## stations in the news-

#### CJCH GOES STEREO

On October 11, CJCH Halifax joined the growing list of Canadian AM stations broadcasting in stereo—the first in Atlantic Canada. Chief engineer Walter Labucki said CJCH chose the Kahn/Hazeltine independent sideband system after in-depth testing and research. Promotion includes giving away Sony SRF-A100 AM Stereo receivers. Even in mono, the station's sound is said to be brighter, with greater fidelity and dynamic range. (Most stations testing AM Stereo have experienced similar improvements in sound quality.)

#### MORNING NEWS SHOW ON CFPL-TV

An hour-long morning news show began on CFPL-TV London, September 19, 7:30-8:30 am. FYI—First Edition is hosted by newscaster Molly Connors, Jim Swan on weather and sports, and Michelle Dash, who, along with Swan, handles interviews and features. Producer is Carol Campbell, with Darrell MacInnis as associate producer, news. Dennis Kalichuk reports that 'as far as we know, CFPL-TV is the only private station in Canada doing a show of this type without network assistance'.

#### CITY SEEKS FOUR MORE TXs

CITY-TV Toronto has applied to the CRTC to expand its viewing area to western Ontario. Four transmitters would be built, as a cost of \$2.5 million, in:

- Woodstock (8,831w, channel 31)
- Brantford (4,379w, channel 34)
- St. Thomas (4,973w, channel 64), and
- Stratford (4,832w, channel 44).

A further bid for channel 60 in Ottawa was planned but has now been shelved.

General manager Dennis Fitzgerald says CITY, licensed as a distinctly local service for Toronto, has been successful in other areas, when carried on cable TV. The station wants to expand its coverage, but would not change its programming.

Engineering director Ron Reid told BT that CITY had opted for four lower-power transmitters in its application, in preference to a single high-power plant, for reasons of economy and reliability. The plan calls for a 1 kw transmitter at Woodstock, with totally solid-state 500w translators in the other locations.

#### CHSK: NEW CALL IN SASKATOON

CJUS-FM, the University of Saskatchewan station, has changed its call letters to CHSK-FM. The station also plans to expand coverage via cable systems and to obtain CRTC permission to broadcast sponsored messages.

#### ANOTHER FRENCH TV NETWORK?

Following an announcement by the Department of Communications that \$75,000 would be spent to study the feasibility of a second private French TV network, Cogeco Corp. of Trois-Rivières said it may be interested in starting such a network. Cogeco owns the two television stations in Trois-Rivières.

#### TVO TVRO USERS' GUIDEBOOK

TVOntario has prepared a guidebook for users of TVROs (satellite-receive only dishes), entitled Solutions to Satellite Receiving Problems.

Director of engineering Bruce M. Read told BT that the book is based on a series of programs developed by TVO to run on a Tl-59 programmable calculator. The programs are 'broadcast oriented' to the extent that they deal primarily with 12 GHz (Ku band) examples and provide guidance on the performance margins required for this band. 'The programs used to determine the precise times of Spring and Fall sun outages are, we believe, unique, in that they permit this somewhat complex computation to be performed on a desk-top machine.'

#### **ABC PREPARES FOR OLYMPICS**

ABC Radio reports it has shipped 'an arsenal of technical equipment' to Sara-

jevo in Yugoslavia for coverage of the 1984 Winter Olympics. Kent Coughlin, vp of engineering, says it will be 'the most demanding remote' ever tackled by ABC Radio, which will use six production areas at the broadcast center, and also take along two specially-designed studios. A technical operations center consisting of five equipment racks and interconnect frame will allow immediate access to all six remote studios and all venues, plus feeds to New York. The audio routing switcher distributes 100 separate inputs.

The Winter Olympics will be the proving ground for a new two-way communications system, also to be used for the Democratic National Convention in San Francisco, the Summer Olympics in Los Angeles, and the Republican National Convention in Dallas—all occurring within a few weeks in July and August.

