This could be Canada's year at the Commonwealth Games. Held in Edinburgh, Scotland, they will run from July 24 to August 2, and Canada, experts say, may well be the overall champion. Approximately 300 Canadian athletes will compete in a total of ten disciplines, and they are expected to do especially well in swimming, track and field, boxing and wrestling.

To cover the games – which are held in a Commonwealth

country once every four years—CBC Radio Sports is sending seventeen reporters, producers and technicians to Edinburgh. This represents some of the most extensive overseas sports coverage by the department. That's important, because this year more than 3,300 athletes and officials will be attending—more than ever before in the fifty-six-year history of the games.

Apart from regular reports on the events, CBC Radio Sports

will also be presenting Commonwealth Magazine, an hour-long program to be broadcast twice daily. Co-hosted by Vicki Gabereau and Mark Lee – who first teamed up for coverage of the 1984 summer Olympics – the program will offer live coverage of the events, as well as interviews with Canadian athletes and others who make up the games. Commonwealth Magazine will give listeners the inside edge on what it's like to

be competing—and spectating—in Edinburgh, Scotland.

Ben Johnson's female counterpart, Angela Bailey, 24, claims the title of "world's fastest woman" on the track. The Ontario sprinter competed in the 1982 Commonwealth Games, the 1983 World Championships and the 1984 Olympics. Her longtime rival is fellow Canadian Angella Taylor, who should also be competing in Edinburgh.



ALEX BAUMANN


Canada's "good guy" in the pool, Ontario swimmer Alex Baumann, 21, is known for his 200metre individual medley world record (2:01.42) as well as his television commercials for the Canadian Egg Marketing Agency and other associations. Baumann took two gold medals at the 1984 Olympics and was the subject of a 1985 portrait by artist Ken Danby.



DEBBIE BRILL

Debbie Brill, 33, a high jumper from British Columbia, competed in her first Commonwealth Games in 1970—and won a gold medal. A series of international triumphs followed, as did a baby boy. Brill told The Toronto Star in 1984, "I've promised myself I'll high jump on my 60th birthday."






VICTOR DAVIS

Canada's "bad boy" of swimming, Victor Davis, 22, caused a stir when he kicked a chair in the presence of the Queen at the 1982 Commonwealth Games. His reputation in the water makes him one of the world's best. The Ontario native won a gold medal at the 1984 Olympics, and after a 16-month hiatus from the pool,

Davis is back in full force.





JACQUES DEMERS

Aside from winning a silver medal at the 1984 Olympics, Jacques Demers, 26, a weight lifter from Quebec, has also played a "Wagubu" tribesman in the movie Quest for Fire. Demers holds multiple records for his lifts and a bronze medal from the 1982 Commonwealth Ganes. Demers won three gold medals at the 1984 Austrian International Meet.



CURT HARNETT

Cyclist Curt Harnett, 21, earned a silver medal for the one-kilometre race at the 1984 Olympics, and by 1988 he hopes to be the best one-kilometre rider in the world. The former hockey player used to cycle to stay in shape but retired from the ice when, at 16, he linked up with national cycling track coach Des Dickie of Ontario.

ALLISON HIGSON

Canada's youngest national team swimmer, Allison Higson, 13, from Ontario, holds age-group records and a gold medal from the 1985 Canadian Games for the 100- and 200-metre breast stroke. Higson is looking toward the 1988 Olympics - not to mention this year's Commonwealth Games-to show her prowess.



BEN JOHNSON

Ben Johnson, "the world's fastest human," heads to Edinburgh with a time of 10.00 seconds flat for the 100-metre and a world record for indoor 60-metre (6.50 seconds). Coached by Charlie Francis of the York University Optimists, Johnson, 25, of Ontario, was Canada's outstanding male athlete of the year at this year's Tribute to the Champions.



LENNOX LEWIS

Twenty-year-old Lennox Lewis got his start in the boxing ring when he was 11, in an Ontario gym. Since then, Lewis, now six foot four, has gone on to play high school basketball—and to win the 1983 Junior World Super Heavyweight Championships. Lewis's teammates Egerton Marcus, Asis Dar and Howard Grant are also strong contenders.

