Cogeco Bids For Quebec's Pathonic Inc.

Trois-Rivieres-based Cogeco Inc. has emerged as a bidder for Ste-Foy-based Pathonic Network Inc. in a takeover bid valued at \$64.7-million.

But before it can be successful Cogeco will have to persuade the Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission to approve the deal involving companies that control competing television stations in two cities in Quebec.

Pathonic's major properties include TV stations CFCM Quebec City, CHLT Sherbrooke, CHEM Trois-Rivieres and CFER Rimouski, all affiliates of the French-language TVA network. It also owns CKMI-TV, the CBC English-language affiliate in Quebec City.

Among Cogeco's growing holdings are CKTM-TV and CKFM-TV in Trois Rivieres, which are, respectively, affiliates of the CBC French service and the Quatre Saisons Network. Cogeco also owns CKSH-TV and CFKS-TV, the CBC and Quatre Saisons affiliates in Sherbrooke.

Cogeco chairman, chief executive and controlling shareholder Henri Audet acknowledged getting the go-ahead from the CRTC will be difficult. But he said Cogeco and Pathonic are discussing a number of possible strategies to deal with the concentration of ownership issue involving the Sherbrooke and Trois-Rivieres television stations. He refused to say if this would involve selling any of the combined stable of TV stations. He also said that Pathonic's controlling shareholders, chairman and chief executive Paul Vien and vicechairman Pierre Lessard, have a commitment "to accept our offer and only our offer."

Appeal Court Upholds Asper in CKVU Dispute

The British Columbia Court of Appeal has rejected an appeal by CKVU-TV Vancouver founders Darryl Duke and Norman Klenman of a B.C. Supreme Court ruling of July, 1987 that awarded I.H. (Izzy) Asper control of the station.

The decision came six days after Asper's CanWest Group of Companies formally took over the Vancouver independent television station.

But two more issues affecting the station still remain to be decided.


The first concerns a dispute between Asper, chairman and major shareholder of Winnipeg-based Can-West Communications Corp., and Edmonton broadcaster Dr. Charles Allard over his nine per cent stake in CKVU. Dr. Allard launched a suit claiming CanWest must sell its 76 per cent stake in CKVU to his company. Mr. Asper contends Dr. Allard must sell his stake to CanWest subsidiary CanWest Broadcasting Ltd.

The second issue still in dispute in the melodrama surrounding CKVU concerns a suit for damages that CanWest launched against Duke and Klenman alleging breach of contract and other complaints. The B.C. Supreme Court is expected to begin hearing those claims

Oct. 29.

Also facing CKVU in October is an appearance before the CRTC when the television station will seek a five-year renewal of its broadcast licence.

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AM Band Expansion In The Works For Canada

Communications Minister Flora MacDonald has announced expansion of the AM radio band, paving the way for hundreds of new radio stations to start up across the country.

Canada recently signed an international agreement with the United States and 20 other countries in South and Central America to open up the AM band from 1605 to 1705 kHz. Key element of the agreement will give Canada 10 new AM frequencies starting July 1, 1990.

Communications Department spokesman Michel Lucas said that although broadcasters haven't been beating down the doors demanding new frequencies, he expects there will be a fair number of applications to open new AM radio stations. He also said the airwaves over most cities with populations of more than 200,000 are almost full.

CRTC Streamlines To Better Serve Industry

The Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission is being streamlined to better handle its job of regulating the airwaves.

The commission, in a July announcement, said its broadcasting section will be broken into three units to handle television, radio and cable.

The major reorganization was to affect about half of the 400 people who work at the CRTC.

Two top jobs were eliminated in the July 5 shuffle. Gone are the positions of executive director, broadcasting, held by Larry Durr, and directorgeneral of broadcast operations, held by Gilles Courtemance.

But three new directorates, each reporting directly to CRTC chairman Andre Bureau, have been created: Television, headed by Robert Armstrong; Radio, headed by Peter Fleming; and Cable, Pay and Specialty Services, headed by Lisa de Wilde.