#### Other stations in the news:

- Unionized employees of Atlantic TV voted to accept a two-year contract with increases of 10.5% in the first year and 5% in the second year.
- The Film Council of Greater Columbus, Ohio, has presented an award for excellence to CKND-TV Winnipeg for its TV dramas, Reunion and Hunting Season.
- CJAD Montreal has launched its own magazine, The New Montrealer, which it hopes to publish quarterly. Distribution of 200,000 is primarily through the Gazette.
- On a more modest scale, CHWK Chilliwack published a 20-page tabloid which it distributed throughout its listening area to promote the station and local events.
- CHFI Toronto will co-sponsor the Canadian Management Film Festival and Training Forum '84, March 27-29, at the Sheraton Centre, Toronto.
- What's new, DAD? Digital Album Delivery—whereby newly released rock albums are broadcast via satellite in their entirety to affiliates of ABC Radio.

- CJRW Summerside, PEI, 35 on Nov.
   17. Manager Paul Schurman hopes for a power increase to 1 kw soon; and

#### State of the Art Studios for London's CKSL

On August 29, 1983, CKSL moved into modern new studios at the City Centre complex in London, Ontario.

Among the most up-to-date in North America, the impressive facilities are part of a \$1.5 million investment by CKSL and City Centre (London) Ltd., who purchased the former CKSL building at 343 Richmond, where the station had been located since its inception in 1956. (The official opening ceremonies on September 13 included a symbolic 'smashing' of CKSL's old image, represented by a model of the elevator at 343—notorious for its labored performance...)

CKSL's principals, Captain Joseph Jeffrey and Vincent Regan, credit the late Roy Thomson, who made his early fortunes in Ontario broadcasting, with suggesting that London was ready for a second AM station. CKSL went on the air June 24, 1956, with a power of 5 kw on 1290 kHz, and in September, 1964, moved to 1410, increasing power to 10 kw. The first general manager was Lyman Potts, and Bob McAdorey was the first morning man. Also with CKSL from the start was director of engineering Bill Post.

Today, a staff of 40 is headed by Gord Hume, vice-president and general manager, who praises Bill Post and his assistant, John Gribbon, for a 'superlative' job in installing the new equipment on schedule, and on budget, in less than four months.


CKSL occupies 8200 square feet of space, located on the mezzanine level at City Centre, an office and shopping complex which includes Holiday Inn's 'flagship' hotel in Canada. Planning involved all departments and personnel. First, engineering developed the studio design, which includes four recording/production studios, and five 'talk' studios. Then the plan for the rest of the station was swiftly drawn in, approved by management, and turned over to the architects.

The choice of equipment was largely influenced by CKSL's experience with the original equipment from McCurdy Radio Industries—installed by then chief engineer Ron Turnpenny and Bill Post in 1956. After consideration, it became apparent that McCurdy still made the kind of contemporary, reliable and efficient equipment desired, and McCurdy sales manager Jon Young put together the appropriate package.

Hume says the move gave CKSL the opportunity to become one of the most technically-advanced radio operations in Canada. State-of-the-art facilities include:

- a sophisticated 2-way radio system that provides for paging, increased range for live news reports, and direct aircraft or marine reports;
- · a UHF link for remotes, making telephone lines unnecessary;
- · emergency studio-transmitter link;
- nine Studer tape recorders;
- two McCurdy consoles, providing the equivalent of 40-channel recording studio capability;
- provision for conversion to AM Stereo; and
- a totally integrated news operation.

A new 10 kw Harris transmitter was installed last year. (See Ad Lib! for photos of opening ceremonies.)

#### CENTRE DE PRODUCTION ROLLING IN QUEBEC CITY

Québec City's Centre de Production Télé-Capitale Ltée has been completed and with over \$1 million in orders, expects to meet an ever-increasing demand for commercial production in the eastern part of the province. Construction of the facility began June 15, 1982; initially planned for 22,000 square feet, it was expanded to 35,000. The \$4 million project was the subject of a Broadcast Technology cover story in September/October 1982, which provided full details of the facilities. In addition, a mobile unit is available for outside production.

The launching of CFIN-FM Coaticook, Québec, in October, marked the culmination of five years of determined effort by Clément De Laat, now manager of CFIN.