MARK McKOY


Ontario hurdler Mark McKoy, 24, set Canadian and meet records at the 1982 Commonwealth Games for his 110-metre run (13.37 seconds). His personal best is 13.19. A student at Louisiana State University, McKoy won the 1985 Grand Prix outdoor title and finished fourth in the 110-metre race at the 1984 Olympics.

ROBERT MILLS

Nova Scotian Robert Mills, 27, was a member of the crew that won the Outstanding Team of the Year Award at this year's Tribute to the Champions. This was the result of his gold medal win at the 1985 World Rowing Championships in Belgium. Mills also has two gold medals from the 1983 Pan American Games.







CHRIS RINKE

British Columbian wrestler Chris Rinke(top), 25, won a gold at the 1982 Commonwealth Games and was honoured with an Olympic Champion Award at last year's Tribute to the Champions. Since 1980 Rinke, who enjoys fishing, bowling and playing hockey, has fought in the 82-kilogram freestyle class. He won a bronze at the 1985 Swiss International Tournament and a fifth-place finish at the 1985 World Cup.



CAROLYN WALDO

Since winning a silver medal in the solo event at the 1984 Olympics, synchronized swimmer Carolyn Waldo, 21, has not lost a competition. She started swimming lessons at 10; before that she had been afraid of water after nearly drowning. Waldo, of Quebec, will head to the World Aquatic Championships in Madrid after her duet swim in Edinburgh.

LINDA THOM

Shooter Linda Thom, 42, of Ontario, is not only a 1984 Olympic gold medalist but also a cordon bleu chef—she picked up the latter skill when living in Paris with her husband. Thom returned to Ottawa in 1975—retired from shooting—but came back in 1981 when she learned women could compete in their own events in Los Angeles.

Lynn Williams's 1984 Olympic bronze medal came behind distance runners Mary (Decker) Slaney and Zola Budd in the controversial 3,000-metre race. This feat made her the first Canadian woman to win an individual Olympic track medal in 48 years. Williams, 26, lives in British Columbia with her husband, Paul, also a distance runner.

Stories of his shenanigans abound, but separating the myth from the man—well, that's a job only Rawhide could tackle

For nearly fifty years

APART FROM THE FACT THAT HE'S VERY kind to animals and dislikes most human beings, the only other observation I can make on Allan McFee with any certainty is that he is an extremely enigmatic and private person. For almost half a century, in spite of the earnest efforts of radio interviewers and newspaper columnists, he's managed to stay that way. As an interviewer you're fine just as long as your questions remain innocuous and superficial, but just try to get past that façade, to probe a little more deeply, and the old octopus will invariably shoot out those defensive little jets of prevarication and deception in a voice so persuasively charming and warmly sincere that you'll never know you've been had. Take this one, for example, recently fobbed off on an Edmonton journalist: "I guess I'm just old-fashioned ... rudeness bothers me." I was perusing McFee's file down at the CBC reference library when I came across that one just recently, and I almost fell off my chair. What a cavalcade of memories it released.

I saw myself standing with the "old-fashioned" gentleman a number of years ago on the fire escape of the CBC's radio building on Jarvis Street in Toronto. We'd just finished taping a session of *The Max Ferguson Show* and had stepped out to get a breath of air. In the parking lot below us a figure emerged from the TV building and strode purposefully across to the radio building. It was the number one man in the whole CBC Toronto operation.

THE INSCRUTABLE MR MCFEE

"You down there! What the hell do you think you're doing!" I couldn't believe my ears as I listened to McFee's voice shattering the morning quiet. Nor could the object of the unprovoked attack. He looked up, face flushed, in time to receive the next volley.

"Yes you! You red-faced excrescence. Get back to your office and do some work for a change. Try to earn the money they're wasting on you!" The figure went on at an accelerated pace and nothing ever came of the incident.

Again I saw myself sitting with McFee in the small studio where we both spent most of our working hours at the CBC mouthing station calls and the odd newscast. McFee always referred to it as our "fetid cell," the place where we squatted like toads in the service of the corporation.

Suddenly, the door is flung open and a drunk lurches in. (This one was a lesser number but a number nonetheless.) "Allan," he slurs, "you haven't been up to visit me for months. My office door is always open to old friends." Here, the eyes begin to well up and the maudlin whine continues until interrupted by McFee's warm, placating reply.

