairman of D'Arcy-MacManus & Masius Advertising Ltd. in Canada with Jack Prince president and chief operating officer . . . We'd like to pass out bouquets to Larry Heywood and Len Moore. Larry, v.p., creative services, for the Radio Bureau of Canada, was always a tower of strength when this writer ran the Radio Broadcasting course at Humber College. We asked him if he'd guest lecture for the students in the Human Communications course at York University and he readily agreed and did a superb job. (We're taking that course on a part-time pathway to a BA degree.) Len, president of the Television Bureau of Canada and the subject of the Phil Stone Report in BT's January/February issue, helped us out by giving a presentation to the broadcasting students at Conestoga College, where we are teaching one morning a week for the ebullient Gary Parkhill, filling in for Gord Hume who moved to London as manager of CKSL . . .

Congratulations to the Canadian Cable Television Association for the workshops it was enterprising enough to give on Pay-TV. They were geared to people working the financial, technical or marketing side. Also the CCTA rates applause for its support of the 1981 International Year of Disabled Persons . . . Peter Coleman who had been afternoon-drive news/sports reporter at CKFM, became news and public affairs director for its sister station in Montreal, CJFM-FM (FM 96) . . . Standard's two new transmitters should be fully operative by the time you read this. In Betty Abrams words: "super hi-fi, here we come!" . . . After his years at CKEY, Gene Kirby is handling a two hour Big Band program Saturday nights from 7 to 9 on 'RB . . .

Don Luzzi who rose from g.s.m. to g.m. at CHML/CKDS-FM Hamilton, is now also president of Radio ML Ltd., a Western Broadcasting Company . . . Michael H. Koskie was appointed v.p., administration, of the Vibco group while Paul C. Carder was appointed v.p. and managing director of V&B . . . There is not much difference between 30-second and

60-second TV spots in terms of over-all impact, durability and conviction as judged by target groups surveyed by Elliott Research Corp. Ltd. As discussed in Report on Business, Elliott used data from 800 case studies as its base. These were target groups at which specific ads were aimed. In an Elliott newsletter it was reported that "TV works almost as hard in 30 seconds as it does in 60 seconds in areas other than informativeness." In other words, one assumes, a 30-second spot is more durable and repeatable but in certain instances cannot carry all the information the sponsor might desire in detail . . . Quote from Jim Coleman: "Don't be surprised if there are some new faces on the television crews for CFL games in the coming season." . . . Terry Kielty who heads up CFRA/CFMO and Ottawa Rough Riders is initial chairman of the Canadian Football League's recently created board of governors . . . The CFL allocation has 36 games on CTV, 33 on CBC, with the first telecast July 10 from Montreal.

Al Johnson, CBC president, told the Broadcast Executives Society that the assertion that Canadians do not want and will not watch Canadian television programs is, quote, "an unverified piece of conventional wisdom—an old wive's tale". While Canadians spend some 75% of their viewing time watching U.S. shows, Johnson claims the time Canadians spend watching Canadian shows is in proportion to the amount of Canadian shows available . . . R. Scott Colbran is now v.p., corporate development at Maclean Hunter Cable TV Ltd. He's had a strong hand in MH's acquisition of U.S. franchises during the past two years . . . Radio-Canada has appointed Clement Gaudreau to Network TV sales rep, while Jacques Carpentier is National Selective TV sales rep . . . Bernard DiMatteo became president of CBS Records Canada Ltd . . . Selkirk Communications appears to be on the way to a billion-dollar year: 1980 gross was \$93 million, up from \$81.6 billion in 1979 . . . A 30-second spot on the 1981 World Series will cost \$150,000—last year's tab was \$125,000

Rhonda Taylor went from All-Canada, where she had been a National TV rep, to CFRB as a Retail rep... Brenda Burns has succeeded one of our former students, copy director Peter Henderson, as president of the 'RB Staff Committee... Good to learn that RPM Magazine was revitalized—Walt Grealis put too much into it to have it go down the drain...

CJAD and FM-96 in Montreal revelling in brand new quarters replete with outstanding new facilities . . . It is expected that the Federal Government will spend some \$62 million on advertising in 1981-2 and that about parallels the previous fiscal year . . . That familiar Datsun dealer in Bracebridge, Ontario, is John Enright, once of CFRB . . . Kim Hesketh, Bob's son, became the first radio representative to become president of the B.C. Legislature Press Gallery . . . Kudos to Wayne Van Exan of CFRB who was selected as Volunteer of the Year by the Oakville Association for the Mentally Retarded . . . It's expected that newspaper rates this year will increase more than those for TV but less than radio and magazines . . . Bill Deegan racked up his 25th year in radio recently and is now eligible for the CAB Quarter-Century Club . . .

Obits: Like many, we were intensely saddened by the passing of Joe (Joe-Joe) Crysdale; he was a symbol of the ingenuity and skill of early broadcasters . . . And the industry lost one of its pioneers when Jack Davidson died this winter in Winnipeg at age 69—he was a stalwart in the early development of Northern Broadcasting . . . Many knew and admired Wib Perry, a multi-talented man who made his mark in varied fields of creativity and whose passing brought back memories of many former associations . . . His association with the CBC is what most recall about the late John Fisher's monumental career: little known is the fact that he started in radio with a private station, CHNS Halifax . . .

