USSR Open for Space Launches... But

An interesting article was sent to us recently by the press office of the Soviet embassy in Ottawa. It tells us that the Soviet space agency, Glavcosmos, is in the business of launching space vehicles, including communications satellites. Some 30 satellites have already been launched for India, France and Czechoslovakia.

Noting that launchings by both the U.S. and European Space Agency (Ariane) have involved many failures and losses of expensive satellites, the article states, "No one is guaranteed against breakdowns of technology. If a foreign satellite is lost, Glavcosmos will pay compensation... or will re-launch it on privileged terms."

However, business from western countries is meagre, as the U.S. has placed a tough embargo on bringing space vehicles into Soviet territory if there is even one U.S.-made component in them. The Soviets claim they have no interest in any 'secrets' of U.S. technology, having developed their own space technology independently, but "if some doubts remain... satellites are exempt of customs examination and will be transported... in a closed sealed container. The customer is allowed to accompany his satellite up to the take-off... We only need to make sure that a satellite is in a working state."

The article calls for peaceful international cooperation in space research, and cites Inmarsat (the plan which would provide satellite communications between ships at sea and the mainland) as one project that is being delayed by the U.S. embargo.

While this is only one side of the story, we thought it was of interest and pass it along to you without further comment...

Request for Used Equipment

Fred Long does some on-air work for CFMX-FM, when he's not at his full-time job as business education director for Cobourg District Collegiate Institute West. At the suggestion of CFMX manager Jerry Good, he writes with a request. It seems that about ten years ago, Fred and a student installed a school 'radio station'—transmitted over a PA system. It worked well for a few years and about seven students went on to work in broadcasting. Later, however, the sound deteriorated and the project was abandoned. Fred says that now many students are realizing that they have lost something unique, and they want it back. "If I were to rebuild the facility, I would like very much to have some more 'commercial' radio station control equipment. The cost

NEW FM SERVICE FOR ABITIBI

A company co-owned by Radiomutuel and Yvon Larivière of Rouyn-Noranda had been licensed to operate a new FM service for the Abitibi-Témiscaminque region of northwestern Québec. Bids by four other applicants—Radio-Nord, Radio-Canada, Nord-Média Inc. and Normand Roy—were denied.

The new service will use two transmitters, at Rouyn-Noranda (1 kw on 99.1 MHz) and Val d'Or (49.4 kw on 102.7). Studios will be in Rouyn-Noranda initially, with a Val d'Or studio to be added in the third year of operation to produce 48.5 hours a week of separate local programming. The format will be Group IV dance music (pop/rock), designed for the 12-34 age group; the CRTC noted that this age group has been underserved, although it accounts for 53% of the population. The Commission also believes that the area needs a new alternative: of the 10 existing radio stations—six AM and four FM-six are owned by Radio-Nord and eight are Radio-Canada affiliates.

TWO NEW FRENCH FMs FOR N-E NB

Two new French-language FM stations have been licensed for northeastern New Brunswick. The CRTC expects the new stations will resolve long-standing concerns about improving service in the area, where about 75% of the 120,000 population is of Acadian origin. In January/85, the Commission denied four previous applications, but urged interested parties to collaborate in resolving the problem. The new licensees are:

Radio de la Baie Ltée, owned by three area AM stations—CJVA (70%), CKBC (20%) and CKNB (10%). The proportions of ownership were determined according to the expected impact which the new FM will have on their revenues. Based in Bathurst, the station will operate with 10 kw on a frequency to be determined, with a rebroadcaster, 10kw on 102.7 MHz (channel 274), at Dalhousie/Campbellton.
Radio Péninsule Inc., Inkerman, will operate the first French-language community station outside of Québec—28.8

kw on 97.1 MHz (channel 246). Over half

of the programming will be produced by


volunteers. Financing is to come from pledges of \$100,000, anticipated grants of \$154,000, and a loan of \$287,000 from the local credit union.

Denied was a third application—it was from Radiodiffusion Beausoleil, jointly owned by CHAU-TV Carleton and Radio Nord-Est Ltée, both of whom had applied previously in 1984.