"All right, all right. I'll drop in to see you tomorrow."

"Wonderful, Al," slurs the drunk one, "I'll look forward to seeing you."

"You'd better not," hisses the old-fashioned one, "because I'll be coming in to tell you what a rotten mess you're

making of your job.'

Again the scene changes. This time I'm talking to McFee in front of the CBC radio reception desk, when our conversation is interrupted by the arrival of an exuberant young rising executive—fortunately as thick-skinned as he is obtuse. With a friendly grin he shook my hand and then made to shake McFee's. The latter eyed the outstretched hand for a few seconds and then snapped, "That limp-wristed appendage can hang there till the end of time—I'm not touching it."

I first met McFee in 1949, having been transferred as a staff announcer that year from Halifax to Toronto. Though our announce shifts coincided and I saw quite a bit of him around the studios, my attempts to initiate conversation or make other little overtures of friendship were usually foiled by my inability to hold his attention. There were always petty diversions to distract him. It might be a fire axe hanging on the wall of a studio hallway, which, for some reason, he had to take down and hurl some six metres with a splintering crash into a studio door. Sometimes it

was the sight of a neatly folded fire hose that caught his attention. This would have to be turned on full blast so that it would hurtle off the wall in agonized contortions, section by section, like a gigantic striking cobra spewing gallons of water over walls and carpeting.

Over the span of his CBC career,



McFee's voice has turned up at one time or another, completely unauthorized, on just about every program in the CBC schedule. To break the monotony of the long, tedious hours he had to spend sitting in his fetid cell in the bowels of the CBC radio building putting in station calls, he used to open his microphone and send his voice out over top of whatever program the CBC happened to be carrying. During the heyday of that atrocious hour of soap serials the CBC used to carry weekday afternoons in the 1950s, listeners would be regularly astounded to hear Ma Perkins offer her saccharine philosophy to Willie or Shuffle and then punctuate it with an incongruously masculine and terribly vulgar throat clearing. Similarly, listeners to broadcasts of the Toronto Symphony must have winced at the sound of a celestial horn passage accompanied by stentorian nose blowing.

Mind you, the CBC didn't take all this lying down. Whenever McFee, or any of us for that matter, committed an infraction of the rules, he would receive in his mail slot a little missive with the heading: NOTIFICATION OF FAULT. This would state the nature of your misdemeanour and leave a tiny space for you to write a pleading denial. The form then went on to some CBC official to be entered in your personal file, a sort of Doomsday Book of everything good or bad you ever did for the corporation. McFee averaged at least one of these per day and simply used a multicoloured pen he owned to write "POOP" across

each one in five different colours. I remember being stunned one day by McFee's triumphant disclosure that he had somehow managed to gain access to his personal file. Finding it to contain a collection of derogatory reports on his studio conduct by producers who found him intractable, he simply rewrote all

these vituperative whinings, changing them into flowery tributes.

McFee's war with the CBC, fought tenaciously and without respite over so many years, began to wind down from 1972 on. That was the year someone in the corporation had the brilliant idea of giving McFee his own program, Eclectic Circus, thus beginning a sort of behavioural "born again" transformation in him. Eclectic Circus, in providing him with that creative, sublimating outlet or safety valve he had so badly needed, was surely the CBC's ultimate solution. If there was any specific armistice date, I suppose it would have to be that day in 1981 when he was awarded the CBC's President's Award with the citation reading: "For his warmth, humour and unique qualities."

That's a nice note on which to end, and yet . . . something bothers me. With a new crop of impressionable young announcers coming along these days at the CBC, have I perhaps created for them a dangerous image, a false cult hero whom they might strive to emulate? Maybe it's better to leave them with a moralistic observation and warn them that Allan McFee was really a very naughty boy who should have been taken over management's knee at the very outset and given six of the best. But no. I can't do that. Don't ask me why. It's just that . . . well . . . rudeness bothers me. I'm old-fashioned.

JOHN HAMMOND GOT AMERica swinging. John Henry Hammond, that is. His son, John Paul Hammond, is the well-known blues guitarist. John Henry, however, is even more famous. It's probably no exaggeration to state that he is the single most influential non-performer in the history of American pop music.