Bob Quinn of RTvR (Radio-Television Representatives Limited) agrees that Andy McDermott was the first independent rep in Canada but writes us to say that as a matter of record he "is not the last or only independent rep house in the country." RTvR, Bob claims, is not only independent by any definition but in broadcast billings "is the largest independent"... Jay Nelson, still with the CHUM organization, is serving as weatherman on CITY-TV News... Many a station manager learns to his dismay that the closest the new copy person came to being a good writer was when he wrote his resume...

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## in the news

#### TELEMEDIA ONTARIO PLANS FOCUS ON CJCL TORONTO

Following CRTC approval of the purchase of CKCH Toronto—established in 1951 by Foster Hewitt—Telemedia Ontario has undertaken extensive changes at the station, now the flagship for the company's recently-acquired group of eight radio stations in the province.

The Toronto station is now CJCL Metro 1430. Its format remains basically MOR and a strong sports orientation will continue, aimed at the 25-49 age group. In keeping with Telemedia's commitments to the CRTC, the news staff is being increased from 5 to 14, and Toronto will provide a news feed four times daily to the other Ontario stations, while also exchanging news with Telemedia's Quebec network of French-language stations. A budget of \$50,000 is to be allotted to develop Canadian musical talent over the next five years.

Some of the CJCL personnel include: Larry Silver, news director, formerly of CKSL London; air personality Andy Barrie, formerly of CJAD Montreal and CFRB Toronto, who will be heard 9:15 am—12:15 noon daily; Mark Hebscher, formerly of CJFM Montreal, whose early evening sports talk show will precede coverage of live sports events; music director Connie Sinclair, formerly of CFTR Toronto and CJBK London: Iim Fonger, production director; and Jean-Marie Heimrath, who comes from the recording industry to handle publicity and promotion. Newly-appointed sales manager is Peter Emerson, and Gerry Wilson continues in charge of engineering.

Studios will remain at 464 Yonge Street at Grenville, with the old facilities gradually being phased out and replaced in larger quarters.

Meanwhile, Telemedia Ontario has announced a Canadian talent series, "Discovery 81", to begin July 1. Twelve productions a year will introduce new talent, with the programs later being offered to stations across Canada through the CAB Program Exchange.

Telemedia, which now claims to be the world's largest privately-owned broadcast group, is controlled by Philippe de Gaspé Beaubien. President of the Ontario group—which includes CFCH/CKAT-FM North Bay, CFOR Orillia, CKMP Midland, CJCS Stratford, and CKGB/CFTI Timmins—is John Van de Kamer; Leslie Sole is v.p., programming and Gary Hooper is in charge of engineering.

#### AM BID FOR NORTH BAY

A North Bay, Ontario, group has announced that it will apply for a second commercial AM radio station for the community, presently served by Telemedia-owned CFCH and CKAT-FM.

President of the company, Gateway City Broadcasters, is Sid Tomkins, active in local politics and broadcasting over the past 25 years, and more recently, in broadcast education at Canadore College.

# DECISIONS AM RADIO DINOSAURS TO BE CHUM'S

The purchase of a 69.3% interest in Dinosaur Broadcasting (CJDV Drumheller,

CKBR Brooks and CHOA Stettler, Alberta) by CHUM Ltd. has been approved by the CRTC.

S.J. Solberg will retain a 29.8% interest and remain as general manager for at least two years. CHUM Ltd. has allocated \$350,000 for new equipment, studio renovations, and a power increase for CJDV, which already puts a receivable signal into Calgary. There will also be emphasis on production of local country music shows and expansion of regional news services.

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

#### FM APPROVALS INCLUDE TWO FOR REGINA

Applications for two new FM stations at Regina have won CRTC approval.

Midwest Broadcasters (CJME) will operate with 100 kw on 98.9 with a contemporary MOR format. The station will spend \$30,000 a year to produce live concerts, in an exchange plan with other western FM stations, and will play 25% Canadian music content.

Armadale Communications (CKCK) also applied for 100 kw on 98.9 and will have to find another frequency acceptable to DOC. The format will be easy listening, and at least \$80,000 a year will support Canadian talent, including live concerts "from classical to jazz" to be produced in collaboration with the University of Regina.

In reply to an intervention by the CBC on both applications, the CRTC notes that other channels are available for CBC use.

Squamish, B.C.—Application by Mountain 99 Broadcasting Ltd. approved for 2,400 watts on 104.9, with rebroadcasters at Pemberton (46.4 w. on 104.5) and Whistler (380 w. on 102.1). Mobile facilities are to be provided, with permanent studios eventually to be established, at Whistler. A budget of \$4,000 a year will finance live concerts.

Denied was a competing application by Whistler Communications Corp. for stations at Whistler, Garibaldi and Pemberton.

 Selkirk, Man.—Application by Denis L. Cloutier for 7 kw on 92.9 approved; easy listening format.

#### RENEWAL DENIED FOR THOMPSON, MAN. SYSTEM

The CRTC has refused to renew the cable licence of CESM-TV Ltd., Thompson, Man.

In operation since 1961, CESM-TV was licensed in 1970. In 1973, 600 residents signed a complaint and a CRTC inspection indicated service to be below minimal standards. Despite three short-term renewals. the system continued to fall short of CRTC requirements and DOC technical standards. At a hearing in Regina last December, nine interventions, including a petition signed by nearly 2,000 residents, all opposed renewal, and a Thompson alderman stated that the citizens were prepared to do without any service, if necessary, to get a new operator ... "we will put up with that, knowing what you will give us next time couldn't possibly be any worse than what we have now."

The Commission is issuing a call for applications.