Also created in the reorganization was a Licensing Directorate, headed by Brien Rodgers, and a Corporate Analysis Directorate, headed by Bob Tyre. Each reports to the secretary-general of the commission.

The changes are reported to have been in the works for months.

And for the first time in almost a year the commission now has a full roster of full-time commissioners with the naming of three commissioners to seven-year terms in late June. The new commissioners are Frederic Arsenault, a long-time New Brunswick civil servant; Adrian Burns, an anchor and writer for CFCN-TV Calgary; and Edward Ross, a veteran advertising marketer who headed his own consulting firm. There are still three-part time vacancies on the commission to fill.

CRTC Unveils New Network Policies

Radio listeners will get more Canadian program variety from expanding radio networks as part of a policy proposed by the Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission.

Canadian radio stations, particularly small ones, are able to buy programs from networks to boost their regular

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

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schedule against competition from larger stations, which can afford to produce expensive music and documentary programs.

Aware of the growing trend, the CRTC proposed a new policy and asked for comments from the radio industry. A public hearing is expected to be called once the commission has digested the comments it has received.

The policy proposed by the CRTC laid out for the first time general criteria for licensing network operations which, the commission says, have become a central component to Canadian broadcasting.

"There are small, independent syndicators popping up all over the country with creative ideas and there's been sort of a renaissance, particularly with network and syndications," said Mike Ferras, a CRTC economic and regulatory analyst.

The commission said the nature of networks and other syndicated programming arrangements is "uniquely capable of reaching, informing and entertaining Canadians with high quality, diverse programming." It said local and regional radio programs are still the main responsibility of AM and FM stations, but the new network proposals aim at allowing stations to combine their programs with the best of acquired programs picked up from other parts of the country.

The CRTC also asked for comment on proposed new television network policies that would "clarify and simplify" its policy framework for networks.

Selkirk Expands to Quebec Radio Market

Toronto-based Selkirk Communications Ltd. is expanding into the Quebec market with a deal to acquire two French-language radio stations from Radio Futura Ltd. of Verdun.

The purchase of rock station CKOI-FM and middle-of-the-road CKVL from Jack Tietolman, who founded CKVL in the 1940s and held 95 per cent of all shares of Radio Futura, is subject to approval by the CRTC. No purchase price has been announced. CKVL is ranked fourth in the Montreal market while CKOI is the No. 1 FM station.

In announcing the acquisition, Selkirk president George Meadows said Selkirk plans to invest \$7-million to upgrade the Verdun studio facilities and equipment of Radio Futura. A new building will be built to house the two stations.

In a related move, Selkirk appointed Walter Machny as director of operations for Montreal. Currently president and general manager of Selkirk's Calgary radio station CFAC, Machny will co-ordinate the application to the CRTC seeking approval for purchase of the Montreal stations. He also will guide the transition of the ownership and assume responsibility for operations of the two stations.

A bilingual native of Montreal, Machny spent 18 years there in radio and television. He retains his positions at CFAC.

Group Makes Second Bid for Ottawa Licence

A group of Ottawa business people is making a second attempt to bring a new television station to the nation's capital.

Metro TV Ltd. has filed an application with the Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission for a licence to operate an independent station in the market.

Spearheading the bid is Ted Billo, a Groupe Lavalin communications consultant who helped win the original independent licence for Baton Broadcasting Inc. Baton subsequently abandoned the licence when it bought CJOH-TV, the Ottawa CTV affiliate.

No details of the new application have yet been released.

If the CRTC decides to consider the application it will call for competing applications. And George Lund, vicepresident and general manager of Mid-Canada Communications, owners of CHRO-TV Pembroke, said his company plans to compete with Metro TV for the licence.

NewCap To Buy Radio Stations in B.C.-Alberta

Newfoundland Capital Corp. plans to purchase the three radio stations of CFCW Ltd. of Edmonton--CFCW Camrose, CKRA-FM Edmonton and CHRK-FM Kamloops, B.C.

The proposed purchase is subject to

approval by the CRTC.