In approving the two new stations, the CRTC noted that radio advertising in NB had increased 10% during 1981-85—twice the national average—and that stations in the area are all realizing profits.

RAWLCO PURCHASE OF CFGO OK'd

The CRTC has approved the sale of CFGO Ottawa by Baton Broadcasting to Rawlco Communications for \$2.8 million. It is the first acquisition in eastern Canada by the Rawlinson group, which owns CFFR Calgary and six stations in Saskatchewan. Baton has an application before the CRTC to buy CJOH-TV Ottawa, and Douglas Bassett, president, says the sale is in line with Baton's emphasis on television.



Rawlco plans to invest \$375,000 in the station during the next five years, of which \$300,000 will be spent on technical improvements, including AM stereo. The format will remain adult contemporary, and programming expenditures will be increased by almost 50 per cent.

EASTERN BUYS ONTARIO GROUP

Three stations in western Ontario have been purchased by a group controlled (67%) by Eastern Broadcasting Co. Ltd. (Eastern, which owns eight stations in the Maritimes, is 90% owned by Maritime Broadcasting Co., in turn owned by Maclean Hunter Ltd.'s Key Radio, licensee of six other radio stations in Ontario.)

CKJD/CJFI-FM Sarnia and CHYR Leamington were acquired from Rogers Broadcasting for \$1.6 million, the approximate net book value of the stations, none of which has been profitable for a number of years. The new owners say it will take at least until 1991 to show a profit.

Eastern's partners in the purchase are two of its former executives in Moncton, Don Chamberlain (with 24%) and Gerald Kennedy (9%). Both will move to Sarnia to manage the stations there, while Lou Tomasi retains his long-time post as manager of CHYR Leamington.

Among the improvements/benefits of

the transaction:

- a new \$350,000 facility, with total replacement of equipment, will be built immediately to replace the Sarnia studios;
- \$250,000 will be spent to put CHYR on a single frequency;
- · affiliation with Newsradio;
- \$50,000 for market research to ensure that programming will better respond to community needs;
- studios to be made available for recording of local talent, with \$15,000 a year in air time for promotion, plus \$5,000 a year contribution to FACTOR/CTL.

A request by the applicants that CJFI be given experimental FM status was denied by the CRTC. Surveys indicate that U.S. FMs take 74% of the Sarnia audience, with only 7% tuning to CJFI; however, the Commission stated that CJFI's prospects are much better than those of the two FMs in nearby Windsor—recently given the experimental status, which allows more flexibility to compete with U.S. FMs. CJFI was permitted to increase 'hits' to 49%, with a repeat factor of 18, along with a decrease in foreground programming (from 20 to 15%).


TWO WINNIPEG RADIO BIDS DENIED

CFQX-FM Selkirk, Manitoba, was given a new lease on life, as the CRTC rejected two applications for new radio stations in nearby Winnipeg. Denied:

- Ralph E. Warrington's bid for 10 kw on 1200 kHz—a contemporary MOR format for the 35-55 age bracket. Warrington, who has been with CHED Edmonton, CKDA Victoria and CJOB Winnipeg, told the Commission that his research showed Winnipeg had \$12 million in unrealized ad revenues, as well as a need for a community-oriented station. He projected revenues of \$2.5 million in the first year of operation.
- Rawlco Communications Ltd. proposed a country music format on FM for the 25-34 age group, 100 kw on 99.9 MHz.
 Projected revenues in the first year were a more modest \$900,000.

Local broadcasters opposed proposals for a new station. Bob Laine of CHUM Ltd. noted a decline of 7% in radio revenues, while MTN Television and CKO Radio (the latter not yet on-air) would bring further fragmentation. Michael Sifton, president of Armadale, said that FM had not reached maturity in Winnipeg and that CKWG, among others, was losing money. John Cochrane of Westcom emphasized the diversity already provided by the city's 12 radio stations.