It was in 1978 that De Laat began his quest for a local station to serve this area of L'Estrie (the Eastern Townships), until then dominated by nearby U.S. radio stations which, naturally, lacked interest in catering to the audience in southern Quebec. It was soon discovered that the FM frequency of 104.5 MHz was reserved for Coaticook.

In 1979, another resident of the region, Michael Dougherty, teamed up with De Laat, bringing his experience in electronics and communications. This association was the starting point in applying for a licence from the Canadian Radiotelevision and Telecommunications Commission. Interest from the community was enthusiastic, as De Laat and Dougherty prepared their case: incorporation, studies of the market and listening habits, and a technical study based on 710 watts with Mont Tanguay as the transmitter site.

Support was also enlisted from the various levels of government and organizations in the region, and two significant agreements became part of the plan: one provided for free use of a tower

and site for 99 years from a local communications firm, in exchange for free publicity, while a second agreement with the town provided for free use of two rooms for two years.

The application was filed in the autumn of 1980 and went to a public hearing in June, 1981. A delegation of six from Coaticook FM Inc. was questioned for two hours. Four months later, the answer came: the CRTC had not been convinced that the project was realistic, and the application was denied.

Undaunted, the organizers began work on a second application. De Laat recalls: 'This time the approach would be quite different. First, the new station would have a completely new format, country & western, the first on FM in Quebec. Second, the investment would be smaller and more realistic. Everything was underway for a second appearance in June. 1982. This time, it lasted longer and the questions were more complicated.'

On November 3, 1982, the CRTC approved Coaticook's radio station, and in February the call letters CFIN-FM were assigned. 'At last,' comments De Laat with well-earned satisfaction, 'the answer so long-awaited.'

#### Awards

• For many years, the CCBE have been working on the establishment of a Bursary. • This year's recipient of the Engineer of the Year Award was Stu Clark, retired engineer of CKLW-TV Windsor, ON. He was selected by his peers for making a significant contribution to broadcast engineering. Stu started his career with John Beardall at CFCO Chatham in 1929. In 1930, he moved to CJGC London, owned by Arthur Blackburn, where he stayed for two years. He then moved on to CKTB St. Catharines, which shared a transmitter (and frequency) with CKOC Hamilton; the late Les Horton, then chief engineer

of CKOC (and 1980 recipient of this Award), realized he had a technician who like to experiment, and moved Stu to the transmitter site. There, in 1936, he designed and built a pulse-modulated 'ham' transmitter, and in 1937 built a Dougher-ty transmitter. Later that year he moved to CKLW, where he remained until his retirement; in 1949, he installed CKLW's 50 kw RCA AM transmitter, and moved to CKLW-TV in 1953.

Stu was presented with a sculpture in Italian marble, entitled Northern Geese, by the Canadian artist David Bernett.

• Mel Crosby of Pineway Electronics Ltd. was presented with this year's Safety Award. Mel and his company have supported our safety booth every year since its inception. (I hope you all took advantage of having your business card laminated with the now-famous Hill Street Blues phrase, 'Hey, let's be careful out there!')



Warren Parker of CKTB did his usual great job of setting up and operating the CCBE safety booth, and the presence of the charming hostess was especially appreciated.

#### News of the Industry

 RCA Broadcast has completely closed up shop in Canada; MSC Electronics will now be the representative for all RCA lines, including replacement parts.

- · Continental Electronics have announced a non-exclusive arrangement with Pineway Electronics to promote and sell Continental equipment in Canada.
- AM Stereo seems to be plugging along, with more stations adding systems each month. There is still a a lack of AMS receivers available to the public, so I think it is going to take some time before AM Stereo really makes its mark in the market place.

On September 29, Delco Electronics announced that General Motors' Buick division plans to introduce AM Stereo radios in selected 1984 models-believed to be the first such announcement by any auto manufacturer, foreign or domestic. The radios Delco will build for Buick will receive AM Stereo signals using a C-Quam decoder integrated circuit.

#### Lightning Strikes—Twice

· Larry Smith reports that on July 31 at about 3 am, the STL tower at the CJOY and CKLA-FM Guelph studios was hit by lightning. The stations lost about 95% of the equipment that contained C-MOS devices, and it took three technicians over two weeks to restore things to normal operating conditions.