Over the course of fifty vears as a talent scout and record producer, Hammond found or furthered the careers of countless jazz and rock greats. Included in this illustrious lineup are Bessie Smith, Billie Holiday, Benny Goodman (whom Hammond's sister, Alice, married). Count Basie and Fletcher Henderson, As swing gave way to more contemporary sounds, Hammond continued to cultivate talent of legendary proportions. Bob Dylan, George Benson, Aretha Franklin and Bruce Springsteen all got their lucky breaks after being spotted by Hammond's keen eye.

Or perhaps keen ear would be more to the point. "He has an ear like nobody else," says Toronto producer David Tarnow, "He can hear things that nobody else hears." For more than a year, Tarnow has been working on a series of documentaries about John Hammond's influence on American pop music. Beginning this month the thirteenpart series will feature extensive interviews with Hammond as well as many of the performers with whom he's been associated. "I'm also trying to create the mood of the times," points out Tarnow. "We go through fifty years of history, so there's going to be a lot of great music in this series."

WHEN ASKED TO DESCRIBE his friend and colleague David Grimes, David Jaeger doesn't hesitate: "He's a broadcaster's dream." The executive producer of *Two New Hours* explains: "He really has a gift-especially in this area of music, where the technical and artistic concepts are difficult to describe. He's an excellent communicator."

For the past eight years, Grimes has been communicating the complex concepts of new music as the co-host of Two New Hours. And until recently he's been contributing to them as a member of the celebrated Canadian Electronic Ensemble. The two pursuits have more than complemented one another. "I've heard literally thousands of new music tapes from around the world," says Grimes, "and I've had access to a repertoire that unfortunately ninety-nine per cent of the composition industry doesn't hear.'

While Grimes is undoubtedly a gifted broadcaster—in 1982 he won the Canadian Music Council Award for best broadcast of Canadian music-his first love is composition. For this reason Grimes, along with his wife and three children, is leaving Toronto and Two New Hours for Ipswich, Massachusetts, his hometown. "It's time for me to do something different," he explains.

Grimes also hopes to put in a couple of weekends of golf. "He shoots in the high seventies or low eighties, depending on how much he's been playing," reports Jaeger. So, apart from paying tribute to Grimes this month on Two New Hours, the CBC music department has also given him a gift certificate for golf supplies. With it, Grimes has purchased a sand wedge. "Last time he played in Massachusetts, he lost his sand wedge," says Jaeger. "It's only fitting that he replace it before he goes back.'

STEVE WADHAMS HAS COVered the world for radio. But the Sunday Morning producer finds just as much material for stories closer to home. Wadhams, whose documentaries are regularly heard on Sunday Morning, has recently tackled such large issues as Star Wars and famine aid in Ethiopia. But he's just as interested in creating documentaries without exotic locales and international implications. "I like to take what appears to be a local story and find the universal in it," says Wadhams.

A recent documentary by

A recent documentary by Wadhams about a halfway house for federal prisoners in his neighbourhood in East Toronto is an example. During the year-long making of "Not In My Back Yard," Wadhams created a dialogue between the halfway house residents and the neighbourhood opposition by playing the interview tapes to each of the two camps. After listening to one of the tapes, the leader of the group opposing

the house volunteered to go on its board of directors. "Situations like this are usually just a question of fear of the unknown," says Wadhams. "Radio can be an interesting way of getting people to talk when they don't want to take the first step."

Wadhams first worked in radio with the BBC. He spent two years in Africa with the Malawi Broadcasting Corporation, producing a magazine show for high school students and, among other things, doing live soccer commentating ("Ever tried to wrap your tongue around a load of Zulu names in a hurry?"). Wadhams produced a documentary for the first Sunday Morning program aired in November 1976 and, except for breaks to do such specials as the ACTRA award-winning George Orwell: A Radio Biography, has been with the program ever since. "It's the only home for someone who wants to crank out documentaries," says Wadhams.