The winner in the decision is Radio QX-FM Inc. in Selkirk, 18 miles northeast of

Winnipeg. Licensed in 1981, it has had a history of financial problems, but has now won approval for a power increase (from 35 kw on 92.9 to 100 kw on 104.1 MHz), at a new transmitter site. This will enable CFQX to tap the Winnipeg market, adding projected revenues of \$115,000. Robert Chipman, the president of CFQX, was given approval to increase his holdings in the station from 50 to 100%.

CBAF, CBD: STILL DUPLICATING...

The CRTC has renewed the licences of CBC stations CBAF Moncton and CBD Saint John, NB, to August 31/89. The renewal includes continued exemption from the CRTC-DOC policy against the duplication of signals in a market. Both stations have broadcast on both AM and FM for more than seven years, and the CBC has failed to meet two previous deadlines for ending the duplication.

Aspects of the dilemma include:

- AM signals, although deficient, are still relied on by many listeners;
- CBC budget restraints preclude costly construction of new AM or FM facilities;
- Other AM channels are unused, so the CBC sees no urgency to end duplication;
- Closing of 33-year-old CBAF would leave no French station on the AM band in the Moncton area;
- The CRTC is critical of the CBC for failing to promote listening on FM;
- Private broadcasters are critical of the exemptions, as they are rarely permitted to simulcast on two frequencies.

The Commission warns that 'only in the most extraordinary circumstances' will it tolerate continued duplication beyond August of 1989.

- Applications for rebroadcasters: VOCM-FM St. John's, at Clarenville, NF, 2.2 kw on 100.7 MHz... CFJC Kamloops, at Clearwater, BC, 163 watts on 102.9 MHz...
- CJJR-FM Vancouver is using SCMO to broadcast Indo-Pakistani programming...
 CIDC-FM Orangeville, ON, has added SCMO for taped music (Muzak)...
- Power increases: CKBI-TV Prince Albert, from 61 to 100 kw... CJTR Trois-Rivieres, from 10 to 50 kw (day)... CHAS-FM Sault Ste. Marie, ON, from 6,760 to 13,900 watts, at a new tx site... VOWR St. John's from 5 to 10 kw (day)... And an application has been filed by CKSY-FM Chatham, ON, for an increase from 35.4 to 50 kw at a new transmitter site.
- Monarch Broadcasting plans to increase its stake in CIOF Vancouver from 30 to 50.61%. Other shareholders are D.H. Gourlay (30%), Don Hamilton (15%) and J. R. Longstaffe (5%).
- TVOntario rebroadcasters have been approved at Cloyne (57 kw, channel 55), McArthur Mills (63 kw on channel 42), and Kenora (58 kw on channel 44).

MID-CANADA ACQUIRES CKAP

Mid-Canada Communications, which operates radio and television stations in Northern Ontario, has acquired CKAP from Kapuskasing Broadcasting Co. Ltd. In approving the transaction, the CRTC noted that Mid-Canada would provide stability, expertise, and added sources of news for CKAP.

STV CO-PRODUCTION IN WORKS

A series of 26 half-hour shows is being coproduced by STV Saskatchewan and CKND-TV Winnipeg. Big Sky Country features country music entertainer Ray St. Germain as host and is directed by John Szpala. Thirteen programs are being taped on-location in Saskatchewan; the other 13 are being produced in Manitoba and will include top performers from Nashville.

HOST BROADCAST UNIT FORMED


The CBC has established a host broadcast unit to meet the needs of broadcasters covering various international events taking place in Canada. It's a role the CBC has filled on numerous occasions over the years, and now a small permanent group will provide an ongoing approach to the task. The executive director of the unit is David Knapp, a 20-year veteran with CBC. He joined TV News in Montreal in 1966, then headed the Parliamentary News Bureau in Ottawa, and in 1979 became executive producer for election coverage and other special projects. He directed the host broadcast units for the 1981 Economic Summit, the 1984 Papal visit, and EXPO 86. The unit will be providing facilities at the October 13-17 meeting of Commonwealth Heads of Government in Vancouver. Based in Ottawa, the Host Broadcast Unit can be contacted at (613) 727-7351.