CFCW was founded 35 years ago in Camrose by Hal Yerxa as a 250-watt country radio station.

Newfoundland Capital operates a number of stations in eastern Canada through its subsidiary, NewCap Broadcasting. The firm is waiting approval of its recent purchase of seven Newfoundland radio stations from CHUM Ltd.

Allarcom Bids To Buy CKRD-TV Red Deer

Television station CKRD in Red Deer, Alta., will be sold to Allarcom Ltd. of Edmonton, says Bill Yuill, president of Monarch Broadcasting Ltd.

Allarcom, which owns Edmonton's independent CITV, will also operate an independent CITV station in Red Deer which is expected to go on air in May of next year. The sale must be approved by the CRTC. No price has been announced.

Allarcom also owns pay TV's Superchannel and has a 50 per cent interest in a children's channel.

Investor Seeks To Add To Radiomutuel Stake

A holding company controlled by the chairman of BCE Mobile Communications Inc. wants to buy about 25 per cent of the equity of Radiomutuel Inc. for approximately \$9.2-million. Radiomutuel owns five AM and seven FM radio stations in Quebec as well as 50 per cent of a newly-licenced Frenchlanguage music video television service.

Charles Sirois, who is a director of Radiomutuel, said he isn't planning to try to take over the Montreal-based broadcasting company. He said buying 25 per cent of Radiomutuel will allow the holding company he controls to consolidate the holding in its accounts and give it about 43 per cent of Radiomutuel A shares outstanding. That would translate into about 15 per cent of the votes.

Radiomutuel chairman and chief executive Normand Beauchamp and executive vice-president Paul-Emile Beaulne would continue to control the company through their holding of B shares, which do not trade publically.

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CRTC Approves Two Cogeco Applications

The Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission has approved two of three applications from Cogeco Inc. for the purchase of Quebec radio stations.

The commission approved the application by Cogeco to purchase Radio St. Hyacinthe (1978) Ltee, licensee of CKBS and CFEI-FM Saint-Hyacinthe, and the purchase of Radio Cote-Nord Inc., licensee of CHLC and CKDO-FM Baie Comeau and of CFRP Forestville.

However, an application by Cogeco that would have given it effective control of Radio Drummond (1980) Inc. and Communications Grantham Inc., licensees of CHRD and CJDM-FM Drummondville. The Commission said that Cogeco had not satisfactorily proven that the proposed transfers of control of the stations would yield "significant" benefits for the communities and would not be in the public interest.

Radio Drummond acquired CHRD, established in 1954, in 1981. CJDM-FM began broadcasting Aug. 15, 1987. Cogeco Inc., through its subsidiaries, operates four Quebec television stations and two other radio stations. The company also has indirect interest in a number of cable undertakings that make it the third largest cable operator in the province as well as interests in pay television services and a private production company.

In other recent decisions, the CRTC:

- * Renewed the licence of CKWK Corner Brook, Nfld., for only two years so it can assess the station's performance, particularly its local and regional news service, and its adherence to regulations concerning Canadian content and for providing proper logger tapes.
- * Renewed for three-years the licence of CHER Sydney, N.S., so it can assess the station's overall performance, particularly its adherence to provision of logger tapes and to the amount of local and regional news that had been broadcast by the station. The station had told the commission that, under new management, it has increased its news staff and its commitment to provision of local news programming.

- * Approved power increases from 24,000 to 100,000 watts for CKGL-GM Kitchener, Ont.; from 5,000 watts to 25,000 watts for CKEC New Glasgow, N.S.; from 1,000 to 5,000 watts for CKGA Gander, Nfld.; and from 28,200 to 39,000 watts for CKRO-FM Inkerman, N.B.
- * Approved a CBC application for an FM station at Middleton, N.S. at 93.3 MHz with a power of 8,000 watts, to rebroadcast programs of the CBC English-language FM (Stereo) network.