On the morning of August 30, CKLA's broadcast tower south of Guelph was hit by lightning, burning out the bottom bay of the 6-bay antenna, the input matching stub and about 10 metres of co-ax. An emergency antenna was rigged up with

a height of 8 feet and power of 2,000 watts. Later, the riggers moved the emergency antenna about 100 metres up the tower, and CKLA ran that way until new parts arrived three days later. Larry says that all in all, it wasn't a bad signal in the downtown area, considering normal height is 400 ft. with 50 kw power.

#### Safety Reminder

 On September 13, Jeff Guy of CJBK London had an accident at the transmitter site, resulting in a 6,000 volt DC shock. After spending two hours in the hospital and 12 hours sleeping at home, Jeff was fine. As past president of CCBE, Jeff was a key participant in our Convention and Trade Show and it was good to see he had not suffered any ill effects from one of the ever-present dangers we all must contend with at our transmitter sites.

I hope all those who attended enjoyed this years Convention, and that you'll mark down the dates for next year: Sept. 25-27, 1984, in Toronto.

He sent a cab for me, and with Todd, we drove at top speed, preceded by a police motorcycle escort to the Eglinton Theatre. We raced up Toronto's Oriole Parkway which is crossed at one point by a railway track. It was seldom-used, but Todd didn't know this, was horrified when we raced through, and buried his head in my chest. I told the story whenever his name came up, and when he later came to appear at the Royal Alexander he told the yarn in the theatre's programme. In August, while in London, England, we noticed he was appearing in The Business of Murder one of the finest plays we have ever seen. I sent a note backstage and he returned it immediately with an invitation to join him in his dressing room. There he opened a bottle of wine and we spent an interesting, convivial hour chatting with him. He hopes to bring The Business of Murder to Canada, and if he does, be sure to see it...French immersion for even the youngest of children is now common and perhaps particularly so in Ottawa. We went there to see my son Jay who is an assistant city editor at the Ottawa Citizen, his wife Sandy, and son Ben who is five. He goes to junior kindergarten, and when my wife asked him what he was learning, he replied, 'I'm in French Emergency.' He is the same tad who says that Pierre Trudeau is Canada's 'Fried Minister'...





### **DECISIONS**

#### CROSS-OWNERSHIP RULINGS

In dealing with four cases of daily newspaper/broadcast cross-ownership in the same market, the CRTC has, in each instance, extended the broadcast licences. The Commission had been instructed by the federal cabinet to review the cross-ownership issue and disallow cross-ownership unless there were 'overriding public interest considerations.'

 London, ON—licences of CFPL AM-FM-TV extended for full five-year term; the CRTC concluded the market has been well-served by London Free Press Holdings.

 New Brunswick Broadcasting (CHSJ AM-TV Saint John), owned by the Irving family, who also own the Saint John daily newspapers, renewed for three years. CRTC acknowledges that licensee still needs to make some improvements.

 Cablevue Ltd, a Belleville cable company 50% owned by Thomson, who also own the Belleville daily newspaper, renewed for five years. CRTC satisfied that co-owner Manville Holdings (50%) has effective control of Cablevue.

 CFCN Communications Ltd (CFCN AM-TV, CFVP Calgary) owned by Maclean-Hunter, who also own 49.7% of Toronto Sun Publishing Corp. (Calgary Sun), licence renewed. CRTC satisfied that legal agreement between TSPC and M-H puts restraints on M-H control of the Calgary Sun.

#### AM Radio

#### OCEAN PACIFIC GETS OK

Ocean Pacific Broadcasting Inc. has received a licence to operate a station in Vancouver at 50 kw day/10 kw night on 540 kHz. Ocean Pacific proposes 50% spoken word content, based on a special theme day concept which would draw upon the expertise of specialists, rather than rely on the traditional open-line format. An additional 10% will be allotted to news, 55% of it on items of local or regional interest. Music will be country-oriented. Ocean Pacific will also spend \$30,000 in its first year to develop Canadian talent.