The Susan Nelles Case

"A HORRIBLE MISTAKE HAS been made-they arrested the wrong person." Those were the words of lawyer Austin Cooper, referring to nurse Susan Nelles. Uttered at the end of a gruelling fourteen-month ordeal for Nelles-during which she was subjected to internment, trial by press, untold stress and crippling legal costs-Cooper's words were sustained by Judge David Vanek. In May 1982, after a forty-five-day preliminary hearing, Vanek found there to be insufficient evidence to charge Nelles with murdering four babies at Toronto's Hospital for Sick Children. He dismissed the case, stating, "The only question iswho did it?'

The next year, during an inquiry that cost taxpayers \$2.8 million, doctors, lawyers and Mr Justice Samuel Grange would search for the

"who"-with little success. 'The Nelles case proves the vital necessity of the preliminary hearing process," says lawyer-playwright Gabriel Emanuel. "Nelles was ultimately not put on trial for murder." Emanuel spent three months plowing through "thousands and thousands" of pages of transcripts generated by both the hearing and the subsequent Grange Commission. The result is a two-part series for The Scales of Justice. "This is a very important case in the history of Canadian law," says Emanuel. "It raises many issues, such as the rights of an accused person upon arrest and whether an innocent person should be compensated for what the system puts them through." Then, speaking as a true dramatist, Emanuel adds, "And it has all the suspense



A IS FOR AARDVARK



"WIT." SAYS LISTER SINclair, "is the power to make distinctions where at first sight everything seems the same, together with the ability to draw things together that seem to have no similarities." In A Is For Aardvark, Sinclair draws on the disparate and similar worlds of art and science to create a personal anthology of notes, ideas and letters.

The theme of the series is creativity—making connections. The letters of the alphabet provide a starting point, but Sinclair isn't out to present a dictionary of odd and unrelated words from aardvark to zymurgy. He refers to the old tradition of A Commonplace Book in talking about his program, which runs until the end of August. Dating back to Eliz-

abethan times, this literary tradition involves keeping a notebook of items of personal interest. Sinclair has kept his own notebook, in his head, over the years. In A Is For Aardvark, he brings the tradition to radio and connects the dots between all his mental jottings. "I try to make links between ideas and feelings," says Sinclair. "The problem is to get people to develop feelings about their thoughts."

Author, broadcaster, critic and more, Sinclair did a similar program for the CBC in the 1950s. Last year A Is For Aardvark ran throughout the summer. Some of those shows will be repeated this year, but all twenty-six letters will also get new definitions. Sinclair's notebook is not easily exhausted.

A Canadian in Paris

GOOD IDEA: John Glassco was adept at many literary forms: autobiography, poetry, translation and what he called "aphrodisiac works . . . as an article of commerce." In 1927 the eighteen-year-old Canadian set out for Paris and the literary life. *Memoirs of Montparnasse* is his superb record of those early years in the world's cultural capital. *A Canadian in Paris*, Martin Hunter's literary documentary on Glassco, plays this month on *Ideas: The Sunday Edition*. This showcase of the best *Ideas* programs from the past year runs on Stereo every Sunday until the end of August. Bill Terry, head of Radio Drama and Features, says, "There's tremendous response to *Ideas* in its regular appearance on CBC Radio. 

Centenary of Liszt's death



"LISZTOMANIA" WAS NOT, AS some people believe, the invention of director Ken Russell, whose outrageous 1975 film of that name starred Roger Daltrey as a nineteenth-century rock and roll star. The word was coined by German poet Heinrich Heine to describe the phenomenon of (mostly female) hysteria that flooded many of the major cities of Europe whenever Franz Liszt came to town to play.

Until he retired from the concert stage in 1848 to devote himself to composition in the city of Weimar, Liszt was a celebrity in the modern sense of the word. Swooning fans attended his more than 1,000 "recitals" (a term Liszt himself invented) from 1839 to 1847. He was the originator of the concert tour, travelling to perform as far afield as Cork, Ireland, and St Petersburg, Russia.

And everywhere, the ladies were there, fainting at a glimpse of their idol, tearing at his hair and stealing his handkerchiefs. "They would even collect the dregs of the coffee he drank," says Alan Walker, professor of music at McMaster University and one of the world's foremost authorities on Liszt. "They'd put them in a little glass vial and carry it between their cleavage. I wonder what modern psychologists would make of that."