New Montreal Facility For Radio-Canada

Radio-Canada has reached agreement with Prodevco Lavalin to build a \$50 million film and television production centre in Montreal. The centre, to be located adjacent to the east-end Maison de Radio-Canada building, will house three studios and an ultramodern post-production facility as well as office space.

The 105,000-square-foot production centre will include a special effects studio and facilities for radio production. Work on the project is expected to begin this fall and is expected to take two years.

In other news from CBC:

- * The CBC and Radio Nord Inc. have applied to the CRTC to disaffiliate CHAD Amos, CKRN Rouyn-Noranda, CKVD Val d'Or and CKLS La Sarre, all Quebec, from Radio-Canada, the CBC French-language AM radio network.
- * CBC has applied to the Commission to change the frequency of CBCO-FM Orillia, Ont., from 105.9 to 91.5 MHz, relocate its transmitter site and reduce its power. The request is in line with the CBC policy of moving to educational FM channels where possible and free up commercial channels for use by private broadcasters. The CBC would cease operation of CBCM-FM Penetanguishene, Ont., if the application is approved.
- * And CBC's new London, Ont.,, station replaced now-independent CFPL-TV as of September 4. CBC claims its six rebroadcasters in the region increase its potential audience by 1.2 million viewers.

MARKETING ...

In May, I told you about Virginia radio sales rep Carolyn McCollum and how she'll keep a lead-generated prospect on the phone a bit longer to develop a rapport, no matter how small, before visiting. Carolyn's attitude is that it's easier to deal with a friend. A recent edition of Sales Upbeat had more news of her.

Carolyn recognizes that everyone loves being the centre of attention and she uses that knowledge to her advantage. When prospects say they aren't interested in advertising for one reason or another, then turn a deaf ear, she'll end the conversation on a polite note: "Thanks for your time. Is it all right if I give you a call in a few weeks, just to keep in touch?"

She then spends some time thinking about what the prospect said. Most objections, she finds, come from misinformation, either about her station or about radio advertising in general.

Then Carolyn writes a personal letter to the prospect, explaining her side of the story: "I understand your hesitation to advertise on the radio, so I have enclosed some information that may clear up some of your questions . . ."

The response is usually favorable.

In fact, she won a national account that way! The man to whom she wrote called after sending the order to say he had been impressed by the fact that she took the time to write. He felt the letter showed she cared about his business and his interests.

PROGRAMMING ...

It's not often a radio station wins a prize. But that's exactly what happened for OM-FM Windsor. PD Ian Davies and promotions type Keith Chinnery flew off to England thanks to Pepsi Canada to see Michael Jackson at Wembley Stadium. OM-FM won the trip for most entries per market capita in the "Bad in Britain" promotion.



New Frequency And Facilities for CHSJ







The New Control Room at CHSJ

by Steve Wilson

CHSJ Saint John, New Brunswick, commenced broadcasting in March, 1934. Originally known as CFBO, it had a power output of only 100 watts.

In 1940, the decision was made to increase the transmitter power to 1,000 watts, providing a better service to the growing community. The transmitter site was moved to Coldbrook, as the original location on top of the Capital Theatre was no longer suitable.

In 1947 the power output was increased to 5,000 watts, and the building -- still on the site -- was constructed. In 1960, power was again increased, to 10,000 watts, the present level.

When the Coldbrook site was chosen, no houses or businesses were in the area.

But that was 48 years ago

Today, with the city having expanded all around the Coldbrook area, and the ground system having completely disintegrated, a new transmitter site had to be found.

Move to 700 kHz

With CRTC approval for broadcast on 700 kHz, CHSJ's search for a new transmitter site commenced in earnest. In the summer of 1987, a site was located 30 km to the south-west of Coldbrook.


As most of the electronic equipment was of early '60s vintage, it was necessary to replace 95 per cent of it with new AM stereo equipment. And, of course, it wouldn't be right to have all of this great-looking equipment sitting in old control rooms.

New Production Room


First, scale models were made of the new rooms.

Construction then started on the production room first, so that all the stereo music could be carted and ready to go when the other facilities were completed. The production room construction took approximately three weeks, then equipment installation took one week.