CADILLAC FAIRVIEW TO BUILD TORONTO BROADCAST CENTRE

Cadillac Fairview Corporation has been selected to construct the CBC Broadcast Centre in Toronto. Campeau Corporation and Trizec also submitted proposals for the project, however Cadillac Fairview's was judged the strongest financially. The CBC will now negotiate a letter of intent for construction, which is expected to begin in the fall of 1988. The facility will provide nearly 4 million sq. ft., including commercial, retail and residential space.

MONTREAL DEVELOPER SELECTED

Another important construction project is going ahead in Montréal. It will provide a major production centre at the site of La Maison de Radio-Canada. Although none of the four proposals submitted was found to be financially satisfactory, one was selected as the best overall plan. Terms are to be negotiated with Centre de Production de Montréal (Dorchester) Inc., a joint venture of Astral Bellevue Pathé, Le Groupe Alexis Nihon, 153088 Canada Inc., Réseau Pathonic Inc. and Hawco Construction Canada Ltd.





The last line before pulling the plug for the day goes something like this. "The next nine hours of quiet time is brought to you by..." Full points for innovative and clever promotion/sales.

Which GM, annoyed over delays in commercial production, said to his operator: "Bobby, you've got to understand. At this station take 67 isn't going to be any better than take 2."

News...

The forty-first annual Atlantic Association of Broadcasters convention is set for later this month at Charlottetown. Convention chairman, CHTN GM Harry McLennan says the AAB gathering—Sept. 25-27—will have C.R.T.C. Chairman Andre Bureau as the headliner for Saturday evening's dinner.

The federal government wants greater detail, particularly as they affect the political scene, on poll results which are broadcast. The proposal would require news organizations to report the name and address of the person or organization that paid for a poll, to give the exact wording of questions, sample size, dates of the first and last interviews and the margin of error. Reaction has been swift... BN news director **Wayne Waldroff** says it has always been BN's responsibility to provide all the information available on any story. CTV VP, News **Tim Kotcheff** says such a law would infringe on CTV's right to handle a story as it sees fit. CBC's director of news and current affairs, **Bill Morgan**, says the bill can be construed as an intrusion on freedom of the press. RTNDA president **Eric Rothschild** says forcing dissemination of all poll information would make handling such stories unwieldy.



The Mitchener Awards Foundation has added a study fellowship program to its annual Mitchener Award for Journalistic Enterprise. The program will consist of two fellowships, each valued at 20 thousand dollars, granted annually to Canadian journalists.

CKO ACQUIRES NEWSRADIO

The CKO Radio Network has acquired Newsradio from Maclean Hunter Ltd. The audio 'voice clip' service, based at CKEY Toronto, was established 18 years ago and has about 120 station subscribers. CKO, launched in 1977, operates a network of eight stations across Canada; it holds licences for another four, but construction has been delayed by continuing financial restraints.

Trade of Frequencies Proposed: An interesting side issue is the proposal, subject to CRTC approval, that CKEY and CKO Toronto would exchange frequencies. CKO would be paid a reported \$4 million to move to 590 kHz, allowing CKEY to take over 99.1 MHz on FM. The deal would give CKO the money it needs to start operations in Regina, Winnipeg, Saint John (NB) and St. John's (NF).

Regardless of the CRTC's decision on exchanging frequencies, the purchase of Newsradio by CKO will stand. Key Radio president Steve Harris says that despite Newsradio's successful track record, it remains impractical for Key to operate a full-scale national news service. Noting Newsradio's "incredible growth" from 70 to 120 subscribers in the past year, he says the transaction "makes sense for CKO."

The all-news concept in Canada was developed by Tayler 'Hap' Parnaby, who co-founded Newsradio. He joined CKO after its proposal for a national radio news network was licensed, excluding CKEY's plan for a local all-news station.