In 1986, the centenary of Liszt's death (and the 175th anniversary of his birth), Liszt's role in society has been taken over by Mick Jagger and Sting. But his fatal charms continue to be an issue: since his death, there have been hundreds of claims on his paternity, though Walker, who has examined four test cases, is convinced none can be proved.

WILD WIT: "Billy Wilder is a smart, sharp-toothed . . . venomous wit," wrote *New Yorker* film critic Pauline Kael about the Vienna-born writer-director, a six-time Academy Award winner. Born Samuel, but nicknamed "Billy" by his mother after Buffalo Bill, Wilder acquired an impressive reputation in Hollywood with the *film noir* classics *Double Indemnity* and *Sunset Boulevard*, then developed his rapid-fire dialogues into tongue-in-cheek comedies: *The Seven Year Itch, Witness for the Prosecution* and *Some Like It Hot*.

"He's extremely funny and you can't put anything over on him," recalls Vicki Gabereau, whose interview with the acclaimed director will be re-broadcast this month. Wilder, now eighty, has made over fifty films in a career spanning as many years and last March received a Life Achievement Award from the American Film Institute.

Bravo! Moscow audiences will be shouting their approval this month when musicians from around the world meet at the International Tchaikovsky Competition

LEEDS, BRUSSELS, Warsaw, Sydney and Montreal are all cities that host music competitions of international repute. But none of them can touch Moscow's International Tchaikovsky Competition in terms of glamour and prestige. Ever since Van Cliburn electrified Russian audiences in the first Tchaikovsky event twentyeight years ago, Moscow has been the magnet for ambitious young artists seeking a shortcut to musical superstardom.

The Tchaikovsky has been called "The Olympics of Music." True, it comes around every four years and the musicians (all under thirty) compete for gold, silver and bronze medals. But

a gold medal for an athlete is the crowning achievement of years of effort while a Tchaikovsky gold is the springboard for a career.

A gold medal in any one of the four disciplines—piano, violin, cello, voice—immediately launches a young performer into concert orbit. Without such instant fame or the patronage of a renowned conductor, the aspiring artist would have to slog around the recital circuit for years, building up a reputation, hoping to attract the attention of a major orchestra.

major orchestra.

Remember what happened to Van Cliburn twenty-eight years ago when he won? The unknown Texan returned to the United States a national hero-with a ticker-tape parade up Broadway and his face on the cover of *Time* magazine. This is what lures young talent to Moscow for one month of grinding, nerve-wracking competition. Other laureates whose careers were boosted by winning the Tchaikovsky Competition include John Ogdon, John Lill, Mischa Dichter, Gidon Kremer and Eugene Fodor. And our own André Laplante from Rimouski, Quebec, won a silver medal for piano in 1978.



I witnessed André's performances in the second and final rounds as producer of the first CBC radio coverage of the competition in Moscow. All the competitors play for an international jury of twenty-one eminent musicians. Pianists and violinists perform in the great hall of the Moscow Conservatory, a creamand-white rococo space. The vast stage is decorated with banks of gladioli and an enormous, stern portrait of Tchaikovsky. Across Moscow in the Tchaikovsky Concert Hall—less ornate and intimidating-the cellists and the vocalists compete. There is a separate jury for each category, with an equal mix of judges from the Soviet Union, Eastern bloc countries and the West.

During the month of the competition, Moscow is caught up in music fever. Virtually every concert is broadcast on radio, and television cameras are everywhere, making life hot for performer and audience alike. The visiting musicians are treated like rock stars by the music-loving Muscovites who join interminable lineups for tickets and wait at the conservatory doors to press little gifts into the hands of their favourite performers.

In the last competition, the Russians swept the gold medals, except in the piano section where no first prizes were awarded: a Soviet and a British pianist-Vladimir Ovchinikov and Peter Donohoeshared the silver medal. This kind of controversy adds spice to the event, and it is not without precedent. In 1974 when American Eugene Fodor took top honours in the violin competition, he had to be content with sharing a silver medal with two Russian violinists.

In 1982 our chances for a Tchaikovsky gold rested on the shoulders of cellist Desmond Hoebig, the only Canadian to reach the final round in any of the four cat-

egories. This year there are nine Canadian hopefuls among the 447 musicians from forty-seven countries invited to compete (102 from the United States, which historically sends a huge contingent, and forty-seven Soviets, who are traditionally well honed and inevitably make it through the gruelling cuts to the final round).