Equipment in the new production room includes a McCurdy SS8816 console, two Technics SP10MKII turntables, four ITC Delta series cart machines (two with record capability), a Delta ESL-V erasure splice finder, two Denon CD players, two Revox PR 99MKII, one Technics RS-B905 cassette deck, Studer/Revox telephone hybrid, four custom switching panels, one Bryston stereo amplifier, two EV

100 speakers, Sennheiser mics and headphones, and a Garner 105A bulk eraser.

Most of the equipment was supplied through Maruno Electronics Limited. Yamaha provided an REV-7 digital reverb. The rooms were designed by Steve Wilson, console woodwork was by MEL Cabinet Systems, while the woodwork in the studios was done by Ted Johnson.

Control Room Rebuilt

Once the production facilities were in operation, the former production area was gutted so that the new control room could be constructed. After another couple of weeks, this room was ready for equipment installation.


The new control room is equipped with a McCurdy SS8816, one Technics turntable, six ITC Delta cart machines, two Denon CD players, two Revox PR 99MKII, one Technics cassette deck, Studer/Revox telephone hybrid, one Bryston stereo amplifier, two EV 100 speakers, Sennheiser mics and headphones, and CRL audio processor, supplied by Maruno. Remote control is a Moseley DRS 1.

New Xmitter Building

While all this activity was taking place, work crews were busy completing the transmitter site. (Work had started in October -- lots of trees down there!)

Not only was the building new, so was much of the equipment, as the photo on the preceding page shows. From left in the photo are:the 208VAC stepdown transformer, a Nautel 10 kw transmitter, exciter and processor rack, monitor rack, N.B. Telephone LD1 digital audio rack and battery charger.

Equipment at the transmitter site includes N.B. Tel LD1 PCM audio system, CRL audio processors, Motorola C-QUAM stereo generator, 10 kw dummy load, vector phasing equip-

ment, three Trylon towers and a diesel back-up generator.


The grounding system for the three towers consists of a 20-foot square copper mesh, with 120 equally-spaced radials. The copper mesh provides a more stable ground-wave pattern.

Work Was Worth It

Many long, hard hours were put in by the CHSJ staff to see this project completed, with very few technical problems. When the transmitter switch was flipped on for the first time everything worked perfectly!

CHSJ's move to 700 kHz with AN stereo took effect on February 25, 1988 and has been followed by numerous reports of improved reception in many parts of New Brunswick and Atlantic Canada.

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marketing for TVOntario, says that sales of new product and services around the world in the past fiscal year grossed \$3.8 million...John Saunders, once of CITY-TV sports, Toronto, is now happily ensconced with ESPN where he chairs the nightly Sports-Center...Sandi Rinaldo started her career with CTV as secretary for news director Don Cameron before making it on air.

The recent passing of **Bill Byles**, at 73, took away a man who had truly been a colorful legend in broadcasting and advertising. He was an imaginative, inventive pioneer whose mark will live long in media history. One of his landmarks was bringing a young comedy team to radio. They were originally billed as Shuster and Wayne...CKO's Bob Mc-Lean became a member of the Variety Club of Ontario, as did Nigel Watts of MCA-TV...Mimi Fullerton, directorgeneral of TVOntario, announced the appointment of Donald Duprey as managing director, English Program Services...Wolf von Raesfeld, who had been gsm at CFRB Toronto, became gm of CKOC and CKLH-FM Hamilton, owned by Armadale Communications Ltd. According to Ad News he replaces **Bob Macdonald**, who will be devoting himself full-time to duties involving Armadale's radio operation in three markets.

Deryl Ring was appointed Co-ordinator of National Sales Activities at the Saskatchewan Television Network...Fernand Seguin, the veteran broadcaster who died at 66, wrote and moderated the first scientific telecast in French...Ralph Mellanby, the Canadian Football League's director of broadcasting, joined Vickers and Benson to form a production company that will broadcast and film sports events...We had a note from Glen Barnett, president of KWXY AM/FM Palm Springs, telling us that Alyce Walker, whom we profiled in a recent issue of BT, had retired from the station after 20 years service.