#### NEW CORNER BROOK AM

An application by Western Broadcasting Ltd. of Corner Brook, NF, has been approved on 1340 kHz 10 kw day/2,500 w night. A country music station, it will operate 24 hours a day, with emphasis on local news and sports coverage. Western said also it would hire a staff of four full-time news persons, purchase a mobile news cruiser and spend from \$3,000 to 5,000 per year to develop local talent.

#### EDMONTON BIDS DENIED

Inn

The CRTC has denied all six applications for a new AM station for Edmonton. With the exception of CJIL Broadcasting Ltd., none of the applicants provided "sufficient programming diversity." CJIL, which proposed to offer a station based on gospel and inspirational music, was turned down on the basis of a CRTC policy on the licensing of religous stations. CJIL had proposed 60% gospel music, 5% news, a number of public affairs programs and an hour per week of free access time to Edmonton churches.

- CHAL Saint-Pamphile, PQ—to delete 16 hours per week of local programming and become a full-time rebroadcaster of CHGB La Pocatiere.

- CKMW Brampton—transfer from Mutual Broadcasting to Patrick J. Hurley (51%) and Bill Evanov (49%). Proposal to replace Englishlanguage with multilingual programming also approved.
- Reseau Radiomutuel—French-language network renewed if licensee commits to one hour per week of public affairs programming.
- CKAN Newmarket, ON—transfer from CKAN Radio Ltd. to North County Broadcasting.
- CHWK Chilliwack, BC—no longer CBC affiliate, service provided by CBYF-FM Chilliwack.
- CJRC Ottawa, ON—relocation of studios from Ottawa to Gatineau, PQ.

#### Other developments:

 The CRTC will introduce a complex point system to ensure Canadian productions are just that. Beginning Jan. 3, 1984, productions must earn six out of ten points, and drama programs must earn all ten to be considered as Canadian content. Canadian directors and writers are worth two points each, and various others involved in the production are worth one.

 Canadian broadcasters will be allowed to reduce by a half-hour the home-made programs they must show in exchange for every hour of fully Canadian drama that is shown in the prime time hours of 7:30 to 10:30 p.m.

The CRTC is implementing a simplified licensing procedure for the renewal of AM, FM, TV and cable licences. Applicants will file a new abbreviated application form. If an intervention is filed, applicants may be required to provide more detail.

 The CRTC is recommending that holders of joint AM/FM licences be allowed to increase the daily maximum of commercials to 150 minutes on their FM station, the same maximum that applies to licencees of FM stations only.

## **CJON-TV Approves NEC VHF-TV Transmitter**

In early September Jack Heaney, director of engineering for Newfoundland Broadcasting Co. Ltd., travelled to the NEC plant in Fuchu City, Tokyo. The purpose of the visit was to witness the acceptance tests to be performed in the factory on the 20 kw transmitter purchased by NTV as a replacement for their main (channel 6) transmitter at St. John's. Jack was accompanied by David La Frenais, president of MSC Electronics Ltd., exclusive Canadian distributor for NEC broadcast transmitters.

The decision to purchase the NEC transmitter was arrived at after careful comparison of all its characteristics with those of other available transmitters. High on the priority list were: technical performance, reliability, low operating cost, and aftersales service. Other items, in varying degrees of importance, were design philosophy, quality of workmanship, and the nature of the instruction manual.


Although the dates for commencement of the tests had been scheduled four months ahead, the transmitter was ready for us on the appointed day, having just successfully completed its regular factory tests the day before.

On our arrival, all appropriate test gear was at hand for the tests. When the transmitter was switched on, it immediately made full power without any 'tweaking'. Nor was any 'tweaking' necessary throughout the regular tests which lasted fully two days. The transmitter passed on every count. In most cases the measured figures were substantially better than the DOC specification, NEC's own specification and also that required by CJON-TV.


The third day was devoted to putting the transmitter through various simulated fault conditions and testing the fault diagnostic system. Finally, the NEC personnel conducted a familiarization session during which Jack was able to assess what was required to integrate the transmitter into the site.

On the final day we were taken on a tour of other sections of the plant, including the department which designs and manufactures the popular E-Flex digital video effects system. CJON-TV had recently taken possession of an E-Flex unit, so this stop on the tour was especially interesting to Jack.

As usual, the staff at NEC were most courteous and