Hap Parnaby and other CKO staffers are enthusiastic about the acquisition of Newsradio. Rob Whitehead, director of subscriber relations and operations at CKO, told Broadcast Technology that it was "the most natural move we could possibly make." However, there are some conflicts-for example, MH has stations in five of the cities where CKO operatesand "normally, we won't use each other's voices."

Another Wire Service? CKO recently discontinued the Canadian Press wire service, there appears to be a strong possibility that it will now develop Canada's third broadcast wire service (after BN and SBW). Sources would include many of the

Newsradio subscriber stations, in addition to the 12 bureaus which CKO will operate in major cities across the country.

SBW SIGNS TELEMEDIA QUEBEC

The Standard Broadcast Wire service. launched this spring by Standard Broadcasting and United Press International, has signed up the 10 French-language stations of Télémédia Québec. SBW actually adds 27 stations through the agreement, as the Télémédia Québec network supplies news programming to 17 other affiliates in the province.

SBW general manager Stu Morrison says that Standard is "most pleased to be associated with Télémédia Québec." While the English-language wire service gives Télémédia an important source of national and international news, Standard will also benefit through a direct computer link with Télémédia's flagship station, CKAC, which will inform Standard's CJAD and CJFM Montreal of regional and local stories being covered by Télémédia as they break.

'FUTURE OF NEWS' IS CCBA TOPIC

A panel discussion entitled The Newsroom of the Future was a feature of this year's CCBA convention in Kitchener, ON. Ron Johnston, news director of CAP Communications was moderator, and here is a cross-section of panelists' comments:

- Rick Jesperson of CITY-TV Toronto satellite technology will result in greater fragmentation, live programming from all over the planet (ethnic people will watch the news from their native countries via satellite)... a single 'reporter-technician' will do ENG reports using pocket-size, broadcast-quality low-light cameras, just as we use audio recorders today...
- · John Hinnen, CFTR Toronto-change is taking place quickly and the trend is away from investigative, in-depth news (as a result, people are not as well-informed as they should be)... News can build audience and 'local news might be the way to go' ...
- Peter Desbarats, dean of journalism. University of Western Ontario-major change has been not in technology but in kind of people in journalism; trend to higher education, better training, professionalism, higher salaries, will continue...
- · John Rae, Broadcast News-radio stations will interact more with syndicators and networks... new forms of information must be developed and promoted to an 'information-hungry society'...TV news programming will increase, because it's cheaper than other kinds of programs... "the game will be won by the stations with the greatest local presence."

INDEPENDENT TV ON-AIR IN REGINA & SASKATOON

SaskWest Television Inc. waged a lengthy battle before it was finally confirmed as licensee of Saskatchewan's first independent television service, but it's been "right on schedule" ever since for the CanWest subsidiary.

As STV prepared for its official on-air launch on Sunday, September 6, 1987 at 7:00 pm, chairman I.H. (Izzy) Asper said, "both stations, identical twins, are developing exactly as planned, with construction of the two new buildings, the assembly of equipment and staff all proceeding very smoothly." Asper adds that the stations will provide their half-million potential viewers with "a fresh new alternative in local programming," and as independents they will have flexibility "in putting together the best possible program schedule." Many top programs, both U.S. and Canadian, are being acquired through another CanWest affiliate, Global Television.

STV will operate 24 hours a day from its two new buildings in Regina and Saskatoon, which are identical in design. Each station is equipped with state-of-the-art facilities and employs a start-up staff of 60 people.

STV Regina, with an estimated potential audience of 248,000, is seen on channel 11 (cable 5). It is located at 370 Hoffer Drive, Regina, SK. S4N 7A4; the telephone number is (306) 721-2211 and the Fax number (306) 352-4817.

STV Saskatoon has a potential audience of 242,000 and is seen on channel 4 (cable 3). It is located at 218 Robin Crescent, Saskatoon, SK. S7L 2C3; the telephone number is (306) 665-6969 and the Fax number (306) 665-6069.

Sales representatives for the two stations are Canvideo TV Sales in Toronto and Montreal, the CKND sales department in Winnipeg, Metro Marketing West in Vancouver, and Brydson Media Sales in the United States.