Elwy Yost, the popular TVOntario movie man, will host on a cruise for film buffs departing in October on S.S. Rotterdam. Guest lecturer for this Caribbean cruise is a yesteryear movie star, Virginia Mayo...We heard that CBC has 220 people in Seoul for their 10-hour-a-day coverage of the Olympics...Edward (The Equalizer) Woodward, told the Globe and Mail's John Haslett Cuff that he thinks British TV is better than the North American version because it "maintains a higher standard of writing and developed out of a theatrical tradition, while the U.S. industry grew out of radio, where the concept of 'product' was already well entrenched"...


Doug Ward became station manager for CBO Ottawa...The main stage at Toronto's Young People's Theatre is being named after Susan Douglas Rubes, founder of YPT. She was later head of radio drama for CBC and is now president of the new pay TV feature, Family Channel...It's estimated that 48-year-old ABC-TV personality Ted Koppel, who has been with the network for 25 years, earns \$1.5 million annually...CJEZ-FM Toronto newsman Neal Sandy, spells it that way, not Neil... Speaking of names, J. D. Roberts, of CITY-TV Toronto anchor, was christened John David. According to Susan Ferrier-MacKay, who recently profiled J.D., he entered the University of Toronto at 16 intending to become a dental surgeon but, after becoming involved with the university's radio station, decided instead to go into broadcasting and got started in CFOS Owen Sound before moving to CHUM in Toronto and then to CITY.

Jester Hairston, who plays the blunt church elder Rolly Forbes on Amen, is said to be the oldest sitcom regular at age 87......CHCH-TV Hamilton, became the second Toronto-area TV station to program 24-hours a day when it decided to broadcast throughout the night... Erin Davis, whom we earlier reported as leaving CKO for CJEZ-FM Toronto, is working weekends as an on-air personality...Singer Kenny Rogers will host a daily syndicated TV talk show, scheduled for telecast this fall...Bob McCown returned to CJCL Toronto to host a sports talk show. He'd been with the station until 1981 when he moved to Global to get its late-night Sportsline underway...It should be noted that earlier this year, E. R. Jarmain, industry pioneer and Chancellor of Canadian Cable Television Association's Honor List, was saluted by the University of Western Ontario. The school conferred upon him an Honorary Doctor of Law degree...Al Waxman was elected chairman of the Academy of Canadian Cinema and Television... CTV plans to expand its weekly amount of closed captioned programming to 20 hours from 17 as the result of a new in-house captioning service...After a spell with Glen-Warren Broadcast Sales, Paul Sweeney has returned to Radio-Television Representatives in Toronto. He is with the TV sales force.

If it hasn't happened yet, look for the marriage of The National's host Peter Mansbridge, 39, to Wendy Mesley, 31, a CBC parliamentary reporter in Ottawa. Previously married, Peter has two teenage children...Suzanne Legue of CKVR-TV Barrie's public affairs program Close-Up was the subject of a rave by the Toronto Star's respected TV writer, Jim Bawden. In part he said that Suzanne "runs rings around the network competition" at the Barrie station...Peter Trueman lost his father, Albert Trueman, a distinguished educationist who in his time served as chairman of the National Film Board, director of the Canada Council and chancellor of the University of Western Ontario...Elaine Ali, appointed assistant gm at Winnipeg's CKND Television, is also continuing as Director of Finance & Administration of STV, CanWest Capital Group of Companies' two independent stations in Saskatchewan.

A reminder that the joint convention of the Canadian Association of Broadcasters and the Western Association of Broadcast Engineers will be held in November at the Winnipeg Convention Centre. In the meantime there is the Atlantic Association of Broadcasters convention, at the Algonquin Hotel in St. Andrew-by-the-Sea, N.B. Sept. 23-25; the Ontario Cable Telecommunications Association Conference, to be held at the Constellation Hotel, Toronto, October 18-20; and the Central Canada Broadcast Engineers convention at the Westin Hotel, Ottawa, October 18-20...It is expected that the handsome new building Johnny Lombardi is having erected to house his CHIN radio stations, and other enterprises, will be ready for occupancy this November. It is located across College Street in Toronto from the present CHIN facilities.