Carrying the Canadian flag this year are pianists Linda Ippolito, Brian Finley and Huo-Yuan Lee; violinists Barry Shiffman, Stephen Sitarski and Martin Chalifour; cellists Mihai Tetel and Johanne Perron; and soprano Martha Collins. Executive producer Gloria Bishop, who is in charge of this year's CBC radio coverage of Tchaikovsky, will be leading a team of four to Moscow. "What I'm really excited about is being able to broadcast the rounds in sequence," says Bishop. "We're going to fly the tapes back so listeners can hear the event just as the Russian audiences did as it flowed from one stage to the next."

See listings for details I REMEMBER MY MOTHER would sing old Joe Williams songs when she was doing housework. There was always jazz in my house. My parents listened to a very catholic mix of things: Lester Young, Hank Williams, Count Basie, Charlie Christian. I remember hearing Billie Holiday sing "The bird with feathers of blue is waiting for you/Back in your own back yard" and running to the back window wanting to see this bird.

The mood was very comforting. There was something very warm and allencompassing about hearing Lester Young, and I remember thinking, There's music without words here, but they're trying to tell me something. It wasn't just background music; you had to listen to find out what they

to listen to find out what they wanted to tell you. Of course, I grew up listening to the Beatles and the Everly Brothers and Neil Sedaka too, and my father was a big Motown fan. The one thing we never listened to was classical music, and in a way I feel grateful that I was never introduced to the concept of there being serious music and non-serious music. The Rolling Stones were serious music in our house.

But there wasn't a lot of jazz on the radio, so when I started going to McGill University, I thought the ultimate in music was soul music. There was this boy at school who got very angry with me because I didn't know what was going on in jazz, so he lent me a bunch of jazz records, including *Kind of Blue* by Miles Davis. He was very strict with me and said, "I

want you to go home and listen to these."

I still remember Bill Evans's opening notes in "So What," the first song on the album. It was as if a window had opened. Like an add-a-pearl necklace, you find one person you like and then you start listening to records by their sidemen, and it just grows. It's like archaeology—you can enter the pharaoh's tomb from any one of a number of different channels. And that's what I want people to hear on Jazz Beat. I want people's imaginations to be opened. There are just so many rooms in this mansion, and you've got to visit them all and see which ones you like the view from. I want to get away from the very serious, academic approach and make it all right for people to listen, even if they don't know anything about jazz. All you have to know is what you like.

I started working at Radio McGill, and I always knew that I

wanted to work for the CBC. There was this friend of my mother who was contributing local reports to Our Native Land, but the producer decided he wanted everyone on the show to have some native blood, which this woman didn't. But I did, so I applied for her job and got it. I also did the local afternoon show for five years: During that time an announcer who had been doing a jazz show retired, and they were desperate for someone to produce and announce their own jazz show. I said if they were desperate, they'd have to use me.

When I started, ten years ago, people found it odd that a woman was doing a jazz show. That's changing, but I still get letters from guys who think I'm some sort of

pinup. It's almost as if they can't talk about jazz with their girlfriends or wives, and their fantasy is to find a woman who likes Charlie Parker. In many ways jazz is still very much a macho culture, maybe because there has always been a slightly combative element to it—you know, my solo's better than your solo.

For me, jazz is the music that is the most evocative of pure emotion. And it's not just about sex and anger and love and hate and having a great time on a Saturday night, although all of those are there. But there's a real spirituality about jazz. It can be very noble and stately in ways most people ascribe only to classical music. What makes it different is its improvisational nature—no matter what he starts with, the musician has to make something else out of it. It's an endless thing, which gives me an incredible feeling of peace. And when the lights go down at the Théâtre St-Denis during the festival, I still get that rush of, Oh, boy! You know who's coming out now? It's like going to the circus when you're a kid, that feeling of being there.

It's sort of like being in the same room as the Rosetta stone, except that musicians can speak to you with their music. I look at Miles Davis and think of all the amazing guys he's played with who are dead now. But he's still alive, and he has a little bit of the secret of their music in him. It's there if you're willing to listen.

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
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