Peter Reback, executivtive producer of CTV's W5 has authored a book, Undercover Agent to be published next month by McClelland and Stewart...Ronald Corey, the former journalist, broadcaster and radio and television producer, has been made president of a division created by Molson's to co-ordinate its sponsorship of sports and entertainment events. Corey, who is president of the Montreal Canadiens hockey club which Molson's owns and for whose games Molson's has the broadcast rights, is also vice-chairman of the NHL.



Dining on Toronto's Danforth Avenue one night this summer we ran into Harry Rasky, whose weekly documentaries on CBC-TV have been winning him fresh accolades. One of his first jobs in broadcasting was in news at CHUM in the early 50s...1989 will see the beginning of construction on a \$50-million centre for movie and TV production on CBC land in east-end Montreal...Because of falling movie house attendance, French TV stations are limited to showing two movies a week in prime time - that's 8:30 to 10:30 p.m. in France...Canadian Home Shopping Network, which markets a variety of consumer products through a televised shop-athome service to Canadian cable subscribers coast-to-coast, has a new leader. He is E. S. Ted Rogers, chief executive officer of Rogers Communications Inc. He replaced in John Goldberg as chairman. Goldberg will continue as a director and consultant for the company for the next three years.

After six years of dedication and contribution, Carol Weir left the Radio Bureau to go with All-Canada Radio & Television...While continuing as host of TVOntario's highly popular Saturday Night At The Movies, Elwy Yost will appear with the Scarborough Philharmonic's 1988-89 subscription series, joining music director Chris Kitts...Richard Ian Laidlaw, whose broadcasting career spanned 30 years died, in Charlottetown at age 60. He was likely best known for his terse, caustic views of life in Ontario aired on CBC Radio in the 70s...In a streamlining move, the CRTC will be broken into three units to handle radio, television and cable...Linden MacIntyre, who has hosted CBC Radio's Sunday Morning for the past two years, left the program to return to CBC-TV as a journalist producer with The Journal...Murray Marchant, who had been vp, finance at First Choice, is now with Astral Bellevue Pathe Inc., Montreal. His successor is Richard (Rick) Miller, who had been with Columbia Records, City-TV., CFMT-TV, and Cybermedix...Fox Broadcasting will carry a two-hour program in late November covering the induction of newly-elected personalities to the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences Hall of Fame. They will include Jack Benny, George Burns and Gracie Allen, Chet Huntley and David Brinkley, Red Skelton, Davis Susskind and David Wolper...Karen Bryant, director of promotions at CKGM Montreal, was elected an executive vp of the Advertising and Sales Executives Club of Montreal...D'Arcy Masius Benton and Bowles, Toronto, named Virginia Smith senior broadcast producer.



IN MEMORIAM

William D. (Bill) Byles

A pioneer in Canadian broadcast advertising who helped found the Broadcast Executives Society died June 22 in Toronto. He was 73. He started his career in 1930 with a brief stint at Marketing magazine and then worked on the account side at several agencies. He was best known for Stoven-Byles Television, the broadcast rep house he owned later in his career. By the time he retired in 1974 he had also been chairman of the Association of Canadian Advertisers and of the Canadian Association of Advertising.

Fernand Seguin

A pioneer in bringing science to on radio and television died June 19 in Montreal at the age of 66. He began his career in broadcasting in 1947 with a series of scientific talks for the CBC's French-language service, Radio-Canada. When television arrived in the early 1950s, he wrote and moderated the first scientific telecast in French. He continued in both radio and television and also took part in more than 250 films. In 1977 he received the Kalinga prize awarded by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization and the Olivar-Asselin and Judith-Jasmin prizes for journalism. He was also the first francophone to receive the Sandford-Fleming medal from the Royal Institute of Canada.


